Officials Wary Of Soviet Proposition

WASHINGTON -(AP)- The United States looked Moscow and Peiping today for proof that Jacob Melik's call for a 38th-Parallel truce was a real peace bid and

not just another Soviet propaganda play. Pending definite evidence, state department and o administration officials appeared extremely wary of the proposition which the Kremlin's envoy to the United Nations put forth in a speech Saturday.

This country, however, declared its readiness to play its full share in ending the fighting if the proposal is sincere. And in order to nail down that point it seemed probable that U.S. Ambassador Alan Kirk at Mos would be instructed shortly to ask the Kremlin wh cease-firing conditions and other considerations were involved in Malik's suggestion.

Britain and France may participate in making such a sounding.
In the meantime, it was understood by authorities that such intermediary governments as India and Sweden which have formal relations with Red China — and better contacts than the British there would lose no time in asking Peiping whether it shared Malik's expressed convictions that a truce is now possible.

There are a good many people who have a little trouble with the circulation in their legs. Often it is difficult to put a name to it and often the situation gets better after smoking is stopped, improvement in the general health, or change to a warmer climate. But there are also two important which have to be sonsidered and which, if found, require

treatment. One of these is Buerger's disease which is an inflammation of the lining of the arteries and veins, generally in the feet and legs. Naturally this interfers with the circulation and may block a vessel entirely so that the pulsation of the foot artery is complete-

Can It Be Proves ...at Stealing Does Not Pay?

I remarked to an associate of mine, who helps me find my errors in thinking, that one could not prove that stealing did not pay. I contended that it had to be accepted on faith. He replied that it cr-

tainly can be proved that stealing does not pay and that it is not practical. He said just try stealing from everybody-steal from your wife and your children and steal from everyone you contact, and see what trouble you get into. I had to admit that he was right and I was wrong-that it can be proved by the process of trial and error that stealing, no matter by what name you call it, does not pay.

Most people realize that indi-vidual stealing does not pay. However, when it is done collectively and called by some other name they seem to think it does pay and that it is practical. If it is called by some other nice sounding name such as the common good or social justice or "social security" or the general welfare or rent control or rolling back prices or majority rule or an emergency, or zoning, or national planning, or tariffs, or subsidies, or drafting soldiers, or wars, or immigration quotas, or public "education"—then the great majority of people seem believe that stealing by the state does pay-that it is practical -that it works.

Of course, we cannot turn the clock back through the ages and have a nation try stealing and then try having it not steal to see if it pays. But all history gives evidence that those nations that do the least stealing, the least specific welfare or personal welfare, the least ineddling with human initiative, are the nations where the people get the most out of living While we cannot turn the clock back for centuries to try to have one nation try stealing and another nation not stealing. can determine by reason that if it does not pay for one individual to steal it does not pay for two individuals to steal or three or the majority or the state or the government. That is true because multiplying zero by 10 or one mil-lion still results in zero. If it does not pay for one individual to steal, multiplying a non-existent right by the majority does not make it

The rational reason why stealing does not pay for an individual and does not pay for the state or the government is that when an individual starts to steal he can-not cooperate with other people. He is a lone wolf, or the stealing nation is a lone wolf. The individual who is stealing cannot devote his time and energy in creating The only way he gets wealth is by getting it where there is only one person who has a temporary material gain.
