



Time was when \$10,000 was a lot of money. Only the relative few earned or had reasonable hope of earning as much. Even nowadays, with record taxes and a fourbit dollar it is far more than most families ever see, the average income being in the neighborhood of \$3,000.

Yet there is a \$10,000-a-year class of people in this country who simply can't make both ends meet, economize as they will. That, at least, is the theme of a fascinating article in the July issue of Harper's magazine, called "Going Broke on \$10,000 a Year," which is signed with the pseudonym Jay Taylor. This class consists of junior business executives who must put up a front, appear to live very well, have good addresses, entertain as a part of their jobs, and donate generously to charities and other worthy causes. Mr. Taylor writes early in his article: "I'm a symbol — a simpleton. I'm a symbol of the group from which business leaders used to be drawn, a group now being liquidated.

Mr. Taylor goes into meticulous detail as to his finances ,and it's quite a story. Last year, he wrote, he earned \$10,400 and spent \$10,456. And here, in capsule form, is what happened to his money. To get the full flavor of the account, of course, the whole article

First of all he actually got not \$10,400 but \$8,978, taxes having accounted for the difference. His first outao was for rent — \$1,656. This, he says, is about as little as he could pay without moving to so cheap a neighborhood that he would lose caste with his associ-

ates and endanger future promotions. Several hundred dollars went out for unavoidable household expenses such as utilities, and his wife got \$2,049, or some \$40 a week, to buy the food and other supplies needed by a family of four. Furniture swallowed \$274, and insurance \$471. Mr. Taylor has no car and says he can't possibly afford one, but commutation tickets cost him \$180 and are scheduled to go up in

Doctors and dentists accounted for \$264, and the children's expenses, such as their clothes and school books and a summer camp, dug in to the tune of \$241. He and his wife spent only \$173 on clothing for themselves. Gifts and holidays expenses totaled around \$500 all told, and there was a miscellaneous item of \$364, which included such odds and ends as church contributions, wood, bushes and bulbs for the garden.

So it goes, in Mr. Taylor's summation — everything is accounted for down to the penny save \$133 for which he has no records. None of the items of expenditure seem at all high for a man in his position - many of them seem almost amazingly low

Mr. Tayler's conclusion is typical of the tone of his article: "So I speak as one small symbol of a class. I look at the broken down occasional chair which should have been replaced a year ago. I postpone my trip to the dentist for another six months in hopes that the pediatrician's bill can be paid in the interval. And I realize that I belong to a new class of forgotten men in whom no labor leaders, politicians, farmers, corporation presidents, or commencement speakers take any vested interest — the \$10,000-a-year men, Vanquished

Many people believe that this is a wonderful period for business and especially "big business." The dollars are rolling in in an endless golden stream, they reason, and about the only worry is how to dispose of them.

If you hold this belief, the following paragraph from a factual article in a publication of the National City Bank of New York should be of interest: "'Big business' now devotes a major portion of its income to the support of 'big government.' The modern corporation has become an agency to marshal men and money not only for the mass production of goods, but also for the mass collection of taxes. Last year the 100 largest industrial organizations each paid an average of \$67,-000,000 in Federal income and excess profits taxes, and \$42,000,000 in other Federal, state, local and foreign government taxes. Their total direct tax bill of\$109,000,-000 took 67 per cent of the balance before taxes. Such taxes were at the rate of about 14 cents of every dollar of sales. They amounted to nearly two-thirds of total payrolls, and to nearly four times the dividends paid to

The individual income tax-payer is in a similar position. More and more of his income goes to government - less and less of it is his to spend and save and invest. Economists have long believed that if a nation's economy is to be kept dynamic and progressive, not more than 25 per cent of the national income must be absorbed in taxes. Today about a third of the national income goes

Steel Companies Fighting Slavery-The Union Shop

The American people owe a vote of gratitude to the big steel executives who are standing for principles in the steel strike.

There is not much question but what the strike now has simmered down to the question of a union shop or a modified union shop.

Very few people realize the importance of this stand on the part of the major steel companies. The union shop or even the modified form of a union shop is just a form of slavery. It is a form of totalitarianism where the individual loses his right to sell his own services to the world's highest bidder. It also takes from him his right to use his conscience.

The original union shop permitted the employer to hire non-union men, but the non-union men were obliged to join the union and pay dues. They could not be discharged as long as they paid their dues. The modified union shop requires the worker also to join the union, but he has the option of withdrawing from the union between the 20th and the 30th day of his employment with the corporation, If he doesn't withdraw then, he is in for the rest of his life. And the modified union shop doesn't give the present union members the right to withdraw from the union, no matter how arbitrary or how tyrannical the union shop becomes, Thus the union shop follows the same line as is practiced by every dictator. The individual in a dictator country is not permitted to even leave the country. He is a complete subject of the state. So in the union shop the worker is the complete ward of the labor union bosses. He cannot sell his services for less or for more than the union dictates. He cannot make an individual bargain. His future is limited to the pleasure of the union bosses, no matter how efficient the man may be.

The union shop also makes the worker a slave to the union he is in. It prevents the competition of other unions. A worker could not become a member of a less tyrannical union when he could not resign from the one he was in. Thus the union has a complete monopoly over his economic liveli-

Many people think it is difficult to conceive how the American people should even consider the union shop in America. But the union shop is the natural result of education governed by politicians. The union shop and political education are based on the same principleor lack of principle. Just as under the union shop, under public eduation the politicians, appointed by a politician, have the final say as to what each and every individual must pay to the government to upport their ideas of education. Just as in the union shop where. the worker is obliged to pay when he thinks the union is harmful, so

is the American citizen obliged to pickets off" the line. pay for schooling that he regards as nothing but tyranny.

political education is even worse than political unions, because political education is dealing with the souls and the minds of the youth of the land-it is conditioning them to believe in and pay homage to a form of slavery and oppression and tyranny. When the youth is grabbed in his formative period of life and taught by politicians, that practice that the maority is god and determines right from wrong, it is only natural when he goes to work to believe that the majority in his union determines what he should do and what he should get for his services and how he should be promoted and who should be promoted. Labor Racketeers

The effort of "District 50"-a John L. Lewis, U. M. W., satellite, headed by A. D. Lewis, a brother of John L., to impose its will upon the people of Central City, Kentucky, is a typical example of the gangsterism that pervades the labor movement in this Country.

None desired to become members, There was no labor dispute between Dennis and his employees. He refused to sign the contract. The union began to picket his place of business, and Dennis sought a court injunction, which

These labor leaders have no respect for the Church-for the Court-or the rights of the citizens. According to news reports, one of them said District 50 will not pull out of Central City under any circumstances even if the Court pulled all the

It might be even claimed that its misery. There are no geographic bounds to such activities. The entire South has suffered for years under "Operation Dixie" and New York City has a contemptible labor racket engaged in "shaking down" merchants, which caused one prounion writer to ask: "What's happening to this labor movement of ours when a territory can be staked out and merchants assaulted?"
