Britain, Iran Oil Fight In Second Round

NEW YORK (AP) — Britain and Iran moved into the second round of discussion of their oil dispute before the UN security council today, still sharply at odds over settlement.

Iran's Premier Mohammed Mosaddegh worked through last night on another installment of his speech attacking British handling of oil in Iran. Security council officials said that if a solution can be hammered out in the council, it will take at least another meeting tomorrow to do it.

Investigation Threatens To Spill Into Justice Department

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional investigation of the Internal Revenue bureau threatened today to spill over into the Department of Justice.

And a House Ways and Means subcommittee began hearings (9:30 a.m.) here on allegations of influence buying in the office of the Boston collector of internal revenue.

New Questions Before the hearings began, new questions were posed by these developments:

1. The St. Louis Post-Dispatch, in a copyrighted article, stated that internal revenue employees at least two occasions, tried to interfere with a federal grand jury investigation that resulted in the indictment of James P. Finnegan, former St. Louis collector.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat reported last night that in late March, while the grand jury was investigating Finnegan's office, Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder telephoned U.S. District Judge George H. Moore saying the Bureau of Internal Revenue would investigate and correct any irregularities in the office.

The judge confirmed getting the call. The grand jury was under his guidance.

Rep. Hillings (R-Calif.), who with Rep. Keating (R-N.Y.) asked the inquiry, told newsmen there was "an interesting parallel" between cases involving the tax collectors of both cities.

San Francisco Collector James G. Smyth, and eight other district internal revenue employees at San Francisco have been suspended as a result of irregularities.

Hillings said in both cases the Justice Dept. "sent emissaries out to make special investigations." It was a "curious thing," he declared, that the Justice Dept. investigation of the San Francisco tax office swung to a United States attorney who was behind the grand jury investigation of Smyth's office.

Hillings added, without further elaboration: "We have information at our disposal which causes me further to question the situation at San Francisco."

MacArthur Speech, Parade To Highlight Legion Conclave

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A double feature starring Gen. Douglas MacArthur and the American Legion's colorful parade drew tens of thousands of spectators into the streets of Miami today.

MacArthur and the parade were the big show for the day as Legionnaires put aside domestic and foreign policy matters for the bugles and drums and the tramp of marching feet.

The General and Mrs. MacArthur were scheduled to arrive shortly after noon to review the parade and take part in a belated dedication of the "MacArthur Causeway" named in honor of the general.

Last night, Senator Richard B. Russell of Georgia told Legionnaires the American people will demand stronger military action in Korea unless the Reds show good faith in the Kaesong truce talks.

Good Weather The weatherman predicted good weather although a storm which seemed to be dying out in the Caribbean began to pick up steam.

But it wasn't close enough to cause any immediate alarm or change the parade plans. Three years ago the Legion parade was caught in a pouring rain which almost washed out the whole show.

MacArthur's speech tomorrow was expected to be another attack on the domestic and foreign policies of the Truman administration. The general was reported to have prepared a 45-minute address — one of the longest since he was relieved of his Far Eastern commands last April by President Truman in a dispute over the conduct of the Korean war.

Red Charges Are Levelled At Candidate

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Charges that Rep. Hale Boggs (D-La.), a gubernatorial candidate, once joined a Communist front organization will be investigated Friday by the Democratic State Central committee.

The charges were brought by Lucille May Grace, register of the state land office and only woman among the 10 Democratic candidates. She filed the charges in Baton Rouge last night in an effort to have Boggs declared ineligible for the Jan. 15 Democratic primary.

Among other things, Miss Grace charged in her petition that Boggs had been a member of the American Student union. The organization has been cited several times by the House Committee on Un-American Activities as a Communist front. She also said he was ineligible to run because of his membership in Congress.

Red Party Leader Begins Sentence

LEAVENWORTH, Kan. (AP) — Gus Hall, a U.S. Communist party leader who evaded authorities for three months after jumping bail, has started serving his five-year term.

He and three other top Communists jumped bail early in July after being convicted of conspiring to teach and advocate the violent overthrow of the U.S. government. Hall was picked up in Mexico Oct. 9 and turned over to U.S. authorities.

Warden Walter A. Hunter said Hall was received at the prison Saturday. After a 30-day quarantine period, he will be assigned a job "the same as anyone else."

Taft Will Run For Presidency

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senator Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio) today announced his candidacy for president in the 1952 election.

"I am going to run because I believe I can conduct the only kind of a campaign which will elect a Republican to office," the Senator told a news conference.

Taft issued three carefully prepared statements.

The longest statement said he would enter the Wisconsin presidential primary and also accept the bid of Ohio delegates to the nomination convention next year.

Definite Advance Senator Bricker, Taft's Republican colleague from Ohio, said the announcement would give him a definite advantage.

Ready to take issue with Taft supporters on that point, were backers of Gen. Eisenhower, who has kept publicly silent on whether he will seek the GOP nomination next year.

His supporters say they have no doubt he will be available and will make his announcement when he completes his indefinite tour as supreme commander of (See SENATOR, Page 2)

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Temperature Takes A Dip

A cool front which took the edge off warm October weather by dropping temperatures almost 10 degrees, moved into Pampa this morning.

The front, which hit the northernmost section of the Panhandle early this morning, dropped the mercury in Pampa from 63 to 55 degrees, between 8 and 9 a. m. It continued to fall, but more slowly, later in the day.

By 10 a. m. it had fallen one degree. According to an Associated Press report, the front was expected to lower temperatures about 10 degrees.

For tonight and early tomorrow morning, lows of 34 to 40 degrees are forecast for the Panhandle. It will take the front several days to cool off the rest of the state. The Weather Bureau said. There is little prospect for moisture for most parts of the state.

However, widely scattered thundershowers may fall in the Panhandle and South Plains tonight and early Wednesday.

Hurricane Prowls Atlantic Waters

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Storm warnings were displayed today from Cape Hatteras in North Carolina to the Virginia Capes as a 70-80 mile-an-hour hurricane prowled Atlantic waters 230 miles off the East Coast.

The Miami Weather bureau warned that tides would be high. Shipping was advised to use caution and small craft to remain in port from Myrtle Beach, S. C., to Cape Hatteras.

This new hurricane, the tenth of the season, sprang up yesterday 400 miles east of Jacksonville, Fla., and by 5 a. m. (EST) today it was southeast of Cape Hatteras.

Strongest winds were estimated at 70 to 80 miles an hour a short distance north of the center and gales extended 300 miles to the north. Highest winds south of the center were 40 to 50 miles an hour.

Stoker Funeral Is Scheduled Today

Services were to be held at 3 p.m. today for Rufus E. Stoker in the First Baptist church at Higgins. Mr. Stoker died Monday after a lengthy illness.

Rev. James Bryant, pastor, will officiate with burial in Higgins cemetery under the direction of Duengel-Garmichael Funeral home.

Mr. Stoker was born Aug. 21, 37, in Wood county. He moved from Claude to Higgins about nine years ago and had served as justice of the peace in Higgins for seven years.

Survivors include his wife, three sons, three daughters, two brothers and 11 grandchildren.

Pakistan Minister Is Killed

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan of Pakistan was assassinated today, the Pakistani high commissioner's office in London announced.

The Prime Minister was shot while addressing a crowded meeting at Rawalpindi in the wild northwest frontier region of the Indian subcontinent, not far from the border of disputed Kashmir.

The assassin fired two bullets into the chest of the Muslim Premier. He was taken to a hospital to have the bullets removed.

Liaquat Ali, 56, became Prime Minister in August, 1947, upon the death of Mohammed Ali Jinnah, founder of Pakistan. Liaquat had been Jinnah's foreign minister.

The prime minister was in Rawalpindi for a six-day tour of the northwest frontier.

Not Identified There was no indication, in first scanty reports, of the identity of the assassin.

Officials in neighboring India long have been aware that extremists in Pakistan have been trying to push the government into a more forceful Kashmir policy. Last March plotters, allegedly headed by the Pakistani army chief of staff, were arrested and charged with attempting to overthrow Liaquat and make war on India from Kashmir.

Northwest Uneasy The northwest territory is the scene of many movements of tribesmen for autonomy.

Kashmir, predominantly Moslem in population, acceded to the Hindu India after the partition of the subcontinent, because it was ruled by a Hindu Maharajah at the time. Pakistan disputes India's claim and troops have been facing each other across a line of demarcation while the United Nations tried to settle the ominous quarrel.

Front line dispatches reported Red resistance stiffened as the Allies drove closer to the city, approximately 30 miles north of the 38th parallel.

Rolls Advance Morning gains of the 24th division were limited, a U.S. 8th Army communiqué said. The 8th Army, attacking from the south-east, pushed forward 1000 yards before noon.

The rapid and only moderately opposed advance has surprised Allied commanders. They had expected to meet the same fanatical last-ditch defense put up by Reds against other phases of the UN fall offensive on Heartbreak ridge in the east and along the full western front.

The Reds had shifted their central front stronghold to Kumsong after they lost their old Iron Triangle assembly area to the Allied summer counteroffensive. Kumsong is east of the Chorwon-Kumbwa-Fyonggang triangle. Presumably they had enough power available to make it tough going for attacking Allies.

Varying opinions have been advanced for Red failure to defend the high hills south of Kumsong — now mostly captured and passed over.

KAPUSKASING, Ont. (AP) — This bush country paper mill town left the starch out of its rousing welcome to Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh last night.

Instead, the working-man town officials took the hard-traveling royal visitors to the paper mill, offered an informal party, and gave them plenty of time to get to bed early.

Mayor A. M. Stevenson, foreman of the mill which is Kapuskasing's sole industry, said he realized the visitors needed rest after their crowded program.

Today the couple fly to Winnipeg (at 9 a.m. CST) to begin a 12-day jaunt through the western Canadian prairies and British Columbia.

Kapuskasing's 5,000 population was bolstered for the royal visit by another 20,000 persons. They were paired in by train, bus and automobiles from surrounding towns.

At the party, at which she met local officials, the Princess was intrigued by the bow ties of some of the guests. The neck-

Newborn Baby Still Missing

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind.—(AP)—Two thousand volunteers combed Michigan City again today in their search for a missing baby, and the FBI hunted a practical nurse who left town about the time the infant disappeared.

Police continued giving the detector tests to St. Anthony hospital staff members who were on duty Saturday afternoon when week-old Lawrence James Lyons disappeared from his crib.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Lyons, waited with waning hope that their pleas and rewards totaling more than \$200 would bring their baby back to them alive and well.

Police were pessimistic about the chances of success, but they asked the FBI to look for her.

The nurse, whose name was withheld, was fired Saturday by a Michigan City doctor. She left a note for her daughter that she had gone to Milwaukee.

John Boehlen, a Michigan City machinist, told police he saw a woman carrying a bundle leave the hospital nursery about 5 p. m. and get on the elevator. He said she was not the nurses' aid on duty on the floor, and it was established that she was not the mother of twins who left the hospital at about that time.

The lie detector tests were started yesterday in the hope of clearing up "muddled reports of the exact time the baby disappeared from the busy fourth floor of the hospital."

The baby, the Lyons' first child, was born by caesarean section last Tuesday. Lyons, 27, a filling station operator, has a 19-year-old daughter by a previous marriage.

Edgar Davis, Oil, Rubber Tycoon, Dies

GALVESTON (AP)—Edgar B. Davis, 78, who made a fortune in Sumatran rubber and Texas oil, died Sunday.

He was widely known for his philanthropies and for his financial backing of a Broadway play known as one of the theatre's greatest "flops."

Davis was brought to the hospital here last week after suffering a stroke at his home in Luling. He never regained consciousness.

Doctors said he died of "a stroke and old age."

Services will be held Wednesday in Luling.

A native of Brockton, Mass., Davis founded a rubber fortune in Sumatra where he went for his health shortly after 1900. After seeing rubber trees growing wild and untapped in the forests, he told a traveler of the possibilities of cultivating the jungle trees. The traveler was an official of the U. S. Rubber Co.

In 1906 Davis was sent to Far East by U. S. Rubber to spend \$10 million on rubber. Eventually he became a director of the firm and sold out his holdings for \$2 million.

In the 1920's he came to Texas and sunk his fortune in six oil wells, all failures. He borrowed money to drill a seventh near Luling. It came in a gusher in 1925. In 1928 he sold out to the Magnolia Petroleum Co. for \$12,100,000.

One of his theories was that commercial oil production could be found much deeper than wells drilled in those days. In the sale of his oil properties he reserved production rights for the deeper strata.

Davis first attracted general public attention when he used his immense wealth to back the theatrical play "The Ladder." It was written to promote Davis' idea of religion of the Far East concerning reincarnation. Davis tried every way to make it a success. In October, 1928, he offered to return the admission price to any who didn't like the show after they attended it. In all, Davis spent more than \$1.3 million to keep the play going in 1928 and 1929.

Davis endowed the Luling Foundation, a school for boys, for \$1 million in 1927. He endowed the Pilgrim Foundation, a similar school in Brockton, for \$1 million.

He gave thousands to Texas for paintings of blue bonnets, the state flower.

The 37-year-old Congressman said the protest was typical of Perez and branded the charges as "absolutely false, low and vicious." As for himself, Boggs continued, his own record spoke for itself. He was a member of the Catholic church, patriotic organization, the U. S. Naval reserve, national co-chairman of "I Am an American Day" and had waged a life-long fight against dictators.

Longshoremen Back On Job After Strike

Striking Longshoremen went back to work today in five Texas and Louisiana ports after agreeing on a wage increase.

Three other Texas ports may be opened by negotiations later today.

In Galveston last night union and port representatives of Houston, Beaumont, Port Arthur, Orange and Lake Charles reached an accord.

Galveston port authorities refused to agree to the wage hike and nickel lines continued their picket. Negotiations may be resumed.

Charles Christl and Brownsville were not represented last night. Union officials said that scheduled negotiations today probably would result in a settlement.

Port representatives of Houston, Beaumont, Port Arthur, Orange and Lake Charles agreed to raises of 5 cents an hour for warehousemen and 7 cents for longshoremen. They also agreed to join the International Longshoremen's association in petitioning the wage stabilization board to show an overall increase of 11 cents an hour.

The IILA warehousemen and longshoremen struck three days ago when negotiations broke down.

Other members of the union respected picket lines and all cargo movement, except the handling of defense and military cargoes, stopped.

spoke for almost 15 minutes in forceful, emphatic French before turning over to an aide the burden of his hour-long argument that Britain has exploited the South Iran oil fields and that the oil dispute is no business of the security council.

For the crowded chamber and the American television audience, Mossadegh displayed none of the emotional outbursts which characterize his speeches at home. He read his prepared statement slowly and calmly. There was not a tear, not a faint.

Mossadegh said he would speak today on a revised resolution the British have submitted calling for new talks. The British withdrew an earlier resolution implying censure of Iran.

His statement yesterday, Mossadegh said, was directed at the earlier resolution.

Britain's Sir Gladwyn Jebb said he would have to wait for Mossadegh's new statement before he could present his final argument.

Jebb said of Mossadegh's accusations against the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. that "some are false, some are exaggerated." He also denied the Iranian's charges that Britain used force against Iran.

A handshake meeting between Jebb and Mossadegh, arranged by UN Secretary-General Trygve Lie in his office after the session, failed to make peace.

PARIS (NEA)—The fancy names under which Parisian fashion dictators are unveiling their Fall collections is one good indication of what's in store for style this Autumn.

Dior calls it the "Shapely Look." Fath's line is the "Egret." Balmain's the "Enchanted Flute," and Desses' "The Bluebird."

It would seem, therefore, that smart women this coming Winter (at least those who can afford to keep up with the Mode) will wear grandmama's rustling petticoats under skirts which are said to be staging a "brutal" return to fullness in many disguises.

"Haughty" collars will command a regal bearing while bird-cage veils will stress the mysterious, alluring, ultra-feminine 1951 belle.

The "New Look" threatens a return offensive. Skirts have crawled down a few inches lower than in the Spring. They will focus and command all the interest, while bodices will be demure, simple and form-fitted, achieving a new pigeon-breast look by the help of darts and whalebones.

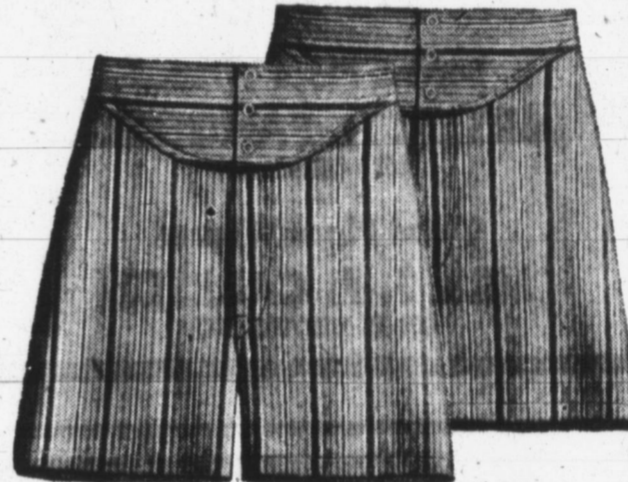

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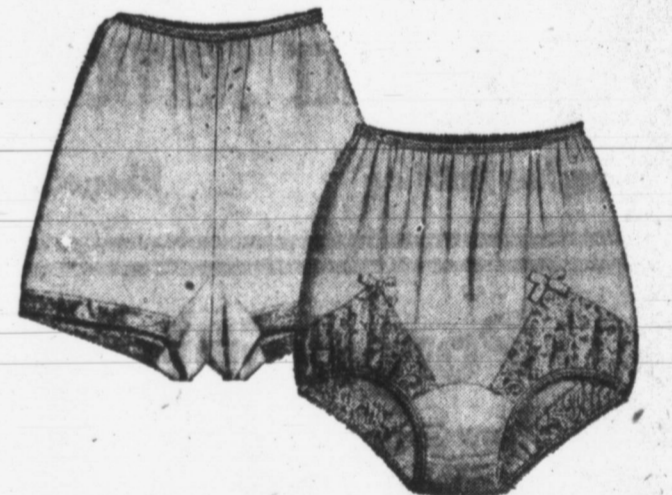

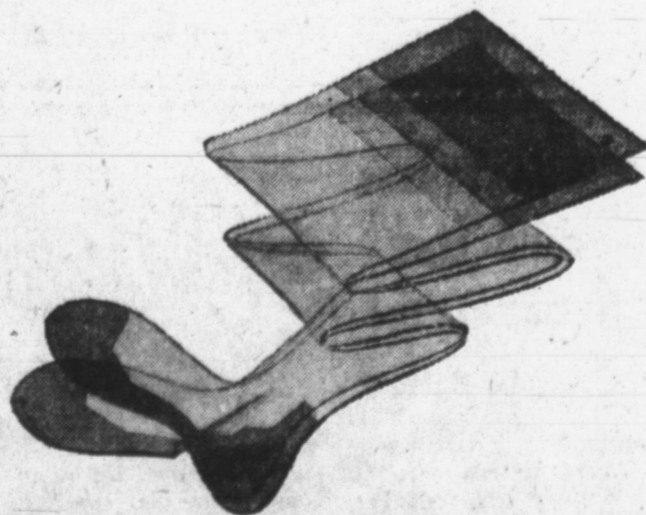

Harvesters Open Final Week Of Work For Conference Play

Lefors Basking In One Of Most Thrilling Grid Wins

LEFORS — (Special) — I was back to work for the Lefors Pirates Monday afternoon, despite the Buc's spectacular 7-6 victory over the Panhandle Panthers here Friday night on Shaw Field.

Stampering themselves logical contenders for the 1-A crown, Lefors fought back fiercely at the Purple and Gold, staving off a last quarter passing attack to assume District 1-A's leadership in company with Canadian, who ripped McLean's Tigers, 28-6 and showed themselves as a team to be reckoned with.

Despite their loss to the Pirates, Panhandle cannot be counted out of the race as yet. White Deer's Bucks, the pre-season team favorite was decisively trounced, 39-14, by Dumas' Class AA Demons. It was White Deer's first commendable opposition since the Bucks had played only Class B teams other than stamping hapless AA Perryton in their opener.

McLean, in the loss to the Wildcats, showed more than ever that the graduation of L. M. Watson has harmed the Bengal Tigers immeasurably and they will probably wind up in the cellar.

Wheeler's Mustangs probably also are to be counted out of the district tussle. Losing to both Clarendon and Lefors, Coleman Huffman's outfit showed that they won't be around at 1-A's title festivities when Stinnett's 1-B Rattlers shaded them, 7-6, their third loss in a row after a stirring victory over Pampa's Guerrillas in an early season tilt.

Clarendon's Bronchos, who seem to be the hard luck team of the district, dropped a toughie to the Memphis' AA Cyclones, 20-8, in a traditional rivalry they'd figured to beat. Clarendon still can be counted as 1-A's dark horse, though it looks remote at this time. They'll still make the rest of the district play ball, however, even though the Bronchos are in a rebuilding process, having lost many key men through graduation.

But back to the Pirate-Panhandle contest, which has been said by old-timers to be the best game ever played on Shaw Field. The Panthers fielded a club that looked sharp, and the Pirates sent one out looking equally sharp. And both lived up to expectations.

By far the outstanding performance on the field was captain Ray Dickerson's, who raced 75 yards with the tying touchdown. Bob Newsum, powerful senior fullback, crashed over the extra point, instead of Burl Bigman, as previously announced. The entire Pirate front wall played top-notch ball, with Bob Clemmons, all-district center in '50, leading the way with the help of Ed Higgins and Bigman.

Next weekend the Pirates face the rough Price College Cardinals in Amarillo, and it is quite possible that the Lefors reserves will see a lot of action, giving the Pirate regulars a deserved rest before meeting Clarendon on Shaw Field the following week.

Coach Frank Sonntag, who suffered an attack of appendicitis following Friday's game, has recovered and will direct his club's activities further.

DALLAS — (AP) — The SMU-Rice game at Dallas Saturday night appears to be the only Southwest conference football game this week not handicapped by player injuries. Other squads report injury lists ranging to the long and varied toll at TCU.

Texas, the nation's No. 4 team, went through a light workout yesterday minus center Jack Barton, who has a bruised hip, and end Tom Stollands, who hurt an ankle in the Oklahoma triumph.

Arkansas, Texas' opponent this week in Fayetteville, reported dozens of injuries to its line. The team of uniform with a bruised hip, Texas A&M, rated No. 6, is looking for a replacement for halfback Augie Saxe. Saxe broke his left arm Saturday. End Walter Hill missed practice and backs Bob Smith and Billy Tidwell did no contact work.

TCU worked against Aggie formations with sophomore Ray McKeon in the quarterback position. The injured regular quarterbacks, Gil Bartosh and Mal Fowler, confined themselves to a few sprints and practice passes. Bartosh, with a strained ankle, may be able to play against A&M, but Dutch Meyer indicated McKeon would carry the load.

Baylord guard Walter Bates and end Harold Riley probably won't be in the lineup Saturday against Texas Tech because of leg injuries. Injuries to Clary Jones and Francis Davidson are improving.

The SMU squad got a short practice session yesterday, an obvious reward for their 27-20 win over Notre Dame. Herschel Forrester, Lou Miller, Rusty Russell, Jr., and D. Russell had minor injuries but will play against Rice.

Every member of the Rice squad was hale and hearty after the Navy game Saturday.

Unbeaten Irish Set For Phillips

SHAMROCK — (Special) — Shamrock's Fighting Irish, undefeated in four games, but tied in one, collide with the dangerous Phillips Blackhawks here Friday night.

Coach Scott McCall's Irish are expected to be in top shape, as the injured backs, Ronald Settle and Don Carlin, report for the combat. Settle was hurt in the Wellington tie, 19-19, and Carlin cracked a wrist in the first week of the present season. It will be his first game this year.

Phillips has a very potent ground attack, grinding out 402 yards against Childers' all on the soil. The Hawk passing attack doesn't seem to be strong, although they did set up the lone TD against Hereford, with a 38-yard heave.

Although the Irish outgained the Hawks, 262 yards to 144, last season, they were hard-pressed to tie, getting the tie when Bobby Campbell, hero of this year's Memphis game, fell on a Hawk fumble on the Hawk 6. Vernon Tarbet, Irish half, made the six on the next play and Dunnam kicked goal to tie. Shamrock and Phillips are rated among the top contenders for the District 1-AA crown. Other tough 1-AAers are Dalhart and Dumas. All four are in the top 10 AA group of the Panhandle and South Plains. A 3 Shamrock and Dumas are undefeated. Phillips lost to Brownfield, 23-7, and Dalhart lost to Canyon, 13-12.

Any of the four may win the crown, but one of them may be eliminated at Shamrock this Friday night.

Sports Shot California Tops Nation; Longhorns, Aggies, Bears Listed In Top Ten

DALLAS — (AP) — Blair Cherry's story of why he quit coaching is in the Saturday Evening Post. It is interesting, tributing to Weldon Hart and Wilbur Evans, who wrote it for the man who resigned as coach at Texas in mid-season last year to enter the oil business.

Hart and Evans are good-ex-sports writers. We'd like for them to write why they quit this profession, which, like the coaching profession, gives little time for sleep and brings sarcastic and bitter letters from the fans.

Cherry sets forth three reasons why he quit coaching: the long-standing invitation of his brother, Alton Cherry of Dallas, to join him in his oil business and associated enterprises. Poor health, which he says was probably caused and certainly aggravated by his inability to relax under the constant strain of big-time football family responsibilities. He says he didn't think it fair to his wife and children to let them remain indefinitely widowed and orphans. (Funny thing: his wife has told me she's thinking about sports writing making her a widow and her children orphans.)

But Cherry gives still another reason. He does indicate he thinks he was the lesser evil than the fans and alumni who harassed him so. This other reason was sports writers. Cherry names two — Fred Williams, sports editor of the Austin American-Statesman, and you truly.

In the entire article Cherry puts the blame for his troubles on others. The only mistake he appears to think he made was that he would tell the sports writer the "straight dope" but would, of course, expect the writer not to put him out on a limb.

This policy, he relates, backfired in 1950 when I interviewed Cherry on football prospects. I asked Blair if his team shouldn't be a favorite to win the Southwest Conference championship. Cherry said it should, along with SMU, TCU and Rice. We reported that Cherry said his team should be "a" favorite to win the conference title. Cherry claimed that was construed by the fans as saying he had picked his team to win the championship. He perhaps was correct — we should have said "one of the favorites."

Cherry admits he contributed to the pressure by admitting Texas ought to have a good team and that perhaps he should have kept his honest opinions to himself. It was such statements as that which brought stories in the press that Texas would be the favorite. Actually, Texas should have been the favorite since it had the best material in the conference.

But since we put him on the spot, apparently Cherry had to win the title to offset it. His team did win it — in fact didn't lose a conference game. So perhaps our statement that day that Cherry said his team should be a favorite was the best thing that could have happened to Texas. It is refreshing anyway, to know that we have so much influence.

Cherry's grievance against Fred Williams was that Fred took the position that game officials robbed Texas in the Texas-Oklahoma game, which the Longhorns lost 14-12. Williams charges the Austin newspapers kept the flame of controversy burning by their columns to the readers who wanted to give their opinions. He says many letters were caustic and abusive and few showed a bit of enlightenment or knowledge of the situation or football itself (it is often natural to think the fellow criticizing you is ignorant).

Cherry says he didn't question the right of the papers to question the letters but he did question the judgment of anyone who would allow irresponsible, anonymous attacks upon an individual to be the cause of the guise of freedom of expression news writers to the public and to his readers — he should give both sides of any question and allow those who pay the bills — both for the newspaper and for the coach's salary — to have their say. In this, Williams was merely following the time-honored tradition of the press. Suppression of the news which some Southwest Conference football coaches, among them Cherry, attempted with those "cooling off" periods before the dressing room interviews after a game, might be worse than using a news coach thinks detrimental since it criticizes him and his team.

The article is a good one, highly interesting and informative, but we pause to wonder why Cherry uses a column by a sports writer that told of the alumni wanting to buy up Cherry's contract but does not say whose column it was; or, in recounting the attitude of the college officials, who he claims in an indirect way, "knife the coach in the back when he loses, he doesn't name those college administrators.

Cherry says the college administrators seldom back the coach whose team loses. Wonder if he read the statement of the president of TCU recently that Dutch Meyer would stay at TCU so long as he might wish whether his team won or not (TCU hasn't won a conference championship since 1944.) Or did he know that the administration at SMU tried to keep Matty Bell as coach in the season that SMU lost four games after being picked to win the Southwest Conference championship?

One other thing about which Cherry takes your correspondent to task is the Texas-SMU and Texas-TCU controversy over those "off weeks" before the Texas

Sports Shot California Tops Nation; Longhorns, Aggies, Bears Listed In Top Ten

NEW YORK — (AP) — The Golden Bears of the University of California took over today as the No. 1 college football team in the land after threatening to hit the top for two weeks.

Coach Lynn "Poppy" Waldorf's men, winners of four straight this season, collected 1,123 points in the third weekly Associated Press poll of sports writers and sportscasters across the nation. They easily beat out Tennessee, the No. 2 team with 977, and Michigan State, No. 3, with 935.

Further, the Bears were voted the No. 1 spot on 50 of the 138 ballots cast, compared to 28 for Tennessee and 16 for Michigan State, the leader in the first two polls.

Two new members joined the top ten. They were Princeton and Baylor, which took over the No. 10 spot, respectively. Others in the charmed circle included Texas, No. 4; Georgia Tech, No. 5; Texas A&M, No. 6; Maryland, No. 7, and Illinois No. 8.

Dame, the early-season surprise, and Ohio State, the pre-campaign favorite, both tumbled. The Buckeyes, held to a 6-6 standstill by Wisconsin Saturday, dropped to 17th, and Notre Dame, beaten 27-20 by Southern Methodist, plummeted to No. 21.

Texas, Georgia Tech and Maryland all improved their positions over a week ago. The Longhorns jumped from sixth after moving up from eighth by beating Louisiana State 25-7, and Maryland advanced from 10th with its 3-7 triumph over Georgia.

California tripped Washington State 42-35, while Michigan State had to come from behind to beat Marquette, 20-14. Tennessee, which was voted the most likely team to wind up No. 1 in the pre-season AP poll, turned back Chattanooga, 42-13.

Texas A&M, one of the Southwest Conference favorites, and Illinois, which could wind up the Big 10 winner, both won their games, but each went down on the list, the Aggies from fourth to sixth and the Illinois from seventh to eighth.

Texas A&M smothered Trinity of Texas, 52-14, and Illinois defeated Syracuse, 41-20.

The points were figured on 10 for first place, nine for second and so on down to one for 10th.

In an attempt to salvage something, high school officials were reported willing to approve the signing of scholastic players who leave school for economic reasons or to enter industry — with the ban remaining on those to stay in school.

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Jail Indicted Cage Briber

NEW YORK — (AP) — Joseph Benintende, 42, was jailed on a bribery charge today as the leader of a ring allegedly ready to lay \$50,000 bets on a single rigged college basketball game.

AUSTIN — (AP) — A Railroad Commission order reducing freight rates on cattle feed because of a drought emergency was upheld in 98th district court today.

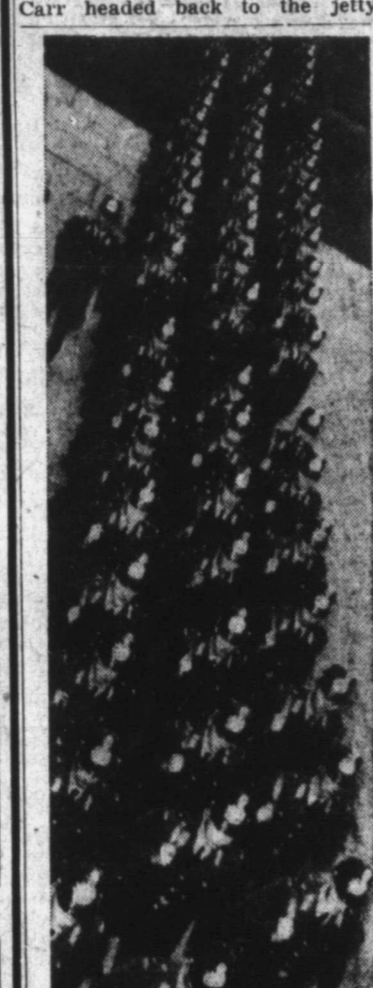
Wage, Hour Law Hits Small Firms

FORT WORTH — A lot of smaller employers and businessmen are in danger of violating federal law because they do not think that the wage stabilization program applies to them, a government spokesman here warned.

F. D. Riley, supervisor of the Fort Worth office of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts divisions of the U. S. Dept. of Labor here, said that the law applies equally to employers and employees, regardless of the size of the firm or organization. He added that there is increasing evidence from information received that many small employers, especially those with fewer than eight employees, may be exposing themselves to penalties because of their indifference to the law.

1/2 cup sugar, 3 egg whites, unbeaten
1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 cup shredded coconut, cut
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, 1/2 to 3/4 cup chilled heavy cream
2 or 3 tablespoons sweet cocoa mix
in stiff peaks. Fold in chocolate mixture gradually, blending well. Add vanilla and coconut. Turn into 1-quart melon mold. Chill until firm, then unmold. Combine cream and cocoa mix in small bowl. Beat with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick. Spread over unmolded sponge and decorate top with shreds of coconut to resemble football laces. Surround with additional coconut, which has been tinted green. Makes 7 to 9 servings.

Jessup Nomination To Get Consideration Today

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Amid doubtful prospects for Senate action a foreign relations subcommittee called a meeting today to consider what to do about the nomination of Philip C. Jessup to be a UN delegate.

The closed session (8 a.m. CST) was arranged originally as one at which the five-man group would vote, but Jessup last night accepted an invitation to testify again and said he could not do so before tomorrow.

In a telegram to Chairman Sparkman (D-Ala.), Jessup said he was eager to set the record straight on accusations by Harold F. Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania. But he said he would not be able to see until this morning the full record of Stassen's testimony yesterday and that he has a special engagement in New York this afternoon. He asked to appear tomorrow morning or any time thereafter.

Sparkman said in advance of today's session that request seemed to blow up plans for a subcommittee vote today. He added that Jessup "certainly is entitled to be heard."

Jessup is an ambassador-at-large and a top adviser to Secretary of State Acheson. His nomination for the United Nations post has become involved in a sharp controversy over past U.S. policies toward China.

With Congress driving for adjournment by Saturday, it appeared increasingly doubtful the Senate will act now on the nomination.

Unless the Senate specifically votes down the nomination, President Truman would be free to give Jessup a recess appointment to serve as a delegate to the forthcoming UN sessions in Paris after Congress adjourns.

New Drug Is Said To Aid Alcoholic

"Antabuse," the drug that builds a "chemical fence" around the alcoholic, is now available for general prescription use in the fight against the nation's "number one emotional disease."

The announcement was made yesterday at a New York physicians meeting by Boyd O'Connor, president of Ayerst, pharmaceutical company which introduced the drug in this country in 1949.

Three years of intensive laboratory and clinical research have confirmed "antabuse" as our most effective chemical weapon against alcoholism," Mr. O'Connor told the luncheon meeting at the Sherry Netherland hotel, held under the auspices of the New York Medical Committee on alcoholism.

O'Connor and Dr. John Jewell, Ayerst medical director, reported the drug has been tested in more than 100 clinics in the United States and Canada, by more than 800 qualified physicians, and with more than 5,000 patients.

Using "antabuse," 50 per cent of these alcoholics have achieved permanent abstinence — another 25 per cent made basic improvement — the pre-conditions necessary for rehabilitation, Dr. Jewell added.

Dr. Ruth Fox, chairman of the Medical committee and head of the New York Alcoholics Treatment center, hailed the Ayerst announcement as offering renewed hope to "850,000 chronic alcoholics and more than three million excessive drinkers in the United States."

Iran, Egypt Rocking Boat; But May Sink Themselves

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The big men, meaning the rich men, in Iran and Egypt are rocking the boat. Their own boat. But they can't rock too much or they'll sink themselves.

Communism is too close to them to be comfortable. And if Communism ever moves in on them they'll be the first to go. They are the ones with the most to lose: the rich men and the big landowners. They have no doubts of that. So while they talk of booting out the British — which is a nice way of building themselves up at home with the masses of the people by fanning the flames of Nationalism — they can't afford to let the fire get out of control.

The Iranians, taking advantage of Britain's weakness, due to the war, has kicked them out and taken over the oil industry. But they can't afford to make tie-ups with the Russians to such an extent that Communism could step in.

And because of the same British weakness the Egyptians are talking of booting the British out of the Suez Canal area which the British have been guarding under a treaty with Egypt. But there are Communists in Egypt and the rich men can't let them make hay.

This reaction against the British is neither unnatural nor unusual. There has been longstanding resentment against the British who, when they had it,

threw their weight around and never left much doubt as to who was boss. Now that Britain no longer is the No. 1 world power, the smaller countries are taking advantage of her come-down in the world. And as British prestige sinks, more of the same may occur elsewhere.

If this involved only the British, the rest of the world might be able to sit back calmly and say to itself: "John Bull finally got it in the neck." But it does concern a good part of the rest of the world. Britain is one of the cornerstones in the Atlantic alliance between this country and Canada and Western Europe, an alliance which has been extended now to include Greece and Turkey.

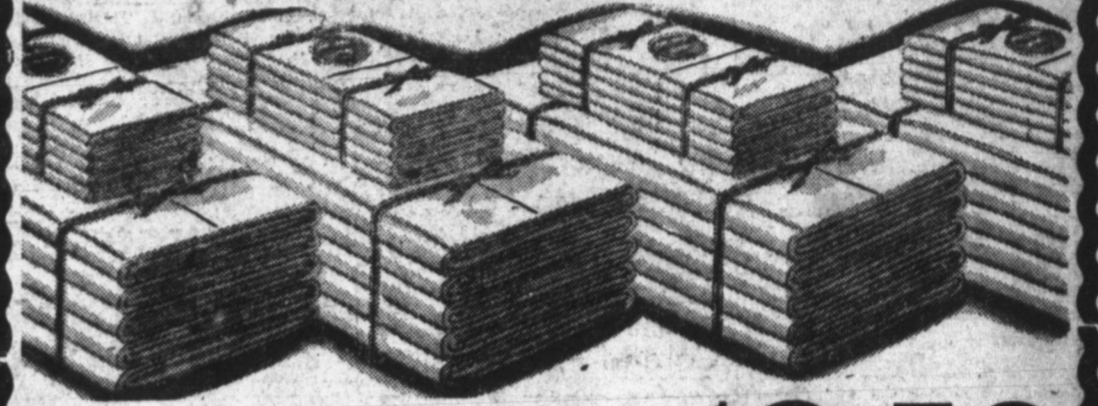
