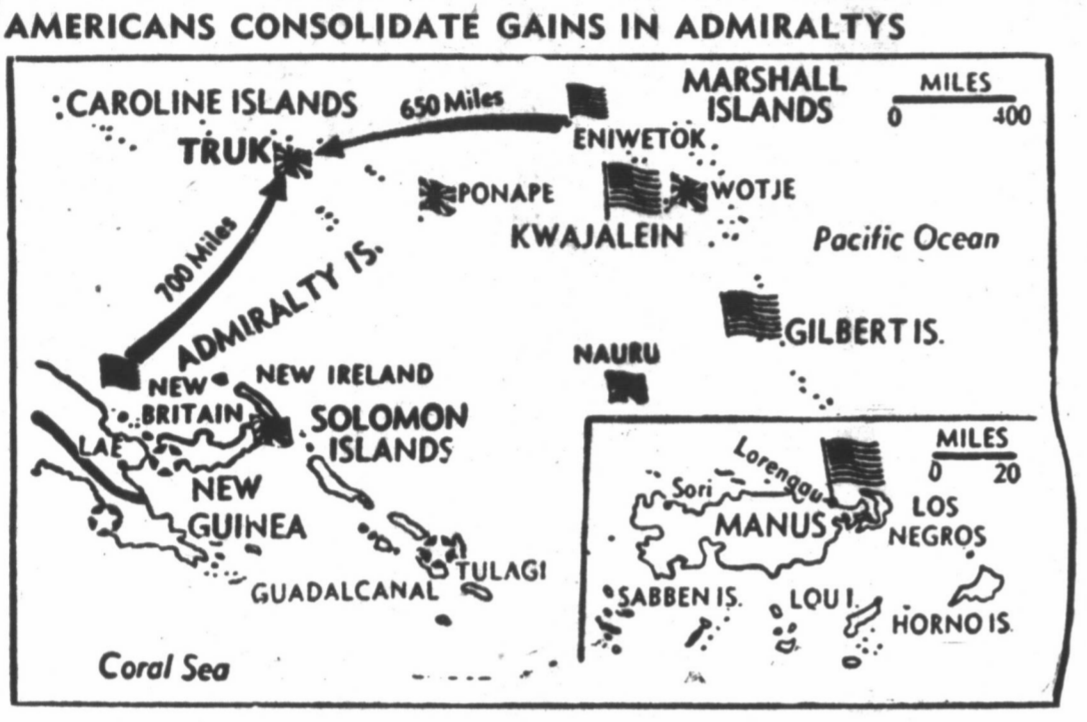

(By The Associated Press) Gen. Douglas MacArthur communique today that "heavy ground reinforcements" have been landed on Los Negros island in the Bismarck sea...

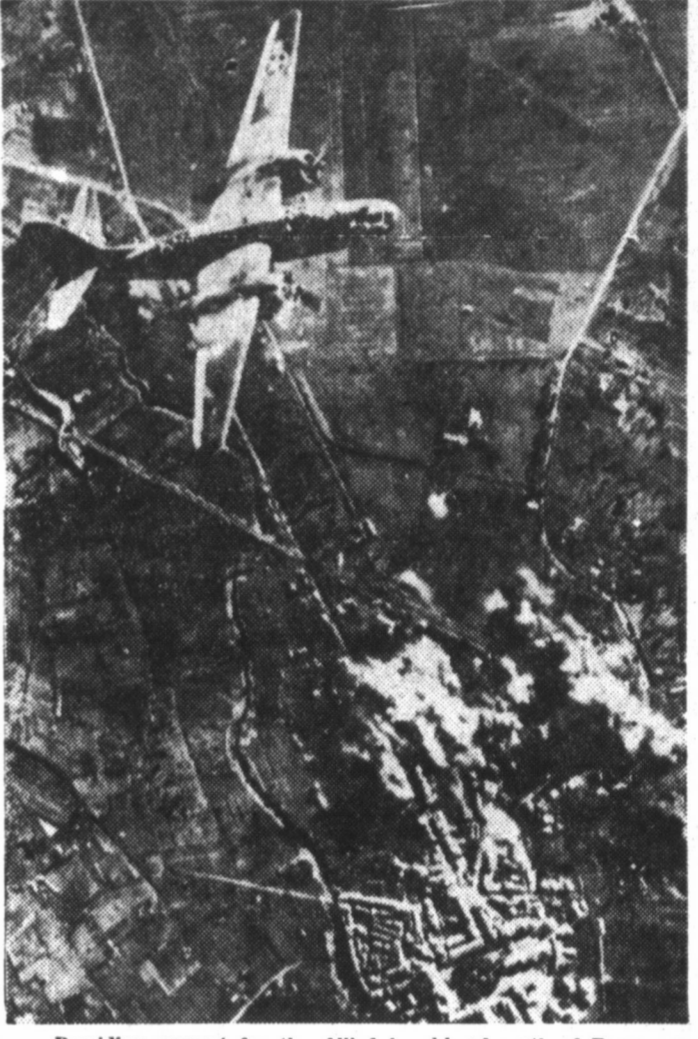

Three Religions Used in Burying U. S. Soldiers

By CLYDE A. FARNSWORTH HEADQUARTERS, 14th Air Force, China. (AP)—They lived together, fought together and died together, but their funeral here under a Chinese sky had to be conducted in three religions—Jewish, Catholic and Protestant.

There was one of the five, who because of his own past indiscretion, was buried as one of three Protestants. He may not have been one. They died in a Mitchell bomber just returned from a sweep against Japanese shipping. They were sent to base but an air raid alarm sent them roaring off again to protect their plane from the enemy.

Chaplain John P. Fitzsimmons of Belmont, Mass., stepped forward and laid a white rose and a red rose on each of the first three caskets—those of Capt. Charles L. Waugh, of St. Louis, Capt. Derfard B. Harper, 26, of Dodge, Texas, and T/Sgt. Sanford W. Carlhart, Jr., 24, of Forest Hills, Long Island.

The symbol of the roses, Chaplain Fitzsimmons said, was red for sacrifice and white for faith in the love of God and immortality. The Protestant service finished, Pvt. Samson R. Breuer, New York City, repeated the rose-laying on the casket of M/Sgt. Albert E. Danovitz, 27, of Philadelphia.

Finally Chaplain John S. Kelly placed a pair of roses on the casket of T/Sgt. Frank J. Elmer, 28, of Galveston, Texas. The flags flapped against the caskets. A dozen or so of officers from headquarters of the 14th stock uncovered the caskets.

It was the first Protestant-Jewish-Catholic funeral for American soldiers in the China theater. The caskets went into new, camouflaged vaults of the American cemetery, amid the ancient grave mounds of another people.

House Observes Texas Independence WASHINGTON, March 3—(AP)—The anniversary of the independence of Texas, established as a republic in 1836 when American colonists broke away from Mexico, was observed officially in the house Thursday.

Rep. Lanham (D-Texas) took the floor to relate the historical background of the Lone Star state, recalling that settlers from Virginia, Georgia, Massachusetts, Tennessee, New Jersey, Kentucky, and North Carolina had been outstanding heroes of the state.

NEW ORLEANS, March 3—(AP)—James H. Davis, Louisiana's governor-designate, looked forward today to "resting up with a little fishing trip" after having spent the past four and a half months campaigning over the state with his hillbilly band.

Davis issued a statement asking for cooperation of the people irrespective of their previous political alignments. Latest figures on Tuesday's primary election gave Davis 238,507 votes to 307,442 for the "old regular" candidate, Lewis I. Morgan. Nearly 700,000 unaffiliated voters from the 1970 of 1965 precincts showed that the Shreveport public service commissioner carried seven of eight Louisiana congressional districts.

Meat Rationing Agitation Arises

WASHINGTON, March 3—(AP)—Suspension of meat rationing in Canada evoked some congressional agitation today for a similar step in this country but most legislators adhered to the official view that the meat surplus is temporary and that lowering of ration point values is all that is justified.

Commenting on testimony Wednesday of Philip R. O'Brien, president of the Chicago board of trade, that government grain price policies had led to an oversupply of livestock, Senator Wheeler (D-Mont) said it seemed "inconsistent for this government to continue strict rationing when we have so much livestock that the markets have been glutted."

But Senator McClellan (D-Ark), member of the committee which recently considered legislation to force a suspension of meat rationing, said the peak of the hog marketing season has now passed. "I don't know that we could justify a complete rationing suspension," McClellan said, "but I do think the war food administration and the office of price administration have been too rigid in their point value rules. Their policy in the past hasn't been elastic enough. They have been stiff-necked to arguments about the meat surplus."

During the 12 class periods Mrs. Branson will give instruction in simple ways to keep a sick person comfortable and well nourished, and how at the same time to maintain an orderly household despite extra demands upon time.

Pampa women who receive Red Cross home nursing certificate upon completion of their work will have learned how to make a sick bed, bathe a patient, read a thermometer, and protect the health of all other members of the family while caring for a patient with a contagious disease.

Special emphasis is put on simple "help the doctor" tips, how to keep bedside records clear, up to the doctor's orders, and ward off serious illness by early recognition of symptoms. The work will also include a study of diets and administering medicines, special care of the aged and convalescents, as well as making known and care problems.

Mrs. Branson has had a great deal of experience in public health nursing and is particularly resourceful in improvising sickroom equipment. She will bring to the class a thorough knowledge of home nursing problems and technique.

Mrs. Campbell stated that it is hoped that additional classes will be organized shortly, and expects to be able to schedule both afternoon and evening sessions.

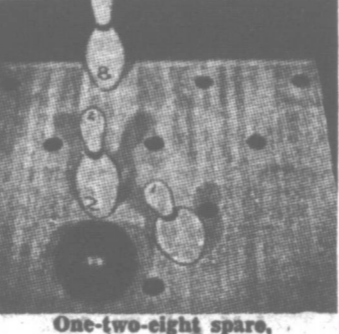

(Continued from Page 1) tary proof was produced in 1937 it was considered as propaganda by the outside world.

News of the Jap atrocities against Americans on Bataan and Corregidor was not unexpected by the Chinese, he said. The same thing was perpetrated upon the Chinese at Nanking in 1938 with murders and rapings and torture by the Jap invaders, he stated.

"I brought with me to America," he said, "actual motion pictures of these atrocities—pictures taken by Americans and British in Nanking at the time. I tried to have them exhibited in New York theaters in 1938 to show the people what the Japanese were doing. But I was turned down. They told me that, anyway, the pictures were too gruesome, and that the American public couldn't take it. Now, after the revelation of atrocities inflicted upon the prisoners of Bataan and Corregidor—these same films are being shown in American theaters.

Cheng presented China's suggestions as to what should be done with Japan after the victory. He said that the Chinese want the Japanese monarchial form of government, completely ousted; they want occupation of Japan by the Allies as long as necessary with the nation completely demilitarized, and return to China of territory taken from her by Japan prior to 1895. This would include return of the island of Formosa.

Presenting a bit of philosophy on how the Chinese believe world peace can be attained, Cheng said: "To have peace in the world there must first be peace within the individual nations; to have peace within the nation there must first be peace within the family, and to have peace within the family there must first be self-control of the individual."

"Upon self-control of the individual," he added, "all the others depend." Discussing the Chinese attitude toward life, he said that in China the social scale is rated this way, (1) scholar, (2) farmer, (3) laborer, and (4) the businessman.

Cheng returned last year from two years in Chungking, China's wartime capital.

In an interview yesterday afternoon he admitted that he was too optimistic about an early end of the war in the Pacific.

The next and last speaker on the Rotary's community forum will be Simon M. Davidson, of Lima, Ohio, who will speak Thursday night, March 23, on Russia.

"After the failure of all his attacks which began Feb. 29, the enemy did not resume his strong offensive against the Allied beachhead forces yesterday," the Navy communique said. "Our positions remain intact. Heavy losses were inflicted on the enemy."

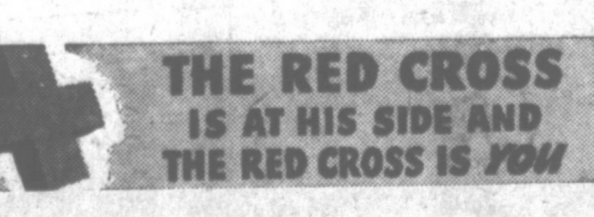
