## Sectional Warfare Threatens Sessions

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago (AP) — The Democrats stormed to the start of their 31st national convention today, pulling and hauling in uncertainty over platform and candidates.

As to the platform, it was again, as it has been for years, a North-South battle over "civil rights."

This sectional warfare threatened for a time to break out on the convention floor at the opening sessions in a scrap over seating of rival delegations from Mississippi and Texas. But convention leaders put the issue over for at least 24 hours by a program shift.

As to candidates, it was wide open. Five hopefuls were working hard for the presidential nomination, and there were a dozen "favorite sons" in the field.

Gov. Adlai Stevenson, of Illinois, the man who has said repeatedly he doesn't want it, was still getting a lot of talk for the nomination.

Sen. Paul Douglas, of Illinois, a number of GOP attacks on the Truman administration's Korean policy, said in a prepared speech that the joint chiefs of staff had reported in 1947 that Korea had little strategic value to the United States.

CANTERBURY, England (AP) — Dr. Herbert Johnson, the "Red" Dean of Canterbury, last night carried his charges of American germ warfare to the pulpit of Canterbury Cathedral, the 1,000-year-old main seat of the Church of England.

A small elderly woman tried to ban the dean's Communist denunciations from the pulpit.

"I defy you to go into the pulpit," she said, but he brushed her aside. Then, in a passionate sermon he repeated his allegation that the U. S. had used germ bombs in China and North Korea.

## Feuding Texas Democrats Swing As Convention Opens

CHICAGO (AP)—Feuding Texas Democrats were right in the middle of the fight in the Democratic convention opening today. And they were ready and raring to go.

Each side had two presidential candidates lined up — Averell Harriman and Sen. Estes Kefauver on the side of the Loyal Democrats led by Maury Maverick of San Antonio.

Sen. Richard Russell and Robert Kerr cast their blessings upon the conservative regular delegation headed by Gov. Allan Shivers.

Harriman and Kefauver agreed last night to throw the first challenge on the convention floor. They plan to offer an amendment to the temporary convention rules that would require them to say they will work to assure that the party nominees for President and vice president will be on the official Democratic ballot in Texas.

Shivers' people had heard rumors of that plan before the release came. Their state convention had voted not to require the party loyalty pledge.

## Murray Charges Steel Industry Repudiated Settlement Terms

PITTSBURGH (AP) — President Philip Murray of the CIO United Steelworkers charged today that the steel industry repudiated a strike settlement which he worked out with officials of Bethlehem Steel Corp. last June 17.

Murray told the USW's 170-man Wage-Policy Committee that President Charles White of Republic Steel previously had urged the steel companies to accept suggestions made by White which Murray thought could have led to a settlement.

The potent Wage-Policy Committee was called together to hear Murray's report on the 90-day walkout which has idled more than 1,500,000 and to give the union chief some guidance on future strategy.

Committee heard Murray say that negotiations with Vice President Joseph M. Larkin of Bethlehem and Bethlehem counsel John Morse produced a "memorandum of understanding" in which the steel company executives "substantially accepted the union shop."

Murray said Larkin and Morse took the memorandum before the other major producers with the understanding they would press for its acceptance.

Murray said that on June 20, the Bethlehem steel men returned and "both expressed considerable disappointment that the other steel companies had refused to accept what they believed to be a solution of very aspect of this situation."

## School Board To Make Bid For Sewer Line

The Pampa Independent School District will be putting the bid on the City Commission tomorrow for a sewer line running from the southwest grade school to the main serving Prairie Village, a quarter of a mile or more away.

To do this the eight and three-quarter-acre plot, west of S. Hart, may have to be brought into the city limits and the legal mechanics surrounding that move will also be discussed.

The reason for the request will be that the present line running near the point where the new school is to be built is not large enough and is now overtaxed. The school board wants a line that would be tied into the Prairie Village 12-inch main running east to Malone.

CHICAGO (AP) — Adlai Stevenson, with talk of drafting him as a presidential nominee, lauding about the Democratic convention, told delegates today the party will never apologize for its 20th Century leadership.

"Who leads us is more important than what leads us," the Illinois governor said in a prepared welcoming speech.

"What counts now," he said, "is not just what we are against but what we are for. A man doesn't save a century or a civilization, but a militant party wedded to a principle can."

"I hope our preoccupation here," he said "is not just with personalities but with objectives."

What America needs and the world wants is not bombast, abuse and double talk, but a solid message of firm faith and a bold, in 1948, President Truman the 39 electoral votes of Tennessee, instead to a States' Rights party, instead to a States' Rights party.

conservatives stay at home—control the precinct conventions. They would then naturally control county conventions and finally the state convention since only elected delegates may participate in county and state conventions.

Everything done by the presidential convention except naming delegates to the national convention can be done in Amarillo on Sept. 9, when the state convention is held.

It will be in Amarillo where the party policies will be determined; where members of the state executive committee will be elected; where the approved list of presidential electors can be changed; and where potential legislative action can be spawned.

Democratic leaders have been busy trying to get out the "vote" for precinct conventions and will continue the drive this week by phone and personal contact.

The mechanics of the second round of conventions will be the same as the presidential conventions—each precinct allowed one delegate to the county convention for each 25 votes cast for governor in 1950; each county allowed one delegate to state for each 300 votes cast for governor in 1950.

One thing the Republicans will do at their county convention that the Democrats won't will be nominating candidates for local offices in the November general election. If any Republican wants to stick his neck out and make a run for it.

The precinct conventions (for both parties) will be held at 10 a. m., Saturday, election day. But, if a citizen votes in the primaries that day he may not, by state law, participate in Republican precinct conventions, and vice-versa. However, those who participated in Republican presidential conventions may—if they want to—turn around and vote in the Democratic primaries Saturday. But, that will automatically disqualify them from continuing in GOP affairs on that day.

### Pre-Finished Oak Ideally Suited For Modernizing Floors

Hardwood strip flooring especially well suited for remodeling and modernizing of homes can be obtained from most lumber dealers nowadays.

Complete pre-finished at the mill, the flooring is ready for use immediately after the last nail has been driven. An average size room can be floored with the material and put back into service the same day. Like the unfinished variety, it can be laid right over old wood floors.

Many home builders are utilizing the pre-finished stock in new houses to speed completion time, particularly when experienced floor finishers are not readily available. Ordinarily at least two or three days must be allowed for sanding and finishing the floors of a new home.

In oak, which is used most extensively for residential flooring, there is a choice of four pre-finished grades. Flooring of beech and pecan also is available in pre-finished form, though in only one grade only.

Grading is based chiefly on the appearance of the wood. All grades are more than adequate in resistance to wear and general serviceability.

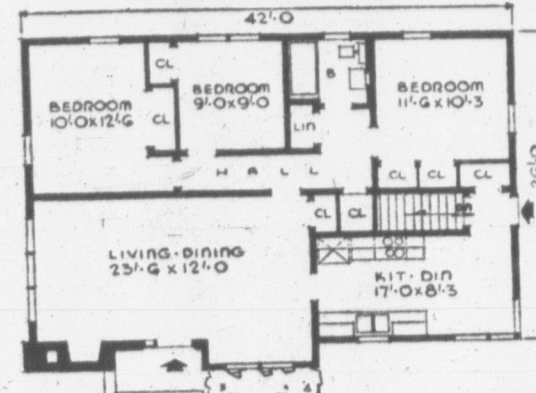
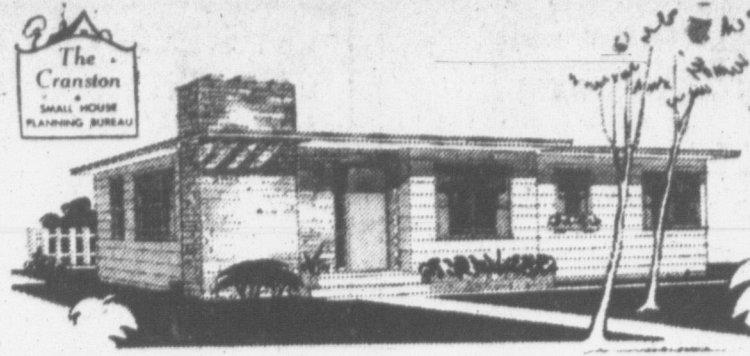
### Chrome Shades Stolen

copyrighted interview in U. S. 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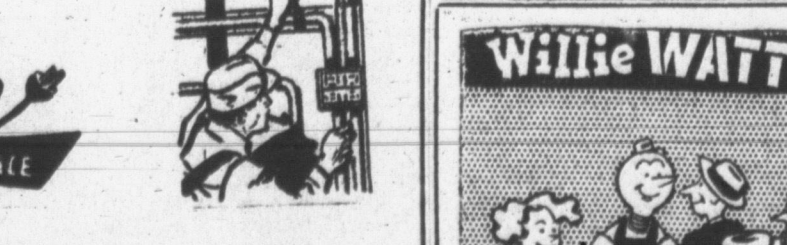

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## Motorists Must Make A Choice

Looking for the cause of 326 traffic fatalities in the nation during the Fourth of July weekend, a new record for a three-day holiday on that date, speed must rank high.

Combined with overcrowded highways, a comparatively large number of inexperienced drivers out for a holiday, hot weather and short tempers, speed can and does rank high on the list of traffic killers.

This point is given weight by what happened the first day of the long weekend on two of the country's best-known speedways, the New Jersey Turnpike and the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

On the eight-month-old New Jersey super-highway, where the speed limit is 60 miles per hour, a heavy trailer-truck rammed into three automobiles parked at the side of the road. Five persons, including a three-year-old boy, were burned to death in the flaming wreckage.

Later in the day another crash on the turnpike cost two more lives. They raised to 25 the number of deaths on the 118-mile highway since it was opened last January.

But the speedways weren't yet through for the day. On the Pennsylvania Turnpike five persons were killed in a two-car crash.

The New Jersey Turnpike is a modern miracle of winding concrete — wide, sweeping curves, no cross traffic, no towns to go through, no nothing much except sit there and hold onto the wheel and zoom along at 60.

This sounds fine and it is, for a while. Then the whole thing gets to be a little monotonous. And that's where a lot of the turnpike trouble apparently comes from.

The senses lose some of their edge, lulled by the steady smooth pace and the motor's hum. The reactions seem to miss the frequent test of dealing with cross traffic, turns, starts and stops.

Also the driver is inclined to lose sight of the fact that he is traveling fast. So when an emergency does arise, when a car cuts sharply in front of him, or someone ahead brakes to a sudden stop, his senses often are not up to coping with the swiftness with which things happen, and accidents result.

At high speed such accidents can be bigger killers than ordinarily — five killed in the Pennsylvania crash, five dead in the New Jersey one.

By engineering standards, the turnpikes are marvels. But they don't, they can't, take into full account human behavior. The relationship of man and his machine can be a satisfying and productive one up to a point, but the machine steadily becomes the stronger and faster and there comes a point beyond which man cannot follow it and remain the master in control.

So some time along about now, man, the American automobile driver, is going to have to make up his mind whether he's going to sacrifice speed, or sacrifice himself.

## First-Get The Facts

A short time ago the Associated Press asked the president of the New York Stock Exchange to comment on the intense activity in the Canadian securities market, including that of so-called "moose-pasture" salesmen who dispose of worthless stocks to the unwary.

In answer, he said, "Canada is a rich country in the process of developing her resources. . . . Speculation is a natural, an inevitable part of that development, just as necessary to tap Canada's vast resources as it is to the further growth of the United States.

"I am not against speculation as such. But I am against those 'moose-pasture' salesmen who are riding the coattails of legitimate business expansion in Canada and selling millions of dollars worth of worthless, or highly speculative, securities to United States citizens."

He went on to point out that there are good Canadian stocks and bond ones, and praised the efforts of Canadian authorities and reputable securities dealers to rid the business of the "moose-pasture" crooks. Then he said, "When you get a phone call or a persuasive letter or telegram from an unknown person in Canada offering to make you a fortune — beware. If you want to put your money in a speculative enterprise, go to it — but, first time will certainly tell if the present policies are continued.

Our prosperity as measured in dollars is a phony prosperity. It is the loss of all. ### What Is Prosperity?

The American people will be hearing a lot about prosperity during the coming campaign. It will be argued for and con.

I recently read an editorial in the Commercial and Financial Chronicle on this subject. It was interesting to me, and since it is a subject that I understand, I want to discuss the matter.

There are of course several ways of trying to measure or determine whether or not we have prosperity. Some contend that prosperity exists when everyone is employed. That certainly is not a rational way of determining whether or not a people have prosperity. If that were true, everyone in a poverty stricken country would be prosperous. In India and China the people work long hours in order to try to sustain life. So the number of hours worked is not the proper way to tell whether we have prosperity.

Another test commonly used is what is known as the gross national production, measured in dollars or pounds or yards. It is pretty difficult to measure in pounds or yards because some pounds of some material have much more to do with the well being of mankind than others. So we cannot measure prosperity by the physical production.

It is difficult to determine our prosperity by the number of dollars' worth of material that is produced. This is difficult for two reasons. First, the dollar varies greatly in the amount of material things it will produce. Another objection to this way of measuring prosperity is whether what is produced is produced for human consumption or for destructive purposes. If a third or a fourth of a people's production is used for war, that amount certainly does not increase their prosperity. Nor does it add to the prosperity of a people to have a large fraction of the people doing non-productive work for the government.

Of course, in attempting to measure prosperity in dollars one must allow for the shrinkage in the purchasing power of the dollar and the increase in population must also be considered when the dollar is used as a measuring stick of prosperity.

One must also take into consideration that under free enterprise there is a normal increase in prosperity. For 150 years the increase in real wages and real prosperity was about 3% a year. So in considering whether or not a nation is prosperous we must take all these things into consideration and allow for what is a normal increase. Unless we are increasing faster than the normal 3% per year compound we are not as prosperous as we should be.

Our increase in prosperity comes from the amount of freedom — the amount of respect for human initiative — that results in better tools and better ideas as to how wealth is produced. The purpose of all business is simply to save the labor required to satisfy a human want and anything that interferes with increasing the amount of tools that save the labor to satisfy a human want or interferes with free exchanges of goods and services retards the increase in prosperity.

There have been many fictitious statements as to the dollar prosperity we are having. The profits of corporations are not the measure of what the states should because the government will not allow industries to charge depreciation enough to replace tools when they are worn out. So the extra profit that is being subtracted from the profits stated in order to get the real profits and arrive at the dollar prosperity.

It is undoubtedly a fact that for the last 20 years we have not added to the real value of tools as rapidly as we did in percentages for the 120 years prior to that time.

And when some people are prosperous because of laws that impoverish others that is not real prosperity. Certainly the man who has a life insurance policy or his savings in bonds or credits is any thing but prosperous. The changing of the value of the dollar seems to temporarily benefit some, but it impoverishes others. But this is not real prosperity, because under free enterprise the loss of one is the loss of all. And if one believes in Jewish and Christian principles, then it is impossible to believe that we are really prosperous when we are collectively violating the essence of the Jewish and Christian religions — namely the Golden Rule.

## The Doctor Says

It isn't always easy to identify polio early and yet this is one of the most important things to do if treatment is to be as effective as present methods permit.

One reason for this is that the early signs of polio are almost identical to those of many other acute infectious or virus diseases.

Actually it is stated, probably correctly, that when the nervous system of a child is attacked by polio, there are few diseases in which good nursing and physical therapy are as important in getting good results as in polio.

The muscular paralysis which comes on after the first few days of the disease is accompanied by painful muscle spasms. These can be greatly relieved by hot wet packs, properly applied, and by nursing care. The skin tenderness which is so common is also helped by such treatment.

At the time when the disease is acute every effort has to be made to keep the muscles in the best possible condition so that they will respond to the later treatments and training. Bed rest is, needless to say, important as are the other measures like plenty of fluids, which are used for any infectious disease.

## National Whirligig.. Trouble Looms For Democrats In Selection Of Candidates

CHICAGO — The only Democratic presidential candidates even remotely satisfactory to both the Truman and the Southern states' rights wings are Vice President Alben Barkley of Kentucky and Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, although there is no assurance that they will appear on the convention ticket.

Even they would not satisfy the most influential Dixie leaders unless they were teamed with Senator Richard Brevard Russell of Georgia on a platform virtually repudiating the Truman-Harriman-Humphrey stand on civil rights, especially FEPC.

The most practical solution to the feuding here seems to be a Barkley-Russell ticket, despite the Kentuckian's 72 years. As the Senate leader during the Roosevelt-Truman regimes Barkley would be expected to hold the labor, racial and liberal elements, polio, much of this has been made possible by the funds made available to them through the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, to which so many generous-hearted citizens throughout the country have contributed.

Thanks to this every victim of polio who needs hospital or other care for polio need not lack it because of financial reasons. Medical science is constantly searching for new methods of treatment. Several drugs are used for certain aspects of the disease with moderate success. Although a sure cure for all victims of the disease has not been discovered, proper treatment given early enough eases pain and lessens the chances of crippling complications.

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## Fair Enough . . . Pegler Says U. S. Will Adopt Socialist Government Shortly

CHICAGO — In the United States, as in Great Britain, the two-party system is rotting into a corruption which may serve as fertilizer for the growth of something better. However, the tendency suggests a adaptation of national socialism. It is a fascinating irony that this new thing is nowhere more popular than in the City of New York where the foulest epithet is "Nazi-minded." But to be "Nazi-minded" is merely to believe that national socialism is a desirable system and socialism certainly is very popular in New York.

It is difficult to distinguish between national socialism and international socialism, but New York obviously prefers the international kind. The entire eastern campaign against Senator Taft was based on the charge that he was an "isolationist," meaning a patriot. It was so effective that he had to deny that he was an unconditional isolationist, or patriot. He was moderately international.

The Churchill government of Britain will not live out its term because it regained the mandate on promises to denationalize the trucking industry, which the socialists had converted into a government monopoly with a great bureaucracy on the public payroll, and clean up the states medical service, among other changes. But Churchill has been afraid to do a hard line program, or socialized industry, because nobody wants to buy back institutions whose employees have been made lazy, impudent and careless by the trucking treatment that they received from an efficient, shining administration which wanted their favor. Moreover, there is always the risk that the socialists, on their return to power, will simply nationalize, or socialize, the same industry, and bring it back to the proprietors to warn any remaining stout anti-socialists not to try it again.

Any way, few Britons now have any money above their daily needs. A few are licked and is never coming hard terms with the proprietors in some new combination of European powers. She is not very hostile to Communism and Soviet Russia, either, and the people would much rather make a deal with Moscow than fight the United States in an airplane carrier, and they are markedly indolent, negligent and fatalistic. Religion and morality are way down.

British medicine never was a such above the pill-doctor version of the people, and not catered to the bedside sweetness that we are used to. Doctors always have sold their patients as a promoter sells a sucker. Under Socialism the medical service has got worse, but let us use their island as they can put themselves away in hospitals for rest cures on the pretext of hangover, hang-nail or acute galloping fatigue. The hospitals are dismal plants, but all Britain is dismal so that objection can be raised. They know nothing better. They don't like nice things and so don't pine for luxuries.

When so resourceful a fellow as Churchill finds himself stuck for answers and has to carry on while the United States is afraid to attempt the reforms that he was going to put through, it is apparent that Britain has gone so far down the road that there is no hope of return to the system that made the nation rich and mighty. The most of the Socialists have quit calling themselves Laborites and their party the Labor Party and frankly call the system Socialism and the party the Socialist Party, as John T. Flynn predicted they would in "The Road Ahead."

In our country, a ratty little faker named Buchanan was elected to Congress from an underworld constituency in Pennsylvania with three indictments for cheap swindles for his moral credentials, and organized an "investigation" of "lobbying" to stop the circulation of Flynn's book.

It is reported that he would not be averse to a dead-end-breaking draft. He denies any ambitions. A recent White House caller in Detroit, auto manufacturer reports to friends in the Loop that Truman has apparently soured on Stevenson because of his vaillation. While the President did not commit himself, he gave the impression that he would not be hostile to a Kerr nomination.

STRENGTHENED — The Republicans' selection of Eisenhower has strengthened the South's bargaining power enormously, as the Trumanites reluctantly recognize. In view of the fact that Dixie-land and popularity in Dixie-land, the states righters may not need to bolt or enter a third ticket, if they are rebuffed or outmaneuvered here.

The machines in 11 states associated with the Byrd-Brynes George-Shivers faction would simply have to "go fishing" or "sit on their hands" throughout the campaign. They might even pass out quiet word that they were voting for the military man. Many leading Southern newspapers would support GOP nominees.

while the Georgian kept Southern and border states in line.

COMPROMISE — But such a combination would require a platform compromise on FEPC along the line of the Republican declaration. That document declared for a voluntary Fair Employment Practices Act, with "supplemental" federal action only when the states defaulted.

The joker is obvious. The Southern states are the ones which will fail to act against such a necessitating federal intervention. A similar compromise, though worded differently, may supply the basis for Democratic agreement.

A platform, however, is only as meaningful as the men who run on it. The Truman-Harriman-Russell can be talked into accepting the second spot, it may be regarded as a Janus-like slate by northern Negroes.

Barkley's record, however, will be the one that he will do right by the metropolitan masses. He has always been the darling of the unions. Russell's participation will be assurance to the South that its social and economic structure will not be destroyed.

TASK — The strength of such a team is that it would present two seasoned, dexterous and well-liked legislators against such relatively inexperienced Republicans as Eisenhower and Nixon. Whether the Democrats can or will dare to hitch together two Southerners on an ambiguous FEPC and states rights platform is the major question — and task — at Chicago.

However, there appears no possibility of a deal, or an "involuntary" such first-place hopefuls as Harriman, McMahon, Kefauver or Kerr. The first two are "poison" to the South, while the crime-chaser and multimillionaire oil baron are anathema in the great cities. The politicians of the Truman-Harriman and natural gas consumers regard Kerr as a brigand.

Despite sporadic talk of a Truman draft, hard-boiled politicians think he would be an extremely weak candidate. In this analysis, it is assumed that the convention will not dare to nominate Russell, although he is the ablest man in both parties. He was born in the wrong state, politically.

LIST — Still insisting that Stevenson will respond to an honest draft, "Jake" Arvey, Illinois National Committee man, has asked the Southern bloc for a list of possible vice-presidential material. In the event Russell would not run. Here is the list given him in the order of preference: Kerr of Oklahoma, Senator Fulbright of Arkansas, Senator Johnson of Texas, Speaker Rayburn of Texas. It is interesting that Rayburn ranks only fourth, largely because of his age. There is no mention of Kefauver or Sparkman of Alabama, who are too "New Dealish" to suit their colleagues.

Several powerful Southern negotiators, including Governor Byrnes of South Carolina, turn thumbs down on Stevenson. He favors federal intervention on fair employment matters, if states do not war on discrimination. He has spoken approvingly of Harriman, the South's avowed enemy. He advocates federal jurisdiction over oil pipelines.

It was too true for the comfort of the eastern, international socialist. The result of all this low-rating of women is that many women today don't give themselves credit for having as much sense as they really possess.

They are fearful and unsure and often unhappy because they don't realize how smart they really are, what a good job they are doing and how much pride they should take in the job they are performing.

What today's housewives need to hear more often is "You're smarter than you think." They've been beaten down too long with criticism. What they need now is to be told they are plenty smart enough for their big job in life.
