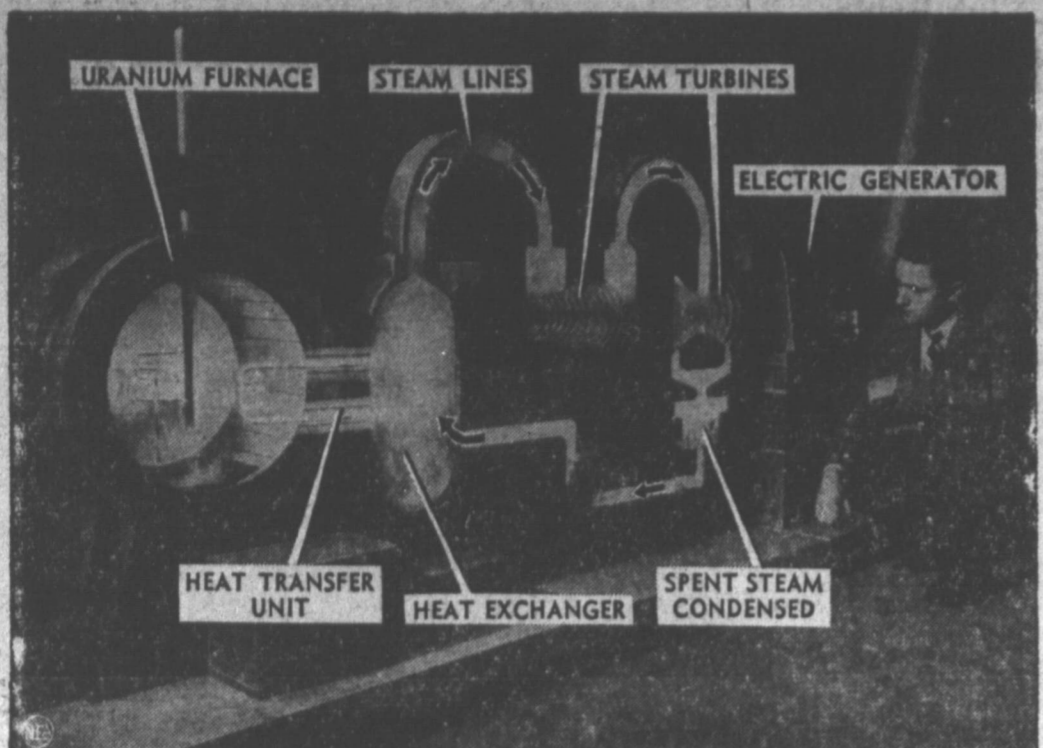

DESIGN FOR ATOMIC POWER—A simplified explanation of how the atomic power plant for the nation's first atom-powered sub will operate is offered by this model "mock-up," designed by Westinghouse, and placed on display in New York. When installed in the U.S.S. Nautilus, heat generated by splitting of the atom will be transmitted by fluid in a sealed, coiled pipe, to a "heat exchanger," or boiler. Steam will be formed in the water-filled boiler, pass through piping to the steam turbine, which will drive an electric generator to power the sub's electric motors. Spent steam will be condensed, pumped back to the heat exchanger. Demonstrating the power plant is Robert Dollison.

West Coast City Juvenile Delinquency Growing Worse

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fourth in a series of juvenile delinquency. The following dispatch tells of the problems that confront a big city.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13 —UP—The recent escape of 12 youths from the San Francisco Youth Guidance Center dramatized a juvenile delinquency problem which, authorities say, is getting worse.

The youths fled from the modern \$5 million center after forcing a supervisor to surrender his keys as he prepared to show the inmates a movie.

One of the escapes, age 18, returned home just long enough to threaten his stepmother with a knife unless she gave him money and the keys to the family auto. Another of the escapees, also, 16, stole a rifle from an apartment house and terrorized the city for 24 hours before he surrendered.

These are just samples of the rising wave of juvenile crime which includes teen-age prostitution, drug addiction, armed robbery and all the other categories of crime ranging from misdemeanors to murders.

1,875 Arrested in Year
City officials, members of the police department's juvenile bureau and youth guidance workers agree there is a rise in the number of violent acts committed by boys and girls under 18.

Official figures show that 1,875 juveniles were arrested last year for a variety of crimes. The arrests included four boys for homicide (one a murder); 45 boys and two girls for robbery, 194 boys for burglary, 411 boys and 42 girls for auto and other thefts, eight boys for rape, four girls for prostitution, 10 and 327 girls for disorderly conduct.

These figures cover only the cases of juvenile delinquents who were caught and brought into court.

Philip Green, chief juvenile probation officer, said in the first nine months of 1953 there was a 47.5 per cent increase over the comparable period last year in complaints involving boys who committed illegal acts which required formal court action.

Girls' Offenses Increase
He said the increase for girls has been 25 per cent over 1952.

"These figures indicate we are getting near the high delinquency rate which prevailed during World War II," Green said. "The Korean war and the general unrest among youth who are about to enter the military are partly responsible for the increase in delinquency."

Betty Grable Planning New Stage Show

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 13 —UP—Betty Grable, who has succeeded as queen of Fox Studio by Marilyn Monroe, decided today she's happier to be on her own and unveiling her famous legs on the stage again.

Betty is teaming with a pair of long, black mesh stockings and her bandleader husband, Harry James, for a stage show in Chicago. It will be the first appearance of one of the world's most famous blondes since she abdicated as queen of song-and-dance epics at Twentieth Century-Fox.

"That's the way it's always been at the studio," explained Betty as she collapsed in a chair during rehearsal of her act.

"Alice Faye was there, and then they brought me in, and she left. While I was at Fox they tried building up new stars, June Haver and Mitzel Gaynor didn't make it, but Marilyn Monroe did.

"I like working with Marilyn better than the other two. She's nice and I like her love life. She sticks to one fellow and doesn't go out to nightclubs with different men."

Betty was suspended most of the time by Fox during her last three years at the studio.

"They wanted me for a dramatic role but that kind of a part isn't good for me. There are so many girls who can act. I almost had a nervous breakdown worrying over it. It wasn't my cup of tea," she said.

"I couldn't turn down scripts for ever so I went back to do 'The Farmer Took a Wife' and it was dreadful. They sent me to Columbia for a picture but the cast wasn't picked so I didn't report for work and boom! I was suspended again.

"I figure I lost about \$500,000 by suspensions so I asked for my release. Besides, the studio was shut down and no movies lined up for me. When my option came up, they probably would have dropped me anyway," she reflected.

For months Betty went to the race track and turned down movie and nightclub bids. She and James accepted an offer to open at the Chicago Theater Nov. 27 because "I've always wanted to work with Harry. Besides, it was such a good deal—70 per cent of the take, we couldn't turn it down." She may be back before movie cameras at Columbia in January.

"I'm very excited. I haven't been on the stage since I came to Hollywood," she added.

In her revue Betty will show she'll still be the song-and-dance queen. Most stars, she said, "go on the stage in a strapless gown, sing and that's it." But she's rehearsing an elaborate routine of numbers from her hit movies.

"And I'm going to give 'em the short costume right off the bat," said the girl with the fabulous legs.

LONDON, Nov. 13 —UP—Princess Charles will have the finest party a Queen can give him Saturday on his fifth birthday, for he is saying good-bye forever to carefree little boyhood.

Presents were arriving at Buckingham Palace as preparations were made for a party for the sturdy little boy who one day will be King of England and an emperer.

"I want it to be a really happy birthday for Charles," Queen Elizabeth II, his mother, said when she was planning the birthday celebration.

Begins To Realize Difference
Charles already is beginning to realize he is different from other little boys. And now that he will be five, his education will begin in earnest. It will not end until he is a man and king.

The Queen has loaded her movie camera to take pictures of Charles' birthday, and the Duke of Edinburgh plans to try to catch the childish chatter on his new tape recorder. They will be able later to see and hear the scenes thousands of miles away when they leave on their eight-month Royal tour, the week after next.

Tradition governs all Royal birthdays, even when a prince is only five.

Gets Presents at Nine
Princess Anne will toddle into her brothers' bedroom next door as soon as she wakes to wish him "Happy Birthday." But no presents then. Both must sit down and eat breakfast as usual.

Promptly at nine, Prince Charles can go to the Queen's sitting room and get his presents.

"Granny," Queen Mother Elizabeth, has sent him a clock work fire-engine, and "Margo," Princess Margaret, is sending a new set of records. He loves to sing "John Brown's Body" at the top of his voice while in his evening bath.

To Get Toy Soldiers
He will get model soldiers, for a king must know all about the Army and the Navy and the Air Forces. Already he salutes as he watches the changing of the guard by the scarlet-coated guardsmen in the palace forecourt and cries "Not with both hands, silly!" to Princess Anne when she does not do it rightly.

The guards, in fact, will play "Happy Birthday" and "Oranges and Lemons" especially for Charles Saturday morning. Afterward, he will be asked what he would like to do on his birthday.

Charles will probably choose first a ride on his new pony, William. He'll probably choose a television session in the Queen's sitting room where TV is watched by candle light. It is only an occasional treat for the children, who are allowed even then to watch only the British Broadcasting Corp's Children's hour.

And then at four o'clock will come the finest birthday party the Queen could organize.



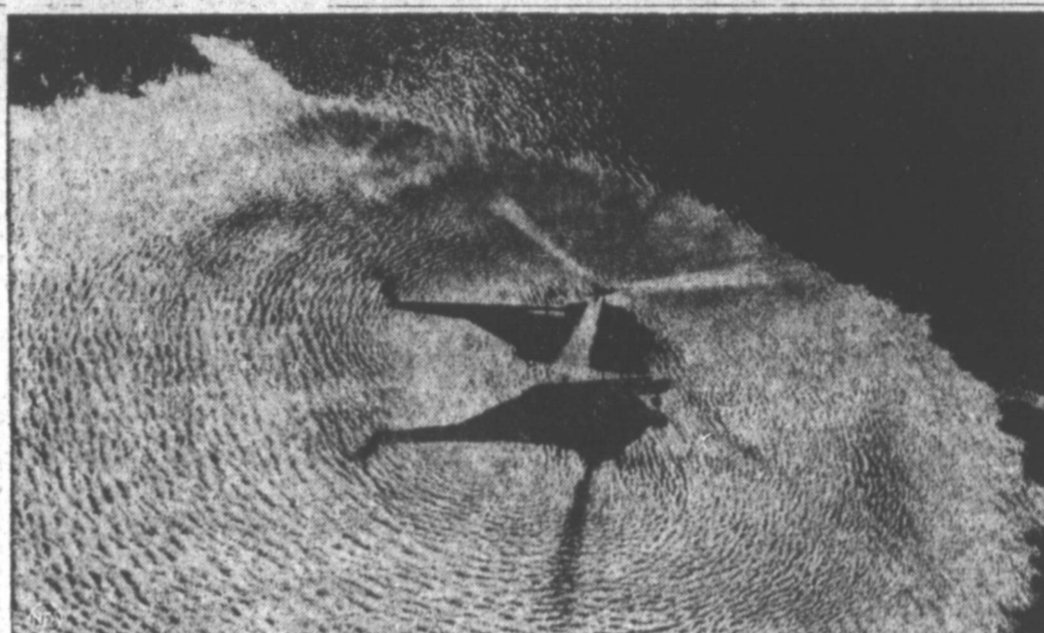

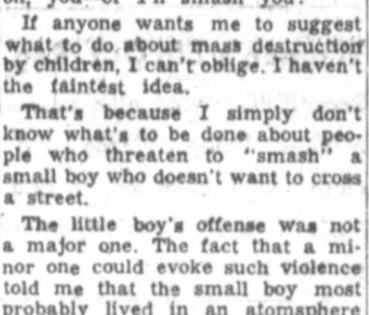

News In Balance

By PHIL NEWSOM
United Press Foreign Analyst
 The week's balance sheet between the good and bad news in the hot and cold wars:

THE GOOD

1. Energetic, former Defense Minister Ramon Magsaysay won the Philippines presidential election, the second in the islands' brief history as a free nation. The cheering news was not so much Magsaysay's victory as the fact that, despite predictions of coercion of the voters and violence, the election and the counting of the ballots were carried out in reasonable peace and good order.
2. President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and France's Premier Joseph Laniel announced they would meet in Bermuda the first week in December. Out of the meeting should come agreement on the line to be followed as regards Russia, and such related issues as the long-stalled European Army plan, the Austrian and German peace treaties, Korea and the war in Indochina. A meeting of minds especially was made necessary by Russia's apparent resumption of a "hard" policy toward the West, and the split between the United States and Britain on the good or evil that might come out of a four-power meeting with Russia.
3. At Panmunjom the Communists continued to take a bad propaganda licking from anti-Communist United States and Britain on the good or evil that might come out of a four-power meeting with Russia.

THE BAD

1. Seventy-three-year-old King Ibn Saud of Saudi Arabia died and his son, Emir Saud, became head of the oil-rich desert kingdom which extends from the Persian Gulf to the Red Sea. Ibn Saud, called the greatest Arab since Mohammed, had been the West's staunchest friend among the Arab nations. His son also is friendly to the West, but the oil pool beneath Saudi Arabia is one of the world's greatest and is a prime target of Communist conquest. It remains to be seen whether the son is as strong as the father.
2. The Communists, too, were looking for trouble in neighboring Iran which also is oil-rich. In Tehran they seized upon the treason trial of ousted Premier Mohammed Mossadegh for new demonstrations against the government and incitement to revolt. Mossadegh had accepted Communist help in his fight to oust the Shah.
3. The Trieste situation is especially embarrassing to the Western Allies because it is in their own backyard. Last weekend six persons were killed and scores injured among Italians demonstrating for Trieste's return to Italy. Italy blamed allied-controlled police for the killings and heated words were exchanged between Italy and Britain—two nominal allies. The demonstrations did not help to settle the dispute which now seems headed toward continued stalemate or, if the Allies are successful, toward a five-power meeting among the United States, France and Britain, and the two antagonists, Italy and Yugoslavia.
