Child pulled from City Lake

Pampa fire and police personnel responded to a tragic drowning call Friday evening in Recreation Park on the city's east side.

Upon their arrival firefighters were advised by Pampa Police personnel that a three year old child had been in the water approximately 10 minutes. Firefighters visualized an object floating in the west end of the lake.

Pampa Police Officers, Pampa Firefighters as well as a family member of the young child had attempted to swim out to rescue the child but due to extremely cold water temperatures were unsuccessful.

Police Officers immediately went for a boat while firefighters attempted a rescue using a backboard and a rescue rope.

One firefighter then swam out to the child utilizing the backboard as a floatation device and a rope was tied to the firefighter as a safety line.

Guthrie exhibit opens at Panhandle Plains

CANYON — Woody Guthrie's connection to Pampa and the Texas Panhandle is on display at the Panhandle Plains Museum today.

The exhibit on the legendary American folk singer opened over the weekend with a reception Friday night (February 6).

Amy David, a spokes person for the museum, said the exhibit would run through the end of July.

July is the month of the Woody Guthrie celebration in Okemah, Okla., Guthrie's birthplace in 1912.

The Woody Guthrie celebration in Pampa, normally held the first weekend in October near the anniversary of his death in 1967, will be moved to July to coincide with the Okemah celebration and the museum exhibit.

Thelma Bray with the Woody Guthrie Folk Music Center in Pampa said they always have a surge of visitors in July of people either on their way to or coming back from the Okemah celebration so the change seemed logical.

In addition to the exhibit, David said the museum is planning a symposium on Woody Guthrie beginning April 17.

Nora Lee Guthrie, Woody's daughter (Arlo Guthrie's sister), will speak about her father Friday night, David said.

Jimmy LaFave and his band and Joe Raphael will perform at the museum Saturday afternoon, and Nora Guthrie will speak again Saturday night. Josh Paulson of Pampa and other local musicians will perform Sunday afternoon at the museum.

Nora Guthrie will give another program on Monday, David said. Anna Canoni, Nora Guthrie's daughter, will give programs in Canyon schools Friday and Monday.

Nora Guthrie heads up the Woody Guthrie Foundation in New York. "The foundation has been so helpful," David said of the exhibit.

She said that Canoni, who works for the family foundation, was instrumental in getting images of Woody and his drawings and paintings for the exhibit at the Panhandle Plains Museum.

Pickens' Mesa Water taking case to Legislature

Mesa Water executives are taking their case to the Texas Legislature, while an Amarillo attorney, who has in the past represented Mesa interests, indicated that the court might be the place to settle the case on constitutional grounds.

Mesa Water, Inc., was founded almost a decade ago by Dallas businessman and Texas Panhandle rancher T. Boone Pickens in an effort, he said, to protect the water beneath his Roberts County ranch.

When the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority and the City of Amarillo began buying up water rights near his ranch in rural Roberts County, Pickens formed Mesa Water with the expressed intent of pumping groundwater from the Texas Panhandle to cities downstate that were then troubled by drought.

Under the legal doctrine known as the rule of capture, Pickens said CRMWA and Amarillo could suck all the water from beneath his ranch. His only recourse to realize the value of his water was to pump it and sell it.

Pickens partnered with neighboring ranchers to put together about 225,000 acres of water rights in the four counties of the north-eastern panhandle.

Amarillo gathered more than 70,000 acres of water rights, but the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority put together more than 300,000 acres.

Mesa has not yet sold any of its water, but late last year CRMWA officials indicated that they were negotiating through third parties for some 173,000 acres of Mesa's water rights in Roberts and neighboring Ochiltree, Lipscomb and Hemphill Counties.

Sources familiar with Mesa's operations report that the company is also negotiating with water groups in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex and San Antonio.

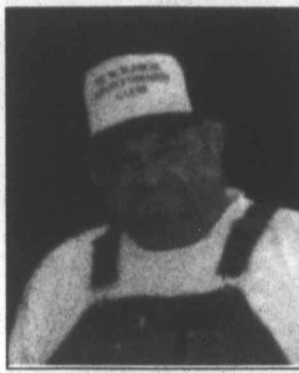
Alvie Gifford, 82

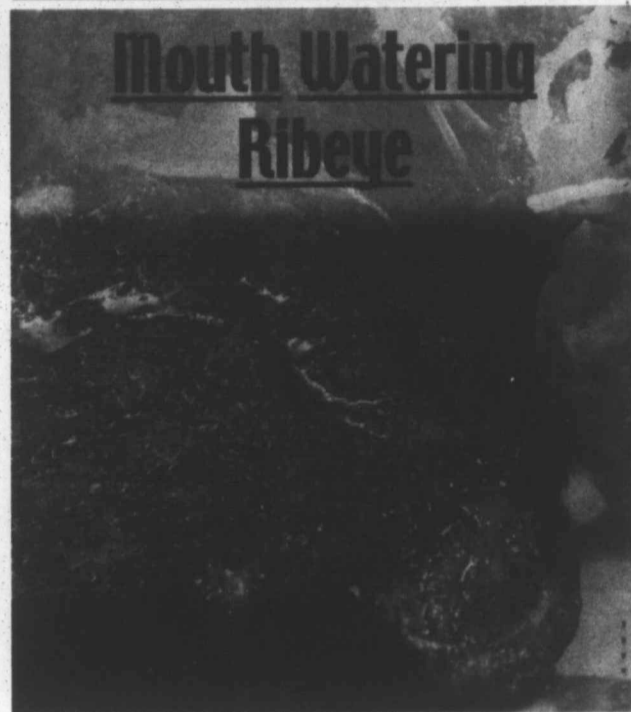

Water rights issue taken to lawmakers

appears to be not with the water, but with how much of it can be pumped under the regulations of different groundwater districts.

The water rights in Roberts County lie in the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District. The water rights in Ochiltree and Lipscomb Counties are in the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District. The water rights in Hemphill County are in the Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District.

These groundwater districts form three-fourths of the membership of Groundwater Management Area 1. The fourth member is the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, which is not directly involved in the Mesa controversy.

GMA1 is in the process of determining the desired future condition of

Ogallala Aquifer that supplies most of the groundwater for the panhandle.

In December, the members of GMA1 voted on a desired future condition proposal that would allow 40 percent of the water in the aquifer to remain in storage at the end of a 50 years period in the western counties of the North Plains district, 50 percent of the water to remain in storage in the eastern counties of the North Plains district, 50 percent in storage in the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, 50 percent in storage in the High Plains district that is in GMA1, and 90 percent of the water would remain in storage in the Hemphill County district.

This proposal was sent back with representatives of each water district for comments by the board of the individual districts.

Robert Stillwell, general counsel for Mesa Water, promptly fired off a

letter to James Herring of Amarillo, chairman of the Texas Water Development Board, Kip Averitt, chairman of the Texas Senate's Natural Resources Committee and Mike Hamilton, chairman of the Texas House Natural Resource Committee, complaining that the differing desired future conditions by each water district side-steps the joint planning process mandated by the Texas Legislature in the creation of the Groundwater Management Areas.

Mesa is calling for the legislature to provide better direction for Groundwater Management Areas and base the desired future conditions on aquifer subdivisions rather than political subdivisions, such as counties.

Stillwell pointed out that with different proposed desired future conditions among the water districts, and even two different conditions in one of

the districts, the North Plains district, it would be difficult, if not impossible for Mesa to realize value from all the water rights it holds.

"About 15,000 acres of water rights are situated in Hemphill County and have been rendered basically worthless by the Hemphill district," Stillwell said in his letter.

While Mesa is approaching the problem with legislative solutions, Amarillo attorney Marvin "Marty" Jones is looking to the courts.

The Texas Constitution provides for equal protection and equal rights, Jones said. It said that no one will be deprived of property except by due process of law, similar to the due process clause of the U.S. Constitution.

"That means that water districts cannot differentiate between who own rights in the same aquifer," Jones said.

child, personnel from Pampa Police Department, Guardian EMS, Pampa Fire Department and the Texas Game Warden's office pulled the firefighter and the child to the north shore of City Lake.

The child was then treated by Guardian EMS and Pampa Firefighters. LifeStar helicopter was launched and a landing zone was established at Recreation Park.

Details of the cause of the incident are still under investigation by Pampa Police Department. The condition of the small child was not available.

Groundwater management board to meet February 20

AMARILLO -- The desired future condition of the Ogallala Aquifer will be the primary focus of the Groundwater Management Area No. 1 board when they meet here this month.

The board consists of members of the four groundwater districts in the panhandle — the North Plains Conservation District, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District and the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District of which Pampa is a part.

The 16 groundwater management areas across the state are under a mandate to provide the Texas Water Development Board with what the areas consider to be their desired future condition of aquifers in their areas for joint water planning purposes by

September, 2010.

At their Dec. 15 meeting, GMA members were split on those conditions.

The adopted proposed conditions to be sent back to the member districts for discussion. That proposal would set 40 percent of the water in storage in the aquifer at the end of 50 years for the western part of the North Plains district and 50 percent for the eastern half of the district. Hemphill County would set a 90 percent storage rate at the end of 50 years, while Panhandle and High Plains district would have a 50 percent of the water in storage at the end of 50 years.

North Plains, High Plains and Hemphill County districts voted for the proposal. Panhandle Groundwater representatives voted against it, saying they would like to see a consensus on one desired future condition.

At this month's meeting, the board will see the results of groundwater availability models they requested from the Texas Water Development Board for both the Ogallala Aquifer, which provides most of the groundwater in the region, and for the Dockum Aquifer, which underlies several of the groundwater districts in the panhandle.

Also on the agenda is a letter that the general counsel for the Mesa Water Group, Robert Stillwell, wrote to state lawmakers and James Herring of Amarillo, the chairman of the Texas Water Development Board, complaining about the different desired future conditions in the different districts.

Mesa owns water rights in three of the districts and if they developed well fields for the export of water to thirsty cities down state as they have indicated

is their plan, they would face three differing sets of rules out of the same aquifer.

Groundwater Management Area No. 1's meeting will begin at 1:30 p.m., Friday Feb. 20, in the Ed Davis Conference Room on the ninth floor of the Chase Tower in Amarillo.

This barely raised an eyebrow on his mother. But later, the finger was a little swollen, so she decided if it was still stiff and swollen the next morning, she'd have it checked.

Nick was not really complaining. He is almost never without an abrasion and it really doesn't even phase him that much anymore.

Just that morning, Cody, 4, had been to the doctor to have the stitches removed from an ER visit exactly one week prior. That involved a dumpster diving incident where he obtained a not very long, but fairly deep cut on his arm.

Not long before that, Evan had been in with a lip he split when he decided that jumping off the roof onto their large trampoline seemed like a really good idea. He had crawled out of his window onto the roof and was bouncing a ball off the trampoline. That was so much fun, he decided to try it himself.

He and Nick have both broken arms before.

In our family—we have to learn the hard way.

I don't want to give the impression the children are unsupervised. They are all very quick and quite resourceful. Usually they wait to try these things while their mother is bathing. (she'll have to shower sometime...) And Cody's dumpster diving occurred when he was visiting his dad. Evan's broken arm was a sports injury and Nick broke his when, of course, he fell—off the jungle gym at school.

Their household does move at the speed of a Keystone Cops movie. (Sorry, if you're too young, Google it)

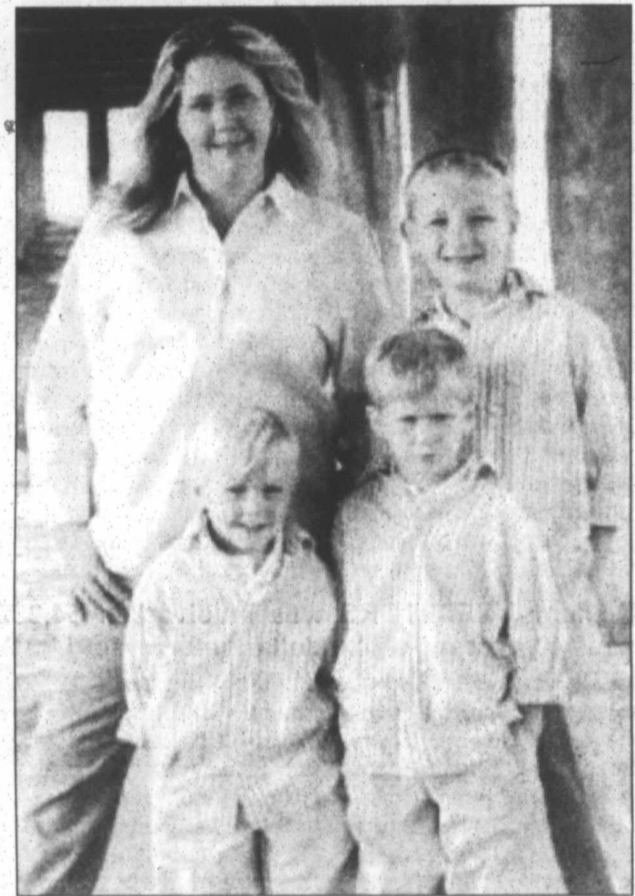
The next morning, on his way to school, Nick fell again. This time he said his finger "really hurt". This is unusual only because Nick can fall down just walking across the room and never complains. (His pediatrician assures us there is nothing wrong with him.) But combined with the scooter injury the night before, into the emergency room they went, where Derrick, the head ER doc greeted her by the desk. "Hi, Rachel, it must be Wednesday."

He took them to an exam room. "Nick, he asked "what happened today?"

"Actually," said Nick, who almost always begins his sentences with "actually" these days. "It was yesterday AND today."

"OK," said Derrick the doc, "tell me what happened." "Well," Nick said, "I went for a ride with my brother on his motor scooter (actually an electric razer type) and you know—it will go 15 miles an hour. Any way we were riding and he went off the curb and hit a trash can. But that wasn't the worst. Then He FELL on me. My finger was squashed like a bug! Then, this morning on the way to school, I fell in the rocks and—well, here I am with my hurt finger."

By this time the doctor and my daughter and nearby nurses are laughing so hard that Nick's not feeling any sympathy. "At least get the little guy a popsicle," the doctor gasped.

"OK," he said and hustled off by himself.

My daughter just looked at the doctor and said, "What's wrong with this picture? He's six—and he's going to get an x-ray by himself and doesn't mind!"

"Well he has been here a half-dozen times and he knows the tech," the doc said.

"Your kids are in here so much, you're making my payroll. I would call CPS, just to watch their reaction to Nick's stories, but you're too nice."

The finger is broken and Nick has another splint.

What's almost worse, when they went to have Cody's stitches taken out, they pulled up to the pediatrician's office he said, "This is not my doctor." He thinks the emergency room is his doctor's office!

That night for a treat she took the boys to a restaurant they like. On his way out of the bathroom, Nick took a header, and did a belly-slide into a chair. He bumped his head on a chair leg. The waitress was horrified. But up Nick jumped. "I got this," he said, "I'm OK!"

Yes, there is a knot on his head, to go with the scrapes on his knees and elbows and the splint on his finger.

We're really hoping this is just Nick at six and he'll live to see better days. Cody's only four, so we hope he's more coordinated.

At the end of my nightly phone conversation with my daughter—just before we were disconnected—I heard her saying, "All three of you! Get off that wall!"

Ex-regent defends bonus decision

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Dallas businessman Robert Rowling, who abruptly resigned as a University of Texas System regent after senators berated bonuses paid to UT investment executives, defended his financial decisions Friday and said lawmakers were grandstanding in their interrogation.

"It's a popular, easy target to beat people over the head with," Rowling said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press. "We have nothing to apologize for, in my opinion."

Rowling, in his resignation letter sent after the grilling by the senators Thursday, also took issue with criticism of the bonuses from Gov. Rick Perry, the politician who appointed him to the UT System board but now stands on the opposite side of the state's Republican

fence. Two weeks ago it was revealed that Rowling — a wealthy magnate leading an empire of Omni Hotels and Gold's Gyms — will be a top fundraiser for U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison's bid to unseat Perry in 2010.

Rowling and others in the Hutchison campaign wouldn't comment on whether a political clash

with Perry preceded Rowling's resignation. Perry's camp denied there was any politics at play.

"Not at all," said Perry spokesman Mark Miner. "This had to do with a multimillion-dollar bonus going out in difficult economic times. Anybody that would bring politics into this is misinformed and factually incorrect."

Officials say meal kits may be tainted

AUSTIN (AP) — Health officials say some emergency meal kits in Texas could include peanut butter contaminated with salmonella.

Health officials said Friday that the meals may have been distributed to food banks in Texas and that they should be thrown away.

The warning is in connection with a multistate outbreak of salmonella that has sickened nearly 600 people and been linked to eight deaths nationwide. Texas health officials said they were not aware of any illnesses associated with the emergency meal kits in the state.

The meal kits were packed in boxes labeled with the brand Standing

Rock. The Texas Department of State Health Services is trying to identify where they were distributed.

The meals were originally used as part of disaster response by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in several states, then donated to food banks after they were no longer needed.

The packets of peanut butter were manufactured by Boca Grande Foods of Duluth, Ga., and supplied to Red Cloud Food Service of South Elgin, Ill., for the meal kits. The date of production numbers for the affected meals are: 092208, 092308, 092508.

The date of expiration numbers are: 092209, 092309, 092509.

On Thursday, FEMA identified four unopened trailers near Fayetteville, Ark., as containing more than 80,000 emergency meals with packets of recalled peanut butter.



Hearing could lead to exoneration in rape case

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The mother of a man who died in prison while serving 25 years for a rape that DNA tests now show he didn't commit tearfully pleaded Thursday for a judge to overturn his conviction.

Timothy Cole died in prison in 1999 from complications from asthma at the age of 38 after years of insisting he was innocent.

"If I can just clear his name," Ruby Cole Session said. "That's what he wanted."

Dozens of Cole's family members jammed a special court of inquiry hearing before state District Judge Charles Baird to plead their case. If successful, they hope it will be the first step toward earning a pardon from Gov. Rick Perry and having the criminal record expunged.

According to the Innocence Project of Texas, Cole's case would be the first posthumous DNA exoneration in the state.

The hearing is expected to last through Friday. Jerry Wayne Johnson, a prison inmate whose DNA matches the sample used to clear Cole, is expected to testify Friday. Johnson is currently in prison on separate rape convictions.

Cole was convicted of raping a Texas Tech University student in 1985 in Lubbock. DNA testing not available at the time was finally conducted on the original rape kit last year, showing he was not the rapist.

"This case ... is a shocking, horrible and hideous case. A case that ultimately resulted in the needless death of a young man, falsely accused, wrongly convicted," said Jeff Blackburn of

the Innocence Project of Texas, which is representing Cole's family.

Blackburn has enlisted the help of Barry Scheck, who helped found Innocence Project, a national organization that assists prisoners who could be cleared by DNA testing.

The lawyers said the trial would show that police investigators and prosecutors manipulated the victim's testimony, conducted faulty suspect lineups and ignored physical evidence that may have led them to other suspects.

The Lubbock County district attorney's office is not participating in the hearing.

Cole's family filled up much of the courtroom. Behind them sat the Michele Mallin, the former Texas Tech student who was raped. The Associated Press does not typically identify rape victims but Mallin, who is now 44, has come forth publicly to help clear Cole's name.

Cole's 1978 prom picture, when he was 17 years old, showing him wearing a beaming smile and a black tuxedo, was on display in the middle of the court, about 15 feet from the witness stand.

Cole refused before trial to plead guilty in exchange for the promise of probation, and refused again years later when it might have earned him parole and release from prison. He would not confess to a crime he didn't commit, his mother said.

Cole had been taught to own up to things he did wrong and not to take the blame for things he didn't do, she said.

"He refused," Ruby Cole Session said. "And I'm proud of him."

She tearfully recalled the night after he was convicted. Cole and his family went to a hotel to await sentencing the next morning.

"He cried, 'Mother, why did these people convict me of a crime I didn't do?'" she said. "My son, a 26-year-old man, lying in his mother's arms That's the last time my baby was in my arms like that."

The original case against Cole hinged primarily on identification made by Mallin.

Blackburn and Scheck allege the photo lineup used in 1985 was flawed. She picked Cole out of a photo array that included at least six other pictures. All were standard jail mug shots except for Cole's photo, which was a Polaroid. Mallin later identified Cole in a live lineup and again at trial.

The attorneys also say investigators ignored key physical and clothing descriptions Mallin gave of her attacker. They also ignored the fact that Mallin said her attacker was a smoker and that Cole had to use an inhaler to help with his asthma, the attorneys said.

Mallin said Thursday she testified as truthfully as she could in 1985. She said she now feels misled by Lubbock officials, who she said portrayed Cole as a violent criminal and a thug.

Mallin said she now has a good relationship with Cole's family, several of whom gave her a hug during a break in testimony.

She said she was overwhelmed with emotion when Lubbock prosecutors called her last year to tell her the DNA matched someone other than Cole to

the crime. Mallin said until then, she didn't even know that Cole had died in prison.

"I was feeling really guilty," she said. "I was crying on the phone."

The judge told Mallin she should not feel guilty about Cole's conviction.

"You are to understand you are not to be blamed for this," Baird said. "We're all sorry it turned out this way."

Mallin pointed at Cole's smiling picture just a few feet away.

"It's hard. That's a human being," Mallin said. "He didn't deserve this."

Friday's Sports In Brief

BALTIMORE (AP) — Michael Phelps said it's fair for USA Swimming to suspend him for three months, the latest fallout from a photo showing the Olympic great inhaling from a marijuana pipe.

Phelps was back at his regular pool in Baltimore a day after his suspension.

The latest fallout has been much greater than in 2004, when an underage Phelps was arrested for drunken driving three months after the Athens Olympics. He pleaded guilty and apologized to his fans, saying he wouldn't make the same mistake again.

Phelps wasn't sure how the negative publicity might influence his decision to compete in the 2012 London Olympics.

With the three-month suspension he won't be able to take on any rivals until early May, which would give him a little more than two months of competition before July's

world championships in Rome.

BASKETBALL

NEW YORK (AP) — LeBron James lost his latest triple-double when the NBA determined that one of his rebounds should have been credited to Cleveland teammate Ben Wallace.

James scored a season-high 52 points and had 11 assists Wednesday in the Cavaliers' 107-102 victory at New York. He was believed to have a triple-double when he grabbed what went down as a 10th rebound with under 2 seconds left.

However, the league reviewed the game and ruled that a rebound given to James with 39.3 seconds remaining should have been credited to Wallace. The corrected statistics now have James with nine rebounds and Wallace with two.

FOOTBALL

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Todd Haley has

been hired as coach of the Kansas City Chiefs after helping the Arizona Cardinals reach the Super Bowl.

Haley was the offensive coordinator of the Cardinals. He joins a team that went a franchise-worst 2-14 under coach Herm Edwards, who was fired Jan. 23. Edwards lost all but two of his last 25 games and launched a rebuilding project that made the Chiefs the league's youngest team this season.

HOCKEY

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Stars and New York Rangers would not comment on a report that the Rangers have had front-office talks about the possibility of bringing back suspended Stars forward Sean Avery.

The New York Post said that Rangers general manager Glen Sather was expected to speak to Stars co-GM Les Jackson about a timetable under which

Dallas would place Avery — who left the Rangers in the offseason to sign with the Stars — on waivers.

If the Rangers were to reacquire Avery, they would be responsible for half of the rest of his four-year, \$15.5 million contract. For Avery to be eligible for the playoffs, the Rangers would have to pick him up before the March 4 trade deadline.

BASEBALL

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Pitcher Randy Wolf and the Los Angeles Dodgers agreed to a \$5 million, one-year contract.

A 32-year-old left-hander, Wolf was a combined 12-12 with a 4.30 ERA last year with San Diego and Houston, which acquired him in July for minor league pitcher Chad Reineke. The Astros offered Wolf a \$27 million, three-year contract in November, then withdrew the proposal a week later, citing the poor economy.

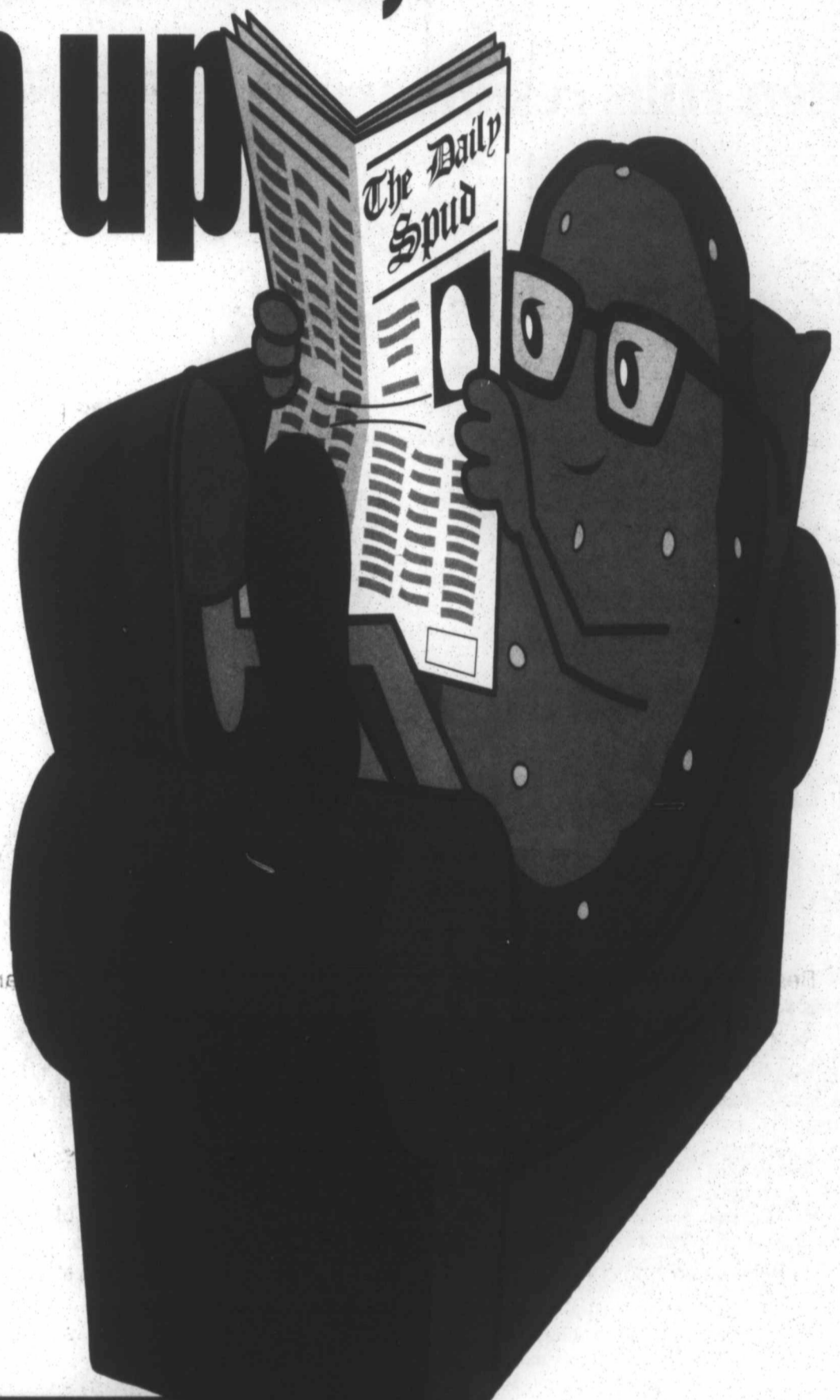

Don't panic: IRS audits rare, often just a letter

NEW YORK (AP)— You don't have a nanny or any other household help, nor are you chauffeured around in a limo with a personal driver supplied by a friend.

That may make you eligible for a political appointment, but it doesn't shield your tax return from an audit.

Yet if the fear of an audit has you paralyzed as you're preparing this year's 1040, you can take comfort in the fact that such reviews are relatively rare, and most often involve only the exchange of a few pieces of mail.

Nearly 1.4 million individual returns were audited in 2008, or "examined" in Internal Revenue service parlance, up about a half percent from the prior year. That represents just over 1 percent of federal returns filed in 2007.

The likelihood of an audit increases for higher income earners. While less than 1 percent of all returns for incomes under \$200,000 are examined, IRS data shows nearly 3 percent of returns for incomes over \$200,000 were reviewed last year. The figure climbs to almost 5.6 percent of returns for incomes of \$1 million or more.

Still, the majority of examinations, almost 78 percent, involved only letters sent to taxpayers seeking more information.

Known as a correspon-

dence audit, Bob D. Scharin, senior tax analyst from the Tax & Accounting business of Thomson Reuters, said such queries are generally easy to handle. "Some people don't think of it as an audit, because they're not physically seeing the IRS representative in an office," he said.

Scharin said taxpayers receive such letters when something doesn't match up in IRS records, or when a deduction seems out of line. "The computer could kick out the letter because something didn't match up," he explained, for instance the amount of income listed on a 1099 form that the IRS received doesn't match the amount you claimed. Or the IRS might want documentation to back up a deduction, for example, for a large in-kind donation to charity.

Jay Safier, a principal in the New York accounting firm of Rosen, Seymour, Shapss, Martin & Company, said one way to avoid such a letter is to include documentation supporting a claim like a big deduction with your return. "If you attach it, it reduces the chance that the return will be audited," he said, noting that returns are looked at by an individual before it's determined they will be audited.

If you get an IRS letter, it's important to read it carefully to make sure you understand what the

agency is asking for and that you can provide the information. Any time you're sending such paperwork to the IRS, you should keep the original and send a copy. "It could get lost somewhere along


the way," Scharin said, "or you may need to produce it if this proceeds to an in-person kind of audit."

People whose taxes are prepared by H&R Block, Jackson Hewitt, Liberty Tax Services or other

chains can get help from those companies if they are audited. This can include having a representative accompany them to an in-person audit.


Do-it-yourselfers who use Intuit's TurboTax,

H&R Block's TaxCut or most online software products can find sample letters to use when replying to a correspondence audit, or can contact the software provider for additional help.

Pentagon boosts spending on PR

WASHINGTON (AP) — As it fights two wars, the Pentagon is steadily and dramatically increasing the money it spends to win what it calls "the human terrain" of world public opinion. In the process, it is raising concerns of spreading propaganda at home in violation of federal law.

An Associated Press investigation found that over the past five years, the money the military spends on winning hearts and minds at home and abroad has grown by 63 percent, to at least \$4.7 billion this year, according to Department of Defense budgets and other documents. That's almost as much as it spent on body armor for troops in Iraq and Afghanistan between 2004 and 2006.

This year, the Pentagon will employ 27,000 people just for recruitment, advertising and public relations, almost as many as the total 30,000-person workforce in the State Department.

"We have such a massive apparatus selling the military to us, it has become hard to ask questions about whether this is too much money or if it's bloated," says Sheldon Rampton, research director for the Committee on Media and Democracy, which tracks the military's media operations. "As the war has become less popular, they have felt they need to respond to that more."

Yet the money spent on media and outreach still comes to only 1 percent of the Pentagon budget, and the military argues it is well-spent on recruitment and the education of foreign and American audiences. Military leaders say that at a time when extremist groups run Web sites and distribute video, information is as important a weapon as tanks and guns.

"We have got to be involved in getting our case out there, telling our side of the story, because believe me, al-Qaida and all of those folks ... that's what they are doing on the Internet and everywhere else," says Rep. Adam Smith, D-Wash., who chairs the Terrorism, Unconventional Threats and Capabilities Subcommittee. "Every time a bomb goes off, they have a story out almost before it explodes, saying that it killed 15 innocent civilians."

On an abandoned Air Force base in San Antonio, Texas, editors for the Joint Hometown News Service point proudly to a dozen clippings on a table as examples of success in getting stories into newspapers.

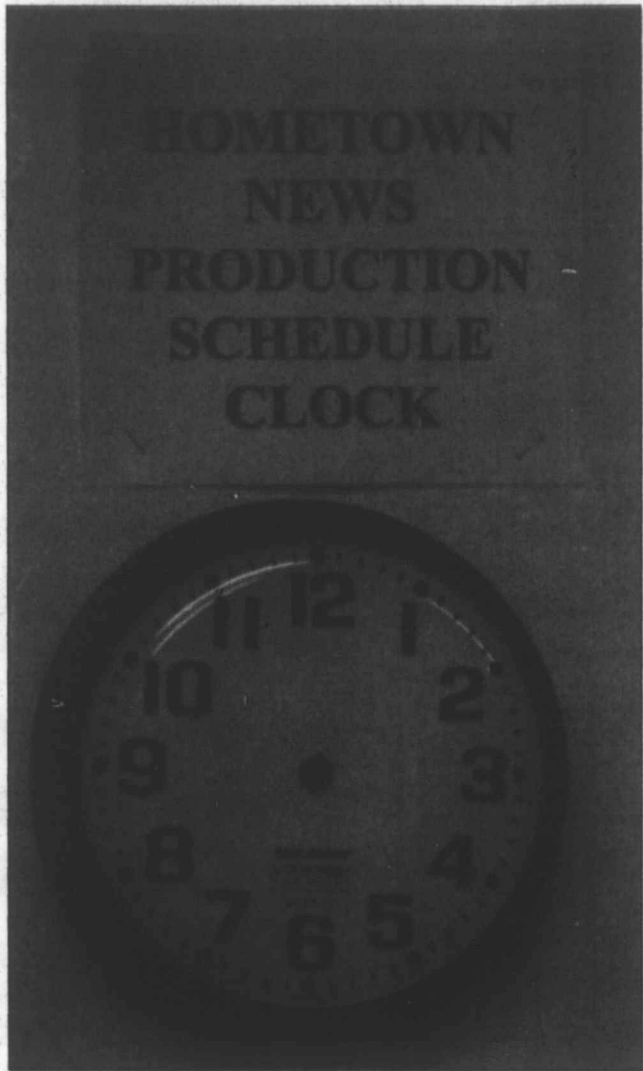
What readers are not told: Each of these glowing stories was written by Pentagon staff. Under the free service, stories go out with authors' names but not their titles, and do not mention Hometown News anywhere. In 2009, Hometown News plans to put out 5,400 press releases, 3,000 television releases and 1,600 radio interviews, among other work, almost 50 percent more than in 2007.

The service is just a tiny piece of the Pentagon's rapidly expanding media empire, which is now bigger in size, money and power than many media companies.

In a yearlong investigation, The Associated Press interviewed more than 100 people and scoured more than 100,000 pages of documents in several budgets to tally the money spent to inform, educate and influence the public in the U.S. and abroad. The AP included contracts found through the private FedSources database and requests made under the Freedom of Information Act. Actual spending figures are higher because of money in classified budgets.

The biggest chunk of funds, about \$1.6 billion, goes into recruitment and advertising. Another \$547 million goes into public affairs, which reaches American audi-

ences. And about \$489 million more goes into what is known as psychological operations, which targets foreign audiences.

ences. And about \$489 million more goes into what is known as psychological operations, which targets foreign audiences.

Staffing across all these areas costs about \$2.1 billion, as calculated by the number of full-time employees and the military's average cost per service member. That's double the staffing costs for 2003.

Recruitment and advertising are the only two areas where Congress has authorized the military to influence the American public. Far more controversial is public affairs, because of the prohibition on propaganda to the American public.

"It's not up to the Pentagon to sell policy to the American people," says Rep. Paul Hodes, D-N.H., who sponsored legislation in Congress last year reinforcing the ban.

Spending on public affairs has more than doubled since 2003. Robert Hastings, acting director of Pentagon public affairs, says the growth reflects changes in the information market, along with the fact that the U.S. is now fighting two wars.

"The role of public affairs is to provide you the information so that you can make an informed decision yourself," Hastings says. "There is no place for spin at the Department of Defense."

But on Dec. 12, the Pentagon's inspector general released an audit finding that the public affairs office may have crossed the line into propaganda. The audit found the Department of Defense "may appear to merge inappropriately" its public affairs with operations that try to influence audiences abroad. It also found that while only 89 positions were authorized for public affairs, 126 government employees and 31 contractors worked there.

In a written response, Hastings concurred and, without acknowledging wrongdoing, ordered a reorganization of the department by early 2009.

meant for the military's Stars and Stripes newspaper.

The program was set up to keep U.S. troops

informed about volunteer donations to the military. But the military awarded \$11.8 million in contracts to a public relations firm to raise donations for the troops and then advertise those donations to the public. So the program became a way to drum up support for the military at a time when public opinion

was turning against the Iraq war.

The audit also found that the offer to place corporate logos on the Pentagon Web site in return for donations was against regulations. A military spokesman said the program has been completely overhauled to meet Pentagon regulations. "They very explicitly

identify American public opinion as an important battlefield," says Marc Lynch, a professor at George Washington University. "In today's information environment, even if they were well-intentioned and didn't want to influence

American public opinion, they couldn't help it."

In 2003, for example, initial accounts from the military about the rescue of Pvt. Jessica Lynch from Iraqi forces were faked to rally public support. And in 2005, a Marine Corps spokesman during the siege of the Iraqi city of Fallujah told the U.S. news media that U.S. troops were attacking. In fact, the information was a ruse by U.S. commanders to fool insurgents into revealing their positions.

The fastest-growing part of the military media is "psychological operations," where spending has doubled since 2003.

Psychological operations aim at foreign audiences, and spin is welcome. The only caveats are that messages must be truthful and must never try to influence an American audience.

In Afghanistan, for example, a video of a soldier joining the national army shown on Afghan television is not attributed to the U.S. And in Iraq, American teams built and equipped media outlets and trained Iraqis to staff them without making public the connection to the military.

Rear Adm. Gregory Smith, director of strategic communications for the U.S. Central Command, says psychological operations must be secret to be effective. He says that in the 21st century, it is probably not possible to win the information battle with insurgents without exposing American citizens to secret U.S. propaganda.

"We have to be pragmatic and realistic about the game that we play in terms of information, and that game is very complex," he says.

The danger of psychological operations reaching a U.S. audience became clear when an American TV anchor asked Gen. David Petraeus about the mood in Iraq. The general held up a glossy photo of the Iraqi national soccer team to show the country united in victory.

Behind the camera, his staff was cringing. It was

Army: Insulin error put 2,100 patients at risk

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — More than 2,100 diabetic patients treated at William Beaumont Army Medical Center could be at risk for hepatitis or HIV because of potentially flawed insulin injections, Army officials said Thursday.

Last week's discovery that injection pens might have been used on multiple diabetics led to an Army-wide review and the El Paso medical center contacting patients who may be infected, William Beaumont spokesman Clarence Davis III said.

The warning covers WBMAC patients who received insulin injections between August 2007 and January 2009. The mistake was uncovered Jan. 30 following 18 months of potentially incorrect use.

None of the 2,114 patients identified had been screened for blood-borne diseases by late Thursday. WBMAC said the staff believes the risk of infection is low.

"There is an ongoing investigation," Davis said.

WBMAC said each needle used was new and sterilized. But the pen portion of the multi-dose injectors, which are designed for repeated use on a single patient, may have instead been used on more than one person.

U.S. psychological operations that had quietly distributed tens of thousands of the soccer posters in July 2007 to encourage Iraqi nationalism.

With a new administration in power, it is not clear what changes may be made. Obama administration officials have said they intend to go through the Department of Defense budget closely to trim bloated spending.

The emphasis on influence operations started with former Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld. In 2002, Rumsfeld established an Office of Strategic Influence that brought together public affairs and psychological operations. Critics accused him of setting up a propaganda arm, and Congress demanded that the office be shut down.

Rumsfeld has declined to speak to the press since leaving office, but while defense secretary he spoke bluntly about his desire to revamp the Pentagon's media operations.

"I went down that next day and said, 'Fine, if you want to savage this thing, fine, I'll give you the corpse,'" Rumsfeld said on Nov. 18, 2002, according to Defense Department transcripts of a speech he delivered. "There's the name. You can have the name, but I'm gonna keep doing every single thing that needs to be done and I have."

In 2003, Rumsfeld issued a secret Information Operations Roadmap setting out a plan for public affairs and psychological operations to work together. It noted that with a global media, the military should expect and accept that psychological operations will reach the U.S. public.

"I can tell you there wouldn't be a single

American disappointed with anything that we've done that might be out there, that they don't know about," says Col. Curtis Boyd, commander of the 4th PSYOP Group, the largest unit of its kind. "Frankly, they probably wouldn't care because maybe they are safer as a result of it."

In January 2008, a new report by the Defense Science Board recom-

mended resurrecting the Office of Strategic Influence as the Office of Strategic Communications. But Congress refused to fund the program.

In February, the Army released a new eight-chapter field manual that puts information warfare on par with traditional warfare.

The title of an entire chapter, Chapter 7: "Information Superiority."

Scarred Ga. sugar blast victims hope for new rules

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — A year after he escaped badly burned from a huge blast at the nation's second-largest sugar refinery, Jamie Butler still needs physical therapy once a day to stretch the skin grafts on his arms, hands and legs.

He still takes painkillers. And he needs steroid injections to reduce scarring on his face, now covered by a black mask that applies healing pressure to the skin.

The 26-year-old cannot forget what happened at the Imperial Sugar refinery on Feb. 7, 2008. And he wonders why his older brother, who worked beside him filling bags of sugar, had to die when fine sugar dust exploded.

"I've been thinking about my brother all the time," said Butler, who was burned over almost half his body. "I know it could've been prevented."

Despite the outcry after the blast, which killed 14 people and injured 40 others, the U.S. still lacks federal regulations requiring industrial plants to prevent the buildup of fine dust particles that can form explosive clouds in confined areas.

Federal regulators concluded that the explosion and fire at the refinery in Port Wentworth, just west of Savannah, was caused by a spark that ignited sugar dust like gunpowder.

The blast set off secondary dust explosions that turned the packaging plant where Butler worked with his 35-year-old brother, John Calvin Butler Jr., into fiery rubble.

Last summer, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration proposed \$8.7 million in fines against Imperial Sugar and cited the company for 211 safety violations at its two refineries, here in coastal Georgia and in Gramercy, La.

OSHA has a dust regulation from the 1980s covering grain and plant silos. But another federal agency says that's not enough because food processors, wood manufacturers and other industries face the same risks.

In 2006, the U.S. Chemical Safety Board, which investigates industrial accidents, called on OSHA to close that gap by adopting a new combustible dust regulation. Over the past three decades, the board says, about 300 dust explosions have killed more than 120 workers nationwide.

OSHA opposed a new industrial dust standard following the Georgia explosion. The agency argued existing regulations on plant cleanliness and maintenance — which it used to cite Imperial Sugar — have been sufficient.

Members of Congress tried to force OSHA to adopt a new standard by law last year after the Imperial Sugar blast. A bill passed the House but stalled in the Senate amid a promised presidential veto.

Rep. John Barrow, D-Ga., co-sponsored the failed dust bill. He's trying again with a new version introduced Wednesday. The National Fire Protection Association, which has had voluntary standards for preventing dust explosions since the 1930s, said it endorses a federal regulation to make such measures mandatory.

Imperial Sugar, based in Sugar Land, Texas, is contesting the OSHA fines as it moves ahead with a \$200 million project to build new storage silos and a 75,000 square-foot packaging plant to replace those destroyed.

As reconstruction continues, Latacia Johnson Bynes said she still wants answers as to why the dust was allowed to accumulate in deadly levels.

Bynes' father, Earl Johnson Sr., 56, was working on the second floor of the packaging plant. His body was identified a week after the blast, using medical records.

"I know life at the plant must go on," Bynes said. "They can pick up and rebuild. But I can't rebuild my dad."

John Sheptor, the company's CEO, said Imperial Sugar is following the National Fire Protection Association's voluntary dust guidelines in its new buildings. Those call for

safety features such as a minimum of raised surfaces where dust can collect.

"I think the ultimate objective here is to establish an example to the industry for others to follow," Sheptor said.

On Saturday's anniversary, the company plans to dedicate a memorial park on refinery grounds where bricks from the blast site are laid out forming a cross. A bronze sculpture also has been shaped as a pair of hands releasing 14 doves — one for each

worker killed. Imperial Sugar faces more than 30 lawsuits filed against its subsidiaries by injured employees and relatives of the workers.

Butler and Bynes are among those suing, as is survivor Lawrence Manker Jr.

Manker, now 20, spent six months in a medically induced coma as doctors treated burns to 85 percent of his body. In October, he became the last Imperial Sugar patient to be discharged from a hospital burn unit.

Manker said he still experiences nausea and struggles to regulate his body temperature, often too hot or too cold. A former football player who once bench-pressed 280 pounds, he now works out with 5-pound weights and his mother helps him dress.

"Every day is a better day — I see myself gaining (by) degrees in my stretching ability. I'm getting better at putting my clothes on," Manker said. "I just thank God ... that I've seen another year."

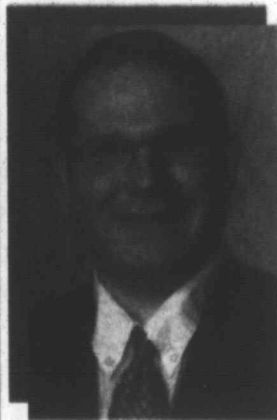
