Hoover Rips Democrats In Farewell Talk

CHICAGO (AP) — Aging Herbert Hoover bid farewell to Republican convention delegates last night with a plea to rip away the Democrats' "push curtain" at home and salvage "lost statesmanship" abroad. Hoover, the only living ex-President and the last Republican to hold that office, attacked the Democratic administration with a vigor that belied his 77 years. He said that he did not expect to address another GOP convention because of "the inexorable course of nature" — words met with roared "No's."

Guill Denies Statement On Political Future; 'Stop Ike' Move Is On

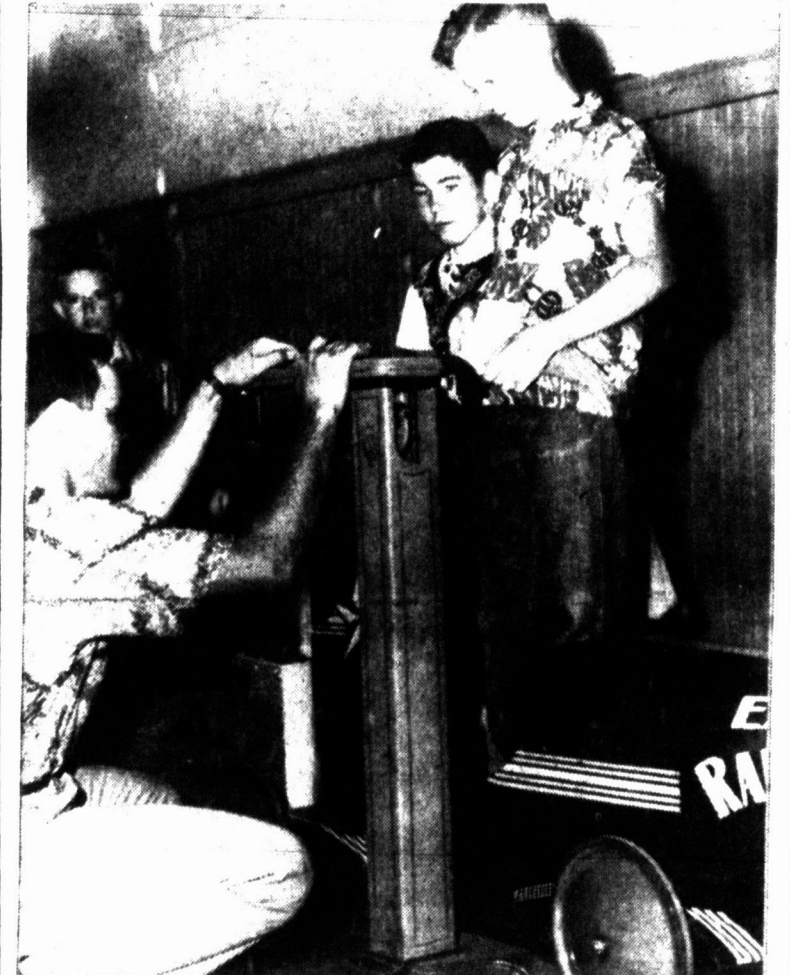

Honor, Integrity Are Said At Stake

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago (AP) — Rival Texas delegations this morning began laying their claims before the Republican National Credentials Committee in the bitter contest as to which group will get the bulk of the Lone Star State's 38 seats. The way for the hearing of the Texas contest was cleared when the backers of Sen. Robert A. Taft yielded 13 contested Louisiana seats to the Eisenhower forces.

Democratic Conventions Are Slated

County Democratic Chairman Aaron Sturgeon today announced the times and places for holding the second round of precinct and county conventions. In accordance with state laws, Sturgeon had to set the dates at July 26, for precinct conventions and Aug. 2, for the county convention. Both conventions will be held at 10 a. m. on the respective days, the hour being set at the discretion of local county executive committees.

Buyer Testifies Against Henderson

AMARILLO (AP) — Grain elevator managers testified yesterday that C. M. Henderson, former mayor of Farwell and a prominent grainman and Commodities Credit Corporation grain as his own during 1950 and 1951. MUNSAN Korea (AP) The first year of Korean armistice negotiations ended today with the United Nations and Communist delegates meeting in secret for 26 minutes. There was no announcement on whether progress had been made toward solving the prisoner exchange deadlock, key issue, blockading a truce. It was the shortest of six secret meetings held since Friday. Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckles, U. N. Command spokesman, said the session was business like but "there was no change in the attitude of either side."

A definite diagnosis of polio has been made by the boy's doctor, and the patient is reported to be improving satisfactorily at Highland General Hospital.

Daniel Seeks Limit To Federal Spending

By HENRY S. GORDON Pulling no punches in his battle for the U. S. Senate, Atty. Gen. Price Daniel this morning called for a federal constitutional amendment prohibiting Congress from spending more money than is provided by revenues. Daniel, who was the first to announce his candidacy and wound up drawing the last place on the Gray County ballot, said he would refuse to raise federal taxes one bit short of total war. He blasted the administration for building up bureaucratic power to where it is greater than Congress in handling the nation's purse strings. "We now have," he charged, "more than 200,000 federal officials at the policy making levels who are not elected to office and they are the ones who are writing the appropriations and tax bills that are being accepted by Congress and passed on to you." He emphasized, too, the comparison between the present administration and the nation's history, saying: "During the last seven years we have been taxed more and the government has spent more than all of the previous administrations put together, including the Roosevelt administration."

U. S. Cool To British Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States reportedly is cool to a British suggestion that a team of political advisers be named to assist Gen. Mark Clark, supreme United Nations commander in Korea. The State Department is said to be against creating any formal new advisory group in the Far East theater at this time. But top American officials told a reporter today they are considering closer liaison between Clark and the American ambassadors in Japan and Korea as a means of preventing military decisions that could result in world-wide repercussions. Informed diplomatic officials said Britain's minister of state, Selwyn Lloyd, suggested the idea of a political guidance team when he talked with Secretary Acheson here several weeks ago. Lloyd reportedly argued such a group, on which Britain would be represented, would make sure Clark and top American military leaders in Korea realized the full international implications of military decisions they might make. A political guidance team, he felt, might have avoided the flare-up between Britain and the United States which resulted from American bombing of Communist power plants in North Korea without first notifying the British.

Murder Instead Of Accident Blamed In Patrolman's Death

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) — The Corpus Christi Caller said today that a border patrolman was murdered and placed at the wheel of his car which crashed into another auto Sunday night. The death of Edmon H. Wheeler, 43, chief of the patrol at Alice, was first believed caused by a highway accident. The Caller story said: "All evidence indicates that whoever shot Wheeler, propped him in the front seat, got partially under the wheel, put the car in gear, jammed the accelerator down and then jumped out." Wheeler's car roared onto the Naacvs River bridge near Saddle, Tex., and crashed head-on into a car driven by Milton Mareth of Orange Grove, Tex. Mareth received a crushed arm. Three others in Mareth's car were not seriously injured.

Airport Contest Entries Pour In

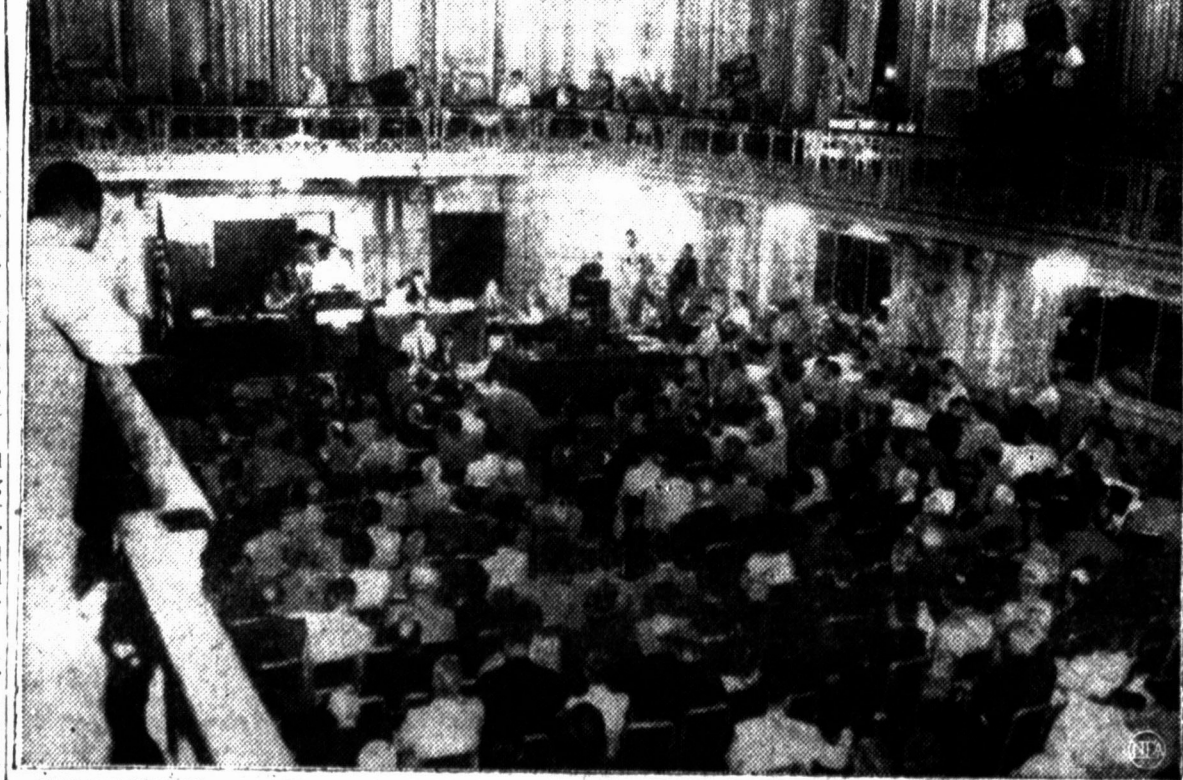

It's often possible to spot an ineffective player from a distance. You may be too far away to see a single card, but you can see the player zip through the first few tricks without hesitating for even a fraction of a second.

Then comes the pause that embarrasses. The rest is confusion. In the hand shown today, West opened the seven of hearts and South hurriedly won the first trick and then took both of dummy's top clubs. When East showed out on the second club, South slowed down.

It was now clear that the clubs could not be brought in. South therefore went after the diamonds, hoping to win four dia-

cash both the ace and the king. If East showed out (as would indeed be the case) the jack would force out West's queen, and to the first round of clubs, South could later take a finesse through West's ten.

If East had started with four clubs to the Q-10, he could practically guarantee four club tricks. If both opponents followed suit to the second round of clubs, the suit would surely break favorably.

### Appropriation Cuts Employment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thousands of government workers throughout the country are being fired as a result of sharp cuts in appropriations for federal agencies.

Although virtually all departments feel the pinch, the hardest hit are the six economic stabilization agencies which officials estimate will release more than 8,000 or over 50 per cent — of their 17,000 employees within 30 days.

These agencies are the Economic Stabilization Agency, Office of Price Stabilization, Wage Stabilization Board, Office of Rent Stabilization, Salary Stabilization Board, and Railroad and Airline Wage Board.

There were no immediate reports from other government agencies on planned cutbacks, but the total will run into additional thousands.

### Overcoat Helps Lawns

URBANA, Ill. (AP)—An overcoat one sixteenth of an inch thick promises new help for starting grass to grow on lawns and slopes.

The method has been developed by Harold M. Smith, a University of Illinois soil scientist, during three years of experiments.

Previously, if a hard rain hit a newly seeded lawn the seed would wash into pockets with an uneven stand of grass resulting.

Or a freshly sown highway shoulder or grass waterway on a farm could quickly wash out and become gullied in a single rainstorm. Seed, fertilizer, topsoil and labor would all be lost.

Smith solved the problem by spraying asphalt on the ground surface after preparation and seeding. Not only did a thin crust hold everything, but seedlings came up from one to two weeks earlier, he noted.

Two special asphalts have been found useful for the purpose. A liquid type, trade named terolite, is produced by the Shell Oil Company. The other, called a cut-back material or asphalt mulch, is put out by the Lion Oil Company. Ordinary asphalts proved unsatisfactory, Smith said.

He said either of new products is superior to straw mulch, the usual material for protecting new seedlings.

### Blood Disorders Traced To Drug Used Against Fevers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Blood disorders and several deaths traced to use of the antibiotic drug known as chloramphenicol have touched off a government investigation into "possible hazards" of its use by humans.

The drug — its scientific name is chloramphenicol — is used for treatment of typhoid fever, rocky mountain fever, typhus, whooping cough, bolis and other infections.

The Food and Drug Administration says it has asked the National Research Council to help it evaluate results of a nationwide survey which turned up 200 cases of blood disorders and "a number of deaths" among patients who have been treated with the drug.

FDA made it clear that beneficial effects of the antibiotic have been proven and that its use would not be ended when it has been proven.

"Doubtless thousands of lives have been saved through its use in serious diseases... several million people throughout the world have been treated with chloramphenicol apparently without adverse effects."

"Many of the most valuable drugs in use today have side-effects which the physician guards against, and their use always involves a calculated risk."

Regarding its survey, FDA would not say how many deaths had been uncovered.

When the investigation results are all in, and full appraisal has been made by medical experts, including blood specialists, it will then be possible to determine the proper course of action, the agency said.

## Early Rainmaker Learned Lot About Weather In West Texas

MIDLAND (AP) — More than half a century ago the federal government sent a specialist to West Texas to try his hand at rainmaking.

He tried for about two weeks. Whether he taught West Texas anything about rain was not clear. But there was no question about this: he learned a lot about West Texas weather.

It was on Feb. 27, 1891, that U. S. Secretary of Agriculture J. M. Rusk commissioned R. G. Dyrenforth to conduct "experiments in the production of rain."

It was probably the first U. S. Government experiment in rainmaking. Dyrenforth conducted his experiments in Andrews County north of Midland, near El Paso and later near San Diego in South Texas.

Dyrenforth believed the explosion of a gas-filled balloon might create rain. Senator C. B. Farwell of Illinois won appropriations of \$2,000 and \$7,000 for rain-making studies. Dyrenforth was put to work as special agent, Nelson Morris, Chicago, offered "the freedom of his large ranch in the dry region of Texas, plus food and lodging," Dyrenforth said in his eventual report of Congress. Dyrenforth accepted.

When he arrived at Midland, after considerable difficulty in assembling this company and supplies, Dyrenforth had premonition that nature had dealt him one from the bottom of the deck.

"The Ranch, known as the 'C' ranch, is near Midland, a station on the Texas & Pacific railroad, and embraces several thousand acres, but the ranch house, located in the south central portion of the Llano Escabado in Andrews County, is 23 miles from Midland, much farther than I had been led to believe," Dyrenforth wrote.

There had been a deficiency of rain for several years in the region and the past 18 months had been severely dry, he was informed. Small wonder that the journey to the ranch "made a strongly negative impression" upon Dyrenforth. His report gave an accurate description of West Texas drought in the summer.

"Though we started early in the morning, the sun shone fiercely. There was not a fleck of a cloud visible anywhere in the sky. The ground was dry with an appearance of alkali. There was a strong dry wind from the south which seemed greedily to take up any moisture that might be present," he recalled.

He had studiously avoided conducting experiments in a wet climate. Now he feared he had gone to the other extreme.

Four wagons hauled equipment to the site. Two large wooden tanks were ordered built in Midland to contain hydrogen and oxygen, which were to be generated on the site. On Aug. 9 the first charges of "crackrock" were touched off in a trial run.

"On the morning of the next day, Aug. 10, a very heavy rain fell, coming from the northeast and extending west and south where she rates in this business."

## Rare Operation To Repair Heart Reported A Success

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Pennsylvania Hospital has disclosed what it termed the "successful completion" of a rare operation in which a section of the body's largest blood vessel was taken from a dead man and transplanted into a living person.

The vessel, the aorta, supplies blood to the body below the heart. It is about 1 1/2 inches in diameter with walls an eighth of an inch thick.

The patient, 46-year-old John Chatman of Philadelphia, was admitted to the hospital suffering from a weakening of the wall of the aorta. At one place his aorta had swollen to the size of a man's fist and was tissue thin. The hospital said a break would have caused immediate death.

On June 25, during an operation of more than seven hours duration, surgeons removed the weakened section of Chatman's aorta and replaced it with a three-inch section taken from the body of a 19-year-old youth who had been killed in an accident 10 days before.

Chatman, now well on the way to recovery, will shortly be released from the hospital.

## Flush Wins Most Poker Hands

"The players in my poker games like to bet on possibilities," relates a San Francisco correspondent. "We play a lot of seven-card stud, splitting the pot between high and low. A player who has four low cards and one aces high card will raise as often as the rules allow.

"Likewise, a player who has a four-flush or a four-card straight will raise as though he already had the hand he is hoping to get. "What should I do, if they raise me when I already have a straight or flush in my first five cards?"

Don't let such opponents catch you when they cross a busy street. It would be a shame if anything happened to prevent them from playing poker with you.

A flush is almost always good enough to win the high end of a pot. A fairly high straight is almost as good an investment. If you already have a hand that will probably win the pot your only problem is to build up the pot, keeping lots of company.

Sometimes the way to build up the pot is to raise back. If the raise is made at your left, and if everybody stays for it, you can raise at your right, however, you must just call; an overraise might drive out the opposition.

You can't be sure of winning every such pot, but you don't need any guarantees. Even if one of the opponents fills his hand, your cards may still be good enough to win. And if nobody fills, you are a sure winner.

As a result, you will win far more than your share of such pots. In the long run you will be a steady winner, and the bigger the pots run the more you will win.

Most poker players have a very peculiar attitude to raises made by opponents. They groan and sigh—and then contribute to the pot. If your chances to win; and you should welcome the raise because it gives you a good excuse to get out.

"Martha Taft is a woman of great courage," commented Rep. Frances Bolton of Ohio as she watched Mrs. Taft receive long lines of guests at a big reception Sunday night. Her husband stood beside her.

## New Atomic Sub To Resemble Shark

WASHINGTON (AP) — The radically new atomic-powered submarine Nautilus being built by the Navy will be a pug-nosed vessel that looks like a hammer-head shark.

This was revealed when the Navy unveiled a 4 1/2-foot model of the submarine President Truman recently said would be able to travel thousands of miles at top speed on a few pounds of uranium fuel.

## Electronic Evangelists Flirt With Death In Science Sermon

CHICAGO, Ill. — (NEA) — When "electronic evangelists" Keith Hargett and George Speake preach that old-time religion, they literally make the sparks fly.

Using scientific experiments to illustrate their sermons, Hargett and Speake have excited audiences from coast to coast by frying eggs on ice, floating steel bars through the air, playing music with a flashlight, changing the deepest bass voice to a stratospheric soprano and other stunts—all to prove the wonders of the Bible.

As one observer put it: "Every time they put on a demonstration, science gets a little friendlier with its old sparring partner, religion."

At the climax of their performance, Hargett and Speake—seven get friendly with death.

The shocker, when the sparks actually do fly, comes when one of the pair steps barefooted atop a copper cylinder. Suddenly, 1,000,000 volts sizzle up through his body and out his fingers.

Speake, a former Naval officer with a background in mechanical engineering, and Hargett, a former aircraft engineer with specialized training in physics, got the know-how for their unique "Sermons from Science" from Dr. Irwin A. Moon, an official of the Moody Bible Institute, which sponsors them.

While pastor of a Los Angeles church, Dr. Moon felt the urgent need to awaken the interest of youth. Then he got an idea. Since youngsters were enchanted by miracles of science, why not weave scientific fabrics through his sermons, demonstrating with experiments?

The idea proved a crowd-pleaser wherever Dr. Moon presented it and led to his association with the Bible Institute. Later the Moody Institute of Science was created. It now produces gospel-science films in sound and color for world-wide distribution.

Hargett and Speake were chosen to carry on Dr. Moon's work and soon added novel touches of their own, such as the human lighting rod stunt and the development of a Lullaby radio station.

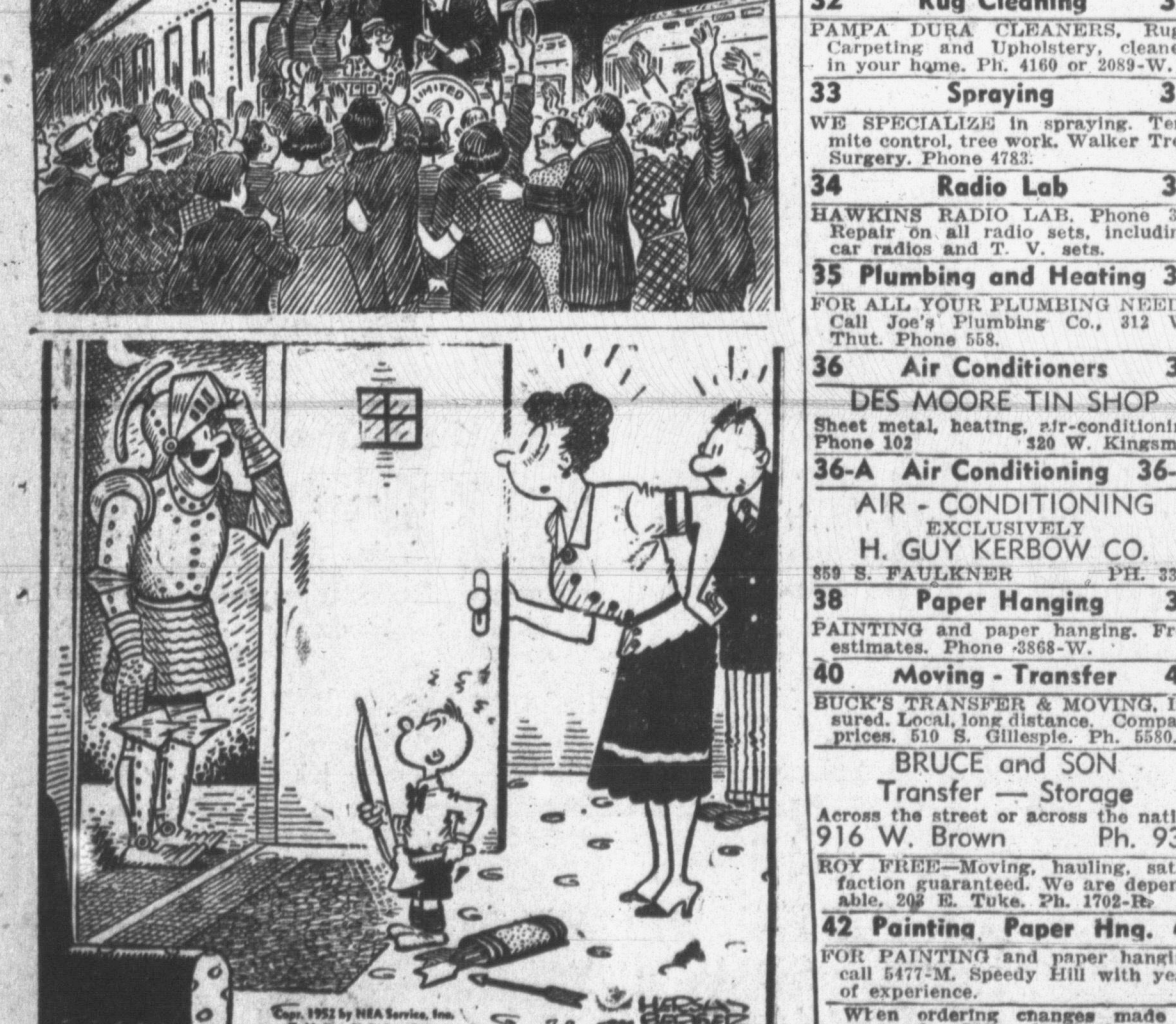

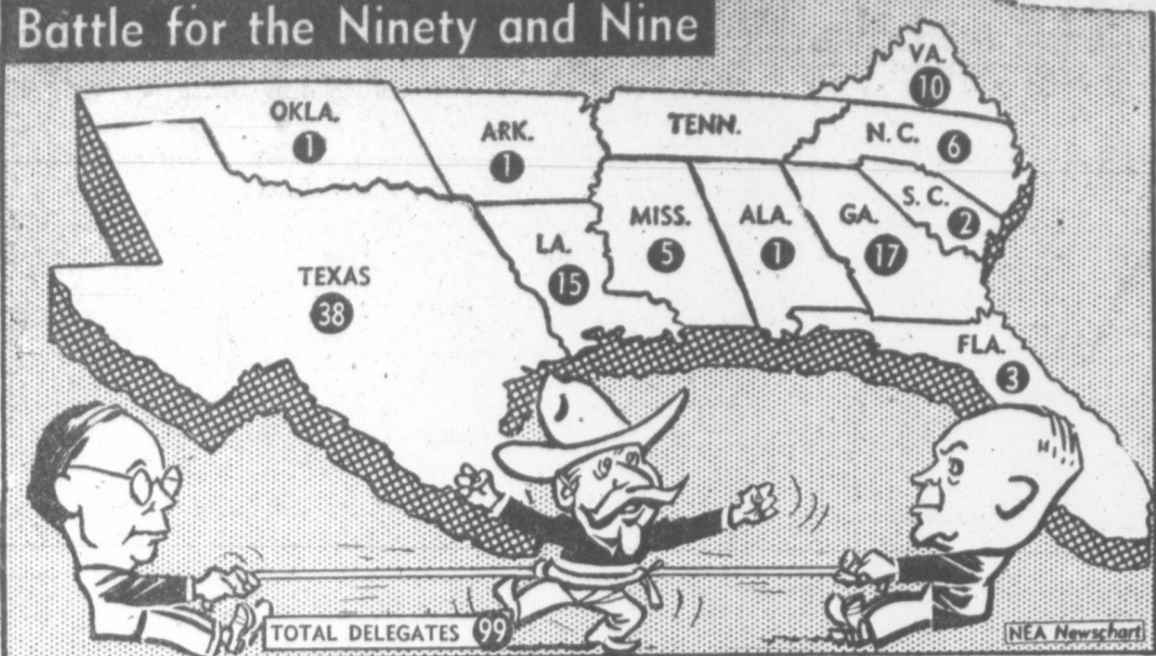

### Battle for the Ninety and Nine



The South, always a Democratic stronghold, this year is destined to play a decisive role in choosing the Republican presidential candidate. The race between Sen. Robert A. Taft and Gen. Dwight Eisenhower is so close that the votes of the Southern delegates to the Republican National Convention may turn out to be the determining factor in the contest. Above Newschart shows the states and the number of delegates that each candidate will be wooing. Without the votes of these delegates, neither one of the major GOP contenders has amassed enough strength to insure victory on the first ballot.

### Area Employment Picture Is Varied

A combination of increased employment, labor-management disputes and the opening of new business firms made up the Texas employment picture during the month of May, according to the Texas Employment Commission. Farm placements totaling 17,162 were handled by the TEC in May, but the non-farm labor force increased only 900 in the same period. The farm jobs filled were double that of the previous month, although they only increased slightly in the West Texas area. The five-month figure—through May—for non-farm employment, however, was better than that for last year.

For the Texas labor market as a whole, the TEC reported that only three people out of every 100 were without jobs in May. The number of unemployed in May was but 100 more than in April. The number of workers involved in labor-management disputes, however, jumped in May to the largest number on the TEC record—20,151. Nevertheless, at the end of the month only 5338 workers were still in disagreement with their employers.

Fifty-five new firms opened for business in Texas during May, says the TEC. This is the largest number of new firms since July, 1951. The new businesses hired a shade more than 2000 employees in eight industries. Except for labor-management wrangles, the employment scene for May in Texas would seem to be a reassuring one. ### Yugoslavia Clamps Down On Smuggling, Black Markets

BELGRADE (AP)—Communist Yugoslavia has clamped down upon smuggling, black-marketeering and currency speculation costing Marshal Josip Broz Tito's financially hard-pressed government tens of thousands of dinars annually. The reform measures are firm, but sometimes they boomerang and cost the country more than it saves. For example: In country short of many of the necessities of life, many Yugoslavs leaned heavily during the postwar years upon gift packages from friends and relatives in the states. Up until recently, these were admitted without customs duty. Now most of these packages, particularly those containing goods drawing high prices on the black market, are subject to a heavy import levy. Without question, there have been abuses calling for some sort of reform, and the government in enforcing the new regulations cited

cases of "gift" parcels packed with such scarce commodities as drugs and women's stockings which later appeared on the black market. In enforcing the custom regulations here the government has based its assessments on the contents of gift packages on the price they bring on the Yugoslav market—in many cases far higher than the purchase price plus the shipping cost in the states. This has discouraged gifts from abroad. On top of the high tariff, customs officials lack the manpower to deal with the problems of inspection and assessment of individual packages. The result is wasted manpower in long waiting queues. A good many of such gift packages are refused once the customs agents have been fixed. The situation has reached the point where one larie mail order house in the United States no longer will guarantee individual deliveries in Yugoslavia.

### Girl Pleads Guilty

An Amarillo girl, Mary Payne, 19, has pleaded guilty in county court to a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Judge Bruce Parker sentenced her to 60 days in jail and fined her \$100 and costs. Deputy Sheriff Buck Haggard had picked her up Saturday on U. S. Hwy. 90, about five miles outside of town.

### Rufer Lost To Cats

TULSA (AP)—Rudy Rufers, infielder for the Fort Worth Cats of the Texas League, probably will be lost to the club a month or six weeks because of a skull fracture. Rufers was pitching batting practice here Sunday when a line drive struck him above the right eye.

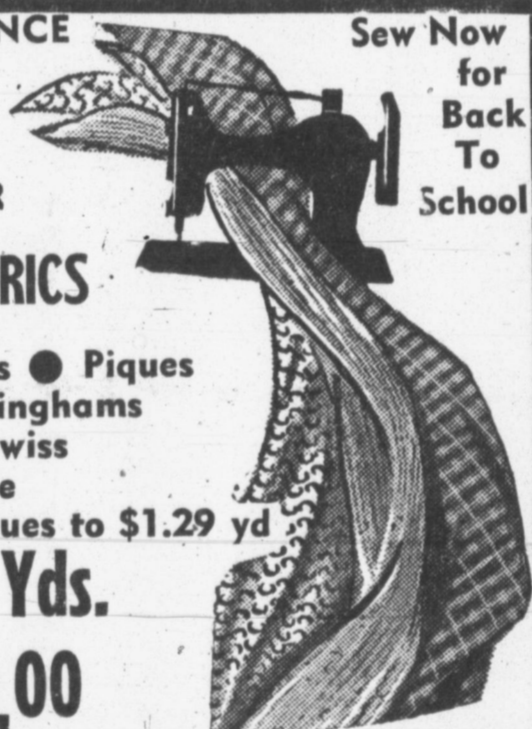

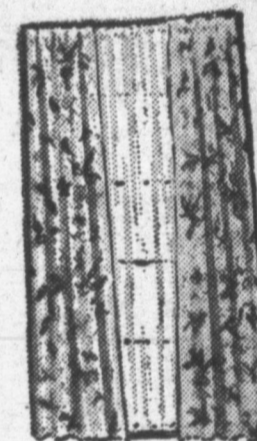

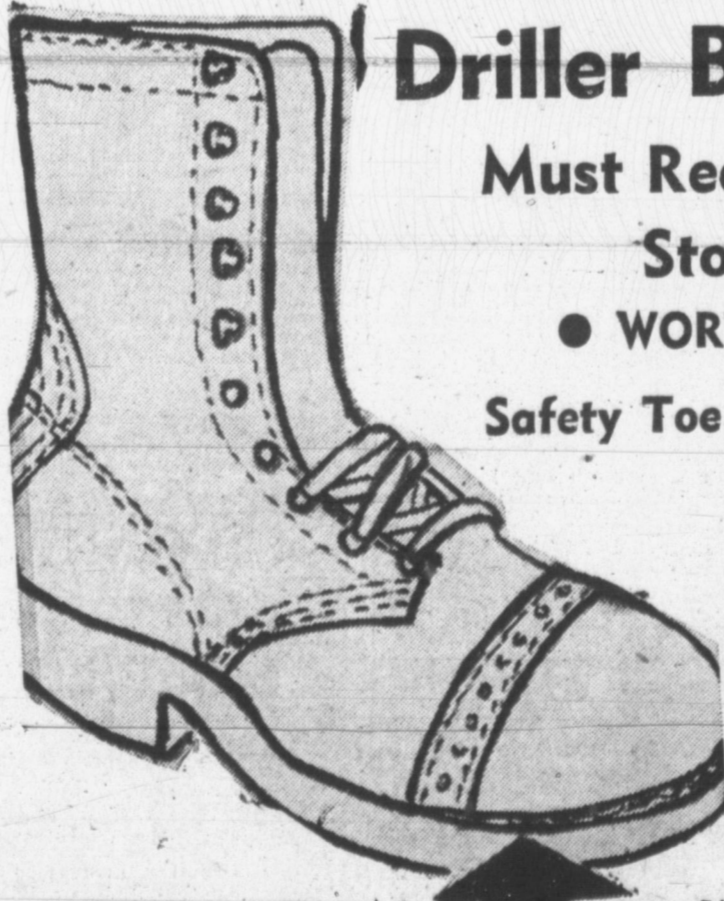
