

A total of .67 inches fell in Pampa. The body of Earl V. Hickman was found at about 9:20 a. m. today by a posse six miles from where he was catapulted into the flood-swollen waters of Red Deer Creek at Miami about 8 p. m. yesterday.

ST. LOUIS - (P) - Secretary of Defense George C. Marshall lashed out today at critics of the present situation in Korea, say ing there were those who cried stalemate about Greece and the Berlin airlift.

But the five-star general declared, we have a remarkable record-"a record met in turn by courageous decision and so far with the avoidance of general war.' General Marshall, in a prepared speech, told the graduating

class of Washington University: "There were many criticisms and dim views of the European recovery program and there were many more regarding the courageous decision of this government regarding Greece.

"The latter was advertised as a stalemate, as a costly and tritile enterprise. It proved to be a significant success in saving

Greece from Communist domination."

He said there were also "those who cried stalemate and waste of large sums" in connection with the airlift to Berlin.

"But it ended in success," the general continued.



National Economic Council Sees How Professional **Educators Teach Socialism** and Communism

(continued) In the last issue I was discussing an article written by Merwin K. Hart, president of the National Economic Council, on how "educators" are teaching socialism and communism. He pointed out in the last article that many modern "educators" believed in teaching the youth of the land that the must prepare themselves for change. I continue to quote:

But the quality of both is open to question. For the interest of those who crowded expen sive, elaborate schools down the throats of local taxpayers, seemed not in teaching more thoroughly the long accepted subjects of the 'Three R's, English and other languages, civics, government and science, but in new fangled 'social studies,' 'projects' and 'democracy. Many have been the instances where parents of students have petitioned the Board of Trustees to teach their children to read! Witness the modern 'reading clinics,' like those of New York University, and which are found necessary because of the defects of education ***


