according to more than 1,700 Roosevelt letters published by Harvard university in the third and fourth (of eight) volumes of "the letters of Theodore Roosevelt." They cover the period 1901-1905.

But above all, in the opinion of historian Elting E. Morison of the Massachusetts Institute of technology, who edited the letters, Roosevelt sought to resolve the conflict between culture and barbarism in an industrial society. He set about trying to achieve what he "took to be the right kind of civilization," Morison said.

Roosevelt saw "in a society that rested upon industry the constant danger of barbarism." commented Morison. "Unhappily prominent in American life, he wrote a friend, was 'the spirit of. . . the banker, the broker, the mere manufacturer, the mere mer
