# **Postal Officers Smash Fantastic Money Ring** Czech Flights Over Allied Zone Gang Trapped Halted; Believed To Be Retaliation In Philippines

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP)-The allied high commission has barred all Czech airline flights across West Germany, high commission officials disclosed today. Officials gave no reason

for the action.

An American official said the United States, Britain and France had concurred in the joint action in barring the Czechoslovak plane flights. effective last Tuesday midnight.

Asked whether the decision had anything to do with the case of William Oatis, Associated Press correspondent, who was sentenced to jail by the Czechoslovaks for 10 years on spy charges, he answered "no comment.

The inquiry was prompted by a dispatch Aug. 16 from Washington which said that the State department was studying a plan bar the Communist country' planes from flying over the U.S.

Washington officials said that it was one of several moves being considered as retaliatory steps to the Czechoslovak treatment of Oatis. The State department has termed the espionage charges against Oatis ridiculous and callthis trial a hoax. State department officials said
