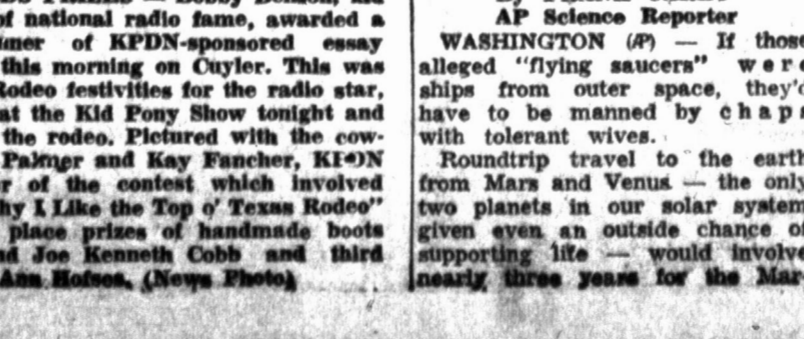

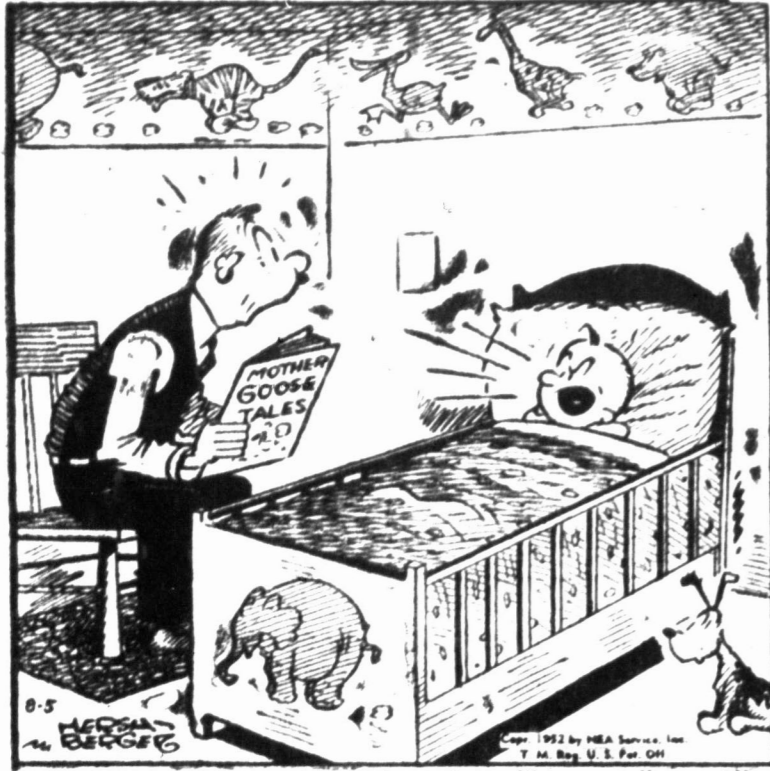

# Camera News

It took the French Embassy through its commercial attache in New York City, to introduce in this country the first 2 1/4 x 2 1/4 twin lens reflex camera with interchangeable lenses. Made in France, the Rex Reflex had a special debut for press, photo dealers and assorted photographers.

The idea of a roll film reflex camera on which you could change lenses has been the dream of many camera fans and the object of much research. It has been accomplished in the French camera by supplying two complete optical systems, each one mounted on a metal lens board. This board is locked in place, or slips off the front of the camera

by flipping two small levers, one on each side of the lens.

One lens system has a normal 75 mm f3.5 taking lens. The other has a 150mm f5.5 telephoto taking lens. Each lens system has a lighter viewing lens coupled to these taking lenses and a shutter synchronized for flash and strobe.

Several professional photographers were asked to test the camera before it made its official appearance. One of them was Josef Schneider, well-known baby photographer. He was favorably impressed with its handling.

"I was very pleased with the sharpness of the pictures though taken at its widest aperture while hand-held," he said. "Switching lenses was easy and there seemed to be remarkably little distortion

in close-up heads shot from below."

## Aid-To-Farmers To Stress Long-Term Conservation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's aid to farmers program next year will emphasize long-term conservative practices, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan says.

Brannan called it a "farm-by-farm, first-things-first" approach. He said the Agriculture Department will make every effort to see that assistance given under the 1953 Agriculture Conservation Program (ACP) is directed to soil and water conservation practices that farmers on their own likely would not carry out to the extent needed.

"Emphasis will again be put on shifting away from those practices that—thanks to the success of previous programs—are now becoming established as standard operations on well-run farms, so that the funds and assistance may be used to carry out conservation measures that are over and above what farmers might be expected to carry out on their own resources and on their own initiative," Brannan said in a statement.

He added that farmers who co-operate in the 1953 ACP will be offered assistance only on those practices that will help them meet current farm production goals and at the same time help them keep their land in condition to meet the larger demands that a larger population will put on them in the years ahead.

Under the ACP financed by a financial assistance is given to farmers who carry out approved conservation practices on their farms.

WINNIPEG, Canada (AP) — A restaurant group here offers a monthly meal ticket on which you can eat four steaks a day—or anything else—at your choice of three restaurants.

A \$45 meal-ticket entitles the purchaser to any number of meals a day, and choice of foods, every day for a whole month.

Many regular customers express satisfaction with the plan. All eat regularly, and eat food much the same way as if they were eating at home, with no leaning toward expensive table items or fancy steaks.

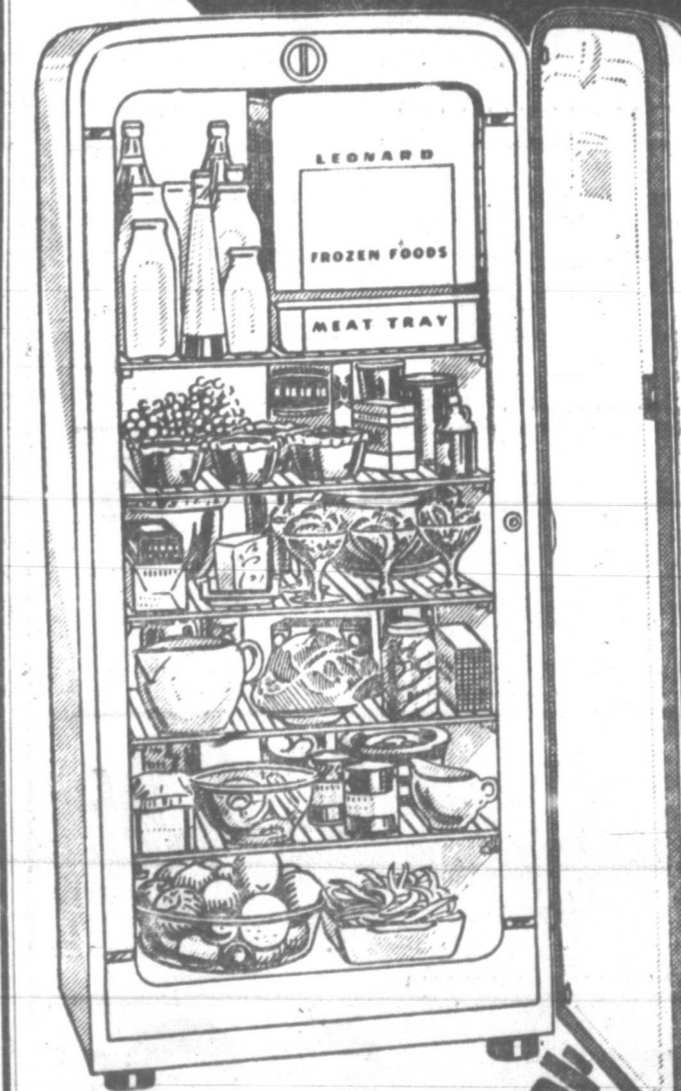

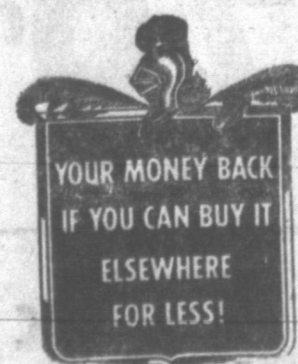

**Beauty Depends On Basic Treatments**

Do you know how to pick the proper cleansing cream for your skin type? And, for that matter, do you know what your skin type actually is? It has become all too common a practice for many women to select a cleansing cream at random, and expect it to do the job. The odds are against them. There are four skin classifications; dry; oily; combination (oily in some places, dry in others); and normal. As with other treatment preparations, only the cream made for your skin type will do the most for it. But how are you to recognize your complexion category? Simple. Your skin is dry if it looks dry; if it has rough patches or a flaky appearance. Dry skin is apt to show fine lines and there may also be a papery shine on your nose. What you need is a rich, creamy cleanser that helps soften the skin as it removes dirt, grime and make-up. It should leave your skin feeling fresh, clean, soft and smooth. Oily skin has a moist, oily shine, with an almost uncontrollable tendency to conspicuous pores. It is inclined to look greasy and may have some blackheads and whiteheads. Believe because your skin is oily it does not need a cleansing cream. Rather, it is extremely important for you to make a daily habit of removing every bit of clogging matter, without adding more oil to the skin. Your cleansing cream should cleanse thoroughly, remove clogged dirt and caked make-up and leave your skin looking bright and clearer, with less conspicuous pore openings. It is a misconception to believe that a combination skin is usually dry around the eyes, cheeks and mouth, and oily through the center of the chin. Look for a light, fluffy cream that gently softens as it cleanses, but without any excess of rich ingredients. The young, sensitive and normal skin requires nothing more than a good lubricating cleanser. Don't hesitate to discuss your skin and its problems with your cosmetician. She is experienced and well-qualified to give you any special advice you may need. Check your skin type and the cleanser you are using with her. Then you will be positive you are on the right path to beauty. Once you have your cream home, the next thing you must give some thought to is application. As a general rule, always apply a cream or a lotion with long upward strokes, starting at the base of the neck and going up over the face. Don't use a downward movement, as you may break down the tissues. And those nice long strokes help bring up the blood up to the face and stimulate circulation. Really massage so that you will stimulate circulation. If your nails are continually breaking, try filing them (with an emery board, of course), in a square. In other words, don't shape your nails into an oval or a point. The squarer your nail, the stronger it will be. This is because the sides lend support. Until your nails become stronger, keep them fairly short. An important factor, naturally, is your diet. Are you drinking enough milk, eating green vegetables? When it comes to your polish, always apply a base coat, two coats of the polish itself and then the top coat. If, however, the polish still chips, don't wear it during the day. It is much better to use a colorless polish than to allow chipping to spoil the beauty of your hands. Occasional attention will never show results. 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## You Can't Win

The Republican and Democratic parties have read the conservative voter of the United States out of both their houses and we have as the two possibilities for incumbent of the White House come next January a pair of like-thinking semi-socialist internationalists.

The nomination of Adlai Ewing Stevenson of Illinois by the Democrats gives that party its strongest candidate, one who faces no sectional prejudice as might Senator Russell, nor machine opposition in the big cities as would Senator Kefauver.

This nomination of Stevenson comes closer to a real draft of a candidate than the maneuver of the Eisenhower forces in the GOP ranks which ran around on the shoals of Taft dissenters.

Mr. Stevenson had bluntly and consistently stated he "could not accept" the nomination; that he would rather be Illinois governor than president; that he "did not feel himself fit to be President"; that he "would damn well like to chuck the whole thing."

That was the situation right up to the week of the convention, the day of the nominations; and so far as overt evidence is available the man did not lift his own hand to swing a delegate to himself.

But it is rather easy to see why the Democratic leaders have come to Mr. Stevenson — standing as they do under the shadow of the Republican nomination of Dwight Eisenhower. There was not one of the other major candidates who would not have goaded one or another of the party's feuding factions to a frenzy. Senator Russell of Georgia would have driven away almost the whole of the party outside the old Confederacy. Averell Harriman would have sent the Southerners rushing home to arms. Senator Kefauver would have been a bitter pill for the Northern bosses. Senator Kerr and the remaining ragtail of favorite sons and dark horses raised only faint enthusiasm.

To keep the Democratic donkey from kicking itself to death the party leaders turned to Mr. Stevenson. Neither the Southerners nor the city bosses nor the "intellectuals" are frothing with enthusiasm for the shy lawyer from Bloomington, Ill., but they have no antagonism toward him and they recognize that he is saddled with none of the disadvantages of those who were running so hard for the nomination.

Mr. Stevenson by his reluctance has managed to escape any man's label and particularly that of Harry Truman although it must be pointed out that the Political Plague from Independence, Mo., tried hard to brand him.

Some cynics may suspect that Mr. Stevenson's balkiness was contrived to give him looser bid. If the purpose was to shake loose the effluvia of the Truman administration, more power to him.

At any rate, we now have our candidates. Mr. Stevenson of the Democratic party, Mr. Eisenhower of the Republicans.

Frankly, the people can have little choice between them.

Both are relatively new faces in the political scenery without being unknowns on the national scene. Both are internationalists of almost identical degree, believing in strong American intervention in foreign affairs particularly in Europe. Both are credited with an inclination to clean the corruption out of the federal bureaucracy — Stevenson has already exhibited capacity along that line in Illinois — but neither has indicated any program to decrease the amount of bureaucracy in government.

Both may be less free with the public money than the Trumanite regime but neither offers any hope for an end to the New Deal — Fair Deal philosophy which has permeated the American government.

At the present time it appears that Stevenson comes to the electorate somewhat freer of labels than Eisenhower who left the GOP convention the captive candidate of the Eastern Republicans. Just what the general will do about these chains is a moot issue.

Stevenson himself at 52 is a strange type of politician, complex and self doubting, who has figuratively broad-jumped within a four year period from the calm waters of a prosperous law practice in Chicago to the roaring rapids of a presidential campaign.

As governor of Illinois, Stevenson has acted as a sensible man who had strayed into politics by mistake and had no intention of adapting himself to a new and unsavory environment. His tactics of naive ruthlessness have jolted or hypnotized a hostile Legislature to a point where it has permitted him to achieve an extensive and ambitious program of reform in a state where it would be a masterpiece of understatement to say it was needed.

But this is not to indicate Governor Stevenson belongs to the minimum government school. He does not, and neither does General Eisenhower — by their words and by their acts. They both subscribe to the myth that Big Government is an essential to modern living and their only saving grace is a vanity — the hope they can make it work honestly and economically.

So here the people of the United States have now before them the results of the so-called deliberations of the two major parties and it will be one of these two presidential nominees — Stevenson or Eisenhower — who will be elected President of these United States in November. That is the way of the democratic process in our Republic.

It is a dangerous time for the conservative minority in this nation. Their fortunes are at low ebb. They have been cast aside in the Republican ranks and a ruthless attempt was made to destroy them in the Democratic party by fanatical zealots who forget or deliberately deny that this is a Republic where the majority may rule but the minority still has rights.

The deliberate affront to the southern conservatives in the Democratic convention rules — softened only somewhat by the seating of the Virginia, South Carolina and Louisiana delegations — may be something the Democrats may regret on Nov. 4.

The so-called "loyalty" resolution, committing delegates to an unseem platform and an unidentified candidate, created many angry gentlemen of an ire that will not cool quickly — the anger of those whose consuls are rejected unheard.

Neither Republican nor Democratic party in the year 1952 offers them political sanctuary.

The new candidates guarantee only the end of the consularship of Truman.

They offer no more.

## Better Jobs

"Something Can Be Done"

I want to quote from an article in the Freedom Club news by C. B. Tibbets, president of the Los Angeles Steel Casting Company. It expresses so clearly the ideas that this column has been trying to present that I want to quote Mr. Tibbets' way of explaining liberty and freedom and a definite limited government. I quote:

"It hardly seems possible that today this great nation of ours, secure because it was founded on freedom of the individual, is now in the process of trading that freedom for the shackles of a security that is as nebulous as a mirage on the desert."

"I would like to tell you what I think is wrong, and what I think can be done about it. But remember, I am a steel maker. My effort will not be polished, but I will do my best to tell you how it looks from the foundry."

"Steel making is controlled by definite physical laws. When those physical laws are followed and our practice conforms to them, steel is good. When our practice does not follow those laws, the steel is porous or brittle and good for nothing but the scrap heap."

"The laws that govern life and people were laid down by the same Creator at the start of time, and history is the record of man's search for those laws of the Creator."

"When man discovers those principles and lives by them, he prospers and is happy. When he lives in violation of those laws of the Creator, either because of ignorance or wilfully, the result is regression, unhappiness and, finally, oblivion."

"It is just as impossible to create a good civilization when men do things contrary to God's laws which govern human behavior as it is for us to tap out of our furnaces a good heat of steel when we have violated the laws of metallurgy. Whether we did this because of ignorance, carelessness, or wilfully, makes no difference."

"Let's take a look at this matter of freedom and see how essential it is to the success of human life. This whole universe is made up of energy. Physical energy is called power. All energy operates under control. This fact makes scientific knowledge possible. Electricity is an example of this, and electricity under the same conditions always acts the same way."

"Living energy is different. It is creative and variable. Yet living energy is controlled. Each human being, by his nature is so."

"Therefore, any system of government based on anything but recognition of the freedom of its individuals and of this individual responsibility, is doomed to failure. And it makes no difference whether that system of government is adopted wilfully, through ignorance, or by compulsion."

"Teaching free men how to make steel by controlling the laws of the Creator is a major job of government responsibility. Does this differ, when we consider the position we are in today? Yes, in your communities, from your responsibility for teaching others the basic principles of a good society, of a free government, and of a free economy, and how to apply the laws of the Creator that you know are sound?"

"If we lose our freedom, men in your position and mine are going to have to take a double responsibility. Each of us has a part to play to live in accordance with the laws of the Creator and, second, because we failed to pass along to others the things we know to be true."

"The last responsibility is steel making is teamwork. Each of the 550 of us in our plant depends upon others to do their jobs at the right time. Each is individually responsible and each must cooperate with the others."

"Compulsion has no place in teamwork, unless you wish to go back to the days when teamwork was accomplished by chaining men to the oars, and the oars were being paced up and down applying the lash to bare backs."

"Communism has no place in life or in America, nor in our steel plant, for the simple reason that it violates God's principles that men are free individuals responsible for their own acts, and substitutes compulsion for that freedom of choice. Such a system cannot live for long, but it can do just what it can do centuries before man fights off the shackles again—shackles he has worn, discarded, and then worn again."

"Why is this, where is the key to stopping this endless, useless cycle? I believe it lies in education. It exists because of our failure to teach each generation the lessons we ourselves have learned from generations past."

Then Mr. Tibbets explains that the CIO has a bargaining monopoly with this steel company. So in order to try to get his workers to understand the position of the employer he had some of his employees play a game with him. They were supposed to start a steel company to make steel. He explained to them that the company would need \$100,000,000 to go into the steel business. They agreed to play the game of starting a steel company. They used poker chips for money and gave ten of the men \$100,000 worth of chips. They first bought a lot that cost them \$200,000. Then they bought equipment and machinery and had left \$212,000 to meet the first month's payroll. They sold 800 tons of steel castings the first month for \$420,000. After they had paid all the expenses except taxes, they had left \$42,000. All the steel workers thought that was a very reasonable profit for \$420,000 worth of business. But then the government agent walked in and took 70% of the \$42,000, leaving them \$12,600. Then one of the foremen explained that they needed new equipment to compete with their competitor that would cost them \$7,000. At that point one of the men wanted to declare a dividend before someone else came in and took the rest of their first month's earnings.

Mr. Tibbets goes on to explain how industry works in this manner:

"I have told you of the teamwork which results when men who understand the basic principles, accept and execute their responsibility, and you know our product is good for without it you could not enjoy the life you do."

"Exactly the same requirements are present in maintaining and operating the American way of life."

"First, we must follow the principles laid down by the Creator. We must realize that each of us

is an individual, generates his own energy, and is responsible for his own acts.

"The men and women of America must join us of their own free will in our desire to remain free."

"Third, we must have teamwork and that teamwork results from a basic understanding of each other's problems."

"Last, and most important, we have the responsibility of teaching the coming generations the fundamentals upon which all life is based."

"This responsibility for the education of our boys and girls is a home problem, a school problem, and a life problem."

"The art of steel making could be lost in two generations unless our knowledge of steel is passed along. Freedom will be lost in less than two generations unless we do a better job than we have been doing."

"I recommend that each of you takes on the responsibility of checking your school system, your home and your business, and make sure that your children and your people are being taught that two and two make four, and that their only hope of security lies in what they do with their own lives for which they and they alone, under God, are responsible; that their only hope of happiness and a full life lies in the maintenance of a free society, and that the maintenance of that freedom is their responsibility."

"If this is done—if you see to it that it is done—then our country can go on to even greater accomplishments. If it is not done—if you do not see that it is done—then we will go the way of those civilizations whose ruins we find scattered over the world."

"It's a down to earth man-to-man job that needs to be done."

"Out, and you alone—acting as individuals—can do it if you will!"

## National Whirligig.. GOP Loses Confidence Of Gay Ride To White House With Ike

WASHINGTON — The Republican Party earlier confidence that the nomination of Eisenhower would end the party's split and finally his moving acceptance address, have slowed what might have been an emotional White House stampede to the Democrats.

In nominating Ike, the GOP made obedience to the five million of non-partisan independent voters who must list in order to cast the "ins."

They counted on his demonstrated military and diplomatic ability, his integrity, his popularity, his nonparticipation in domestic wrangles, to attract millions who had not voted in 1948, or who had preferred Truman to the one tried and defeated Dewey. He was the "new face," replacing grim-visaged professional politicians.

SUPPORT — Most of all, perhaps, they relied on nationwide support from lazy Republicans, honest Democrats and on-the-fence groups, whose only interest in the 1952 contest would be to "drive the Missouri gang" from the White House.

Ike's generous and tolerant nature, together with Truman's popularity, buttressed their belief that the military hero could shift at least six Southern states into the Republican column.

QUANDARY — The Democrats' selection of Stevenson has altered that rosy picture, as even the hardheaded Republican strategists admit. His record as chief executive of a great state, his anti-corruption activities in general Illinois, his reluctance to run, and finally his moving acceptance address, have slowed what might have been an emotional White House stampede to the Democrats.

It is, perhaps, correct to say that the Stevenson selection has not detached voters from Ike as they must have done. But it has raised doubts in their minds on the question of making a choice until they have seen and heard both men in action. The most frequently heard comment, and the most descriptive of this large unorganized voting group's quandary, was:

"I had planned to vote for Eisenhower for any Republican — but now I don't know. I've never seen Stevenson and I've never seen Truman, and I've never seen either of them in action. 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## Fair Enough.... Red Officer Impassive When Presented To Mrs. Roosevelt

CHICAGO — Indro Montanelli, Courier (Corriere Della Sera) of Milan, Italy, attended a grand reception in New Delhi, India, for Eleanor Roosevelt, the Great Red Officer, and wrote a sensitive account which I am able to present in part, thanks to a colleague living in Italy who writes in a covering note: "I enjoyed this article and the work of translation was a labor of love."

Mr. Montanelli's article says: "Learning of my presence in town, Pandit Nehru invited me to the party in the garden of his residence in honor of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, welcome guest of India. The residence was one of the British command-in-chief. Sixty thousand were not many to keep in line 400 million people. The English here knew how to manage. For them, the Empire must serve to make money, not to spend it. Not for nothing was this empire sanctioned by a Venetian Jew, Disraeli, who, alas, is one of those great men of whom England today is a little ashamed, for which reason there is no longer an Empire."

"The Prime Minister, with his wife and daughter and sister, was at the door to receive the guests, standing next to the Great Widow, who has not yet resigned herself to being merely a widow. She wore the national costume, a dress coat with the closed collar of a schoolboy, very close fitting at shoulders and hips, over pajamas, and on his head that type of ice cream vendor's beret called a Gandhi cap."

"The Great Widow, grown a bit fat, wore a violet costume and towered a whole head above the pandit. The son of a maharajah, my friend, told me of the skirmish between Nehru and the widow who had at first refused her palatial hospitality. She wanted to go and live in the midst of the 'poor people' in a village 'somewhere in the country,' among the untouchables. It would cost a load of money to construct such a village even with only hand tools to give a hundred decent families to play the part of 'poor people.' Already it had cost a load to keep Gandhi in poverty."

"We were waiting on the lawn to be presented. In the rear, a military band in the uniforms of the British colonial battalions, was playing a Scottish march on the fife. It was a very beautiful march, pastoral and warlike that seemed to come from the distant past."

"Kipling might have set the words of one of his ballads to it."

"In front of us two others were waiting, new elected representatives, one from the Punjab, the other from Haiderabad. They were exchanging impressions in English, of course, only the language common to all Indians, the other being dialects. In English, Indian independence is proclaimed; the constitution is published. In English, newspapers are published, continually speaking of the Empire. I saw that the other replied, 'seems so to me, too.'"

"Nehru indeed was gloomier than usual, nervously smoking one cigarette after another in his filtered holder, his shoulders slumped, his under lip protruding beyond the upper lip. He was answering in monosyllables, looking up and giving brief, frigid smiles at Mrs. Roosevelt, whose mouth seemed always laughing. Who ever knows at what?"

"The two in front of us tried to hide behind the couple ahead to escape the angry glance of Nehru because India is a democracy in which the representatives do not have a right to a sense of humor different from its hard well-bred people, is described as 'slightly emotional.'"

"I kept my eyes open to see how one acts when presented to a king and queen of democracy. I discovered that it is just the same as when one is presented to a real king and queen. You take the proffered hand and bend over it, without daring to look

the august person in the eye even if such a one has declared a wish to live in the midst of the poor in a village in the country, while a master of ceremonies reads in a loud voice your identification from the invitation."

"Mr. Per Nielsson, from Denmark, Nehru shook the hand without looking at the owner. Mrs. Eleanor extended her hand with a little polite 'Oh' but 'Oh!' Norway is a poorer country than Denmark and needs sympathy."

"Mr. Jacob Deryevanski, from the Soviet Union!"

"This time, Nehru was on the job. He grasped the hand of the imposing Russian with his right hand. He even placed his left hand and patted it up and down with fervor. Mrs. Roosevelt opened her interesting mouth more than usual and let out a terrific 'O — ooo — h' which seemed desirous of summing up, so long and caring it was, all the politics of her life husband in relation to Russia."

"But this exceptional welcome did not produce any effect upon the imposing Russian, who, impassive, his face closed like a fist, was the only one of all who did not bow and looked both the Great Widow and the Prime Minister fixedly and darkly in the eye."

"The great saint, Vinobha Bhabhe, who has taken Gandhi's place as the apostle of poverty, entered, wrapped in his white head and his flapping patched robe, flanked by the maharajah of Kurpatala and by the millionaire, Birla. Nehru is kept in power one-third by the maharajah, one-third by Birla's millions and one-third by misery. With them, the party is now complete. The Great Widow and the Prime Minister may at last relax, so they sit down in two of five great chairs that have been placed under a mangrove tree between two beds of flowers, one blue, one yellow. A little group of ministers and representatives stand in a semi-circle around the two seated persons. In groups of three, they occupy the three chairs in turn, relinquishing their places to the next three. Those next to the pandit were so intimidated by the maharajah's open mouths. He didn't look at them."

"Those next to Mrs. Eleanor were gratified by a flow of words in which they tried in vain to interpolate even one of those teeth engaged in a fierce struggle."

"Mrs. Eleanor now was summoned to her side by a female journalist who wrote rapidly in her notebook as the widow spoke."

"Only one word reaches me: our reporter says, 'Democracy' emitted like a violent hiccough between teeth engaged in a fierce struggle of ham from a roll. 'Poor people.' 'Somewhere in the country.' Then the Scottish march came again from the military band in the picturesque costume of the old British colonial battalions."

"A melancholy voice murmured behind me as the echoing strains of the pastoral and military march were vanishing in the distance."

"Thus empire pass away — it turned. It was an English friend who as a rule, tried to be stupid but does not always succeed."

## Shantz Bids For No. 20

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Little Bobby Shantz climbs up on the mound at Shibe Park tonight in search of his 20th win of the current American League season.

If the Philadelphia Athletics' condensed schedule comes through — and he's failed only three times this year — he'll be the first major league hurler to reach the magic 20-game circle in the 1952 campaign.

Bobby has been the talk—small talk, that is—of the baseball world since his record began to reach impressive proportions fairly early in the season.

His sweeping curve ball and recently acquired knuckle have become the bane of American League batters — some of whom insist that facing Shantz is like having a cannonball fired at you from a hole in the ground.

Any discussion of his physical stature is purely academic. His shadow across the league's statistical department is long — nearly long.

His record of 19 wins against only three losses prior to tonight's game is tops in both major loops.

His earned run mark of 1.53 is the best in the junior circuit and he has 110 strikeouts — only one less than the leader, Billy Pierce of the Chicago White Sox.

# Wild Offensive Struggle Is Outlook For North-South Tilt

FORT WORTH (AP) — A wild offensive struggle with the air filled with passes is indicated when All-Star schoolboy football squads clash in the annual Texas Coaching School game Friday night.

Both the North and the South, coached by Jim Tatum of Maryland and L. R. (Dutch) Meyer of Texas Christian, respectively, have been throwing the ball all over the premises in practice sessions.

There's talented passing on both sides along with more than average speed. So there could be considerable running, particularly from Meyer's spread formation, while Tatum's Split T is noted for down-the-middle pushes.

Tatum is pleased with his crop of quarterbacks for the Split formation and his squad took to this style of offense even faster and smoother than Meyer's squad did with the spread. Tatum used Charley Brewer of Lubbock and Jack Kirkpatrick of Post and liked them both. Brewer probably will bear the brunt of the North offense.

As it came out later, however, Braddock didn't do too badly. There was a highly secret and leak-proof covenant which provided that the outgoing champ — it was pretty definite that Jim would get the description — would receive in the dark destroyer.

Walcott was in the ringside in the dark destroyer, quite contemplative when Marciano exploded that left hook on Harry Matthews' jaw, and it seems as if to suggest that he and his manager, Felix Bocchicchio, must since have given the future a lot of earnest thought. Up to now, Walcott has made relatively little out of the title. He's going to have to be guaranteed a real payday, somehow, by somebody, before he samples Rocky's depth charges.

Bocchicchio already has drawn one veep of anguish by insisting that his fighter must receive 45 per cent of the net for a September fight.

"He's crazy," wailed Al Weill, who admits to being matchmaker for the International Boxing Club but bleeds at the suggestion that Rocky is his personal property.

"He ain't going to get any 45 per cent. Why don't he ask for 100 per cent and be done with it?"

Eastern Mickey McDermott, Bob's mound opponent on May 29, came up with a brilliant one-hitter. The luckless Senator gave the Sox ten scattered safeties and only one run — but it was enough to lose.

The 28-year-old Belleville, N.J., hurler was at his worst on June 29. He worked only four innings as the Nets lost, again via the shutout route, 5-0.

Another wrong-way blanking came on July 10 when lefty Billy Pierce defeated Washington, 2-0. Porterfield was reeling for only five safeties that time.
