### Amelia Anthony, Founder Of Girlstown, Is Guest Speaker at Miami Silver Tea

Miami (Special) - One can well understand why the designation, a woman with a mission, has been applied to Amelia Anthony, founder of Girlstown, when one hears her speak. Miss Anthony, founder of the one and only Girlstown, addressed a group of women in the First Christian church here recently.

A Silver Tea, sponsored by women of the churches, honored Miss Anthony, and the proceeds from the tea were given as a benefit for her project, Mrs. Harvey Landrum registered the guests, and Miss F. S. Parker, Dan Graham, Elmo Gill and R.E. Thompson greeted the ladies as they arrived and served punch and cookies in the vestibule of the church. A prelude of organ music was played by Miss Barbara Loper.

"Girlstown," said the speaker, "is now in its fourth year, having been founded March 13, 1949, at Buffalo Gap, Texas. Three months later, 1,425 fertile acres, near Whiteface, Texas, were dedicated to the home, so it was moved southwest of Lubbock." Started with her own personal savings, Miss Anthony said that the home is maintained entirely by individual contributions.

There are more than 530 Boy-Girl towns projects in America, but Girlstown is the only project of its kind in the world. There are now 42 girls in the home.

"Our goal," said Miss Anthony, "is to have 500, by 1959. This can only be accomplished by awakening people who love girls, so they will give their financial and material support to the home."

"There is never a day," she continued, "that we do not have applications for entrance. We have had more than 900 applications. Entrance is based on the greatest need."

Miss Anthony said, "Our aim is to give homeless girls love, security and an equal opportunity for education and complete religious liberty, which will restore the old-fashioned ideals of democracy. We have only two tools to work with, faith and truth. Our motto in the home is the Golden Rule, 'Do unto others as you would have others do unto you.'"



Mrs. Hubert Keahey, dressmaker, demonstrated proper fitting of garments at the Bell Home Demonstration Club's recent meeting in the home of Mrs. Hubert Keahey. The pattern should be altered before the material is cut," Miss Keahey explained, "and this will be the clothing a professional always cut with the grain. The material for a good fit-cut material will not hang correctly, it will wrinkle and sag places.

Both sides should be the same appearance. Padding should be placed where it is needed, or ample if one shoulder is lower than the other. Irregular lines should be altered in patterns to the person. To set the pattern to adjust it where wrinkles do not fall in a place that is becoming to the garment.

"There are some minerals in whole grains and black molasses. The whole wheat flour has six times as many vitamins as un-enriched white flour, and five times as much iron. Brown rice is wholesome. Wheat is the oldest grain known and was called corn in old Bible times. Miss Dunlap cooked whole wheat muffins at the meeting as a part of her demonstration.

# Oilers Even Hub Series With 16-2 Win

## Baldwin Nominated To Tonight's Tilt

The Pampa Oilers turned in their fourth victory of the season yesterday afternoon with a rousing 16-2 victory over the Lubbock Hubbers. And the winning pitcher, Max Molberg, has accounted for three of those four victories. Yesterday, he handiuffed the visitors in front of the very fine fielding support which turned in three twin-kills for the second straight game.

Tonight the two clubs move to Lubbock to continue the series. Manager Jake Phillips has picked curveballer Clyde Baldwin to start the six-game road trip for the Oilers. Lubbock Manager I. B. Palmer could name no starter due to the overwork his staff has seen.

The Oilers started right off from the bottom of the first and scored clusters in each of the first six innings. Palmer finally took the mound—as the third Hubber hurler and had the greatest success, giving up but one run and three hits in the last three innings.

**Visitors' Runs**  
The visitors picked up their runs in the second and eighth, only one run being earned. In the second Palmer opened with an infield single behind second and moved to third as Bill Metzger flopped a hit in short right. The hubs then put on the double steal, and as the Oilers got Metzger in a run down, Palmer scored. But Metzger escaped the trap when Sudol threw the ball into left field. Metzger taking third. But he expired there as Ed Kennan fanned and Chuck Nelson bounced out.

In the eighth, Jess Jacinto was safe on an error by Auerbach and went to second on a single by Mike Pontarelli and scored on a single through the box by Palmer.

Auerbach opened the game for the Oilers by walking. After Woltd and Temes had bounced out, Phillips doubled off the leftfield fence to plate Auerbach. A single by Sudol scored Phillips with the second run. Don Moore followed with another single, but Frank Salo bounced out to end the inning.

In the second, with one out, pitcher Molberg walked. Auerbach singled him to second and Deck Woltd singled him home. Auerbach moving to third. Temes flew out. Auerbach scoring after the catch. Woltd then stole second and scored on a single to center by Phillips. A double to right by Sudol scored Phillips with run number six. Moore bounced out to end the frame.

In the third, pitcher with one out, Rizzo beat out a bunt and went to second when the third baseman threw the ball past the first sacker. Molberg singled the runner to third and Auerbach walked to load the bases. Woltd also worked down. McDonald pitched for a walk to force Rizzo home. Temes then socked a bases-clearing double off the centerfield fence and took third when the centerfielder dropped the ball while trying to throw into the infield.

Here Dick Leeder came in to pitch for the Hubbers and was greeted with a single to left by Phillips to score Temes. That ended the scoring for the inning as Sudol popped out and Moore forced Phillips.

# News Showers Are Plentiful During April

WASHINGTON — (AP) — An April shower of news had the world hip-deep for 30 days in a sea of words about war and peace, natural and man-made destruction and, of course, politics.

The cloudburst was so heavy that the Columbia Broadcasting System, for example, reported it put on more special news programs than in any month since the end of World War II. Possibly in the United States the big news was steel, backbone of production and, hence, the nation's others did, too.

Defenses and future. An industry wide strike was impending April 1, President Truman seized the mills April 8 and District Court ruled the seizure illegal April 30.

Defense Mobilizer Charles Wilson quit because he differed with the President over the wage-price settlement proposed — and there was talk of Capitol Hill of impeachment.

In a row over corruption-clean-up policies, he lost a cabinet member, Attorney General Howard McGrath who was ousted the same day he fired Special Investigator Newbold Morris.

The restoration of Japanese sovereignty as Japan's peace treaty with her World War II victors went into effect; A quickening of optimism over truce in Korea, where simultaneously the Communists charged the Allies were using germ warfare; Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's resignation as Western Defense Chief in Europe, leaving him free to accept the Republican presidential nomination sought for him; New atomic test explosions in Nevada, and the Soviet jetplanes' shooting up of a French airliner.

In U. S. politics, Eisenhower and Sen. Robert Taft of Ohio were neck-and-neck in the Republican race for nominating delegate strength. President Truman's March 29 withdrawal from Dem-with names of many potentials oeratic convention still rippled bobbing on the tide.

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# Vernon Groves' New Home Both Comfort And Eye-Appeal

The Vernon Groves' new home at 1821 N. Hamilton is artlessly outstanding even though its architecture is of conventional lines.

The exterior is brick robed with dark asbestos shingles. The garage and front bedroom form short wings on either side of the inset porch which is paneled in redwood. Adding to its outstanding quality is a light green wrought-iron work on the porch.

The large picture window lends an easy balance and also provides an excellent view of the front yard from the living room.

This 1350-square foot floor space home faces east. J. D. Lard was the contractor and Davis Electric did the wiring.

An important feature of the home is the vivid walls. Green, blue and plum are used in the richest tone value.

The living room with dark green walls, woodwork and ceiling has tan carpeting. Drapes for the picture window have a yellow background with a floral pattern of browns and red-browns. A divan and chair are brown and other large chair is of a harmonizing shade. The overall picture here is the varying shades of brown combined with green for a well-balanced effect. Entrance to the dining room from the living room is wide and sided with natural wood poles for added decorative effect.

In the dining room the walls, ceiling and woodwork is a companion of the living room green and the drapes also match. This continuity is well conceived as the wide entrance gives a view of both rooms from either room.

Furniture is light and airy. A large mirror is on the north wall.

The gay kitchen opens off the north of the dining room. Green ceiling and walls are combined with yellow-morale. Woodwork is green. Running east and west is the hall to the bedrooms and bath. Ceiling and walls are the same as the living room. An extra closet is located here.

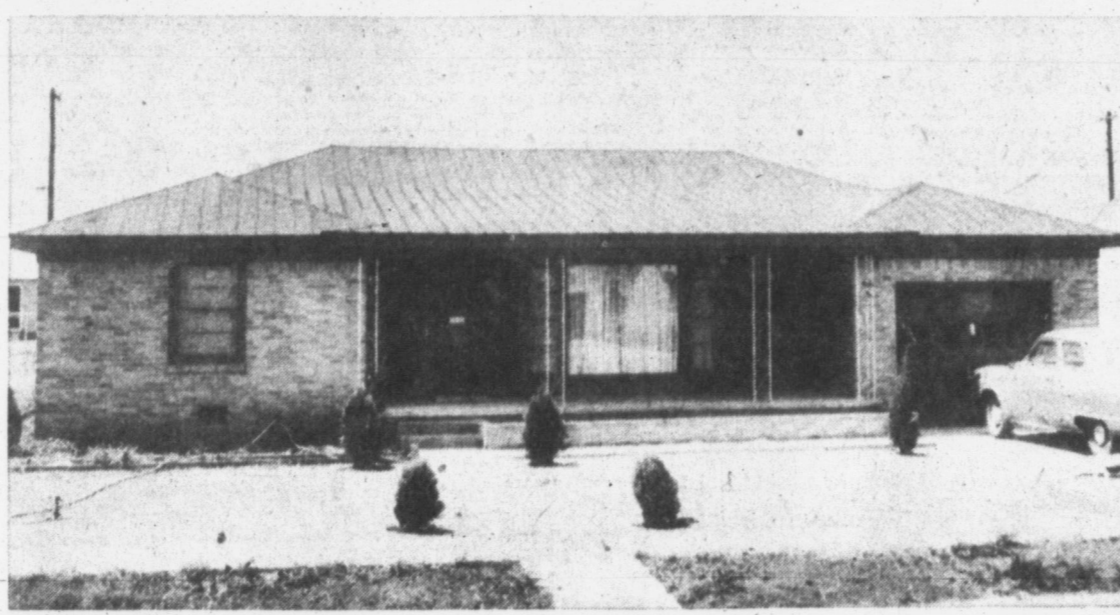

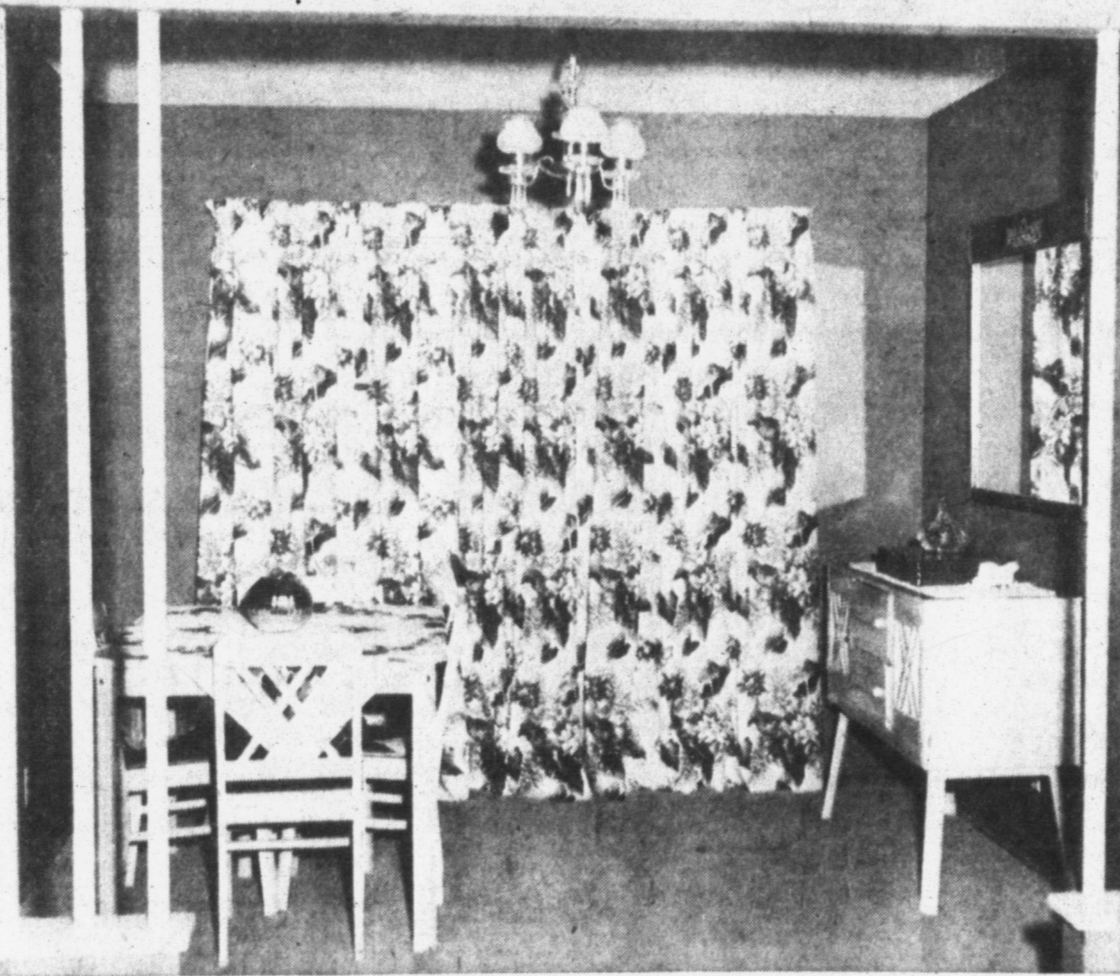

## Foil - Backed Wallboard Insulates, Protects

If you are one of the many home owners who like to dabble in their own remodeling work in attic, basement or house proper, chances are you're looking for materials that are easy to work with.

Consequently, you know you won't get far off base using dry-wall construction on walls and ceilings. When you come to choose wallboard it will pay you to look into a new product recently introduced by the gypsum industry.

An aluminum foil-backed wallboard that combines several features, it's a prefabricated plaster to solve problems of insulation, vapor condensation and fire protection.

The aluminum foil, laminated to the wallboard, reflects about 95 percent of heat rays striking its surface — keeping your house cooler in summer and warmer in winter months. In addition, the home remodeler saves time and money putting up wall and insulation in a single application.

front along the porch. Flowers have been planted and the summer months should see a colorful fronting to the Groves home.

The Groves' new home was built with comfort and eye-appeal in mind. This has been accomplished through careful planning, attractive interior and exterior design and decoration.

As a vapor barrier in winter the foil - backed wallboard prevents water vapor from penetrating inside walls of the home. Vapor within walls ordinarily condenses upon meeting colder air from outside — more than two gallons a day per room. The moisture may rot the studding, weaken interior walls or blister exterior paint.

Gypsum will not burn, thus protecting wood framing members from fire.

This gypsum wallboard is applied by nailing it to studs with the foil side facing the outside. The same procedure — foil side up — is followed in nailing wallboards to joists or rafters in ceiling construction.

Home owners doing their own remodeling will find the material easy to handle. Sawing is not necessary. The boards are cut to size simply by scoring through the paper with a sharp knife and snapping the score, then cutting the foil on the other side. Panels can be decorated as soon as the wall is in place.

The joints can be made strong and concealed with perforated tape and special adhesive.
