FORT WORTH, March 13.—(AP)—With the champion Hereford bull bringing \$10,450 yesterday keen competition was forecast today in the auctions of the Shorthorn and polled Hereford cattle at the Southwestern Exposition and Fair Stock Show. Also on the schedule of events today are the judging of beef and dairy cattle and sheep, and auctions of swine.

First cowboy day money winners in three competitive events of the rodeo were announced yesterday afternoon. Bareback winners, judged on the basis of seven performances of the rodeo, were:

Paul Bond, Collinsville, Okla., first; Cecil Henley, Hayward, Calif., second; Wag Biesing, Burbank, Calif., third; BUD SPEALMAN, PAMPA, fourth; Sonny Tureman, John Day, Ore., fifth, and Fred Basky, Denver, sixth.

Buster Ivory of Hayward, Calif., placed first among saddle bronc riders on the first go-round of five performances. Other winners in the event were: Bill Lineerman, Red Lodge, Mont., 1945 all-round cowboy champion, second; Tater Decker, Rowell, N. M., third; Bill McFadden, Florence, Ariz., fourth; and Jim Like, Kim, Colo., fifth.

The speedy bull dogging time of 6.6 seconds scored by Rusty McGinty of Plains gave him top honors among steer wrestling on a seven performance go-round.

Runners up were Dub Phillips, San Angelo, 10, second; Steve Hancock, Billings, Mont., 10.6 third; Tom Hogan of Tulsa and Dick Johnson of Bethel, Okla., tied for fourth and fifth at 10.8 seconds each; and Dick Truitt, Stonewall, Okla., 10.9, sixth.

NEW ORLEANS, March 13.—Naval reserve and temporary USN officers who qualify as law specialists in the regular navy will perform duties at naval districts and other shore bases, on staffs of naval governors and on large staffs afloat, according to an eighth naval district announcement.

10-in-1 Rations Placed for Sale

DALLAS, March 13.—War Assets Corporation has announced that it has arranged to sell several million packages of 10-in-1 rations to co-operative for American remittances to Europe. The latter is a non-profit organization.

These food packages, declared surplus by the war department, were originally destined for export through UNRRA, an organization devoted to mass feeding. C. A. R. E. will deliver these food packages to individuals, groups and organizations in Europe as designated by American donors. It is pointed out that C. A. R. E. activities will be supplemental to the mass feeding program of UNRRA. For that reason UNRRA has concurred in the relocation of the food packages by the department of agriculture to C. A. R. E.

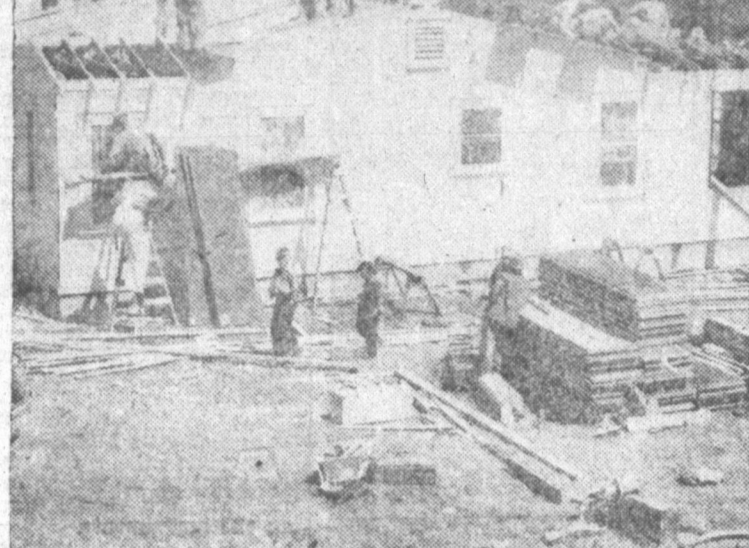

176,500 Workers Remain Jobless Throughout State

AUSTIN, March 13.—(AP)—Unemployment increased in Texas during February and is still rising, with 176,500 workers jobless and 12,117 openings filed with the United States unemployment service, C. E. Belk, state director of that agency, reports. Cities having major unemployment problems are San Antonio, Texarkana, Longview, Lufkin, Beaumont and the Sherman-Denison area, Belk declared. There are no longer any areas in the state where the local demand exceeds the local supply of labor.

Areas of unemployment include Austin, Lubbock, Orange, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Fort Worth, Tyler, Waco, Temple, Port Arthur, Brownwood, Abilene, San Angelo and Marshall. The only areas now listed in the balanced job and labor class are Houston, Corpus Christi, El Paso, Amarillo, Borger and Galveston-Texas City.

During February, Belk said, 72,356 workers applied for jobs, five thousand less than during the previous month, while placements by the USES totaled 27,043, an increase of 13 percent. It was pointed out that the agency put on a drive to contact employers during February, while the demobilization program of the armed services slowed down. An employment increase of 3.1 percent in the smaller towns since V-J day was observed.

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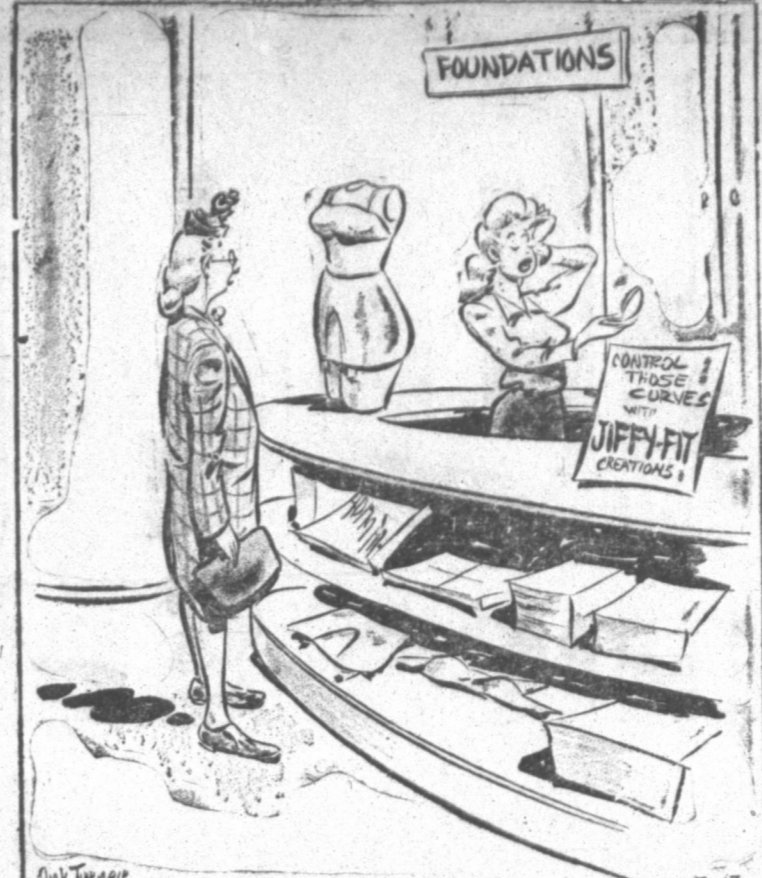

Spain, Argentina Vital Issues of Question Box

QUESTION: Has the United States severed diplomatic relations with Franco? ANSWER: We have not severed diplomatic relations with Franco's government, but in our recent joint statement with Great Britain and France we declared that this decision would be made "in the light of events and after taking into account the efforts of the Spanish people to achieve their own freedom." The three powers stated that "so long as General Franco continues in control of Spain, the Spanish people cannot anticipate full and cordial associations with the nations of the world which have, by common effort, brought defeat to German nazism and Italian fascism, which aided the present Spanish regime in its rise to power and after which the regime was patterned."

Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Notebook

But you've got to do as the Egyptians do. You've got to take a good afternoon nap."

Spain, Argentina Vital Issues of Question Box

QUESTION: What was our declaration on the Spanish situation? ANSWER: In addition to the above, the joint statement expressed the hope "that leading patriotic and liberal-minded Spaniards may soon find means to bring about a peaceful withdrawal of Franco, the abolition of the Falange, and the establishment of an interim or caretaker government under which the Spanish people may have the opportunity freely to determine the type of government they wish to have and to choose their leaders." The three powers stated that an interim government which would provide for political amnesty, return of exiled Spaniards, freedom of assembly, free public elections, should receive the recognition and support of all freedom-loving people. "Such recognition would include full diplomatic relations and the taking of such practical measures to assist in the solution of Spain's economic problems as may be practicable in the circumstances prevailing. Such recognition is not now possible." The state department simultaneously made public captured German, Italian and Spanish documents, including letters by Franco to Hitler and Mussolini, on Franco's relation with the Axis.

MANILA, March 13—(AP)—A Catholic bishop of Manila was among hundreds of Filipinos accused of treason in the People's court today as special prosecutors rushing to meet a March 15 deadline brought total indictments to more than 3,400. Cesar Maria Guerrero, auxiliary bishop, was accused of placing his imprimatur on a seditious Japanese-sponsored magazine, of urging inter-marriages with Japanese and of praying for Nipponese victory.

WASHINGTON, March 13—(AP)—The federal power commission announces that it will reopen in April a hearing on a petition by the Reynolds Gas Pipeline company for authority to transport natural gas from Texas to Mexico. The Texas railroad commission asked that the record be reopened "to receive further any new evidence before the final decision," the FPC said. Prior hearings were held Dec. 12 to 19.

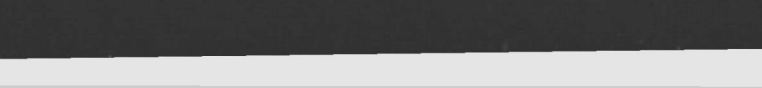

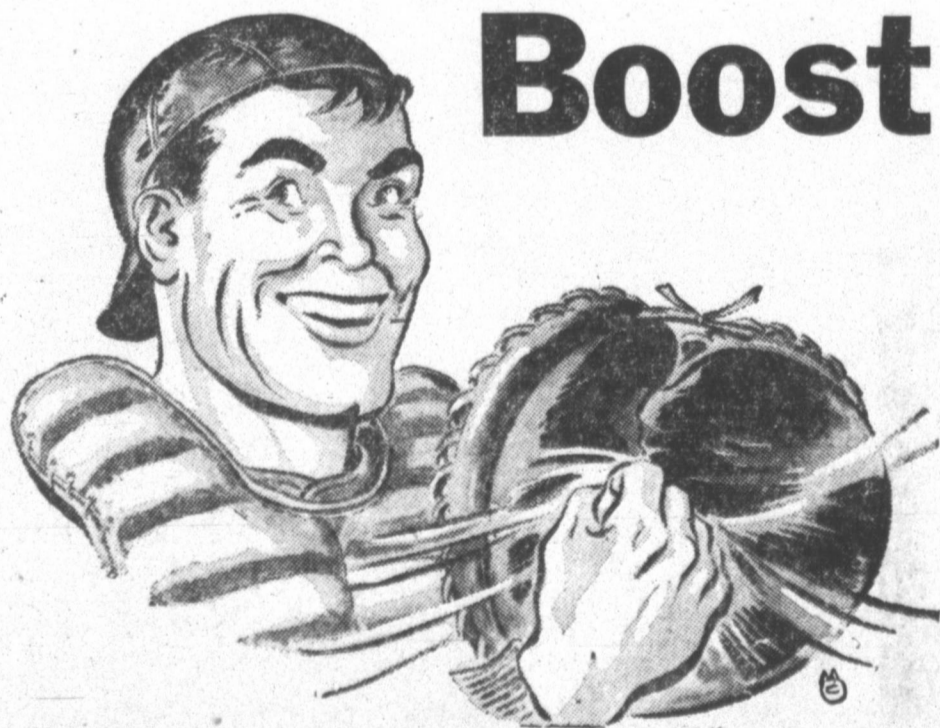
