### **Guards Force** Stubborn PWs To Hear Reds

PANMUNJOM, Oct. 15 -UP-Heavily-armed Indian guards forced anti-Red Chinese sitdown strikers to attend the first Communist lectures Thursday but the prisoners rejected repatriation in overwhelm-

For seven hours the violently anti-Communist war prisoners of the Allies refused to leave their compounds. They came out quietly when they were told their Indian guards would use force if neces-

The Indians, carrying rifles and swinging nightsticks, herded the first group of 22,418 prisoners into the miniature tent city built by American engineers on an aroundthe-clock schedule.

Only 10 of the 500 Chinese inter viewed by Communist political of-ficers Thursday decided to return to Red rule. The others held firm to their anti-Commiunist stand.

The first day of "counter-brainwashing" ended at 6:30 p.m. (3:30 z.m. cst). The 10 who accepted repatriation will be turned over to the Reds at 8 p.m. (5 a.m. cst). The first nine men who refused to go home came out of the interview huts and planted the Chinese Lt. Gen. K. S. Thimayya, Indian chairman of the Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission, had ruled that his guards could not make

I gave my word, so naturally I can't say anything about the very skimpy hand for the opening bid of one no-triump, If I hadn't promised, I'd say that a skimpy hand like that should pass the merely invitational bid of two no-

trump.

They did both, East had to find four discards on the long clubs, and the effort strained both his hand and his disposition. He could afford one diamond and one heart. Then the going got tough, After some thought, he parted with a second heart, And after still more ought, he parted with a low

Goldsmith saw the signs of trouble and could tell exactly what was going on, Evidently East had nothing worth saving in hearts, but was worried about spades and diamonds. So he threw a couple of hearts, cashed the ace of hearts, and led the king of spades!

East could take the three spades that he had managed to save, but then he had to get out with a diamond, It did East no good to lead the jack of diamonds, for he had dready given his hand away. Goldsmith won in dummy with the ace of diamonds and confidently fi-nessed through the queen of dia-monds to make his contract.





One of the top mysteries of the day is why, beyond the announced desire to appoint a middle-of-the-road man, Eisenhower ever named the California governor to

Certainly it cannot be on the basis of his vast judicial experience for Warren has never held a judicial post in all of his years as a political figure. Even his record as an attorney and later his district attorney record were anything but spectacular.

Nor could he have been named to the high court because of his high political courage or his leadership in the Republican party of which Eisenhower is the nominal head. Too many Californians will remember that in an almost unprecedented campaign before the last Republican convention there was a spontaneous mushrooming of opposition to Warren leading the GOP delegation back to the convention in Chicago. And they remember that more than 500,000 members of Warren's own party said "No" at the polls and voted for Thomas Werdel — a man completely unknown to most of the voters who merely objected to Warren and were determined to vote against him.

Certainly with such a record Warren could hardly be considered the GOP standard bearer in his own state,

Just who made the deal for Eisenhower and why has not yet been fully disclosed but the appointment gives the Republicans who ARE Republicans a pretty good line on the political thinking of the man they elected to the presidency. Throughout his service as governor Earl Warren has been a strong advocate of big government and government intervention in the lives of the people of the state. He has been a member of the "let government run your lives" school of thought, as demonstrated by his determined effort to bring about some form of socialized medicine to the state of California.

It ought to be a curious thing for Vice President Richard Nixon to be as closely associated with Warren as he will be in Washington. Californians who worked for the election of Nixon to the Senate over the candidacy of Mrs. Helen Gahagan Douglas will remember that as governor of the state and with considerable political influence at that time, Warren flatly refused to have anything to do with the candidacy of Nixon and failed to speak a good word for him during the entire campaign even though he was opposing as radical a left-winger such as Mrs. Douglas.

As government continues to march on in greater weight, a conservative member of the Supreme Court who understood and believed in our original form of constitutional government could be of great service to the nation in attempting to stem the ever-rising tide of statism, whatever its disguise might be. In the appointment of Earl Warren of California to the position of chief justice of the Supreme Court, President Eisenhower has struck a real blow at our traditional and representative republic and has given a vote of confidence to radicals and left-wingers of all description.

### Persuasion Talks

So we'll have to chalk up another one for the North Koreans and the Chinese Reds. This time in the matter of trying to talk a lot of their captured men in the recent shooting war into returning to Russia for whatever fate awaits them.

There are supposed to be more than 20,000 of them, who have said that they have been fed up with the Reds and their tyranny and want to get away from it.

So a Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission has been set up to listen in on the talk by the Communists with these men. In exchange our Allied Commissioners are permitted to talk to the American boys who have plunked for the Russian system. Having devised this set of rules, the commission now has fixed up a bunch of rules that couldn't have been handier to the Communists if they had drawn them up themselves.

The "persuaders" first of all can demand individual Interviews, giving them a chance to get right down the throat of the men they want most to intimidate. While he is being "interviewed" the POW must not interrupt and must attend all meetings to which they are "invited." Since there is no limit, the "persuasion talks" can last as long as nine hours a day and can go on the full 90 days of the armistice. In other words, they can do just about anything they want, short of swinging a lead pipe on the reluctant ones, to convince them they should

The one chance the interviewee has is that he doesn't have to answer any questions, including giving his name. We wonder how many they will be able to "sell."

Those interested in education want to know whether the parents or the government should have the final say as to what children are being taught in tax - supported schools on ethical and political questions. They want to know whether the government is to be the servant or master of the citizens. If the government has the final say as to how the youth is to be educated, it certainly becomes the master or tyrant. As Isabel Paterson, author of "The God of the Machine," says, government school are tyranny naked. And as Rose Wilder Lane, author of "Discovery of Freedom," says, they are the primary tyranny.

Even if the state grants the right of parents to send their children to private schools, should he state have the final say under state compulsory attendance laws as to whether these schools qualify? If they do, then the parents have lost control of the education of their children.

Natural Or Man-Made Laws? Opponents of tax-supported or oercive schools contend that such schools cannot teach successfully the Golden Rule because they violate it. 
