Black Page In History

Conservation Association, writing in Texas Water, official publication of the association, calls the tidelands vcto by President Truman the "blackest page in the history of the United States."

In an editorial in the June issue he says:

When the history of this decade is written, May 29, 1952, will go down as the blackest page in the history of the United States, for it was on that day the President of the United States repudiated a solemn agreement between the United States and the Republic of Texas, two sovereign and independent nations, entered into in 1845 and ratified by joint resolution enacted by Congress, in pursuance of which Texas entered the Union.

The principle involved in President Truman's veto of the tidelands bill restoring the titles of the States to their submerged lands, means more in the preservation of the Honor and Integrity of this Nation than all the oil under all the submerged lands in all the forty-eight States. Never before has a President of the United States repudiated and treated as a mere scrap of paper, a solemn agreement between this and another nation.

On March 1, 1845, President Tyler signed a resolution for the annexation of Texas to the United States providing that Texas "shall also retain all the vacant and unappropriated lands lying within its limits to be applied to the payment of the debts and liabilities of the said Republic of Texas and the residue of said lands, after discharging said debts and liabilities, to be disposed of as soid State may direct." Texas thereby kept her lands and minerals and paid her debts herself. The United States did not take her public lands, nor assume her debts.

The Senate and House of the Texas Republic acted on June 23, 1345 and after reciting the specific terms of the offer of statehood contained in the Joint Resolution of the United States Congress, provided a consent on the part of the Government of Texas, "on terms of guarantees and conditions "set forth in the preamble to the

joint resolution.

The same joint resolution of the Texas Congress ratified the action of the President of the Republic in calling a Constitutional convention for July 4, 1845. At that convention the deputies of the people in Texas, in convention assembled, accepted the proposals, conditions and guarantees contained in the resolution of the Congress of the United States. And finally, the Congress of the United States, on December 9, 1845, passed a joint resolution, recognizing the acceptance by Texas and formally admitting the State to the Union.

Now the President of the United States has brazenly repudiated the "terms, guarantees and conditions" set forth in the resolution of the Congress of the United

We pray to God that He keeps the news of this shameful act from Washington, Jefferson, Jackson and Lincoln. And especially do we pray that He keep it from Sam Houston and those brave soldiers of his who won Texas' tidelands on the bloody battlefield at San Jacinto.

We have faith that Congress will rectify this wrong and thereby say to the rest of the countries of the world that the United States believes in, supports, and will defend, the sanctity of its treaties and agreements.

In the current issue of Collier's magazine author Donald Rogers writes an article about women intended for the auidance of married men, under a somewhat ghoulish and disconcerting title: "Teach your wife to be a widow.

Women - not necessarily the meek - are inheriting the earth. Already they control most of the corporations. Over 50 per cent of the stock traded in the New York stock and curb exchanges is owned by women. Of the shares of the most-owned corporation, American Telephone and Telegraph Company, 39.5 per cent is owned by women - against but 25.1 per cent by men.

Much of this feminine financial might (goes on Mr. Rogers) has come to widows from husbands' estates. Moreover, since women live longer than men, widows will finally, as they say at the horse tracks, "take it all."

Therefore, he concludes, it is the duty of every husband to teach his wife to be canny and cautious with property and such, so she may hang onto his cash after he turns up his toes.

Now, that may be well-advised — and surely Mr. Rogers' attitude is gallant as all get out. But it leaves us feeling a little cold and clammy - sort of gripped by the post-mortem blues. It seems likely that the situation will tend to take care of itself, anyway. Widows when they own everything won't remain widows long. It'll be simpler for covetous male characters just to marry 'em then connive at gypping 'em.

Austin E. Ingleheart, president of General Foods, recently made some statements, in a speech to the Advertising Club of Boston, that deserve national attention in this crucial election year.

"Whether we wil keep our form of representative government, or see it change into something along socialist lines, depends on how far the voter sees ahead," he said.

"If we vote for handouts, feather-bedding, paternalism along with more inflation, we shall have abandoned the American spirit . . . We would be powerless to keep the Communists from making slaves of us, as they intend to do in the long run. We could not possibly be of help in getting Europe and Asia to their own feet, because

we ourselves would be beyond help." The Communist leaders have long been convinced that internal decay in the United States itself, coupled with economic depression, will be one of the most potent weapons in their plan to destroy the free world. In other words, they look to us to eventually perform something resembling national suicide. And that Communist-desired goal will certainly be reached in time if we forget those qualities, such as independence, individual responsibility, and thrift, which made us great and strong, and follow those who offer a phony form of "security" which would turn us into wards of an all-powerful state. It's a form of insanity to adopt more and more socialist - communist ideas here at home - while we spend endless billions fighting aggression abroad. Every voter should keep that in mind when he goes to the polls next November.

Here is what he found: Since 1930 government employment of all kinds has increased at four times, and Federal civilian employment at eleven times the rate of increase in the total population. Today there are about 6.8 million civilian workers on gevernment payrolls which means there is now ne government worker for every 6.6 families in the nation.

This vast bureaucracy is hitting

the taxpayers "below the belt. For the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, taxes of all kinds will absorb more than 30 percent of our national income. In order to obtain the necessery revenue with which to carry on and expand its spending orgy the Federal Government has invaded many tax fields which constitutionally belong to state and local governments. It now absorbs 75 percent of all taxes collected in the country as against only 36 percent in 1929.

As a consequence of this greatly increased take by Uncle Sam, state and local officials are compelled to go hand in hand, like so many mendicants, to Washington and beg the bureaucrats for a share of the money that the Federal Govern ment has taken away from the citizens of their communities. Ridiculous, isn't it? The net result of all this is that self-government at the local level is being destroyed and will soon vanish entirely.

Adding insult to injury, the Federal Government is steadily stick ing its messy hands in to the affairs that rightfully belong to private business enterprise. Insidious and powerful attacks have been made upon our American Capitalistic System of Free Enterprise. The succesful have been penalized, profits have been scoffed at and industry has been subjected to all forms of red tape and regulations. At the same time, Federal Government

has coddled and pampered labor unions. It has fixed prices and granted wage increases that are squeezing the profits out of bustness. Such procedures give the Federal Government the power of life and death over industry. The Founding Fathers, fully a-

ware of how tyrannical ment had destroyed the freedom of people in Europe, in drafting Constitution and the Bill of Rights, set up safeguards to free-dom. One of these was a limitation upon Federal Government by granting it specific powers and dividing them into three distinct branches - legislative, executive and judicial. This made for a system of checks and balances to prevent any one branch of the Federal Government becoming su preme or totalitarian.

But now what do we find? This bulwark is being seriously threat ened. As I see it, the business outlook has seldom been more uncertain or confusing. The vast expansion of debt in almost every country, the rise in taxes, and the barriers to enterprise are reasons enough for a collapse more severe than any this nation or the world has yet ex-

On the other hand, the fiat paper money we now have permits governments to engage in any amount of borrowing and spending up to the point at which their currencies become completely worthless.
Therefore, the only limit to the rise in prices and the money volume of business is political, not economic; and the would-be forecaster must first of all try to guess what governments are going to do. The records of other inflationary periods, however, show that the

upward course of prices is never smooth and steady. Instead, there are intermediate downswings of increasing violence. Therefore, the longer inflation continues greater is the difficulty of forecasting and planning. Furth no one can tell

will go or when it will end; and the longer it lasts, the greater and more widespread are the economic and moral losses it entails.

The economic losses come about as government spending diverts more and more wealth and manpower to unproductive uses; armaments, war, extravagance, and

The moral losses come about through discouragement of thrift and honest work and through increasing temptation to try to get something for nothing FORWARD PROGRESS

HAS CEASED For these reasons, whether or not serious deflation and depres-sion are immediately ahead, I think we must expect increasing dislocation and confusion.

These evils have already gone far enough to stop the world's forward progress. Even in the United States, the most progressive nation of all until recently, the growth of real wealth and income has stopped. Gains to some (e.g., certain wage earners) are being more than offset by a decline in the real incomes and wealth of others (e.g.,






