## **Dean Claims Reds Building Strength**

PANMUNJOM, Dec. 14 - UP - UN negotiator Arthur H. Dean said Monday Allied troops, if necessary, will be used to guarantee the walk to freedom of 22,000 anti-Communist war prisoners.

Dean announced to cheering Allied soldiers he had informed the Communists that the troops would line up south of the demilitarized zone in January to handle the men if the Reds try to detain them.

But Dean, who broke off negotiations for a Korean peace conference Saturday, said he expected no trouble when the Jan. 22 deadline for the release of prisoners is

## Pioneer 'Playboys'

When a man starts up a new business and has to close his doors because he runs out of money, the losses he takes may not seem much like blessings.

He might lough at the idea that his loss could do anybody any good.

But the fact is we need men willing to take losses. Pioneers are usually ahead of their times. When they invent something new, they usually have trouble getting it accepted. If it weren't for their early losses, most radical new products would never get out of the test-tube and onto the counter.

The great thing about pioneers is their willingness to take risks which involve losses. They face the fact that they may go broke, but they take the risk anyhow. It's part of their nature to enjoy a fight, even though they may get knocked out

For example, take the steamboat. We always thought that Robert Fulton invented it. Then we found out from Henry Grady Weaver's new history book, "The Mainspring of Human Progress," that no less than sixteen steamboats had been built and operated in America before the launching of Fulton's Clermont.

Most of the early inventors and operators went broke, but they bounced back again. In those days it was possible for a man to lose and remake several fortunes in

One advantage of huge personal fortunes is that they are often "wasted" on "useless" toys. The early automobiles were considered "useless toys." The young Vanderbilts bought these toys and tinkered with them for no more useful purpose than to see how fast they could

Conservatives and reactionaries shook their heads and muttered: "Those fools are throwing away their money just to get themselves killed."

And that's what happened. The Vanderbilts poured thousands of dollars into those early "useless" toys, just threw their money away on a silly luxury that wasn't good for anything except killing people.

The first Vanderbilt Cup Races were known as "those bloody races." The early drivers not only killed themselves; they drove straight into the crowds where their gas tanks obligingly expladed and scattered people in all directions. Money and lives were thrown away.

The funny thing is: it's doubtful whether the automobile industry would have ever gotten started except for those early "useless" races. The playboy sportsmen who raced cars improved their quality and made the cars safer each year - not for the public, but so that when they turned over they might get out of their own rocers alive.

If we'd had a big, paternalistic government in those days it would have probably outlawed the Vanderbilt Cup Races on grounds of safety, and taxed the Vanderbilt fortunes out of existence on grounds that the government would spend the money more wisely on charity — than on useless horseless carriages.

The pioneers may take a loss, but they're always busy cutting down on the possibility of losses by cutting costs and inventing new methods which lower prices. They prefer to be on their own, to solve their own problems. And the true pioneers enjoy the stimulus of a loss; it separates the men from the boys.

That's why the true pioneers aren't running to the government for price supports - they prefer to be in-

## Don't Take Chances

The cost of highway accidents in death, pain and suffering is a fairly familiar story to most Americans. Not so well known, however, is the costly and tearful aftermath of each fatal or serious accident in the home of every victim of carelessness on the streets and highways, for weeks or month - for periods extending over many years and even a lifetime - the family of each motor vehicle accident casualty learns how much a single mishap costs in grief, worry, never-ending bills to re-pair broken bodies and disfigured faces, and other exbenses.

But virtually unknown is the important fact that direct or hidden costs of streets and highway accidents reach into every home to the tune of \$90 from the average tamily every year. That's how much is being drained from each family purse in the nation as a whole. But the cost per family runs higher than the national average in 31 states. In 17 - or more than half of this aboveaverage group — the bill is well over \$100. It ranges all the way up to \$399.44 in Neveda.

According to Paul H. Blaisdell, public safety director of the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, milies in all but five states are laying out more than I a week as their share. Specific bills for these accident losses may never turn up in their mail-boxes, but the costs are levied against each family just the same. even though an accident does not kill or injure one of its members - even if they don't own an automobile. That's because the charges are passed on through increased taxes, wage losses, cost of insurance, medical and haspital bills, automobile and property damage repair charges and other items.

Any family can consider itself fortunate if it escapes he human misery of these accidents, which touch the ornes of some 40,000 dead and 2,000,000 injured victims in a year's time. But it must nevertheless help to share the burden of their economic costs, visible, running close to \$4,000,000,000 annually.

Safer driving by all offers hope of lessening this big sinch on the average family's purse. It will also diminish the threat of accidents to a family's safety if it insists that its driver or drivers take no unnecessary chances wills at the wheel. Constantly remind them: "Slow down

### **Looking Ahead**

FREEDOM IS DECLARED To really know America and what it's made of, we need frequently to take a refresher course in American history. Before any eitizen approves any measure shifting responsibility and political and economic power from the hands of the citizenry to the hands of government bureaucracy, he should be reminded especially of purposes of our great founding documents and the condition

out of which they emerged. Two documents stand out among all those adopted by the citizens of this new world - the Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution. Why were they written, why were they needed? In this column let's apply that question to the Declaration of Independence and look back upon the struggling colonies. Then, next week, we can follow through with the Constitution.

By and large the American colomists of the early 1700's felt a strong allegiance to Great Britain and the Crown. For a time Britain encouraged this allegiance by permitting the colonists great liberties - in foreign trade and in their domestic affairs. But after 1763, when the French were driven off the North American continent. England began to apply harsh and restrictive measures — the Sugar Act, the Stamp Act, the Declara-tery Act which declared that the King, by and with consent of Parliament, had authority to make laws "to bind the colonies in all respects." Regimentation became the lot of the colonists. It became clear that England would enforce the prosposition that the colonies existed for one purpose - the good of the mother country.

sonal liberty began to be fanned, England clamped on ever-more burdensome restrictions. Som e were designed as punishment. Government became the master of the people of the new world. Patrick Henry, Jefferson, Franklin - the powerful voices of the oppressed people spoke out. The flame of freedom gathered in intensity. One after another, incidents flared. British soldiers were sent in and began to march threateningly about the countryside. In 1775 the fighting began - at Concord, Massachusetts. In the midst of war, the lead-

ers of the embattled colonies gathered at Philadelphia in the first Continental Congress, They appointed a committee of five to draft a declaration of independence. The committee asked Thomas Jefferson to write it. Ben Franklin and John Adams later penned in a few minor revisions, and Jefferson then presented the final document to the Congress. It ted, as near knows, on July 4, 1776.

The purpose of this historic Declaration was wet forth clearly: When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, a separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation."

Next the great philosophy of the free man was written into the Declaration: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That to are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.


Read again this historic purpose of government — " to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed..." That says clearly that the purpose of goverement is to safeguard the citizen's unalienable rights - the right to live, the right to be free. and the right to pursue happiness in one's own way. When we examine our government today we see how far afield we have permitted it to go. It's now a dominant power in nearly every phase of our everyday life. Will we hold back its growth now .- or will we permit it to go on until out personal liberty has evaporated?


