WASHINGTON, June 7.—The Bretton Woods world monetary agreements were approved overwhelmingly by the house today.

LONDON, June 7.—Prime Minister Churchill told commons today that the Big Three made no secret agreements at Yalta that had not already been made public, but indicated that the discussions covered a wider field than the decisions officially announced.

UNRRA Said Focal Point of Communist Party Here

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Rep. Thomas (R-NJ) today called for a congressional investigation of UNRRA. He termed the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration "the focal point for the communist party in the United States."

Russian Defeat Is Expected in U.S., Soviet Differences

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—American-Soviet differences over the right of free discussion in a world security council headed today toward an open fight in the United Nations conference, with the prospect that Russia would be defeated.

V-E Day Created New Problem for Medical Division

IN OCCUPIED GERMANY—(P)—Cessation of the European conflict spelled the end of months of combat service for thousands of medical men in this theater but it promptly created a new medical problem.

One division alone—the Eighth Infantry—found that its medical department suddenly had acquired responsibility for:

Some 15,000 German battle casualties in 26 military hospitals; Medical and sanitation supervision of more than 200,000 prisoners of war in the division's area; Sanitary control, medical care and disease preventing among additional thousands of wandering displaced persons;

Operation of five civilian hospitals. The immense medical job literally was dumped into the lap of the department headed by Lt. Col. Robert E. Daniels of Decatur, Ind., and Asheville, N. C., when the Wehrmacht in northern Germany collapsed under the double squeeze of the Allied and red armies, leaving the Schwein sector strewn with refugees, displaced persons of all nationalities and remnants of the German army.

In order to do the job, Daniels promptly pressed into service 300 German medical officers and civilian doctors, German nurses and the captured medical personnel of several Wehrmacht divisions.

Many military hospitals already were functioning when the Eighth division overran the Schwein sector but they were swamped by the influx of casualties. Nearly 1,500 patients poured into towns by train the first two days and another 300 were brought across Schwein lake by boat.

Where to house the overflow was the first problem confronting Maj. Pete C. Rumore, division artillery surgeon who was placed in charge of all military hospitals in the sector. The surgeon, from Brooklyn and Effingham, Ill., started brooking buildings right and left.

Then with a medical staff composed of only 15 enlisted men headed by Capt. David Rosenberg, Port Chester, N. Y., Rumore did what would have been considered impossible in a civilian hospital—he set up hospital facilities which handled a daily turnover of more than 5,000 patients during the first days.

Osaka, the nation's most important industrial producer, within a month.

High explosive bombs centered on the Osaka arsenal sent Japanese scurrying to air raid shelters before other fire-bombing B-29s started new blazes burning in the industrial section where more than 11 square miles were blackened in previous strikes. A Japanese communiqué said that blazes started in the daylight attack were being "steadily brought under control."

Heavy overcast prevented American bombardiers from observing results of their attack, a departure from recent all-incidentary raids.

The Osaka arsenal is one of Nippon's most important producers of medium artillery and small arms. It lies next to Osaka castle, 16th century seat of the Japanese government and more recently headquarters of Japan's fourth army division.

Osaka is only 750 miles northeast of the Naha airdrome, one of the first Japanese built fields the Americans have ever captured. It was captured by the Sixth division who found it overgrown with grass, littered with the wreckage of some 70 enemy planes, and pock-marked by great craters.

Engineers immediately began putting both the field and Naha harbor, the best port in the Ryukyu islands, into shape for American use.

In the suit which it filed in federal district court, Humble referred to the national labor relations board order which directed the company to place a maintenance of membership clause in its contract with the union as: "A bald effort of the board to legislate into general effect a policy the board thought socially or otherwise desirable or expedient."

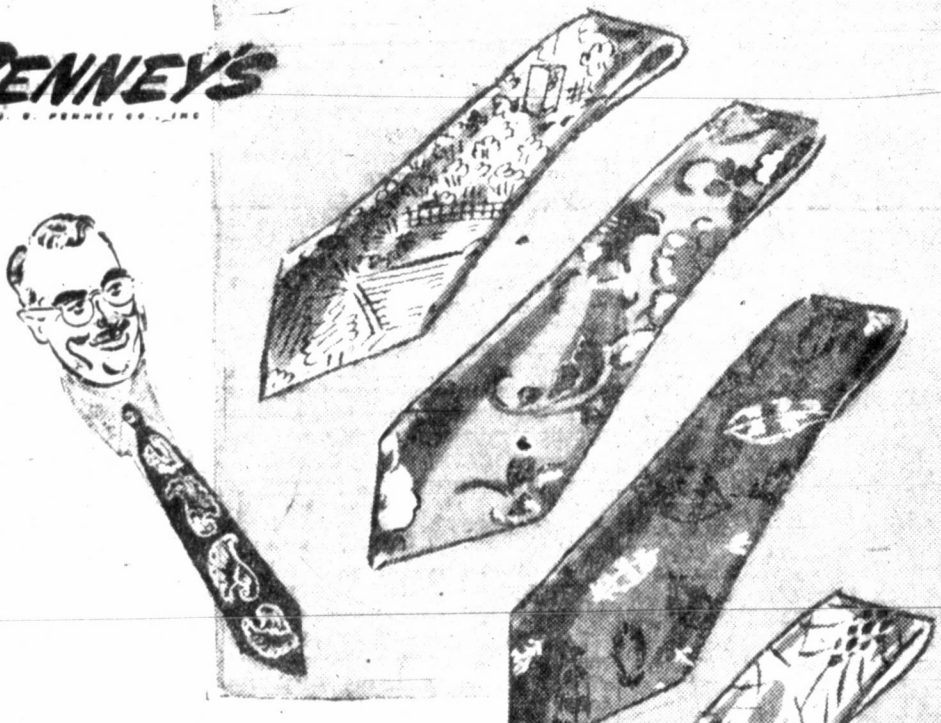

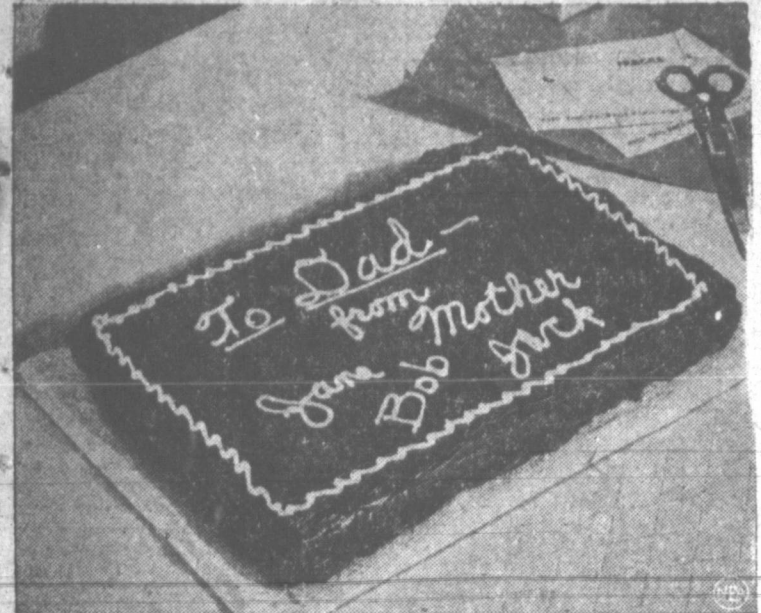

Chocolate Cake for Father's Day

Men like chocolate—fathers expect it. So your June 17 Father's Day treat is no problem. And here's a rich, dark, wonderful new cocoa devil's food cake.

Cocoa Devil's Food Cake
Preparations: Have shortening at room temperature. Grease pans, line bottoms with waxed paper, and grease again. Use two 9-inch layer pans, or use a 13x9x2-inch pan. Start oven for moderate heat (350 degrees F.). Sift flour once before measuring.

Measurements: Measure into sifter: 2 cups sifted cake flour, 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 cup breakfast or Dutch-process cocoa, 1 1/2 cups sugar.

Measure into bowl: 1/2 cup vegetable shortening, 1/2 cup water, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Have ready: 3 eggs, unbeat; 1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk. (To sour fresh milk, add 2 teaspoons vinegar or lemon juice to 1 1/2 cup milk; let stand in warm place for a few minutes.)

To mix the easy way: Mix or stir shortening just to soften. Sift in dry ingredients. Add water with vanilla and the eggs. Mix until flour is dampened; then beat 1 minute. Add sour milk, blend and beat 2 minutes longer. (Count only actual beating time. Or count beating strokes. Allow at least 100 full strokes per minute. Scrape bowl and spoon or beater often.)

Baking: Turn batter into pans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 30 to 35 minutes for layers, or about 45 minutes for sheet cake. Cover tops and sides with your favorite chocolate frosting. Inscribe names of father's adoring family with vanilla confectioner's sugar frosting, using pastry or paper tube.

Note: Mix cake by hand or at low speed of electric mixer. You may substitute 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, firmly packed, for granulated sugar in above recipe. Add to shortening after sifting in dry ingredients, forcing through sieve to remove lumps, if necessary.

British Food Rationing Is Flexible and Effective, Strict Enforcement

British rationing, because of its inclusiveness and strict enforcement, is highly effective. The British ministry of food, in cooperation with other government agencies, controls major food products from the time they leave the farm or the foreign country that produces them.

That's the report of Annette M. Snapper, director of consumer research for Fabst Co. who has just returned from her second tour of the British Isles, sponsored by the British ministry of information.

Meat Owned by Ministry
"Food manufacturing, processing, transport and distribution are all controlled," Miss Snapper adds. "However, there are degrees of control. All meat is owned by the ministry until it reaches the retailer, and all imported wheat and flour are ministry property. But British wheat remains privately owned. Fresh fish is also privately owned, but distribution is regulated. Bread and potatoes are not rationed."

"Depending on the season, adults are allowed between two and four pounds of meat a week," Miss Snapper says. "Children under 5 get seven pounds, expectant mothers seven pounds of priority milk and seven pounds of non-priority milk. Unlike the American abundant supply, eggs are scarce but all infants between 6 and 18 months old get three a week. Whenever a retailer receives oranges, for the first five days he sells them only for children and expectant mothers."

"If you take your meals in restaurants and hotels," Miss Snapper explains, "the limit is three courses. Five shillings (about a dollar) is the top price for a restaurant meal, except for places which are permitted to add a cover charge. In so-called 'British restaurants' 20 cents will get you beef stew, carrots, potatoes, apple turnover and coffee. London restaurants close at midnight—at 11 p.m. everywhere else in Britain."

Must Register
"They ration practically everything, including candy," Miss Snapper reports. "For basic foods like sugar and meat, the consumer has to register with a particular retailer, the retailer with a particular wholesaler. But for canned goods, dried fruits and vegetables and other things you can shop around."

"Farmers are protected, too," this trained observer adds. "They not only know what and how much to grow. They know there will be a market for their produce."

First Women Eligible For Military Crews

WASHINGTON, June 7—(AP)—Eighty Wave officers designated as naval air navigators are the first women in American history eligible to serve in military flight crews.

Subjected to the same rigorous training given men selected for similar assignments, the Waves will wear regulation navy navigator wings.

While trained primarily to replace male navigators assigned to sea duty, the women officers already have proved their versatility in every phase of air navigation, the navy said, and are functioning now as navigational instructors.

In addition, they will serve as trans-ocean navigators in theaters where Waves may be assigned to duty. This will permit them to join crews flying to such points as Hawaii and the Aleutians.

The Wave navigators were trained at schools in Hollywood, Fla., and Shawnee, Okla.

Spring Rhubarb, Honey Are Tasty

Spring rhubarb and spring greens are brightening home menus these days. Honey seems to have a natural affinity for rhubarb, so try one of these simple recipes.

Baked Rhubarb

Rhubarb Brown Betty

Two cups bread crumbs, 3 cups rhubarb, cut in 1/2-inch pieces, 1/2 cup honey, 1-4 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 3 tablespoons butter or fortified margarine.

Mix 1/2 of the bread crumbs and 1/2 fruit and place in a deep baking dish. Bring honey and water to a boil. Pour over bread and fruit mixture. Sprinkle remainder of crumbs over this. Sprinkle with nutmeg and dot with fat. Arrange the rest of the fruit so that each serving will have one or more pieces of fruit on top. Bake in moderate oven (315 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes.

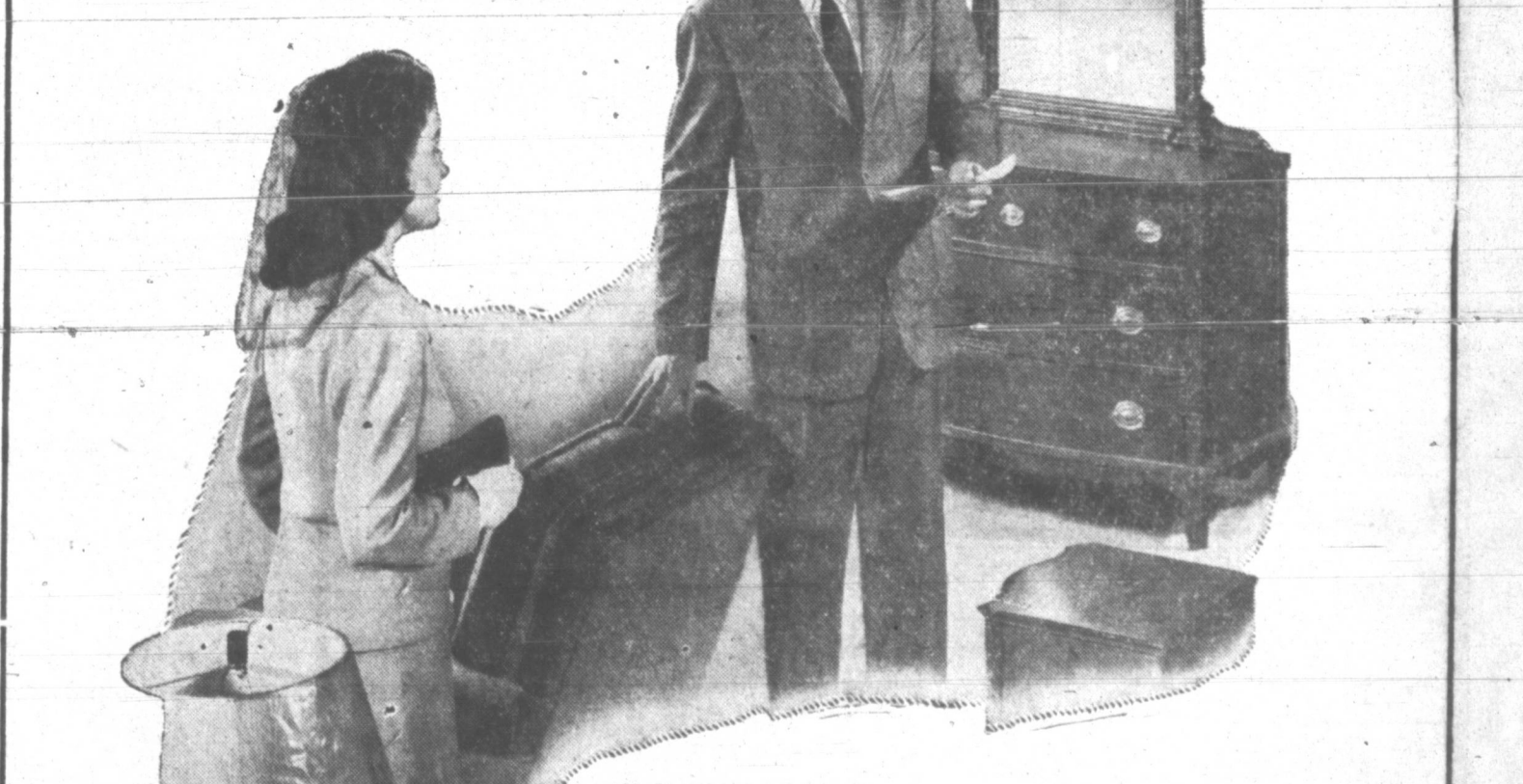

V-E Day Created New Problem for Medical Division

IN OCCUPIED GERMANY—(AP)—Cessation of the European conflict spelled the end of months of combat service for thousands of medical men in this theater but it promptly created a new medical problem.

Civilian division alone—the Eighth Infantry—found that its medical department suddenly had acquired responsibility for:

- Some 15,000 German battle casualties in 26 military hospitals;
- Medical and sanitation supervision of more than 200,000 prisoners of war in the division's area;
- Sanitary control, medical care and disease preventing among additional thousands of wandering displaced persons;
- Operation of five civilian hospitals.

The immense medical job literally was dumped into the lap of the department headed by Lt. Col. Robert E. Daniels of Decatur, Ind., and Asheville, N. C., when the wehrmacht in northern Germany collapsed under the double squeeze of the Allied and red armies, leaving the Schwein sector strewn with refugees, displaced persons of all nationalities and remnants of the German army.

In order to do the job, Daniels promptly pressed into service 300 German medical officers and civilian doctors, German nurses and the captured medical personnel of several wehrmacht divisions.

Many military hospitals already were functioning when the Eighth division overran the Schwein sector but they were swamped by the influx of casualties. Nearly 1,500 patients poured into town by train the first two days and another 500 were brought across Schwein lake by boat.

Where to house the overflow was the first problem confronting Maj. Pete C. Rumore, division artillery surgeon who was placed in charge of all military hospitals in the sector. The surgeon, from Brooklyn and Effingham, Ill., started grabbing buildings right and left.

Then with a medical staff composed of only 15 enlisted men headed by Capt. David Rosenberg, Port Chester, N. Y., Rumore did what would have been considered impossible in a civilian hospital—he set up hospital facilities which handled a daily turnover of more than 5,000 patients during the first days.

Osaka, the nation's most important industrial producer, within a month. High explosive bombs centered on the Osaka arsenal sent Japanese scurrying to air raid shelters before other fire-bombing B-29s started new blazes burning in the industrial section where more than 11 square miles were blackened in previous strikes. A Japanese communiqué said that blazes started in the daylight attack were being "steadily brought under control."

Heavy overcast prevented American bombardiers from observing results of their attack, a departure from recent all-incendiary raids.

The Osaka arsenal is one of Nippon's most important producers of medium artillery and small arms. It lies next to Osaka castle, 16th century seat of the Japanese government and more recently headquarters of Japan's fourth army division.

Osaka is only 750 miles northeast of the Naha airdrome, one of the first Japanese built fields the Americans have ever captured. It was overrun Wednesday by Marines of the Sixth division who found it overgrown with grass, littered with the wreckage of some 70 enemy planes, and pock-marked by great craters.

Engineers immediately began putting both the field and Naha harbor, the best port in the Ryukyu islands, into shape for American use.

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Chocolate Cake for Father's Day

Men like chocolate—fathers expect it. So your June 17 Father's Day treat is no problem. And here's a rich, dark, wonderful new cocoa devil's food cake.

Cocoa Devil's Food Cake
Preparations: Have shortening at room temperature. Grease pans, line bottoms with waxed paper, and grease again. Use two 9-inch layer pans, or use a 13x9x2-inch pan. Start oven for moderate heat (350 degrees F.). Sift flour once before measuring.

Measurements: Measure into sifter: 2 cups sifted cake flour, 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 cup breakfast or Dutch-process cocoa, 1 1/2 cups sugar.

Measure into bowl: 1/2 cup vegetable shortening, 1/2 cup water, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Have ready: 3 eggs, unbeaten; 1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk. (To sour fresh milk, add 2 teaspoons vinegar or lemon juice to 1/2 cup milk; let stand in warm place for a few minutes.)

To mix the easy way: Mix or stir shortening just to soften. Sift in dry ingredients. Add water with vanilla and the eggs. Mix until all flour is dampened; then beat 1 minute. Add sour milk, blend and beat 2 minutes longer. (Count only actual beating time. Or count beating strokes. Allow at least 100 full strokes per minute. Scrape bowl and spoon or beater often.)

Baking: Turn batter into pans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 30 to 35 minutes for layers, or about 45 minutes for sheet cake. Cover tops and sides with your favorite chocolate frosting. Inscribe names of father's adoring family with vanilla confectioner's sugar frosting, using pastry or paper tube.

Note: Mix cake by hand or at low speed of electric mixer. You require substitute 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, firmly packed, for granulated sugar in above recipe. Add to shortening after sifting in dry ingredients, forcing through sieve to remove lumps, if necessary.

British Food Rationing Is Flexible And Effective, Strict Enforcement

British rationing, because of its inclusiveness and strict enforcement, is highly effective. The British ministry of food, in cooperation with other government agencies, controls major food products from the time they leave the farm or the foreign country that produces them.

That's the report of Annette M. Shapper, director of consumer research for Fabst Co. who has just returned from her second tour of the British Isles, sponsored by the British ministry of information.

Meat Owned by Ministry
"Food manufacturing, processing, transport and distribution are all controlled," Miss Snapper adds. "However, there are degrees of control. All meat is owned by the ministry until it reaches the retailer, and all imported wheat and flour are ministry property. But British wheat remains privately owned. Fresh fish is also privately owned, but distribution is regulated. Bread and potatoes are not rationed."

"Depending on the season, adults are allowed between two and four pounds of milk a week," Miss Snapper says. "Children under 5 get seven pints, expectant mothers seven pints of priority milk and seven pints of non-priority milk. Unlike the American abundant supply, eggs are scarce, but all infants between 6 and 18 months old get three a week. Whenever a retailer receives oranges, for the first five days he sells them only for children and expectant mothers."

"If you take your meals in restaurants and hotels," Miss Snapper explains, "the limit is three ounces. Five shillings (about a dollar) is the top price for a restaurant meal, except for places with big overhead expenses, which are permitted to add a cover charge. In so-called 'British restaurants' 20 cents will get you beef stew, carrots, potatoes, apple turnover and coffee. London restaurants close at midnight—at 11 p.m. everywhere else in Britain."

Must Register
"They ration practically everything, including candy," Miss Snapper reports. "For basic foods like sugar and meat, the consumer has to register with a particular retailer, the retailer with a particular wholesaler. But for canned goods, dried fruits and vegetables and other things you can shop around."

"Farmers are protected, too," this trained observer adds. "They not only know what and how much to grow. They know there will be a market for their produce."

Sprinkle with nutmeg and dot with fat. Arrange the rest of the fruit so that each serving will have one or more pieces of fruit on top. Bake in moderate oven (315 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes.

Rhubarb Sauce
Three cups rhubarb, 1 cup honey, 1 tablespoon grated rind of orange. Wash rhubarb. If tender, do not peel. Cut in 1/2-inch pieces. Place in saucepan with just enough water to keep it from burning. Cook until soft. Add honey and grated rind of orange.

Court Rules Solar Time Counts Here

HOUSTON, June 7.—(AP)—Your gran'pa, who used to take a squint at the sun and allow it was quitting time was right as a fox.

The supreme court has upheld that solar time is the time to be followed in Texas. And yesterday the corporation court of Houston upheld both gran'pa and the supreme court.

marine warfare. Actually, the
Swordfish made a sort of trial and
error journey, but the quiet-spoken
Smith brought his boat back with
spectacular success.

It was the night of his initial
patrol that the first Japanese ship
to be sunk in the Pacific by subma-
rine wallowed into periscope view.
As Smith dived to escape detection
after morally wounding the
enemy vessels chains clanked
against her hull. Skipper and crew
held their breath, waiting for a
mine to explode, but the Swordfish
moved on.

The Swordfish took her depth
charging during an approach on an
enemy convoy. Smith had brought
a heavily-loaded freighter into range
and slammed two torpedoes amid-

ships. The ship caught fire and was
burning furiously as a Japanese des-
troyer raced up. Skipper Smith took
his boat into a dive and the first
depth charging of an American sub-
marine in the Pacific began. Char-
acters roared out. Clanging like a giant's
hammer against the sides of the
Swordfish as other vessels joined
the search.

"It was an uncomfortable feel-
ing to be lying on the bottom with
vessels on the hunt for us," Smith
noted.

Next on the roster of enemy ac-
tion was a batch of aerial bombs
rained down by a snooping Japanese
patrol plane. It was a bad moment
for the Swordfish. Each time she
was brought to the surface the plane
hovered overhead. Finally Smith
reasoned that his boat must be
leaking oil and leaving a betraying
surface slick. That night, not dar-
ing to show a light in the search,
crewmen located a tiny leak on the
deck. They found it by smell, crawl-
ing along in the murky, tropical
darkness, and repaired it not far
from where enemy patrol ships
swarmed in a vain hunt for the
submarine.

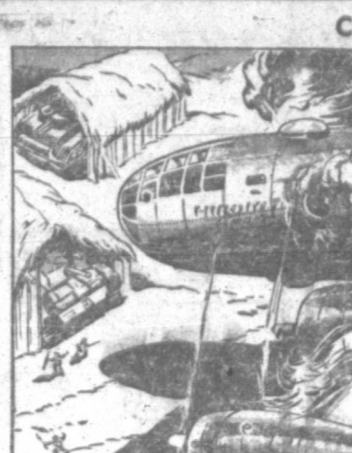



Sub Commander Shows 'Certain' Suicide Not So

PEARL HARBOR, June 7.—(AP)—Every submariner knows that you can't put a lone submarine up against an escorted convoy in an attack on the surface and get away with it. It is certain suicide.
But Commander Lawson P. Ramage did it, sank four Japanese ships, and got away without a scratch.
That's why commander Ramage of New London, Conn., holds the congressional Medal of Honor and one of his war patrol ranks as one of the greatest feats ever performed by an American submarine.
The submarine was the Parche, and she had the Japanese crazy. She fired 19 torpedoes in 46 minutes and she scored 15 hits in what the navy is pleased to call a "brilliant night surface attack."

Senae Has Vast Powers in Regard To World League

U. S. senate—like a ghost from an old play—hovers over the United Nations conference at San Francisco.
No matter what kind of league of nations is formed at San Francisco, this country can't join it until the senate approves.
When it comes time for us to join, two-thirds of the senate must approve. One third of the senators, plus one, could keep us out.
There are 96 senators. Two-thirds of them, if all were present and voting, would be 64. One-third, plus one, would be 33.
On voting day probably not all 96 will be present. Just the same, two-thirds of those present and voting must vote "yes" for us to join.
That two-thirds rule was the bedrock on which our chance of joining the old League of Nations was broken and destroyed.
That rule gives the senate terrific power, so much so that even though the majority of the American people wanted this country to join the new league, a handful of senators—one-third, plus one—could keep us out.
There has been strenuous agitation in the past two years to abolish that two-thirds rule.
Some congressmen wanted a simple majority vote of both houses—the senate and house of representatives—to be all that was necessary to ratify a treaty.
The senate is still in the saddle.

Final Italian Drive Is Thrilling for Veteran General

By GEORGE TUCKER
 PARIS—(AP)—For a man who has traveled across oceans in submarines on secret diplomatic missions, captured Italy and lived on goat stew for 20 months, Mark Wayne Clark is perhaps the healthiest and youngest looking combat general in the United States army. He wore out his aides and most of his staff officers in three days in Paris.

"It's the first time I've seen it in 27 years," he said as he paused here briefly on his way to the United States.

The four stars on his shoulder have added neither weight nor cares although there have been many moments in the last 20 months that would have made most men grow gray with anxiety.

One of those moments was the fourth day at Salerno when the Germans drove between the American and British corps and almost reached the beaches.

"They got between the Americans and the British except by water," he said.

Another time was the Germans' second great attempt to liquidate Anzio. At the time there were many official details that the beachhead was jeopardized, but the situation was so tense that even cooks and drivers were fed into the lines in an effort to stop the German steamroller. Those were the days when the Americans paid a bitter price in blood for the toe-hold south of Rome.

Clark almost lost his life while making a run to the beachhead in a torpedo boat when an American destroyer mistook it for a German boat and opened fire. The destroyer scored a near miss and two of Clark's boat crew were wounded. Shell fragments missed the general by inches.

Like General Patton and Marshal Montgomery, Clark has a tremendous pride in achievement. Like them he has some natural vanity and appreciation for recognition. His Fifth Army, when it was racing side by side with the Eighth Army up through Italy was his pride. There actually was a tremendous race for home and Clark won.

Clark said the greatest thrill was the final drive in Italy with the Italians, Indians, Poles, New Zealanders, Palestinian Brigade, South

Hero of the War In the Pacific--Submarine 'X'

By MURLIN SPENCER

PEARL HARBOR, June 7—(AP)—It was 4:35 p.m. when Commander L. D. McGregor and the men of the submarine "X" opened fire on the big Japanese carrier and in 15 minutes they sent her to the bottom of the Pacific.

That brief, courageous action broke the hearts of the imperial Japanese navy because when McGregor, the daring, sandy-haired submariner from Annapolis, Md., sent the heavily loaded warship down he knocked a vital piece out of the enemy's rapidly weakening naval machine.

The action was swift. McGregor told the story this way:

"Commenced firing (torpedoes). First torpedo hit causing the target to stop and to commence burning aft. The target opened fire just prior to being hit, with all guns on the starboard side.

"Carrier continues to fire all starboard guns, its escorting destroyers are making dropping depth charges indiscriminately.

"Carrier still burning. Torpedo hit carrier. The sharp crash of the torpedo explosion was followed instantly by thundering explosions, apparently from magazine and gasoline storage. Huge clouds of smoke, flames and debris burst into the air completely enveloping the carrier. When executive officer looked several seconds later he still could not see the ship due to the smoke."

And nine minutes later when McGregor swept the seas with his periscope he could see only the escorting destroyers. The carrier, her decks loaded with airplanes, and carrying hundreds of men of the Japanese navy, had gone to the bottom.

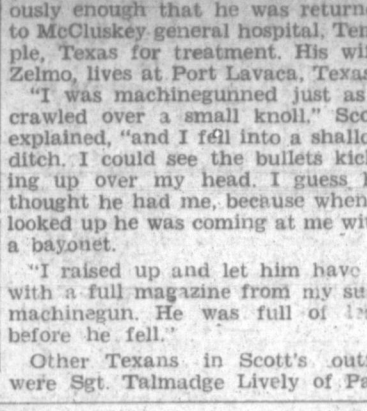

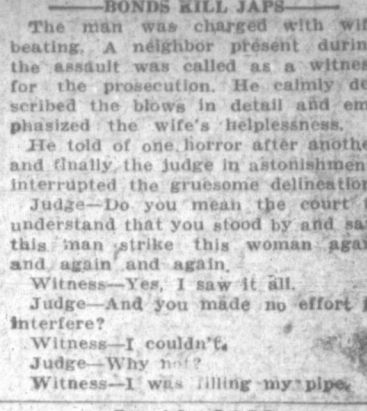

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Yankees May Lose Stirnweiss, Lindell, Zuber to Army



Mark Christman Will Return To Brown Third Sack Position

Draft board calls threaten to cripple the New York Yankees today as Cleveland and the St. Louis Browns regain key men and the Boston Red Sox begin to act like power contenders.

Center Fielder Pohony Lindell and Second Baseman George Stirnweiss of the leading Yanks are due to take pre-induction physicals today along with Pitcher Bill Zuber in New York City.

Loss of either Lindell or Stirnweiss would throw the American league race into a wide open scramble and could make the Yanks a third or fourth place club.

News that Third Baseman Mark Christman was to rejoin the champion Browns on a full time basis and the signing by Cleveland of Outfielder Jeff Heath served to boost the chances of both clubs.

Boston is the real surprise of the month, moving into a virtual three-way tie for third place only three and one-half games behind New York on the strength of Pitcher Dave Ferriss.

When the army air force dischargee joined the Red Sox, the club had just won its first game after losing its first eight starts. Manager Joe Cronin had broken his leg at the Yankee stadium a few days earlier and the hub fortunes were at a low ebb with the Sox flourishing in the basement.

After a doubleheader triumph over Philadelphia yesterday in which Ferriss hung up his eighth successive triumph, Boston was finally above the 500 mark with a 21-20 record only two and one percentage points behind the Browns and White Sox, respectively.

Ferriss was not at his best against the A's, yielding 14 hits but he left 14 runners stranded in copping number eight by a 5-2 margin. The nightcap was capped by Boston, 3-2, Red Barrett turned in a fine job of relief pitching.

Dutch Leonard stopped the Yankees cold with four singles and drove home two scores with a perfect three-for-three night at bat to win 4-0 in a night game at Washington.

Detroit picked up a full game on New York to trail by one and one-half as Stubby Overmire won his fourth straight in trimming Cleveland, 6-1.

Orval Grove shut the door on the St. Louis Browns, 4-0, although the Chicago Sox got only six hits off Slig Jakucki and Weldon West.

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Girl Disguises Her Sex in Order To Kill Japanese

By JAMES HUTCHESON
WITH THE 38TH DIVISION ON LUZON — (AP) — Marita — All 110 pounds of her—had been carrying supplies to American troops in the Sierra Madre mountains for two months before an officer discovered her masquerade.

Then Lt. Anthony Canceledosi of Nutley, N. J., the 38th division's civil affairs officer, uncovered the story of how this 18-year-old girl, inspired by a consuming hatred of the enemy, plodded up mountain trails daily with burdens of half her own weight and how she had become Maritina's most vindictive Japanese killer.

Filipino men and boys, who find it difficult to keep up to her on the trail, tell of the unrelenting snipers who were harassing the "human pack train" in the hills. An American patrol went after them. But while the soldiers were advancing slowly, Marita spotted the two snipers and killed them both with her rifle. In all, she says shyly, she has killed seven.

Canceledosi first became suspicious of the sex of the barefooted, trousers-clad girl when he noticed her long fingers as she reached out for her week's pay. A battered cap covered her close-cut hair.

Marita, he found, a poorly educated and speaks very little English. But in her heart is a hatred of the Japanese that gives her strength and courage.

Hadn't the Japanese burned down the home of her family of 10? Hadn't one of the devils from Nippon taken her to headquarters for questioning and stabbed her when she resisted his advances? She still remembers all too clearly how she escaped by jumping through a window and vanishing into the night.

Marita started her treks into the mountains two years ago when her father, Nicanor Martin, became too ill to continue carrying supplies by night to guerrillas.

Now, for the hardest of the jobs Filipinos are doing to help American troops, she gets the equivalent of 87½ cents a day, as do the men beside whom she plods. But Marita does more for the doughboys. During the noon hour rest, she washes their clothes in mountain streams. When she starts homeward late in the day, she takes more G.I. clothes with her.

Marita may not have much of the knowledge that comes from books, but she knows her firearms. She says she has fired carbines, the grand rifle and a tommygun and has thrown grenades.

When Lieutenant Canceledosi discovered Marita was a girl, he told her he would have to discharge her as a carrier. She insisted she was strong and pleaded for a chance to continue. He offered her other work under the civil affairs unit at the same pay. She said the pay meant nothing to her; she wanted to do the job that would help most.

So when the rains come, and carriers become an even more vital means of getting supplies to troops up front, stocky, determined Little Marita will probably be in the line of raggedly clad figures plodding upward with their burdens.

BONDS KILL JAPS
Least Nazified Pay for Crimes
WITH AMERICAN TROOPS EN ROUTE BACK TO PARIS.—(AP)—It is one of the war's odd quirks that the least nazified section of Germany suffered the heaviest battle damage.

This is the Rhineland and Ruhr area where the Catholic population showed less enthusiasm for Adolf Hitler's new order than perhaps any other part of the reich. But because it was situated unfortunately from a geographic viewpoint, this zone carries the longest lasting combat scars.

Driving back from the front lines you pass through peaceful village after village where practically every house stands intact and only an occasional bomb crater or shell hole mark the land. Once you get well beyond the Rhine traveling westward, however, you enter a desolate arena of ruin.

The two largest wrecked cities are Juelich and Dueren. Few populated centers in the history of the world can compare in destruction to these modern Carthages.

These are the ghost towns of modern Germany. It is hard to imagine how they ever can be resurrected. Their inhabitants have not returned for there is nothing to return to. They are cities in name only. They have no food, water, light or shelter. The rain falls on them and the wind blows through them and nothing stirs. Even the dogs have forsaken them.

In Dueren a statue of Bismarck, Germany's great 19th century statesman, still stands half twisted on its stone pedestal facing toward France. The statue has been put to work for the Allies. Across the bronze shoulder are strung

a half-dozen strands of military field wire.

As you drive through these lost cities you smell strongly the stench of scores of long dead bodies caught beneath falling debris. Their homes have become their tombs. It will be months or years before they are dug out.

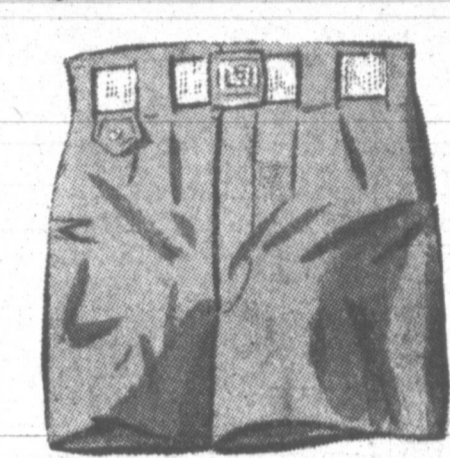

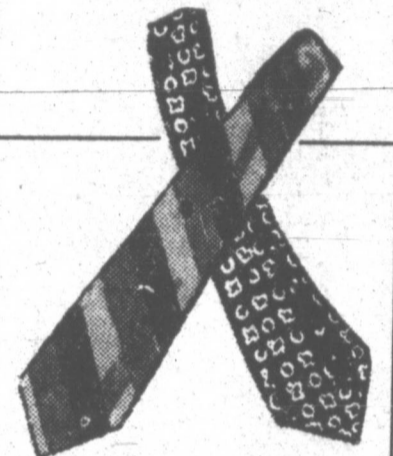

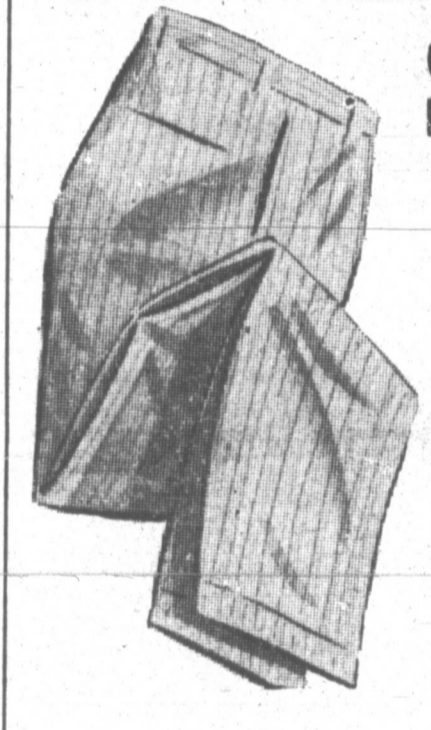
