Britain To Pay Debt Owed U. S., Canada

LONDON — (AP) — Britain has decided to pay in full installments of capital and interest due on the United States and Canadian loans at the end of the year, an informed government source reported today.

This country could have avoided paying the interest on both loans by invoking waiver clauses which were written into the 1946 agreements. In view of its economic plight, there had been speculation that it would do so.

Britain is due to pay the United States \$51.5 million in capital and \$87 million in interest on Dec. 31.

It is supposed to pay the Ottawa government \$14 million in Canadian dollars in capital and \$23.7 million in interest on the same day.

OWES F. S. Britain owes the United States a total of \$4,350 million, \$3,750 million in new money made available under the September 1946 loan pact, and \$600 million in lend-lease pipeline aid.

Her debt to Canada totals \$1,180 million in Canadian dollars. Political factors clearly influenced Prime Minister Winston Churchill's newly elected Conservative government in reaching the decision to pay the whole amount due to the American government.

Churchill and his colleagues felt a decision to waive the interest payment would damage the nation's prestige in the United States and would weaken their overall bargaining power when they meet President Truman in Washington next month for a review of Anglo-American relations.

Coach Released By Lefors School Board

LEFORS — (Special) — Lefors school board last night released Head Coach Frank Sonntag.

The action was taken as a result of Lefors' suspension from Class A football competition for the 1952-53 school year.

"We just want to show our neighbors we are trying to get straightened out," Lefors School Board President Jeffrey said today.

"We don't want to hurt anybody," he said. "We have been hurt too much ourselves."

According to Jeffrey, no further action has been taken yet. He said the board had no other coach in mind yet and that the system would continue to operate as well as it could until the board could meet to decide upon a successor to Sonntag who began his tenure at the beginning of this year's football season.

Lefors was suspended from Class 1-A football at a meeting of the district executive committee Dec. 3. One dissenting vote was cast against Lefors by Canadian officials because of a Lefors protest filed after a Lefors-Canadian football game.

Lefors, because of its size, must be voted into the district by unanimous consent of the other schools in the league.

A clean bill was given Canadian at a special district meeting devoted to the protest which concerned the eligibility of two Wildcat players.

At the Dec. 3 meeting, Canadian refused to approve Lefors' entrance into competition.

Lefors school board met with Canadian officials late last week to try to seek some means of re-entering the district. As yet, Canadian has made no announcement as to their intentions.

Deadline for final action on Lefors status next year is Dec. 22 at which time Executive Committee Chairman Logan Cummings of McLean must file the names of district participants with the interscholastic league.

Sonntag was named head coach at the Buccaneers school this season, following successful tenures at Seagraves and South Taylor (Tuscola.) His Pirate team this year started out successfully but was beaten by Clarendon, in a game later reversed by an ineligible ruling, and by the district champion Wildcats.

Allies, Reds Bickering About Five-Point Plan

MUNSAN, Korea — (AP) — Truce negotiators advanced complete new plans today for exchanging prisoners of war and supervising a Korean peace. But both proposals appeared headed for rejection.

The Allies offered a "take it or leave it" compromise for truce supervision. The Reds came up with a five-point plan on prisoner exchange.

Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, spokesman for the UN command, said the Communists proposed: 1. All prisoners of war be released by both sides.

2. Prisoners be released in groups as quickly as possible after the armistice, the sick and wounded first.

3. The exchange to be made at Panmunjom, site of current truce talks.

4. A joint Allied-Red team handle the exchange under the military armistice commission.

5. The Reds would release prisoner of war information during the preceding four points were accepted.

A press dispatch from Panmunjom said the Reds submitted their offer after a strong statement from Rear Adm. R. E. Libby, who has been demanding immediate information from the Reds on the number of prisoners they hold, and where.

REDS REFUSE Libby said the Communists again refused these requests. They also refused to invite the International Red Cross to visit their camps.

"They wanted us to make a blanket agreement first to release all prisoners," Libby said. The United Nations command wants to exchange prisoners on a man for man basis.

The Reds submitted their plan Wednesday afternoon before negotiators adjourned until 11 a.m. Thursday (8 p.m. Wednesday CST).

Earlier, in another subcommittee meeting the UN offered its package deal for supervising the truce. In the background UN artillery thundered down on neighboring hills.

Vishinsky Says Big Four Meetings Give New Hope

PARIS — (AP) — Russia's Andrei Y. Vishinsky said today that agreements reached during the big four arms talks held in Moscow between East and West. But the Western powers, in a joint statement, said they were "rather disappointed" in the tone of his speech.

Vishinsky told the United Nations political committee that since the Big Four had agreed to set up a new disarmament commission "it enhances our hopes" that the rival camps could agree on other issues also.

This was generally interpreted to mean that Russia would take part in the commission's work even if it is set up under Western-sponsored directives which the Soviet union opposes.

French delegate Jules Moch said, however, that Vishinsky showed no tendency to budge from positions which the West has declared make impossible agreement on atomic control and disarmament.

PROHIBITION OF A BOMB These positions, as restated by Vishinsky today, call for an immediate and unconditional prohibition of the atomic weapon and the reduction of airm forces by one third during a year.

The three Western powers want a step-by-step reduction of armed forces, under string international supervision, which would include prohibition of atomic weapons after a foolproof system of safeguards had been worked out.

Oil Producing States Meet To Discuss Conservation

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — (AP) — Governors of two oil producing states today discussed possible federal encroachment in the field of regulating conservation of the nation's petroleum resources.

Gov. Edward F. Arn of Kansas and Gov. Sid McMath of Arkansas said effective regulatory laws by the states are the surest way to prevent what they described as interference by the federal government.

McMath's remarks came in an address welcoming more than 200 representatives from 23 states attending the 1951 meeting of the interstate oil compact commission.

The two-day convention opened yesterday with various panel discussions on technical problems facing the petroleum industry and states in which oil is a major product.

McMath, who traced the history of Arkansas' statutes governing the conservation of oil and natural gas, said: "It is the duty of the states to keep their laws, rules and regulations modern and up-to-date so as to take advantage of the newest technological develop-

That honor went to Kazmaier, with 3,827 yards.

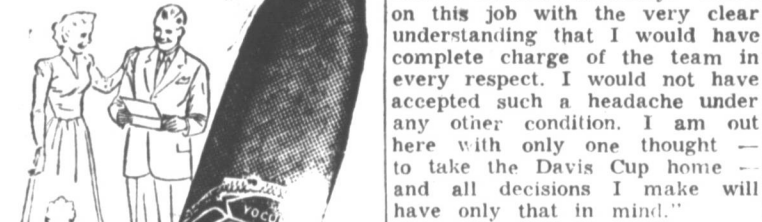

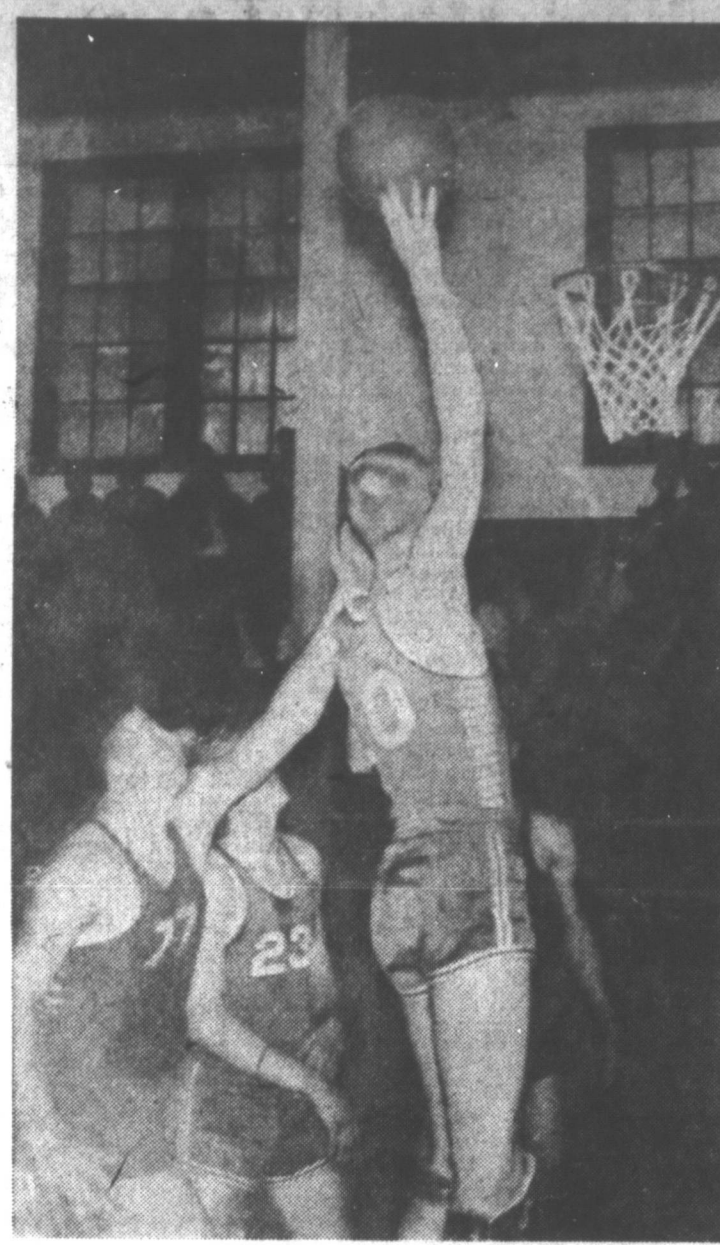

DiMaggio Considers Several Offers Made By His Yankees

NEW YORK — (AP) — Joe DiMaggio, definitely through as a player at the age of 37, is expected to remain in the New York Yankee organization in the role of a television broadcaster.

The great outfielder, who yesterday announced he would never wear a baseball uniform again — as a player, manager or coach — is considering an offer as TV commentator of Yankee home baseball games.

While both parties refused to commit themselves, Yankee President Dan Topping admitted DiMaggio had been offered the TV job "among other propositions."

DiMaggio said all his offers dealt with radio and television and "it is possible" he will accept the Yankee bid. The TV post reportedly would pay him \$50,000 a season for three years.

DiMaggio planned to leave for his home in San Francisco on Friday to think over all the propositions. He said he expected to reach a decision "some time next week."

The Yankee Clipper appeared in good spirits as he outlined his reasons for quitting before grinding cameras, glaring lights and the largest sports press gathering since the days of Babe Ruth.

"Old injuries that lingered on and some new ones hastened my decision to retire," DiMaggio explained. "Another reason was night baseball. Joe estimated the arc light play cut about two years off his career."

"It gets tough to recuperate the next day from a night under the bulbs when you get older," he said. "Night ball should be played every night or not at all. You don't get to bed until two in the morning, or so, and wake up at 10. I found that wasn't enough rest to get the aches and pains out of my system. I'd go to the park for an afternoon game the next day, and sometimes I wouldn't wake up until the fifth or sixth inning."

"I feel I have reached the stage where I can no longer produce for my ball club, my manager, my teammates and my fans," he added. "I had a poor year last season. But even if I had hit .350, this would have been the last year for me."

"I found playing last year a torture. I was full of aches and pains. I found it difficult to get out of bed each morning — and sometimes I wouldn't wake up until I'd miss the game, but I don't feel too badly about it because those days and nights of history."

DiMaggio closes out a memorable baseball career. Holder of numerous batting and fielding records, this great all-around performer undoubtedly will rank beside such superb stars as Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and all the other baseball immortals. He put in 13 active seasons in the majors, all with the Yankees, built up a lifetime .325 batting mark despite numerous injuries.

His 56-consecutive game batting record may never be equaled. He played with 10 pennant winners and was a member of nine world championship clubs, both records. This is the same person who was rejected by 15 clubs because of a knee injury suffered while playing with San Francisco in the Pacific Coast League. As a result, the Yankees acquired him in 1936 for only \$25,000 in cash and five players.

It turned out to be one of the best bargains in baseball history.

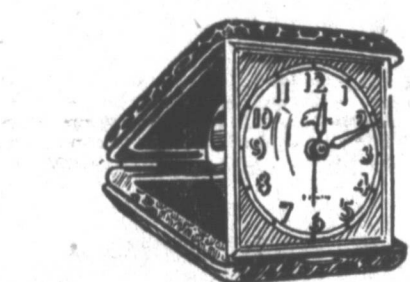

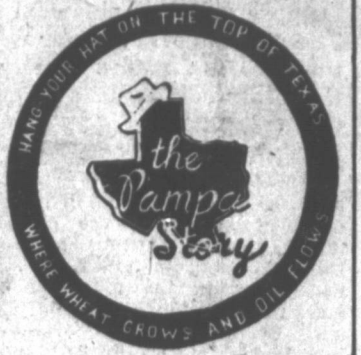

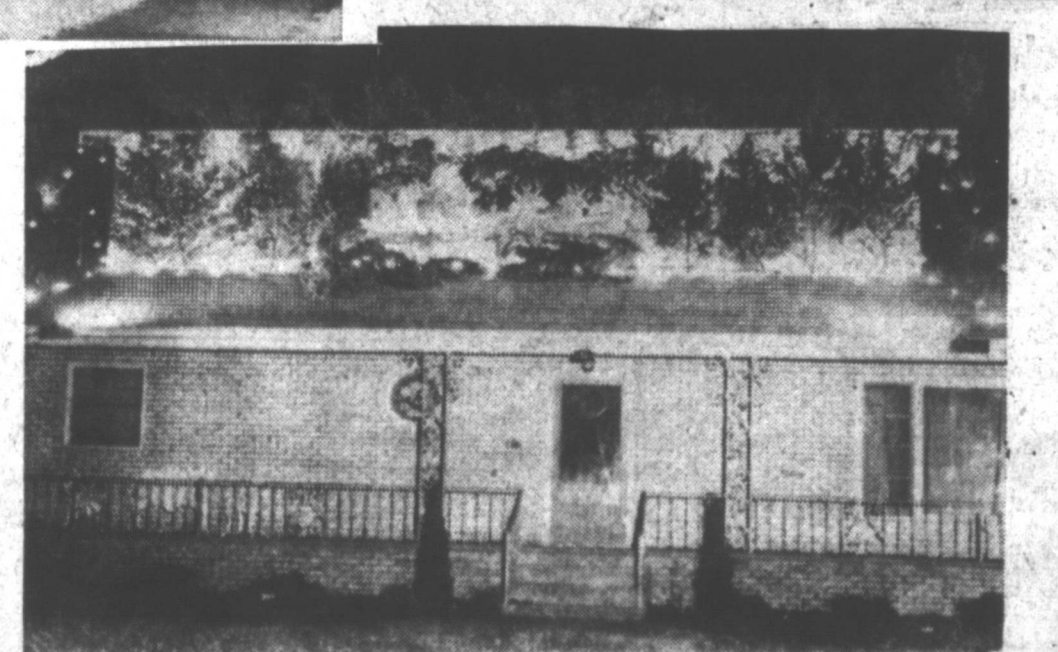

Its origin is a mystery, but its recent revival is the most scientific since the 12th and 13th centuries, she explained. "Once, before laymen as well as clergy could read and interpret the contents of the Bible," Mrs. Davies said, "stained-glass windows were the religious books of the people. The stories depicted in the designs of colored glass were as meaningful as sermons. Some men spent years or even a lifetime, fitting thousands of pieces of colored glass into a historical, vivid design held together by grooved strips of lead called cames. "The making of stained-glass windows advanced from a craft to a fine art in the second half of the 12th century with the development of the Gothic cathedral and its great arched windows. In no other era were the colors richer or the designs more harmonious than then. The mosaic windows are said to have breathed life into the cold, stone cathedrals. Thousands of pieces of blue, red and green glass contrasted with the dark lines of the lead frames. "The small 'Prophet' windows in the Augsburg cathedral in Germany made in the 11th Century are said to be the oldest in existence, and two of the most outstanding of American executions of stained glass are the chancel window in the cadet chapel at West Point, and the windows in the Washington Memorial chapel at Valley Forge. The chancel window was done in 1910 by William and Anne Lee Willet of Philadelphia, who were awarded the commission after a competition among both United States and European studios. "The windows at Valley Forge, begun about 1914, are the work of Nicola D'Ascenzo, also of Philadelphia, who is 76 years old and the 'dear old' of the stained-glass window making craft. "Lawrence Saint, famous for his windows in the Washington Cathedral, undertook the job of learning the lost glass formulas of the Middle Ages. His first experiments were discouraging, but after much study and chemical analysis, he matched the glass found in the famous European cathedrals. Mrs. Davies pointed out that the first few steps in making actual stained-glass windows, and decorative Christmas windows are much the same. The first step is the painting of a small-scale design, then a full-size drawing, (a cartoon) by cutting jigsaw-puzzle-like pieces from the cartoon. The jigsaw puzzle pieces are placed on glass for actual stained-glass windows, and on colored cellophane for window decoration. Designs or pictures are outlined in show card ink or black construction paper, and it means weeks and weeks of hard work. But the effect is equally as lovely inside or outside, Mrs. Davies said, and the paper stained glass windows at Christmas time rival the impressive stained-glass windows of the 12th Century.

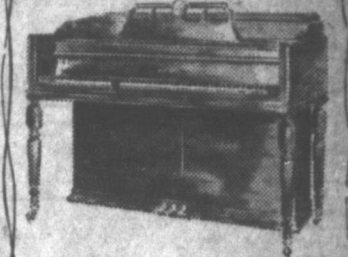

Santa Has New Games For All

Everybody from Grandpa to the baby can get in on the fun of this year's crop of Christmas games.

With family fun in mind, Santa has packed his sleigh with games for all ages, including the preschoolers who have not yet learned to read.

Inflation gets attention from the gamblers this year, with a brand new game called Boom or Bust, which dramatizes the dizzy whirl of property values during inflation and depression as contrasted with normal times. The new trading game will find just as enthusiastic addicts among parents as among children, fitting the skills of both age groups. The board used in the game shows typical urban properties such as a beauty parlor, grocery, movie house, barber shop and such. Players buy and sell at prices which zoom or fall depending on the business cycle.

Globe trotting by airplane, boat, train and bus are illustrated with careful attention to relative costs and time of travel by different modes of transportation in a new game with a polarized map. Schoolroom routine, stock trading, oil prospecting, crime detection and many other "real life" situations inspire varied forms of new parlor competition.

The trend toward games that give the youngsters who can't read or write a chance to compete happily with older brothers and sisters and their parents are featured. Scatterbug, for example, is a new variety of spinning game that's designed to appeal to all ages. Each player spins a top by holding it directly over a hole in the center of the board. The top dances in and out of various openings and scatters the playing disks all over the field. When the top is spinning, the score is made by adding together the numbers upon which the disks have landed; younger children quickly learn to recognize numbers in the process of playing.

The Wild West craze is reflected in a variety of board and target games utilizing cowboy and Indian heroes.

A new twist to horse racing games is offered by Phony Ponies which offers race horses powered by Mexican jumping beans strapped under each saddle.

Rook, the classic card game, is featured in a de luxe party kit with four different colored packs and a gala set of scoring aids. Another old timer in new dress is Jackstraws, now with an electric angle. Players grope for straws through a perforated metal box top. Jack straws must be obtained without touching the metal; when fingers tumble, the electricity makes a loud buzz. New versions of chess and check straws among the season's new offerings. Mexico Predicts Former U. S. Cattle Flow Can't Be Rebuilt

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Mexico's largest commercial bank has predicted that the former flow of half a million cattle a year to the U.S. will never be fully restored.

The Banco Nacional, in its monthly trade report, said reopening of the U.S. border to Mexican cattle will not re-establish the movement of cattle which previously existed. It forecast "the government will probably take steps to control exports of live cattle or will substantially increase export duties and permit only the sale of surplus stock."

Three others were released on bail of \$5,000 each after the U.S. court of appeals in San Francisco ordered reduction of bail.

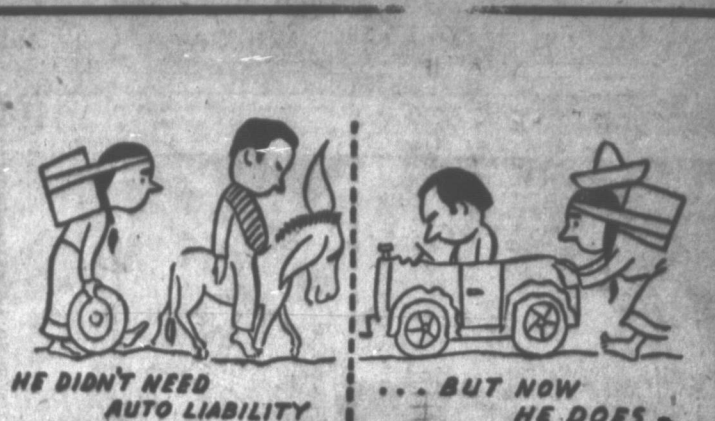

Reporter Angley, Like Other Great, Comes Home To Rest

By FRANK H. KING

PALESTINE — The great reporters like the captains and the kings come home to rest. And so they buried Edward Angley here in the East Texas hills of his boyhood where the dogwood and the redbud soon will be blooming again.

Angley died in New York Friday from a lung ailment.

At 82 he had traveled the world for many years and achieved with distinction his boyhood ambition of becoming a top-flight writing man, reporter, foreign correspondent and author.

Even among the brilliant company of Texas newspapermen of the 1920s and '30s, Ed Angley made his mark early. With the Galveston News, the Associated Press at home and abroad, as well as within a week had scooped the special correspondent around the world for New York and Chicago newspapers, he was among the best.

His final task was a prodigious reportorial job finished only weeks ago. This was the book, "Fifty Billion Dollars," collaborating with Jesse Jones of Houston in three years of interviewing, research and writing the story of Jones' direction of the RFC.

For Angley it was his great assignment. He talked about it with gusto and good humor, as always. All night he sat long ago at Houston, yarning with this writer about London of the 1920s, when England was gay and Edward the Prince was young. Of life in Moscow when Lenin lived. Of Paris and Tokyo, the royal train through Canada; of Australia — where he found his true love — and of the turmoil of Asia.

"Jee" covered them all. All the great stories of his generation from Wimbledon to the Shanghai bund. From the Kremlin to sidown strikes in Detroit.

He covered World War II from its start in 1939 until the shooting ended in 1945.

In an elevator in Washington a startled Jesse Jones recognized him and exclaimed, "Ed, I thought you were killed in the war."

"No sir, Mr. Jones, I'm still alive and writing."

"Come see me," invited the RFC head.

The result was an assignment over the United States, checking, digging, interviewing scores of men, the great and the small who figured in RFC financing. The long list is in the book, a tribute to exacting research and authentication.

"And when I was through interviewing them, they died... Henry Ford, A. P. Giannini, and others," said Angley wryly. Jesse Jones matched the reporter in careful detail.

"When Mr. Jones' time comes," said Angley, "he will rise up and say to the man carving words on the tombstone, 'wait a minute, we must get it exactly right.'"

With his work as collaborator completed, Angley was to live only long enough to see his biggest news story become a best seller and historian's source book for the fabulous era it covered.

Be As Bright And Gay As You Like With Yule Decor

Brighten Your Outdoor Scene

Now that Santa Claus has come to town, it's time to start designing and planning the colorful outdoor lighting for the home.

The sooner householders start work on their own interpretations of this gay Yuletide tradition, the better can be the effect that will be achieved.

An exceptional demand for the comparatively inexpensive electrical wiring gadgets and colored lights that will be needed, is expected this year.

Much of the equipment required is carried over from year to year, which means that the tradition is growing in pace.

While lighting of public buildings and downtown areas would appear to predominate in some cities, home lighting is most popular of all as far as the national picture is concerned.

It is not the expense but the inventiveness and artistry of the family that produces the most effective outdoor Christmas time decorations. The physical line of the house and the trees and shrubbery in the front yard, give householders a starting point for their lighting.

Doorways and windows offer excellent patterns to be outlined in colored lights.

A good trick is to entwine holly or pine branches with strings of light and then place them along the eaves. Lights in flower boxes twinkle merrily. Flood lights, sometimes with color screen, sometimes without, will lend lustre to the plan.

Experts suggest some precautions for safety's sake in a fall weather. Never use strings of lights with worn insulation. Be sure your lights are designed for outdoor use. Always arrange them so that you can plug the string into a socket.

When putting up or taking down strings, remove lights first, to avoid breakage and waste.

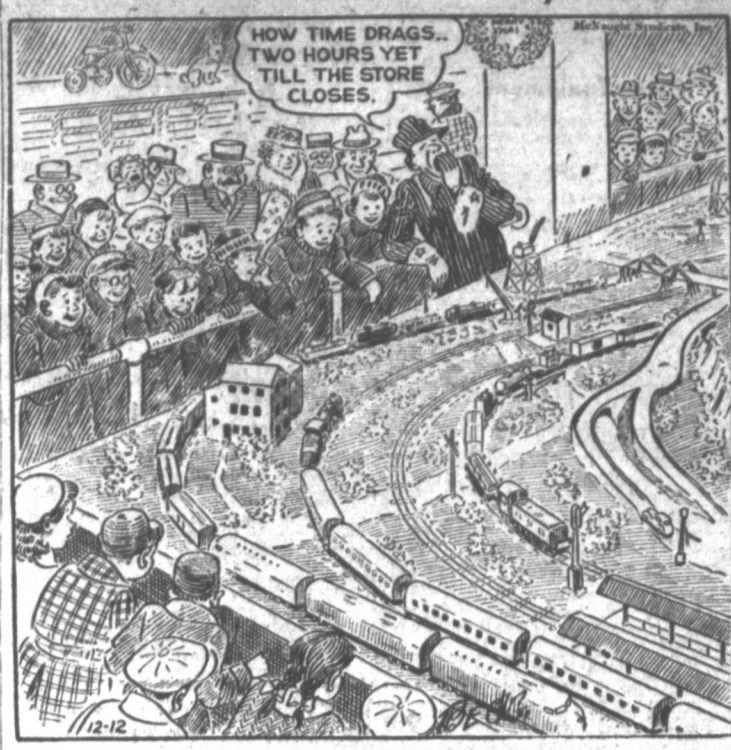
Gifts To Him Should Show Trend To Leisurely Living

Widow Indicted In Connection With Doswell's Death

DALLAS (AP)—Mrs. Rebecca Doswell, 52, wife of the late wealthy oilman Thomas W. Doswell, 56, was indicted for murder Monday in connection with his death. The grand jury returned a report after having the case under study since shortly after Doswell was fatally shot Aug. 29 as he and his wife sat in their car at the Melrose hotel here. Mrs. Doswell has been at liberty under bond of \$25,000. She was charged with murder a few days after the shooting

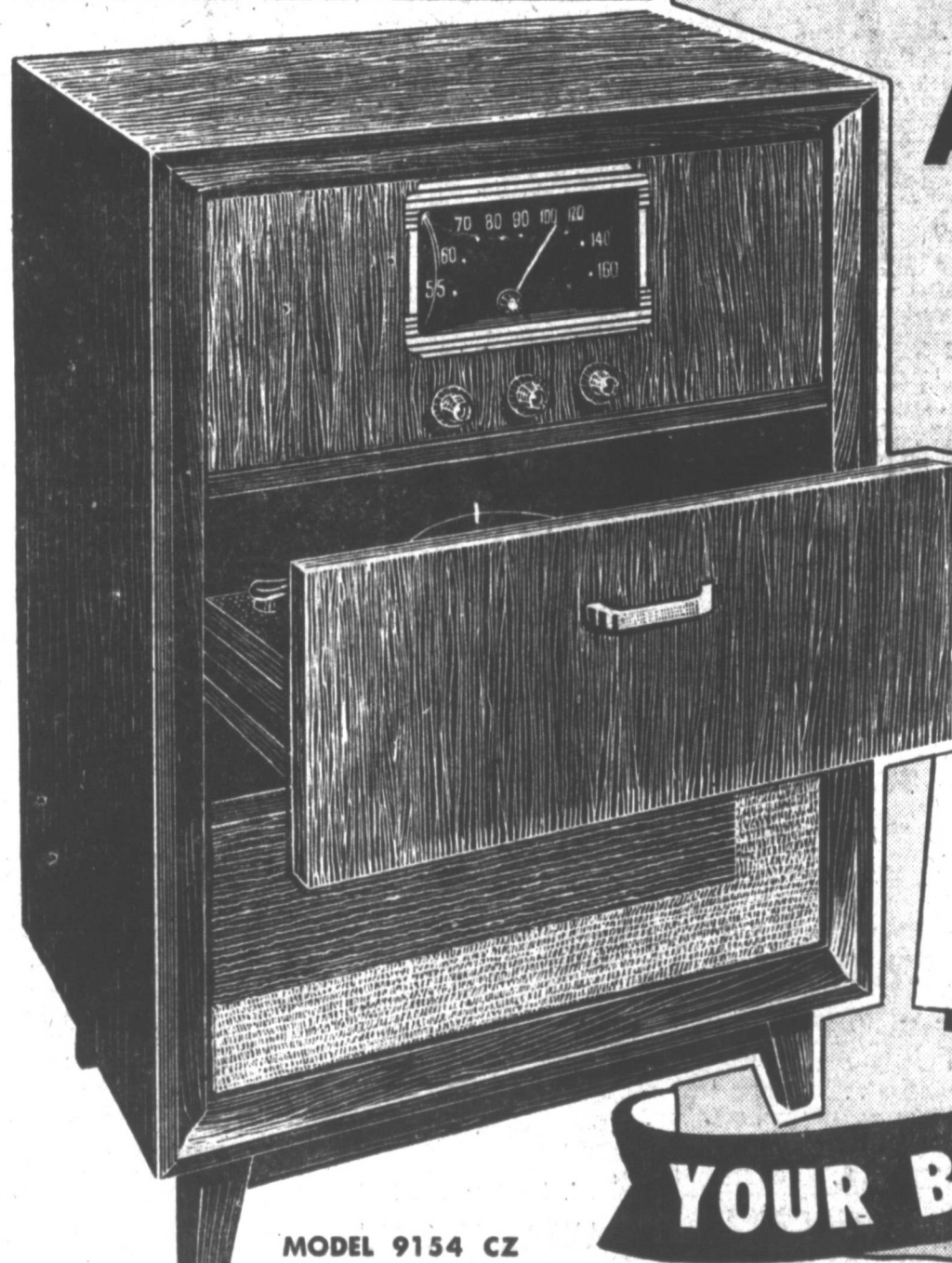
