Oversized stockings will adorn every fireplace in anticipation of Santa's arrival.

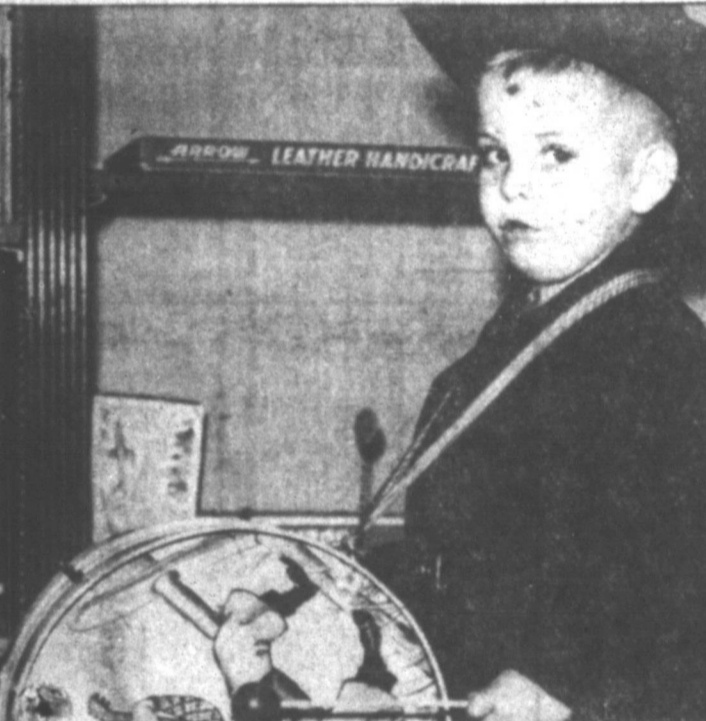

# Panhandle Area Shivers As Mercury Dips To Five

## Area Expects Low Tonight Of 10 To 20

Winter held Texas in its icy grip Wednesday, as the thermometer plummeted to five degrees above zero at Dalhart and below freezing at all other points in the state except the extreme south.

Bitter cold, icy winds, freezing rain and snow beat down upon the state as the after-effects of "the year's first blue norther" which raged through the state Tuesday. Snow fell during the night in the hill country around Junction and was still reported falling at 8 a.m.

Pampa is slated for more cold weather with a forecast of continued cold tonight, with temperatures ranging from 10 to 20 degrees. Radio Station KPBN reported that yesterday's high temperature was 23 degrees, with a low temperature during the night of five degrees.

Wednesday, Marfa reported an inch of snow on the ground at 8 a.m. Presidio recorded 0.1 of an inch and Junction, Waco, and San Angelo traces.

Sleet at Palacios  
Sleet and freezing rain began beating down on Palacios, on the coast, around 7 a.m., and forecasters predicted during the day for the coastal areas. Some glazing of highways was expected in East Texas and the north portion of South Central Texas, endangering the highways for Christmas travelers.

Icy winds, which whipped through the state Tuesday, had diminished in West and North Central Texas, by midmorning, but forecasters said very strong winds would continue in South Central Texas and the south portion of East Texas for the next 24 hours. Skies had cleared over the Panhandle, South Plains and Pecos Valley westward by dawn, but were cloudy over the remainder of the state.

Colder Weather Predicted  
Meanwhile, forecasters predicted colder weather for Texas Wednesday night. The mercury was expected to go below 20 degrees at most points and not rise above 30 degrees Wednesday.

## POW 'Progressives' Reject America's 'Come Home' Cry

PANMUNJOM, Dec. 23 —UP— American converts to communism ignored their country's final plea to come home to their families Wednesday in a weird orgy of wild dancing and singing of Soviet songs.

The Americans, a lone Britain and 103 South Koreans repudiated their homelands and loved ones even though strong Indian guards stood outside their compound, ready to take them back to freedom.

Nineteen of the 22 unrepatriated Americans pressed against the barbed-wire enclosures that symbolized their choice of communism and sang "the Internationale" as the last "come home" plea came from a sound truck.

Dance to Primitive Music  
Then they danced with themselves and with South Koreans, five of whom wore gay women's clothing, to primitive music.

Wisecracks and loud shouts of "no" rose from the compound when the prisoners' leaders asked whether they, on this final day of decision, wanted to be repatriated. Allied newsmen and UN officials who had worked four months on winning back the prisoners to democracy said they were disgusted by the exhibition.

Ring of Obscenity  
At times there was a certain ring of obscenity in the Communist songs. During the morning, one of the Americans, a youth with long blond hair, was seen holding hands with a South Korean.

The Allies gave the unrepatriated prisoners 30 minutes to make up their minds and, after hearing Red songs and watching the men

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wave their fists, sent the sound truck back to Munsan, automatically ending the explanation program at 12:30 p.m. (9:30 p.m. cat Tuesday).

Technically, the unrepatriated had until midnight (9 a.m. cat) to make up their minds. That was

the absolute deadline set by the Korean armistice.

The Communists made a bold move to extend the explanation by requesting "come home" interviews Thursday with 250 anti-Communist Chinese, but the Neutralist Chinese, but the Neutralist

## Sen. McCarthy's Methods Flayed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 —UP— Retired Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor said Wednesday that Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's Fort Monmouth investigation was a "fiasco" that produced no evidence of espionage but damaged military "efficiency and morale."

McCarthy's methods of conducting the hearings, he said, "have been so far below the recognized standards of congressional investigating committees that his actions are undermining respect for law."

Taylor, former U. S. war crimes prosecutor in Germany and now a New York attorney, lashed out at the Wisconsin Republican in an interview with Newsweek magazine.

Believes in Investigations  
He said he believes strongly in congressional investigations but asserted that "abuses and excesses" like those indulged in by McCarthy tend to degrade the process.

For that reason, he proposed creation of a new joint congressional committee to investigate McCarthy's methods.

## Priest Decries Santa Claus

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 23 —UP— The excitement of Christmas still danced in the eyes of the children Wednesday — even though they now have been told there is no Santa Claus.

When the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Louis J. Mendellis broke the news at the St. Alphonsus Catholic school party Tuesday, there were no tears. The vision of gayly-wrapped presents and twinkling trees still cast its spell.

"I believed in Santa but now I know he doesn't exist," said eight-year-old Paul Raykes. "But I don't feel any different."

Anita Butler, 7, said she wasn't disappointed that Santa didn't appear at the party "because he's not a

child. He's just a man dressed up in a bunch of old stuff." Another seven-year-old, Rose Mary Walters, likewise confessed she wasn't upset.

... Too Commercialized!  
Msgr. Mendellis decided to expose Santa because he believes Christmas has been too commercialized, that it has wandered too far from what it is supposed to be — a commemoration of the birth of Christ.

"I've been preaching for 24 years and before I die I want to give Christmas back to Christ," he said.

## Cops Catch Two Convicts

RICHMOND, Ind., Dec. 23 —UP— Two elusive Southern Michigan prison escapees were arrested Wednesday despite a last-minute attempt by one to grab a gun while police were watching him.

Their capture, in a hotel about

down, resulted from a routine investigation of a car they stole in Detroit.

The fugitives, Roman Usiondek, 37, convicted of killing a tavern owner during a 1942 holdup, and Robert Dowling, 27, serving larceny and breaking and entering terms, were jailed pending arrival of Michigan authorities.

Dowling and Richmond Police Capt. John Rizio struggled briefly in the Mack hotel room when Dowling grabbed a German pistol loaded with one bullet from beneath a hat on a pretense he was reaching for identification papers.

But Rizio jumped forward and twisted Dowling's wrist, forcing him to drop the gun. Usiondek was being watched by Policemen Edward Clark and Harold Ryan and offered no resistance.

Police said the fugitives, who were among 13 convicts who broke out of prison at Jackson, Mich., last Saturday night, apparently drove into Richmond shortly after midnight. The other 11 convicts previously were arrested and these two had become the object of an intensive police search in the Detroit area.

Familiar Names  
At Christmastime

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 23 —UP— Two Christmas won't celebrate their Christmas at Lackland Air Force Base this year, but the Snows will be there.

## USDA Clears Large Markets In Spread On Beef Prices

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 —UP— The Agriculture Department reported Wednesday that retail beef prices "have generally reflected" the declining prices farmers received for cattle in 1952 and scattered cases of "extremely wide" farm-to-housewife price spreads on lower grade beef. But it said most of these wide middlemen's margins were found in smaller markets. It gave big markets and chain stores a generally clean bill of health.

The department undertook the survey after several congressmen charged that retail beef prices did not reflect the sharp skids in cattle prices which have taken place for

the past two years, and especially this fall. The lawmakers suggested that middlemen might be making exorbitant profits at the expense of farmers and consumers.

Ordered by Benson  
Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson ordered the study last September. He asked his aides to "examine and report to me quickly on this spread between the price the farmer receives and the price the housewife pays for beef."

The 33-page report was concerned only with retail store sales and did not cover hotels or restaurant beef prices.

For some reason, not explained by the department, none of the 25 charts and tables in the report gave a direct comparison of farm and retail prices on all grades of meat during the year. The only retail prices shown for lower grades of beef were for the month of October. Most of the report dealt with wholesale prices or with retail prices of choice beef.

## Oklahoma Officers Seek Bank Robbers

VIAN, Okla., Dec. 23 —UP— The Oklahoma Highway Patrol reported that a bank in Vian was robbed about 9:30 a.m. The patrol said it was setting up roadblocks throughout the area.

Vian is 10 miles west of Sallisaw in Sequoyah county.

N. R. Johnson, agent in charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Oklahoma City, said he was sending some agents to the area immediately.

Vian is 32 miles west of Fort Smith, Ark., in the Cookson Hills, notorious outlaw hideout country in pioneer days.

Authorities said two men robbed

the bank while a third waited in a cream-colored car outside the bank. The car traveled east towards Arkansas after the robbery.

One of the robbers was described as having curly blond hair and wearing glasses. He carried a .45 caliber sub-machinegun.

The other gunman was armed with a .45 caliber automatic. He was described as having black curly hair and wearing a black coat.

Authorities had no description of the driver of the getaway car.

## State Crude Oil Output To Drop

AUSTIN, Dec. 23 — UP — The Texas Railroad Commission estimated today that the state's crude oil production would fall below one billion barrels in 1953, a figure that was topped in 1951 and 1952. Production this year was estimated at 993,380,658 barrels, some 11,412,000 below the output a year ago. That would be the third largest yearly total since Texas started commercial production of oil in 1896.

# Goal Of Soviet Espionage Has Been Atom Bomb Secret

Editor's Note: The following dispatch, third in a series, of United Press stories on Communist espionage in the United States, tells how Russian spies learned that secret of the A-bomb.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 — UP — The No. 1 target of Soviet espionage in World War II was this country's No. 1 secret, the atomic bomb. Thanks in considerable part to the operations of their trained espionage agents, aided by some Communist-inclined scientists and technicians, the Kremlin's masters learned the innermost secrets of the bomb before the American people became aware of the weapon in 1945.

1911. He was a brilliant student. The rise of the Nazis forced him to take refuge in Britain in 1933. He was interned at the outbreak of war between Britain and Germany in 1939. He was released in 1942 to do atomic research. In 1944, he became a member of a British mission which was to study the development of the atom bomb in this country first hand.

Dr. Yolande Jacobl, of the faculty of the Carl Jung Institute for Analytical Psychology, Zurich, Switzerland, says that modern woman does not hold the man in awe as did the woman of two generations ago. "Woman has solved her inferiority complex on the intellectual level," said Dr. Jacobl, who is lecturing on marriage at the New School for Social Research.

# Christmas Spirit In Divided Berlin

This is the spirit of Christmas in divided Berlin: In Communist East Berlin, signs proclaim "Peace Xmas, 1953" and "Xmas Under the New Course." But at the Brandenburg gate dividing East and West Berlin, Communist peoples police beat their hands against the cold and pace back and forth in their ill-fitting olive-drab uniforms with tommy guns and machine pistols slung over their shoulders.

Children's toys mostly are made of wood, and, as one Soviet zone newspaper complained about a toy train, "guaranteed for a life of five minutes."

Little or nothing of a frivolous nature is on display in East Berlin. Necessities also will double as Christmas gifts. Along the fabulous two miles of West Berlin's Kurfurstendamm, are displayed goods never seen in East Berlin. Fashionable tailors show cloth from all parts of the world. Dress shops vie with London, New York and Paris. Radio shops display the latest in phonographs and tape-recorders. Shoe shops and book stores have an international selection.

Counterfeit Leer  
ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Dec. 23 — UP — Christmas shoppers were asked to contact the U.S. Secret Service if they saw Alexander Hamilton leering at them from a \$10 bill.

Neil Muzzy, vice president of the Union Trust Co., said 11 counterfeit ten-spots had turned up here recently. He said the bogus bills are most easily detected by a leer on the face of Hamilton.

**JULE KAGA (Norwegian Christmas Bread)**

2 packages yeast, compressed or dry  
1 1/2 cups water (boiling for compressed yeast, warm for dry)  
1 cup milk  
1 cup sugar  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 1/2 cups shortening  
1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour (about 1 1/2 cups)  
1 egg  
2 teaspoons ground cardamom  
1 cup chopped candied citron  
1/2 cup seedless raisins  
1/2 cup chopped, blanched almonds

Soften yeast in water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening and cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour and mix well. Add softened yeast and eggs and beat well. Stir in cardamom, citron, raisins and almonds. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl. Cover and let rise in warm place until doubled (about 1 1/2 hours). When light, punch down and divide into 2 equal portions. Let rest 30 minutes. Shape each portion into loaf and place in greased bread pans. Let rise until doubled (about 1 hour). Bake in moderately hot oven (400°F.) 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350°F.) and bake about 45 minutes longer. Makes 2 loaves.

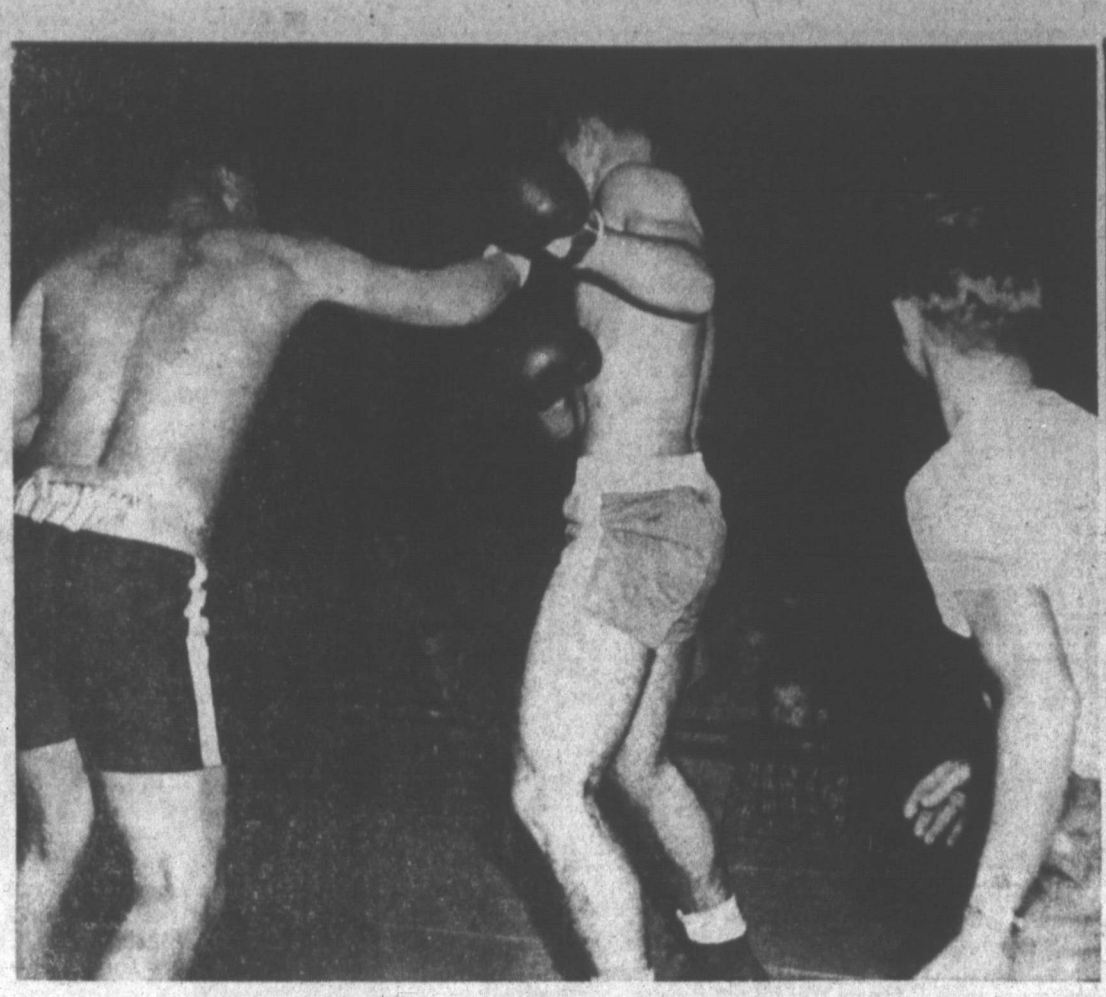

Hot shooting Oregon State, paced by seven-foot-three Wade (Swede) Halbrook, led almost all the way Tuesday night to trounce Indiana 67 to 51 at Eugene, Ore., to smash the Hoosiers' winning streak at 11 games, six of them this season.

Meanwhile, second-ranked Kentucky was blasting powerful La Salle, 73 to 60, in the final round of Kentucky's invitational tournament at Lexington, Ky., to maintain their unbeaten record through six games this year.

Second Night of Trouble Indiana, which had to go into overtime to beat Oregon State the previous night, jumped off to a quick 6-2 lead Tuesday night but the Beavers rallied to tie and then go ahead to stay for the rest of the game.

Key to the Wildcat triumph was the "spiking" of La Salle's big gun, All-American Tom Gola. Although Gola played an excellent game he was held to 18 points by fine guard-played by former all-American center Clif Hagan led the Wildcats with 28 points.

Fabulous Clarence (Bavly) Francis also had a big night Tuesday night, although his Rio Grande College team was trounced by North Carolina State, the nation's seventh-ranked team, 92 to 76.

Francis racked up 34 points in his appearance against a team ranked among the nation's top 10. Although it must be noted that 14 of those points came against the state scrubs in the final quarter.

Wednesday night Francis faces his other test in Dickie Hamrick's center Wake Forest, who Tuesday night scored 24 points to lead the Deacons to a 58 to 57 victory over the Peoria Caterpillars, national AAU champions.

Other Games Also Wednesday night, the Oklahoma Aggies will try to follow up their upset of Illinois by beating Southern California's fifth-ranked Minnesota faces Marquette; North Carolina State plays the Peoria Caterpillars; and 53rd-ranked Notre Dame plays a big game against Bradley.

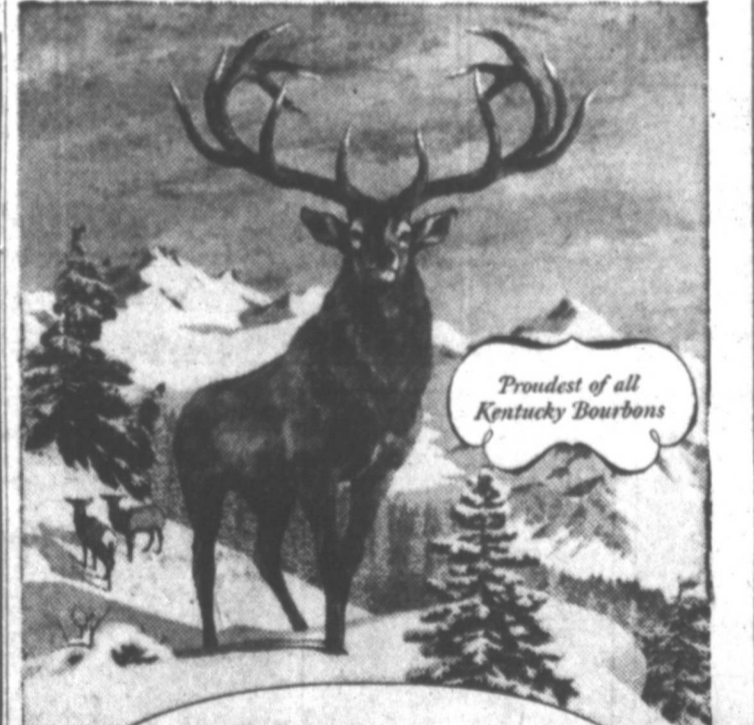

Making Ike's Atomic Plan Work Is Considered Big Task

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — The most important question about the Eisenhower plan for developing peaceful uses of atomic energy through the United Nations is, "What happens next?" There is considerable fear that like the President's great foreign policy speech to the U.S. newspaper editors last April, the atomic energy plan may die on the vine for lack of active cultivation.

South, West Differ The Russians propose a ban on the use of atomic weapons and a cut of all armed forces by one third. The western powers proposed balanced reduction of armed forces and a system for inspection and verification of all weapons including atomic ones. After this, a ban on weapons of mass destruction could be put into effect.

Out of all this discouraging lack of progress grew the American plan of November to have disarmament studied by a subcommittee made up of only five powers, America, Britain, France, Russia and Canada. It would meet in closed sessions to facilitate negotiation.

At last report, Maj. Charles Yeager had an edge for the title of "fastest man on earth" with a flight 2 1/2 times the speed of sound, or 1,650 miles an hour, in a stub-winged rocket plane. This put him ahead of Scott Crossfield who only went twice the speed of sound (1,327 miles an hour). Yeager was reported to have zoomed up to 80,800 feet in his record bid this month but didn't hit the 82,235 feet reached by Marine Maj. Marion Carol in another experimental rocket ship.

In contrast, at Bakersfield, Calif., man drilled more than four miles through the earth's crust in the search for oil—nearly 1,000 feet farther than ever before. It took two years to dig the hole that deep and they didn't find oil anyway.
