Says Will Quit If Reds Assure Peace

WASHINGTON -(AP)- Secretary of State Acheson hinted strongly Saturday the United States is willing to halt the fighting in Korea at Parallel 38 if there can be assurances of no further Red aggression.

He told senators this government might agree to a "reasonable settlement that would accomplish the military pur-

Then he explained further: "That is, if the aggression would end and you had reliable assurances that it would not be resumed, then you could return to a peacetime status and we would hope gradually to remove troops from Korea, both Chinese troops and United Nations troops.' The U. N. forces now are along the 38th Parallel and

Fine of \$1,000 For Being An American

How the concept of Americanism has changed from that held by the writers of the Declaration of Independence was vividly illustrated by the fine of \$1,000 placed on Dr. Edward A. Rumely, secretary of the Committee for Constitutional Government, Dr. Rumely refused to give the Buchanan Committee the

names of the purchasers of quantities of books that the Committee sells. Years ago when the first official document of this country was written, people believed that their or their business was their castle, and that so long as they did not directly injure others, the government had no right to inquire into their doings. The Committee for Constitutional Government believed, and probably correctly, that many people would not buy large quantities of books and distribute them if the government made their

names public, so that socialists

and communists could attack them

in every method possible. I was responsible for buying quite a number of books from this organization and I would have no objection to anyone knowing it. I am not ashamed that I helped distribute such books as "The Road Ahead" by John T. Flynn and such book as "The "Constitution" by Thomas James Norton, The Committee is now distributing a new book by Norton called "Undermining the Constitution" which should be in every man's hands who makes any pretense whatsoever of understanding the principles on which this government was form-

But many individuals and corporations do not have the same attitude that I do toward defending the American principles. They seem to be ashamed that they are spending money and time to distribute books that they believe will promote the American idea. In fact, most of them do not even understand it themselves well enough to defend it. They are willing to lay down money, but are not willing to let the world know what they stand for. If most of them were asked questions about The American way, they would have to contradict themselves because in many cases they are advocating things that are unAmerican and therefore they would be embarrassed if they attempted to publicly defend American principles.

Undoubtedly Dr. Rumely and the Committee had a moral and thus a Constitutional right to refuse to divulge the names of those who purchased large quantitles of books from them. The amount of books they were able to distribute would undoubtedly be reduced if the names were made public.
