LUBBOCK, Tex., July 2-UP - L. Jones, former football player, is the new dean of men at Texas Tech.

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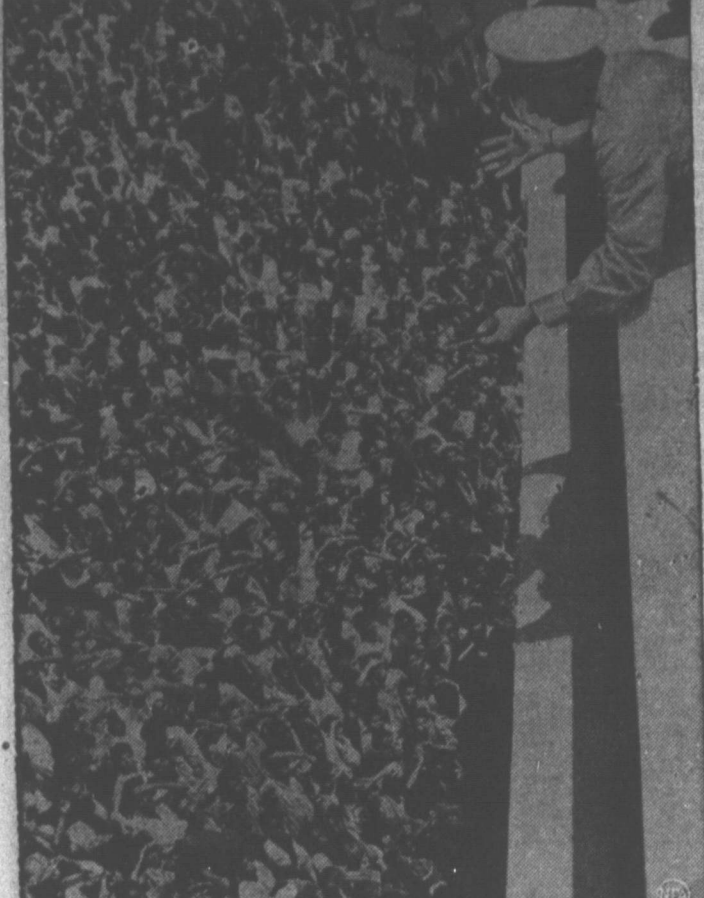

### Matching Ribbons For Mama Columnists' Families Believe They Lead The Life Of Riley

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Higher than a mountain, deeper than an ocean, and more constant than the tides, is the love of a newspaper columnist for his family.

If this weren't true, those of us who write columns for a living never would pay visits to our families. We would avoid them as if they were a blight.

Once the kissing and hugging of greetings is over a columnist's family settles down to making it plain that the man with the typewriter is a loafer and idler, and they start thinking up things to keep him as busy as his brothers.

Accustomed to men who go off to work and keep regular hours, they can't put up with a man who, as they see it, seems to have a little or nothing to do. Appearances are against a columnist. He can put his typewriter on a cool porch, keep a cool drink at hand, wear the most comfortable clothes he has, and wander aimlessly about between paragraphs.

To them, the writing of a column is about the same as a stenographer doing a long letter, and not nearly as grueling a task as recording the minutes of a Missionary Society meeting. I have found that it is no use trying to explain to your loved ones that while the actual typing of the column may not take more than forty-five minutes to an hour, a good 22 hours has been spent in fussing, fuming and fretting over what to write about.

I hadn't been here at home more than an hour before my sister said, "Well, it's nice to have you home. With all the time you have on your hands, you'll welcome some work to keep you busy. I have saved up a lot of dirty jobs for you to do."

She wasn't joking, either. The grass in the back yard is knee high, and Ethel admitted that she hadn't thought of calling a yardman since she heard I was coming. She said I'd have to repair and sharpen the lawnmower and that my brother, Cog, would have fixed it, only he is a working man and doesn't have the time. Besides, when he comes home at night he is tired. This really burned me up.

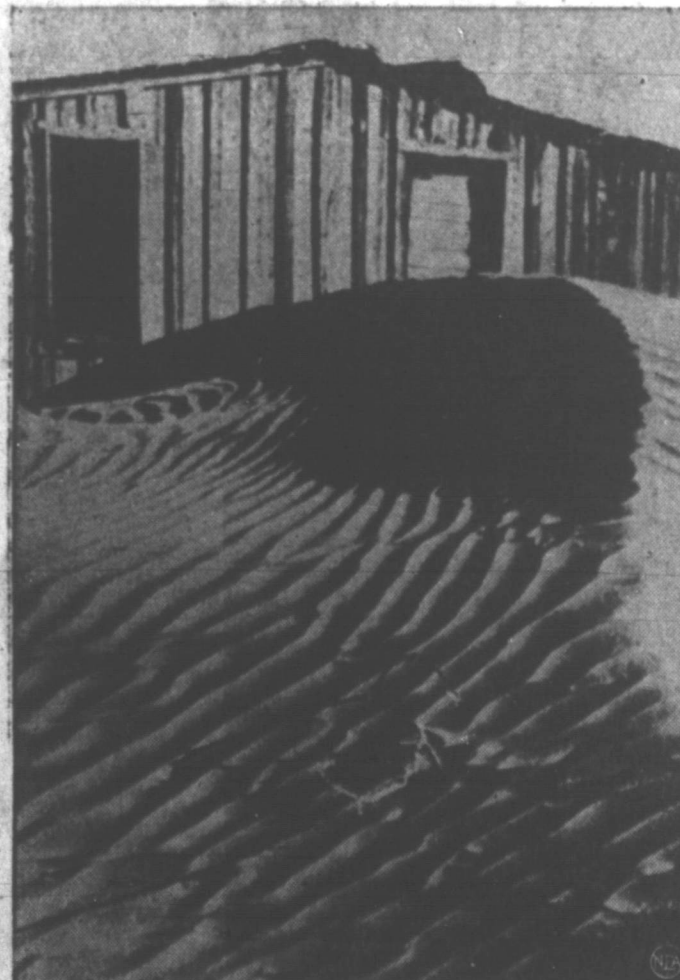
Another job saved up for idle brother Henry is the clearing out of the Spanish-moss from the oak and pine trees in the yard. The moss that is driving the family crazy is not the moss that can be reached from a ladder, but the kind that hangs from branches so high the squirrels carry oxygen masks when they travel up them.

And, of course, the attic needs a thorough cleaning. It would have been cleaned in the spring when my oldest brother paid a visit, but, as my sister explained, he works all year and needed a good rest. "I wouldn't have thought of asking him to help," she said.

An attic in Florida at this time of year is a pressure cooker with a shingled top, so I can hardly wait to get up there and start moving old trunks which should have been thrown away half a century ago.

The dogs are dirty, too, and need thorough washings. The window boxes need painting, one porch awning could stand a little repairing, and three trees are just crying out for transplanting.

This column is a little short, but I'm behind schedule now. I am supposed to be in town matching ribbons for Mama right this minute.

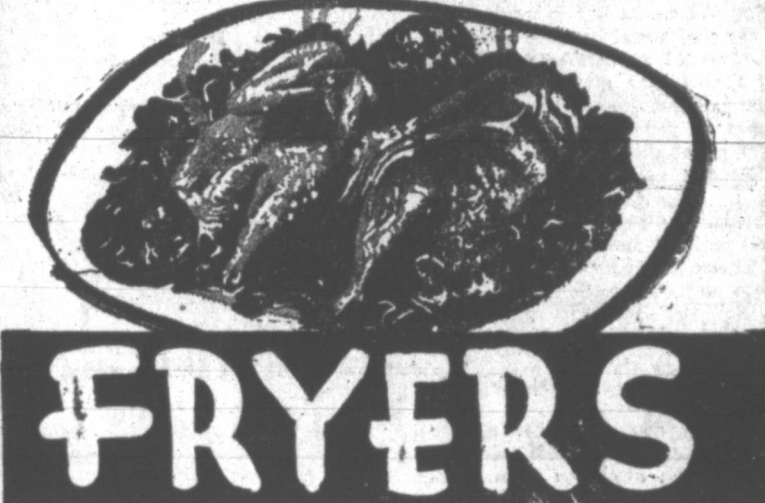

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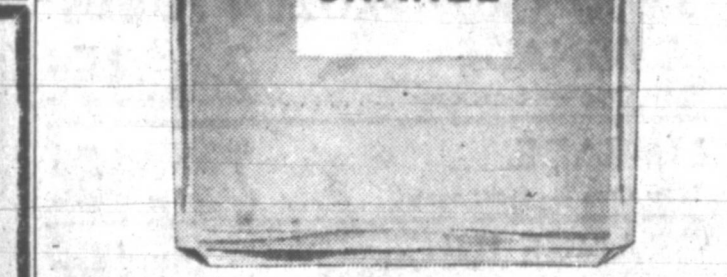

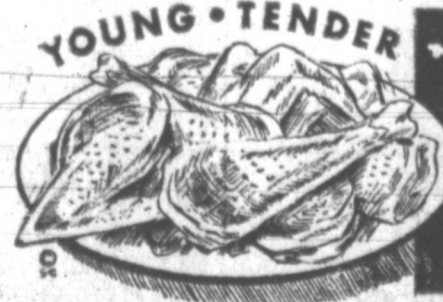

# Rhee Has Won New Prestige By Defying The United States

The realization is settling in slowly that Syngman Rhee has outsmarted his allies — most especially the United States.

It's a new twist to the Daniel in the lion's den story.

Rhee has walked straight up to Uncle Sam, taken a savage tug at old Uncle's beard and then settled back, confident no one could lay a hand on him.

And he has been so right.

Rhee's methods have been devastatingly direct.

Fairly or not, and more than the Communists ever have been able to do, he has put the United States on trial in the Orient.

Ironical and further complicating the situation is the fact that by embarrassing his friends, Rhee at the same time has gained considerable "face" for himself.

Part of this "face" springs from traditional Oriental suspicion and distrust of the West.

By bringing the United States and its powerful United Nations

allies to heel, he inevitably arouses secret admiration even in such a nation as India which, publicly, would deplore his action.

India also will watch carefully to see how we handle him now.

Back in March, 1952, United Nations negotiators at Panmunjom presented documentary proof that the Communists had impressed between 30,000 and 40,000 captured South Korean troops into the Red Army.

Regardless of UN promises to the contrary, Rhee avowed the score when he turned some 27,000 North Korean prisoners loose from UN prison camps and announced he was taking them into the South Korean army.

It was an eye for an eye.

The very high-handedness of Rhee's action has helped to assure his position.

Arbitrarily he has taken a position as champion of all small nations, saying that if South Korea falls now to communism, no small nation ever again will have the courage to resist.

## Group Praises 'Stillwater Plan'

WASHINGTON, July 1 —UP—Members of the Oklahoma congressional delegation Wednesday praised the objectives of the so-called "Stillwater Plan" to promote federal economy.

The plan, endorsed by the Stillwater, Okla., Chamber of Commerce, would offer special inducements to both civilian and military leaders who make savings. Prizes totaling \$85,000 would be offered heads of civilian agencies making the greatest economies.

The congressional leaders said they are taking a close look at the scheme designed to stimulate frugality on the part of all federal employees.

"I'm for all such constructive efforts calculated to promote economy in government," said Sen. Robert S. Kerr.

Kerr added that he is "very much interested in studying, and learning more about, this proposal."

Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney (D-Okla.) said the plan "aims at the same general ends" as his own proposal to establish a "blue-ribbon" Civil Service with promotion

based on merit and administrative ability.

"Only by pressing for better management with plans of this general type can we hope to get better value for the money we spend," Monroney said.

He added that the Stillwater Plan and his own proposal, which he plans to reintroduce in the current Congress after some revisions, "stem from the conviction that the taxpayers' purse is not a bottomless pit."

## Two Fined In County Court

Two related cases came up on the county court docket.

Vestie L. Smith, 37, of 514 S. Somerville, has been fined \$100 and costs on a charge of driving while pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Jerome Henry, of the Flats, has been fined \$100 and costs on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday. He, too, had pleaded not guilty to the charge earlier.

Finally, a bulldozer, using its blade, pushed the grunting, shorting pigs back home.

COLUMBUS, July 2 —UP—A house painter got rid of a wasp nest under the eaves of a house he started to paint, but it took all the profit out of the job.

The painter destroyed the nest by burning it with rolled up newspapers. The house caught fire and caused \$800 damages.

## Marine Falls to Death

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1 —UP—Marine S-Sgt. Charles S. Flint, 21, of San Antonio, Tex., died Tuesday from injuries received when he fell from a fourth-floor hotel window. Police said Flint apparently leaned out of the window too far while watching an early-morning fire near the hotel.

## New Post

AUSTIN, July 1 —UP—Harry Benge Crozier, succeeded Wednesday by Weldon Hart as chairman of the Texas Employment Commission. Hart, with Hugh Williamson and Joe Hiltcock, Crozier had been a member of the commission since 1942 and chairman since 1945.

## SUB FOR CHURCHILL

# State Agencies Accused Of Aiding Fuel Price Increase

WASHINGTON, July 2 —UP—Chairman Charles A. Wolterton of the House Commerce committee charged Thursday that state conservation agencies have conspired with the oil industry to force gasoline and oil prices up at a time when they should be coming down.

The New Jersey Republican, whose committee is investigating possible "collusion" in recent sharp increases for petroleum products, noted that most oil-producing states have regulatory commissions with broad powers to control crude oil output.

While the avowed purpose of these agencies is to conserve natural resources, he told reporters, "they have a far greater effect than just conservation."

"State production control can be

used as a price-fixing device and oil firms have standing "arrangements" to raise prices at the same time. Retail gas prices have jumped more than two cents a gallon in some parts of the country in the past few weeks.

John Dessler, executive secretary of the New Jersey Gasoline Retailers Association, testified that gas station operators were in "the tight grip of monopoly" of the oil companies.

He said the large oil producers are trying to extend absolute control from the wells all the way through to the retailers. Dessler said the oil companies also are promoting "price wars" among retailers in some areas to wipe out independent operators.

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## No Steering Wheel

OAKLAND, Calif., July 2 —UP—Emmett Williams was fined \$15 and given a 10-day suspended sentence Wednesday for driving his car without a steering wheel.

Williams said he used a wrench on the nut at the end of the steering column to turn corners. "I was very careful," he said.

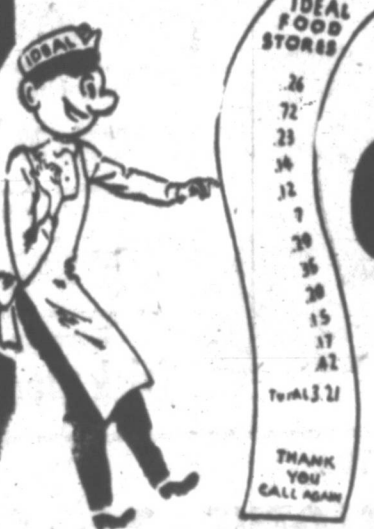

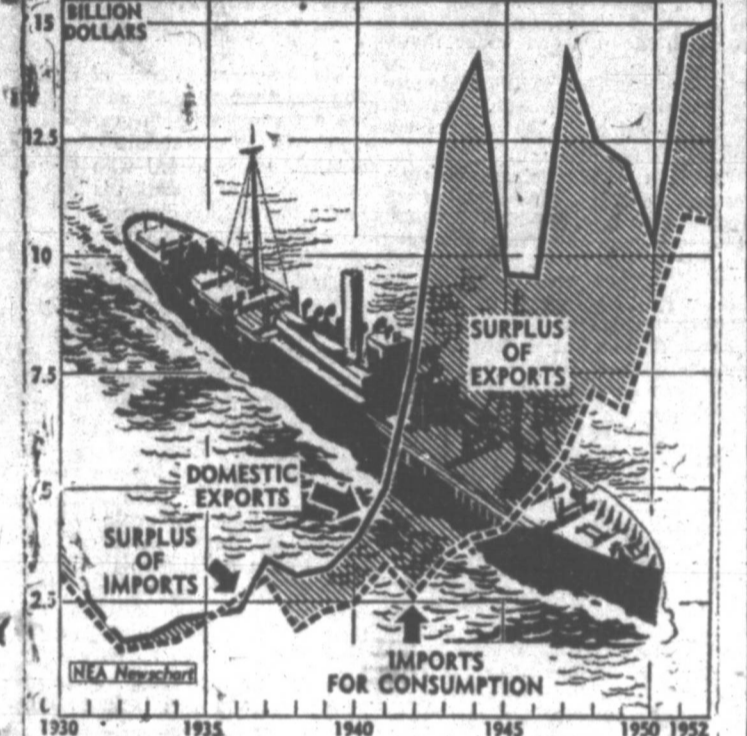
# Feminine Lines Shine Through Lingerie Line

## JACOBY ON CANASTA

### Follow Rules In Pickups

 Today's mail brought me two canasta questions from my boy who is only eight years old. His first question has been answered several times in this column, but I still cannot bring myself to deny an answer to my youngest reader. Here are his questions:  
 "You have a canasta, of something. An opponent discards that something. Can you pick up the pile even if you have a canasta?"  
 "If a player had all of the wild cards and couldn't get down, would he have to discard a wild card?"  
 The answer to the first question is simple: "Yes." According to the official laws of canasta, a canasta is just another meld. It happens to be a big meld, and it gives you a good bonus, but a canasta is just like any other meld for the purpose of picking-up the discard pile.  
 Let's take a simple example. Suppose you have a canasta that is made up of five queens and two deuces. The player at your right discards a queen at a time when the pack does not contain a wild card.  
 That discarded queen matches your canasta of queens. You can therefore pick up the discarded queen, taking the rest of the discard pile with it. You add the queen to your canasta, and put the rest of the discard pile in your hand.  
 The second question has an even easier answer. A player is allowed to discard a wild card whenever he pleases, provided that it is his turn to play. You don't have to wait until you have a hand that contains only wild cards.  
 Some people have their own rules on this subject. They may say that you cannot discard a wild card at this time or at that time, but those rules are pretty foolish. My advice to canasta players

(whether their age is 8 or 80) is to disregard all such rules. A player should be allowed to discard whatever he likes whenever it is his turn.

Q — In a game of Samba I melded three queens and later on melded another three queens as a separate meld. Am I allowed to join these as a single meld? Can my partner do so? Must we add another queen in joining the two melds? The rule is that you have the right to keep the melds separate or to join them. The choice is completely up to you and your partner. Once the melds have been joined, however, they may not be separated again.

# Seeks To Rebuild Democratic Party

**BEAUMONT, Tex., July 2** —UP— Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell said Wednesday night that a depression is not inevitable and that his party would rebuild on "the rock of the Solid South."  
 Mitchell, touring the state to get Texas back into the Democratic fold, will speak at Bryan today and Waco tonight.  
 At Beaumont, he told an audience that "the Democratic party of the future will be built on the rock of the Solid South." But he said the party must not be a regional one, but "must join North and South, East and West."  
 He told a group at Kilgore, Tex., earlier that "Those Republicans who believe that depressions are inevitable are simply selling America short."  
 The 49-year-old Chicago attorney said "the old GOP elephant has forgotten nothing and has learned nothing. The party still stands for reaction in domestic affairs and isolation in foreign affairs."  
 He criticized President Eisenhower's administration as one of "big business" and said the trend toward tight money was curtailing industrial expansion, home building and other activities.  
 He said Americans are becoming alarmed at the "meat ax" cuts in the Air Force budget. "If tight money plunges us into depression we can still survive, but if our anxiety to reduce taxes import to a cut in our national defense below the margin of safety," he said, "then not only our wealth, but our lives and civilization will be lost."  
 Earlier, Mitchell told an audience at Denton, Tex., that he had learned "the Republican administration plans to impose a national sales tax."  
 "I am told the people of Texas for many years have understood the basic injustice of the sales tax," he said. "I am told you folks call it a tax on poverty — which is exactly what it is."

## 'Make-Believe' A-Bomb To Aid Troop Training

**NORTH FORT HOOD, Tex., July 2**—UP—The 36th Infantry Division was to explode a "make-believe" atomic bomb during summer training maneuvers Thursday.

Lt. Col. Frank G. McDonald, Hillsboro, said the experiment of producing a mushroom-shaped cloud was a new one for them, but they would try it.

## Big Fire Guts Baptist Church In Nacogdoches

Reese and Dr. Jared I. Cartledge, pastor, said deacons would start rebuilding plans almost immediately. They said about half of the loss was covered by insurance.

The fire was the second in the church within a year. Last October, the attic heating system caught fire, resulting in \$40,000 damage.

# County Calls For Bids On Land At Perry Lefors Field

Bid for raising wheat on the hillside portions of Perry Lefors field will be opened by the county commissioner at 10 a.m., July 13.

The commissioners called for the bids following a brief discussion on present leases, Leon Daugherty, on bid weed problems. Daugherty has held the lease since 1948 and asked for renewal.

The court, however, wanted to "play safe" and remain above criticism by taking bids on the land.

In other action, the court paid Elmer Immel \$280 right-of-way for a small tract of land north of the Kellerville bridge for a permanent easement. The land will be used in reconstruction of the bridge. A payment of \$1,800 right-of-way to Horace Saunders for right-of-way along the 1.3-mile stretch of road to be paved in Precinct 1 between the Colfax Gasoline Plant and the Colfax Carbon Plant.

Action was postponed on a request by Pct. 8 Constable Luke Henley and Deputy Sheriff Jimmy Shelton, McLean, to move their present headquarters into another building in McLean.

A serious pauper case in McLean where a 42-year-old woman invalid, whose children refuse to help her, was referred by the commissioners to Commissioner O. L. Tibbets to make what arrangements he finds most expedient and necessary.

Judge J. B. Maguire was also authorized by the commissioner to appoint a five-man advisory board to work with a similar group appointed by the City Commission to investigate the feasibility and best location of proposed \$32,000 barn and show arena at Recreation Park.

Fighting fires in the county will be one budget item for the commissioners to study, Judge Maguire said. Currently county pays Pampa, McLean and Lefors fire companies \$50 per run plus \$5 a mile up to 10 miles. The judge suggested a flat rate, based on the average yearly cost to each city for Pampa. The most the county has ever paid to the city of Pampa in a year, the judge added, was a little over \$4,000. So far this year, the county has paid a little over \$1,100 to the city for county fire runs.

**Grable Leaves Studio**

## Attorney Relates Details On Union

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 2—UP—Union officials carried guns and a construction firm paid more than \$150,000 to union stewards who did no work, congressmen probing labor strife were told Wednesday.

Labor disputes have idled about 20,000 construction workers in the Kansas City area and members of a House committee are investigating the labor situation here.

James E. Burke, Kansas City attorney and chairman of the Heavy Construction Association negotiating committee, told the congressmen that officials of construction unions "carried guns and frightened members of other unions."

Burke said "commissions have been issued to members of various crafts to carry pistols and many officials carry guns or at least have permits to carry them."

He said at one negotiating session, he literally asked the union members to "lay those pistols down while we negotiate."

A Tulsa construction man, William G. Eastman of the O. R. Burden Co., said his company, in a two-year period, paid union stewards "who did no work" a total of \$150,000.

He said Missouri is the "only state our company operates in where we have had to pay salaries to people who did no work."

Louis Byers, Cleveland, Ohio, lawyer for a pipeline firm, said his company paid between \$100,000 and \$200,000 for "featherbedding" on a pipeline project in Missouri and Kansas. He said non-working stewards were paid up to \$290 a week and working stewards up to \$400.

John Cady, an ironworker, and John M. Christensen, a construction superintendent, told the congressmen they were attacked and beaten by members of the Teamsters Union. The teamsters are headed by O. L. Ring, who employers and workers have testified is the center of most labor difficulty in the Kansas City area.

Survivors include his parents; a brother, Milton Wheelock; and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Kelso, Pueblo, Colo., and Mrs. Vera Storm, Mooreland.

Marcum is out of the hospital today and back in Amarillo, according to Highland General Hospital officials.

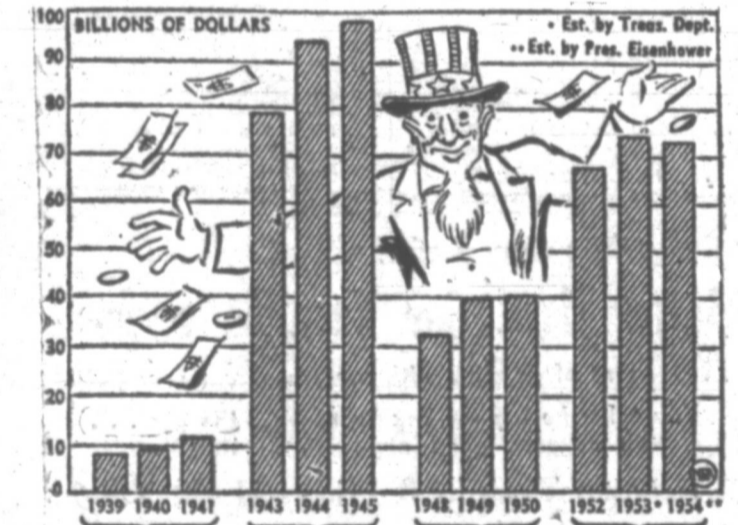
Accident occurred Tuesday on the Lefors highway, two miles southeast of Pampa, Robertson said.
