

Stalin Just Loves World's Children!

International Communist leaders in Russia, who spawn new "front" organizations faster than the non-Communist western world can keep up with them, have now launched a new children's crusade. This appears to be the latest move in Moscow's present peace offensive.

Theme song of the new movement is: 1-Stalin loves children. 2-Everybody loves children. 3-Therefore everybody should love Stalin.

From this simple formula is build up the Kremlin proppaganda line that the Communists are not interested in aggression—Korea or anywhere else. What they are said to be interested in is children—their health, education, moral and cultural development, housing and food, Their line is that children of the world should be protected from maladjustment, juvenile aelinquency, child labor, immoral literature, radio and movies.

Vehicle for launching this new propaganda drive is the "International Conference for the Defense of Children," ICDC, which just closed in Vienna, Austria. Parents of this new front are the Communist-run "World Federation of Democratic Women" and the "World Federation of Trade Unions," the Communist international labor oragnization.

ICDC has been in formation since last November. It claims branches in 26 countries, but half are behind the Iron Curtain. No branch organization is listed for Russia, nor for the United States. But a few Americans have been sucked in as members of an International Patronage

Among those listed on this committee are Prof. Goodwin Watson of Columbia, Dr. Katherine Dodd, University of Cincinnati, Dr. Mary Van Kleek, formerly of Carnegie Institue, Pittsburgh.

Collective Bargaining Miserable Failure

As the readers of this column know, I have always contended moral and there: ore uneconomic and impractical. That is true because anything that is immoral cannot produce good economic re-

Collective bargaining has had such bad results as it grew and grew and grew so that the government now has control of the railroads and tried to get control of the steel plants to prevent the catastrophe that always follows a

a concession that he would not do on a voluntary basis. The result is that collective bargaining instead of doing what it claims it can do, namely raise wage levels, does exactly the opposite. It keeps wage levels down. It keeps them down because collective bargaining or labor unions never produce a nickel's worth of wealth. They have prevented billion and billions of dollars of wealth from being created. They do this by strikes, by seniority, by limiting apprentices, by featherbedding, by objecting to labor saving machinery, by setting some wages ar-bitrarily so high that what they produce costs so much that the demand is reduced and people go without. Their whole method is to interfere with natural division of labor. They thus cause long periods of unemployment and thus greatly reduce the amount of wealth produced that could be distributed.

Fallacy Of Collective Bargaining The belief in collective bargainng is based on the fallacy that industry is like gambling—that when one man gains, another man oses. The fact of the matter is that industry is not like gambling or war, and when one man produces wealth, whether he be a big industrialist or a humble laborer, he benefits everybody else in the world. Collective bargaining s based on the fallacy that there a limited amount of work to be done, and if one man has a job, somebody else is deprived of job. But when one man has a job and produces wealth, he is an employer—a customer of other workers, and wage levels are raised by a division of labor. If men did not divide labor and one man tried to produce all his own wants, he ould perish in a short time. Anything that interferes with a free and natural division of labor keeps production down and thus wage evels down. The people have been fooled into

believing in collective bargaining. It is a popular belief. No real eco-nomist, no man who believes in and understands the Golden Rule believes that collective bargaining, that attempts to bargain for others than those in the union group, can raise wage levels. They know that collective bargaining instead

of raising wage levels keeps wage But both the Republican and

Democratic parties in order to try to get into office took the popular ide and advocated collective bargaining. They were more interested in being elected than they were in getting the voters to understand the moral and thus the economic principles that raise

wage levels. Many preachers and the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, now the National Council of Churches, endorsed collective bargaining. They use emotion rather than practical, rational experiences in guiding their recomnendations.

As strikes get bigger and bigger and more reduce production, more and more people should come to understand that labor unions that practice collective bargaining are an enemy of everyone, and especially an enemy of the working man. The man who is having a hard time to make a living is the man who is hurt the most by collective bargaining, because when he has to do without something it is more of a necessity that he is obliged to do without than when the wealthy man's income is reudced.

It seems too bad of course that

people cannot have foresight and reason and see the end results of anything that retards production as does collective bargaining. But way. We have to have outstanding examples of what collective bar gaining really does to undersind it. The principle is just the same whether collective bargaining is used by a half-dozen men or a It should be evident that collect-

ive bargaining is immoral because no moral person would claim that an employer had the moral right to discharge an employee with the idea of causing the employee to lose wages. If an employer obliged to dismiss an employee it is his duty to do it in a way so that the employee loses the least possible in wages The same rule does apply to the employee. If he right to quit with the idea of reducing the production that the employer would have with steady employees. Morai ruies do not just apply to one group and not to another. They apply to everyone. The belief in collective bargaining of course is largely the result

of miseducation on the part of many newspapers,/magazines, politicians, preachers and schoolsboth public and private. I have never found a single, solitary textbook used in public schools that explained how collective bargaining keeps wage levels down. They all imply that it benefits the workers. No wonder the youth grow up to believe that we can have more by collective bargaining which stifles production.

It is to be hoped that the steel dilemma will help educate the people as to the immorality of col-lecive bargaining and the poverty

From time to time I receive letters from readers which scold me on the score that big businessmen are quoted too often in this

For those quotations I make no apology, It is a procedure which I propose to continue. When I have need of medical attention, I consult a physician; if a tooth is aching, to a dentist I go for surcease; when needing legal advice, to a lawyer; needing spiritual advice, to a minister; etc. In each case a man is selected who is an expert, who has carefully studied his particular profession and suc-cessfully practiced it.

By the same token, when business advice is needed, isn't it reasonable to consult an expert in that profession? With few exceptions, the men who are at the top of industry, banking and business didn't reach that eminence by accident—they reached the top through study, application and ability. They know the "ropes"—because they climbed up them. Therefore, on the subject of business, whose opinion could be more valuable than that of a man who speaks from a background of suc-

So, at the risk of further offending my critics, I would like to pass on part of the remarks made by Clarence B. Randall, President, Inland Steel Co., regarding the government seizure of the steel plants, in a radio address on April 1952. From here on Mr. Randall takes the floor:

. . . Harry Truman has seized the steel plants of the Nation, the private property of one million people, most of whom now hear the sound of my voice. This he has done without the slightest shadow of legal right. No law passed by the Congress gave him the power. He knows this, and speaks of general authority con-ferred upon him by the Constitution. But I say, my friends, that the Constitution was adopted by our forefathers to prevent tyranny. not to create it. When he asked the Congress for power to seize private property they said no. They gave him instead the Taft-Hartley Act which he now spurns, and the power which they denied him he now has seized The President talked of in-



a sound thumping. The WSB started out as a mild mannered youngster back in the fall of 1950 when Congress gave President Truman authority to set up machinery for controlling in flation.

The President created WSB t sit on wages and the office of price stablization to howl down prices. WSB's job then was to keep employers from raising wages too much.

At that time it had nine mem bers: Three from organized labor three from industry, and three representing the public. It soon became clear the nine didn't get along well together.

This was revealed when the Board tried to work out a formula controlling wage increases to keep them in line with living costs and prices. On Feb. 15, 1951 the Board said raises would be limited to 10 per cent. The industry and public mem

bers voted for that. Not the labor members. They walked out, ruining the Board. They thought 12 per cent should have been the lowest · limit. But labor had another complain

about the inflation machinery particularly against Defense Mo bilizer Charles E. Wilson. They said he didn't have labor people in the group around him making

After a couple of months, Truman reorganized the Board, changing it from nine to 18 members Now there were six from labor six from industry, and six repre senting the public. But this was a different kind


