Texas Dope Ring Broken

HOUSTON, April 9 —UP—Moving in the dead of night, state and local officers early Friday began a roundup of known narcotics sellers and believed the arrest of 46 persons "broke the back" of Houston's dope traffic.

It was one of the biggest narcotics operations in the state's history.

Among those under arrest were four picked up in San Antonio, Galveston' and Richmond where they had gone.

Charges of selling narcotics were filed against 31 of the 46 in custody plus 13 who have not yet been taken into custody.

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





I believe we pray for the same reason that we open a window to let air into a stuffy room. In a purely physical sense we grow sick and finally die unless the air around us is renewed. Perhaps, in a spiritual way, that is what turns our whole world sick. The life that is within us, life that is not a matter of lungs and heart-beats, needs a certain atmosphere of its own. There are never enough of them, and the spiritual atmosphere of our world is getting dangerously stale and thin.



Two of the top business leaders of the country agree that they disagree with those who foresee serious economic trouble ahead.

There is no depression in my vision," declared Harlow H. Curtice, president of General Motors, in a press conference in Son Francisco.

Almost simultaneously, S. Clark Beise, new president of Bank of America, said that next to 1953, the current year promises to be the best in American business history. Beise also pointed out that the present lag in business may very well be due to the fact that Easter is much later this year than usual.

Easter is traditionally the "springboard" for the upswing in business volume following the relative inactivity of the early part of the year, Beise declared.

Curtice, in spelling out his confidence, said that General Motors is employing 30,000 more people now than at this time a year ago. On the national scene, he stated, there are now about 60 million people holding jobs, which compares with a postwar peak of 61.5 million and 57 million at this time in 1950.

Two other factors which speak for themselves are the billion dollar expansion program which GM is undertaking and the sharply increased output of Cadillacs this year over last.

The End Result Of "Social Security"

Since so many people, and especially the administration, seem to believe in what is called "social security," and want to increase payments and force more people to come into it, I can think of nothing that would better promote an understanding that would permit better jobs than to have more people realize what "social security" is doing to them.

Paul Poirot, a member of the Foundation for Economic Education staff, has just written a small booklet which was published by the Foundation on the question of 'social security." There are some interesting things in it that I want to pass on to the readers of this

Mr. Poirot starts out by showing that 13,000 United Mine Workers beneficiaries of the Anthracite Health and Welfare Fund were advised early in 1954 that future pension and death benefits would be cut to half their former rate. He goes on to explain why, Under the heading of "A Lesson to Be Learned" he writes:

"From a national point of view, it might not seem important what happens to the Anthracite Health and Welfare Fund or to its relatively few beneficiaries. But that point of view does not diminish the force of the blow to certain individuals. Nor should it diminish the force of the lesson for every other person in the United States. Lack of current reverue to maintain the promised fate of benefits is the sort of disaster which is likely to befall the beneficiaries of any poorly funded pension plan, whether it be privately or publicly financed.

"Some advocates of broadened social security coverage may view the collapse of the anthracite fund as further evidence of the need to expand the federal program. But such a conclusion is unjustified. The failure of the security program for hard coal miners stands as a warning against any and every promise of security and independence which rests upon a questionable claim to the property or future productivity of other per-"Regardless of the current eco-

nomic outlook, there are no competitive industries in the United States today which have been guaranteed a prosperous future. No company, nor any industry, con-trols the buying whims of consumers or the forces of competition. The competitive economic arrangement allows individuals and even whole industries to fail-if and when capital, labor, and managerial resources are either pushed or pulled toward the more attractive employment opportunities which exist elsewhere. Unfortunately, there are no alternative employment opportunities for poorly funded pension rights Labor and management, and even invested capital to a certain extent, can move out of a failing business venout of anthracite mining operations. But the pension rights of retired hard coal miners are strictly dependent on the income from a declining industry. The inadequate pension fund is being depleted, with ittle chance of its being replenish-

"Of course, there is no certainty that invested capital can be salvaged from a declining business. A pension right, though fully funded by ownership equity in a business, is vulnerable if that business is losing its competitive position in the market. The market permits unsound investment of any fund, including savings accumulated in the name of a pension fund. Ownership equity, however, is a far safer form of old-age insurance than is simple faith in a mere


Security Through Private Property

"Investment of savings in productive private enterprise is the traditional method of achieving retirement security in the United State. Successive generations of farmers have worked to build ownership equity in land, buildings, equipment, and livestock, finally to retire in old age upon the income which younger farmers would offer for the rights to use that accumulated capital. Other persons have achieved old-age secur- what, ity through ownership of rental housing, business facilities, producor another, valuable because someone else has use for it. If the individual seeks help in arranging his personal security program, the managers of banks, insurance companies, trust funds, and other business enterprises stand ready to accept responsibility for the sound investment of savings entrusted to their care.

"It is true that ownership of property involves the risk of loss. The property may wear out, be destroyed, or otherwise lose its value, affording less security than the owner might have anticipated. erty. Such property enhances personal productivity, which helps to

satisfy human needs. "Possible gains from the use of more and better tools far outweigh the risks of possible loss of savings. Yet this leep-seated subconscious respect for property rights may be over-ridden at times by the highly humanitarian and emotional appeal of an illusion such as the social security idea. 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
