



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## Free World Trade

There have been but two periods of peace which endured any impressive length of time: the Pax Romana, and the Pax Britannica. The Roman Peace and the British Peace lasted as long as they ended for the same

Both the Roman and the British Empires were built by trade. Leftist history has taught the idea that empires are built by force of arms and that imperialism means domination of others by arms. This was not true of the Roman and British Empires, though the fact will come as news to those who studied history recently in government schools.

Both great empires maintained extremely small armies at the high water mark of their power. Rome used no more than 100,000 soldiers with which to patrol the

Nations petitioned for membership in the Roman Empire, for they found they had more freedom under Roman law (at first). And if they belonged, Rome would protect them from their enemies.

In the end all the civilized nations preferred to be a part of Rome, and it was considered a great honor throughout the civilized world to obtain Roman citizen-

Rome fell when the bureaucrats began to choke off trade. Instead of resisting, the members of the Roman family of nations felt that it was better to live under Roman bureaucratic tyranny than to secede. They put 'security" above freedom. This submission added fuel to the bureaucrats' ambition.

In both England and Rome the end of freedom of trade marked the end of the respective empires.

Our solution to the problem of war is not the United Nations, nor any kind of world government with a police force. Our solution is free trade. We cannot claim this solution as being original with us, however

The West is agreed that Japan committed an immoral act by aggressing upon her neighbors.

But no economist will deny that Japan was forced to seek a market for her goods when the Western nations put up tariffs which denied our consumers the righ to take advantage of cheap Japanese products.

We built a wall around Japan and called the Japanese beasts for their brutal methods of attempting to crash through the wall of our making.

The only solution is: let us tear down the walls our-

Never mind what other nations do. Our great industries can survive competition, foreign or domestic, for

it was competition that made them great. The foremost organization of economists in the United States, The Foundation for Economic Education, published a pamphlet by W. M. Curtis called "The Tariff ldea," which pretty well sums up our idea that free

trade is the solution to the problem of war: ". . . free trade between individuals of different nations contributes to the friendship and good feelings which are conducive to peace.

"Trade restrictions, on the other hand, lead to hatred, conniving, jealousy — incidents which in turn may lead to conflict . . . The elimination of trade barriers between European nations and the restoration of trade opportunities to individuals and firms would go further toward

bringing about a peaceful Europe than anything else." The United Nations, peace talks, or World Governments won't bring peace. To the extent that they advocate controlled economies (and they all do) they will pro-

Free trade is the solution for war as well as the only guarantee for prosperity.

## None So Blind

We are put in mind of the adage that there are none so blind as those who will not see.

Writing in a recent issue of The Saturday Review, President Benjamin F. Wright of Smith College takes a polite stand against teachers who refuse to answer Congressional inquiries on the grounds of self-incrimination. But, he concludes:

"Tho the justification of the investigation of Communism in schools and colleges almost certainly came to an end some years ago, if it ever existed . . .

Either President Wright is incredibly naive or we have been getting the wrong dope from some recent graduates of the Ivy League universities in Mr. Wright's own baskyard.




