Randy Dunn retires after 29 years at PHS

June 12 will mark the end of an era at Pampa High School.

"That will be my last day," said Randy Dunn.

It is the final day of his teaching contract, and will mark the last day of a 29-year career for the Ag Science teacher, all of them in Pampa.


"I came here in the fall of 1980," Dunn said, leaning back in his chair in the vocational sciences building at Pampa High.

Dunn, 51, was born a cotton farmer near Lubbock, but being an Ag teacher was something that always appealed to him.

"I graduated Lubbock Cooper High School," he said, "but it was just Cooper High School then. We had a very strong Ag program, and I was involved in it."

He was finishing up his degree at Texas Tech and farming when he drove to Pampa one June day in 1980, to interview with the Pampa Independent School

District for a job. "I had to go to the first summer session to finish," Dunn said. "My Dad had had surgery on his neck earlier in the year, and he wasn't able to drive a trac-

tor. I was going to school worry about getting hailed and farming after achoos out or other weather-relatand on weekends.

He said it was a little tricky scheduling an interview around school and farming. June is a critical time for cotton, he said.

"We got it done," Dunn

At least with teaching, he said he didn't have to

"My senior year in high school," Dunn said, "I farmed 90 acres across the road."

He lost \$3,000 on the crop.

"We had a tremendous sandstorm on the Fourth of July," Dunn said.

It wiped out a lot of the crops in the area, he said.

"The sand was blowing so hard, you couldn't see the mail box out in front of the house," Dunn said.

When Dunn first started teaching in Pampa four years later, he said he was fortunately enough to teach with Bob Skaggs.

"When I started teach-

ing," Dunn said, "he'd been here 24 years. I learned a lot from that man."

Skaggs died in January, 1983. The Pampa High School farm on Price Road is named for him.

"At one time," Dunn said, "we had three Ag teachers here. We're down to one.'

PISD also had three family and consumer science teachers at one time, but they are down to one now, too.

Things have changed, he said.

"When I first started teaching," Dunn said, "we had Ag Science 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Each of those courses was a year long.

Now, the courses are divided into semesters and include individual classes in Animal Science, Equine Science, Wildlife Management and Agricultural Mechanics and Welding.

"They're more specialized," Dunn said.

He said Animal Science and Welding are the two most popular classes.

"I don't know what I'm going to do," Dunn said with regard to his retirement.

His wife, Brenda, is a DUNN cont. on page 3

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

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Senate sends state schools reforms to Gov.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Texas Senate on Friday gave final approval to improving security and oversight of the state's large institutions for the mentally disabled, which have been hit with allegations of widespread abuse and neglect.

The unanimous vote sends the bill to Gov. Rick Perry, who had declared fixing problems at the state schools a top priority of the legislative session.

If signed into law, the state will install video surveillance in common areas and give new powers to the state Office of Inspector General to help local prosecutors pursue cases of abuse, neglect or exploitation. Staff would be subject to drug tests and criminal background checks. The bill also renames the institutions as "state schools" as "state supported living centers"

Texas has nearly 5,000 residents at the state's 13 state schools and the changes approved by lawmakers come on the heels of scathing reports of neglect and abuse, including fights between residents staged by workers.

Dozens of people have died under questionable circumstances and hundreds of employees have been disciplined for mistreating residents. A 2008 review by the federal Department of Justice reported that residents' civil rights were being violated.

"The abuse and neglect that has taken place at our state schools will stop," said Sen. Jane Nelson, the Flower Mound Republican who led the Senate's reform efforts.

Lawmakers are expected to give final approval to a five-year, \$112 million settlement with the federal government to improve conditions and medical care, including hiring more than 1,000 new direct care workers and placing monitors in each school.

A provision in the state budget would move 500 people out of state schools in the next two years to community-based care and identify more than 1,000 others who could be better served in other facilities. It also would create more community-based slots for

The bill passed Friday also strengthens oversight over those community care facilities, said Rep. Patrick Rose, D-Dripping Springs, who sponsored the bill in

For example, those homes will no longer be allowed to investigate claims of abuse and neglect at their facilities, Rose said. That job now reverts to the state. Community homes also will be subject to unannounced inspections by the state Department of Family and Protective Services.

Lawmakers agreed to give the state new investigation powers into abuse claims at community homes and creates a database of abuse cases that can be reviewed by the public.

Some advocates for the disabled had called for closing state schools or ending admissions, two ideas that ran into fierce resistance from some families of residents.

Jeff Garrison-Tate of the advocacy group Community Now! said the state schools system is beyond repair.

"These facilities have created an environment and culture that breeds abuse and neglect," Garrison-Tate said. "It is past time for Texas to develop a plan to get people out of these places and close the facilities no longer needed.'

They became something of a tradition beginning in 1997, Dunn said, looking up at them.

"We had a big group of seniors that year," he said of 1997.

There are a few years that are missing, where the students didn't get the pictures done, but most years

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U.S. Must Not Capitulate to North Korea's Nuclear Blackmail

Less than one week after Iran launched a ballistic missile capable of striking U.S. targets and allies, North Korea followed suit and raised the stakes by detonating an illicit nuclear device. This aggressive act incited outrage across the globe, even drawing a strong rebuke from North Korea's traditional ally China. The question is, how will the United States meet the escalating challenge of a nuclear armed North Korea or Iran? History gives us a framework of what will not

In 1994, the North Korean threat to develop nuclear weapons "Framework Agreement" with President Clinton guaranteeing the delivery of two energy-producing light-water nuclear reactors and 500,000 tons of fuel oil annually, if Pyongyang would halt operations at their nuclear facility in Yongbyon.

At the time, President Clinton insisted it was the best agreement possible and preferable to war. In a column I wrote in 1995, I raised concerns that this appeasement strategy bore insufficient safeguards and, by rewarding North Korea's bad behavior, we were sending a mes-

sage that the United States would capitulate to nuclear blackmail.

The ineffectiveness of this strategy was again proven when, in 2006, North Korea acknowledged to the world that it had never terminated

its nuclear program. That exchange for their false year, it tested the Bush Administration by detonating its first nuclear device. Many experts believe that the 2006 test was technically flawed and fell short of the expectations of North Korean scientists, sending them back to the drawing board.

But this month's successful nuclear test, reportedly yielding a blast comparable to the bomb dropped on Nagasaki in 1945, has made it very clear that, not only is North Korea's nuclear program active, but it has made enough technical advancements to be truly dangerous. This is an important part of North Korea's strategy, which has been rapidly unfolding over the last five years. This year, North Korea rejected the Obama Administration's diplomatic overtures, abandoned the six party talks, ousted U.N. inspectors, resumed activity at Yongbyon nuclear facility, and test launched as many as six missiles.

former Ambassador John Bolton suggested in a Wall Street Journal column, North Korea faces no real consequences from the Obama Administration only strong rhetoric. Mr. Bolton concluded that this gives North Korea what it wants: "America in a conciliatory mode." Indeed, Pyongyang is counting on a weak response, culminating in negotiations and concessions being made by the United States. Once the desired negotiations begin, Kim Jong Il can siphon food, oil, and other induce-

ments from America in

promises to disarm. That what was promised in 1994, and we see the results. Absent nuclear weapons

and missiles, North Korea would be irrelevant. Their economy is in shambles, and only their bad behavior continues to pay dividends. That's why this cycle of appeasement must end. This time, our strategy must be multi-pronged:

First, we must lead international efforts to levy punitive sanctions against North Korea. Presently, trade with the nation is limited because North Korea has little of value to offer partners. Yet, it relies heavily on Russia and China, particularly to meet their energy needs. Russia and China are uniquely positioned to pressure Kim Jong Il, and they should use this leverage to help carry out the will of the international community that North Korea not be a nuclear-armed state.

Second, future negotiations with North Korea to terminate their nuclear weapons program must link any aid we provide to inspection and verification. Assurances by Pyongyang, proven to be duplicitous, are insufficient. We cannot declare our diplomatic efforts a success without verification, while North Korea continues to arm itself unabated.

Lastly, we must defend America and our allies by fully funding a leading edge missile defense program. The President's recent budget has slashed missile defense funding by over a billion dollars.



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The programs that have been cancelled or seriously cut back are the very programs that would be an integral part of our missile defense response if North Korea followed through on its threats. Above all, our missile defense strategy must send the unmistakable message that the U.S. is prepared to meet and defeat any escalation of arms.

North Korea and Iran have shown that they're willing to use provocative tactics to raise international tension and to instigate conflict with nations across the globe. Efforts to extend a hand of friendship have been met with belligerence. Calls for direct negotiations have been rebuked. As the U.S., once again, grapples with these challenges, our policy must be resolute and rooted in the reality that these are hostile, unreasonable nations who wish to do us harm.

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Major San Antonio attraction doubles in size

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — For decades, the channel of the San Antonio River north of the popular restaurants and retail shops downtown was overgrown and blighted — the kind of place tourists went only if they made a wrong turn. But not anymore.

A \$72 million overhaul— essentially doubling the size of the River Walk— has transformed the dry weed-choked eyesore north of the River Walk into a 1½-mile manicured waterway with whimsical art, benches and fountains that can be passed on foot or by water taxi en route to

attractions upriver.

The so-called museum reach of the River Walk, which opens May 30, connects visitors from the busy convention center and Alamo area to the San Antonio Museum of Art and the Pearl Brewery, a retail redevelopment project. Beyond that, this fall, a path will allow pedestrians and cyclists to keep going north along the river to Brackenridge Park, home of the Witte Museum and the zoo.

"The entire river is an artwork," said Mayor Phil Hardberger, who pushed the project and will see it open on his last day in office. "The river, as it changes character, will assume different shapes and different personalities."

The River Walk, a bustling development built in the 1940s with help from President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal, is already the most popular tourist attraction in Texas, just ahead of the nearby Alamo. But beyond the River Walk, much of the other 11 miles of riverbed had been neglected over the years.

Now, visitors will able to ride water taxis from downtown, hailing them from any of the landings, or walk the paved path past the lock system that raises and lowers the boats so they can move upstream and downstream despite the 9-foot elevation change.

Along the way, trees and flowers line the side-walks with covered over-looks and water features. A small steel bridge that once allowed beer kegs to move between the two towers of the old Lone Star Brewery, now home to the art muse-um, was salvaged from the scrap heap and turned into a small foot bridge over the river, said Boone Powell, the lead designer on the project.

The nonprofit San Antonio River Foundation raised money to place 12 pieces of art along the three miles of walkway. The art includes a 150-foot cement

cave-like sculpture with a waterfall and a school of brightly colored sunfish suspended from wires beneath the Interstate 35 overpass.

The pathways are lighted at night, as are many of the art pieces. Two others under bridges are designed to be at their showiest after dark.

"The project itself provides a surprise around every corner. To get the full experience you have to go during the day, then in the evening and then at night," said Suzanne Scott, general manager for the San Antonio River Authority, the agency that

manages the river.

Retail and residential development along the museum reach is expected to grow in coming years, but the river renovation has already allowed the art museum to open a grand new entrance off the river and has given visitors a new way to access the stores and weekly farmer's market at the Pearl Brewery.

It's also provided easy access to a historic spot that was largely hidden before the river walk made it more accessible. VFW Post 76, the oldest in Texas, occupies a grand two-story columned man-

sion along the river, and its first-floor bar — which opens every afternoon and serves ice cold beer "until everyone has gone home or 2 a.m., whichever comes first" — will serve you even if you're not a veteran of a foreign war.

The San Antonio River,

a waterway so narrow that Hardberger says "some people in the East would probably call it a 'crick," begins just north of downtown before it joins the San Pedro Creek about 13 miles downstream. The waterway drew American Indians and later, European

settlers, including the missionaries who built the Alamo, to the area.

In the 1800s, the river served mills and breweries like Pearl and Lone Star, which used the water for power and to make ice. As the industrial buildings aged, however, the riverbed was largely ignored until the recent restoration push.

The museum reach is the first and most urban of the redevelopment plans, but officials hope by 2014 to have completely restored the San Antonio River. Sections reaching to the northern edge of Brackenridge Park and downriver to the southernmost of the five historic missions are in various stages of development.

The newer sections will be largely pedestrian and bike paths, with a heavy focus on restoring plants and trees south of downtown.

"The river is why there is a San Antonio," said Hardberger. "It connects our city together in a way that nothing else does."

IF YOU GO: Water taxi barges charge \$10 for 24 hours of unlimited use. You can hail one from any of the landings in the downtown River Walk or the new museum stretch and pay aboard. Prince Harry tours WTC site in first US visit

NEW YORK (AP) -Prince Harry bowed his head in prayer at ground zero Friday, then toured the Sept. 11 attack site and shook New Yorkers' hands in his first official visit to the United States.

'Big question — when is this supposed to be finished?" the 24-year-old prince asked two officials showing him rebuilding plans of the World Trade Center site.

The prince laid a wreath of peonies, yellow and white roses at a spot on the site overlooking the Sept. 11 memorial under construction, then bowed his head for several minutes.

Attached to the wreath was his handwritten note. reading "In respectful memory of those who lost their lives on Sept. 11, 2001, and in admiration of

the courage shown by the people of this great city on that day." It was signed, "Harry.

Harry spoke for about 15 minutes with relatives of four 9/11 victims in his first New York City stop. He was to visit a garden memorializing Sept. 11 victims and a veterans center in Manhattan later

I live in a two-bedroom apartment with my two children. My son is disabled. Yes, I do have a job, but I earn a low hourly wage and I'm on a tight budget. I am also concerned that my brother will need counseling to help him get over what he has been through.

When I explain my concerns to my family, they get angry and say I'm being selfish, and to be honest, I am feeling very guilty. Please help me because I have no idea what to do. -- CRYING AT NIGHT IN **MILWAUKEE**

DEAR CRYING: Dry those tears and do not allow yourself to be manipulated into something you can't handle. As a single mother, you already have your hands full caring for two children -- one of whom has special needs.

Your family is wrong to expect you to shoulder this additional challenge alone. Because none of them is offering to help you, and your brother was abused in the care of the family, accept that he may be better off in a supportive foster-care environment.

DEAR ABBY: When my husband and I moved into our new home, one of the neighbor kids, "Rachael" (age 9), took a liking to me. She came over with her mom, introduced herself and asked for my phone number. I thought nothing of it. But as time has passed, she has been calling more and more to invite me over. Abby, I'm almost 30!

It has reached the point where we no longer answer our phone. Rachael also


shows up at our door with her friends and wants to "hang out." Sometimes she just stands there and doesn't say anything. It's awkward because I have never been wild about kids.

Stress map outlines recession's stories

Through the voices of its people, the map shouts. From Atlanta, Ga., listen to Marian Chamberlain -

65, jobless, and no longer eligible for unemployment: "I will never be able

to retire."

From Shakopee, Minn., listen to Bruce Paul, 56, a vintage car mechanic laid off in January and unemployed for the first time since Richard Nixon was president. Today he and his wife spend their days in the public library to reduce energy costs at home. "You go out and they say, you know, you need a resume. And I say, 'A resume? What's that?""

From Broomfield, Colo., listen to U.S. Marine and construction worker Simon Todt, 27, a combat-arms specialist who returned from three tours in Iraq only to be laid off from his construction job in December. He smiles wanly as he sums up his situation: "There's not a big calling in the civilian world for explosives."

The republic is brimming with Americans like these. And the Associated Press Economic Stress Map helps us find their voices and tell their stories

For generations, maps have told tales that words and numbers alone cannot. Maps guided us to the New World, helped us navigate from its edges into its interior. Vague, undefined maps showed Lewis & Clark where to go next — and in turn gave us fresher, more accurate maps that fueled further explorations. Maps outlined the frontier for settlement and showed us where to find the silver, the gold and the coal that made us prosperous. Computer mapping helps businesses expand, prosper and find new customers.

The interactive Stress Map offers insight into the American recession, translating it into misery and geography using an equation, the Stress Index, that shows us — state by state, county by county - just how uncertain and battered around we actually are. It takes the numbers, the pronouncements, the big plans for recovery and illustrates what they mean on Main Street USA, or what passes for it in 21stcentury American communities.

The Stress Index synthesizes three complex sets of ever-evolving data. By factoring in monthly numbers for foreclosure, bankruptcy and — most painfully unemployment, the AP has assembled a numeral that reflects the comparative pain each American county is feeling during these dark economic days.

Here are some fleeting examples of what the Stress Index tells us:

—The current recession spread like an epidemic from isolation to ubiquity, marching from sequestered pockets of foreclosure to a nationwide explosion of misery as unemployment overtook foreclosures as the dominant misfortune of this recession.

-Places with technology-based economies were recession-proof for a while but aren't now.

-Places with large numbers of government jobs — state capitals, university towns, communities with concentrations of hospitals — remain fairly recession-proof. These are places like Columbia, Mo.; Madison, Wis.; the Raleigh, N.C., area; and Athens, Ga.

-State government is not hurting that much at least, not yet.

-The regions we look to for our traditional sources of energy, for our coal and oil — Wyoming, West Virginia and the like have generally not been hit as hard.

While bankruptcy declarations are happening everywhere, they tend to be higher in the South because of such things as low wages, state laws that give power to creditors and a culture that's more familiar with the bankruptcy option.

Among counties with 25,000-plus residents, no place has been hit harder than Elkhart County, Ind., and that 15 of the 20 American counties hit hardest by the recession in the past year are in six states — Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

The Stress Index is not merely a map of misery, though. When recovery comes, it can be a map of optimism as well, a welcome harbinger of better days approaching. Going forward, it can track the recovery we hunger for show us where it is poking its head up, where it is spreading and who it is leaving behind.


The map, and the numbers behind it, cannot tell us everything. No single number can track Americans' net worth, no monthly barometer indicates the pain factor of people who lost retirement funds, whose stocks vanished out from under them. who dutifully set aside nest eggs that now amount to little or nothing.

But it can help compare and contrast places, then find the people who breathe life into the numbers that characterize their regions and their hometowns. It can illustrate emerging trends — why are certain areas starting to recover while others are lagging behind? — and offer early hints to where the tightness of economic stress might be starting to

Where can we go with this map? It can carry us to Los Gatos, Calif., one of the high-tech regions that seemed to be escaping the worst of the recession but is now clawing to keep pace. It can point us toward Champaign, Ill., an example of the trend that communities with government institutions tend to be more recession-proof than other places.

highlight can Burlington, N.C., where the manufacturing jobs that disappeared might never be coming back, and Myrtle Beach, S.C., where unemployment and foreclosures have locals wondering when the dividends of the American vacation economy will shine upon them once more.







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
