Brutal 'Deuce Of Spades,' Killing Of OSS Man Solved

U.S. Tells Russ Meeting Not A Peace Parley

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States told Russia today the Japanese peace treaty conference at San Francisco next month "is not a conference to reopen negotiations on the terms of peace."

In a formal note to Moscow, the U.S. in effect advised Russia that its apparent intention to raise basic treaty issues at San Francisco is out of order since the purpose of the meeting will be "conclusion and signature" of a treaty already drafted.

The note was made public shortly after President Truman said he did not think the arrangements already made for signing the treaty could be upset by anyone.

Mr. Truman was asked at a news conference if he thought the decision of the Russians to attend the San Francisco meeting would upset plans for signing the treaty.

He replied no, he didn't think the treaty can be upset by anyone. The President said he would be happy to see Andrei Gromyko, deputy Soviet foreign minister, if the latter wanted to visit him en route to San Francisco.

The American note declared Russia has had "equal opportunity with the other allies" during the past 13 months to help write the treaty.

U.S., Philippines To Sign Mutual Treaty For Defense

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States and the Philippines announced agreement today on a mutual defense treaty pledging each nation to "act to meet the common dangers" in event of an armed attack on the other.

The pact will be signed early next month. The announcement said the agreement will embody commitments which already exist between the United States and the Philippines.

The American-Philippines treaty is one of four now projected for signing next month in connection with Japanese peace. The other are the proposed Japanese peace treaty restoring Japan's independence and permitting its rearming; a mutual U. S.-Japanese security treaty to permit American armed forces to operate in and around Japan after the occupation ends; and an American-New Zealand-Australia defense treaty.

The Australia-New Zealand and the Philippines pacts would make precisely the same kind of commitment. In Article Four, the wording of each treaty is the same in substance.

This article says: "each party recognizes that an armed attack in the Pacific area on either of the parties would be dangerous to its own peace and safety and declares that it would act to meet the common dangers in accordance with its constitutional processes."

"Any such armed attack and all measures taken as a result thereof shall be immediately reported to the Security Council of the United Nations. Such measures shall be terminated when the Security Council has taken the measures necessary to restore and maintain international peace and security."

'Wrong Bottle' Kills Russian War Human Guinea Pigs Not Inevitable Solon Asserts

VERMILLION, S.D. — (AP) — Dr. Donald Slaughter, dean of the University of South Dakota medical school, said today the death of two "human guinea pigs" in a drug experiment occurred when a doctor on his staff "picked up the wrong bottle."

The staff doctor, whose name was withheld, had planned to participate in the experiment, along with a fourth person. Slaughter said the staff physician called him after injections had been given to Jack Clifford, 30, laboratory technician, and Mrs. Ardy Pearson, 26, a secretary. The injections were given Tuesday afternoon and Clifford and Mrs. Pearson died 24 hours later.

Dr. Slaughter said all known antidotes were given without effect after his assistant phoned to say: "I've made a mistake." Roy Milliken, chief agent of the drug firm and the university's attorney general's law enforcement division, was expected in Vermillion today to head up the state's inquiry.

Clifford, employed at the university for three years, is survived by his widow and four-year-old daughter. Mrs. Pearson was the wife of Everett W. Pearson, Milford, Conn., a student at the university.

Founders Of Progress Dead: Murder Is Ruled In Death Of Blocher; Body Found In Field MULESHOE — (AP) — Colorful old Joshua Blocher, who spent most of his life trying to make a little town here into a big city, was found today to be dead in a cotton field near here.

Blocher, about 85, was found yesterday by two youths irrigating a cotton farm. "It definitely is a case of murder," said Muleshoe Justice R. J. Klump.

Rangers and officers had been searching for Blocher since he disappeared Sunday from his one-room shack in Progress, the town he founded. Sheriff Hugh Freeman said the body apparently was dumped just inside the cotton field while Blocher was still alive.

Arms To Reds Involved In 1944 Slaying

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A cold-blooded "deuce of spades" killing of an American cloak-and-dagger officer behind enemy lines in Italy seven years ago has been solved, the Defense Department said yesterday.

The department declared Maj. William V. Holohan, then 40, was killed by two fellow American servicemen with the aid of two Italians. All were attached to an Office of Strategic Services (OSS) mission parachuted into enemy territory to get the low-down on partisan guerrilla bands.

One of the former U. S. servicemen denied any connection with the killing; the other withheld comment. Named by the department as the principals in the case were: Aldo Icardi, then a 23-year-old lieutenant, formerly of Pittsburgh but now employed in New York City; and the department's OSS formal mimeographed announcement that Icardi hatched the plot in a disagreement with Holohan over how much arms aid to give to Communist partisans.

At his home in Preskness, N. J., Icardi denied any part in the killing and said he assumed it may have been done by two Italians who, the department said, had told the entire story.

"The Department of Defense has gone way off base in assuming I am implicated," Icardi told a reporter. "I deny any connection with the killing."

"The way it happened is news to me. Now that those two men have admitted they were involved in the killing, I assume that part of the story is true. This is the (See BRUTAL, Page 2)

Record State Oil Allowable Is Scheduled

ABILENE — (AP) — The state railroad commission today set the state's September daily oil production allowable at a record 3,059,367 barrels — an increase of 76,861 barrels from the August 11 daily allowable.

It is the first time that Texas' daily oil production has been set at more than three million barrels. The commission set 19 producing days for the East Texas field and 24 for the rest of the state annually.

Three representatives from the Petroleum Administration for Defense told the hearing held in Abilene today that Texas must help alleviate the shortage of oil production caused by the shutdown in Iran.

Indonesia Raids Commie Officials JAKARTA, Indonesia — (AP) — The Indonesian government arrested 16 left-wing members of Parliament in a series of pre-dawn raids today. It was the first strong action taken by the government to fight a growing Red movement in this East Indian country.

The dramatic move was believed timed to forestall Communist demonstrations and possible trouble tomorrow observing Indonesia's independence from the Netherlands. The Communist party is legal here and the government has been lenient with it.

Jury Is Selected In McCracken Trial

SANTA ANA, Calif. — (AP) — Nine men and three women were seated today in the jury to hear the second trial of Henry Ford McCracken on a charge of murdering Patricia Jean Hull, 10.

Judge Robert Gardner at one point yesterday excused the jury and reprimanded Defense Counsel George Chula for reading possible court instructions.

"I consider it an abuse of judicial procedure to unduly prolong the selection of a jury," said Gardner. "There must come a time in this or any other case when we must apply the rules of reason."

McCracken is accused of luring the little girl from a theater last May 19, taking her to his motel cabin, killing her and burying her body in a canyon.

HST Says Many People Want Presidency — Few Qualified WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman said today there are plenty people ambitious to be president, but they don't know what they are getting into.

 first I have heard of it, however. "What the shocker stirred, I ren. That's the last I ever heard of him (Holohan)."

In Rochester, LoDolce's wife Ruby said "my husband does not want to make any statement until he finds out what it is all about."

She said he has been studying under the G.I. bill at the Rochester Institute of Technology.

The Defense Department said it and the Justice Department have been poring over isobooks seeking a way to prosecute Leardi and LoDolce in this country, and if added, "all possibilities have now been exhausted and it appears that the only hope of prosecution lies with action by the Italian courts."

The Italian embassy declined comment on whether it would seek to have the two men sent back to Italy for trial.

They cannot be tried by civil courts here since the slaying took place outside the U. S., and they are beyond reach of military courts because both have been discharged from service.

The department said the death of Holohan occurred on the night of Dec. 6, 1944. It said that after the major was killed, his body was tied up in a weighted sleeping bag and dropped into 30 feet of water in Lake Oka in the Alps near Trieste.

It declared that two Italians who were attached to the mission, under intelligence officers' questioning a year ago last June, "finally broke down and told the real story of what happened to Major Holohan."

The department said LoDolce, later located in Rochester, "finally confessed and wrote out a statement" which corroborated that of the two Italians.

An investigation by Army intelligence officers, the department said, turned up evidence that Leardi "had apparently embezzled and converted to his own use a considerably large sum of money in gold currency entrusted to him by Major Holohan."

But it did not indicate that was the motive for the killing.

As for that, the department said there was a bitter quarrel between Communist and non-Communist partisans, and that Holohan withheld further arms aid for both sides until he could sum up the situation.

"This precipitated the murder of the major, for it brought about a fatal division between Holohan and Leardi," the department said.

U. S. May Retaliate For Imprisonment

WASHINGTON (AP)—A plan to bar Czechoslovakia's airmen from flying over the U. S. zone in Germany is under study in the state department.

Officials said last night this is one of several moves being considered as retaliatory steps to the Czechs' imprisonment of Associated Press correspondent William N. Oatis.

Camera News

AP NEWSFEATURES
 Pictures that are dramatically different are possible for camera fans with either 35 mm or centimeter sheet film. The unusual touch is made possible by the use of infrared film now only available in 20-exposure 35 mm magazines (R 195) and in sheet film in common sizes. It is possible because infrared photography extends the camera's vision beyond the limits of the human eye. It penetrates haze and pictures the sky, green foliage and other objects in a manner entirely different from ordinary photography. Its trademarks are white trees and black skies.

The full story of infrared photography can be found in Kodak's latest revised data book, available at all camera stores: "Infrared and Ultraviolet Photography." But you don't have to digest all the technical details to produce its unusual results. Handling, loading, exposing and processing are practically normal, plus the use of a Wratten Filter 25 A for outdoor scenes.

White light, as we know it for normal photography, is a combination of the colors of the spectrum. When white light is passed through a glass prism it is visibly broken up into its component colors ranging from violet through blue, green, yellow, orange, red and deep red. We sometimes see this happen on a grand scale when a rainbow appears in the sky, the result of white light being split up by rain-

drops. These colors are visible light radiations of specific wave lengths.

But at other end of the spectrum are other light radiations which our eyes cannot see; those with shorter wave lengths are the invisible ultraviolet radiations.

At the other end, beyond the deep red, are the infrared radiations. These can be recorded on films which have been specially prepared through treatment of the emulsion with special dyes. Normal films are not sensitive to these infrared rays.

As with panchromatic film, infrared should be loaded into a camera in subdued light only. While they can be exposed in hand-held cameras, it is recommended that they be used on a tripod with the smallest opening feasible for best definition. For distant landscapes in bright sunlight the exposure would be about 1-20th second at f8 with A filter. For nearby scenes and architecture, 1 second.

Accurate focusing by eye is not possible since we're dealing with invisible light radiations. Some of the newer lenses have as part of their focusing scales, index marks (usually red) which are for use in taking infrared pictures. In other cases a slight increase in lens-to-film distance is necessary to compensate for the longer infrared wave lengths. That is why longer exposures at smaller lens openings are recommended to gain depth of field to offset the lack of critical visible focussing.

In normal photography, distant scenes are obscured by haze and are helped only slightly by haze filters. Infrared radiation is transmitted freely through this haze, so that distant objects which may be invisible to the naked eye, will register sharply on infrared negatives.

It is the chlorophyll in live green foliage which gives a noteworthy response to infrared film. In normal photography, it absorbs a large percentage of the visible light rays and reflects back to the lens but little and you have dark trees. Infrared radiations, however, are not absorbed by the chlorophyll so the

Citizens Eulogize Hearst In Death

(By The Associated Press) The death of William Randolph Hearst Tuesday has brought statements of regret eulogizing the newspaper empire builder as a great American patriot, humanitarian and distinguished journalist.

In New York, Francis Cardinal Spellman termed Hearst "a great American patriot... who fought battles on many fronts for all that America signifies and who leaves to posterity traditions to continue the fight for freedom and justice that will encourage and inspire Americans for generations."

In Chicago, Col. Robert R. McCormick, editor and publisher of the Chicago Tribune, wired William Randolph Hearst, Jr.: "My sincere sympathy to you in the loss of your father... His life up to the moment of his passing was devoted to the interests of his country and of humanity."

At Palo Alto, Calif., the secretary to former President Herbert Hoover released the following statement from Mr. Hoover: "William Randolph Hearst was the most powerful individual journalist in his day. His positive views, his trenchant expression, and his enormous circulation alone warrants that statement. He was a great newspaper empire that has endured and will continue to be the most potent force in American life."

Vice-President Alben W. Barkley said: "Mr. Hearst occupied a long and colorful career in the journalistic world. He made a distinct impression in formulating the opinions of the American public. He will be greatly missed by many, many Americans."

Hearst Burial To Be Where Work Began

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—William Randolph Hearst came back Wednesday to the city where he began building a newspaper domain that was to become known throughout the world.

His body, accompanied by four of his five sons, was flown to San Francisco from Beverly Hills, where he died Tuesday after a series of strokes. He was 85.

Four of Hearst's sons were at his bedside when he died. They are William Randolph Jr., George, David and Randolph. Also present were Martin F. Hubert, chairman of the board of the Hearst Corporation, and Richard E. Beilin, president of the Hearst Corporation.

Hearst's 87-page typewritten will already has been filed for probate in Los Angeles. His widow was left \$1,900,000 in cash and the income from a \$4,000,000 trust fund.

Former Screen Actress Marion Davies, in a codicil dated Aug. 15, 1947, was bequeathed the publisher's Beverly Hills home but a codicil, dated Sept. 8, 1948, revoked the bequest without explanation.

His will directs that the estate be divided into two trust funds — one for the family and the other the residuary or charitable trust.

Executors of the estate, the will directs, are not to part with ownership of any of the Hearst publications "unless it shall, in their opinion, be necessary or prudent to do so."

His five sons are to get enough preferred stock to realize an annual income of \$150,000 to be added to 100 shares of common stock in the Hearst Corporation.

Dr. Myron Prinzmetal said death was caused by "several cerebral vascular accidents." He said Hearst had "enjoyed robust health until approximately four years ago when he became subject to the ailments of advanced age."

He passed away at 9:50 a.m. Tuesday.

His death closed a career of 65 years as a newspaper publisher. His spectacular career began when he took control of the San Francisco Examiner in 1886. It was then a small newspaper.

It was from this start that he built a newspaper chain that at its peak represented a \$200,000,000 enterprise.

Who will continue to direct the huge publishing empire still is being completely answered. William Randolph Hearst, Jr., publisher of the New York Journal American, in a statement to editors of Hearst newspapers did say:

"It is with profound regret that I and my brothers agree you of the passing of our beloved father, William Randolph Hearst.

"Will you please convey to the readers of the Hearst newspapers our pledge to continue to operate our father's publications as he guided us, and our determination to carry on in the tradition of his life, which was dedicated to the service of America and the best interests of the American people."

Hearst introduced a colorful, campaigning kind of journalism. He was an unwavering enemy of Communism and was relentless in his attack upon any "ism" that challenged the American way of life.

In his native San Francisco, the San Francisco Chronicle, a competing newspaper, said editorially:

"... But from our own position of competitors we would grant without question his tre-

mendous stature as an editor and a working newspaperman as well as a financier."

U.S. Seeks To Protect Newsmen

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP)—The United States has asked the United Nations to urge revocation of sentences arbitrarily imposed upon news correspondents

performing their duties. The resolution did not mention Associated Press correspondent William N. Oatis by name, but the U. S. delegate's speech introducing the measure bitterly denounced Czechoslovakia for imprisoning the newsmen.

U. S. delegate Walter Kofschig presented the resolution to the UN Economic and Social Council, which is in session here.

It asked the council to appeal to all governments "to do all in their power to safeguard the right of correspondents freely and faithfully to gather and transmit news." It urged that "personal restraints be removed and notices imposing arbitrary punishments be revoked."

In his address introducing the resolution, Kofschig told the council the Communists sought "freedom from the foreign press" just as they had brought about the "subject submission of the domestic press."

He said there were only a dozen western correspondents in the entire Soviet Union, including one from the Communist Daily Worker of New York, and added that there was not a single non-Communist western correspondent in Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria and Albania. The western correspondents either were expelled, were denied re-entry visas, were forced to flee or were arrested, he said, adding that Oatis was "the latest victim of this policy."

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Japan Rearmament Is Newest Problem

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Should Japan be allowed to re-arm? This country says yes. Russia says no. Each has an ax of its own to grind.

There are many points of dispute between this country and Russia over the Japanese peace treaty proposed by the U. S. but the question of re-armament is the main one.

The treaty not only will let Japan re-arm but will allow the U. S. to keep military bases there indefinitely. The U. S. thinks that's the best policy for it to follow at this time.

Japan is the key point in this country's outer defenses in the Pacific. It faces armed China and armed Russia, both on the move, across a short stretch of water.

An armed Japan, backed by American planes and ships, will discourage communism from venturing into the Pacific. No one will argue that communism doesn't want to take over Japan. And unarmed Japan would be easier to take.

If we withdrew and Japan was kept disarmed, it would be a push-over for direct attack. Even fear of attack might weaken its will to resist so that it could be taken over internally, without outside shooting.

Whatever happened to Japan—conquest from without or from within—the result for the U. S. would be the same: loss of an ally and its greatest Pacific outpost.

During the war, when Russia was an ally, and for some time after the war, while there was still hope of getting along with Greece, this country's stated policy was different: it wanted Japan kept disarmed.

Events changed the policy: communism gobbled up Eastern Europe, took over Czechoslovakia from within; tried to take over Greece; and the communists took over China, tried to take over Korea.

The last two events tipped the scales: the conquest of China meant Japan, if kept unarmed, would be helpless against its two enormous and armed neighbors, China and Russia. Then communism would try to win by force what it couldn't take by persuasion.

Russia accuses the U. S. of being hypocritical for this change in policy, playing down, of course, its own reasons for wanting to keep Japan unarmed. But in the case of Japan it seems hardly likely that Russia can block a
