## GIMME SHELTER

Is city doing enough?

As an evidently sick black and white spotted puppy swaddled in a towel and carried in a shoe box was escorted through the door's of Pampa's Animal Control (PAC), saliva dropping from his mouth caused by Parvo, Animal Control Supervisor Sandy Burns said vaccinations are one of the most important keys to keeping a healthy animal society.

One of the other important keys is having an adequate shelter, which Burns says, Pampa does not.

Burns has worked with PAC since 1980, and the conditions of her workplace have evolved, but are still considerably substan-

dard. Burns and other employees have hand-built cages and tried to make needed repairs with time, but the answer to the problem is in building a new shelter, which will cost between one million and two million dollars, Burns said.

Since the Pampa community has become more aware of the conditions of the animal shelter, some funds, materials, and food has been donated to PAC and Fund 12, the fund established for erecting a new shelter. The amount in the fund has doubled since an article about the fund and shelter was published in The Pampa News in September, but it still is about 67 percent short of it's ultimate goal.

Shelter is city operation
Animal Control is a city funded operation. Their funds come from the same line as the Police Department, according to Burns. She said that she has not been informed of any plans to make changes to the shelter from the city.

Richard Morris, interim city manager, was not available for immediate comment on any plans the city may have for the shelter. Mayor Lonny Robbins said he had not been a part of any recent conversation involving the shelter, and could not comment on the 2009 city budget.

PAC has turned to other organizations, including the PEDC for help with a new shelter. Dwight Fiveash, director of the PEDC, explained that a detailed plan, including exact projections of how many animals will be serve, must be completed before a public

# Gunfire punctuates family argument

## Texas lawmakers to focus on transportation polites

AUSTIN (AP) — If anyone wondered whether Texas toll road rage had subsided or lawmakers' irritation at the Texas Department of Transportation had eased, those questions got answered a few days before Christmas: Not so much.

Denouncing the massive transportation agency as dysfunctional and out of control, a group of law-makers reviewing the department said it will be intensely debated in the legislative session that begins Jan. 13.

"This is a big agency that is a mess," said Rep. Carl Isett, a Lubbock Republican and one of the leaders of the Sunset Advisory Commission that periodically examines state agencies. He said it may take several legislative sessions to repair Texas transportation.

Though legislators agree there are problems, they don't always agree on how to fix them.

hearing can be conducted on the PEDC's involvement with the new shelter.

At this time, a rough concept has been turned into the PEDC, based off another shelter in San Marcos, which is not enough, Fiveash said. The concept for a new shelter includes improved space, glassed in cages, a spay and neuter clinic, and would allow for animals to be held longer time peribeing ods before processed.

"We fund projects like this because they improve the quality of life in Pampa," Fiveash said, potential explaining involvement of the PEDC in building a new shelter. An improved animal shelter would help set Pampa apart from other cities, ultimately making it more marketable according to Fiveash.

The current shelter is very limited on space, causing multiple animals to be cramped in one cage, and made from wood and metal, instead of steel which is ideal for drainage systems. The building is not handicapped accessible, lacks heat and air conditioning, and has leaky roofs which have caused wood to rot and fall apart.

Local people do what they can now

"One local business man has donated money to the fund, his time to rebuild structures, and even adopted a dog," Burns said explaining her appreciation for community help. The same man, who wished to stay anonymous, donated a heater which costs about \$250, which is used to keep dogs in the sick and quarantined area warm. None of the three buildings the animals are kept in are insulated, which creates extreme temperatures in the summer and the winter. Another local business has offered to draw up architectural plans for a new shelter, which Burns said could help the cost of a new shelter go from twomillion dollars, to one-mil-

Over the years served as supervisor, Burns has tried to hire contractors and construction companies to come work on the shelter, but with no success. "They won't work here," she said, discouraged. "It's too small of a job."

Burns said she and her staff are trying to make the best out of what they have.

"Per capita, we handle a lot of animals... Without animal control, we would live like a third world country. Animals would be everywhere and diseases would spread rapidly." PAC has a hard time disinfecting the current shelter and keeping it clean because of improper ventilation and drainage systems. The old, worn cement used as the floor for the shelter buildings also makes disinfecting nearly impossible.

"It would take all the bleach in the world to be able to clean the cracks and crevasses' in these floors," Burns said.

PAC also fights diseases and sickness when people do not inform them properly when they drop off a dog. "People dump sick dogs and don't tell us. They contaminate other dogs before we can even know what is happening. This shelter isn't designed to deal with bacterial well."

Pampa Animal Control processes 300-500 dogs every month and about 100 cats because they do not have the proper means to store the animals. Only five percent of animals that come into the shelter are adopted out. Burns said that many people think that the animal shelter is inhumane for euthanizing animals, but there are worse fates.

"Many people drop animals in the country, it's a fate worse than death." Animals left in the county usually starve to death, are eaten by coyotes or other animals, or freeze to death, Burns said. Sick animals are also frequently euthanized. "It is better for them to die this way, in peace and being in our arms than to suffer.'

The animal shelter is a reflection of the city, Burns said, because they are public servants and publicly funded. With the poor and inadequate conditions of the shelter, Burns said they are fighting a bad public image, which makes adoptions less likely, and reflects on Pampa directly

"What kind of image is (the shelter) saying about our community? Our public image should be nice, better than this," she said.





Lawmakers are still reeling from the 2007 legislative session and their public feuds with the late transportation commission chairman Ric Williamson, a friend of Republican Gov. Rick Perry, who appointed him to shepherd Perry's vision for Texas highway construction. New commission chair Deirdre Delisi, another longtime Perry associate, has been trying for months to ease tension between lawmakers and the agency.

"We've been working very hard to improve our communications and make what we do as an agency much more understandable to the public and the Legislature," Delisi said in a recent interview. "I think our efforts have been paying off."

But frustration continues over Perry's proposed Trans-Texas Corridor road network that threatens to overtake private farm land, and legislators keep bringing up the agency's \$1 billion bookkeeping mistake. They are calling for more transparency and accountability.

Perry will be watching the Legislature's actions closely. Road-building is a cornerstone of his administration and is certain to be an issue in his 2010 reelection bid. Potential primary opponent Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison also has said transportation should be one of the state's top priorities.

For years Perry has said the major north-south highway Interstate 35 and other Texas roads are so choked with traffic they can't handle the state's population growth and commerce.

His proposed Trans-Texas Corridor - envisioned as a huge set of highways, rail and utility lines crisscrossing the state has been under fire almost since its inception. lawmakers are Some pledging to try to abolish Perry's advisers acknowledge the corridor may not need to be as extensive as initially

planned. But they say the part of the corridor that will parallel I-35 is essential to alleviate traffic and that Interstate 69, proposed to run through East Texas and into South Texas; is an

important trade route. Delisi said since taking the helm at the transportation commission last April she has tried to work with legislators to figure out ways to leverage limited money to build and improve roads.

"We've got billions and billions and billions of dollars of state needs," she

In mid-December, a citizen's committee made up of Houston Astros owner Drayton McLane and other business leaders outlined for the commission \$313 billion in road and bridge needs between now and 2030. While some spoke about the astronomical dollar figure, Delisi asked, "What's the cost to the state of not doing it?"

Meanwhile, lawmakers on the sunset panel recommended in a narrow vote to do away with the existing five-person commission that oversees the transportation department and replace it with one commissioner named by the governor - much like the insurance commissioner operates. That transportation head would have to be reconfirmed by the state Senate every two years, and there would be more legislative oversight of the agency.

Isett and several senators disagreed with the onecommissioner structure, so dissent over the recommendation could erupt in the full Legislature. Isett argues that representation

"The commissioner's office is where the buck ought to stop," said Rep. Ruth Jones McClendon, a San Antonio Democrat, who wants to abolish the five-member transportation commission and replace it with an elected commissioner, similar to the role of the elected state agriculture commissioner. "The public pulse favors an elected commissioner."

Rep. Linda Harper-Brown, an Irving Republican who has been outspoken about problems at the agency, said she may work with McClendon on her proposal during the session.

Displaying some gallows humor over the legislative proposal to abolish the panel, commissioner Fred Underwood recently quipped that he feels like he's done more for the transportation department "than the Titanic did for the cruise business."

Delisi has not waded into the debate over how the agency should be governed and is putting her attention on funding.

Some quick turnaround projects have been identified and submitted to the federal government in hopes of getting economic stimulus package money.

For their part, Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick announced that they are united on three transportation fronts in the 2009 legislative session:

Ending the practice of diverting \$1.2 billion in gas taxes every two years to the Department of Public Safety and using the money instead for road construction;

Creating a transportation finance entity to encouraged Texas-based investment funds to put money into road projects;

- And passing legislation authorizing use of bonds approved by voters for road projects in 2007.







## arrests says he stopped violence

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) To some of the people who know him back home in Texas, Brandon Darby is a traitor.

In his own mind, he's proud of what he did feeding the FBI information that led to the arrests trying to disrupt the nity. Republican National Convention.

"I feel like, as an activist, I played a direct role in stopping violence," Darby, 32, said in an interview with the St. Paul Pioneer Press.

## More seat belts for **Dallas-area buses**

DALLAS (AP) — Seventy new large school buses equipped with lapshoulder seat belts similar to those in passenger cars ball, and we are picking are headed to Dallas County schools more than a year before a Texas law members voted to allocate involving school buses and seat belts goes into effect, school officials said.

"Common sense says we need to protect our kids every way possible, and that includes seat belts," said Larry Duncan, Dallas County Schools board president, in an online story Thursday for The Dallas Morning News. "I would like to see them all with seat belts overnight, but we can't get that done."

Dallas County Schools, which provides buses for the Dallas Independent School District and eight other school districts, expects to get the new large buses this month, officials said. Dallas County Schools already has installed shoulder-lap seat belts on two buses that serve DISD elementary schools in North buses, with their big, Dallas. And district officials said they hope belts will be in more buses in

the future. The district's decision to retrofit buses and pur- contends that more crash chase ones with seat belts comes more than a year ahead of the effective date shoulder seat belts would for a Texas law that will require school buses purchased after September 2010 to have seat belts. State legislators passed the law after two Beaumont students died when their school bus

overturned in 2006. But the law is contingent on the state providing money to districts to

install the seat belts, so the law may never take effect, Duncan said.

It's a start, Duncan said, but the district will need to spend far more in the future to provide seat belts for every student. Retrofitting a large 77passenger bus costs Dallas County Schools about \$10,000.

Despite the district's decision to have the seat belts, the debate remains about their benefits on buses.

A 2002 report by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration about shoulder-lap seat belts in school buses concluded that "lap belts appear to have little, if any, benefit in reducing serious-to-fatal injuries in severe frontal crashes."

## Recording studio in hospital about more than music

HOUSTON (AP) - Just down the hall from the chemo infusion rooms at Texas Children's Hospital, Jalen Huckabay was about to slip into another world, away from the wearying regimen of pokes, prods and pinches she'd endured since being diagnosed with lymphoma in November.

For the next few hours, the curly-haired, cherubfaced 16-year-old would become a songwriter.

Purple Songs Can Fly, a one-of-a-kind program at one of the country's largest pediatric cancer care facilities, gives patients a chance to record their own songs in a fully equipped recording studio at the hospital.

More than 116 songs have been recorded since Purple Songs began in March 2006 as part of the cancer center's Arts in Medicine program. Some of the recordings have been featured on audio tracks aboard Continental Airlines flights, and flown into space aboard the space shuttle.

Yet Jalen hesitated and hawed when her oncologist asked if she wanted to write and record a song. She wasn't sure what to expect. She is normally reserved, prone to one-word answers and prefers to stick close to her mother. She doesn't like singing in front of other people.

But she can talk for hours about Jasmine, the pint-size Yorkshire terrier she got as a Christmas present last year. The puppy she calls MYD. My Yippin' Dog.

Purple Songs founder Anita Kruse immediately knew that Jalen's words contained the kernels of a song, and that behind the girl's shy exterior, a creative spirit lurked.

"There's a point where the kids realize they are not thinking about anything else. It's just about being in that creative place," said Kruse, a Houston-based singer-songwriter raised \$10,000 to start Purple Songs, which is funded through donations. Seeing someone through something really difficult let that go, even if it's just for the moment, it's beautiful."

It had been an especially rough week for Jalen, who is no stranger to rough weeks. A few days earlier, a good friend and fellow transplant patient had died. Then, the day before Jalen's first double chemo session, her grandfather had open-heart surgery.

A rough week, coming at the end of a rough year.

In March, Jalen's doctor told her parents she would die within two months without a lung transplant. Her own lungs, weakened by cystic fibrosis, could no longer sustain her. It would be the second transplant for Jalen, who received a new liver four years ago.

"We just prayed that those lungs came quick," said Karen Huckabay, Jalen's mother.

A few months later, an infection sent Jalen back to Texas Children's - she needed 17 operations over 11 weeks. In November, doctors detected a type of lymphoma that can occur in transplant recipients. They found post-transplant lymphoma in her tonsils and put Jalen on six-month course of chemotherapy.

For all but four weeks of 2008, Jalen and her mother have lived in an apartment near the hospital, 400 miles from home in Albany, Texas. Far from Jalen's father, her younger sister,

## **Artist brings**

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — Randall "Ran" Horn knew his time in Van Horn had run its course.

The artist says his Van Gogh Gallery was so cluttered it looked more like a junk store than an art gallery.

"I wanted to get back to the art," Horn said. An elected leader of the city of 2,400 was causing Horn, 56, "misery" because of the painter's strong views against President George W. Bush, Horn said. And then there were the walks in the desert, where Horn collected thousands of arrowheads. While he enjoyed the walks, there was one problem.

"I was spending so much of my time doing it," he said. "That's partly why I've stayed skinny.

So Horn decided to return home. He grew up in Odessa, where he graduated from Permian High. Fromthere he headed to Henderson, in East Texas, where he studied at a seminary. He went on to become a Baptist minister in Dallas and Southwestern Oklahoma. But, ultimately, Horn decided that the clergy wasn't for him. Now he doesn't even go to church.

"I feel like when I attend church, I'm actually disobeying (God)," he said, "Do nothing for show."

Vincent Van Horn

Horn had always loved art. He picked up some painting tricks by watching the late Bob Ross on public television.

One day while living in Minnesota, Horn saw a gallery of reproductions of Vincent Van Gogh's masterpieces in the Mall of America. He was hooked.

"I can see what he did in 10 years," Horn said. "It amazes me what he did with the things going on in his

So Horn began using his artwork to pay tribute to Van Gogh. Some of his works are direct reproductions of Van

Gogh paintings; others try to show what Van Gogh might do in West Texas.

Others, like "Vincent's Parlor" and "Vincent's Gallery," incorporate up to 25 elements from Van Gogh paintings. Horn said he wouldn't sell those two works for less than \$50,000.

"I let him be my teacher," Horn said of Van Gogh. "I'm not him. I don't claim to be."

Other paintings in Horn's gallery are available for much less, with prices for prints starting at \$15. Horn's love of Van Gogh eventually led him to open his gallery in Van Horn. He chose the town, located 170 miles west of Odessa and 120 miles east of El Paso, because it draws traffic from Interstates 10 and 20, and then there was the name.

"I'm Ran Horn from Van Horn," he said. "It makes it easy for people."

The gallery in the remote city brought Horn notoriety everywhere from the Los Angeles Times to Texas Monthly to Texas Country Reporter. He also had wellknown customers.

Horn said Dwight Yoakam bought four paintings while in town for the filming of the 2005 film "The Three Burials of Melquiades Estrada." George Rodrigue, the artist of the "Blue Dog" paintings, has a couple of Horn's works in his home.

And Texas Tech football coach Mike Leach drove 300 miles from Lubbock to commission Horn to do a Van Goghish likeness of the eccentric coach.

Leach said he first heard of Horn's work on, "some kind of show Texas Highways' or something or other where they show the biggest ball of yarn."

It made him want to make the trip to Horn's gallery. "I bought a couple of 'em, and it was really interesting to go down to his store and check out his stuff," Leach

Horn presented Leach with the finished product, which immortalizes the coach wearing a straw hat, at a practice last spring — about two years after first talking to the coach about it. Horn remembers standing next to Red Raiders quarterback Graham Harrell and receiver Michael Crabtree, who finished fourth and fifth in Heisman Trophy voting, respectively, in 2008. "That was a hoot," Horn said.

Now, the painting is a "conversation piece" for those

who come into the football offices. Leach said it even helps out in recruiting players to Texas Tech.

Leach said he had one disappointment, that Horn didn't cut his ear off — similar to Van Gogh's "Self Portrait with Bandaged Ear." Horn said he's working on that one. But he's already

got another piece ready for Leach — this one a painting of Van Gogh with black eyes. "This must be how it feels after a UT or OU dustup,"

Leach said Horn could have a future doing sportsrelated work in a Van Gogh style. He sees it lending itself to athletic themes, in a way similar to LeRoy

But, while Leach made a special trip, most of his customers were just traveling through Van Horn. Horn said he didn't see much repeat business.

Marfa, the artists' haven located about an hour down Highway 90, it ain't.

Time to go

Horn said he thought of moving his gallery to artheavy Taos, N.M. But ultimately he decided on Odessa, somewhere that's less-than-fully exposed to culture.

"I got to looking — 100,000 people in this town, and I didn't see a gallery," he said. Plus he could save money by staying with his mother.

That sort of cuts me some slack there," Horn said. Horn is still working to get his gallery open. He hopes to have the new store, located in the Sherwood Village Center at 621 E. 42nd St., open in January. But he's not rushing it.

Since art hasn't made him rich, Horn's taken a second job working 12-hour shifts as a corrections officer at the Reeves County Detention Center in Pecos, even though he doesn't believe in prisons. Horn was in town but hadn't started his shift when a riot broke out Dec. 12. So he watched the events unfold from a rooftop.

"I wish I had my camera with me," Horn said. "I had some ideas for paintings."

Though the store isn't officially open, Horn has many paintings on display. And not all of them are Van Gogh related. He said his work is also inspired by the likes of Rembrandt, Franz Kafka and Leo Tolstoy.

There's the eight-foot-by-one-foot painting of Guadalupe Peak — an example of the "panoramic" style Horn now favors.

There is a sarcastic jab at Thomas Kincaid, using the heavily commercialized artist's face as a "pretty little house.

Horn has another painting that pays tribute to two other artists who influenced him, the self-explanatory "Picasso shoots Norman Rockwell." And then there is "Bush fiddled," which compares the president, wearing an olive leaf crown and toga, to the Roman emperor Nero. Bush plays the violin with Sept. 11 images of the World Trade Center and the Pentagon burning in the

Horn said it's not meant to specifically target Bush; it was just something he wanted to get off his chest. "He is a metaphor for all of us," Horn said. "We were

But going against the grain in "Bush Country" would-

n't be unusual for Horn. He said he's never been into talking about what shows he's done or awards he's won. "I consider myself an outsider artist," Horn said. "I'm not going to do things the traditional way." "I'm not a person that's into fashion," he said.

The gallery also includes items Horn has collected, from boxes of rocks and arrowheads, which he says were all carved by American Indians, to cases of old soda bottles.

Thinking of others

Part of the reason Horn is opening the gallery is to allow other area artists to show there. Unlike galleries that charge artists commissions, Horn said he'll let those who display with him keep the full amount of their

Ultimately, he'd like to have 50 artists displaying in the gallery on walls set up within the store. He said the works don't need to be anything like his art - he welcomes everything from Southwestern art to sculptures. "I want this to be a place where there's no telling what you're going to see," Horn said. So far, two artists have taken Horn up on his offer.

Glenn Lackey, who works largely in oil paintings, is among them.

"I think it's about time to have a place like that in Odessa to show your art," Lackey said. "There are a lot of artists in Odessa who would love a place like that." Lackey said he's grown tired of local museums requiring him to show a "resume" of the galleries he's shown his work. "I think Ran's got the right idea," he said, recalling the

first time he saw Horn's gallery going up.

"I was delighted," Lackey said. "I just saw the building and saw the word art,' and I made a detour to check it out."

Horn said he's back in Odessa for the "long haul," even if the economy is down.

"This might not be a good time to be starting a gallery," he said. "But I'm not looking at it as a way to

make money. It's a labor of love." But he can count on one customer. "I'll definitely peek in there," Leach said. "He's a very interesting guy with an interesting background. I enjoy

his friendship. In some ways, Horn still feels like he's calling folks to

the congregation. "I still consider myself a preacher," he said. "I just do it though my art and just talking to people."



## **Antiques Roadshow's**

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP), It's sort of like sending your attic and yard sale finds to Cinderella's ball.

009 pm

The 13th season of "Antiques Roadshow" starts airing this month on PBS, once again giving everyday people the chance to learn if a particular possession is treasure or trash. But the filming for the folksy treasure hunt happened months ago.

When the reality TV program stopped in Chattanooga, hundreds of ticket holders were waiting at 6 a.m. on a Saturday in July, some with children's wagons and dollies carrying the two items ,Aî newly dusted antiques, heirlooms or collectibles, they are allowed to bring for appraisals.

The main requirement: Items to be appraised must fit through a standard door.

The sun rose with dozens of the randomly selected ticket-holders in line outside the downtown convention center, rehearsing over and over, "Welcome to 'Antiques Roadshow'!" and after repeated prompts by the production crew to say it louder for the TV microphones, repetitive screams of "Welcome to Chattanooga!"

That frenzy of appraisals will be shown the few shows that brings out every walk-

three straight weeks , Aî March 30, April 6 and April 13, Aî as PBS' highest rated and six-time Emmy nominated series starts its new season Monday at 8 p.m. EST. There are 20 episodes, including a 2008 lineup of stops with host Mark L. Walberg and a cast of thousands that includes collectors from Chattanooga and five other U.S. cities: Palm Springs, Calif.; Dallas; Wichita, Kan.; Grand Rapids, Mich. and Hartford, Conn.

The Hartford stop will be shown on three episodes in May.

One of the more than 70 appraisers, Shiloh Civil War Relics owner Rafael Eledge of Savannah, Tenn., said between meetings with collectors in Chattanooga that "Antiques Roadshow" is the best gig, there is in the antique trade.

When you make it to this stage and you have your name go across the bottom of the screen with that little 'Antiques Roadshow' chest, that's the pinnacle of what you could hope for in our business," Eledge said.

He said the real reason for the show's success is the makeup of the 3,400 recipients of the two free tickets. "If you noticed the line, this is one of of life," Eledge said. "You'll have somebody in a three-piece suit, you have somebody with a Dale Junior shirt and the next person will have a nose ring and chains hanging off of them. There is no other show that can do that.'

Seventy-six-year-old Barbara Barker of Chattanooga coursed slowly through the crowded convention center pulling an antique children's wagon. Her cargo of mask face Santas and a straw-page book, a publication from about 1915 she found in an attic box at an estate sale, Aî did not get her on television. But an appraiser said the book would probably sell in the \$800 to \$1,200 range to a "very specialist collector."

Barker handled the book as if it was

"This is written on straw and at that time rags were popular," she said. "You see how well preserved?"

Barker said just attending the show was

"I have collected since I was in high school," she said.

Also in Chattanooga, one top-dollar collectible picked for appraisal was Creig Moore's French Louis XV-style clock from around 1850. It appraised for \$20,000 to \$25,000.

Moore, who owns Sagetown Collectors Gallery in Scottsboro, Ala., said he was shocked that the appraisal was twice what he thought was the value.

A longtime collector and antique dealer, Moore said he had bought the brass with gold overlay clock about six months earlier from a buddy in Birmingham, without even knowing if it works.

"I had gone to his house and saw it in his garage in a huge basket," Moore said. "He said, 'That's an old clock I picked up in New Orleans about 10 years ago...I'll sell it to you."

Moore, 45, said the clock "ran perfectly" when he got it home and he thought it was worth about \$10,000.

"Once they looked at the clock, they didn't tell me anything about it except to ask if they could put it on the show," Moore said

Moore said the appraiser told him it was the "best made clock of that era he

had ever seen."

He is still trying to sell it. Moore watches the program regularly and is looking forward to the airing of the Chattanooga shows, which is the first time he'll know if he made the final cut.





# New ignition lock laws aim to foil drunk drivers

CHICAGO (AP) — Motorists convicted of driving drunk will have to install breath-monitoring gadgets in their cars under new laws taking effect in six states this week.

The ignition interlocks prevent engines from starting until drivers blow into the alcohol detectors to prove they're sober.

Alaska, Colorado, Illinois, Nebraska and Washington state began Jan. 1 requiring the devices for all motorists convicted of first-time drunken driving. South Carolina began requiring them for repeat offenders.

Mothers Against Drunk Driving has been conducting a nationwide campaign, to mandate ignition locks for anyone convicted of drunken driving, claiming doing so would save thousands of lives. But critics say interlocks could lead to measures that restrict alcohol policies too much.

Users must pay for the fist-sized devices, which in Illinois cost around \$80 to install on dashboards and \$80 a month to rent; there's also a \$30 monthly state fee. And they require periodic retesting while the car is running.

"It's amazingly inconvenient," said David Malham, of the Illinois chapter of MADD. "But the flip side of the inconvenience is death."

Other states with similar laws include New Mexico, Arizona and Louisiana. Most other states give judges the option of forcing convicted drunk drivers to use the devices. In practice though, they are rarely ordered unless laws mandate them, according to MADD.

Until now, that's been true in Illinois, said MADD national CEO Chuck Hurley.

"Illinois has excellent law enforcement," he said. "But the judicial system leaks like a sieve. This law will change the catch and release system to one where people are at least caught and tagged."

In Illinois, the interlocks are mandated only for the five to 11 months licenses are suspended with a first DUI. Drivers can opt not to install them, but then would be banned from driving during the suspension period.

Motorists in Colorado get a similar choice — install the devices or get a longer suspension.

The law taking effect in Washington state actually relaxes penalties on drunk drivers, allowing them to avoid a previously mandatory license suspension by getting an interlock. The bill's author, Rep. Roger Goodman, said too many motorists were driving with suspended licenses.

Motorists could try to skirt the devices by, say, having someone else blow into the detector or driving someone else's car. But if caught trying to circumvent the interlocks, they could go to jail.

Within a year, up to 30,000 first-time offenders in Illinois could be using them, state officials estimate.

New Mexico was the first state to mandate the devices in 2005. Since then, according to MADD, that state has seen its drunk-driving deaths fall 20 percent.

Hurley said other states

could see the same percentage decline within a few years.

DUI deaths nationally have plummeted to around 15,000 from around 30,000 annually in the rly 1980s.

Malham, who supports the technology, said in the future even more advanced technology will enable cars to effectively sniff car cabins, scan faces and eyes of drivers or even test sweat on steering wheels to assess sobriety before engines start.

Not everyone is as enthusiastic.

One of the staunchest critics of interlock laws for first-time offenders is the Washington-based American Beverage Institute, a trade association representing restaurants and retailers.

ABI managing director Sarah Longwell said the group backs interlock laws targeting repeat offenders and those arrested with high blood-alcohol levels.

But she said laws advocated by MADD don't allow judges to distinguish between those who have a few drinks and go just over the 0.08 blood-alcohol legal limit and those who go way over.

"We want sensible alcohol policies," she said.
"We want 10 people to be able to come in and have one drink and not one person to come in and have 10."

She said current interlock laws could lead to more draconian measures.

"We foresee is a country in which you're no longer able to have a glass of wine, drink a beer at a ball game or enjoy a champagne toast at a wedding," she said. "There will be a de facto zero tolerance policy imposed on people by their cars."

Proponents of interlock laws say studies back their approach. They cite a 2008 study by the Pacific Institute for Research and Evaluation that found An undated photo provided by Irving, Texas-based Smart Start, Inc.

interlock devices in New Mexico helped decrease repeat offenses by approximately two-thirds.

MADD also points to figures showing one-third of all drunk drivers have a prior DUI conviction.

The American Beverage Institute questions studies cited by advocates, saying they other factors, like education programs, also account for the declines.

"But perfection can't be the enemy of the good, to quote (18th century philosopher) Voltaire," he said. "I'd like to see more teeth in the law in the future. But this is a start."
