GOPmen Gird For Major Battle On Change In Rules

Traffic Deaths Fall Far Short Of Predictions

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. Traffic fatalities in Texas over the fourth of July week and apparently fell far short of prediction made by the State Department of Public Safety. Safety Director Homer Garrison confirmed that the low traffic death rate reported up to midnight Sunday was correct. At least 17 Texans had died in traffic crashes. But Garrison's department, basing its prediction on past experience, figured that the Independence Day celebration would claim at least 42 lives by traffic.

Danes Reject U. S. Protest

COPENHAGEN (AP) — Denmark today rejected an American protest against the proposed delivery of a Danish-built tanker to the Soviet Union. The move risked cessation of all U.S. economic and military aid to Denmark. Foreign Minister Ole Bjorn Kraft had forecast the rejection in a statement last night saying there appeared to be no legal basis for halting delivery of the 13,500 ton tanker. Kraft announced the decision to reject the U.S. protest after an hour-long meeting between cabinet ministers and party leaders. He said the tanker, the Apheron, was free to leave for a Soviet port whenever the Russians want to pull anchor. The tanker is standing by with a Soviet crew already aboard. It may sail today. Kraft said the leaders of the non-Communist political parties had given unqualified backing to the government's stand. He stressed that careful consideration had been given to the U.S. note. Kraft said the tanker was being delivered under a three-year-old contract which it was impossible to scrap.

Survivors include three sons, K. S. Corse, Mobeette, Arthur, and Gilford Corse, both of Sunray, one daughter, Mrs. Nolan Delas, Fritch, seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Pallbearers for the funeral will be Spence Parker, Bill Gill, Herbert Bruce, William J. Craig, Wallace Corse and Marion Maddox. Burial will be in the Miami Cemetery with Duengel-Carmichael in charge.

Indecision Plagues Many

CHICAGO (AP) — Torn with emotion, more than 12,000 Republicans thronged into Convention Hall today to begin the tortuous process of nominating a candidate for President. Some of them are angry, many of them are anxious for themselves and for the party, and most of them are plagued with the evils of indecision. There are two pictures here today. The one you can see has been building up for a week. All the organized nonsense of a national convention has been going on, full blast, in the Conrad Hilton Hotel, and in the streets around it. There are the swirling crowds with their banners and placards, whooping and shouting, chanting their slogans and home-made campaign songs. They have jammed the vast lobbies of the hotel, fighting and shrieking for a glance at any one of the candidates, cheering in unison like college rooting sections. There are 10-gallon hats from Texas, full-feathered Indian head-dresses, men wandering around in blue jeans, with trousers rolled up to the knees, acres and acres of bare shoulders, a girl in white shorts whirling around on roller skates. Bands of teenagers, frenzied, yelling, and desperately happy to be "for" this or that candidate, portable loudspeakers, blaring and blasting, the crushing white lights of television and the news-reels, a blizzard of leaflets and throw-aways and everywhere, on the curbs and even in the people's sit, fan-collections. Draft Call Set At 28

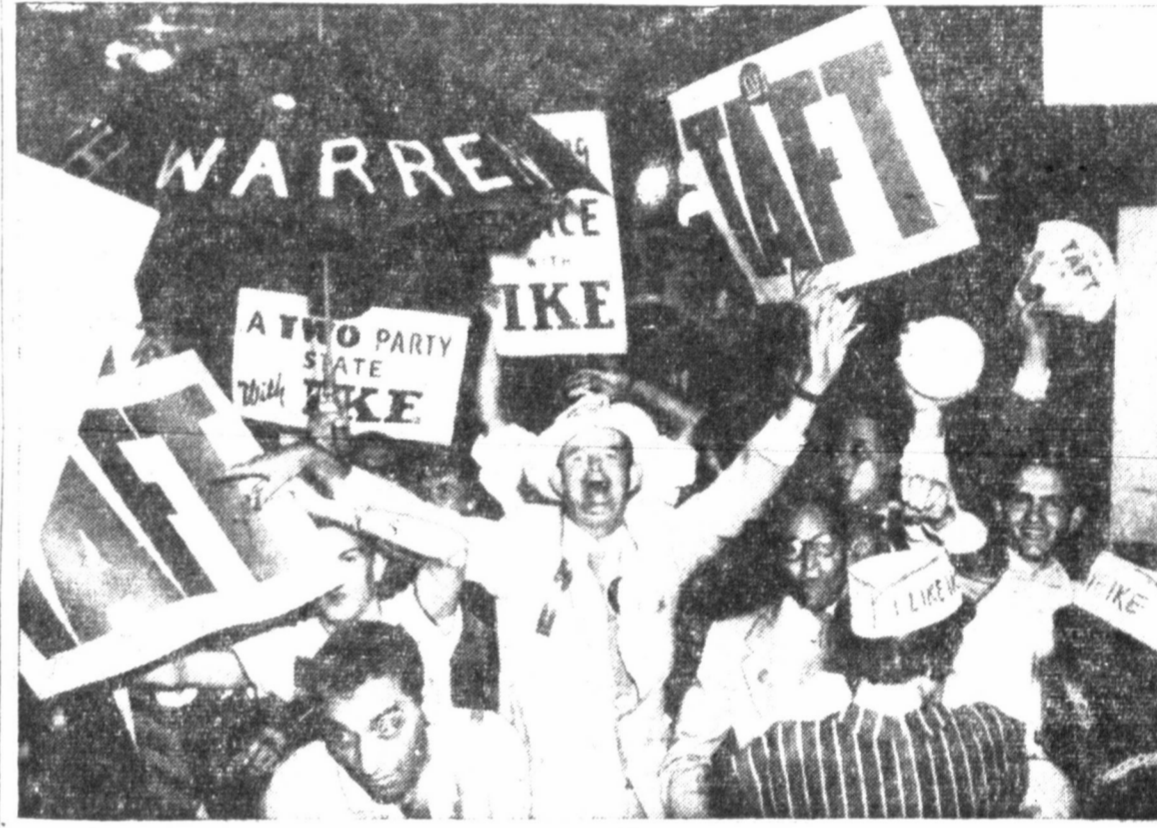
Gray, Wheeler, Donley and Roberts Counties are to draft 28 men for the Army during August as their part of a national call for 29,000 men, according to a quota announced today by local draft board officials. Texas' part in the draft for August is to be 1,119 of which 850 are to be 21 years or over and the remainder 20 or over. This announcement was made with a reminder that each man of draft age planning to enter college this fall is required to take an entrance examination from college he plans to attend and to submit a letter to the draft board requesting deferment. The local board was to fill a quota of 6 for July and that quota is to report for induction Tuesday, July 15. The Associated Press previously reported that the Army has set up its September call for 30,000 draftees and has said it would need 54,000 more men a month for the final three months. The projected draft of 54,007 men in October, November and December would be higher than any since March 1951. In that month—nearly a year and a half ago—80,000 men were drafted, all for the Army.

Deadline July 26 In Contest For Name Of Airport

Yep, only 19 short days left to get your suggestion of a name for Gray County's new airfield, northwest of town, into the Airport Name Contest, editor in the Pampa Daily News. The editors of this paper, sponsor of the Name Your Airport Contest, have set July 26 — primary election day — as the deadline for sending in names for the new airfield. The county commissioners have agreed to abide by the decision of the judges and christen the northwest field with the winning name. The decision of the judges will be final. To enter the contest you must be a bona fide resident of Gray County. Residents of other counties are not eligible. This is because it is Gray County where the airfield is located, the people of Gray County are supporting its construction, in county tax funds; the people of Gray County will live with the airfield; no matter from which angle you look at it, it is Gray County property and it should be up to Gray Countians to have a part in naming their own property. In the entries received to date there are several duplications of names. The postmark on each entry will be the determining factor should one of them be chosen. So, send in your suggestion of a name now. Mail it or bring it to the Airport Name Contest editor along with a letter of not more than 150 words giving your reason for the name.

United States Sets Record

ABOARD THE SS UNITED STATES (AP) — The sleek new superliner United States completed her maiden Atlantic crossing today in a record three days, 10 hours and 40 minutes, copping the transatlantic speed ribbon for America for the first time in 33 years. The time was 10 hours and two minutes faster than the old record set 14 years ago by the British Cunard liner Queen Mary. The United States raced past the Irish line — Bishop's Rock off the English Coast — at dawn as a gale of 60-knot winds whipped her. The ship's hand struck up the "Star Spangled Banner" and her 3,000 passengers capped their champagne at sunrise celebration with a roaring cheer. Gabrielson Pleads For United Party Front Against Demos

CHICAGO (AP) — Republican Committee Chairman Guy George Gabrielson today called for a united party front to end what he termed "the scandalous Democratic years." Gabrielson said in a speech prepared for delivery at the opening of the 25th GOP National Convention. "This will be a fair convention," Gabrielson said in a speech prepared for delivery at the opening of the 25th GOP National Convention. "The only steamroller in this amphitheatre," he said, "will be the determined will of a majority of the 1,206 delegates. The chair will recognize any delegate who seeks recognition." This was an obvious reference to charges which have spun out of the whirling fight for the Republican presidential nomination by chief rivals—Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. Gabrielson said the 1952 pre-convention campaign was the hot test in the party's recent history. He said it demonstrates determination and strength and is fine if kept in bounds. "But after the convention makes its decision," he said, "there can be no room for disunity in the Republican party. We must close ranks against the common foe." He then read pledges from Taft and Eisenhower and two other presidential hopefuls—former Gov. Harold Stassen of Minnesota and Gov. Earl Warren of California. (See PARTY, Page 8)

Both Sides Determined To Fight It Out

CHICAGO (AP) — Shock troops in the Taft-Eisenhower battle for the Republican presidential nomination headed toward a major skirmish today over proposed changes in GOP convention rules. Both sides seemed determined to fight it out. Peacemakers working into the dawn trudged wearily to their hotel beds conceding they saw little chance of averting a head-on clash. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's campaign manager, David S. Ingalls, was asked by a reporter whether his camp was determined "as of now" to oppose a change. He replied: "Yes." At issue is the convention rule about contested delegates and when they may vote in disputes over seating delegates. The rule now says contested delegates cannot vote on whether they themselves should be seated, but can vote on the question of seating other contested delegates. Eisenhower is insisting on a change in that rule. He would have all contested delegates—or under a reported compromise, the major blocs of them—barred from voting at all in such disputes. The general would stand to gain from such a prohibition. Ingalls, Taft's campaign manager, met until nearly 4 a.m. with Guy C. Gabrielson, Republican national chairman, and others to discuss compromise proposals. Among the peacemakers, with whom Ingalls discussed a compromise proposal, advanced by Sen. William Knowland of California, was Gov. John S. Fine of Pennsylvania.

Pennsylvania Bloc In Favor Of Change

CHICAGO (AP) — Pennsylvania's crucial delegation, in support of the Eisenhower-backed move to amend the rules of the Republican convention on delegate credentials. Only 11 delegates lined up against the proposal. The vote of a tense 90-minute caucus was even more one-sided than had been predicted by Gov. John S. Fine who personally led the fight to get the delegation on record on a what he called a highly important moral issue. Two other members of the 70-vote delegation announced they were passing, for the present, the opportunity to express their views.

Sen. Taft Promises To Fight Rule Issue

CHICAGO (AP) — Sen. Robert A. Taft told a news conference today he will fight a proposed rule change sought by Eisenhower forces in the Republican National Convention. He said he wouldn't try to defer the issue. Taft laid new claim to front runner position in his race with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for the presidential nomination, contending he has "six hundred and seven, eight or nine" pledged votes — more than enough for nomination. "I think my position is even firmer than it was," he declared, grinning broadly. He added "we'll see what comes up" before deciding whether to push for a first ballot victory. But on the proposed rule change — which seeks a bar major state contested delegations from voting on the seating of their disputed delegates—Taft said the situation "is hopelessly complicated" and he declined to predict the outcome.

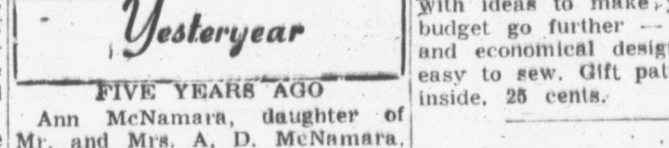

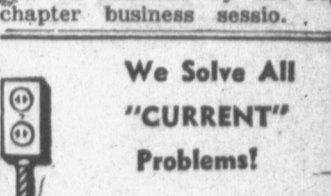
