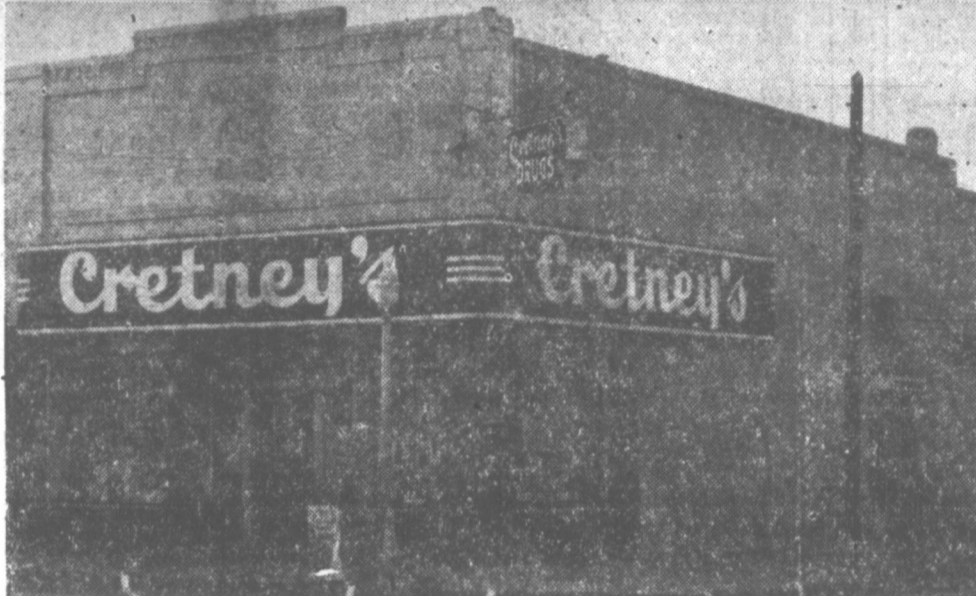

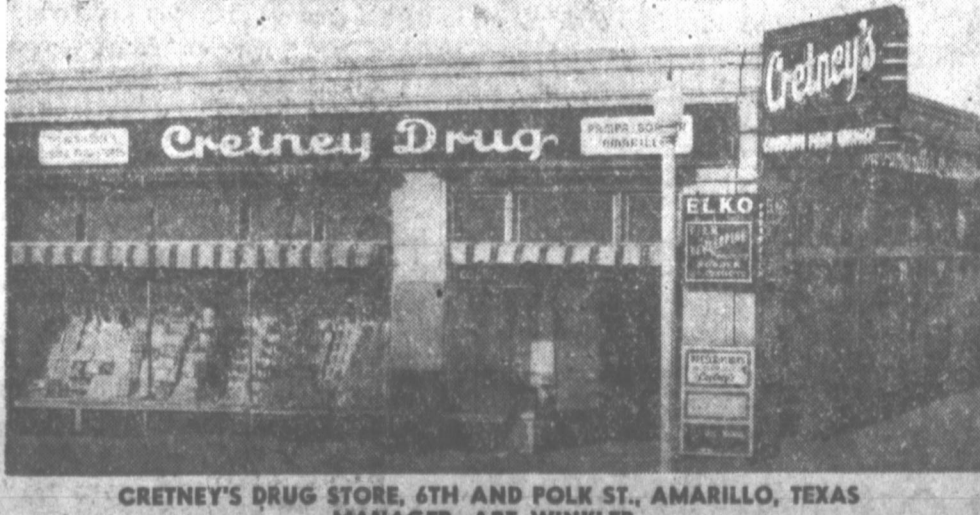

19th Air Group Navy Top Scorer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16—(AP)—In just 16 days of action, navy air group 19 became one of the service's top-scoring carrier based fighting units.

Reporting today on the organization's record, the navy said in carrier strikes on Formosa, the Pescadores Islands, Nansel Shoto and the Imperial Japanese fleet, the group's Hellcats, Avengers and Helldivers destroyed more than 100 airborne enemy planes.

It also aided in extensive destruction of enemy surface units.

Details in Man's Death Are Given

A story from a South Bend, Wash., newspaper relates how Sterling Price McEntire, son of Mrs. Louella McEntire, of Miami, was electrocuted when he came in contact with a high-voltage line Nov. 3 while working with a construction gang. Details of the accident had not been received here before.

The paper says a pile driver was at work driving a dock extension, but the workers did not know that the electric wires high overhead were carrying a head voltage.

The hammer of the driver came in contact with the line, and McEntire, holding a water-soaked mooring, received the full shock. Another worker pushed him free of the mooring with a wooden pole.

Several other men were hurt, but none seriously.

Services for McEntire were held last week. He was 37.

He began work in steel construction in 1934 at Tulsa. He was doing secret government work at the time of his death. Surviving are his mother, two sisters, Mrs. D. W. Stribling of Miami, and Mrs. T. A. Drum of Pampa; two nieces, Mrs. George B. Lilly of Laketon, and Mrs. R. L. Schroder of Miami; two nephews, Bill Getting of Pampa and Clinton W. Stribling, serving in the Pacific with the navy.

Funeral services were his cousins. Flower were in charge of the Susanna Wesley class of the Miami First Methodist of which Mrs. McEntire is an active member.

Portrait of a Sailor: His Watch Is In Torpedo Junction—Interesting

Al Coker, Texas, is a tin can sailor and he stands his watch in Torpedo Junction.

Which means that Coker represents the drive and power of a destroyer for he stands his watch in the boiler room, the place where a ship comes alive. His story is the unwritten story of many another sailor—unwritten because a man who works in the throbbing heat of a ship's vitals has a dangerous out-thoroughly unspectacular time.

In battle he feels danger but does not see it; the roar of guns topside is muffled by the time it reaches him; the boom of a depth charge to him is just a lurching jar. He doesn't see enemy planes; he just knows they are there.

"You don't ever really get scared though," he says, "because in a fight you work as long as 24 hours at a stretch and you drink the coffee and eat the sandwiches they bring down to you and all the time you figure that if your number is up you'll get it and if your number isn't up you're as safe as if you were sitting on the bank of some little river fishing for trout."

At 45, Al Coker's years in the navy have kept him trim. Al is from a lot of places in Texas—Wolfe City, Honey Grove, Big Spring and Austin. He had been selling sewing machines in Dallas for 11 years when the Japs struck Pearl Harbor.

"That made me right angry," he remembers. "Being an old navy man I figured I could help give those Japs a bad time. Way back in 1920 '21 and '22, I was a fireman on the battleship Oklahoma

and you don't stop thinking about the navy, 'cause you've been in. But the big thing is, I've got a boy—his 15 now.

"I guess I wanted to get in and help polish the Nips before he had to go. Anyway, I joined 16 days after Pearl Harbor."

Al has served on four new-type destroyers, which he describes as "slick ships." He has served two years on the Atlantic and eight months in the Pacific and prefers the former.

Three sections of service ribbons across Al's chest testify a lot of water went under the prows of the slick ships he served on. There were patrols in American waters and convoy duty along the thrill-packed Murmansk route with menacing German bombers outlined against the dark sky and there was the fury at Trinian and Saipan, days and nights of almost constant bombardment.

"When you get into a fight you don't mind the work and the strain. You think about the job you are doing and it makes you feel proud and kind of important. The only thing you mind is not being able to see what's going on. Once I sneaked up the hatch and looked out. I was just in time to see a Jap plane diving. His bombs missed."

"Another time, when we depth-bombed a sub I got to come on deck to watch the big mushrooms of water that came up when the charges went off. We got the sub. Flanks and stuff floated to the surface and oil covered about five acres."

Al works four hours and has eight hours off and when working he

wears the customary dungarees, blue chambray shirt and blue denim trousers. In the tropics he never wears an undershirt. Down in the ship, he has a bunk with steel springs and a cotton mattress. There are rows of bunks, three-tiered "like a Pullman car," he says, "without the curtains."

Below the bunks are the individual foot lockers and the men use these for chairs. Nearly always there is some sort of a card game going on, generally poker or acey deucey. Poker is played with chips since money on the table is not allowed. Al said that he had never seen a domino game on a destroyer and said bridge is never played.

Five card games are quiet, the men speaking generally in whispers to avoid waking the sleepers.

"Sailors are like brothers and they stick to one another like brothers. When a bunch of men live together they learn the real meaning of consideration."

"We have better food than the army," he claims. "The army boys admit it so it must be true."

For recreation at sea, he does a lot of reading and often he sits on the card games. At night, when the ship is blacked out he likes to sit on deck and watch the stars and clouds and waves.

"Out by yourself like that," he explained, "you can look your life over and add up the totals."

Roosevelt Sends Names to Senate

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16—(AP)—President Roosevelt today formally nominated James P. Byrnes to be director of war mobilization and reconstruction.

He sent to the Senate a nomination designating Byrnes for a full two-year term, but it had been agreed previously that Byrnes would retain the office only until Germany is defeated.

Originally the war mobilization director planned to step out this week. He agreed to remain after a conference with Mr. Roosevelt following a trip by Byrnes to the European fighting fronts.

The President also nominated Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines as retraining and reconemployment administrator for the war veterans' program. The veterans administrator already holds the retraining and reconemployment post under an executive order.

Thespians' Play Is Well Received

A full house greeted the initial performance last night of the Junior Thespians when they presented their original musical, "I Got Rhythm," written and directed by Bob Murphy.

The play will again be presented tonight at the Salvation Army Citadel, 8-15, and Thespians have extended an invitation to the public to attend.

"The musical is not a religious service," said Captain Herschel Murphy, corps commander, "but an out-growth of the regular Tuesday night 'community night' program. Much talent has been discovered among the young group and excellent work is being done in the Thespians with their stage-lighting, music, and costuming."

There were 26 members of the Thespians who, by special invitation, attended the Passion Play Tuesday evening in Amarillo. Bob Murphy, director of "I Got Rhythm," held a private interview with Joseph Meier, who portrays Christus in the Passion play.

Food Storage Cellar Facilities Planned

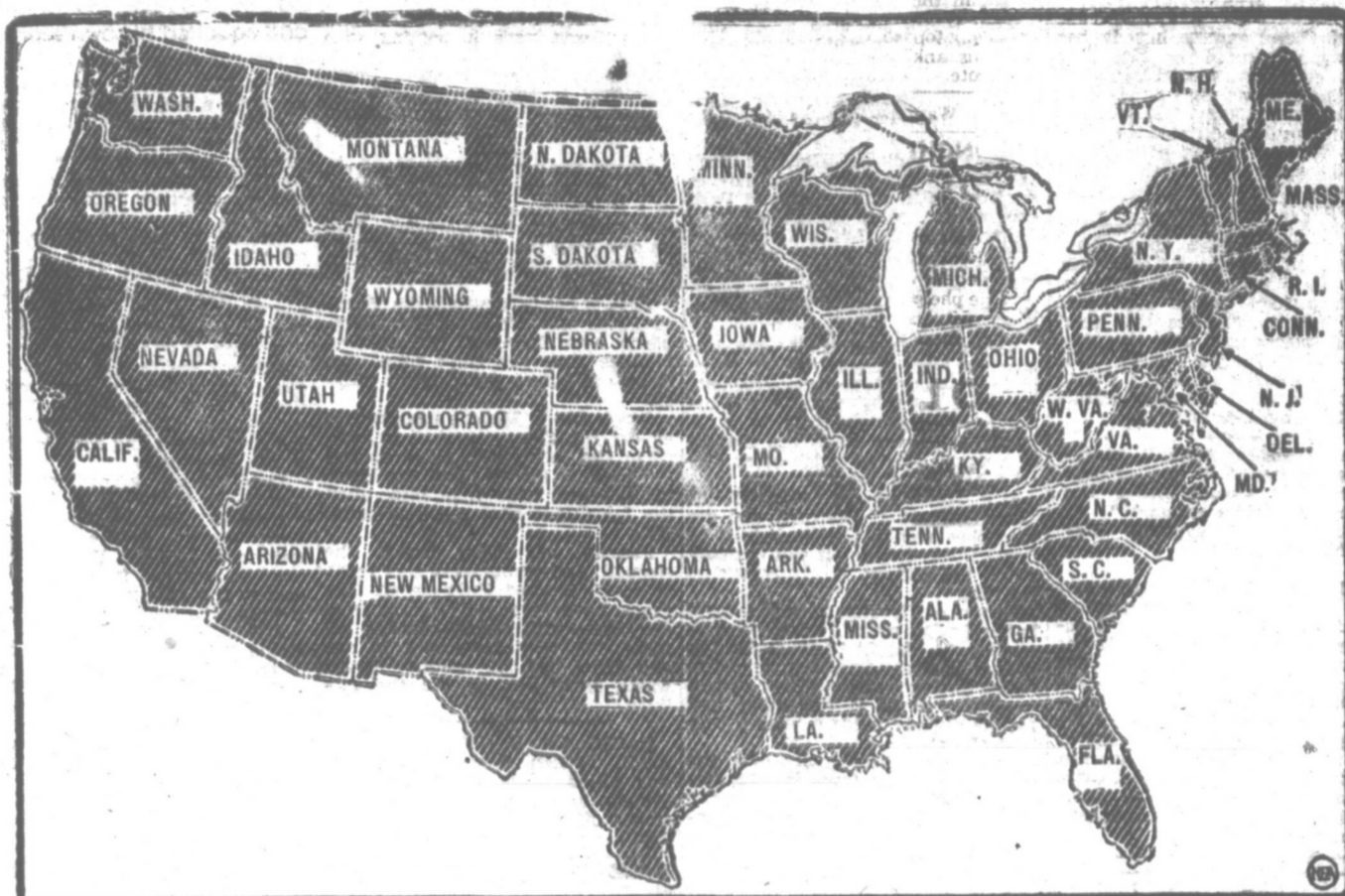

Court Upholds Land Patents

AUSTIN, Nov. 16.—(P)—Validity of land patents issued by the commissioner of the land office in 1932 were finally upheld yesterday by the state supreme court in two test cases indirectly involving approximately 25 other tracts of valuable oil property.

The state contended that the patents issued by J. H. Walker, then land commissioner, were void because the land was within five miles of commercial production. The landholders replied that the state was barred by the statute of limitations from bringing the suits and the supreme court upheld this view.

The attorney general's department said the effect of the decision would

be that the state now may not pursue the additional suits based on similar circumstances.

The court's action was to overrule the decision of the state supreme court in two test cases involving approximately 25 other tracts of valuable oil property.

The written opinion on the motion, by Chief Justice James P. Alexander, said that the applications for writs of error were refused "because we were of the opinion that the state's suits to recover the land were barred by the one-year statute of limitations."

The land immediately involved is in the Hastings field, Brazoria county.

Donnell Elected To Senate in Missouri

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Nov. 16.—(P)—Forrest C. Donnell, a solemnly republican who has the knack of making 50,000 democrats scratch their ballots so they can vote for him, apparently has succeeded Bennett Champ Clark, a democrat, in the U. S. Senate.

Donnell, more than a week after the election, and with less than 20,000 absentee ballots to count, is leading State Attorney General Roy McKittrick by 3,590 votes.

The total: Donnell, 769,875; McKittrick 766,285.

Rump Session Is Discussed With FDR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(P)—Democratic leaders in Congress discussed an abbreviated legislative program for the short session of Congress with President Roosevelt yesterday.

Afterwards they said the session could end by mid-December.

Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) reported the President offered no suggestions and had nothing to add to this program.

Renewal of the second war powers act; Passage of a postwar highway program and crop insurance law in the House;

Action on rivers and harbors and flood control legislation in the Senate.

Rayburn, Majority Leader Barkley (D-Ky.) of the Senate and Vice President Wallace met with the President in the first legislative conference of the Congress which returned to the capitol yesterday. Rayburn said "there might be one or two other little things" taken up at this session but he expects "nothing controversial."

The Senate, Barkley stated, may get to work Monday on a rivers and harbors bill which will become a vehicle for a renewed effort by Senator Aiken (R-Vt) to win approval of the St. Lawrence seaway.

Rayburn announced later the House would begin consideration of crop insurance next Tuesday. He predicted this item would pass easily, pointing out that the party platform endorsed revival of the insurance program which Congress killed last year.

The speaker said Mr. Roosevelt indicated he would like to see action completed soon on legislation creating the ranks of "admiral of the fleet" and "general of the army."

Gunners Perish in Rescue Attempt

A U. S. FORTRESS BASE IN BRITAIN, Nov. 16.—(P)—Three enlisted gunners, who stuck with a doomed Flying Fortress in an attempt to rescue a fourth, died with him when the bomber crashed and exploded, recently behind the Allied lines in France.

Other crewmen told the story. They could have taken to their parachutes along with the other six members of the crew but long ago they had told the ball turret gunner, Sgt. Edwin T. Kreisel, Jr., of Wilmington, Del., "don't worry if anything ever happens; we'll either get you out of that ball or we'll still be with you when she hits."

Kreisel was injured by flak and the ball turret was so badly damaged he could not be rescued.

The buddies who died with him were:

Sgt. John J. Burgard, Long Beach, Calif., tail gunner; Sgt. Irving E. Stewart, Moran, Ga., waist gunner, and Sgt. Elbert D. Smott, Aspermont, Texas, radio gunner.

They were buried side by side in a Canadian army cemetery.

"The friendship among those four guys was stronger than the fear of death," said Sgt. Grady H. Cooper of Chattanooga, Tenn., top turret gunner, who broke his ankle when he landed by parachute.

Pastor Says Peace Decision of Public

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 16.—(P)—"Public opinion is the court of ultimate decision in the peace of the world, and it is up to us as Christians to do our part in forming that public opinion," Dr. J. M. Dawson, pastor of the First Baptist church in Waco and chairman of the South Baptist convention committee on world peace, told approximately 3,000 Texas Baptists at yesterday's session of the Texas Baptist convention.

Dr. Dawson referred to his attendance at the Dumbarton Oaks conference, and asked if a broad guarantee of religious liberty should be deemed worthy of inclusion in the proposals. The reply was, he said, that through the functions of the economic and social council, such a fundamental freedom could receive its just treatment.

"The Christian world is substantially agreed on the provisions of a just and durable peace," Dr. Dawson asserted, citing the six pillars of peace as formulated by the federated council of churches of Christ

in America, and the six principles of peace upheld by the Baptist church.

The six pillars as determined by the church council call for a political framework for continuing collaboration of the United Nations; bringing within the scope of this unit the economic and financial acts of national governments; ability to conform to changing conditions; assurance of autonomy of subjected peoples; procedure for control of military establishments everywhere, and assurance of religious and intellectual liberty.

Principles upheld by the Baptists are those of no isolation, a demo-

cratic world organized for peace, Christian race relations universal economic opportunity, and religious liberty.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—(AP)—War Food Administrator Marvin Jones has called upon farmers for another all-out production year in 1945.

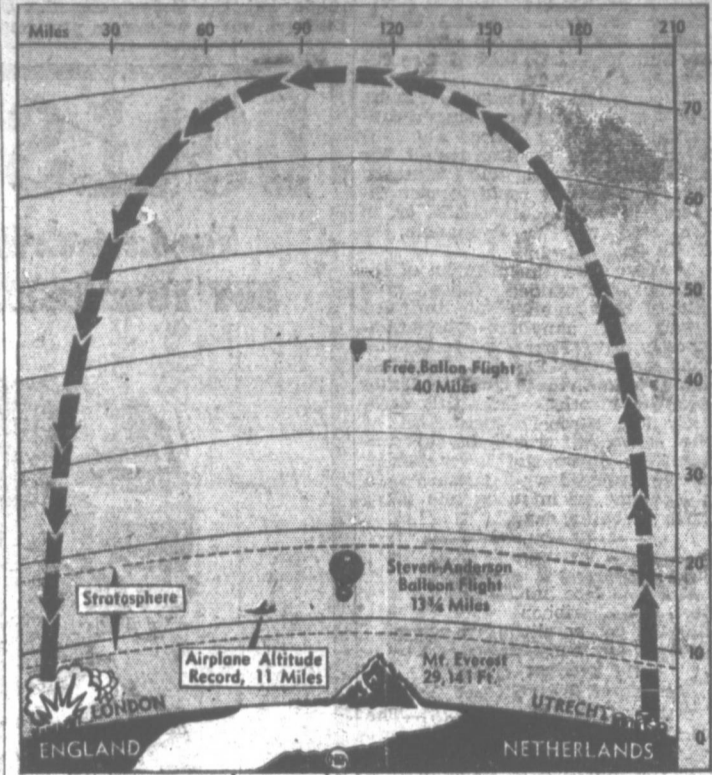
Assuming continuance of the war in Europe until next summer or next fall and consequent heavy military and kind-kinse demand, Jones set production goals closely resembling 1944's.

By MURLIN SPENCER AN ADVANCED NEW GUINEA BASE—(P)—An Alamo Scout patrol brought back the report: "We could find no trace of the missing American airmen."

Gate Problem Is Acute--Latches Do Seldom Work

Big, hospitable Texas has chronic latch trouble. Criss-crossing its expansive acres are thousands of fences. Most of the fences have gates, and most of the gates have latches. But some of these operate like erratic can openers.

Questioning of a rural mail carrier, a pre-war traveling salesman, a county home demonstration agent, a candidate for county commissioner—plus personal encounters with gates—produced this consensus:

In some counties there are as many varieties of gate latches, and most of them original, as there are gates. In some instances, the gates are hung on the latches.

Under the general heading of the shuttle-type gate latch—that's the horizontal bar that slides back and forth into a slot on the gate post—there are, conservatively, 1,000 varieties. And although a few have been found that slide up and down, they are still shuttle types.

The ingenuity of some folks in building this type latch is almost more than can be reckoned with, since I have only two hands and 10 fingers," sighed the home demonstration agent.

At the same time, the candidate declared one of the principal planks in his platform to be legislation to eliminate planks in shuttle-type gate latches.

(As a matter of fact, pressure for gate legislation has already been brought to bear in another state with wide open spaces—New Mexico. Bus drivers in the neighboring state are asking for a law which would force replacement of gates with cattleguards.)

Some Texas gates have little iron cylinders and a slot built, incidentally to fit. But a latch this easily managed is most often discovered on the other side of a gate crested with sharp palings.

Then, there is the wooden bar latch found frequently in the Brazos bottoms regions. This one is carefully whittled to the dimensions of a willow whistle, and it slides into a hole bored into the gatepost. It was the mail carrier who pointed out the great care and accurate measurement necessary in constructing this latch in order to keep the hole one-eighth of an inch smaller than the bar—which has no handle.

Too popular with the Texas gate owners is the chain. If all the chains used for gate latches were laid end to end, more gates could be opened.

Devious methods, evidence showed, have been employed by sadistic latch engineers either to make the chain so long as to tie itself endlessly in tangles around the gate—or the person trying to open it—or so short as to require interminable patience to work the last link off the hook, or the nail, or the post.

or whatever else it happens to be hung on. Familiar in the big pasture country is the most insidious of all latches. But look at the gates they are hung on—those barbed wire entanglements strung around two or more dishonest mesquite limbs. These are nothing more than a continuance of the fence, and the latch, a mere continuance of the wire. Unless a cattle guard is nearby this type barrier could forever divorce the north 40 sections, or, in the case of the Panhandle, the North Pole.

Finally, there is the realm of individual creations, those gate latches that stand alone unrivaled by similarity anywhere—where getuses have wandered and made sure that no salesman nor candidate could follow. They sprinkle Texas like the measles. Into this category fall such improvisations as the converted doorknob superimposed on upper and lower jamb; or the upside-down horseshoe with a lone shoe piler, strong and three yards of baling wire.

'Hidden Cases' Of TB Numerous

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 16—(P)—The number of "hidden cases" of tuberculosis in this country "may run up into the hundreds of thousands," a United States Public Health Service (USPHS) official said yesterday.

In an address to the 38th annual meeting of the Southern Medical Association, Dr. Herman E. Hilleboe, chief of USPHS's tuberculosis control division, said a recent survey among 750,000 adults working in war industries disclosed that 1.5 per cent showed X-ray evidence of pulmonary tuberculosis.

This percentage, he declared, bore out previous estimates of the incidence of disease among adults in the general population.

And yet, Hilleboe added, actual reported new cases of disease annually fall far below the estimated incidence, so that it is reasonable to assume that hundreds of thousands remain hidden.

Thus, he said, further development is needed in a control program aimed at a plague which kills 60,000 Americans annually.

Norwegian Unit Joins Russian Liberators

LONDON, Nov. 16—(P)—The first Norwegian detachments to return home since the ill-fated campaign have landed in Norway and are operating with the Russians against the Germans on the Arctic front.

The Norwegian exiled government announced last night. They sailed recently from a British port. Hoping for early liberation of their country, the Norwegians also sent a military mission.

The first units of Norway's police force, trained in Sweden during the past two years, are expected to arrive later this week in territory liberated by the Russians.

Mexican Advocates Expediting Tourists

ACAPULCO, Mexico, Nov. 16—(P)—A minimum of border delays for tourists to Mexico was urged by former President Emilio Portes Gil, addressing the third national hotel convention, in session here.

Portes Gil also suggested increased communications and hotel facilities as means to help bring a huge postwar tourist flow.
