## Variety Show Slated



## Secretary Block Faces Challenge

"The greatest challenge the new Secretary of Agriculture will likely face is winning support for his producer-oriented policy proposals within other agencies of government."

Several of the major issues confronting Agriculture Secretary designate John Block are of direct interest to other government departments, according to Dr. Ronald D. Knutson.

Knutson is an economist in policy and marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. He also has been serving on the staff of the U. S.

Department of Agriculture's Transition Task Force for the incoming Reagan administration.

Knutson said agricultural issues where conflicts are likely to occur among agencies of government include lifting of the Soviet grain embargo, increases in food prices, and proposals to increase price and income supports that have the potential for adding to government outlays.

Knutson, in an address before the Texas Farmers Union in Dallas Jan. 9, said that two major changes will occur within the USDA as a result of the election of Ronald Reagan as

President and appointment of Block as Agriculture Secretary.

"First, USDA policy proposals and decisions will be more market-oriented. In this situation, forces of supply and demand are the prime determinants of farm prices and income," said Knutson.

This contrasts directly with the Carter administration farm policies where prices of major food and feed grains have been maintained in a relatively narrow range, mainly through low release and call levels within the government-controlled but farmerheld reserve, the

economist explained.

"Second, USDA policy proposals and decisions will be more producer-oriented. In this type of farm policy, decisions are made primarily on the basis of their impact upon producers. This also contrasts with the Carter administration where policy decisions have been heavily influenced by consumers and consumer impacts.

"In other words, the trend toward consumerization of the USDA will be interrupted," Knutson said.

These changes will have significant implications for farmers and their

organizations, the economist noted.

"While farm income will be higher in a market oriented environment, farm prices will fluctuate more and risk will increase," he predicted.

"In addition, with primarily a producer clientele, it will be critical that the new Secretary have a broad unified base of producer support. Without such support base, the Secretary's position in winning the assistance of other agencies for his producer-oriented proposals will be undermined," emphasized Knutson.

The Wellman Wildcats proved too much for the Borden Coyotes Friday night as the Wildcats raced to a 65-47 victory. The Coyotes are 7-15 on the season and 3-2 in the last half of district. They finish the season this week against Union (Tues.) and Klondike (Fri).

## Wellman Is No Challenge For Coyotes



February 27-28, 1981



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

## Assessment of Basic Skills Test

Third, fifth, and ninth grade students from the Borden County Independent School District participated in the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program conducted on February 11 and 12, 1981.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in this state, is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session.

The Borden County students will be among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February 2-20 statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The Borden County ISD will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to Mr. James McLeroy, superintendent.

However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved, Superintendent McLeroy adds.

This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement, Mr. McLeroy points out. For this reason, results will be reported in a

manner that will help everyone become more effective.

Third grade students were added to the annual testing sequence for the first time this year. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will

be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

CTS-McGraw-Hill of Monterey, California will help administer the 1981 test program and develop and field test new items for the 1981-82 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The California firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

## School Board Meeting

The Borden County Board of Trustees met in regular session at 8:00 p.m. on February 16, 1981. Those in attendance were Doyle Newton, Ralph Miller, Jack McPhaul, Bob Dyess, Brent Murphy and Bill Phinizy.

Administrators present were James McLeroy,

Superintendent; Mickey McMeans, High School Principal; and Ben Jarrett, Elementary Principal.

In other action, the Board approved the recommendation to extend the contracts of High School Principal Mickey

McMeans and Elementary Principal Ben Jarrett for a period of one year. The new contracts would be two year contracts extending through the 1982-1983 school year. Both principals were commended for their services to the Borden County Schools.

The Superintendent gave a year-to-date financial statement and reported the enrollment as 69 in high school and 149 in elementary for a total of 218 students. It was also reported that Jimmy Ballard was hired for maintenance duties.

In other action, the Board approved the accreditation self-study conducted in the

1980-1981 school year and approved the school entering into the five year plan of the accreditation process.

The Board granted Superintendent McLeroy permission to pursue plans for a special education co-op to be formed with other schools in the district.

There being to further business, the meeting was adjourned.



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You may have forgotten but I did support our previous president, at least one time. President Carter slapped a grain embargo on the Soviet Union at the time they invaded Afghanistan. I was all for that action as well as the boycott of the Olympic games. My quarrel with the Carter administration was that it did not go far enough. No grain, no technology, no machinery, no oil, no soft goods, no chewing gum even. If you are going to put the squeeze on a nation as a method of punishment, then squeeze tight. I was and am all for isolating and starving out a nation that is, has been, and ever will be intent on destroying US. But you cannot accomplish this by singling out only one industry to be the vise. I have a great deal of empathy for the agriculture industry because I am in it, just as I have empathy for the oil industry which has also been singled out for economic reprisal. It isn't fair. Even so, I am for across the board economic embargos against the Soviet Union.

I was dismayed when candidate Reagan pledged to lift the grain embargo. It was even written into the Republican platform. But I hoped the reasoning was that one industry could not accomplish the end desired. That hope didn't last long

tho because further in that same platform was a plank calling for blocking "transfer of high technology to the Soviet Union and its Eastern European satellites." Well now, you can't lift one embargo and place another one into effect, is my opinion.

Apparently president Reagan has figured that out too with the help of Secretary of State Al Haig and National Security Adviser Richard V. Allen. Reagan now says he will not lift the grain embargo and will ask co-operation from our allies in blocking the transfer of technology to Russia. The foreign policy molders have pointed out to Reagan that it would be a big mistake to ask our allies to cut out their most valuable trade while we resume trading our most valuable export. There is a Miss Bryan with the Bureau of East-West Trade who believes to go about business as usual with Russia now of all times would be a drastic foreign policy blunder. In fact the grain embargo must be strengthened, certainly not diluted nor scrapped, she believes.

I hate to think candidate Reagan pledged to lift the embargo only to get the farm bloc vote. I prefer to think that President Reagan is a reasonable man. And that when the ambivalence of the platform and the signal of weakness a renewal of trade would imply was placed in proper perspective Mr. Reagan then recognized the necessity of embargos, grain, technology, machinery, soft goods, even chewing gum.

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## On taking blood pressure— Do-it-yourself class Feb. 22

The Garza County Red Cross chapter will sponsor a community class on taking one's own blood pressure Sunday afternoon Feb. 22, from 1 to 5 p.m. in the Algerita Senior Citizens Center.

The course will be free and taught by volunteer instructors. There will be a \$1.75 charge for the course work book, however.

Instructors will be Margie Pennell, Kay Hays and Syan Nichols.

This is a one part of a relatively new Red Cross course entitled Vital Signs. The course includes background information on what blood pressure is as well as danger signs that indicate when one should see his or her physician.

This is a self-paced course that takes about three hours to complete. Volunteer instructors work with the students as they read through a workbook and answer questions. At the end of the course there is a practical test with a blood pressure cuff and stethoscope.

The Red Cross has purchased a few cuffs and stethoscopes that will be left around Post where community members can make use of their new skills.

The Red Cross encourages families to make this a project they can do together. The organization has had great success with sixth graders taking this course so it isn't just an adult concern. Senior citizens and anyone

with a past history of high blood pressure should make that extra special effort to attend.

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

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## Your County Agent Says by Alan Day


All FFA & 4-H youth with livestock going to the Houston Livestock Show will leave at 8:00 a.m. Monday, March 2.

As the third most-populous state in the nation, Texas faces many problems and challenges. I have stated often during the last two years that providing an adequate water supply for our citizens, our agriculture and our industry, ultimately, may be the most critical issue of all.

If we do not accurately assess our needs in this regard and prepare accordingly, we could be in a crisis situation.

That is why I recommended in my January 22 State of the State address to the Legislature establishment of a State Water Trust Fund to hold in reserve anticipated surplus revenues toward meeting our future water needs.

Water is not an agricultural problem alone. Neither, contrary to a widely-held view, is it a sectional or regional problem.

Municipal water supplies and sewage treatment capabilities must be assured in the small towns and large cities. Our farms and ranches and industry will continue to demand more water as our population increases from 14.1 million to 22 million by the year 2000.

Already, Texas is classified as a watershort state. That is, we are using our water faster than it is being replaced by nature. According to the Texas Department of Water Resources, we are using statewide 7.1 million acre feet of groundwater per year more than is being replaced.

The withdrawal is causing water level declines, decreasing well yields, land subsidence, movement of geologic faults and saline water encroachment.

This 7.1 million acre feet deficit amounts to 41 percent of water use in our state, annually. And it is twice the amount we can take safely from our 10

largest lakes.

In a recent publication, the Department of Water Resources pointed to this long-term water supply outlook:

Major areas of the State will be limited in growth potential to provide jobs for increasing populations unless additional water supplies are developed.

Areas where some long range (20 to 50 years) water shortages are anticipated include Dallas-Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Abilene, San Angelo, Midland-Odessa, High Plains, Trans-Pecos, El Paso, Lower Rio Grande Valley, Middle Rio Grande, Corpus Christi and the San Antonio area.

Implementation of projects can prevent projected shortages in many of these areas.

The Middle Gulf Coast, Houston, Beaumont, East Texas, Northeast Texas and a part of the Dallas-Fort Worth Central Texas regions can be supplied through intrastate, local area development over the next 50 years if surface-water supplies are developed on a timely schedule as now planned.

All of this led me to the conclusion that establishment of a Water Trust Fund to underwrite water development projects including additional reservoirs and distribution facilities should be a high priority goal.

As I stated in my January 22 speech, this is literally an investment in our future. It will ensure that the state

surplus-unlike some in the past, will be spent in an accountable manner on a highly identifiable and critical need.

It is a form of tax relief, because by putting this money in trust, we are preventing a future onerous tax burden that the State could be forced to levy as our population and water needs increase and our oil and gas revenues decline.

In the long-term sense, the Water Trust Fund would, indeed, amount to a very substantial tax savings, and I support it wholeheartedly.

At the same time, I remain hopeful that we will find a suitable and practical way to return to our citizens in the form of direct tax relief a portion of the surplus which is expected to accrue. I will continue to look for that opportunity.

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
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## Courthouse News



The Borden County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, February 9, 1981 with all members present.

Minutes of the previous meeting of January 26 were read and approved and routine accounts were examined and approved for payment.

Permanent School Funds in the amount of \$40,000 were invested in Federal Home Loan Board securities to mature Jan. 27, 1986 at interest rate of 13.85 percent.

Available School Funds in the amount of \$24,000 were invested in a 182 day Certificate of Deposit at 13.985 percent.

Depository bids, having

been advertised for the 1981-1982 biennium, were opened and considered. Submitting bids were Security State Bank of Big Spring, First National Bank of Big Spring, and State National Bank of Big Spring. The bid of the First National Bank of Big Spring was accepted, it being judged the best bid for Borden County.

Don Wills and Jerry Stone, representing the Borden County ASCS Committee, met with the court to discuss office rent. The court agreed to reduce the rent on the office until October, 1981.

There being no further business, court was adjourned.



## Safety Act Proposed

Austin—The following proposed legislation from Senator E. L. Short was received this week.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Use of certain hoes prohibited. An employer of agricultural laborers may not:

(1) provide an employee with a hoe that has a handle less than five feet in length to use in performing agricultural labor;

(2) require an employee to use a hoe that has a handle less than five feet in length in performing agricultural labor.

Section 2. Remedies. An employee who is injured as a result of an employer's action in violation of Section 1 of this Act may sue the employer for damages or for temporary or permanent injunctive relief.

Section 3. Penalty. (a) An employer who violates Section 1 of this Act commits an offense.

(b) An offense under this section is a Class C misdemeanor.

Section 4. Emergency. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each house be suspended, and this rule is hereby suspended.




