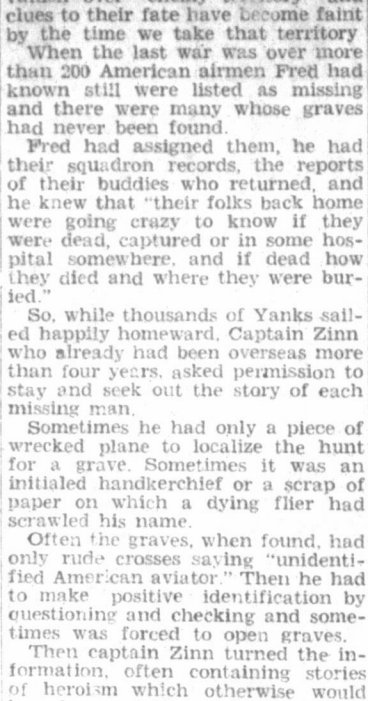




### Lone Man Seeks Last Traces Of Missing Airmen

**WITH THE AEP IN ITALY.** (Delayed)—(P)—With a pocket full of cigarettes and a handful of clues, chunky, bespectacled Fred Zinn is stalking around over Africa, Sicily and Italy doing the same grim job he did in Europe 25 years ago.  
 He's locating the last traces of airmen missing in action.  
 Working alone on a volunteer mission, the 52-year-old seed manufacturer from Battle Creek, Mich. (his wife now is waiting in Rosedale Garden, a Detroit suburb) is almost unknown. He has no official status for his mission, no transportation except what he begs or borrows, and no assistants.  
 But Fred goes plodding on, questioning an Italian farmer who saw a plane crash, asking to see hospital records, erstwhile enemy air force victory reports, old registry books hunting clues to clear up the record of another missing airman.  
 When the last war broke out Zinn was just out of Michigan university, a kid scrounging around Europe. In 1915 he joined the French Foreign Legion.  
 When the Yanks started coming he transferred to the Lafayette Escadrille as a captain, served as aerial machinegunner and observer and was picked by Lieut. Col. Billy Mitchell to organize aerial photo work and then was placed in charge of assigning American flying personnel. Now the percentage of airmen who remain listed as "missing in action" is inevitably much higher than among ground troops, for the fliers vanish over enemy territory and clues to their fate have become faint by the time they take that territory.  
 When the last war was over more than 200 American airmen Fred had known still were listed as missing and there were many whose graves had never been found.  
 Fred had assigned them, he had their squadron records, the reports of their buddies who returned, and he knew that "their folks back home were going crazy to know if they were dead, captured or in some hospital somewhere, and if dead how they died and where they were buried."  
 So, while thousands of Yanks sailed happily homeward, Captain Zinn who already had been overseas more than four years, asked permission to stay and seek out the story of each missing man.  
 Sometimes he had only a piece of wrecked plane to localize the hunt for a grave. Sometimes it was an initialed handkerchief or a scrap of paper on which a dying flier had scrawled his name.  
 Often the graves, when found, had only rude crosses saying "unidentified American aviator." Then he had to make positive identification by questioning and checking and sometimes was forced to open graves.  
 Then, captain Zinn turned the information, often containing stories of heroism which otherwise would have been untold, over to the war department to notify the family. In addition he wrote countless personal letters, relating details which he found "meant so much." When he finally left Europe as a major in July, 1919, only six of the 200 airmen still were listed as missing. Fred Zinn had done his work well. Now he's at it again.

### State Business Activity Stays At High Level

DALLAS, March 8.—(P)—Business and industrial activity in the eleventh Federal Reserve district continuing at a high level during January 1944, although there were declines in such fields as construction, the bank's monthly business review said today.  
 The value of construction contracts awarded was smaller than in December, said the report, and 78 per cent less than in January, 1943. The report said that drilling activity, as measured by oil well completions, also declined in January this year, but remained above the level of January last year.  
 Daily average production of crude oil increased slightly, approaching the all-time high of 2,115,000 barrels daily reached in November, 1943, and stocks of crude oil in the district reached a new peak at the end of January.  
 Department store sales declined more than seasonally in the district but were 12 per cent larger than the corresponding month last year. The moisture situation was im-

### Writer Watches Raid on Rabaul

**ABOARD THE BOMBER MARY LEE OVER RABAU, New Britain, Feb. 29.** (Delayed)—(P)—The pilot banked the Mary Lee onto the bomb run and as we roared over Simpson harbor through a sky full of ack-ack I saw the beginning of the end of the town of Rabaul.  
 It was a developed tropical settlement lying between jungle-covered hills and the bay. Then, five minutes later, I saw the swift and smashing change, dozens of buildings had been blasted into bits, fires raged from almost every section, pillars of smoke already reached half way to the clouds.  
 Capt. M. W. Longwill of Des Moines, N. Mex., piloted the Mary Lee, a Mitchell medium bomber, from which I watched the raid. It was the second and heaviest smash at the town proper.  
 We came from Simpson harbor and smashed the place around the waterfront and industrial installations near the harbor.  
 Suddenly the air ahead of us was full of bombs, screaming from the bellies of the twin-tailed bombers. Just before a cloud obscured the view I saw one of the bombs hit a building near a dock and blow it away with an orange flash.  
 The Mary Lee braced with new buoyance, as though happy to be free of her lethal load, the bombs slid down into the clouds.  
 "This is the time for all good airplanes to get the hell out of here," said Longwill, banking toward Simpson harbor and giving the Mary Lee all the soup she could take.  
 We looked back at the destruction we had caused. Staff Sgt. Lawrence Drake of Royal Oak, Mich., our engineer, yelled: "It looks like somebody hit a big oil dumper."  
 Elsewhere below where many wrecked and beached ships and small craft, evidence of earlier raids.  
 From the cockpit of the leading plane, Maj. James J. Yoem of Rio Hondo, Texas, leader of our element, waves a "well done."

## Economist Doubts Commodity Prices Will Drop Sharply

AUSTIN, March 8—(AP)—There are no grounds for fear that commodity prices will collapse, as they did in 1918, at the end of World War II, a University of Texas economist suggests.

Dr. F. A. Buechel of the bureau of business research also said that while the industrial production index of the nation may temporarily be cut in half when Germany is defeated, business activity in general may not drop off more than 25 per cent.

The possibility of a commodity price collapse is remote, he said, since with the exception of farm products and food, commodity prices have risen comparatively little during the past four years.

"Until Germany's defeat, all-out production is certain to continue on the highest plane possible of attainment," Dr. Buechel said.

"The defeat of Germany will usher in major readjustments to a peacetime economy. The initiation of these readjustments will not await the surrender of Japan.

"Industrial activity is expected to drop precipitously soon after the end of the war."

Dr. Buechel said that the price of raw materials and semi-finished products will be better than the price of finished goods.

"It is expected," he added, "that the output of civilian goods may be expected to increase immediately upon the release of raw materials."

## Truman Group Notes Improved Plane Output

(By The Associated Press)  
New and improved aircraft production in Texas and elsewhere was noted by the Truman war industry investigating committee in its third annual report to congress.

Henceforth war factories can concentrate on quality and specialized needs such as landing craft, heavier and longer range combat planes, radio and ships, the senate's special committee headed by Chairman Truman (D-Mo.) reported.

The committee said that the new civilian production can now be envisaged; farm machinery especially should be put through the lathes to bolster home economy.

There is no need for a national manpower draft such as urged by President Roosevelt.

The committee credited its investigation of the manpower situation at the North American Aviation plant near Dallas with netting large savings in major supplies and expenditures throughout the industry.

At the same time the report disclosed that the North American P-51 Mustang and the Republic P-47, already rated as tops among single-engine fighters, are being improved, and that a "greatly improved" version of the Bell Airacobra is coming into production.

"Production of the Lockheed P-38 Lightning described as 'the finest plane of its type in the world,' is being increased by a contract with Consolidated Vultee.

Formerly the twin-boom, long-range fighter was built only by its designer, Lockheed.

Two new navy fighting planes, the two-engine F7F scheduled for early production by Grumman Aircraft & Engineering Corp. and the BT-D, a bomber-torpedo plane, described as a "radically improved model" of Douglas' B7D Dauntless divebomber, were mentioned in the report.

A new Douglas light bomber, considered greatly superior to the A-20, is coming into production.

With reference to the committee's inquiry at Dallas last fall, the report said:

"The testimony established that North American was not efficiently utilizing the 36,000 workers which it then had and that it could not usefully employ the additional 13,000 workers that was requesting."

Charles E. Wilson, vice chairman of the war production board, concluded upon study of the committee's findings, that the company could reduce its announced peak output by approximately 10,000 workers, and that no new employees would be needed before January, 1944.

"The investigation at Dallas had a profound effect upon the aircraft companies, particularly those on the West Coast. After reexamining their actual needs, they reported to Mr. Charles E. Wilson in the war production board that in their opinion their requests for additional workers could safely be reduced."

Among other disclosures by the committee was that the contract with the Kaiser-Hughes Aircraft Corp. for three 400,000-pound eight-engine wooden flying boats has been cancelled because of the construction would be "excessively

heavy and unreliable."

One of the wooden ships may be completed, it was learned from other sources, and the committee left open for negotiation the proposal to build metal planes of the same type.

The committee also brought to the attention of congress a 19-month-old complaint against the navy's bureau of ships for allegedly having "stubbornly persisted for over five years" in clinging to an "unseaworthy tank lighter design of its own."

The report said a switch had been made to a tank lighter designed by Andrew Jackson Higgins of New Orleans.

The committee put the navy on the back for the way it handled acquisitions from civilians, such as citizens, "with the fairness and courtesy that citizens are entitled to expect from the military."

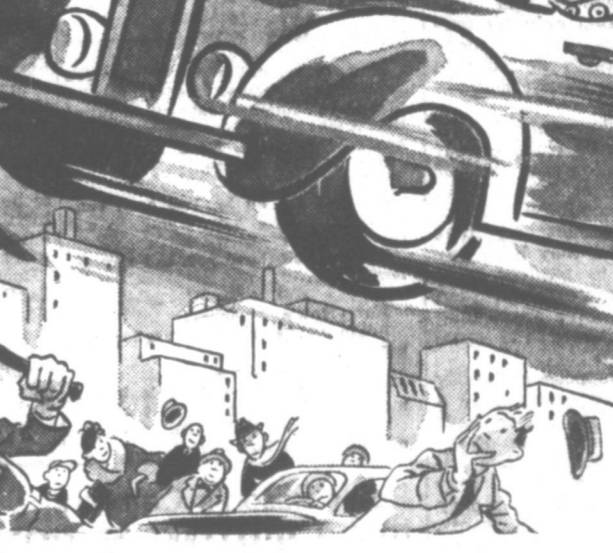

Frosh Dominate Big Ten's Star Basketball Team

By CHARLES CHAMBERLAIN CHICAGO, March 8—(AP)—The 1944 All-Star Big Ten basketball team, dominated by three freshmen and including two players from Ohio State's championship squad, was selected for the Associated Press today by conference coaches.

Dave Danner of Iowa, Arnold Riser of Ohio State and Paul Hoffman of Purdue were the rookies named on one of the vanguard all-conference teams in Big Ten history—ones whose members averaged only 20 years old.

Russ Wendland—A V-6 trainee at Wisconsin—grabbed a 2nd-team berth for the second consecutive year. Others on the second team were Bob Bowen of Ohio State; Dick Ives of Iowa, the Big Ten's scoring champion with 206 points which included a record-breaking 43 against Chicago; Ray Patterson of Wisconsin and Ben Schadler of Northeastern.

Graham, a splendid floorman and rebounder, and Danner who produced 193 points for the Hawkeyes, were stationed at forwards on the No. 1 team. Risen, Ohio State's 8-foot 8½ inch Kentuckian who spilled in 174 points in the regular 12-game Big Ten schedule won the center position.
