We keep learning new things about diseases which afflict the humen body and diseases which west not even

known a generation ago keep cropping up to plague us. For example, the catarrhal jaundice of 20 or 30 years ago which was thought of as a sort of irritation

of the bile passages, has become known as infectious or epidemic hepatitis. It is recognized as a virus disease attacking the liver. and accepted as a pretty serious health problem.

There are some peculiar things about this disease. It caused a good deal of trouble during World War II and at times a good many men were laid up with jaundice. The virus responsible is present in a good many plantand has been carried by blood transfusion, hypodermic needles and recently infections has been reported from tattooing.

Fortunately, the vast majority of those who acquire this infection recover without any apparent seriious after effects. The acute illness, however, is unpleasant and is almost always accompanied by fever and the typical yellow color of whites of the eyes and the

It takes a while-often several month—to recover. Rest in bed combined with the proper diet has to be kept up for a long time.

A curious thing about it is that It is almost impossible during the active stage to take any alcoholic drink because the liver has apparently lost its ability to handle this substance. Anyway, alcoholic liquors should be strictly avoided in this illness.

A few victims of infectious hepatitis seem to develop a chronic form of the disease which keeps them below par for a long time. There isn't any highly successful treatment for this but care in diet and attention to the general health are necessary for a long time.

To the extent that taxes cut the power to make demands on a limited supply of goods, they tend to dampen inflation. But if taxes fail to do that, if they are nothing but a transfer of spending power from one hand to another hand, the ability to demand goods has

been in no way decreased. To meet the danger of inflation there must be an attempt to bring the total demand into balance with the supply. 




