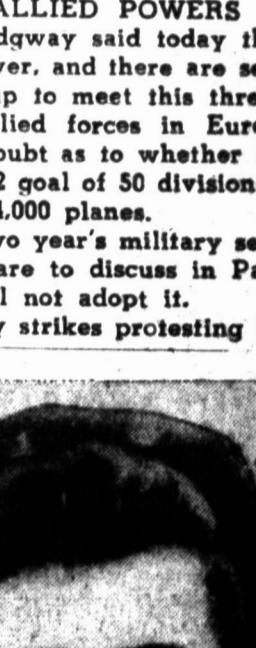

## Filipinos Rocket Bandit Stronghold

**MANIA (AP)**—Philippine warplanes and artillery today sent rockets and explosives crashing into the Jolo Island strongholds of Datu Kamil, Moro regent chieftain who welcomed on his unconditional surrender.

Some 1,500 Filipino troops with tanks and man-hunting dogs drove through vine-laced undergrowth toward the defense points of Kamil and his 500 followers. No ground clashes were reported.

Less than three weeks ago Kamil surrendered and a United States Marine sent to the island to help him would help the army in its campaign to collect firearms from Moros on the jungle island in the Sulu Archipelago of the Southern Philippines.

Magsaysay returned from Jolo yesterday. In a conference with President Elpidio Quirino he advised on the situation on the island.

In Manila, Maj. Gen. Calisto Duque, Philippine chief of staff, said two outlaws had been killed in the 11-day-old campaign to collect weapons. 16 were captured, three surrendered, and 61 persons were detained on suspicion of aiding the dissidents.

The army has picked up 7.04 firearms, he added.

Police are making an investigation.

## Newly Released Convict Shot To Death In Burglary Attempt

**HOUSTON (AP)**—Discharged three days ago from the state prison at Huntsville, where he served a two-year sentence imposed in Frio County, Robert Byron Brown, 25, Pearisall, was shot to death early today in the home of a Houston sales engineer.

For 15 minutes prior to the shooting, he had held James Turner Pinkston, 37, and his wife, 25, in their bedroom in their home, according to police.

Three children slept in upstairs bedrooms as their mother was awakened at 3:30 a.m. by the sound of an intruder moving across the room.

Mrs. Pinkston awakened her husband by pinching him and he reached to snap on a bed lamp. The man was standing at the foot of the bed. In his hand he held what appeared to be a long-barreled rifle.

"Turn out that light," he barked.

Again in darkness, he spoke, informing the couple he was there for money and would not harm them if he got what he wanted. He demanded Mrs. Pinkston's purse and her husband's wallet.

Fading through the rear of the house, the burglar left by a rear door and as he did so, Pinkston leaped up, got a .22 calibre rifle from a closet and went in pursuit.

The burglar, meanwhile reentered the house and stood for an instant silhouetted against the outside window. Pinkston raised his rifle and shot twice. Pulling the trigger a third time, he got a blank click. The gun was empty.

Brown fell across a threshold between the kitchen and dining room.

The mercury stood at a comfortable 76 at 10 a.m. today in comparison with an 84-degree reading at the same time Sunday when it reached a peak of 95 degrees.

## Snyder Vows Clean Slate For Bureau

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Secretary of the Treasury Snyder said today the American people are going to get a federal revenue service of top efficiency, unquestioned integrity and maximum operating economy.

Snyder spoke at ceremonies unveiling the "new" national headquarters of the Internal Revenue Bureau, which is being gradually revamped under a plan advanced by President Truman and approved by Congress against a backdrop of corruption charges.

Snyder, in a prepared speech, made no reference to the scandal that rocked the service last winter and led to the ousting of eight collectors and about 150 lesser employees. Under the new setup, the 64 politically-appointed collectors are being replaced by civil service status.

At today's ceremonies, three tax service career men were sworn in as assistant commissioners, titles formerly held by political appointees.

## Candidates' Armies Clank Into Position For Battle

Like two great armies on the eve of battle, the clank and rattle of maneuvering for position began arising in earnest today from the Democratic and Republican camps.

D-Day — Labor Day, Sept. 1 — was precisely three weeks away and there was much preparation for the two months of campaigning that will follow. The presidential election is Nov. 4.

At Denver, Gen. Dwight Eisenhower arranged for serious powers after a relaxing visit yesterday with 355 American Indian tribes. The outcome of his conference with leaders of eight Southern states may decide what kind of Republican thrust will be made into the Democrats' Dixie stronghold.

In Springfield, Ill., Democrats used words like "general" and "commander-in-chief" in a somewhat discordant, albeit good humored, discussion of just how firmly Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson will grasp the Democratic standard.

GOP presidential nominee Eisenhower, after the Southern state conference, scheduled a meeting with some Republican members of congressional agriculture committees and other party farm leaders.

Eisenhower flew from Denver to Gallup, N. M., yesterday to address an estimated 10,000 attending the 31st annual Inter-Tribal Indian Ceremonial.

Some of the men around Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, gathered about the same time at a news conference in Springfield. They were retiring party Chairman Frank McKinney; his successor, Stephen Mitchell; and Stevenson's personal campaign manager, Wilson Wyatt.

McKinney, who was appointed by President Truman, said he feels as he steps down that he has accomplished party unity "100 per cent," one of his objectives, Mitchell and Wyatt were hand-picked by Stevenson.

When a reporter asked whether Stevenson would have a "two-headed campaign," the trio gave these replies:

**Only One General**

McKinney — "No, there won't be a two-headed campaign. There can be only one general and that is the national chairman, Mitchell."

**There is a Commander-in-Chief** and the others work for him. Gov. Stevenson is the commander-in-chief."

**Wyatt** — "The campaign is under the direction of the government—and there is only one general."

## Recluse's Treasure Raises Questions

**SOMERSET, Pa. (AP)**—Search of an isolated home occupied by a wealthy man — who even in death was armed with a gun and protected by a fierce pack of dogs — is almost completed today but unsolved are these questions:

**Why did Samuel Jackson King live in such conditions while worth at least \$68,000? And how did he save so much?**

Treasure hunters who have probed the debris-littered mountain farmhouse where King lived have come up with nearly \$18,000 in negotiable bonds, old currency, gold and silver coins in addition to bank books, safe deposit vault keys and real estate deeds indicating an estate worth approximately \$50,000. These were tucked away in places like a sofa, cookie jar and a woman's corset.

The whole thing started 10 days ago when King was found dead in a field, on his farm about 20 miles from this southwestern Pennsylvania community.

A week ago last Tuesday the body of the 73-year-old recluse was found by neighbors and police in the field.

Nearby, lay King's favorite dog.

## Threat Of War As Imminent As Ever

**SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED POWERS IN EUROPE (AP)**—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway said today that the threat of war is still as big as ever, and there are serious weaknesses in the West's buildup to meet this threat.

The supreme commander of allied forces in Europe told a news conference there was doubt as to whether the Western Allies could reach their 1952 goal of 50 divisions—25 active and 25 in reserve — and 4,000 planes.

Ridgway also said he favored two year's military service — something European nations are to discuss in Paris tomorrow amid indications they will not adopt it.

Belgium has already been hit by strikes protesting her two-year draft term.

Ridgway, former United Nations commander in Korea, took over the SHAPE command in May from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"The most serious deficiency, to date," Ridgway said, is the SHAPE buildup in the logistics field.

The problem of building warehouses, troop installations and air fields is broad and complex, he said, and "I haven't had time to go into the almost innumerable details of that program."

On the question of British and French hints they may not be able to reach their rearmament goals because of economic difficulties or failure to receive sufficient United States aid, he said that is "above this headquarters and at a government level."

He added, however, he felt the question "can and will be adjusted without damage to the SHAPE program."

He said the new superweapons being developed are exceedingly difficult to evaluate and it was very difficult to estimate whether the number of ground troops could be cut down.

"The matter is continuously under study, not only from our point of view but from the point of view of any enemy capabilities," he said.

In a prepared statement pending the news conference, he said "some uncertainties in the area of quite prone to overlook the obstacles" in setting up an international command.

For his part, he felt it "incredible that such harmonious ties" had been formed in such a short time.

Finnish police say they do not know where he went, but he has a permit to stay in Finland until the end of this month.

The escapee is Panait Calcai, 26, who laid his plans for a flight to freedom carefully and made them good last Tuesday, when his team was about to leave for home.

Calcai revealed his plan to a Swedish Olympic correspondent. Here is how it worked:

The young Romanian deliberately left behind his knapsack when the team left the Olympic village at Otaniemi. When the team arrived at the central station, he suddenly "noticed" his knapsack was missing and asked permission to return for it. A-

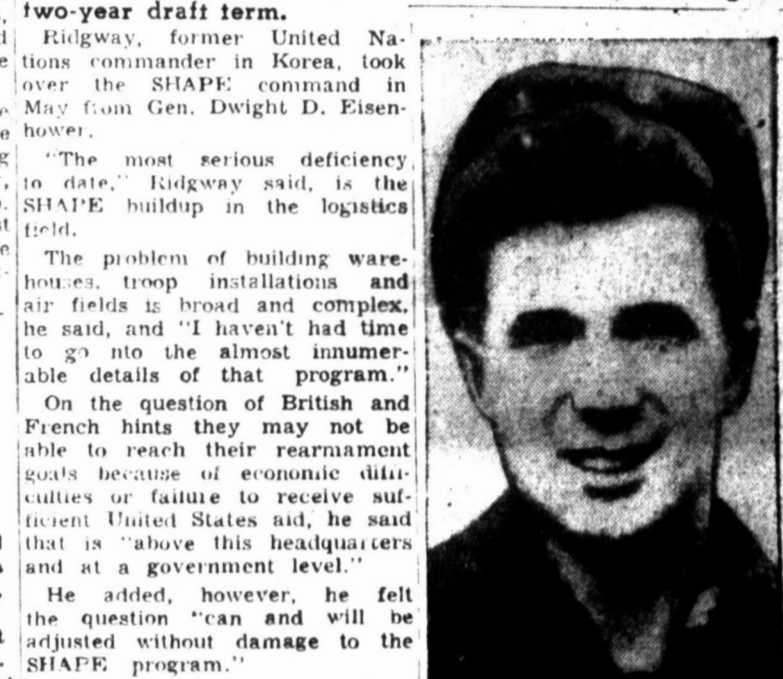

## County Verifies Prison Escape

**MUNICH, Germany (AP)** — A Czech refugee said today John Hvasista escaped with him and four other prisoners last Jan. 2 from a Czech prison where Hvasista, an American, was serving a 10-year sentence as a spy. The refugee's story supported an official Czech announcement of Aug. 8 that Hvasista escaped Jan. 2 and that his whereabouts since are unknown.

The story of the escape was told in an interview by Jaroslav Burec, 30.

## Romanian Athlete Hiding From Commies In Finland

**HELSINKI, Finland (AP)** — A member of Romania's team of Olympic pistol sharpshooters is reported hiding out somewhere in Finland today after escaping from a Communist secret police guard.

Finnish police say they do not know where he went, but he has a permit to stay in Finland until the end of this month.

The escapee is Panait Calcai, 26, who laid his plans for a flight to freedom carefully and made them good last Tuesday, when his team was about to leave for home.

Calcai revealed his plan to a Swedish Olympic correspondent. Here is how it worked:

The young Romanian deliberately left behind his knapsack when the team left the Olympic village at Otaniemi. When the team arrived at the central station, he suddenly "noticed" his knapsack was missing and asked permission to return for it. A-

## UNESCO History

(Editor's Note: The following is the third of a series of editorials which are based on a report by Florence Fowler Lyons of Beverly Hills, Calif., after she had covered the "Model United Nations" conference held on the campus of the University of Southern California. Nearly 1,000 students from 73 colleges and universities in seven western states, Alaska and Hawaii participated.)

That the proponents of UNESCO, (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) mean business and are going about their business with determination is evidenced by a project now being worked on by UNESCO "experts." It is a five-year writing project at which time they will have concluded a "new" history book. And the purpose of all of this labor is to produce a single history book that will be used in every classroom in the world, including, of course, the classroom in member nations which includes the United States of America.

It was roughly two years after UNESCO had been dreamed up when a "directive" was issued for the book. In 1948 "educators" from various parts of the globe were global-minded in their thinking, and, among other things determined that there should be a new world history book.

First, these globalists wrote about the wonders of living in an "international community" and how wonderful it would be for American citizens to forget that they were Americans and become "citizens of the world." Having gotten this off their chests, they wrote, in "Towards World Understanding":

"School textbooks have, as a rule, been written with so little objectivity and integrity that history, as generally taught up to now, has been an obstacle to international understanding. . . . The need is urgent for a general revision of textbooks, both national and general. . . . This revision, another task worthy of UNESCO, should carry much further the elimination of events which, from the world-education point of view, have no value, such as the endless catalogues of wars."

Under such a start, American children apparently could not be taught that there was once fought a war for Freedom — a Revolution against tyranny.

"There is need above all for Universal History. Just as the child should grow used to considering the earth as his habitat, so must he learn to consider the whole of humanity as the fatherland in whose service the particular fatherlands, his own and all others, are enrolled. . . ."

"The stage of civilization which the world has reached makes it imperative that from now on all children be taught some measure of universal history and that they should study the history of their own country ONLY in relation to its part in the development of the whole community.

Having received the "directive" for such a project from the "educators" of the world, it was a relatively simple matter to provide the money for the project. And late in 1951 the United Nations set aside \$600,000 for the writing of the new history book. How much of the \$600,000 is paid by American taxpayers may be determined by the share of cost of UN to Americans.

So now the project had a directive and the money to carry it out. The next step, of course, is to make it all legal and make it attractive to Americans, who, after all, are going to pay most of the freight. So the UN set up a new commission. It is called the International Commission for a Scientific and Cultural History of Mankind.

These experts estimate that the writing of the book will take about five years. It is expected to run about six volumes. It is planned that it will contain about three million words. The title is to be: "A Scientific and Cultural History of Mankind: The Development of Peoples."

And don't attempt to shrug it off with "so what?" Listen to George Stoddard, chairman of the U. S. National Commission for UNESCO, speaking to 100 "key" UNESCO people:

"It (the history book) is truly a labor of love — of love not only of accurate and devoted scholarship, but also of humanity. Few people will read firsthand the six volumes, but MANY PERSONS WILL FEEL THEIR IMPACT. A single comprehensive volume will serve as a source book in which the story of mankind will be retold in popular style."

Thus, American children at different grade levels will read, study and use books at their proper grade level which have been developed from this "source book."

## War In Korea

The Korean war, now in its third year, stands as the greatest military enigma in American history.

Although truce talks are still underway, they have led only to frustration and if the tempo of Korean hostilities continues to increase as it has done this week they may be abandoned entirely. The current outlook for peace through this means appears blacker than at any time since they started a year ago.

Two years of fighting have cost the United States approximately 110,000 casualties including more than 17,000 American soldiers killed in action.

What has been bought for this terrible human price, military leaders are hard put to explain. The battle line runs across the Korean peninsula roughly from a point 50 miles above the 38th parallel at the eastern end to a point slightly below the 38th line at the western end. We, and the Russian supported Chinese, have used the battlefields as a testing ground for new supplies and equipment. The development of air offensive has not been conclusive in Korea and hardly could be with the Yalu river limitation prohibiting full use of American air power. The appearance of fast jet fighters as a clue to future air war technique has probably been the most significant development.

Ideologically, the Korean war is a subject of hot discussion among politicians. We have prevented the Communist grab for South Korea but we appeared to have destroyed the economy of all the Koreans in the doing. We may have made the Kremlin more cautious in its activation of a program for world conquest, but it is doubtful if we have quenched that hungry flame.

## Better Jobs

"This Is Our Problem" Or This Is Your Problem

People of course do not like problems, but whether or not they like them, they will solve them or suffer for not doing so.

The real problem of every individual is for him to learn what promotes liberty, peace and friendship. If he cannot himself understand the principles that promote these desirable ends, then the next thing for him to do is learn who does understand these principles and follow his advice.

This subject of "This Is Our Problem" was brought to my attention by a little folder issued by the Chicago Junior Association of Commerce and Industry. It is a report on information presented at the first Freedom Forum, which was held at Harding College in Searcy, Arkansas. This Forum had very good objectives. They were:

- 1. Identify encroaching Socialism — Communism.
- 2. Point out the superiority of the American way of life.
- 3. Understand the American way of life.
- 4. Preserve the American way of life.

Then the folder goes on to show how these objectives should be brought about. Under the heading of "Identify Encroaching Socialism — Communism" it makes these observations:

"The philosophy of socialism is not new. History records many great nations which started with democratic or republican forms of government that have fallen because of socialism. Greece and Rome are good examples.

"These countries fell because the party in power—the rules—attempted to provide greater benefits to more people through and by a central government." "These new benefits required money and more money to pay them. When it couldn't be obtained through conquest, there were only two remaining courses available to tax the people or to take over the ownership of private enterprise."

"Where taxation was used, the central government had to gradually expand its control until, instead of a democracy, a totalitarian state (as we call it today) came into existence. Exactly the same thing happened in the countries where the government took over the ownership of private enterprise."

"The important thing to remember is that never in the history of the world has any government, once it started down the road to Socialism, ever turned back and successfully restored its democratic form. Instead, it ceased to exist!"

Then the booklet tells how England advanced into socialism. It quotes Sir Stafford Cripps as saying that the old philosophy had to be paid for, in this manner:

"When I hear people speaking of reducing taxation and at the same time see the costs of social services rising rapidly in response very often to the demands of the same people, I sometimes wonder whether or not they appreciate the old adage: 'We cannot have our cake and eat it.'"

Then the booklet goes on to explain that in England the government has the right to tell a man where he must work, it determines wages, prices, etc. Then it explains how Socialism developed in New Zealand, France, Italy and Russia.

"The authors of the booklet inquire: 'What is the difference between Communism and Socialism today?' Their answer is: 'Their end objective of absolute control by a central government is the same. The means used to reach this goal are different. The Socialists favor evolution. However, both groups believe that the end justifies any means. So, Communism, Socialism, Nationalism, etc., mean the same in the end—absolute control by a central government.'"

"But how can a government, a planner, or a dictator decide how human energies should be directed? How can they decide where you and I or anybody else can do our best?"

"It is like taking ten people and saying they must work in our mines; another ten must work in our atomic research laboratories; and still another group shall promote the arts such as literature and music."

"You can't delegate power to have inspirations or abilities. Creative ideas must come from within."

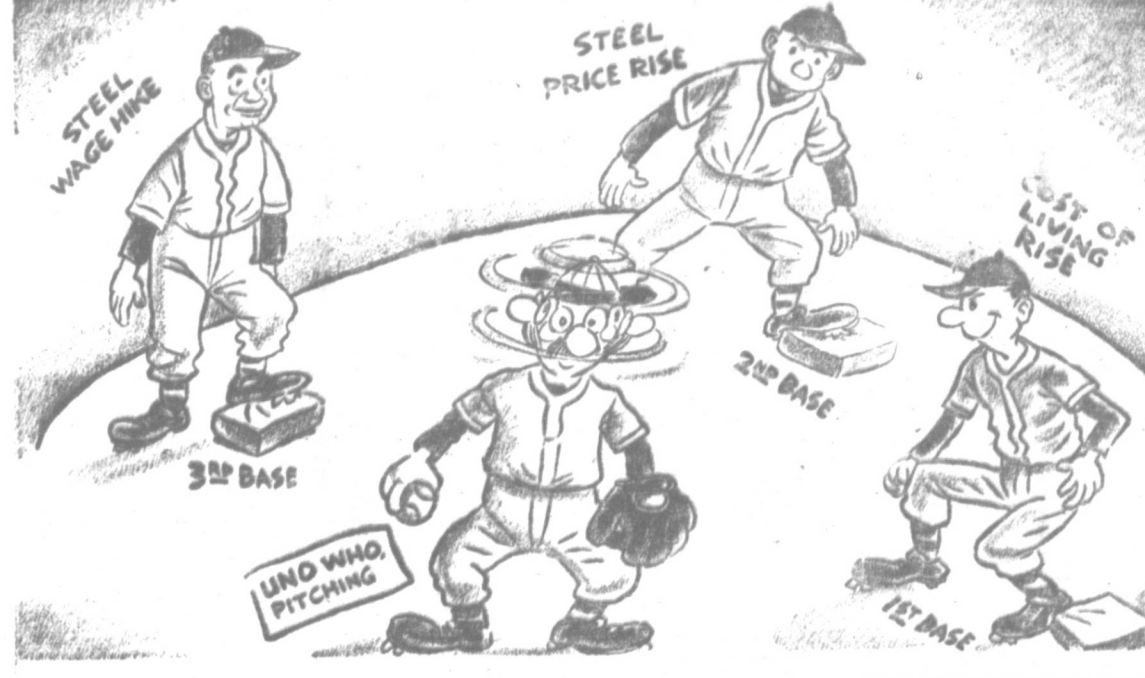

## National Whirligig... Truman Continues Efforts Despite Stevenson's Rebuffs

By RAY TUCKER



WASHINGTON — Although hurt by Governor Stevenson's post-convention announcement that Truman is being having like a loyal party patriot to the end.

Despite differences in outlook between the old and the new Democratic leaders, two reasons animate Truman in his quiet efforts to aid the 1952 ticket. The first is a deep sense of party loyalty that prevents him from permitting personal pique to prejudice him.

The second is his realization that another Democratic triumph will be interpreted as approval of his years in the White House. He cannot bear the thought of a Republican comeback after twenty years of Democratic disaster.

He would be remembered in party annals as a failure, ranking with the inept Buchanan pre-Civil War days.

STRATEGY — Whatever the inspiration, the politically shrewd Truman has made several moves designed to improve and polish the record on which Stevenson must seek election. If he succeeds, the Republicans may discover that several of their major issues have disappeared under their noses.

The Acheson mission to implement the Pacific Pact, which embraces the United States, Australia and New Zealand, highlights the Truman strategy. It is intended to offset GOP charges that Washington has neglected our interests in the Far East because of its obsession with European affairs. It will be advertised as a long-range program for containment of Russia in that area, and for eventual eviction of Muscovite conquerors from the mainland.

Coincident with this sudden Achesonian sortie, which marks his first active show of interest in this area, Truman has ordered a step-up in the air campaign over Korea.

This is the answer to the MacArthur statement that "there is no substitute for victory." More intensive action by our ground and naval forces is expected between now and November.

REPEATED — Truman has also ordered a speed-up in the reorganization of the Internal Revenue Bureau, which he proposed as a counteroffensive against revelations of widespread corruption in this agency.

Whereas it had been expected that these basic reforms could not be installed for a year, the new program means that the changeover from a politics-for-profit to a merit system will have been accomplished to a great extent before the November balloting. This will enable Administration apologists to declare that the "House of Truman" has been cleansed of crooks.

As reported previously, Truman and Secretary Snyder have juggled the handling of maturing bond issues so that \$160,000,000 or \$80,000,000 of increased carrying charges will not appear on the Treasury's books until after the election.

CONTRIBUTION — While these are extremely important technical improvements in the Democrats' pre-election setup, perhaps Truman's most important contribution to Stevenson's chances has been in the field of human — or political — relations. Even though

## The Doctor Says

It is risky to be born prematurely. Those deaths which occur in premature infants are among the 10 leading causes of death in the whole population. In 1944, for example, more than 30,000 deaths were recorded among premature infants.

But the situation is getting better. In 1938 about 15 premature infants died for every thousand live births; in 1944 this had fallen to about 11, and is probably continuing to improve. This means that today infants born prematurely have a considerably better chance of surviving than those who were born 20 years ago.

A baby is considered premature if its weight at birth is less than 5 1/2 pounds. Premature babies are usually weak and have to be fed at frequent intervals, often with a medicine dropper because they cannot take much at one time.

Two things are largely responsible for the improvement in the chances of life for these infants. One is the improved incubators which in many modern hospitals today are air-conditioned cubicles with temperature and humidity kept under control. The second is the much better knowledge of feeding.

The smallest infant known to have survived into childhood weighed one pound at birth. It is not recorded what happened to this child, but many people who later became famous were born prematurely. The records indicate that among these were Darwin, Newton, Napoleon, Voltaire and Rousseau.

Premature babies who live past the danger period are just as likely to be healthy or to become famous as those who are born with normal size and weight.

SOON CATCH UP — Their rate of growth is more rapid than full-term infants. Consequently in a few months or a year or two, they have caught up with the larger infants.

The problem of reducing the deaths of premature infants is still present. Part of the problem can be met by trying to reduce the number of infants born too early. Part can be met by further steps aimed at better care for those who do come into the world early. Work is going forward on both fronts.

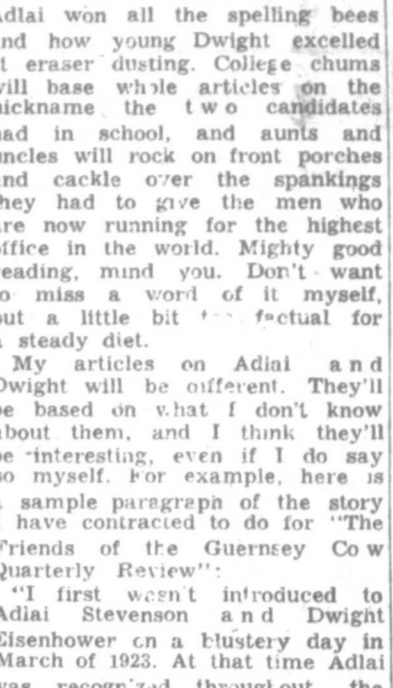
