PANHANDLE BRIEFS

Carson county courthouse has deteriorated rapidly during the past three weeks. Part of the deterioration may be due to the recent heavy rainfall, which has caused rapid sinking of the foundation.

Belief has been expressed that something must be done without delay. Several re-inforcements apparently must be made immediately to stabilize the building, which has many wide cracks.

Cropland terraces save water and conserve soil, Chairman Shaffer of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation association committee says. In the end, this means more and better food and improved health for all, he added.

Farmers cooperating with the agricultural conservation program can receive assistance in terracing their farms, he continued. Properly constructed terraces slow water runoff and hold it on the land where it can be used by growing crops during the dry period of the year.

The Boy Scouts of Canadian are being reorganized. More than forty boys met in the city auditorium Monday night with Scoutmaster Thad Galaway and his assistants, J. J. McCasland, Foster Watkins and Bill Cross. H. W. Truitt is also assisting in the scout work but was unable to attend the meeting.

Perryton will have city parcel post delivery and an extension of city mail delivery service provided certain qualifications are met by the City of Perryton and by individual property owners. Postmaster Mansel Coffee announced last week.

First qualifications for expanded mail service, Coffee stated, is that street markers be placed on each street. This must be done before the Post Office Department will approve any expansion, either in parcel post or city mail deliveries. Approval for the expansion was tentatively granted on October 1, providing the street markers are put in place.

By constructing livestock water dams and reservoirs, Hemphill county farmers and ranchers can obtain better use of their range and pasture areas, says E. Little, chairman of the county agricultural conservation committee.

Sit Down and Write Yourself a Letter

BROWNSVILLE—(AP)—Sit right down and write yourself a boomerang letter. Mail it November 1.

Pan American World Airways wants to demonstrate the speed of airmail service to Latin America via Brownsville when the reduced foreign airmail rates become effective.

Anyone wishing to make the test may address a letter, weighing one-half ounces or less, to Pan American World Airways System, Airmail Test, in any Latin American capital, sticking on a 10-cent stamp. The sender's return address must be placed in the upper left-hand corner of the envelope.

Pan American will pay the return postage and mail the letter back to the sender.

The letter may not be mailed before or after November 1.

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Danger Days' in Store for Driver Of Pre-War Car

With a probable 55,000 miles appearing on the speedometer of the average car—a 1939 model—and highways and streets not yet back to their prewar state of repair, the fall and winter of 1946 loom as "danger days" for the American motorist, it is pointed out by Ed Hedner, national director of service for one of the leading auto makers.

To the normal winter driving hazards of icy streets, poor visibility and greater driver strain, have been added several new factors that might adversely affect highway safety records, he adds.

"The motorist will do well to exercise greater caution in the handling of his vehicle this winter. In most instances, he is driving an older car, and one that has perhaps not received its full quota of service attention. He is driving over streets and highways that have not been as well maintained as they were before the war. His tires may not be up to standard; his brakes may be less effective. In short, the driver must make up in extra skill and caution what his car may have lost in operating efficiency due to the war years," he says.

A complete pre-winter service check-up is advised, with particular attention to brakes and the car's electrical system. The shorter daylight hours of wintertime mean additional use of lights and other electrical equipment which puts added strain on the battery. Motorists were urged particularly to give special care to batteries, for current lead shortages have resulted in a low new battery production rate.

Windshield wipers, likewise, bear a greater load during the winter season. New blades are available and easily installed.

Heaters and windshield defogger connections should be checked and made ready for wintertime service. Since small motors likewise are a critical production item, present car heaters must serve, and a thoroughgoing inspection of this accessory is advised.

All those couplings and the auto's entire cooling system should be inspected to insure that anti-freeze will not be lost.

Other pre-winter attentions every car needs include the cleaning of summer dust from the air filter, a change to winter grade lubricant, switching of tires with best tread

to wear wheels for greater breaking effectiveness, and motor tune-up to insure maximum efficiency during the period of greatest demand upon the engine.

\$38,000 Sterile Animal Gets 'Do or Die' Edict

SULPHUR, Okla.—(AP)—If you think you have troubles, consider the plight of Rupert, the \$38,000 sterile bull.

Rupert has just received an ultimatum. "Either he becomes a father soon or he goes to market," Rupert's owner, rancher and Oklahoma democratic gubernatorial candidate Roy J. Turner, sorrowfully decided.

Now as everyone knows, going to market offers no future for a bull, so Turner's decree puts Rupert on a bad spot.

But don't sell him short. He is now in the midst of a series of treatments which, on the basis of early returns, put the odds on him to miss the sausage mill about even.

In fact, Wayne F. Fox, the big feed man from Des Moines, who personally took Rupert to Iowa for the new treatments, has sent back some reports that look mighty good.

"The bull," Fox informed Turner, "is working better and I am confident that within six months we will have some interesting news."

One big thing in Rupert's favor is his attitude. All observers agree that his approach to his problem leaves nothing to be desired except calves. Outside help in the form of hormones, vitamins and advice has been showered upon Rupert without success since his plight first became known.

That was back in January, 1943, Turner painfully remembers. In those days Rupert was known as T. Royal Rupert 99th, fanciest Hereford bull in the land.

Turner received a record price of \$38,000 when he sold him jointly to Charles Pettitt of Flat Top ranch, Walnut Springs, Texas, and Gladys farm of Dallas, Texas.

Several months passed and it was learned that as a herd builder Rupert was a flop. So back he went to Turner under an agreement between cattlemen which covers such situations.

Turner dispatched the bull to Kansas State college, Manhattan, Kans., where experts diagnosed his trouble as "infantilism," vainly gave

him thyroid and pituitary extracts and then sent him back with the sad tag "no improvement."
Turner, who not only is fond of Rupert but also has difficulty figuring \$38,000 worth of sausage in him, kept the bull around his "Hereford Heaven" ranch for awhile and then decided on the Des Moines treatment.

The treatment, it is understood, has much to do with diet and observers are doing a great deal of speculating concerning reports of Rupert's improvement.

National Girl Scout Week Is Marked Here by Drive for Funds

SCOUTS AT CAMP
This week, over 400 Girl Scouts and 140 adult leaders will observe National Girl Scout Week, which opens today and continues Saturday and, at the same time, an appeal for funds to continue Girl Scout work in Pampa in 1947 is being made by the Pampa Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Since the organization of the Pampa area Girl Scout council in 1938, the local council has grown from a few scattered troops to a far-reaching organization with well-organized, full-time leadership and a promise of additional facilities for the hundreds of activities in which the girls engage.

Unfortunately, however, the local organization has been able to reach only a small part of the estimated 1,900 girls in Pampa who are eligible for scouting and it is for that purpose that the Junior Chamber of Commerce is asking for donations totaling \$6,500 or more so that the council may be enlarged.

A committee of local business men and women are to start tomorrow the task of raising a large amount in advance donations, solicited from local firms as business donations.

The general drive, in which donations from individuals and industries will be solicited, is to start Monday, Nov. 4, continuing through that week.

The money raised in the drive will be used in Pampa to finance activities for the coming year and to employ the paid workers in the organization, Miss Marie S. Edge, director, and an office staff.

Slated to receive some of the funds is Camp Sullivan, a 15-acre site located south of Pampa, where indoor and outdoor camping activities are carried out.

Camp Sullivan was deeded to the local council in 1941 by the owner, John Sullivan. It was also through the efforts of the late Mel B. Davis and Mrs. Davis that the camp was developed.

Oil companies with facilities in and near Pampa were called on for aid and the first building at Sullivan was erected with the aid of Mrs. and Mrs. Davis, Mrs. F. M. Culbertson, first Girl Scout commissioner here, and the Pampa chamber of commerce.

More recently, additional work has been done at the camp but the site is still not classified as finished and work will continue on it until it is one of the best of its kind.

Besides its city hall offices, the

committee members, board members and advisory committee, total 140. Local workers are given training by experienced personnel sent here by the Panhandle Area Girl Scout council.

Besides their worthwhile civic activities, the girls have hundreds of other activities, from campaign to music and art.

Girl Scout activities include all fields of endeavor considered beneficial to the average young girl and are classified under general headings—arts and crafts, community service, health and safety, homemaking and outdoor activities.

Under arts and crafts, the girls do work in leather, metal, sewing, photography, wood and other materials, in addition to drawing and painting.

Child care, first aid training and assistance in community undertakings are included in the community service, health and safety classification.

Outdoor activities include camping, craft, camping, cooking and learning to do one's share of working and playing successfully.

Behind all these activities are the adult leaders, who work voluntarily and without pay, headed by a commissioner president.

Mrs. K. E. Thornton is currently president of the Pampa organization. Others who have served in this capacity are Mrs. W. S. Dixon, Mrs. Bruce Pratt and Mrs. F. M. Culbertson.

Tax Increase

The membership said that school teachers in the local system were given raises in the spring of 1945 for the 1945-46 school year. These were: \$500 a year for high school teachers; \$405 a year for junior high and elementary teachers. This raise brought the common base salary to \$1,845 a year, plus \$40 a year sick leave pay. Sick leave pay accumulates over the years, and goes to the teachers.

In comparing the base pay rate in the Pampa schools with that of other schools, they drew a series of figures, which, they emphasized, though not official, are from school heads throughout the state.

The average base pay for teachers with Bachelors degrees in 11 schools polled showed \$1,633.18 per year. The base pay in the Pampa schools for Bachelors degree holders is \$1,845. A seven-school base pay average for Masters degree holders was \$1,778.57 as compared with \$2,025 in the Pampa system. Masters averages were not available from the other four schools cited in the Bachelors average.

The board stated that additional raises come as a teacher gains teacher time with the local schools, and that additional raises are made on the basis of college training received after the college degrees are obtained. Those raises, made in the form of a yearly payment of 7/30 called an increment, are made as follows:

Over a ten-year period the teacher will have received \$480 in raises. Six additional increments go to the holders of doctor's degrees from the start of employment; three for masters; and one for each 18 hours of college work beyond the Bachelors degree; one for each 12 hours beyond Masters; and men teachers receive one increment in addition to the foregoing increments. High school department heads receive either one or two increments, being qualified by several factors.

The board said, "We are advised that our schedule is one of the best in the state, and higher than any other in this area, according to the best available information."

They continued: "We would like to stress that all money returned to this district by the state is and has been used for teacher pay in accordance with the laws governing such money."

In regard to supplemental allocation of money from the state received within the past several months, they said it should be pointed out that it went for additional teachers who had to be hired last year, due to increased enrollment to pay teachers for a short time who had returned from the service to jobs which they had been assured would still be theirs; and also for the raises which were given the entire faculty during 1945 for the 1945-46 school year.

The tax rate, they explained, could be raised to \$1.50, as allowable by the statutes. It is now \$1 here. But the people must petition for an election if they wish to change it, they said.

Members of the school board will meet sometime this week with the classroom teachers to explain the board's position. The arrangement was made by the board members and Davis Friday evening.

transition, it may not be found possible entirely to eliminate the veto, we should at least consider means of limiting the field of its application."

Nearly 40 countries remain to speak in the general debate and most observers believe all to make some comments on the question as a prelude to full-scale debate on the problem before the full assembly next month.

Norway meanwhile thrust the Spanish question back into the spotlight with a proposal for a complete discussion of the controversial question before the 51-nation body.

"We feel," Lange said, "that ways and means must be found through common action of the United Nations to make every effort to assist the democratic forces of Spain, in their struggle to regain, without the horrors of another civil war, freedom and constitutional government."

"The establishment of such a government in Spain would mean the elimination of a stronghold of fascism and a constant source of international friction, and would permit the great Spanish nation to take its rightful place in the family of democratic and peace-loving nations."

Extension Made On Sugar Stamps

WASHINGTON (AP)—Housewives will have another 30 days to use their canning sugar stamps, the OPA announced last night.

Instead of expiring at the end of this month, spare stamps No. 9 and 10 will continue valid through Nov. 30. Each is good for five pounds.

The action completes a series of moves designed to offset local and regional sugar shortages resulting from the maritime strike. Earlier this week arrangements were made to ship western beet sugar to the east.

The OPA announcement said last night it had agreed to movement of "western beet sugar into eastern deficit areas in order to permit housewives to receive their fair share of sugar."

It added that extension of the valid date of the stamps "will permit housewives who have been unable to obtain home canning sugar to finish putting up the last fruits of the canning season."

The regular table sugar stamp, spare No. 51 in ration books, remains good for five pounds until the end of this year.

Sugar is the only food still rationed at consumer levels. Each ration book holder was allotted 25 pounds this year, on the basis of three stamps, each valid for four months, and the two canning stamps.

Total U. S. consumer income rose from \$76 billion in 1940 to \$160 billion in 1945.

Underwood, featured vocalist and song leader from Enid, Okla., will be leading the evangelistic singing. Many local people will remember his baritone voice and capacity for inspiring people to sing. He led the music for an Easter revival here in 1942.

Although Trans World Airline and its 1,400 striking pilots, deadlocked on wage demands, have expressed willingness for the government to take over and operate the lines, there was no indication the White House planned any early action. Chairman Frank Doughlas of the National mediation board said he foresaw no developments this weekend in the six day strike that has grounded the line's planes at home and abroad.

Police, some armed with tommy guns, broke up without violence the largest mass demonstration in the Hollywood film strike. They arrested more than 100 of 2,500 pickets who demonstrated following an announcement that the striking conference of studio unions apparently had lost its jurisdictional fight for sole set construction rights.

Pedigreed Texas Northerners Come From Western Canada

Pedigreed Texas northerners begin in the Medicine Hat-Edmonton area of Western Canada, swirl down the midwestern plains and charge into Texas through the Panhandle.

A northerner without that lineage doesn't have the old vim and pep of a champion.

But to dispel a part of this northerner myth-northerners aren't indigenous to Texas. A. M. Hamrick, head of the U. S. Weather Bureau at Dallas, said all 47 other states had them, only they call them cold waves. In the Dakotas they're sometimes blizzards.

Furthermore, it's open season all year around on northerners. In the spring and summer they're called cool spells.

But to a Texan, there's nothing else quite like that day in the fall when a yellow tinge colors the air, a blue bank looms in the sky to the north and an icy wind starts whipping the leaves down the streets.

Partner it's blowing up a blue northerner.

Technically, that yellow tinge comes from dust particles stirred up by the advance winds gleaming in the sun against the dark backdrop, Hamrick explained. That blue bank is nothing but rain over Oklahoma or perhaps Amarillo.

Or maybe it's been hot and hu-

mid. The air is still. Then a distant mumble of thunder breaks into a clap overhead and rain comes sweeping down the road, pushed by a wind from the north.

Then it's time to tell a foreigner to get out his heavy overcoat. It's a wet northerner blustering into town.

The heat and humidity come from southerly winds radiating from a high pressure area over the gulf, Hamrick said. When the warm air meets the cold front, it rises and cools and rain results.

Back to a northerner's pedigree.

"All weather, in the northern hemisphere, moves sooner or later in an easterly direction," Hamrick said, pointing to a maze of concentric circles, wavy lines and yellow spots on a map.

The circles, mostly elongated and never uniform, came from a high pressure area, which, the weatherman added, was a mass of dry air stagnated over one area so long that it took on the aspects of the weather of that area.

That's why northerners form in Canada or Alaska, where snow and ice abound.

"Sooner or later," the weatherman went on, "the rotation of the earth starts moving the high pressure area east, and low pressure areas to-

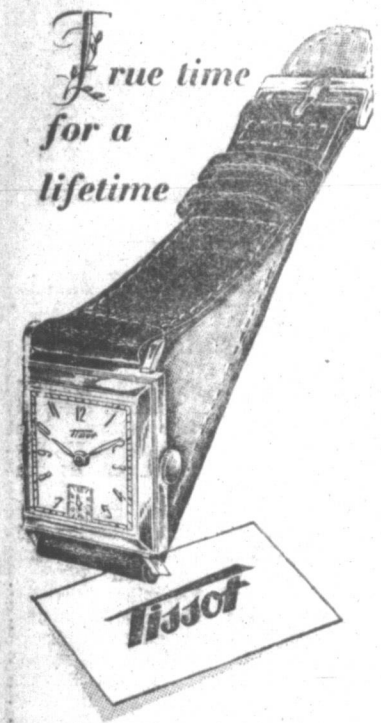

the south start drawing the cold air."

Low pressure areas are troughs between the high pressure hills.

Add a push from a wind from the north, and the cold wave gets to Texas, maybe. If the winds from the south are stronger, it gets deflected.

"I sometimes say it's like two opposing armies meeting on a battlefield," Hamrick said. "The cold air meets the warm and whichever is stronger gets Texas. The battleline often is the Red river, mainly because that's where the winds from the gulf reach."

Any cold front coming from west of the Rocky Mountains expends itself getting over the Rockies and is a weakling when it gets to Texas. As for cold fronts originating east of us, we get only the backwash and sometimes not even that.

Northerners take from 24 hours to three days to get down to us from Medicine Hat or Edmonton.

"Speed depends on the push and the pull," Hamrick said.

"The push comes from the winds behind it and the pull comes from the low pressure troughs in front."

"Of course, a predicted norther sometimes gets sidetracked, say in Kansas, more often at the Red river," he concluded. "And that's when the weatherman has to admit he was wrong."

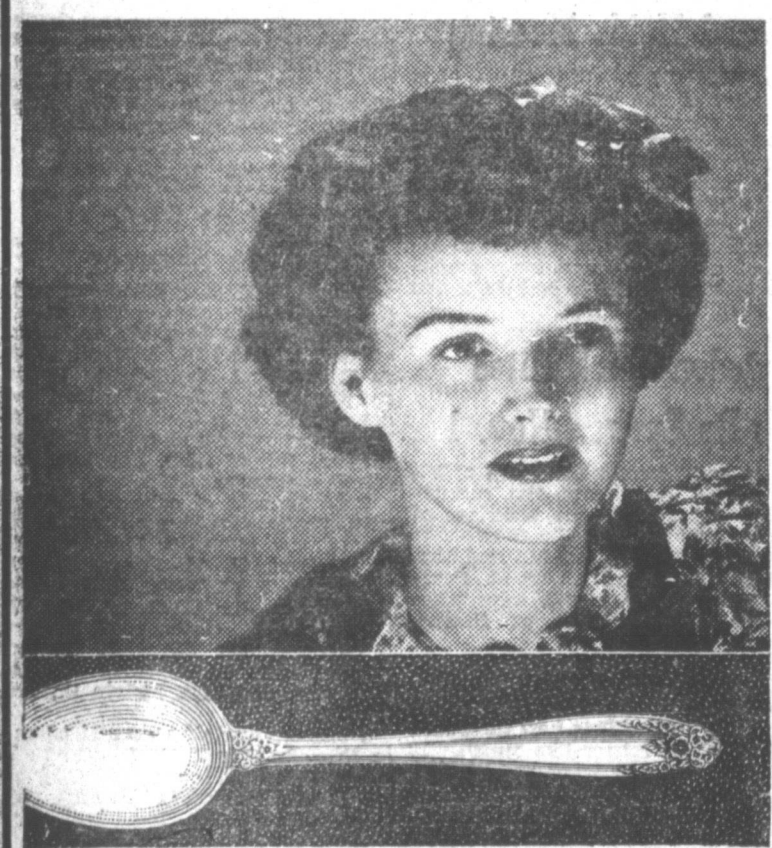

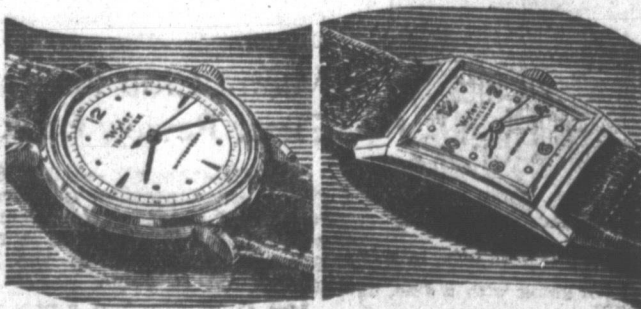

Nicotine Is Seen As Diphtheria Cure

LONDON—(AP)—A nicotine derivative is being used at the Moscow Children's Hospital as an immunizing agent against diphtheria and in the treatment of the disease, says the Soviet Science News.

The new preparation, known as peracetin, was obtained at the Institute of Organic Chemistry by a group of workers under Y. Goldfarb, who were teaching for nicotine derivatives which would retain the beneficial properties of the drug without being poisonous.

Experiments with peracetin as an anti-bacterial agent led to laboratory and clinical tests that proved it capable of destroying diphtheria germs, the magazine reports. It is said that no after effects such as those resulting from diphtheria serum, have resulted from the use of peracetin.

Girl Mechanic Assembles Axis Plane 'Trophy'

WASHINGTON—The only American woman holding a CAA mechanics license for both aircraft and motors is assembling a German Bucker "Jungmann" biplane which was brought from Berlin as a trophy by Col. Dallas B. Sherman, of Clemson, S. C.

Mrs. Joane VanMaltzahn, wife of a U. S. navy lieutenant commander, is putting the former enemy training craft together without any engineering data to help her. Col. Sherman intends to use it as a sports plane.

Aided by six AAF enlisted men, Col. Sherman first assembled the trainer in Berlin, from abandoned German parts. He was attached to the air transport command.

Later he flew the two-seater to Paris, had it crated and shipped at his own expense to the United States.

He believes the Jungmann was the first and last such "war trophy" authorized by U. S. military authorities. Soon afterward, regulations ruled out aircraft, tanks and automobiles as souvenirs.

Churchmen declare the famine will handicap any attempt at a religious revival.


"History shows," said one Anglican minister, "that where Bibles are difficult to buy, no religious movement can be of long standing."

U. S. Rids Garments Of Radioactivity

OAK RIDGE, Tenn. — (AP) — A method of laundering clothes to get rid of radioactive contamination has been developed by Manhattan District, and it is being used to safeguard workers in the atomic research plant here.

The Oak Ridge public relations office announced: "The operation is similar to all laundry operations. The clothing is put into a revolving cylinder and washed in a specially prepared solution designed to remove any radioactive material which might have clung to the clothing.

"Strength of the solution varies in the various plants. For instance, in the plutonium research plant, the radioactivity is much greater than in the plant concentrating U-235.

"After the clothing has been washed and dried, devices which detect radiation check the clothes and if any radioactivity is found the clothes are re-washed."

NEW YORK—(AP)—Planes flying higher and farther are depending increasingly on the stars, moon and sun for navigation—the same beams used by Polynesian natives centuries ago in sailing over vast stretches of the Pacific. Scientists at Bausch & Lomb Op-
