# U.S. Will Open Peace Talk If Russ Proposal Sincere

### State Department Skeptical Of Malik

clared last night the United States is ready to play its part in ending the fighting in Korea if the cease fire suggestion by Russia's Jacob Malik "is more than propaganda.

Malik, the Soviet representative at the United Nations, proposed Saturday afternoon that talks be started between the belligerents for a cease fire and an armistice with "mutual withdrawal of forces from the 38th Parallel."

A State Department statement issued after several hours of consultation that indirectly included President Truman and high Defense Department authorities was frankly skeptical of Malik's sincerity. It declared that the tenor of his remarks "again raises the question as to whether this is more than propaganda.



ASMARA, Eritrea - (A) - Emperor Haile Selassie has given assulances that Italians in Eri-trea "shall be granted their rightful place" in Eritrean economy when this country is united with Ethiopia under a federation. Federation, according to a decision of the United Nations Assembly, is to be set up not later than September 1952.

The Ethiopian Emperor gave the assurance to the President of the Eritrean Chamber of Commerce, Vittorio Percellino, in a recent Addis Ababa interview. Vercellino, after his return to Asmara, said the Emperor also indicated the possibility that Ethiopia and Italy may soon resume diplomatic relations. These have been severed since 1935 when Mussolini's legions invaded







but they are going to have to wait a long time for it. The reason: Nobody can afford it. Receiving sets are far beyond the reach of the average man. Six companies are making sets on an experimental basis, these are not on general sale. The sets cost 100,000 yen, or about \$275. That's a sum the 15,000 yen-a-month worker would find impossible to shell out. There are less than 300 sets in Japan, all of them in Tokyo. So far one license for TV broadening has been issued. It is held by Yomiuri, the largest ewspaper in Tokyo. Officials of Yomiuri say they plan TV a limited and experimental basis for a few years.





Can Taxation Stop Rising Cost Of Living?

The politicians contend or imply that the only way that we can stop inflation is to have more and more taxes. They use the word inflation as synonymous with rising prices.

Intlation of course is not rising prices: it is the issuing of more credit used as a purchasing medium. In this country it is done largely by increasing the bank deposits by the government borrowing from the banks. That increases the deposits and as what is used as a purchasing medium increases, what it will buy decreases.

Increasing credit is a form of taxation. It is taking from those who have life insurance policies, credits, fixed contracts, a part of their assets. It is doing this by reducing what their credits will buy. It is a very unethical form of taxation, if there be any such thing as an ethical form of taxa-

Some forms of taxation in the long run increase the cost of living much more than other forms of taxation. The graduated income and inheritance tax is a form of taxation that in the long run increases the cost of living much more than a tax on consumption based on the proportion to the consumption used.

We have had this kind of tax for 38 years. It started in a small way, so the effects were not noticed immediately. It is true that for the moment a graduated income and inheritance tax does not increase the cost of living as much as a sales tax, but in the long run it increases it much more. This is true because it takes the money for taxes that would go into better tools. Thus the workers have to work with poorer tools and consequently cannot produce as much and consequently cannot be paid as much. This form of taxation fools the great mass of voters. They think somebody else is paying the tax. They are for the moment, but in the long run the graduated tax hurts the one-talent man - - the poor man - infinitely more than it hurts the 10talent man or the man with foresight. This is true because the onetalent man has to sacrifice necessities when prices go up more than the 10-talent man has to.

But the politicians and the school teachers and a lot of the preachers and newspaper publishers who want to be popular with the masses have contended that the graduated income tax was a tax to help the poor man; that it was a tax that would keep down the cost of living for him.

What they do not seem to understand is that there is a natural law of economics. And that when it is violated, it works the opposite from what is claimed. The graduated income tax started in a very small way. If it had started to tax better than 90% reason for passing laws to pia. in drinking water. 


