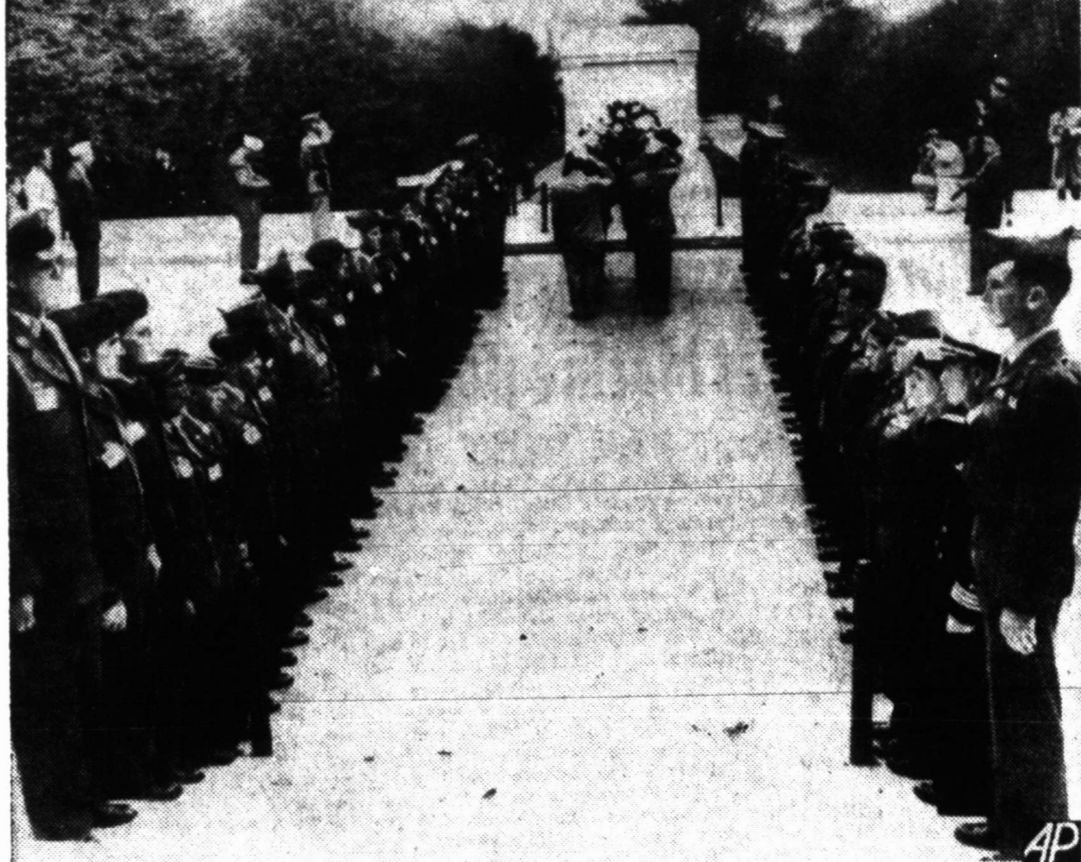

Who can vote — 34,915,112 Britons over 21; peers and felons are barred. Women voters exceed men by 3 percent.

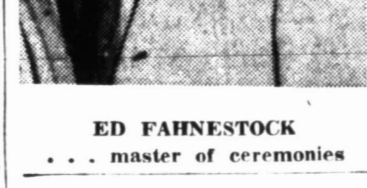

### Evangelist Graham Speaks Today At Baptist Convention

HOUSTON (AP)—Evangelist Billy Graham speaks today to the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The Baptists attacked "moral degeneracy in our government" yesterday and said it threatened the existence and security of the nation.

Delegates adopted a strongly worded statement to that effect. The convention will vote today whether to increase the 150 man executive board to 180 members.

The 50 new members would be elected. Officers also will be chosen.

### Jury Gets Damage Suit

The jury in the \$125,000 damage suit of E. E. Cockrell vs. Lawrence Blasberg in 31st District court was still out at 11 a. m. today.

The case went to the jury at 4:10 p. m. yesterday after more than two hours of argument by attorneys on both sides.

The court's charge to jury included 10 special issues, each which have to be answered before a verdict can be reached.

While attorneys and court officials were "sweating out" the jury last night, Judge Lewis M. Goodrich took time out to accept a guilty plea from Billy Gene Webb, indicted for forgery.

Webb, represented by Atty. Arthur Teed who was appointed by the court, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary at 7 p. m. Teed, assisted with other attorneys in the \$125,000 damage suit, was sitting in the court room at the time District Atty. Tom Braly brought Webb in.

Judge Goodrich took advantage of Teed's proximity and summoned the lawyer to represent Webb in his guilty plea.

Testimony in the damage suit ended shortly before noon yesterday. The case arose out of an automobile crash on U. S. Hwy. 66 on Oct. 30, 1949, in which Wheeler County Commissioner Don Rivers was killed. Cockrell, Blasberg and L. L. See were seriously injured.

### Low Morale, Dissatisfaction Noted In Several Marine Bases

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Senate Armed Services subcommittee reported today it had found dissatisfaction and low morale among Marines—particularly recently recalled reservists—at three bases.

"This was discouraging in view of the long history of high morale and esprit de corps of the Marines," the group said.

The three bases are El Toro and Camp Pendleton in California and Camp Lejeune in North Carolina.

The subcommittee criticized the Navy and Marine corps for what it called lavish use of men and money, in a report which also covered conditions at the Marine corps air station, Quantico, Va., the Navy's amphibious base at Little Creek near Norfolk, Va., and the Navy's submarine base at New London, Conn.

The preparedness subcommittee, headed by Senator Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex) was set up shortly after fighting broke out in Korea to keep an eye on the mobilization problems.

In general, the latest report praised the food, clothing supplies, instruction, medical care, housing and recreation facilities at the six training centers.

But in addition to reporting low morale at the three Marine bases, the subcommittee was critical of what it called a "lack of cost consciousness" among officers at the six centers.

This factor "involves waste in manpower and waste in money—and at this critical juncture the nation can afford neither," the subcommittee said.

As an example of low morale and waste of manpower, the report cited a staff sergeant, an inactive reservist recalled to duty, whose full time job at El Toro is to issue equipment at a golf course.

"It would be impossible to convince this man that he was really needed and that there was sufficient cause to recall him to active duty," the report said.

The Senators recommended that the Navy include in its fitness reports for officers a new category, "cost consciousness."

### Group Protests Naming Clark

AUSTIN (AP)—A spokesman for Texas members of the Missouri Synod Lutheran congregation has made public a protest against President Truman's appointment of Gen. Mark Clark as ambassador to the Vatican.

The Rev. Theo. Delaney of Austin, member of the Texas Lutheran church district's department of public relations, wrote the President he objected on political and religious grounds.

He said the appointment was in conflict with the first amendment which says "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion."

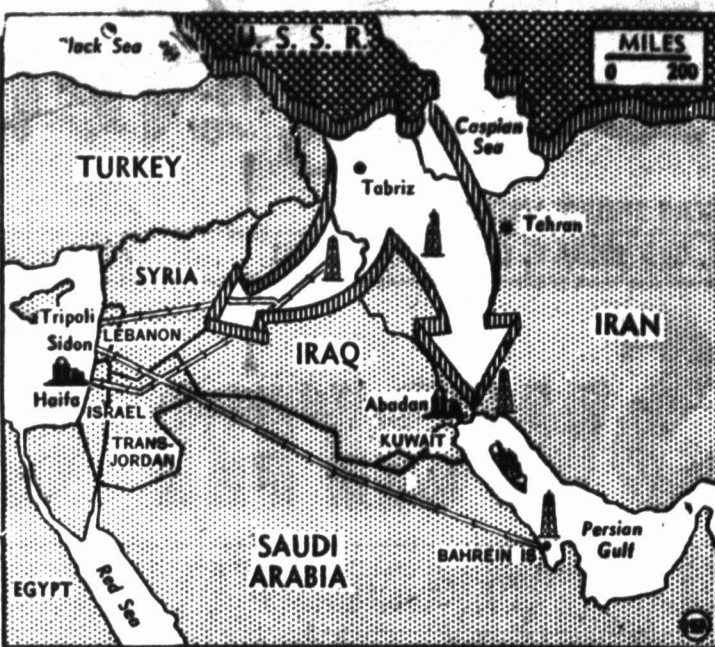

### Threatening Rain Puts Damper On Bomb Maneuvers

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Threatening rain, moving down from the northwest, put a damper today on the preliminary phase of exercise Desert Rock, the joint Army-Atomic Energy commission maneuvers.

The initial rehearsal for the atomic battlefield test was held at dawn yesterday with B-29 bombers making what appeared to be a conventional bomb run.

About 1,000 troops, including units from Camp Roberts, Calif.; Fort Lewis, Wash.; and the 11th Airborne division from Camp Campbell Ky., were believed to have been in forward positions for the TNT type blasts.

The AEC did not say how many such dry runs will be made before the atomic drops start. But it was considered significant that the AEC called yesterday's run "an initial rehearsal" indicating more warmups to follow.

No test was scheduled today; any decision about tomorrow probably depends on the weather.

The commission's test chiefs returned to Las Vegas from the site last night as the weather bureau forecast rain in the Yucca flat area, 75 miles northwest.

They declined comment on the dry run, which was held primarily to test communications, sound blast waves and various operational phases.

Planes from the Air Force strategic weapons command flew from Kirtland Air Force base, Albuquerque, N.M., to take part in the tests. Several B-29s from Indian Springs Air base, near the test site, also were said to have participated.

The Prince headed the Swedish Red Cross from 1906 to 1945. During both world wars he personally directed its widespread efforts to aid war prisoners, invalids and refugees throughout Europe.

BELGRADE — (AP) — A Yugoslav district court Tuesday convicted 12 men and two women of spying for Russia. One defendant was sentenced to the firing squad, one to life imprisonment and the others to hard-labor prison terms ranging from five to 18 years.

**Radar System For Warning Of Aerial Attack Near Completion**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The \$295,000,000 radar system for warning of possible aerial attack against the United States is nearly completed, Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg has announced.

The Air Force chief of staff told reporters the complex and far-flung detection system should be in full operation soon.

But, he indicated, it will take longer before all the units of new jet interceptor planes needed as a vital second part of the air defense system are ready.

The first planes provided for under appropriations made two years ago are only now beginning to be delivered — a "lead time" required for the negotiation of contracts, the hiring of thousands of aircraft workers and the manufacture and installation in factories of the tools needed for mass production of the planes.

The Air Force, with substantial appropriations by Congress and by diverting funds from other projects of lower priority, has been able to rush the radar net near to completion in a little over two years.

Vandenberg said most of the equipment needed for the remaining radar stations in the network is ready, but that some installation work remains.

The warning and interceptor forces of the United States work in close liaison with those of Canada in the protection of the northern hemisphere against a surprise aerial strike by Russian bombers or paratroopers across the polar areas or the high latitudes of the Pacific or Atlantic oceans.

Air Force experts point out, however, that the problem of establishing even a reasonably adequate radar warning system has been staggering because of the vast area involved in the Alaskan-Northern Canada - Greenland air approaches. The area involved is thirty times greater than England — which in World War II had the greatest concentration of radar and fighter plane defenses then known.

In the new North American may most as much as \$5,000,000 radar network, a single station and require 400 men to maintain Arctic perimeter alone, not in-cluding special defense areas in the industrial sections of the U.S. and Canada.

Vandenberg said the network has the latest electronic equipment, but he noted that the range of radar pickup of aircraft is still limited by the earth's curvature, around which radar waves cannot bend.

**Violent Storms In Italy Kill 100**

ROME — (AP) — Almost 100 persons have been killed in violent storms raging throughout Italy.

The toll includes 71 who died in the southern province of Calabria and 15 killed when a gale destroyed their house in Catania, Sicily.

At least 6,000 are homeless in the two areas.

Torrential rains flooded the northern cities of Genoa, Varese and Alessandria.

**Russian - Speaking Pilots Flying Jets**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg, air chief of staff, has said Russian-speaking pilots are flying some Communist jet fighter planes in the Korean war.

He was asked if Russians are piloting the aircraft which bear the insignia of the Chinese Communist Air Force. Sideslipping a direct answer, Vandenberg said: "People who speak Russian are flying the MIG's. Anybody who wants to make something of that can do so."

As to the performance of American jets against the Russian-MIG-15 Jets, Vandenberg said the ratio of "our victories is 14 to 1."

REGINA, Sask. — (AP) — Mayor B. W. Mellor, officer commanding the 16th Royal Ordnance Depot in Regina, had a day to remember. He became the father of a baby boy, was promoted to lieutenant colonel and shot six ducks on a hunting trip.

**Less Pilfering**

SINGAPORE — (AP) — Chinese traders say stricter port security measures by Indonesian authorities have resulted in less pilfering from ships' cargoes during the past few months.

One official said the improved situation had brought about a steady rise in trade between Singapore and Indonesia.

CANYON — Three students from Lefors are listed among the 2200 persons enrolled at West Texas State college for the fall semester.

**Sugar Imported**

NEW DELHI — (AP) — India in 1950-51 imported 60,000 tons of sugar from the United Kingdom at a cost of \$12,915,000 to supplement her own internal production of 1,100,000 tons, a food ministry spokesman said here.

He added the United Kingdom was able to fill India's entire needs because of the 20,000 tons of raw sugar supplied to London by the United States.

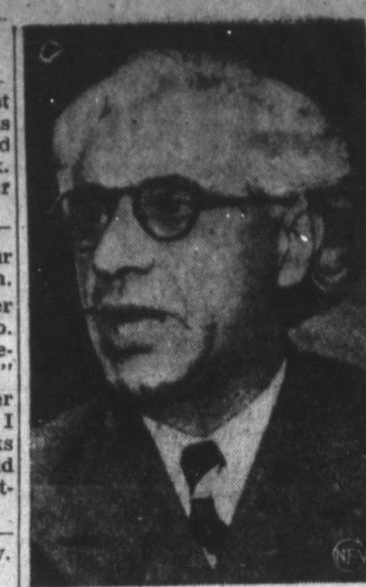

# OPS Boss Says Beef Prices Rise Is 'Way Out Of Line'

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — It is perfectly in order for anyone to criticize the operations of the Office of Price Stabilization. However, many of the statements that have been made about the beef price regulations do not give a complete picture of the impact of our program on the livestock industry.

It would be impossible to discuss all aspects of this subject in a brief space, since the criticisms include every self-serving claim made both to us and to Congressional committees. I shall, therefore, discuss only major points that seem to have been misunderstood.

First, we have not unfairly singled out beef for rollbacks. We reduced the price of beef in order to hold wages and other prices at reasonable levels. We have for similar reasons, issued general rollback orders on 18 other commodities, including such important items as soap, pulpwood, shortenings and salad oils, and various types of metal scrap.

Cattle prices rose way out of line with wages and other prices. Between January, 1950, the date of the wage stabilization base, and March, 1951, cattle prices rose:

- Over five times as much as wages.
- Over four times as much as prices paid by farmers.
- Over five times as much as the index of consumer prices.
- Over three times as much as the prices of food items.

Beef accounts for about 13 percent of the consumer's food bill and for almost half of the meat consumed in this country. When the price of so important an item as beef rises more rapidly than wages and other prices, those charged with responsibility for economic stabilization have in the long run only two alternatives:

One is to reduce beef prices so that they will be in a more normal relationship to wages and other prices. The other is to allow wages and other prices to increase to the level of beef prices.

We rejected the second alternative because it is nothing more than administered inflation. Every person in the country with a fixed income, every person with a savings account or Government bonds, every holder of an insurance policy or an annuity would have suffered. Most important of all, the American people would have lost their confidence in the stability of our economy.

It should also be pointed out that in the long run cattle growers and feeders would not be better off under the second alternative than under the first. If they get more money for their cattle, they will have to pay more money for the things they buy. The experience of the 1920's

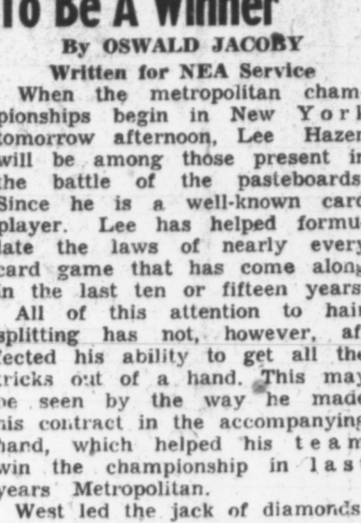

During the preceding year, India obtained 180 tractors. The official source said these tractors by the end of 1951 would have brought 3,000,000 acres under cultivation, resulting in an estimated additional yield of 83,000 tons of additional food grains.

### UN Birthday Observed By Whole World

PARIS — (AP) — In an atmosphere of tension and fear of war, peoples around the world today marked the sixth anniversary of the United Nations, the world organization dedicated to the task of preserving peace.

France marked the day by giving the UN a golden key to the palace which will be the world organization's home in November. In open air ceremonies, foreign minister Robert Schuman handed UN Secretary General Trygve Lie the key to the Palais de Chaillot where the general assembly will open its sixth session Nov. 6. The Palais will officially become the property of the UN Nov. 1 or as long as it is needed.

As the blue UN flag was hoisted over the building, Schuman said he hoped the psychological atmosphere of France would help the 49-nation organization along the road to peace. Lie answered that international relationships were far from reflecting the harmony of the site— one of the most beautiful Paris neighborhoods — but "the United Nations must keep on striving to establish harmony, or at least, some form of peaceful co-existence between conflicting interests and ideologies in the world."

Oct. 24 is celebrated as UN day because the charter officially came into force Oct. 24, 1945. There were observances in almost every world capital. In Moscow, the government newspaper Ivestia charged that the UN had become the tool of British and American imperialists. Despite Kremlin coldness, the UN information center in Moscow planned a flag raising ceremony and showing of films on UN activities.

Birthday processions were arranged to start at dawn in Indian cities and in Pakistan 27,000 Karachi school children were to witness a UN pageant.

### Jesse Jones Tells Of His 13 Years Experience With RFC

By WALTER F. BOSWELL HOUSTON — (AP) — Jesse H. Jones, the white-haired Texas wizard of finance, tells the story of his 13 years with the Reconstruction Finance Corp. in his

book "Fifty Billion Dollars" published Oct. 16. It is a book about human relations as well as money. In his pages are the dispiriting days of the Great Depression; the urgency of the World War II years; details of Jones' public scrap with Henry Wallace (Jesse says that controversy wrecked Henry's chances of becoming President); the story of Jones' relation with his portrait of Franklin D. Roosevelt: "All things to all men — always a politician."

There, too are memoirs of the Houston financial relations with the great and small of business, banking, industry, government, and diplomacy. Collaborator Edward Angly, who spent three years on the book and interviewed hundreds of persons, writes that now "At an autumnal 77, Uncle Jesse, is still on the job at least six full days a week, hankers for home work almost every night, ignores most national, state, and local holidays, and sometimes devotes part of his Sundays to the workaday grindstone."

Jones was busy in those Washington years, too. He tells of his encounters with the J. P. Morgans and A. P. Gianninis of banking; the Budds, Van Swearingens and Baldwins of railroading; the Ben Fairbanks, Eugene Graces, and Tom Girdlers of steel; the shipbuilders like Henry Kaiser; the men of aluminum like Arthur Davis. He tells how RFC fought the Great Depression and later a shooting war.

Once FDR asked Jones to see about buying the 102-story Empire State Building for the government. Jesse was sure the President never forgave him for not buying it.

Military police carried Sewell Avery out of Montgomery Ward & Co. Jones says about the most awkward thing the White House asked him to do was to seize the headquarters and main Chicago plant of Montgomery Ward & Co. in April, 1944.

There are many provocative chapters: "The Roosevelts, the Cabinet and Truman"; "I was not a New Dealer"; "Bailing out Elliott Roosevelt" (Jones took \$400 and bought from John A. Hartford of A&P stores 2000 shares of stock in the Texas State Network held by Hartford as collateral for \$200,000 in notes to Hartford given by Elliott and his wife Ruth Googins Roosevelt. The \$400 was Uncle Jesse's own money; he acted when the President asked him to help, and Elliott later paid him back.); "Jones owns the Houston Chronicle newspaper. In a chapter titled: 'A New Face in the White House,' he writes: Although as a publisher I opposed President Truman's election in 1948, my personal relations with him have remained on a cordial basis."

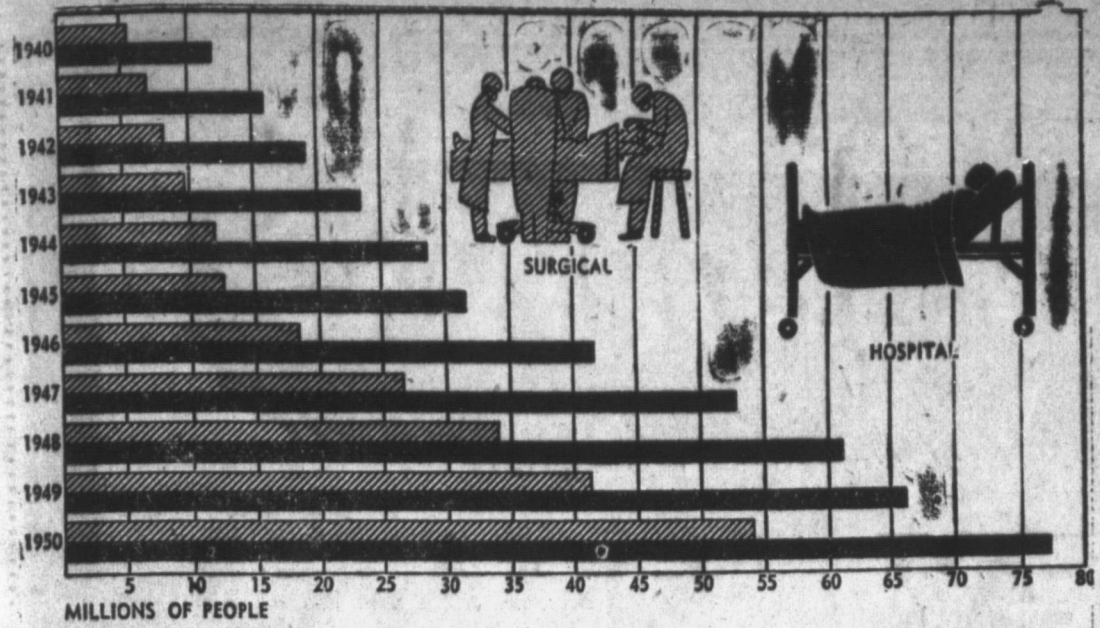

### Man Who Killed Second Wife Also Kills Third, Self

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — (AP) — A retired Chicago chiropractor fatally wounded his third wife and then took his own life Tuesday in what officers said was a case of murder and suicide.

Deputy sheriff Joseph Leard of Broward county said Dr. Frank J. Furch, Jr., 48, who served eight years in Illinois State prison for killing his second wife, shot Mrs. Lucy Slingerland Furch, and then killed himself to climax a marital rift.

BETWEEN THE SHOOTINGS, the doctor beat Mrs. Furch's 11-year-old daughter, Pamela, with a gun butt and fired three shots at her but missed, Leard reported. The child suffered cuts and bruises on the head but was reported in "good condition."

Mrs. Furch had filed a suit for divorce Saturday, alleging she had been beaten and threatened. Police early Tuesday found Mrs. Furch bound and gagged, lying on a twin bed with a bullet wound in her head. Dr. Furch was on the living room floor, also with a bullet in his head. He died six hours later. Mrs. Furch died Tuesday night. She was 46.

Dr. Furch, a Princeton university graduate, was former president of the Illinois Association of Chiropractors and a dean of the Northwestern Institute of Foot Surgery. He and his first wife, Myrtle, had two children.

KILLED SECOND WIFE — Police records show that in 1937 Dr. Furch tried to kill himself after fatally shooting his divorced wife, Norma, and slightly wounding her maid. He was sentenced to 14 years in the Illinois State prison at Joliet but was released in 1945.

He founded the National Association of Nursing homes in 1949 and this year was executive secretary of the group's National Golden Agers' Day committee. Golden Agers were described as persons who had passed their 60th birthday.

Dr. Furch left a note addressed to Orville Reville, assistant editor of the Fort Lauderdale Daily News, asking him to forward a watch to Bernard Baruch as "the golden ager of distinction."

Police shot Herbert Johnson, 37-year-old Negro, after storming an unoccupied two-story farm house in which he had taken refuge following his flight from the nearby Central State hospital.

Johnson had one shell left in his gun and was still on his feet when ten officers ended the siege by moving in under clouds of tear gas and a withering barrage of covering fire from an armored car circling the building.

The officers, on the tower floor, spotted Johnson upstairs through holes made by fire from their riot guns. Two of them fired, Johnson fell.

Until that time, police had been hard-pressed to stay out of range as Johnson fired at them with a gun he is believed to have found in the residence just after he fled the hospital.

Investigator Wallace M. Simpson, 39, was killed by a shot from the window as he tried to rush the house. Two other officers were wounded slightly as they tried to recover Simpson's body.

Also wounded during the siege, in which Johnson held off some 35 officers, were two patients and two hospital employees.

Johnson, a patient at the hospital about six years but not regarded as a mental case with criminal tendencies, had been under treatment in a ward. He recently was allowed to dig potatoes on the prison farm.

Angered yesterday morning when he was given definite working instructions, Johnson fled. Then he held up in the house.

## To David, Christmas Is A Time For Lots Of 'Waffing'

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — David pronounces all of his L's as if they were W's.

David is four years old, the son of a Marine colonel, and lives next door to my sister here in Alexandria.

I have known David only four or five days, but he has made me wish that men never had to grow up. He is completely manly now, and yet his eyes look upon today as the very levellest of all days, and tomorrow he dreams of a day that's even lovelier. He's tough without an atom bomb. He declares war against his six-year-old sister every morning, and fights her and her friends viciously until they subdue him.

Late the other afternoon, we were sitting in my sister's living room, when there was a knock on the door. David said, "Mrs. Wovett, may I come in?"

He sat down on a hassock in front of the sofa, showing two cowboy belts, two pistols, two hats, a cowboy shirt, and a little football. My sister asked him why he had two belts. He said, "Mrs. Wovett, Daddy gave me one and Mama gave me one."

My sister said, "But you don't need two belts, do you David?" "That's what Daddy told Mommy," David said, blue eyes looking out from under his tawny head. The grownups could almost hear the colonel tell his wife, "What does the kid need two belts for? I didn't have any when I was his age."

My mother asked David if he knew that Christmas was not far away.

The look on his face and his answer is what made me wish that men never had to grow up. He made me wish that all the world could see the joys and the beauties of living through little David's eyes. It astounds me that people can be vicious when not so many years ago they were little children. It all comes from a desire for power, and not one of the men who seeks it seems to remember that no matter how much of it he ever gets, time will put him in his grave and take it from his hands.

Here is David's reply to my mother about Christmas, as well as I remember it.

"Santy Claus will be coming. I will be waffing. Dotty, my sister, will be waffing. Penny the dog will be waffing. Mommy and

Daddy will be waffing. Mrs. Wovett, you and General Wovett will be waffing. The soldiers that Daddy tells me are havin' a hard time will be waffing. The birds will be waffing. And Santy Claus will be waffing and waffing, because everybody in the world will be waffing."

I looked at David as he said this, and as a very small part of this world, I felt ashamed. It won't be long before that glow in his eye is gone and he'll be taught to hide under his school desk in case of atom bombs.

There are millions and millions of children like him in this world, including Russians, who have so little time to carry a lilt in their hearts. For those who seek war, in my mind, their greatest offense is the robbery from children of childhood.

When David left, he said, "Mrs. Wovett, the last time I was here you gave me a cookie, but my mother told me not to ask for a cookie any more." He got two, and he swallowed them before he reached his house next door.

## Childless Husbands Draft To Begin In November

AUSTIN — (AP) — Draft physical examinations for married men without children will begin in Texas next month.

The State Selective Service headquarters announced Tuesday 3,600 who will be ordered for physicals in November and December will be principally in that category.

The orders are designed to get married men without children examined as early as possible in compliance with official instructions from national selective service headquarters, state director Paul L. Wakefield said.

First examination is scheduled for Nov. 5, with other examinations following on Nov. 13, 26, 27 and Dec. 6, 7, 13 and 14.

Wakefield said some of the examinations will be conducted in December and still more in January. Many of them ahead of single men who have been examined and acceptable for many months. The law provides that men shall be inducted in order of age — the oldest first.

### JACOBY ON CANASTA

#### Melding Rule Very Important

By OSWALD JACOBY  
Written for NEA Service  
Many canasta players still have trouble with the rule about making two melds in the same rank. Perhaps the difficulty is that the rule goes one way in Canasta and the opposite way in Samba (three-pack Canasta).

Let's take Canasta first. You're not allowed to "make two melds in the same rank. For example, you may not put down a meld of three kings and then another meld of three kings. If you do so by mistake, the two melds must be joined together.

Sometimes there's a real ruckus over this type of meld. A player needs 120 points for his first meld and tries to put down K-K-2-2 and another meld of K-K-2-2. He is told that this meld is impossible and that he must join the two melds.

When he discovers that the melds cannot be joined because they would then form a canasta with more than three wild cards, it seems that there's nothing left for the poor player to do but to climb up to the roof and jump off.

Actually there's a less drastic solution. The player may put down some natural pair to accompany one of the deuces. If he cannot do that, he must pick up the whole meld as an inoffensive meld. In that case, his side needs 120 points for its initial meld.

### Local Assignment All That Stands Between TV, Public

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The only thing now holding up additional television service for the country is the matter of making final local assignments of the available channels.

The distribution, to cities and towns throughout the United States, involves a stupendous engineering job if that bug-a-boo of all broadcasting — interference — is to be avoided.

The work should be completed by February. Then the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will be able to lift the three-year-old freeze on new station grants.

The commission has already decided that about 82 channels will be required to provide "a truly national television system."

To get that number it has gone "away upstairs" in the radio spectrum, into the ultra high frequencies, to create 70 new UHF channels to be added to the 12 very high frequency (VHF) channels now in use.

It proposes to hold out 18 of the new channels as "spares" (for later allocation), and assign the others finally to large and small communities across the nation.

Preparatory to the final allocations, FCC last March made public a tentative table of proposed local assignments. It made provision for nearly 2,000 stations in about 1,200 communities as compared to the 400 stations in 140 locations that could be accommodated in the current 12-channel setup.

Of the projected 2,000 outlets, FCC proposed to reserve about ten percent exclusively for schools desiring to sponsor non-commercial, educational operations.

The FCC plan was to hold public hearings on the tentative table, but the number of towns, schools and industry groups which asked time for witnesses indicated that if oral testimony were taken, the hearing might last forever.

Hence it was decided to receive comment in writing only. Several hundred thousand words have thus far been filed and those interested have until late November to complete their written say-so.

### Report Shows More Money In Banks Than Last Year

Texas banks have more on deposit now than they had at this time last year.

Dallas, Corpus Christi and Wichita Falls reported record highs for deposits as of Oct. 10. Results of national and state bank calls include:

Dallas — a new high, with deposits of 22 city banks totaling \$1,326,787,780.89, as compared with \$1,144,109,980.43 last year.

Houston — total deposits \$1,292,748,192.77 compared to \$1,187,279,276.16. Deposits were up some 42 million dollars from June 30, 1951.

Fort Worth — deposits in 16 banks totaled \$474,663,878.10, up 56 million dollars from last year.

Abilene — three banks with a total of \$57,830,406, an increase of 5.2 million over the third quarter report of 1950 and an increase of 2.1 million over June 30 of this year.

Rural bankers of the Abilene area reported that part of the increased deposits were caused by the abnormal sale of livestock because of the drought.

Wichita Falls — six banks of Wichita county showed a new record high of \$122,615,314.45 in deposits. The three Wichita Falls banks showed total deposits of \$113,604,394.36, a gain of two million dollars.

Sherman — bank deposits total \$24,060,435 a rise of \$2,468,752.

Orange — two Orange banks reported total deposits of \$26,146,453, a gain of \$656,346 in three months and of \$5,604,006 since Jan. 1. The Orange deposits now are only two million dollars less than the wartime peak when Orange's population was more than double what it is now.

### Latin America Tops List With TV Stations

NEW YORK — (AP) — Latin America currently is building more television stations than any other part of the world.

Nine stations are on the air, with regular program service, and 20 more either are in advanced planning stages or actually under construction. Latin American nations are going for TV in a big way.

Since spring, Argentina has opened its first station and Mexico has added two. Cuba and Brazil soon will have new stations, the third for each. The Dominican Republic and Colombia have joined the parade by ordering equipment.

Meanwhile the government's three-year freeze on new stations has prevented further expansion of stations in the United States. Overseas, a third station in England is the only new European station in the past several months for regular program service on a basis comparable to that offered in this country.

However, the United States, with 108 stations and 14,000,000 sets, continues to hold a tremendous lead over the rest of the world and when the freeze is lifted probably early next year, there will be a flood of new stations over the next several years.

One of the most unusual of the new Latin American stations is KELD-TV at Matamoros, Mexico, opposite Brownsville, Tex., telecasting to residents of the Rio Grande valley on both sides of the border in both English and Spanish. It is affiliated with both the Columbia Broadcasting system and the American Broadcasting Co., and receives film recording of CBS and ABC network program.

Like all the other Latin American stations to date, it is privately owned and operated on a commercial basis as in the United States.

Mexico's other new station is at Mexico City, the third for that nation's capital where a fourth is under construction. Several thousand sets are in use. A dozen or more other Mexican stations are contemplated.

Argentina's first station at Buenos Aires was opened last October 17 with great fanfare and day-long ceremonies in which President Juan Peron participated. The station is described as having the greatest effective radiated power of any in the western hemisphere.

Brazil has one station at Rio De Janeiro and one at Sao Paulo, with a second Sao Paulo station under construction and due on the air before the year is out. A second station is planned at Rio and equipment has been ordered for a station at Belo Horizonte.

### Family Know-How On Fire Fighting

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Women ought to have fire-fighting know-how and each family should have home fire drills. So states a new booklet, "Fire Fighting for Householders," issued by the Federal Civil Defense Administration.

The booklet points out that at least one member of each family should know how to use basic fire-fighting equipment. Such training can be obtained through the local civil defense organization.

### Cupid Will Get A Bang Out Of Government's Latest Venture

NEW YORK — (AP) — Cupid must be laughing fit to split his sides at the United States government.

It has set out to solve the timeless mysteries of love and marriage — on an appropriation of \$12,000.

The first season of the 82nd Congress appropriated some \$95,000,000,000.

But when Washington had a chance to make a real investment of benefit to all — how people fall in love, and what happens then? — it pulled the purse strings tight.

It allotted a miserly \$12,000 to Prof. Robert F. Winch, a Northwestern university sociologist, to finance an 18-month study into what love is, and to tabulate "the gratifications and frustrations" of marriage today.

Why Tommy Manville and many another millionaire have probably spent more than \$12,000 on a love problem in a single weekend — and never come up with a satisfactory answer. Hollywood has budgeted movie kisses that cost more than \$12,000 to screen.

Prof. Winch's study is being conducted under the auspices of the National Institute of Mental Health. But I will wager that for \$12,000 he will be unable to give a complete picture of the hearts fractured by puppy love in any one kindergarten classroom, let alone explore the intricacies of adult married love.

This is no criticism of the professor, who is 40, has a wife, and has probably spent more than \$12,000 charting his own marital voyage. But such a small sum! — it is like giving a child a penny and telling him to erect another Empire State building.

I have in mind making love the most romantic circus in history, featuring daily television programs on which our good gray statesmen could query selected witnesses on their love dreams and marital adventures.

The taxpayers would be glad to vote fifty billion bucks for a project that would get them real life entertainment and education like that.

Personally, I doubt if Congress will find out anything more than any grandmother already knows — that love is a feeling that draws two people together, and marriage provides them a way, if they work at it, to remain together in general loving-kindness and keep the human race running. But if every American still learned that fact, it would still be the best-spent \$50,000,000,000 any legislature ever voted.

And if, in addition, Congress by some miracle should come up with a way of making the path of true love always run smooth — well, now, wouldn't that be the greatest highway paving project ever?
