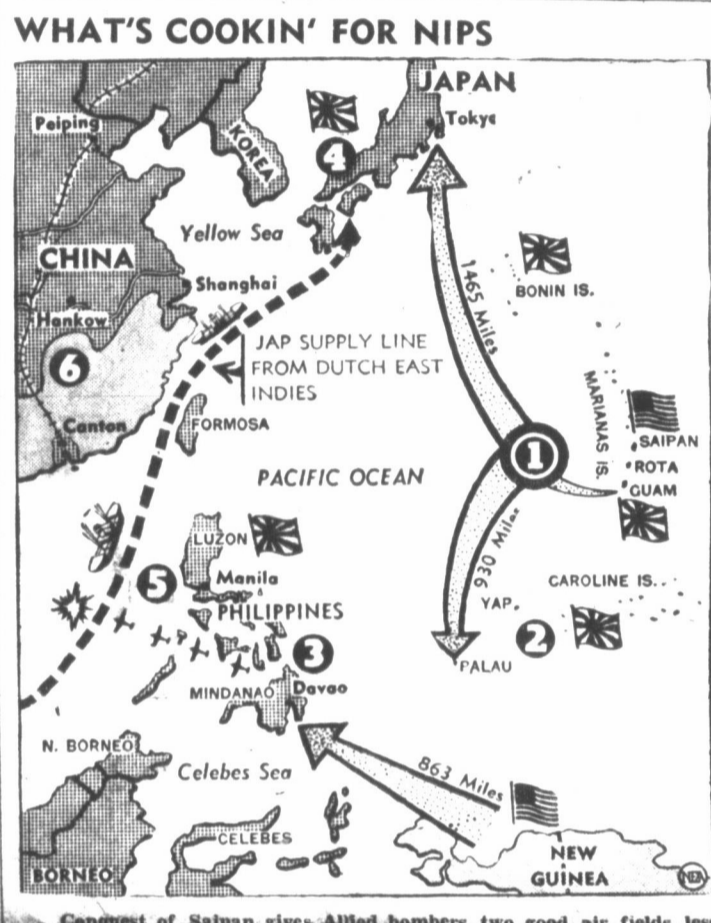

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No Smoking: No the pleasant, rather vague sounds of tuning up the "new world" symphony of postwar products there comes a loud and forthright warning sounded by the big manufacturers. They don't promise to smother any new and mysterious source of thermal energy out of the blue. They just say they have a new coal stove that won't smoke, and also will require 50 per cent less fuel and a lot less tending.

This is good news, and in saying so we don't mean to disparage the postwar world. We mean to say that the comforts that world is going to be wonderful, and it can't come too soon to suit us. But it won't be here tomorrow. And we're not up a collection to comfort to the more than seven million families who still heat their houses with stoves that something better is in store for the immediate postwar world.

Fable Without a Moral: The oldest employe is retiring, and the boys in the office are getting up a collection to buy him a present. They've got John Doe down for \$3, but John says he's always liked the old man and would like to give \$5. Joe Doak says he'll give \$10. Joe would like to give it, but what with taxes and all, he thinks he can afford only \$8.

Nurses Needed: Your corner drugist (with 56,000 of his employees throughout the country) has added to his varied assortment of jobs and services. He has been selected to beat the drum in a recruiting campaign for the United States Cadet Nurse Corps.

The Nation's Press: Years ago The News and Courier said that Texas would be the leading American state. LOOKING AHEAD

SCHOOL TEACHERS ARE influential people. They choose their calling as a rule because they love children, and love influences children. Youngsters, in turn, contrast their homes and parents more than they realize; in ways they don't know about. Thus a good teacher is a power in the community. Any politician could cut quite a splash if only he could line up all the teachers behind him.

The idea is not new. Starts are made in that direction often. Plans to alter the public schools of America in a bureaucratic reshuffle have come before Congress four times since 1937. They have failed every time but each new attempt shows more strength. The most recent one, discussed in this column exactly a year ago, gathered enough momentum to get talked about from Bangor to Burbank.

THE ISSUE WILL BE re-fought. Political problems have a way of coming, like water, until they are cured, and this one is not cured. Teachers have a right to earn as much in the classroom as they might get for manual labor in a factory and for teaching in a school. The bill, (S.367) as finally rejected by the 78th Congress, is dead but the senators' ambitions can still wiggle. Hill is campaigning now for "federal aid to education," and that's been a hobby of Thomas' for a long time.

It is encouraging, of course, to find that some Germans are beginning to doubt Hitler's infallibility. But it would be dangerously wishful thinking to conclude that in many ways the G. O. P. statement was better. The Lewis crowd is disaffected. The conservative in both Parties disapproved the paragraphs in the Republican articles of faith.

NEW NAZI ATTITUDE

Post D-Day reports from Europe indicate that the attitude of Nazi prisoners is changing. The Afrika Korps boys were cocky even in defeat, sure of victory. But today some of the captured Nazis are taking a gloomy view, as S. J. Woolf, NEA Service's artist-correspondent, reveals in recent story.

Mr. Woolf made a trip from France to England aboard an LST with what appears to be a pretty good cross-section of the German army. There were 22 in the group, old soldiers and young men from every point of the German compass. And they represented a variety of opinions.

The older men were the most volatile and most discouraged. Others in the group were sullen, and ignored Mr. Woolf's questions. The youngster of the bunch was definitely anti-Nazi. Those who talked freely told the interviewer that Hitler's popularity passed its peak in the year he came to power; that only a third of the Germans still regard him as their Führer; that about one-third of the Germans still regard Hitler as their Führer; that about one-third of the Germans still regard Hitler as their Führer.

These grumbling, discouraged soldiers are too typical of the lethargic German masses who, though not devoid of decency, blithely voted away their freedom in 1933. The defiant youngster is too typical of a German youth whose poisoned minds must be de-educated and re-educated.

But the job has to be done if the world's future is to be secure. It will take much time and much vigilance. And there are no apparent short-cuts—which is something to remember when the "soft peace for Germany" talk begins, as it surely will.

TRACTORS OF CAPITALISM might note that Soviet Russia is going to allow its citizens to establish small businesses for profit, as an aid to reconstruction. This happened once before in the early 1920's under Lenin's New Economic Policy, when private business helped to rebuild and increase industrial production after the chaos of revolution.

In fact, there are parts of this book which will make excellent Nazi propaganda and give considerable aid and comfort to the enemy.

War Today

Associated Press War Analyst: Hitler's decree for total mobilization throughout the Reich and occupied territories contemplates a re-organization of the individual such as perhaps no despot of history, even in the dark ages, ever attempted. He proposes to halt all human endeavor excepting that which is directed towards war.

Every person who is capable of work will be assigned a task to this end. No class can escape. Even the government services are to be combed ruthlessly to secure further cannon fodder and war workers. The meaning of this amazing re-organization is that Hitler apparently is determined to fight to a finish. He's going to make the Allies dig him out of his hole like the rat he is.

Hitler's deputy, Reich marshal Goering, is to adapt the whole of public life to the requirements of total war. Propaganda Minister Goebbels is entrusted with the task of smoking out every ounce of war energy, no matter where he may find it. The murderous Gestapo chief, "Hangman" Himmler, is to enforce orders through the ranks of fanatical Nazi SS troops—and this means that any disobedience or opposition will be punished by death.

How long Hitler will be able to make such regimentation stick remains to be seen, but it looks like to keep the Reich, and to a certain degree the occupied countries, in hand for the time being. However, as this column remarked the other day, we are mainly concerned with the German home front. Our way to lasting peace certainly lies in the smashing of the enemy war machine on the battle field. Once we have destroyed Hitler's armies, the home front will fall in line.
