He uttered this final warning: The free world is "doomed to destruction" if it fails to crush completely the Communist threat in Korea.

The five-star general wound up three days of virtually constant testimony at 6 p.m. (EST) with a new blast at President Truman, denying he ever violated a presidential order and declaring he never got a firm, workable plan from Washington to carry on the Korean war.

"I felt in all conscience," Mac-Arthur said, "I could not go on the thousands in such a complete Groundwork vacuum of policy decision.

At 70 miles an hour we get a break of fifty-fifty, and at 60 miles an hour it is seven to one we'll live, but maimed. Even at the low end of the curve, from a dead stand to 20 miles an hour, it's one chance in about a thousand that we'll never tell how it happened.

Leaving out the Spanish American War, the Mexican War, the Indian Wars in the conquest of the west, and other minor affrays, we have engaged in about 25 years of major combat. The ones we left out, lumped together, would certainly make three full years of fighting, and we get a total of 28 years of battle. So, our automobiles are twice

I have been quoting and commenting from an 18 page letter written by public school teacher Mrs. Michael Lehrer of Colorado Springs. She realizes the difference between education and training. And if the icderal government did the same thing, the rich communities could help poorer communities which is the only argument for tax supported schools. But the whole principle is immoral and the bigger the unit becomes, the more wasteful and tyrannical it becomes. It is, of course, easier to control on a local basis than on a federal basis, but it is impossible to control and correct human relations based on no eternal principles whether it be on a big or small scale.

#### The Doctor Says

By EDWIN J. JORDAN, MD.

Several good questions about Meniere's disease have been sent by Mrs. W. Others, no doubt, are inverested in the " same things.

'How." she asks "can a specialist tell that a person has Meniere's disease? First there are the symptoms of dizzy spa"a, ringing in the cars. and slight loss of hearing.

Then there are a number of special tests including spinning in a rotating chair and testing with tuning forks. In fact the special methods and equipment available are such that an accurate diagnosis can almost always be made.

Another thing Mrs. W. asks is whether Meniere's disease is refated to a brain tumor. The answer to this is "usually not." Once in a while a brain tumor produces symptoms similar to those of Meniere's disease but this is the cause only in a small proportion of those who suffer with this condition.

Then Mrs. W. inquires about treatment. The majority of cases are caused by the accumulation of fluid in the inner portion of the ear (sometimes spoken of as drop-(y). If the amount of fluid can be essened the symptoms tend to im-

Hence one form of treatment sas been aimed at cutting down the fluid intake of the body or removing excess fluid. Other medical treatments are often used involving the giving of certain

"Is Meniere's disease fatal and does an operation guarantee re-sults?" are Mrs. W.'s final questions. No the disease is not fatal. Rather it tends to run on for years with gradual improvement in some of the unpleasant symptoms such as dizziness and ringing in the ears. There is apt to be some increase in the loss of hearing.

As to operation guaranteeing results, this must be answered with a "no" also. In fact it is impossible to guarantee results operation has sometimes been used for Meniere's disease, the results have been variable.

Space prevents saying much more about this disease now, but I should like to mention one thing more. Because of the dizzy spells ictims of Meniere's disease are particularly liable to falls in which they may injure themselves. This







One of the most unusual pieces produced in the Pampa man's workshop is the inlaid picture which requires about 75 hours of tedious work, and is a superb example of craftsmanship.

The pictures resemble a painting, but instead of painting with oils, Wright paints with wood— wood in its natural state. He combines pieces of veneers of the same thickness (1-28th of an inch) and fits them together like a jig saw puzzle, and thus forms

The Wright home is accented with the results of many hours labor in the workshop, even though he gives away almost everything he makes. There are candlesticks, coffee tables, lamp bases, serving trays and inlaid pictures.

Woods for the workshop are ordered by the square foot from order houses catering to the home craftsman and come in thin Wright has mahogany from Cuma and the Philippines, ebony from India, burbinga from Africa, rosewood from Brazil, lacewood from Australia, tamo from Japan and hundreds of other varieties from this country and other parts of the world.

The multifarious colors help achieve the unusual shading effects on the inlaid pictures. A zebrano wood from Africa is appropriately named because of brown stripes on blonde. A purpleheart wood from Dutch Guiana was named because of its deep purple color. A sample of holly wood compared to other woods proved it to be the whitest wood available.

Where a color is not available in the natural woods, dyed wood can be ordered from the order houses. Maple is used almost exclusively for dying.

Wright, who was reared in Colorado, has lived around trees

all his life (until he came to the Plains in 1942 from New York) and has made an extensive study of woods. On a trip to Cuba he brought back a very dense wood, Lignum Vitae, that is used for ship bearings. It is the heaviest and hardest wood known to commerce, weighing 84 pounds per cubic foot, and is one of the most unusual woods in the shop.

Another different kind of wood

is the burl. It is a side wart-like growth found on many kinds of trees and has the appearance of a mass of penetrating eyes with a swirling character.

The wood grainings are important to the character of the mlaid pictures. Laying the pieces of veneer according to their grain is similar to the way a seamstress cuts "on the straight of the material."

An ardent fisherman, the Pampa man has been tying his own flies for the last five years and completes a fly in 10 minutes. He uses everything from a skunk tail to hair from a polar bear (dyed yellow) for making flies. He also uses silk, yarn, tinsel, peacock feathers (a choice material), and human hair (just to show people it would work). He's caught a "bunch of trout," too! The main equipment for tying flies is a little ingenuity and a

fly-tying device.
Of all the things Wright makes and gives away, there's one item that he makes for himself ex-clusively. "I never give away a fly rod." he said.

He has devised special tools on his drill press to work and taper split bamboo at the same ime, but still it takes some 40 or 50 hours to complete a rod. He builds the rods in five secions because he believes it is better and stronger than the commercially popular six section-

For the beginning home craftsman, Wright suggests the maga-zine "Popular Home Craft" and explains that the cost of the hobby is insignicant compared to the time spent. A home work-shop can be built around one lathe and from that one machine hundreds of items can be made such as bowls, candlesticks, lamps and plates.

Wright is perhaps the only man in Pampa who practices mar-quetry. When the Trapp family appeared here in connection with the Community Concert series, they visited in the Wright home and were surprised to see the inlaid pictures. They had known the use of veneer to exist in Austria when they were children, but had not seen it in many

Though the use of veneer goes back 15 centuries B. C., it was not until the Renaissance that work in veneer got a strong foothold. In the tomb of King Tut objects were found showing the use of fine veneer, and it is, in a way, remarkable that similar work is being done by a total


