CLEBURNE, Tex. — (AP) — A swarm of bees madder than a bunch of hornets speeded things up at a traffic light on the Dallas Hwy. in Cleburne yesterday. Cars stopped for the light jerked suddenly away with a stream of bees buzzing them. Police Chief Orin Smith went out to take personal charge to try for order in the confusion. Fire department and sanitation officers were trying to get the bees in order. Some 20 persons had been stung by noon, and the bees still were hanging around the light. It all began when Joe Vaughn tried to get the bees out of the walls of his grocery store. They moved, all right, leaving Vaughn with three bites and one eye closed by swelling. Vaughn closed the front door of his store and was letting customers in through the back.

Citizens Ask Action Against Law Violators

Boyle Defends Bald Headed Men From Barber's 'Slander'

NEW YORK — (AP) — Bald-headed men of America, arise! The enemy is attacking us again. They're at our very gates. Who's our foe? Nobody but our old cutthroat buddies—the nation's barbers. Listen: "Men with hair are more virile and romantic than those who are bald." That bare-headed slander came from Nick Caluthis, president of the United Master Barbers of America. "Although there may be no biological relationship between business and virility," he added, "the confidence that goes with having a full head of hair gives men more verve in their amours." "Barbers know very well that a woman regards a man's hair in the same light as a man regards a woman's figure." Well, how does a wise man prefer a woman's figure? Cover it with a buffalo belt? Caluthis teed off on us baldies by releasing his organization's annual selection of the "10 best heads of hair in America." His lucky 10: Educator Alfred C. Kinsey, Bernard Baruch, Band leader Elliot Lawrence, New York Police Commissioner Thomas F. Murphy, Salvador Dali, Film Actor Errol Flynn, Scientist Albert Einstein.

Nelson Rockefeller, Ben Hogan, and Arthur Godfrey. There is no quarrel to be found with the list—for sentimental, old-fashioned folk who still like hairy-topped men best. More people in the world live in thatched huts than in houses with slate roofs, but they aren't as comfortable. What forward-looking man of taste today wants to keep his hair anyway? It falls in his eyes, gets caught in electric fans, grows over his ears and makes it hard for him to hear over the telephone. It isn't of help to him in any way, except as a cushion if he is hit with a blackjack. And a man who keeps getting hit with blackjacks doesn't really need more hair. He needs more judgment. All the evidence of modern science tends to prove that bald-headed men are actually more virile than hairy-headed men. Smart women have already found that out, too, and nobody has to feel sorry for "old baldy" today. He's doing all right. The reason he doesn't brag more is that he doesn't want the guys with hair to shave it off and increase his competition.

Muffin Bites On The Job

LONDON — (AP) — Two London librarians have become official muffin bites to Sherlock Holmes. Their duties take them to a Sherlock Holmes exhibition organized as part of the Festival of Britain on the site of 221B Baker Street, storied residence of the sleuth and Doctor Watson. Many visitors to the exhibition took exception to pieces of half-eaten buttered toast which lay on the tea plates, presumably by Holmes and Watson when called out on an urgent case. The toast was all wrong. Favorite tea of Holmes and his assistant was a toasted muffin. Muffins were a problem to the organizers — British bakers usually make them only in winter. Finally a supply was found at St. Albans, 20 miles outside London. So the two librarians have been given their instructions — to bite a piece out of the muffins each day, as they come fresh from the baker. During World War II the U.S. Navy was able to reduce by one-half the amount of rubber required by combat vessels.

House Refuses To Pass 'Wetback' Penalty Measure

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House refused yesterday to approve criminal penalties for farmers who employ Mexicans who have entered this country illegally. It rejected, 125 to 55, a proposal by Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.) to write such a penalty provision into a bill legalizing the importation of Mexican farm workers into the United States. Rep. Cooley (D-N.C.), chairman of the agriculture committee which sponsored the bill, told the House that adoption of the Celler amendment would spell defeat of the measure. Debate continued on a proposal by Rep. Polk (D-Ohio) to substitute a Senate-approved bill for the measure sponsored by the House agriculture group.

Artist Finds Secret Of Old Medieval Craft

PARIS — (NEA) — An intense, bushy-haired man who holds the official title of "best worker in France" is also a living replica of the medieval artist-craftsman.

A master coppermith and enameler, as well as a talented violinist, Robert Barriot's way of life at the moment is as ancient as his craft.

When he was commissioned in 1946 to decorate the high altar of the Church of St. Odile, his contract stipulated he must live and work "on site" just as the craftsmen of the Middle Ages did. So Barriot and his family moved into the steeple of the church, where they have lived and worked ever since.

Barriot got the idea of enameling copper 25 years ago. "The ancient Persians knew the art," he says, "but this was lost down through the ages." It took him four years to work it out, and today he's the only craftsman who knows the secret. He's noted for other work, too — as a sculptor on wood, an illustrator on parchment, a silversmith, and an interior decorator.

A visit to the Barriot quarters, just above the organ loft in the church, is like suddenly going back several centuries in time. The walls of the long, narrow, low-ceilinged room, lit up by two millioned windows, is covered with his work. Here and there are antique cupboards into which are crammed the family's clothes, crockery, and other household affairs. At one end, shut off by a curtain, are the bunks for the three Barriot children, Dan-

iel, 11; Baudouin, 10, and Catherine, 8.

Housekeeping for Mme. Barriot is somewhat complicated. There is running water (cold), but no central heating, no bathtub or other modern convenience. Since family relaxation leans toward the musical, the Barriots have managed to squeeze a baby grand piano, a spinet and a couple of harps into their steeple.

Barriot's work table is in the living room, where he usually works at night engraving and hammering out his designs. This doesn't seem to bother the children.

"You see, it's a pretty rhythmic, regular hammering," he explains. "When they were babies it would lull them to sleep."

His only tools are three hammers, two wooden embossing punches, a hand-vice and a file. "If I find I need another tool," he says, "I make it myself. I'm convinced the ancients worked this way. Each man had his own secrets and formulas."

Mme. Barriot helps her husband in the more delicate stages of his work. Every enamel piece has to be fired seven times, which means an all-night session with the giant electric oven in the church basement.

Barriot's most ambitious religious works are the seven panels, each 12 feet high and 30 inches wide, representing the 24 old men of the Apocalypse. Created for St. Odile, they took two and a half years.

Outside the church, however, many wealthy art patrons seek the robust "profane" works he finds time to create. These have included friezes representing, among others, "Dance Macabre," "Gargantua," and "The Seven Deadly Sins," all treated with the realism and color of medieval art and sculpture.

Art connoisseurs, he says, "are more interested in religious subjects than one would imagine. But all the same, any subject with a slightly macabre touch is a sure sale. It seems to fulfill a certain need in these agitated modern times."

Local Couple Goes On Honeymoon, Just 25 Years Late

Mr. and Mrs. Cary, on their first trip to the falls, met many "second honeymooners" who had returned to the romantic horse-drawn carriages with their grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Cary covered 5,816 miles on the trip. They returned Tuesday, and like the saying goes, "it's better late than never."

Funds Granted To Prof For Study Of Water Tastes

DENTON, Texas — (AP) — A North Texas State college professor has been granted \$7,776 to continue his studies into causes and control of odors and tastes in water.

The National Institute of Health announced the grant to Dr. J. K. G. Silvey, professor of biology, for research in water supplies. He is chairman of the science division at NTSC.

Silvey, who has had several such grants, said the research should help predict whether certain planned reservoirs would have water with tastes and odors, whether certain streams should or should not be used for water supplies, and what treatment should be used.

"The research also will investigate methods of purifying water," said Silvey. His studies will include the Midwest and Southwest. Silvey has done research work on water supplies of Dallas, Waco, Breckenridge, Ranger, Galveston, Denton and Oklahoma City.

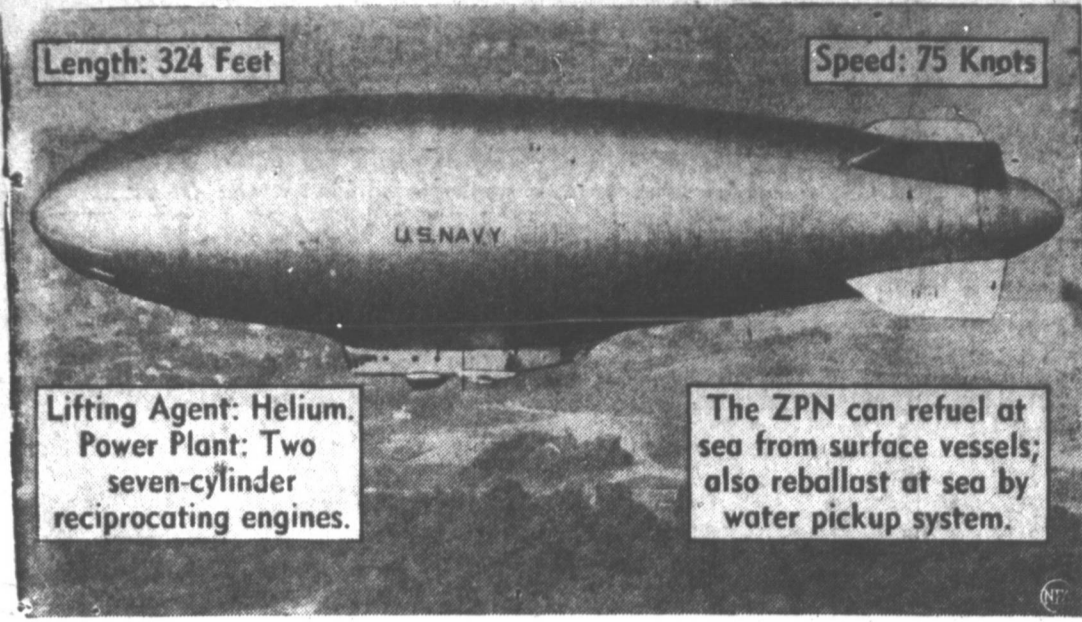

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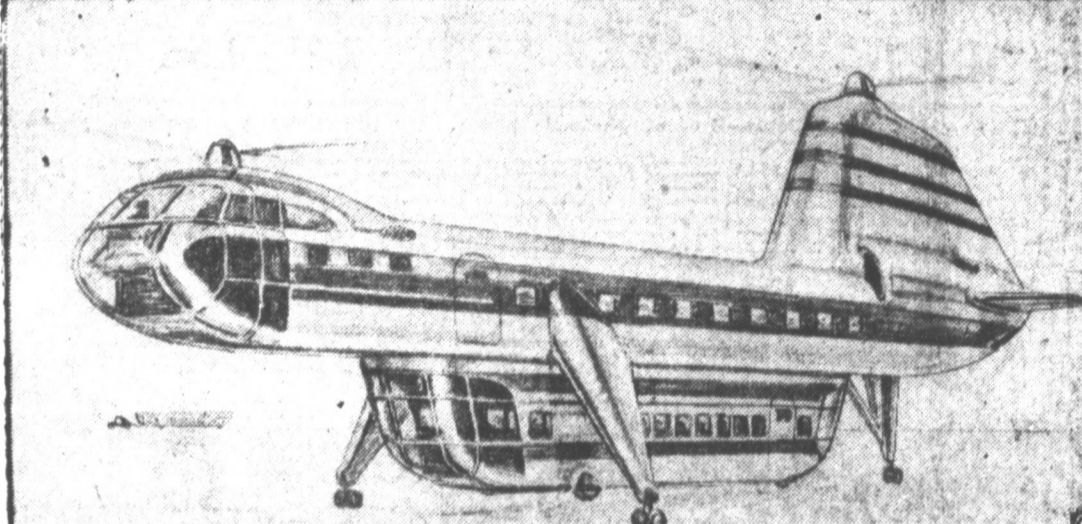

'Flying Windmill' May Solve Commuters' Travel Problem

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Be- fore too many years go by, many be traveling via "flying windmill." That's the fond, fanatical hope of America's helicopter manufacturers, who think they're closer to their goal than ever before.
The men who make the "copters" and other students of aviation feel that in two or three years helicopter transportation will be an important part of commercial aviation. They see four possible fields for a passenger-carrying "copter":
1. Commuter service, carrying people from suburban communities to downtown areas and back home again.
2. Shuttle service, carrying airline passengers from existing airports to the downtown area and suburban communities.
3. Shuttle service, running between airports that are scattered on the fringes of big cities.
4. Short-haul service, carrying passengers between cities for distances under 100 miles.
With graph and chart, the manufacturers build a pretty good case on how the helicopter can handle each of those jobs efficiently.
They admit, right off the bat, they're not competing with existing fixed-wing aircraft. They're competing with even the most economical transport helicopter. And they further admit that said economical transport helicopter is still just a sketch on somebody's drawing board.
But, even though the helicopter costs more to run, it does have advantages for the four types of services it is shooting at.
Commuter service, the manufacturers claim, will be a natural for the "copter. Costs will compare favorably with a taxi-ride, and speed will, of course, be much greater.
The same story applies to the two shuttle services, bringing today's widespread airports closer to the cities and to each other.
But it is in the field of short-haul service, relatively new for the ambitious helicopter, that the manufacturers see the greatest revenue. And it is here, also,

that they unleash their statistical big guns.
They prove that a passenger, going from one city to another less than 100 miles away, would save time by going via helicopter. The conventional plane has a faster cruising speed, but the helicopter travels from downtown-to-downtown. The passenger doesn't have a long trip by bus or taxi from downtown to the airport on both ends of his trip to catch a "copter."
By the same token, he spends the same (or less) money. Even though helicopter fare may be higher than conventional plane fare, the traveler has no taxi or bus fare to take him out to the airport.
That logic doesn't work if the trip is more than 100 miles, or possibly 150. There the conventional plane's speed and economy win out.
Of course, there are hitches to the rosy helicopter picture. First, there have to be large transport helicopters, capable of carrying big loads. These are on the way.
All the big manufacturers are working with such craft. The Bell Feeder-Liner could carry 10 passengers and 480 pounds of cargo 100 miles. A commercial version of McDonnell's HJ-1 would have a 12-passenger capacity. A commercial version of Piasecki's HRP-2 could carry 12 passengers on a commuter line, or 15 on a longer trip. The Sikorsky S-55 is built to haul 10 passengers.
Even bigger helicopters are on drawing boards. Piasecki is developing a ship for the Air Force called the XH-16, which they figure might work out commercially in seven or eight years. This one would handle 40 passengers.
One version of this helicopter-of-the-future has a "capsule" which is loaded beforehand with passengers. The mother ship clamps it on, flies off, deposits it at the airport, and clamps on another one. It would work like a truck-trailer, with the people riding in the trailer.
Another drawback to helicopter service isn't quite as easily written off as the problem of large ships. This is the "copter-port, which must be close to the downtown area or it would defeat the purpose.
There are a lot of cities where airports of any type are now zoned out of the downtown area. This may be for reasons of safety, or nuisance, or noise. Such zoning regulations must be removed, or there'll be no helicopter-ports downtown.
And if there are no helicopter-ports downtown, the dream of a gold mine windmilling down from the sky will vanish.

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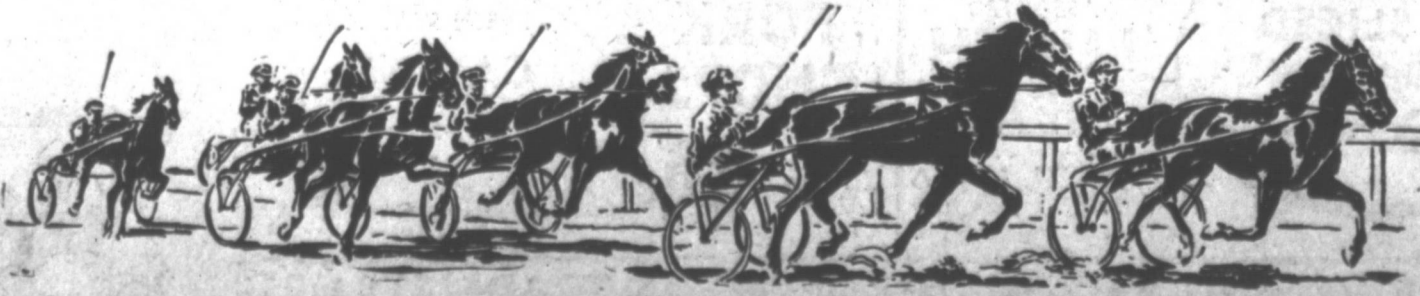

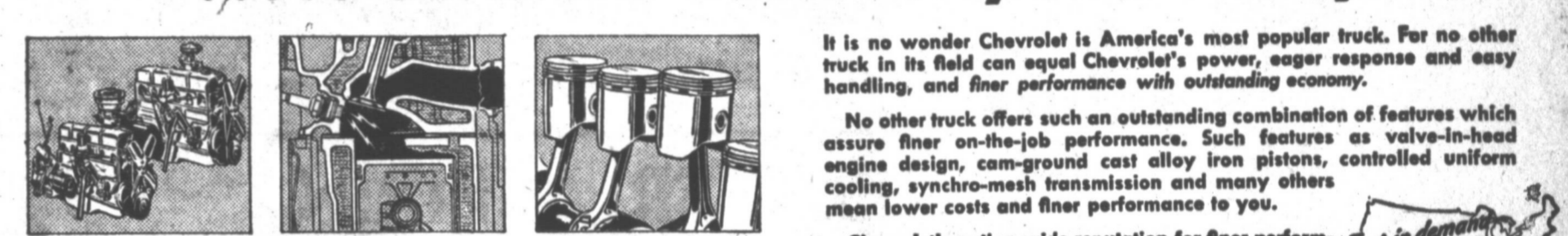

THE LATEST ATTACK TO EDUCATION
Truth, London, Eng.

That there is something radically wrong with education in this country would now deny, though what it is precisely that is the matter remains in dispute, though it ought to be sufficiently clear. The fact is that the whole Socialist conception of the meaning and purpose of education is based upon a fallacy, which is that every child, apart from a small and negligible minority of sub-normals, is capable of benefiting by the ordinary educational processes and attaining thereafter to a certain high standard of educational achievement. From this vast pool of educated "personnel" were to be drawn the recruits for the ever increasing Civil Service of the future required for the running of the Welfare State.

The facts are quite different. Only about 75 per cent of children are educable at all, of whom, perhaps, 25 per cent are sufficiently intelligent to warrant their continuing their studies at an university, and only 3 per cent are of the highest—that is, scholarship—standard. All of which, as it goes directly against Socialist theory, is held to be anathema—that theory, to which every true Socialist clings like a drowning man to a spar, being that there is no such thing as a naturally endowed elite, but that all, had they the opportunity, would reach to a like high level.

Nevertheless, although this is nonsense, for obvious reasons it is still desperately upheld, as is seen by the action now proposed under the London School Plan, whereby the grammar schools belonging to the administrative county are to be merged into comprehensive secondary schools. This proposal has been vigorously attacked in the Press by those who are vigilant enough to see what is happening, and for a number of irrefutable reasons—that the destruction of the old grammar schools, with their ancient traditions and high standards of academic teaching, is a mistake in itself; that the comprehensive high schools which will result from the amalgamation, containing, as they will, upwards of 2,000 pupils, will be far too unwieldy in size; that the corresponding comprehensive schools in America—the only models at present in existence—are indicative of a lower standard of education than the average English grammar school, and that the "propagation of social unity," which the supporters of the comprehensive school see as its main advantage, is irrelevant to a purely educational purpose.

The reply to all this is the classic one which ever obtains in such conditions. It is a blind amazement that there should be so much fuss, when, in point of fact, no real educational conditions are contemplated. The chairman of the L.C.C. Education Committee in a letter to The Times newspaper writes: "When Mr. Wechsler talks of a 'threat' to London grammar schools and of a 'policy' of extinction and uses the word 'destroy' he is misusing words. What is intended in future is an enlargement of opportunity and a more widespread and varied education in an atmosphere of social unity and the development side by side of high standards of technical and academic work for all children in the community."

Despite these doses of soothing syrup, the fact remains that the grammar schools are being deliberately attacked because of their superiority, because they dare to aspire to a higher standard of excellence than the ruck. Every teacher knows that it is rubbish to maintain that it is possible to develop side by side equally high standards of academic and technical work. Any attempt to do so can have only the effect of lowering the academic standard, which is the standard that matters.

That, of course, is precisely what the Socialists want to do. Refusing, as they still do, to recognize the naturally unequal distribution of intellectual gifts, they are determined to enforce an unnatural conformity. Everything must be leveled down to the "technical" standard, the level of parts which be held back lest his rate of progress exceed that of the veriest dunce at the bottom of the class—and all this not in the best interests of education but in the sacred name of "social unity."

The fact that were such a policy to succeed it would destroy the very basis of the whole Socialist system means nothing to the doctrinaires who are now pushing it through. But, of course, it cannot succeed. Of that we may be certain. Nevertheless, it is devoutly to be hoped that in the meanwhile the destruction of those grammar schools which are immediately threatened may yet be averted.

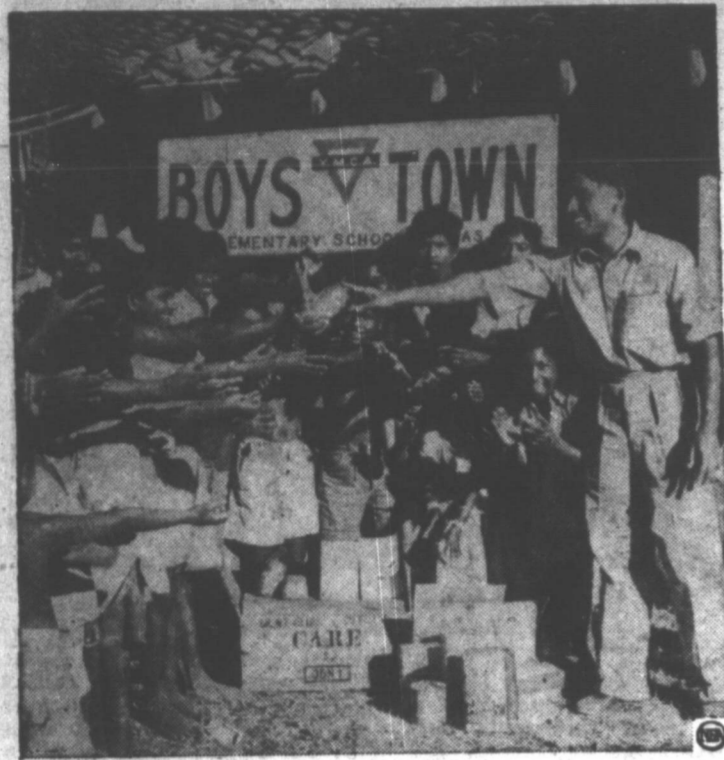

Pre-Dawn Search For Orphans Builds YMCA Town For India

By NEA Foreign Service MADRAS, India — (NEA) — The boys in the Boys' Town here were recruited at four in the morning. Lawrence Burr, international secretary of the Madras YMCA, original of the pre-dawn search for orphans.

Burr came to India from Chicago in 1946. Immediately, he was struck by the tragedy of hordes of homeless boys and girls wandering in the Madras streets. He saw that they had to beg and steal and scavenge for food.

He began going through the streets and alleys at 4 a. m., gathering up the boys he found sleeping there. Within a few months, he opened a hostel that grew from 15 boys to the 55-boy-capacity Boys' Town he now operates.

One of the features of Burr's home for boys is that the youngsters are not locked in, nor made to stay against their will. If the boy chooses to, he can walk out at any time and back to his life as a street urchin. Few have quit Boys' Town, since they've been introduced to it.

Besides providing food, clothing, shelter and medical care, the YMCA Boys' Town maintains a school. During school hours, the place becomes co-ed, as some girls are among the 30 outside children who attend the classes.

All of Madras state is now short of food. This is the fourth straight year that the life-giving monsoon has failed. Foodgrain supplies are scarce, and Boys' Town is suffering too.

The boys' rice ration was reduced to six ounces per boy per day. The wheat ration, which had been two ounces per day, was eliminated. The Boys' Town budget allows for only ten rupees (about \$2.10) a month to feed each boy. That's not enough to provide fruit and fresh vegetables.

The one bright spot for the boys is the help they get from outside. Especially treasured are CARE packages, which some Americans send them.

Each package contains 33 1-2 pounds of rice, milk powder, sugar, flour and other nourishing supplies. That's more food than a boy's ration for an entire month.

The boys, although skinny and underweight compared to American boys, are far better off than the other youngsters who still roam India's streets.

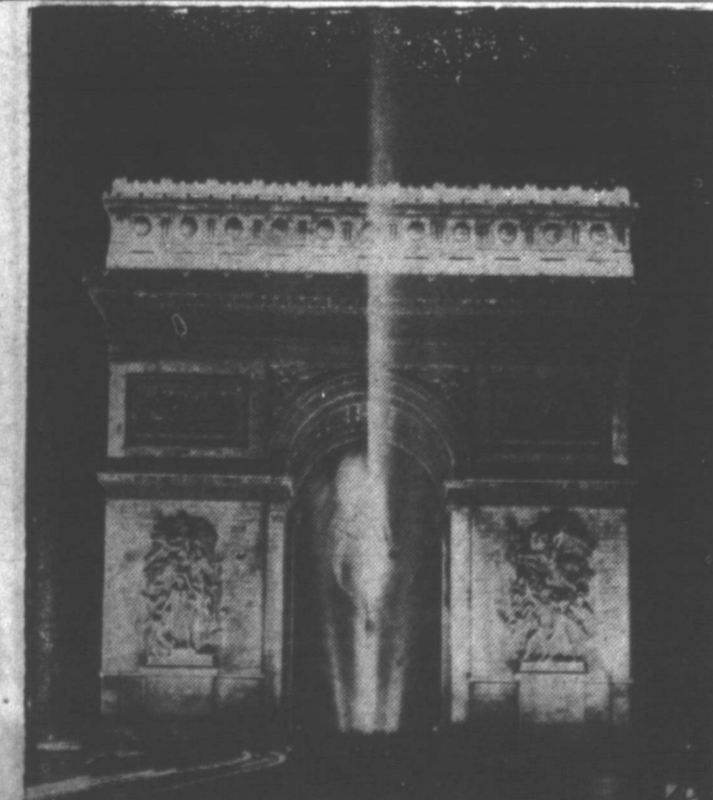

Consumer Advisory Committee Set Up

A national consumer advisory committee has been set up under the Office of Price Stabilization, according to an announcement by Michael V. DiSalle, price stabilization director.

The committee has three purposes: (1) To make certain that the consumer's interest has definite opportunity to be heard, on an advisory basis, in the formulation of OPS policies and regulations.

(2) To see that the OPS work is understood by the consumer-representative groups in local communities and national offices of the cooperating organizations.

(3) To enable the OPS to receive consumer reaction to its program channeled through the cooperation organizations, and hal-

ance the flow of comments and suggestions from industry. Representatives of 22 organizations have been invited to attend preliminary meeting with OPS in Washington this week.

Veterans Ask For Firm U.S. Policy

DALLAS — (AP) — The state convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars adopted a resolution yesterday calling for a "firm policy of preparedness" for the United States.

The resolution asked that this country make no appeasement in Korea and that the nation remain fully armed.

"We urge that the United States should never find itself in a position where it must fear anyone," the resolution read.

It was sponsored by Tom Reid of Abilene.

Bob told me his traveling's proved valuable.

"The habit of going to the movies is still ingrained with the public. Of course, television might be able to get people out of the habit, but I think the movies are holding their own."

Despite his enthusiasm for the Europeans, he declared the U.S. still has the prettiest girls.

every experienced player should recognize at once. Today's hand, for example, should be a matter of routine to a good bridge player.

South wins the first heart trick and returns the queen of diamonds at once. This gives the opponents a choice of defenses—both equally bad.
If the defenders return trumps, declarer gets a free finesse and can probably (with normal distribution) draw the trumps and then develop the diamonds. Normally, the hand should then lose two diamond trick but nothing else.
If the defenders fail to return trumps, South is ready to cross-ruff. For example, suppose West takes the ace of diamonds and returns a heart. Dummy wins with the king of hearts and an attempt is made to cash the king of diamonds.
This attempt fails when East

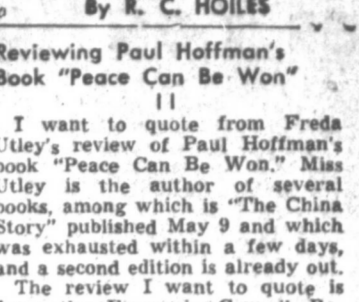

WASHINGTON — Secretary Oscar Chapman's persistent but indirect attempt to seize authority for development of all the natural resources of the nation has finally precipitated a violent battle in open court between his Department of Interior and the Federal Power Commission.

It is an unprecedented legal and jurisdictional clash between two agencies that will affect every large and small industry and retail business having even a remote connection with operations covered by the interstate commerce or general welfare clause of the Constitution.

It is a situation that will be resolved by the Federal courts, and the outcome will have far-reaching implications for the future of the nation's natural resources.

Several reasons account for the "dog-in-the-manger" attitude of the Federal Power Commission. It is significant that Secretary Chapman did not attempt to force the Interior Department until after President Truman's 1948 reelection.

MONOPOLY — Interior and FPC will next meet in judicial combat on Sept. 4 before the U. S. Court of Appeals at Richmond, Va. Ironically, the contestants will be the Interior Department against the FPC, which will be associated with the applicant for the Roanoke River power license, the Virginia Electric & Power Co.

Incentive Gets Boom For Defense Plant

GLENDALE, Calif. — (NEA) — One of the hottest war production ideas in the country is the incentive pay plan of General Controls Co., makers of jet engine controls and numerous other vitally-needed aircraft apparatus.

Its amazing success at licking most of the knotty labor problems plaguing America's expanding war industries delights Pentagon officials. It has aroused the interest of industrial experts all over the U. S. Here is what the plan has accomplished for General Controls:

It has reduced turnover to a minimum of less than one-half of one percent. Absenteeism is practically non-existent. While a 11 other West Coast industries are frantically recruiting workers, General Controls is swamped with applications. About the only way to get in is to know somebody inside the plant. The company gets along fine with the union — International Association of Machinists.

The diligence and hard work which the plan inspires among its workers give the company a

favorable competitive position in its particular market. It probably has one of the highest production-per-worker rates of any industry in the U. S., independent labor experts agree. Last year it doubled its sales to \$13,200,000.

There is not much basically new about GC's incentive plan. A standard is set for a particular job, based on what the average worker would accomplish without loafing during an eight-hour day. Then an employee is paid extra for everything he produces over that average.

It is the completeness of the plan, plus some brand new wrinkles, which makes GC's version unique. There are 30,000 different measured standards for 1200 employees. Even many of the white-collar workers have standards over which they get incentive pay.

The result is that each employee makes about \$2000 a year above his basic salary — and above the average for the Los Angeles area. With other pay ideas the average employee of General Controls now makes about \$5000 a year, and many production workers are in the \$9000 to \$10,000 bracket.

Will Earth Satellites Be Our Defense For Future?

BALTIMORE — (NEA) — Fifteen years from now, if an enemy makes a sneak attack against this country, retaliation could land in his front yard in less than an hour.



William B. Bergen who has been with Glenn L. Martin Co. since 1937, is the author of numerous technical papers and winner of the Lawrence Sperry Award in 1949 for his research on dynamic loads of aircraft. After serving as chief flight test engineer for Martin, in 1945 he became chief of the company's guided missile program, working on the Navy's Viking Rocket. He was made chief engineer in 1949 and a vice president in 1951.

This quick answering blow would be possible through earth satellites with warheads, speeding around the world at 17,000 miles-per-hour and controlled from the ground by radio.

The realism of earth satellites within the 15-year period is possible only if a concerted program of development is carried out.

These predictions are based on the findings of scientists who have been experimenting with rockets and rocket propulsion for a number of years, and my own experiences with the U. S. Navy's Martin Viking rocket, the most successful high-altitude rocket yet built in this country. These predictions are my personal opinions, as the Martin Company is not working on any satellite project.

The Viking has already attained a speed of 4000 miles per hour. Slightly more than four times this speed will be sufficient to establish the rocket in an orbit around the earth with

enough velocity to counteract the pull of the earth — and the rocket becomes a satellite. This is exactly the same principle that keeps the moon in its much larger orbit, preventing it from falling to the earth under the pull of gravity.

Peacetime as well as war potentials are envisioned for these man-made "platforms" speeding around the earth nearly 400 miles up. Rocket men would naturally get a great deal of satisfaction just for the mere accomplishment of making a satellite.

new production machine or method is discovered.

"We couldn't maintain our competitive position unless we did this," he explains, "and our employees realize this."

The present Viking rocket, with which I have been associated since its inception, is an outgrowth and improvement of the German V-2 used during the war. It is being used by Navy scientists to explore the upper atmospheric regions and obtain valuable data about a little-known region.

The Viking has on two occasions reached an altitude of more than 105 miles above the earth's surface, a record for an American designed and built single-stage rocket. A V-2 has gone slightly over 114 miles.

Rockets, like airplanes and automobiles, are evolved rather slowly and each step must be made in proper order to reach

the ultimately dreamed-of goal.

I envision the Viking rocket next as being a ballistic missile, equipped with a guidance system and fitted with a warhead, capable of striking an enemy target hundreds of miles away.

After that comes the earth satellite development. Such a rocket may have a weight as little as 20 tons (which would provide little payload) or go as high as 100 tons with propellants now available and using techniques which have already been used in the laboratory.

The satellites, speeding around the world at 17,000 miles per hour, would always be less than an hour from any target and could be directed to that target from a control station.

At the proper time the bombs could be released, or the satellite itself might be the bomb. It could be guided to the target by any number of methods, such as homing on a picture of the target or on the heat of a city.

Later, human beings could be shot aloft in a satellite, remaining up as long as there is food and oxygen, and return safely to earth.

While these ideas have a strong "Man From Mars" flavor, the man-made earth satellite is a real possibility in the not-too-distant future.

Probably the most original idea in GC's incentive plan is a gimmick which inspires intense cooperation among employees. A worker actually only gets 60 percent of the extra pay he earns. The balance goes for plant-wide distribution.

This keeps a worker from doing his job merely for speed. He knows that if he does a faulty job which might hold up another operation of the plant, he loses a part of his extra pay. It provides a human group-control against loafing, clock-watching or excessive trips to the water cooler.

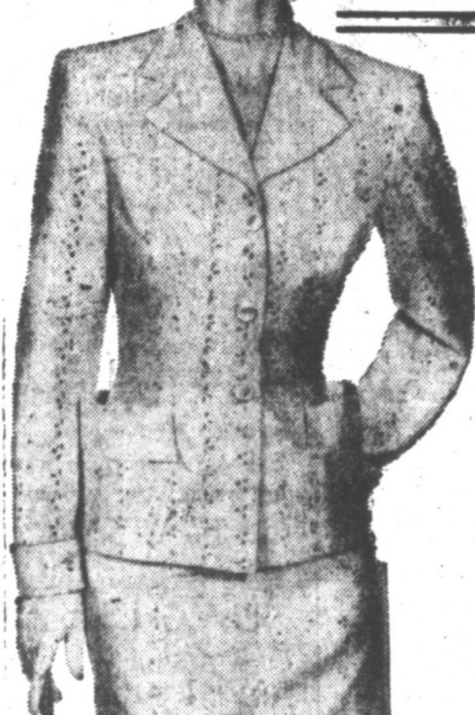
A defense official from Washington who watched the plant in operation described it this way: "Nobody looked up from his job as our party walked through. I never saw such a minimum of wasted effort or loafing, yet nobody was knocking themselves out working, as far as I could see. You saw intense concentration coupled with intense cooperation in every phase of the work."

At first, before 1943, the GC incentive plan was branded as a simple speed-up by the unions. They fought it and struck against it. Today, the union insists on the plan in its contract. Typical reaction is that of union shop steward Harry Deerick, who says: "From my standpoint, as a member of labor, this incentive plan is a 'must' if we are going to continue the present economic system in this country. A man must be paid for what he earns. He is here."

General Manager Alvin Ray, one of four brothers who run the plant with their father, says the key to its success is convincing your employees that you're going to be fair with them. "Once a standard is set for a particular job you can't change it just because a man starts making a lot of money," he adds. Nevertheless the company reserves the right to make new standards any time a
