We've always had a deep respect for a good cook. The ability to produce a meal is no mean accomplishment. Good cooking is an art. We've always wanted to be able to whip up some sort of specialty. The "they - all - laughed - when - I - stepped - up - to - the - stove - but" story of dream.

The only way to learn is by doing, we finally decided, picking up a cook book. We wish we had our dreams back, now.

"Ham a la haecadada" it said. The ingredients were intriguing—whole raw ham, a bottle of white wine, 3 oranges, cloves, bay leaf and marjoram, 2 small hot peppers, sugar and sherry or champagne. Just what marjoram is, we didn't know. We still don't.

Well, you put the ham in a large container, with the white wine, the oranges, cloves, bay leaf, marjoram, peppers and water. This boils slowly for six hours at least.

Then you take it out and wrap

it up well in a towel, set it on a table, and put a heavy weight on top. You let it remain overnight.

It is easy to see by now this is no dish to whip up for admiring company. That overnight weight business practically ruins things, unless it's that kind of a party and our working hours don't permit.

But the worst was yet to come. The third paragraph killed the deal entirely. Next day, it says here, you coat the ham, or whatever it is by then, thickly with sugar, pour on sherry, and then—so help me!—you iron it with a very hot iron!

This is repeated four times, no less. It goes on to say that sliced, with the sauce, it is a "proud dish" but they can have it. They can, in fact, turn it over to the dry cleaners.

More sensible was the way a friend who runs a cafe makes his chile. He's never made chile before in his life until he opened the cafe when he got back from war.

He saw someone make chile and decided he could, too. He got some advice from the people who sell around meat. They told him that first of all, you have to make it so long way if you want to make a profit. That's more important than what it tastes like, they told him. So, added to the normal ingredients, you put in a lot of flour. This fills in between the cracks, apparently and absorbs the juice and increases the bologna.

His chile is very good. He probably uses a very good brand of flour.

Another trick of the trade someone else came up with is how to make scrambled eggs go a long way—add a pinch of baking powder. Take six eggs, scramble complete with whites, add baking powder and a bit of sugar to kill the powder taste and you can serve twelve people.

But don't take our word for it. We're no expert. We know now we never will be. If you have to iron meat, you probably use a Hoover in the eggs.

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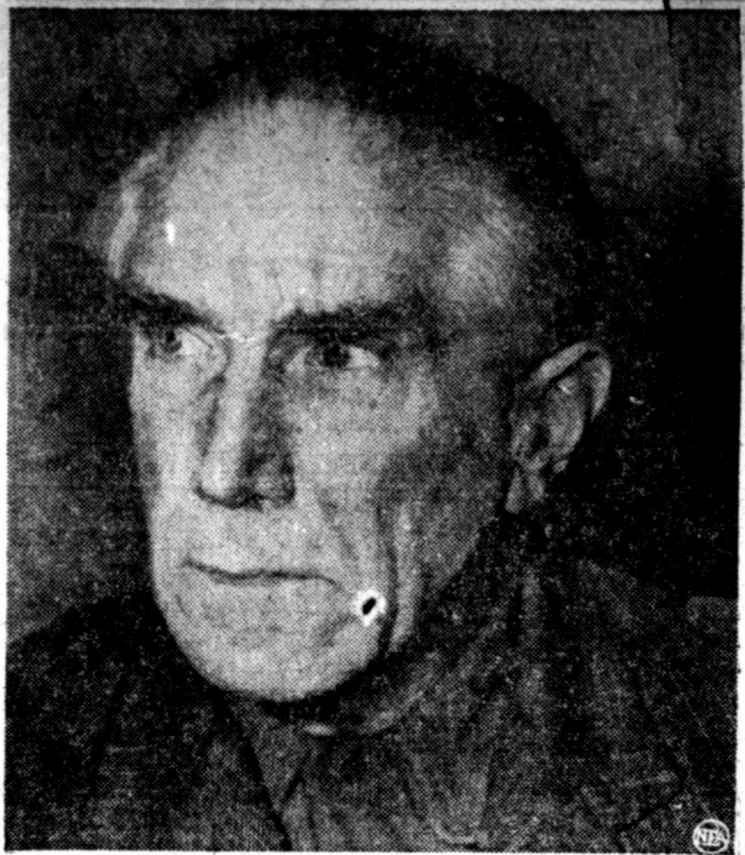

The 'Gray Fox' of Naziism Still Eludes the Trap Set by His Captors

NUERNBERG, Germany—Franz von Papen, the wily "gray fox" of Germany, scanned the hangman's scythe of his captors, but there are still a couple of obstacles between him and the freedom he won at the war crimes trial.

He may still escape completely unscathed. In a lifetime devoted to intrigue and perfecting the double-cross, von Papen has come through surprisingly unharmed.

Von Papen is a master of diplomatic throat cutting. Even Hitler who never trusted him for a moment found him a useful tool. And von Papen, who always hated Hitler, did his ruler's bidding and did it behind his back.

Perhaps they worked together because they both fanatically loved power politics. Von Papen's only consistent loyalty throughout his life was to that love. He was false to his party principles and friends. Even his own voice, his sharp gray eyes and his ever-present smile were a mask that he used to hide his intrigues.

Von Papen started his double-crossing before World War I, while he was German military attaché in Washington. The German war office disapproved of his first clumsy efforts at directing U.S. soldiers and sent in a Capt. Von Rinselen to set him right. Von Papen failed to entice a couple of messages involving Von Rinselen and the British promptly collared the rascal. Von Papen got what he wanted. But the U.S. sent him packing back to Germany.

Elated to the Reichstag after the war, von Papen first went to work on his party leader, Heinrich Brüning, one morning the Germans awoke to find Brüning out and von Papen in—as both chancellor and dictator.

In denunciation over Hitler's growing strength, von Papen offered him the vice-chancellorship. Hitler was of the works, and both lost to Gen. von Schleicher. But von Papen had the personal support of President von Hindenburg, who trusted him like a son. It was no trouble for von Papen to dup the arch-president, convince him that von Schleicher was plotting a coup, and share the spoils with Adolf Hitler, the new "Führer" with Hindenburg as controller, von Papen as vice-chancellor.

Von Papen started right in planning to eliminate Hitler. And Hitler

Election Canvass Shows 2 Counties Voted Republican

AUSTIN—(AP)—The State's official canvass of the November General Election discloses two Texas counties to have voted Republican in the race for U. S. Senator.

The two counties which departed from their traditional Democratic custom were Kimball and Gillespie. Gillespie also voted Republican in the race for commissioner of the General Land Office. Otherwise, Texas still voted Democratic.

Kimball County gave Murray C. Sells, Republican nominee for U. S. Senator, 610 votes to Democratic nominee Tom Connolly's 541. Sells led Connolly in Gillespie County, 1,327 to 1,307.

Democratic nominee Bascom Giles trailed Republican nominee Charles F. Adams, 595 to 624, in Kimball County in the race for commissioner of the General Land Office.

Secretary of State Claude Isbell is announcing the official tabulation of five counties, Bee, LaSalle, Mason, Harrison and Parmer failed to report.

Dental Laboratory Is Opened in City

Operating with a staff of two men and one woman, including the proprietor, Pampa's first and only business of its type is now entering its fourth week here.

The business, a dental laboratory, under the direction of Rutherford Rogers, formerly of Lawton, Okla., opened its doors on the second floor of the First National Bank, Tuesday November 5, Rogers said today.

Rogers has been in the profession for 15 years, but works only directly with the public. The lab builds plates, teeth, gold work and other dental construction or repair work. Nearest dental laboratory to Pampa is in Amarillo, 54 miles away.

Rogers brought his two assistants, William J. Houghton and Miss Dorothy W. Phillips, with him from Oklahoma.

Rogers' wife and four children remain in Lawton at present, but are expected to move to Pampa as soon as Mr. Rogers is able to secure a house.

Prior to coming to Pampa he operated a dental lab in Lawton from 1937 to 1943 and then moved to Pasadena, Calif., where he stayed until several months ago working for a dentist there and also doing several pieces of government work during World War II. Leaving Pasadena, Rogers returned to Lawton for a short while before he opened offices here.

Changes Are Made in National Service Life Insurance Laws

Changes in national service life insurance laws by congress have given the veteran a number of distinct advantages, according to information recently received by Dewey Belmont, commander of the local chapter of the Disabled Veterans.

Congress, seeking to remedy the faults which have caused 10,000,000 veterans to drop 90 billion dollars worth of government life insurance, have eliminated practically every objection former service men voiced.

Under the National Service Life Insurance act, Public 589, the 79th Congress ruled (1) Beneficiaries; The designated beneficiary can now assign his or her interest to cer-

tain members of the veteran's family. The veteran can now designate, as beneficiary, any person or persons, firm or corporation.

Step-parents retroactive to Oct. 8, 1940, can now be listed as beneficiaries. If a step-parent was previously named and not allowed, he or she may now file claim for insurance which matured before Aug. 1, 1946. However, any payments made to another beneficiary will not be duplicated.

(2) Total Disability: Total disability for insurance purposes is considered: permanent loss of use of both feet, both hands, both eyes, or the total loss of hearing of both ears, or the organic loss of speech.

Insured is entitled to waiver of premiums after he has been totally disabled for six consecutive months.

The new insurance law now provides for a TOTAL DISABILITY INCOME PROVISION which is available to any holder of National Service Life Insurance upon application, proof of good health, and at a slight increase in his premium cost. This disability income clause—added to the policy—will pay \$5.00 a month for each \$1,000.00 of insurance if the insured becomes to-

tally disabled. Payments commence after six months total disability and continue during the time the insured is totally disabled. The face of the policy is not reduced by such payments. To the disabled veteran it is important to note that proof of good health is required by that service-connected disabilities—less than total—will be waived in determining entitlement to this liberal provision.

(3) Eligibility: If the insured veteran dies in line of duty within the period between the date of application and date insurance was to become effective, that insurance is now considered in force on date of death.

Any veteran who has had active service between Oct. 8, 1940, and Sept. 2, 1945, may apply for and be granted term insurance up to \$10,000 which can be converted after one year. Evidence of good health must be submitted but the law specifically provides that the veteran shall not be denied insurance because of "any disability or disabilities, less than total in degree, resulting from or aggravated by service." This clause will now enable many seriously disabled veterans who failed to take out any insurance while in active service—or who took out only part of the \$10,000—to apply for and receive full insurance protection.

(4) Optional Settlements: There are four optional settlements under the 1946 insurance act. They are:

- (1) In one sum;
- (2) In equal monthly installments of from 35 to 200 number in multiples of 12, which means over a period from 3 to 20 years;
- (3) Monthly installments for 120 months certain with payments continuing during lifetime of first beneficiary;
- (4) Refund life income in monthly installments with face value certain.

Plans of Insurance: There are six plans of insurance offered for conversion purposes: (1) ordinary life, (2) 20-payment life, (3) 30-payment life, (4) 20-year endowment, (5) endowment at age 60, (6) endowment at age 65.

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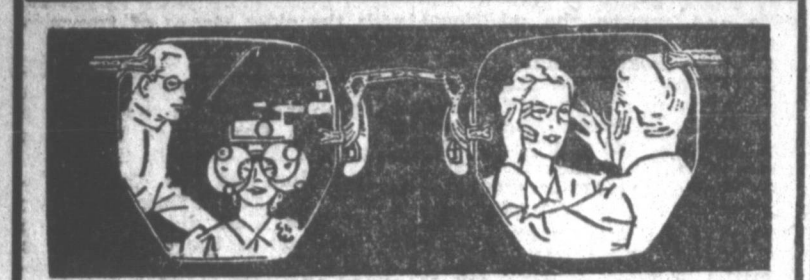
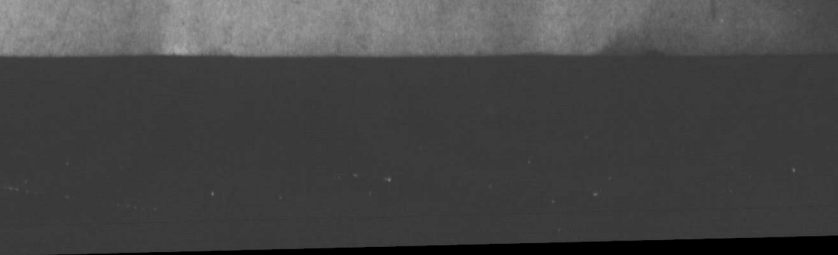
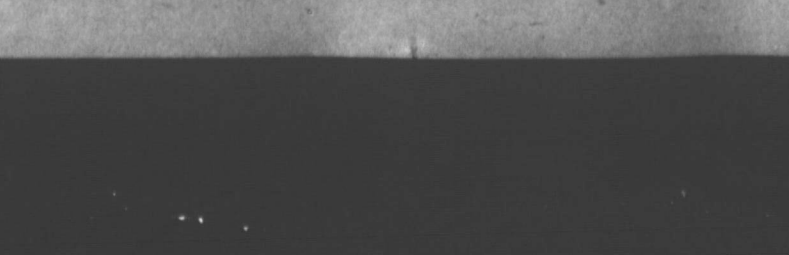
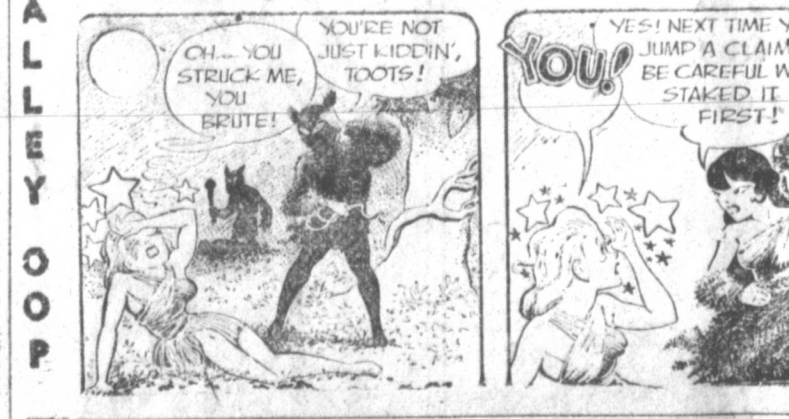
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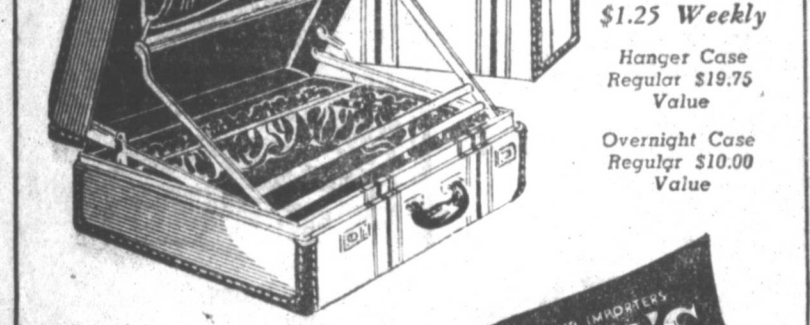
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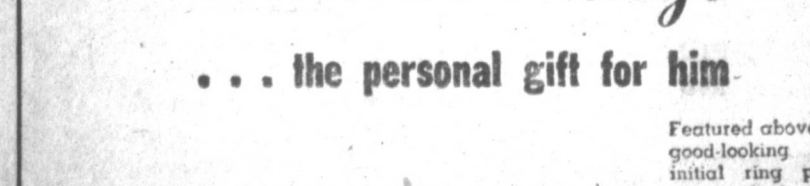
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Fire Hazards Are Growing Out of Housing Shortage

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Special fire hazards growing out of the housing shortage are threatening to heighten the present peak in the number of deaths from fire in the United States, according to statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company.

"Houses which have been long unoccupied and are in poor repair, some of them little short of fire traps, are now being used by families that cannot find more suitable shelter," the statisticians point out. "In many of these places, and in households where several families are living together, additional fire hazards have been created by the use of temporary cooking and heating facilities."

During the war years the death toll from fire reached a record high, according to the statisticians. In 1944, the latest year for which official figures are available, more than 3,000 persons—almost twice the number of about a decade earlier—were fatally burned, trampled to death, suffocated, or otherwise fatally injured in conflagrations. About four fifths of each year's total are the result of fires in private dwellings, apartment houses, tenements, and rooming houses.

With the approach of winter, the season when deaths from fire are most numerous, the statisticians urge increased alertness against fire hazards. Heating systems and electrical cords and appliances should be checked to see that they are in safe condition and in greater care should be exercised in using matches and in preventing children from playing with them. Many fires result from careless smoking, particularly in bed or on upholstered chairs.

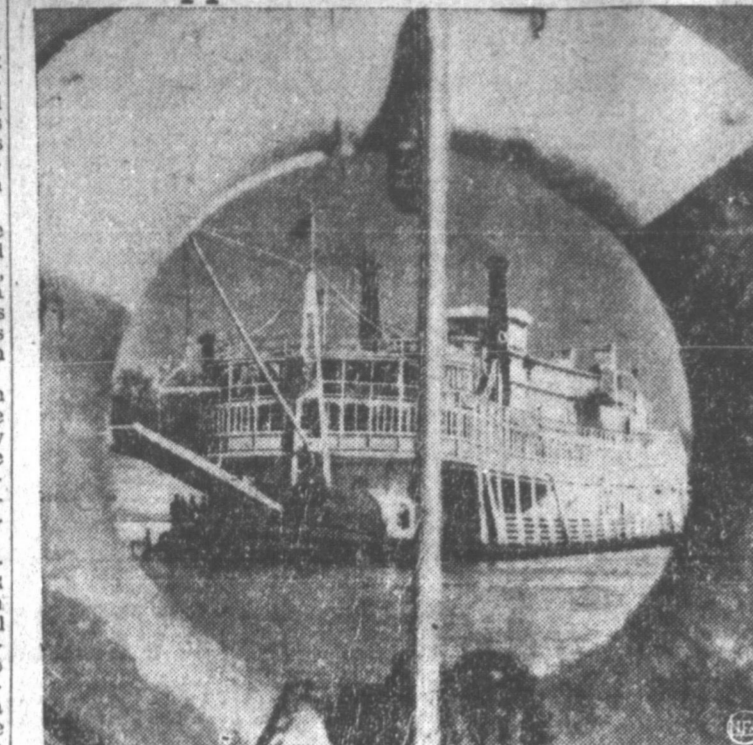

The judge called on UMW counsel to explain why the union should not be held to its contract for the "period of government possession" of the coal mines.

Evidently dissatisfied, Judge Goldsborough asked why the union had not applied to the wage stabilization board for wage relief, as provided by the Smith-Connally act.

Lewis' own chief counsel, Welly K. Hopkins, took over the reins, brandishing his spectacles at arm's length, he shouted, that the union had no need to go to the wage stabilization board because the contract itself "plainly" permitted the calling of new negotiations with the government.

In arguing that Lewis had a right to end the contract, Hopkins told the court the agreement had been approved by the wage stabilization board and endorsed by President Truman.
