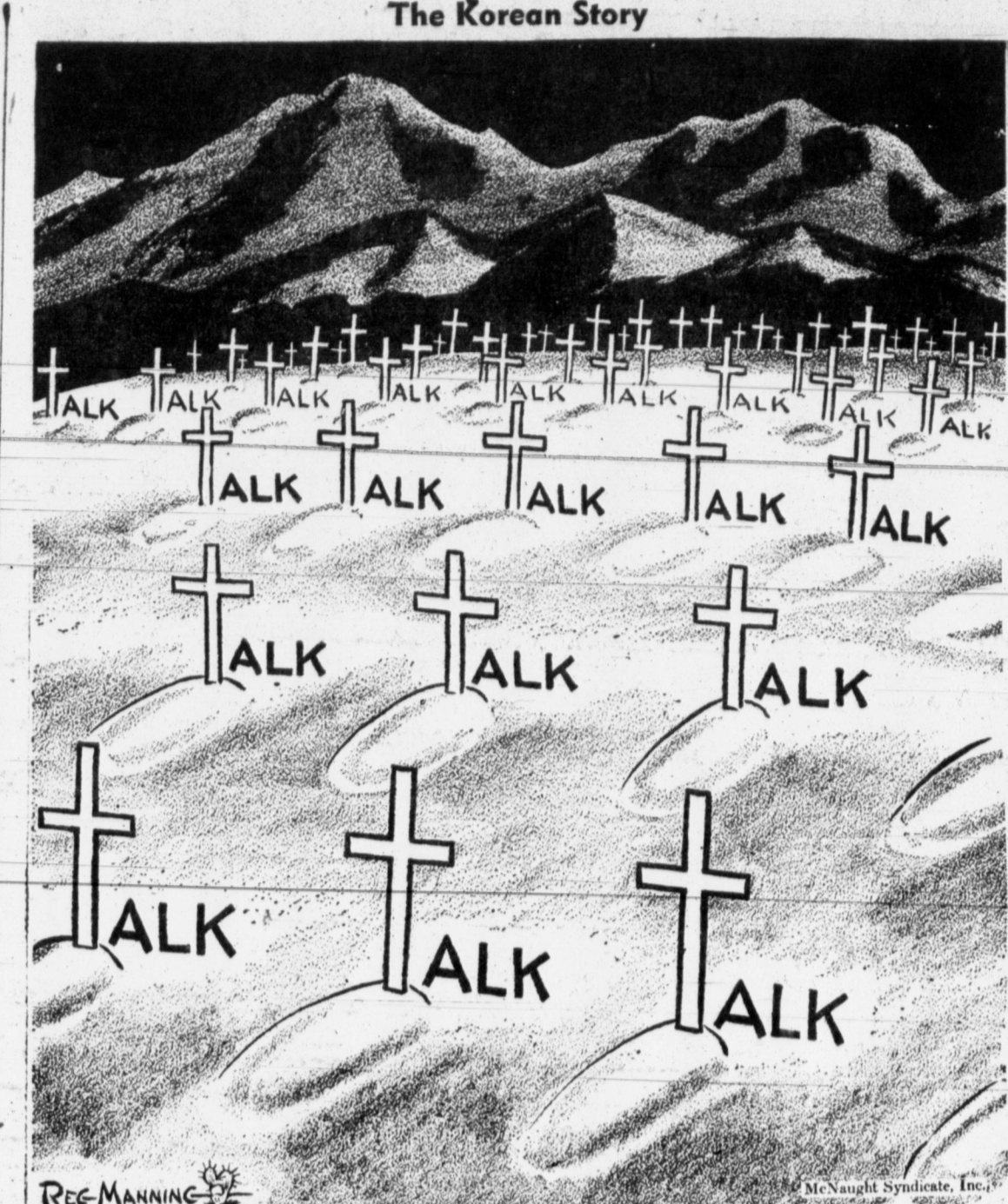

WHO WILL SEND US COAL? Christian Economies

Although there is plenty of coal in many European countries, the United States is sending coal to Europe at the rate of about 40 million metric tons per year. American coal is much more expensive than European coal and to this is added the high cost of handling and ocean transportation...

The Doctor Says

Among the forms of heart disease on which great progress has been made in recent years is condition known as subacute bacterial endocarditis, which was formerly almost invariably fatal.

Endocarditis usually begins gradually. The patient is likely to tire easily, there is loss of energy and an all-in feeling, and loss of pep. After a time there are likely to be chilly sensations, unusual sweating, and slight fever. Sometimes muscle or joint pains and headache are present. These symptoms may appear alone or in various combinations.

Until recently many treatments have been tried, but almost always with disappointing results. At first even the sulfu drugs and penicillin seemed disappointing.

MOST PATIENTS RECOVER. Now, however, most patients who develop acute bacterial endocarditis (provided that the disease is diagnosed early) recover if they are given in large enough doses of penicillin over a long enough period of time.

Many of the early failures with penicillin seem to have been caused by lack of knowledge as to how large an amount of the drug should be given and for how long a time.

Some of these strains are more sensitive to the action of penicillin than others, and those which are rather resistant are much harder to eliminate from the body.

It is a tremendous triumph that a terrible disease like subacute bacterial endocarditis, about which physicians formerly were so helpless, now can be cured in most instances. The remaining difficulties are being gradually mastered and in all probability a still higher percentage of cures will be obtained in the future.

It is tremendously important, of course, that diagnosis (which is not always easy) should be made early.

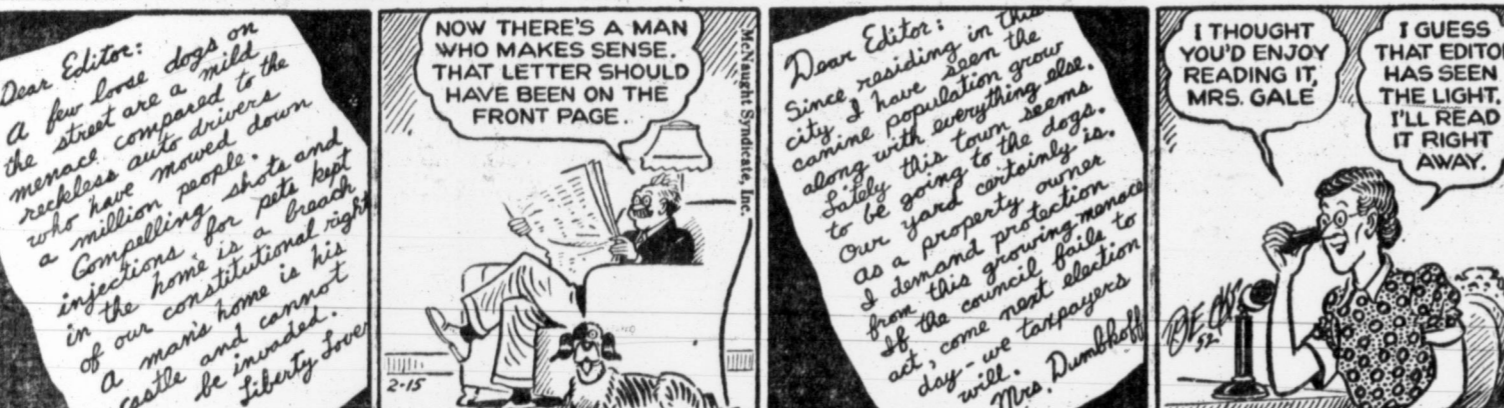

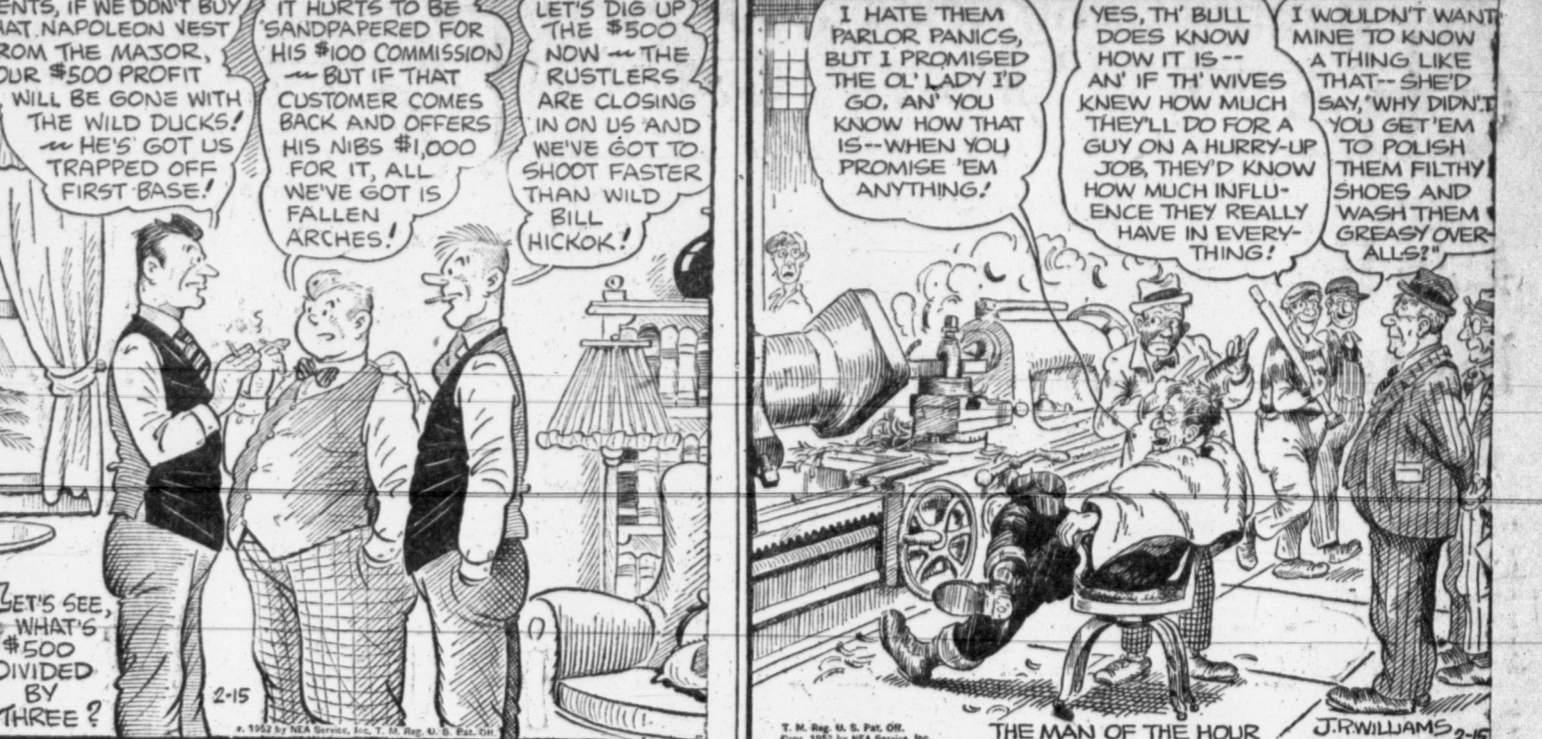

### Korean Kids Must Learn To Do Without GI Candy

 SEOUL, Korea—(NEA)—Running an orphan's home in Korea these days is like taking candy from a baby because that's exactly what has to be done. And that fact poses one of the biggest problems for Korean orphanages.

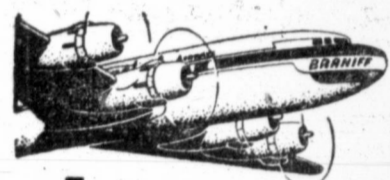
Every day, social workers pick up stray children on the streets and in the hills. They're brought to the orphanages, given three meals a day. But the traditional

diet of Korea isn't to their taste anymore because they've grown used to begging candy from GIs. Many of the strays run away from the security the orphanage gives them. They run back to their irregular, but beloved, ration of candy bars from generous soldiers.

How to keep the orphans in the orphanages is only one of the problems facing Korea's growing number of children's homes. Food and clothing are two others, which are being eased somewhat by the shipment of CARE packages from the U.S. But even the CARE packages produce new problems.

At the Airin Won (Loving Neighbors) Orphanage in Pusan, they found they had some sick children on their hands when the youngsters drank milk made from the milk powder in the packages. Their stomachs were unused to such rich and healthy food. But orphanage officials experimented, and found that if they mixed the powder with sugar and sprinkled it dry over cereal, the children were able to digest it.

Orphanages receive the bulk of the CARE packages sent to Korea, because the plight of the children is pitiful. Of all the 3,000,000 or more South Koreans who sorely need direct relief, they are the most helpless. In almost every South Korean orphanage is heart-rending evidence of this. In the Munske Orphan Home in Seoul, named after Col. Charles Muncke, commanding officer of the Seoul Civil Assistance Command team, emaciated children lie on blankets on the floor. Their heads seem enlarged, their

**Q. Do you know of any measure for the value of newspaper circulation to an advertiser such as the standards that a business man uses in buying merchandise?**

**Q. What is A. B. C.?**

**A. A.B.C.** stands for Audit Bureau of Circulations, a cooperative association of 3300 advertisers, advertising agencies and publishers in the United States and Canada.

**Q. What is the Bureau's work?**

**A. To audit** the circulation of newspapers and periodicals so that advertisers can buy space on the basis of definite standards and verified facts and figures.

**Q. How does A. B. C. accomplish this?**

**A. The Bureau** has a large staff of experienced auditors. They visit the publisher members periodically and make audits of their circulation records. This informa-

THE STORY: Jennet Logan's experience with "doctor's parties" has always been boring, until she and her husband, Dr. Gus Logan, go to the home of Dr. and Mrs. Walter Pelletier. There she meets a charming young physiologist, Peter Surinow, engaged in research in atomic medicine at Asgell's hospital. When Jennet is asked by Peter what interests she has, she says she is Dr. Logan's wife, that is all. She has no children, no hobbies, her work is done by her servant. She is not even sure that her love for her husband is anything beyond love of security. She tells Peter: "I paint."

At the Hel Myung (Grace Bright) Orphanage in Seoul, a little girl sits in a squatting position with her eyes glazed, whimpering like a puppy. Another girl which tore away an opening from the edge of her mouth to high on her cheek. Doctors found the bones and teeth were uninjured, however, and feel they have a good chance of performing plastic surgery on her.

At Sowha Boyuk Won (Little Flower Orphanage) in Pusan, Muncke, commanding officer of the Seoul Civil Assistance Command of St. Paul, little Christine Chung toddles about happily. She was found abandoned in the mission church. They named her "Chris-

time" because they found her on Christmas Day and "Chung" because it is a good Korean surname.

At Auyang Orphanage, in Kwangji-do, there are still 233 children living. There were more, but 150 were killed in a bombardment during the last big Communist offensive. American-educated Dr. Keung Sun Oh, the director, doesn't think he can hold the older children much longer — it is more profitable to be a beggar and perhaps they may become an Army mascot.

At "Kid's Town," the largest of 15 orphanages established on the island of Cheju Do for children who were evacuated from Seoul in 1950, the "Mayor" is 14-year-old Kim Chang Woon. He supervises the distribution of CARE packages, which include clothing and blankets as well as food, and he'll tell any one who listens about the prayer that's said by the children of "Kid's Town."

"Every night now," he says, fingering the new warm sweater he wears, "when we say our prayers, we say, God bless the United Nations, God bless America and God especially bless CARE."
