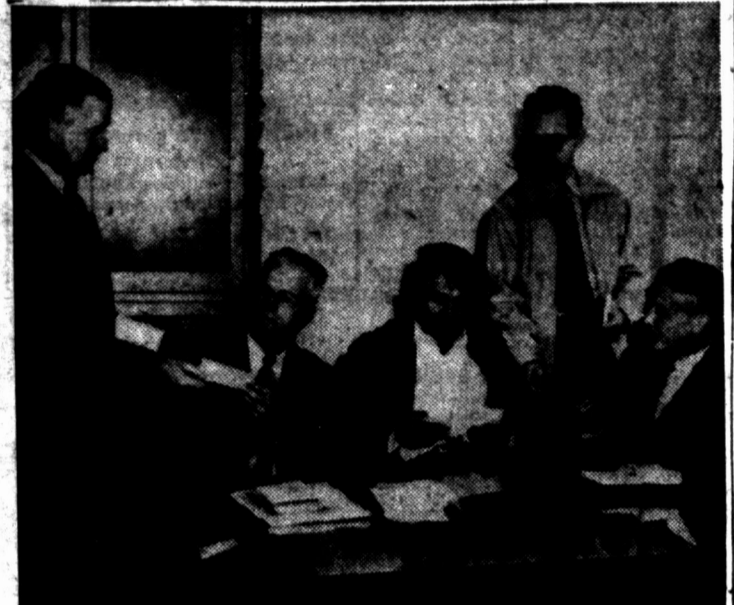

'No Guts,' Says Solon Sen. McCarthy Ridicules Plan For Ejection

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator McCarthy (R - Wis.) said today administration forces "don't have the guts" to press for a showdown Senate vote on whether he should be ousted from Congress.

McCarthy made the statement to a reporter in advance of a closed meeting (9 a.m. EST) of a Senate rules subcommittee to consider a resolution by Senator Benton (D-Conn) on the ouster issue.

The resolution calls for a Senate investigation to determine whether there are grounds to expel McCarthy. If the matter came before the Senate later it would require a two-thirds majority of those voting to force out the Wisconsin lawmaker.

"The administration people," McCarthy declared, "don't have the guts to push this thing to a showdown vote in the Senate. What's more, they have no intention of doing so. This Benton resolution is just an excuse to give some of the pinheads a chance to smear."

Benton said in separate interview "there is absolutely not one bit of evidence to support McCarthy's declaration there will be no showdown," he added.

"I am convinced that there will be, and before too long. In the meantime, McCarthy is again prejudging testimony which I haven't even presented yet to the subcommittee. And he is prejudging the subcommittee before it even hears the testimony."

Chairman Gillette (D-Iowa) said the subcommittee probably would decide at today's session whether to hold hearings on Benton's resolution.

The group also has before it a McCarthy demand that he be permitted to question witnesses at any hearings.

The subcommittee recently issued a unanimous report signed by three Democrats and two Republicans which denounced as "despicable" the successful election campaign conducted last year in behalf of Sen. John Marshall Butler (D-Mo.).

McCarthy was "actively interested" in the campaign.

Next jury week was set for Oct. 22.

Air Of Mystery Shrouds Dalhart Uranium Find

ALBUQUERQUE — (AP) — The only thing known for sure about nearly 100 pounds of refined uranium found in two chunks at Dalhart is that very little is known for sure.

The FBI and the Atomic Energy commission presumably know something about it. But they're not talking.

One piece was found buried early this summer by three boys playing in a tree. The FBI found the second later on a scrap heap. The finds were announced Saturday night by University of New Mexico scientists who established that the metal was uranium.

This much is known: one piece weighs 33 pounds, the other 65 pounds. The metal has 18.5 times the density of water. It's black and tough. It's commercially pure uranium. And the AEC has it.

But the big questions remain unanswered: Where did it come from? The AEC says probably from a government installation. The nearest one to Dalhart is top-secret, heavily guarded Los Alamos, N. M., some 300 miles away.

How much is it worth? Anywhere from \$6 a pound (AEC estimate) to nearly \$500 a pound (commercial chemist estimate).

How did it get to Dalhart? Theories range from theft by an atom spy to the falling of a flaming green "fireball" of uranium. Some think a soviet hunter may have ditched it in Dalhart.

Was the uranium stolen? The AEC prefers the word "taken." If stolen, who took it? The FBI is investigating.

The AEC places the age of the pieces at seven or eight years. That would make them current about the time when the Army's Manhattan project was developing the first atomic bomb at Los Alamos.

Unofficial smiles from the FBI and the AEC are given to the soviet hunter theory.

Observers point out that David Greenglass, now serving a 15-year term for giving atom secrets to Russia, worked at Los Alamos in 1945-46. Dr. Klaus Fuchs, convicted by an English court on a similar charge, worked there in 1943.

The 33-pound chunk was found at Dalhart in June by Jodel Golden, 13, Don Monroe, 12, and Walton Fowler, 13. They dug it up from under a tree so they wouldn't hurt their bare feet on a piece sticking out.

Declare Kaesong Is Not Suitable

TOKYO — (AP) — The United Nations command today told the Communists that Kaesong is unsuitable as a site for any future Korean armistice negotiations.

Allied liaison officers gave these reasons in a note handed Red liaison officers at Kaesong:

1. Kaesong is too close to the main Red supply line, under attack by Allied warplanes.

2. Red and Allied ground forces are in constant maneuvers around the five-mile Kaesong neutral zone.

3. Uncontrolled partisan groups, responsible to neither command, are active in the area and could take action at any time which would again cause a breakup of talks.

The Reds called off the talks Aug. 23, charging an allied plane tried to "murder the Red cease-fire delegation with a bomb the day before."

"It is regrettable," the Allies said, that the Reds did not accept the original suggestion of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, supreme allied commander, that the negotiations be held aboard the Danish hospital ship Jutulandia.

Ridgway proposed some other, more incident-proof site for the conference in a note to the Communists Sept. 6. He since has made clear that he wants better working conditions established for negotiators before he agrees to resumption of the conference.

UN and Red liaison officers met in Kaesong Monday morning to set up arrangements under which talks, if resumed, could make the most rapid progress possible.

About six hours later the Reds sent the Allies a memorandum, contents of which were not disclosed by allied headquarters.

The liaison groups are scheduled to meet again Tuesday at 10 a.m. (8 p.m. Monday EST).

Allied headquarters here said the Reds were told: "It is plain that partisan groups, responsible to neither command, are active in the Kaesong area. These uncontrolled elements may at any time take action which could compel a suspension of the conference."

Red Attack Knocks Allies From Hilltop

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea — (AP) — A savage Red counterattack today hurled American infantrymen off the highest peak of "Heartbreak Ridge" in eastern Korea.

The Americans had gained control of the peak late Sunday night. Three doughboys — remnants of a platoon (about 40 men) — had stormed to the top. Reinforcements came up fast and threw back a Red charge.

But, AP Correspondent Stan Carter said, "an overwhelming mass" of Reds then struck from behind a curtain of grenade explosion.

For the second time in seven days the Reds recaptured the strategic height overlooking Communist supply lines to the north.

Elsewhere on the east-central sector the Reds, tapped at allied lines in a series of stiff probing attacks. All were thrown back.

The remainder of the 130-mile battlefield was relatively inactive Monday, although scattered patrol clashes were reported.

A leaden sky with warmer temperatures covered most of the front.

Loss of the heartbreak peak was a bitter blow to the weary doughboys. They first captured the height Sept. 17 after a bitter hand to hand battle. They lost it the next day.

Former Government Employee Admits Taking Lithofold Gifts

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A former government employee told today of receiving expensive gifts and money from an official of American Lithofold Corp. when that company was seeking printing contracts with the Au Force.

The testimony at a Senate inquiry came from Charles B. Moring, who said he left his 3000-a-year publications job with the Au Force last March to become the \$25,000-a-year eastern division sales manager for American Lithofold.

Moring said he received a television set, a movie camera and projector, a ham and a turkey from a Lithofold official, Robert A. Blauner.

The names of William M. Beckon, Jr., executive vice president of the national printing industry, and Blauner, chairman of the Au Force, have been brought into these charges.

Senator Nixon (R-Calif.) demanded that the senators ask Moring to submit his income tax returns, for study.

Nixon said he had heard that Moring had received \$100,000 from his former law partner, Max Siskind, as a payment for his "Boyle's" share of their former law business.

Siskind has handled American Lithofold business in Washington, Nixon told his colleagues on the investigating committee that there should be a full exploration of financial dealings between Boyle and Siskind.

Jury members selected are Jeff Bearden, foreman, Fred Thompson and Clyde Carrull, all of Pampa; J. M. McCracken, Groom, Clyde Andrews, McLean, Bill Stubbs, Alan Reed, J. O. Coleman, McLean; J. M. Boucher and H. P. Dosier, Sr., both of Pampa; Bill B. Day, McLean; Bob Clements and Aubrey L. Steele, both of Pampa.

Next jury week was set for Oct. 22.

GROMYKO LEAVES PARIS PARIS — (AP) — Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko left Paris for Moscow Sunday by plane, the Soviet embassy said today.

De Gasperi reaffirmed Italy's desire that Trieste be returned to the independence, sovereignty and dignity of a nation.

The premier paid tribute to American aid to Europe.

"Without your generous contribution," he said, "Europe at least most certainly the anti-Communist front line of continental Europe — would already have collapsed."

President and Mrs. Truman and their daughter, Margaret, and several cabinet officers met de Gasperi as his train pulled in from Detroit.

Mr. Truman first shook hands with the Premier and Mrs. de Gasperi and then presented Mrs. Truman.

Among the cabinet officers on hand was Secretary of State Acheson, with whom de Gasperi will confer later.

"The King" is in good spirits this morning.

A morning medical bulletin said the King "had a restful night." "His Majesty's condition this morning continues to be as satisfactory as can be expected."

It came after a Buckingham Palace source had reported that the King "made it safely" through the night after his operation yesterday morning.

Anxious Britons, who had prayed for the safety of their beloved monarch, got no indication of the King's exact condition in his battle against the after-effects of the surgery.

The announcement was signed by five doctors who had spent the night at the King's bedside.

Gray Commission Okays Record Fund

Gray county came close to state level expenditure figures as the county commissioners late this morning approved the 1952 budget totaling more than a half-million dollars.

The \$667,629.60 budgeted county expense is based on an estimated \$697,666.68 tax collections, on a \$37,000,000 valuation.

The move represents a jump of \$180,000 in county expenses over last year, the increase incorporating \$40,000 for a road leading to the old northwest airport, \$42,000 in repairs to the runways so they can be used after June 30, 1952, when Pampa Municipal Airport has to vacate its present location on E. Browning, and \$75,000 for bridge repairs and new bridges over the county.

Irrespective of how the vote turned out on the airport bond election, the county is obligated to keep the northwest field in repair in compliance with its contract with the United States government. It was brought out at the hearing. At least one runway will be brought up to serviceable condition and lights from the present airport moved to the northwest field. There is also a possibility of federal aid in the project, but details of that were not available today.

The anticipated collection figure is based on a 92 percent collection, the remaining eight percent being taken up by delinquencies, discounts, and tax collection commissions. Commissions are automatically transferred to the salary fund.

The county tax rate this year will be \$1.16. This, plus the state rate of 42 cents, will total \$1.58.

The budget was adopted following a public hearing at which a group of local citizens appeared, asking for the bridge construction and airport improvement.

The hearing, with E. J. Dungan, Jr., and Hugh Burdette, doing the speaking for the group, commended commissioners for their work on the budget and prior inclusion of airport, road and bridge improvements.

In a breakdown of budgets for precincts, the tentative figures reached last week during sketching periods were also adopted in full. This will give Pampa \$54,835; Pettus \$82,387; Pettus \$37,540; and Pettus \$46,357 for regular road and bridge work and maintenance.

From the 16-cent assumption tax and the 10 percent valuation increase for properties other than oil, each of the precincts will receive an additional allotment for repair of washed out roads.

JACOBY ON CANASTA

Taking Chance Brings Results

"I was dealt a natural canasta of sixes," relates a Montgomery, Ala., correspondent. "Both sides needed 120 points for the initial meld. With the sixes I had a pair of kings, a pair of eights, and a lone ace (after my draw from the stock pile).
"I had to make the very first discard of the hand, and I thought about it quite a bit. I finally discarded the ace. I knew this was dangerous, but reckoned that the next player still had to have a pair of aces and the count to profit from my discard.
"The next player did have the perfect hand—and the heavens fell on me!
"What would an expert do in this situation?
"An expert would discard the ace, hoping for the best, just as my correspondent did. That disc may turn out badly, but it is the wisest choice. Moreover, it would not disturb me greatly if next player picked up my discard immediately. That's not at all disastrous.
"What is the normal future of this hand? You keep discarding whatever you draw until you get a third king or a third eight.
"Then you are only one draw away from a concealed out. That's one possibility.
"Maybe you will draw a wild card before you get a third king or a third eight. Then you have to guess whether to throw a king or an eight. But you're still only one draw away from a concealed out.
"Perhaps your partner will make the initial meld while you're waiting. Then you will quickly meld your natural canasta of sixes and thus signal him that you are practically out. He may be able to meld kings or eights, perhaps both, to help you.
"One of these should happen fairly quickly. The worst that can happen is that one of the opponents may meld out before you side can. That's still not a disaster. It may cost you six or seven hundred points—perhaps a thousand. Unpleasant, but not overwhelming.
"The way to get yourself massacred is to begin breaking up such practically out. You start by saving the ace and throwing a king or an eight. In a few rounds you have an assortment of odd cards and no play at all for a concealed out. If your partner then fails to meld, you go right to the cleaners. The opponents meld and meld and meld—and you just sit there and take it. That sort of hand may cost you several thousand points—and that is a disaster.

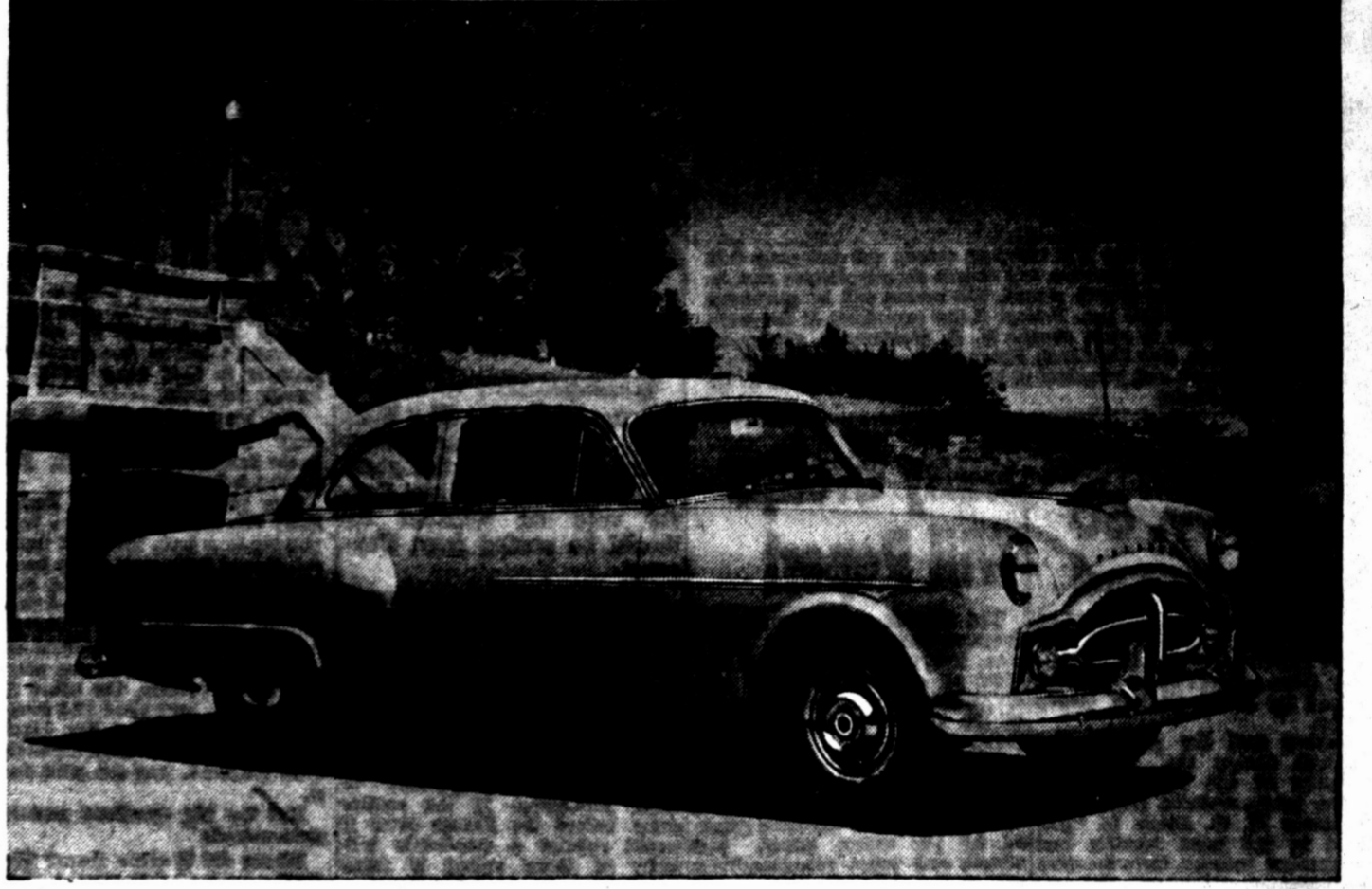

Survey Your Rivals As You Start A Bid

"Please comment on the bidding of this hand," requests a reader of Port Huron, Mich. "We thought that both North and South were very enterprising and that East was unfortunate. There was a difference of opinion about West."

"Some of us thought that West should have passed from start to finish. One or two members of our club thought that West bid his hand correctly but that he was unlucky. A third opinion was that West should have kept on bidding."

"There was nothing to the play at four spades. South took the ace of diamonds and crossed ruffing diamonds and hearts. He had to lose a trump and two clubs, but nothing more. Even if West had opened a trump, South would have made his contract. Two rounds of trumps would cut down dummy's ruffing power, but the queen of hearts would set up in time for a diamond discard. There was just no way to beat four spades."

"What is your opinion about the bidding?"

It's very hard to say whether West should bid three hearts. He has fine distribution but

GAYNOR MADDOX, food and Markets Editor, says a delicious spread just as it comes jar. It can also be the many unusually good fill-in in combination with bacon, grated carrots, cheese, pickles and devils.

Some youngsters want themselves a special snack. Peanut butter is packed try their hand at these vitamins and also supplement, phosphorus and calcium.

Butter Meats Sandwiches (Makes 2 Sandwiches) 1/2 cup chunk-style butter, 1 1/2 4-ounce cans, 1-4 cup sweet pickles, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, whole wheat butter or fortified margarine, small bowl, blend peanut butter and devils ham. Add 1/2 cup, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise; mix thoroughly. Spread on 4 slices of buttered bread; top with remaining 4 slices.

Peanut Butter Carnival Sandwiches (Makes 4 Sandwiches) One-half cup creamy peanut butter, 1-2 cup chopped celery leaves, 1-2 cup grated carrots, 3 tablespoons mayonnaise, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 8 slices white or whole wheat bread, butter or fortified margarine.

Combine ingredients. Mix well. Spread mixture on slices of buttered bread; top with remaining 4 slices.

Peanut Butter Bacon Sandwiches (Makes 2 Sandwiches) Three slices bacon, 4 slices white bread, butter or fortified peanut butter.

In a skillet, fry bacon slowly until crisp. Drain on paper towel. Spread bread with butter, then with peanut butter. On two slices, sprinkle bits of crumbled bacon; turn remaining slices over on these. Cut in halves to serve.

bridge in the bridge. This breakdown will give Pct. one, \$12,200, Pct. two, \$24,400; Pct. three, \$18,600 and Pct. four, \$21,800.

A note of "good cheer" entered into the proceedings when County Judge Bruce Parker told the group that the hearing, if a strong possibility exists that state aid may be available for building the bridge west of Lefors under the farm-to-market road program.

Judge Parker said the state has \$800,000 from 81 cents a mile, 70 and use it to connect the bridge with the town of Lefors on a paving program and build a larger bridge than the county now contemplates. However, the county would have to share in the bridge construction.

This is not expected to exceed \$30,000 which the county intends to spend on the bridge irrespective of state aid. This means, Judge Parker explained, the county would build the bridge, but that it would not be as big or as strong as if the state comes into the picture with farm-to-market road aid.

Several minor changes were also being worked into the budget this morning when commissioners discovered department heads asked for the same amount of money for telephone bills as they did last year, all of them forgetting the increased telephone rate. These amounted, on the average, from \$50 to \$195 per phone. Other minor items including the repair and cleaning of typewriters sometime next year were included in the changes.

gested Sept. 6 that a new site for the talks be chosen.

The allied liaison team said, "from the viewpoint of the military aviator, the Kaesong neutral zone is but a few minutes removed from the most important military line of supply in your rear area. Thousands of aircraft sorties are directed against this line of supply. The likelihood of an accidental occurrence involving Kaesong is obvious."

"The Communist commanders have alleged that a number of violations of the Kaesong neutral zone approaching the figure 200 have occurred. Could any fact argue more persuasively that Kaesong is unsuitable as a conference site?"

The UN delegation told the Communists, "it is regrettable that the talks were not held aboard the Danish hospital ship Jutulandia as suggested by Ridgway, supreme allied commander, before the armistice talks began."

"In retrospect, it is now apparent that the vast majority of the difficulties which have arisen regarding Kaesong would not, in fact could not, have occurred aboard the Jutulandia," the Reds were told.

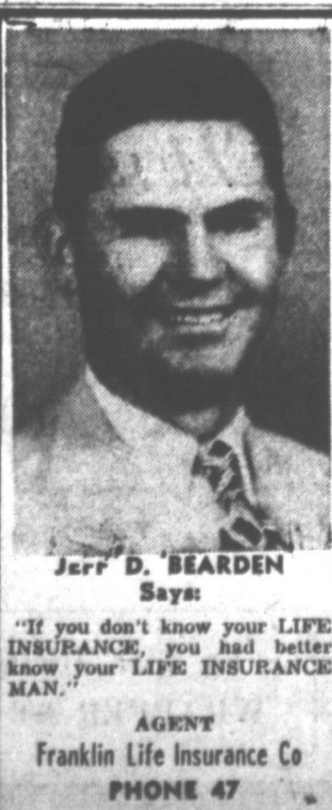

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Yankees, Dodgers All But In World Series After Win

New York's crushing Yankees and Brooklyn's back-peddling Dodgers are all but mathematically certain to meet for the fourth time in 21 years, in baseball's top classic, the world series.

Both came closer to clinching the 117-respectful championships yesterday. The Yankees increased their American League lead over Cleveland to two-and-a-half games beating the Red Sox 6-1. The revenge-minded Tigers meanwhile thumped the Indians for the third straight time in Detroit 9-1.

The Dodgers snapped a two-game losing streak with a 6-2 triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies and retained their three-game National League lead. The magic number is now three for the Yankees and four for the Dodgers. The Yankees, with a four-game bulge on the important losing side over the Indians and third place Red Sox, need win only three of their remaining five games to wrap up the flag, even if Cleveland wins its final three and Boston its final games. Two Yankee victories insure at least a tie.

Any combination of four Dodger victories or four Giant defeats leaves the pennant to Brooklyn. If the Dodgers capture four of their last seven games, the Giants can win all their remaining five and still wind up also-rans.

Vic Raschi became the fifth American League pitcher, and the 17th in the majors, to win 20 games with an eight-hitter over the Red Sox. It was his third straight 20-game winning season.

Not since 1928 have the majors boasted as many as 17 players who have won 20 games in a season. The record was set in 1903, 1905 and 1920. The American League high of 10 duplicated in 1903.

A single by pinch hitter Johnny Mize in the seventh drove in the tally that gave the Yankees a 3-1 lead over the Dodgers. Mize also doubled in the two-run eighth as Chuck Stobbs went down to his eighth defeat. Raschi helped his cause with two RBIs on a sacrifice bunt and a two-out, two-strike homer in the ninth. It was only the second New York win in Boston in 11 attempts.

Virgil Trucks climaxed a lost weekend for Cleveland, pitching the Tigers to their third straight win over the faltering Indians. Those three victories ledoned for the 16 Cleveland victories in 17 previous games with Detroit.

Trucks helped win his 13th game by collecting three hits and driving in two runs. Two of his sacrifices were squeeze bunts. Virgil climaxed a five-run sixth against loser Mike Garcia with a three-run homer.

Preacher Roe, for the second time in a week, halted a panic in Brooklyn, hurling his 22nd victory against the Dodgers with a six-hitter against the Phils.

Roy Campanella, who returned to action Saturday following a skulling last Monday, had a perfect day with four for four, including his 32nd homer. His first inning homer off Bubba Church gave the Dodgers a lead they never relinquished.

Sal Maglie hurled his 22nd victory for the Giants, holding the Braves to one run for four innings. Bobby Thomson's triple highlighted a two-run eighth. Maglie is the first Giant pitcher to win 22 since Carl Hubbell in 1937.

The Arizona Wildcats, whose hopes took a big skid in Saturday night's 27-7 loss to Utah, will find a tough customer in Oregon, which threw a scare into Stanford last weekend. Stanford won, 27-20.

Arizona State's Sun Devils will run into an avalanche of power in Arkansas. The Razorbacks, with neat running and passing, overwhelmed Oklahoma A&M, 42-7.

The Sun Devils' offensive rolled in the high gear, but its defensive work was not impressive.

A firm refusal to play ball — in any sense of the words — with the ones who get out of line would do the trick.

Question we can't answer is "who draws the line?"

He thinks Stohlanski is the finest all-around end in the country. Sewell played three-quarters of the game, almost all the way on defense and about half the time on offense.

Price took the head coaching job when Blair Cherry resigned last fall because of his ulcers. At the time, Ed said: "Well, you can get ulcers in any business, not just football."

The Southwest Conference plunges into its intersectional football schedule this week with only a bare majority in the first games.

Delighted that it would win the big one — Texas' 7-6 decision over seventh-ranked Kentucky — but rather put out because SMU and TCU failed to come through as expected, the conference could be pleased with an identical majority this week.

That will be tough to attain. SMU plays mighty Ohio State at Columbus, O.; TCU battles high-powered Nebraska at Lincoln, Neb.; Texas takes on Purdue at LaFayette, Ind.; and Rice engages Clemson at Houston.

About the only one the conference feels reasonably sure of winning is a melee planned at Fayetteville between Arkansas and Arizona State or Tempe, a Border Conference outfit.

Texas A&M d.d. itself proud in beating UCLA 7-14.

TCU was whipped by Kansas — a team that never had been beaten by the Frogs before. Jerry Robertson, former Dallas schoolboy star and the top quarterback of the Texas freshman team in 1948, passed Kansas to a 2-13 victory. Texas could use Robertson this season. He withdrew from there because of scholastic difficulties.

SMU went down before Georgia Tech 21-7, being quite puny on the ground and too ineffective with a slippery football. Take away SMU's passing and what have you, anyway?

Arkansas, apparently quite underrated this season, slashed Oklahoma A&M 42-7 last week, showing ground power, neat passing and manpower to burn. The Forkers appeared too much and too many for Arizona State which last week edged Utah State 32-27. Clemson warmed up for Rice last week with a 53-6 victory over Presbyterian.

Ohio State, Nebraska and Purdue haven't yet played.

Baylor opened the season against Houston. Larry Leibel was sharp and the Baylor's whipped a good Cougar team 19-0. It could have been more decisive.

Preparation Vital For Painting

Indian summer is a fine time to relax — and it's also a fine time to do outdoor painting, too, right on into October.

You can save yourself a lot of money painting your own house, providing you're not foolhardy (or allergic) about climbing ladders — and providing, also, you don't get over ambitious and try to do the whole job in a couple of weekends.

Begin by visiting your paint dealer and getting him to help you work out, by figuring square feet, amount of trim, and number of coats of paint you'll need for the job.

You'll need proper brushes, too, if you haven't much of an assortment in your workshop. If you lack ladders they can be rented in lots of communities; or they can be borrowed, of course, depending on how you stand with your neighbors.

Your paint dealer also will help you decide the best kind of paint for the climate you live in, such as whether to use a freely-chalking paint that is more or less self-cleaning as it weathers, or a harder finish. Don't fail around with unknown bargain paints.

If just brushing on the paint were the only thing involved in this job, a lot more people probably would do it themselves. But you'll run into all kinds of trouble unless you do a lot of preliminary work first.

Places where the old paint has peeled, cracked, blistered or checked will have to be scraped down to bare wood and primed. You'll usually find the worst of these spots around the eaves and the door and window trim, which means you have to take down screens and shutters before you start.

Dirty streaks down corners or outside walls generally mean leaky gutters and leaders; if you haven't checked them lately, do it before you paint, so your brand-new job won't be ruined the first time it rains.

Pick a dry day to paint and make sure the wood, not just the weather is dry. Avoid a windy day, too, so all kinds of things floating through the air won't stick to the fresh paint.

Since there's almost always

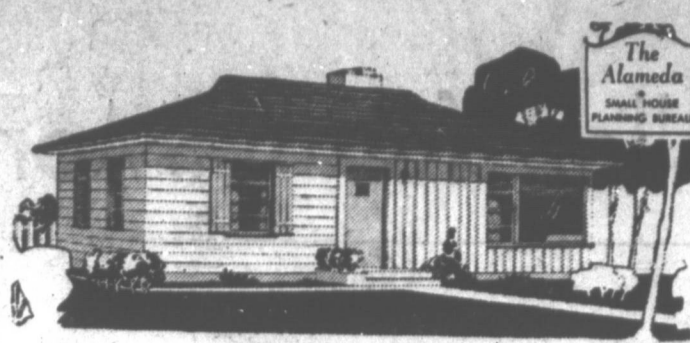
some sort of a breeze blowing, better make a deal with your windward neighbors not to burn leaves the day you're painting — unless, of course, you wanted the house black anyway.

FIX-IT FORUM

Q — What's the safest way to hang a swing on a tree for the children?—Mrs. A. R.

A — Pick a branch that will bear more than the heaviest weight you expect to use on the swing. Tree experts advise screwing hooks into the underside of the branch, rather than merely tying the swing ropes around the branch, since the swing motion causes the ropes to cut into the wood and eventually kill the branch. Excessive swaying of the branch can be avoided by running wire reinforcements from the branch to the upper part of the main trunk.

Follow Rules In Obtaining Correct Mix

There's one time when it's very important for the householder to be a good mixer. That's when there's a concrete job to be done — anchoring a clothes pole, laying a bit of sidewalk, building a few steps or lining a fish pool.

It's the mix that determines the strength, durability and water-tightness of any concrete job.

In concrete, man builds his own rock with soil and water, and does it in fifty. The quality of his product depends entirely on the materials he uses and the way he mixes them. To get quality you have to start with quality — only clean sand, clean water and clean gravel. Sand must be free of loam and vegetable matter. The water should be good enough to drink. The gravel, crushed stone or other coarse aggregate, cannot contain junk that will crumble and cause weak pockets.

Therefore, if you do not actually test sand for moisture content, the safest procedure is to add only five or 5 1/2 gallons of water to a 1:2:3 mix until it is plastic and workable. In that way you'll have six gallons of water in the mix without breaking the rule of never using more than six gallons per sack of cement.

Various jobs call for various mixes. A paste made with five gallons of water will produce satisfactory concrete for severe wear and weather — such as industrial, creamery and dairy plant floors.

A six-gallon paste is used for water-tightness and moderate wear — sidewalks, driveways, septic tanks, swimming pools and basement walls.

A seven-gallon paste is only suitable for concrete that gets no wear, weather or water punishment.

The size of aggregate is another important factor. The smaller the particles, the more surface they present and the more cement paste is needed to coat them. Sand that is too fine — plaster sand or beach sand — tends to settle in voids and separate from coarser aggregate.

All aggregates call for screening. Bank-run gravel — the mix that comes from the gravel bank — is rarely in proper proportions

of sizes to make quality concrete. It should be screened over a 1 1/2-inch screen, with the residue discarded, and then screened through a No. 4 mesh — four openings to the linear inch.

Lacking a concrete mixer, use a smooth, watertight floor or platform — heavy plywood is good — for mixing. Measure out the sand first. Spread it out evenly. Add the cement and mix the two well. Then add the coarse aggregate and continue mixing. When it is completely blended, pile it and form a crater in the

middle. Add half the water and mix the dry materials into the water. Gradually add as much of the remaining water as you need to get a workable paste.

Too much water weakens concrete.

Many Homes Are Under Insured For Fire Loss

Would you sell your home today for the valuation appearing on your fire insurance policy? If not, your home is under-insured.

This question is a good yardstick for determining if dwelling policies are of sufficient valuation, say insurance authorities.

Since home values have far outstripped insurance coverage, fire would cause many owners irreparable financial hardship.

The latest construction-cost index reveals that one dollar worth of construction in 1940 costs \$2.31 in 1951. If a house built 11 years ago for \$900 is destroyed by fire today, it costs \$11,550 to replace it. Homeowners still carrying 11-year-old protection are courting trouble, warns the Construction Research bureau, national clearing house for building information.

Similar figures apply to household furnishings and other personal property. Statistics show that the amount spent for home furnishings has tripled over 10 years ago. From 1940 to 1950, the value of home electrical appliances multiplied by six.

Fire protection has lagged far behind. Insurance firms report they can normally pay only about 40 percent of fire inflicted furniture losses each year due to non-coverage.

The home-owner should survey his protection and increase coverage if his present policies will not replace structure and furnishings at current costs.

At best, adequate coverage can only minimize loss. Housing and materials shortages, plus loss of irreplaceable heirlooms, keepsakes and documents, are bound to inflict some non-insurable loss.

For this reason, maximum fire-safety in homes is urged through proper use of electricity; careful smoking habits, perfectly func-

tioning heating equipment; and use of fire-resistant materials like masonry for exterior walls; asphalt asbestos for roof; gypsum for interior walls and ceiling; fire-resistant material for floors and non-combustible mineral-based materials for insulation.

It takes the average family from 15 years to a lifetime to pay for a home and its contents. Structural fire safety coupled with adequate insurance protection will assure the home-owner that his investment will not end in tragic loss.

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Fingers Suffer In Wheeler Accidents

Fingers have been getting the worst of the battle with machines in Wheeler county this year.

The last two of several accidents happened last week. Doug Baird of Mobeetie was plowing at night for Grady Harris when he caught his finger in the cultivator about 1 a.m. He couldn't free it by himself and remained caught in the machine until Harris came to the field about 7 a.m. He was taken to Highland General hospital in Pampa where a portion of his finger was amputated.

R. W. Brown of Wheeler caught his right hand in a combine on his ranch north of Wheeler. After a stay in the Wheeler hospital the final verdict is: lost, one joint of the little finger and lots of blood; saved, one badly cut finger and the rest of the little one.

Earlier in the season, Holt Green, a carpenter, was sawing the last board of the day with his electric saw and cut off two fingers. Percy Farmer, a mechanic, was mowing his lawn with a power mower and bent to make a minor repair without cutting off the power — another finger gone.

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
