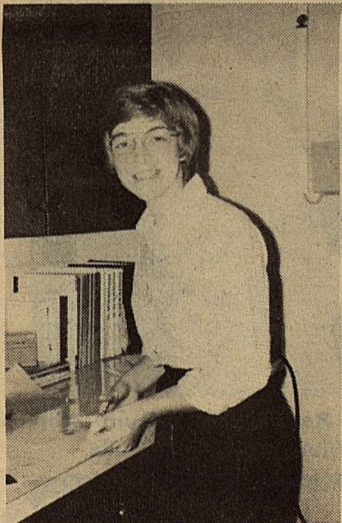
During the evening, special awards were presented to members of the community who have been helpful to the two organizations, their members, and sponsors. Mr. Ralph Miller was

Proponents of the President's economic plan visualize that reduction in taxes will result in there being available to the "private sector" more capital for investment in new businesses and expansion of old ones, more money to pay wages and to modernize equipment, and more funds to lend to entrepreneurs and home-buyers. Eventually the government will receive more revenue from more taxpayers at the cheaper rate than from fewer taxpayers at the present high rate. Individuals will work harder and produce more if they can see themselves keeping what they earn instead of just moving up to a painfully higher tax bracket. If taxes are reduced evenly by ten percent the rich will benefit more than the poor, ten percent of a big income tax obviously being more than

ten percent of a little income tax. Some consider this to be unfair.

One Democrat congressman expressed his doubt about the President's program by asking, "What makes you think the rich won't just spend their money on Cadillacs and fur coats?", inferring that he considered paying high taxes to be much more worthy and less sinful. What if the rich do blow their earnings on cars, coats, jet airplanes, yachts, bungalows on the beach and condominiums at fashionable ski resorts? Don't all these good things have to be made or manufactured by some one, sold by some salesman, finished and maintained by some craftsman, carpenter, plumber, electrician, crew member or employee? How many people benefit when some successful individual or corporation buys a million-dollar jet? There must be hundreds: employees of the airframe manufacturer, subcontractors who furnish tires, engines and radios, pilots and mechanics, airport operators who sell fuel, rent hangar space and furnish services, and in turn those who sell these people their clothes and groceries, and on down the chain. Even if rich folks don't spend their money but just squirrel it away in a bank, doesn't the bank then lend the money to someone to start a business or build a house or invest in some enterprise?

There is a flaw in this system of wealth distribution. All along the line everyone demands something in return for his money, in work performed or goods produced or loans repaid with interest. The rich are willing to pay the piper, but he must play. There is no allowance for the non-producer except as the recipient of charity.

Under socialism there are no rich and poor. Everyone is reduced or raised to the same economic level, both the productive and the

unproductive, and ideally this brings happiness to everyone because there is no reason for anyone to be envious or covetous or brutally ambitious. There are no great penalties or rewards, joys or sorrows, failures or triumphs. What evidence is there, though that countries or societies are better off when everyone is poor? Who hires the college graduate, promotes the new idea or buys the magnificent work of art? If there are no big corporations and no rich, who pays the wage-earner and the artist? In Russia it's the government.

The rich can be beautiful, intelligent, generous, religious, charitable and industrious. Some endow hospitals, churches, museums, universities and ball teams. They also can be arrogant, ruthless, selfish, immoral and avaricious, like on television. They may or may not make it to Heaven but they surely are useful, and interesting, here on Earth.

## Your County Agent Says by Alan Day

### WHEN TO TOPDRESS WHEAT

Recent moderate rain plus favorable temperatures have caused wheat to commence spring growth, and now is the time to watch carefully for signs of insects, disease and nutrient deficiency. Dry fall and winter conditions restricted growth so not much nitrogen had been used. The number of wheat fields deficient in nitrogen may be less than in wetter seasons when more forage is produced and removed from the field by grazing.

On the other hand, the increased cost of nitrogen and irrigation plus the poor wheat prospects due to dry conditions last fall have resulted in many fields not receiving adequate fertilizer prior to planting.

Wheat foliage may appear light green when growth resumes after irrigation or rain if the weather is cool and cloudy. If this yellow green color persists after several days of sunshine, you can be reasonably certain the condition is due to inadequate nitrogen.

The presence of vigorous darker green wheat growth around cattle droppings and urine spots is added

evidence that nitrogen is deficient. If the field has not been grazed, it is necessary to verify that the abnormal wheat foliage color is not due to disease.

Dryland wheat fields that are deficient in nitrogen should be fertilized with 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen. Irrigated wheat fields that are showing nitrogen deficiency symptoms should receive at least an initial application of 60 pounds of actual nitrogen.

Topdressing or adding supplemental nitrogen to wheat should be done as early as the need is evident. In the Southern High Plains and Rolling Plains the topdress application should be completed by the end of March or earlier.

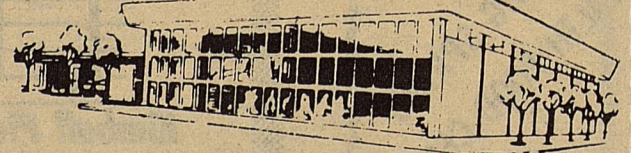

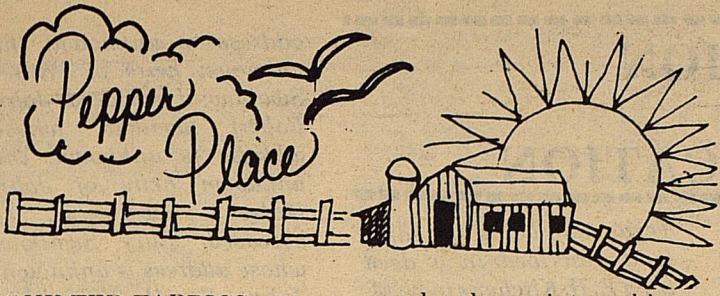

**QUILTED FABRICS**  
For spring, summer!

An old winter friend will be a new spring, summer fashion item. Quilted fabrics are an important fashion item for the 80's, year round.

They offer a texture dimension to fashions, and they add interest and variety to the wardrobe.

Quilted fabrics do require special cutting and sewing techniques if you're trying for a professional look in homesewn fashions.

Below are suggestions: Select a pattern with a straight silhouette. Avoid gathers and curved stitching lines, since the batting in quilted fabrics can make them bulky and prevent drape and ease.

When cutting, use the "with nap" layout. Horizontal and vertical quilt stitching will need to be matched at the seams just as you would a stripe or plaid design.

Because of the fabric's thickness, hold the scissors at a right angle to the fabric as you cut. This will assure same-size apttern pieces.

Mark the fabric with chalk or tailors' tacks. Avoid a tracing wheel, because it may mar the quilted surface or ruin the paper pattern.

When stitching, use a cotton covered polyester thread in the luster and strength suitable to the fabric.

Always test stitching on a fabric scrap. Match the stitch length to the length of the quilting stitch lines. This is usually eight to 10 stitches per inch.

Because of the fabric's bulk, you may need to lessen the preser foot pressure and loosen the stitch tension.

For stitching, use a

regular shap point machine needle. A size 14 needle for lightweight quilted or a size 16-18 for heaviest weights should do the best jobs.

To prevent the shift of the bulky fabric when stitching, pin it generously.

If stitching with two different textures, stitch with the smooth side up. An even feed foot attachment will help the fabric feed smoothly without puckering.

To avoid distoreted seam lines, stitch from center to outside and from bottom to top.

To finish seams, trim away the batting in the seam allowance. This will cut down on bulk. Then you can bind the seams with seam tape.

Spring and summer fashions will have that "something extra" with a little quilted fabric fashion fun.

# ASCS News

## 1981 FARM PROGRAM

For 1981, producers will have three options from which to choose from in participating in the 1981 farm program. The following options are available: (1) ASCS Disaster program (this provides ASCS disaster protection only after crops are properly certified.

(2) 30 percent subsidy on FCIC premium and forego all ASCS disaster benefits.

(3) Unsubsidized FCIC and ASCS disaster program (pay full FCIC insurance cost and receive protection from both ASCS and FCIC.

Producers interested in FCIC insurance have until March 31 to purchase the insurance on cotton and April 30th for grain sorghum.

A list of sales and service agents who are handling FCIC insurance is available here in the County Office.

## FINAL GRAZING DATE

March 21, 1981, is the final normal grazing date for small grains in Borden County. Small grain (wheat and or barley) grazed past March 21 and carried on to harvest will be subject to a reduction in disaster payment coverage provided there is a low yield claim filed on the acreage.

## MAY 15, FINAL CERTIFICATION DATE

The final date to certify small grain acreage is May 15, 1981. Small grain acreage intended for

harvest as grain as well as that planted for grazing only must be reported.

## ACP SIGN-UP

There will be a sign-up period during the month of April for brush control practices to be carried out under the 1981 Agricultural Conservation Program.

Brush control practices include control of brush by rootplowing, bulldozing, grubbing and or aerial spraying. If you are interested in any of these practices and need assistance in the performance, then come in during the April sign up period.

## MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Measurement service is available if you are not sure of the acres that you are planning to certify. Their will be a nominal fee for this service.

## EMERGENCY FEED PROGRAM

All producers who have active EFP applications are reminded to submit all receipts for feed that has been purchased. These receipts must show the kind of feed, weight, price, date delivered or picked up, and be signed by the seller.

An amount of feed (in grain equivalents) equal to that acquired under the program shall be fed to the applicant's eligible livestock during the feeding period.

April 30, 1981 is the ending date of the feeding period. All sales receipts that will be eligible for cost-share must be submitted by May 31st.


