Spring Cleaning Is Emphasized

AUSTIN—A good old fashioned spring house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, who said in Austin today. "From a practical standpoint the old adage that 'Cleanliness is next to Godliness' is still well worth emphasizing."

A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the objective of bettering health conditions for our citizenship should include surface cleaning, drainage, the graving of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and playgrounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be," said Dr. Cox "of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid, and poliomyelitis. Good community housekeeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the state."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filthy-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

Around the World

BRITAIN—The British government announced preparation of a bread rationing system for emergency use, likening the world food situation to the days of Dunkerque "when all the news was bad."

ITALY—The nation entered a cooling off period during which outdoor rallies were banned in preparation for the voting Sunday which will elect a 556-member constituent assembly and decide the fate of the monarchy.

GERMANY—Hermann Goering was disclosed to have fallen into a fit of despondency at Nuernberg, losing weight and declining to discuss his war crimes case further with defense attorneys.

SIAM—Bangkok newspapers charged that the invasion of Siam territory by French detachments from Indochina had caused \$1,000,000 damage. Observers reported all the French now had withdrawn across the Mekong river and that the frontier was quiet.

JAPAN—Emperor Hirohito made his second call on Gen. MacArthur. An American defense attorney said the war crimes trial of ex-Premier Hideki Tojo and 25 other Japanese, scheduled to open Monday, would have to go "like greased lightning" to end by Christmas.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

FRIENDS AT BETHANY
 Scripture: Luke 10:38-42; John 11:1-44; Galatians 5:15.
 By WILLIAM E. GILROY, D. D.
 Many people miss the full significance of the earthly life of Jesus through a failure to grasp with realism the fact of His humanity. To any such who read these words, I would emphasize that the significance of Christ's divinity is that it was revealed in His human life. As John says, "The Word was made flesh." The great fact to emphasize is the Incarnation. The Incarnation means that Jesus was both divine and human.
 Both the human and the divine in Jesus are made very real in the story of His friendship with Martha and Mary, at Bethany, and with their brother Lazarus. We see Jesus in the friendly contacts of that Bethany home, a welcome guest, accepting the scriptural passage assigned for this lesson from Mark 14 tells of an incident at Bethany, but in another home—the home of Simon the Leper. John 12:1-3 tells of a somewhat similar incident in the home of Martha, when Mary anointed the feet of Jesus.
 The similarity of these incidents does not justify the supposition that they have made. There is no clear indication that the woman mentioned in Mark's account was Mary of Bethany, though the dinner occurred in that village. In fact, if Mary was the woman, it seems strange that she should not have been specifically named.
 There is plenty in the narrative of the friendship of Jesus with Martha, Mary, and Lazarus to occupy our solid interest without our needing to include speculation.
 The age-old debate concerning the characters of the two sisters, and the identification of the one or the other, andness and hospitality like any man need of companionship and comfort, but giving more than he received.
 We see Him entering into the life of the home, observing the rivalry, or the conflict of temperaments, between the two sisters; mildly rebuking Martha for her complaint about Mary's not helping her with the work, overcome with human emotion as He finds the sisters weeping over the death of Lazarus.

 The Marthas may complain, but they wouldn't be happy if they weren't serving; and Mary of Bethany is a constant reminder that there is something higher than the satisfaction of material needs. It is not enough merely to serve the Master; we must also listen to His words and seek His guidance.

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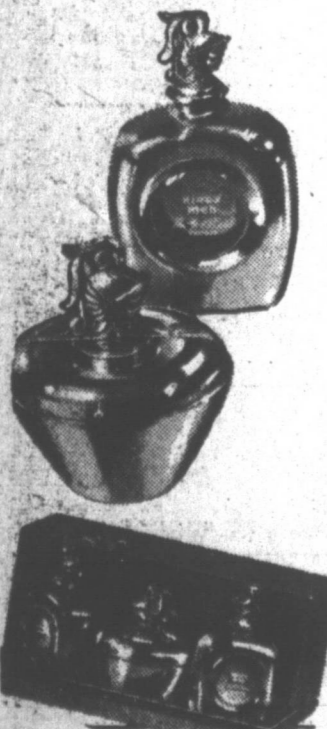

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Robson Picks Up Check for \$38,000 for Speedway Win

INDIANAPOLIS—(AP)—George Robson, 30th winner of the 500-mile International Sweepstakes at Indianapolis Motor speedway, figures the foul luck that had been dogging him and Joel Thorne's racing stable simply wore itself out before yesterday's race.

The Los Angeles driver, who had the pleasant task today of picking up a check for \$38,000—\$20,000 for first prize and \$18,000 for leading in 138 laps—had tried twice before to capture the Memorial day classic but motor trouble stopped him both times. His brother Hal started yesterday's race and went out at 90 miles with a broken connecting rod.

Thorne, wealthy Hollywood speed

enthusiast, suffered a broken leg in a pre-race motorcycle accident and couldn't drive his other car. He turned it over to Rudi Caracciola, of Bern, Switzerland, European auto racing champ, and Caracciola was critically injured in a trial spin at the speedway last Tuesday.

Robson's elapsed time for the distance was 4:21:16.30, giving him an average speed of 114.820 miles an hour—a figure bettered by only three other speedway winners. The record for the event—117,200 miles an hour—was set by the late Floyd Roberts in 1938.

Art Sparks of Los Angeles built the winning car. Its speed had been proven by the late Jimmy Snyder, Robson, veteran of 15 years' racing, drove a heady race and had sparkling assistance from his pit crew in two short stops to have his goggles taped, two wheels changed and gasoline added.

The winning car, labeled the Thorne Engineering Special, was a rear-drive, six-cylinder job with a bore of 3.025 inches, stroke of 3.750 inches and 183 cubic inches of piston displacement.

Old Age Pensions Cut This Month

AUSTIN—(AP)—Each old age pension recipient in Texas will get \$1.50 less than his authorized grant in June because of increasing rolls and the ceiling on available funds.

The department of public welfare announced yesterday an additional 50 cent cut in each payment, on top of similar deductions in April and May. The prospect was the reductions would continue.

There was a net increase of 1,354 in the pension rolls during May, bringing to 183,389 the number of aged persons eligible for the June payments. This was the largest number in history, welfare department officials said.

Discontinuance of service allowances continued to be the chief reason for the increase in the rolls. Stoppage of payments from the government to families of men released from the armed services accounted for 35 per cent of the increase. Loss of employment or decreased earnings accounted for 20 per cent.

Although there was an increase of 47 during May for those eligible to

receive aid for the needy blind, no prorated cut was in sight. The average payment for June will be \$26.70.

Because of insufficient funds, each payment on behalf of dependent children in June will be made in behalf of 23,314 children in June, with the average payment \$25.31.

Indian Problem Will Be Studied

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The office of Indian affairs announced today the appointment of Dr. George I. Sanchez of the University of Texas, to make a survey of the Navajo Indian education problem.

Dr. Sanchez, an authority on rural education, will begin the study early in August.

William A. Brophy, commissioner of Indian affairs, called the Navajo situation "without parallel in modern American education," with

14,000 out of 20,000 children denied the opportunity to learn their ABCs or even to speak English because of insufficient facilities.

Dr. Sanchez' studies, Brophy said in a statement, "are designed to point the way, when the necessary funds are granted, toward early improvement of this condition and toward eventual provision for education of all the Navajo children."

Dr. Sanchez will visit all sections of the 10,000,000-acre Navajo reservation in Arizona, New Mexico and Utah, Brophy said.

LEARNS TO WALK AGAIN AT 95
LYNCHBURG, Va.—(AP)—At 95, a Bedford woman is learning to walk for the third time.

She is Mrs. Karen-Haptuch Saunders, recovering at a hospital from a break in her right leg. Aided by the latest device, a "walker," she is making such rapid progress that attendants say she will soon be able to discard it.

Just two years ago, Mrs. Saun-

ders was treated for a break in her left leg, from which she has entirely recovered.

She believes "old age is a happy time of life," but the ways of this day make her gasp.

"Men today are mighty forward," she remarked when some of them kissed her on her birthday. "When I was being courted, a kiss meant something."

Bituminous operators were keeping quiet about their reaction to the contract which gave their employees \$1.85 increase per day and \$59.25 pay for a five-day week, plus a welfare and retirement fund financed by a five-cent royalty on each ton of coal. Until the operators agree to a contract with Lewis, the mines will continue to be operated by the government.

Common Ground

By E. C. HOLLES. Law to Preserve Independent Press. The recent ruling of the Supreme Court that the members of the Associated Press did not have the unhampered right to choose their own associates greatly endangers an independent press.

With that idea in mind, Congressman Noah Mason of Illinois on May 3 introduced a bill into the House of Representatives (HB 6301) "to supplement existing laws against unlawful restraint of monopoly and for other purposes."

Section Two of this law reads as follows, "The anti-trust laws shall not be construed to prohibit any press service company from exercising its own discretion in selection of its customers or from furnishing its press services on the express or implied condition, agreement or understanding not to furnish the press service which it is furnishing to a customer to any other newspaper or newspaper in the community of the United States."

Now this might look on the face of it as though the members of the Associated Press were asking for a monopoly. It might look as if they were asking for the same conditions that labor unions require when they ask for a closed shop contract.

This is not the case, however. The difference is that the Associated Press in no way tries to set the price for other services than its own. Neither does it refuse to furnish a service if a newspaper buys another competing service.

On the other hand, the objective of the closed shop by labor unions is not merely to set their own price but to set the price for other competitors. Closed shop asks for a monopoly.

There is no monopoly when a group does not conspire together to set the price for its competitors or to fine any of its members who sell their services for less than the prescribed monopolistic agreement.

This right to set its own members is absolutely non-negotiable for the Associated Press in order to preserve control of news by the originators of the news-gathering organization or by their successors.

Peter Edson's Column: AIRPORTS COMING UP--BUT SLOWLY

WASHINGTON, (NEA) — Cities eager to get their hands on some of that \$500,000,000 just authorized by congress for new airport construction are being urged to get going on their local planning. At the same time, they're being warned not to expect too fast action.

It is now doubtful if any construction can get going for a year. The spring of 1948 may be a better bet. It will take the civil aeronautics administration a year to do the planning and give approval to local projects, fitting them into a national airport system.

The biggest catch in the program right now, however, is that the federal government at present has no money to spend. All it has is an authorization by congress. It will take a separate act, appropriating the money, before any work can begin.

Once the money has been put on the starting line, about \$3,000,000 will be set aside for planning, and a similar amount will go to the civil aeronautics administration for management of the program.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS MUST MATCH FEDERAL FUNDS. As the construction money is appropriated by congress, three-fourths of it will be apportioned among the states, according to population and area.

The need for more airports is already great, CAA says there are now 400 U. S. airports—civilian and military. That's one for every four cities and towns in the country.

That leaves 300 airfields to accommodate the 500 commercial planes now flying scheduled routes and the 300 planes now flying on non-scheduled charter operations. The best estimates are that within two years or so there will be from 1200 to 1500 planes in commercial operation.

CAA administrator Wright has estimated that flying activities in all categories are now more than 1000 percent above the 1935 status. Air traffic congestion at some of the major airports has already reached alarming proportions.

Wright predicts that by 1955 there will be at least 400,000 civil aircraft under certification. In 1945, the number was only 30,000. To take care of this new air-age traffic, the CAA airport construction program calls for the enlargement of 1625 fields now in operation and the building of 3650 new ones.

Only 150 of the new airports would be big class three and four fields for commercial plane operation. The remaining 2900 would be smaller class one and two fields for feeder line, short haul, and private planes.

Private enterprise will probably develop thousands of others. But under this government program there will be a minimum of 7000 airports in operation by 1953, at an outlay of an additional \$1,000,000,000.

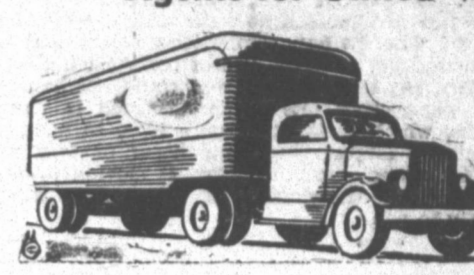
