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# Attorneys await rulings as trial looms

Lawyers were waiting Friday for 31st District Judge Steven Emmert to rule on last week's motions concerning the trial of a Missouri man accused of killing a family in 2005 south of Pampa.

Levi A. King, 26, of Pineville, Mo., is accused of murdering Brian Conrad, 31; Conrad's pregnant wife, Michell, 35, and her son Zach Doan, 14, in their rural Gray County home in the predawn hours of Sept. 30, 2005. His trial is

scheduled to begin June 29.

Earlier this month, 31st District Attorney Lynn Switzer filed a motion for a psychiatric examination of King and a motion limiting the defense attorneys comments in front of a jury.

A gag order issued in March by Judge Emmert is on appeal before the Seventh Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

In May, defense attorneys, Joe Marr Wilson and Maxwell Peck, filed a motion to preclude the death penalty in King's case as a sentencing option because of reduced capacity due to mental illness.

The motion states that King's conscious desire is reduced by impairments of his cognitive ability and his ability has been reduced by mental illness. The mental illness, the defense said in their motion, causes a loss of touch with reality and severe confusion and paranoia. That, in turn, can lead to psychotic collapse, nervous breakdown and disorganized thought and speech.

Switzer, in her motion, said that of the 59 pre-trial motions filed by the defense team, 25 contain unsubstantiated allegations of drug, physical and emotional

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She wants the judge to ask the defense team if they intend to make an issue of the defendant's mental health and, if so, grant a psychiatric examination by physicians selected by the prosecution.

Switzer also moved to limit what the defense can say in front of KING cont. on page 3

# Two arrested on felony charges

A Pampa man and a woman from Lefors have been charged in connection with the production of methamphetamines.

Justice of the peace, Joe Martinez set bond for the pair on Friday.

Bond for Heiskell was set at \$26,000

and Smith's was set at \$11,500.

Both remain in the Gray County Jail.

# What passed in the 81st session? Senator says he doesn't know yet

CHILDRESS - Three days after the Texas Legislature adjourned for this biennium, Pampa's lawmakers joked that they were still trying figure out what bills passed in the chaos of the closing days.

"You never know what bills passed," said State Sen. Robert Duncan, who represents Pampa. "It takes about three or four days to kind of figure out what bills passed and what didn't in the last days of the session."

Duncan and State Representative Warren Chisum were in Childress Thursday for a town hall meeting to discuss this year's 140 day legislative session.

"We had a tough session, quite frankly," Duncan said.

The Senate started off the session with a Voter ID

package.

"We thought it was important to be able to verify who you are when you show up at the ballot box," Duncan said. "We had to change the rules in the Senate a little to actually pass that, but we did pass that


in the Senate early."

The House, he said, had a little more difficulty because of an even party split with 74 Democrats and 74 Republicans

"As a result," Duncan said, "Voter ID was delayed getting to the House floor, which caused a lot of problems with the calendar."

He said the Democrats were able to stop Voter ID.

Duncan said that as he arrived at Stonyridge Golf
Course here Thursday morning for his town hall
meeting, he heard that the U.S. Department of Justice
had disapproved Georgia's Voter ID law so passing a

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#### District clerk, ex-county judge indicted

EL PASO, Texas (AP) A district clerk and former El Paso County judge are accused of bribery, fraud and other charges in an alleged scheme to award a county contract in exchange for part of a multimillion-dollar contract, according to an indictment unsealed Friday

District clerk Gilbert Sanchez and attorney Luther Jones appeared in federal court Friday where they were informed they each faced a count of bribery, conspiracy to commit wire fraud and deprivation of honest services, conspiracy to commit mail fraud and deprivation of honest services, and mail fraud and depravation of honest services

Neither was required to enter a plea during the hearing.

Stephen Peters, Jones' lawyer, declined to comment on the case but said that Jones looked forward to his day in court.

"Anything he actually did was not only not illegal, but was actually in the best interest of the public," Peters said.

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Orlando Mondragon, one of Sanchez's lawyers, declined to comment after the brief hearing.

The pair is accused of working in 2003 and 2004 to ensure a technology contract to digitize

#### **Houston man** gets 75 years for 10th DWI

ANGLETON, Texas (AP) — A Houston-area man has been sentenced to 75 years in prison for his 10th drunken driving conviction.

A Brazoria County jury convicted 48-yearold Keith Gregory Peltier (PEL'-teer) of Manvel.

District Attorney Jeri Yenne (YEN'-ee) described Peltier as "a time bomb in a car."

Defense attorney Jon Jaworski described the sentence, over a May 2008 traffic stop, as "excessive." An appeal is planned.

The Brazosport Facts reported Friday that Peltier's previous longest prison term for DWI was years to life behind bars when he was sentenced Thursday.

Peltier will be eligible for parole after serving one-fourth of his sentence.

The indictment listed eight previous convictions since 1986, but an investigator with the district attorney's office says Peltier had nine prior DWI con-

#### Nearly \$293,000 found in SUV bumpers

Sentencing is Sept. 8. McDaniel faces a maximum life prison term.

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


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
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NEW YORK (AP) -Oil prices broke through the \$70 per-barrel barrier Friday and more forecasters are broadening expectations for an upward swing in crude.

Benchmark crude for July delivery lost 37 cents to settle at \$68.44 on the New York Mercantile Exchange, finishing the week with a gain of nearly \$2 a barrel. Earlier in the day oil jumped as high as \$70.32 per barrel, the highest since October.

Oil prices have been soaring for months despite a massive surplus of petroleum and natural gas. A large amount of speculative money has flowed into the markets, according to government reports, potentially taking advantage of a weak U.S. currency.

Surging energy prices appear to be outpacing an economic recovery for now, and there are con-

cerns that consumers may pull back spending further, especially with retail gasoline nearing the \$3 mark.

"That everyday, inyour-face experience of seeing higher gas prices at the pump; that has quite an impact on people's psyche," said Tom Kloza, publisher and chief oil analyst at Oil Price Information Service.

"There's this feeling of 'here we go again' with what happened last year," Kloza said. "It hurts discretional spending. It leaves people to think about not taking those summer vacations.

Gas prices added another 2 cents overnight, climbing to a new national average of \$2.592 a gallon, according to auto club AAA, Wright Express and Oil Price Information Service. A gallon of gas costs 48.2 cents more than it did a month ago, but it's \$1.397 cheaper than last year. This week, Goldman

Sachs revised its forecast and predicted that oil would rally to \$85 a barrel by the end of the year as the economy stabilizes and OPEC production cuts take

The forecast assumes, however, that the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries will stick to its cuts — and that has never been a sure bet.

Yet even news that could be perceived as negative on the surface has brought more money into oil mar-

The Labor Department said Friday that employers cut 345,000 jobs in May, the fewest since September. On Thursday, it said the nation's unemployment rolls fell for the first time in 20 weeks.

Still, the unemployment rate was 9.4 percent in May, the highest level in

more than 25 years. One of the reasons that gasoline costs nearly \$1.40 per gallon less than last year are the massive layoffs the have millions fewer people commuting to work.

Signs that major employers such as manufacturers, and consumers are suffering badly continues to arrive in government energy reports.

Industrial and residential natural gas consumption plunged in March, according to an Energy Department report this week. Storage facilities continue to swell with huge stocks of unused crude and natural gas.

Analyst Stephen Schork

noted that 14 GM factories will be idled because of the automaker's bankruptcy. That is another 450 football fields worth of power and Btu demand that is about to go missing from the market," he said.

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
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#### Murder charge dropped 2 weeks before trial

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A capital murder charge has been dropped against a man just two weeks before his trial for the 1997 robbery and murder of his college roommate's mother.

Prosecutors said they made the decision because of Michael Puryear's credible alibi, weak DNA evidence and questions about the truthfulness of a main witness.

"There just wasn't any other option," Bob Gill, a prosecutor with the Tarrant County District Attorney's Office, said Wednesday.

The dismissal was a blow to the family of Verna Dennis, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported.

Her daughter Rebecka Eggers said she felt bad about how this has affected Puryear's life if he is innocent, but that "unfortunately, it appears we will be forced to live with the uncertainty."

Dennis' mother, Wynema Drury, 82, said she had been eagerly awaiting the trial, set to start June 15, although she had not planned to attend.

"I thought, 'Will I live long enough to see it?'" she said.

Puryear's attorney, Larry Moore, said he respected

prosecutors for making the "right decision."

"When you're not sure you have the right guy, you don't go forward," Moore said. "It's really simple."

Although the crime for which Puryear was charged carries a possible death penalty as punishment, prosecutors waived the death penalty, Gill said Friday, adding that he was not privy to that discussion. So Puryear faced a maximum punishment of life in prison if he had been convicted.

The body of Dennis, 56, the co-owner of a beauty salon, was found by friends arriving at her home for Bible study. She had been struck 23 times on the head, and her throat was cut with a butcher knife, an autopsy reported.

In 2005, a man told police that Puryear had confided that he killed Dennis, the mother of Puryear's college roommate at Southwestern University in Georgetown. Investigators have said that, in addition to details about the case that only the killer could know, DNA linked Puryear to the crime scene.

But the district attorney's investigation determined that the informant's story was not credible, Gill said Wednesday, declining to elaborate.

Moore said that the man took a polygraph test Monday that was inconclusive, but the examiner who issued the report believed the man was untruthful. The man had gone to police seeking a deal in which authorities would dismiss a felony charge against him and he would testify against Puryear, Moore said.

Gill also said DNA evidence linking Puryear to the crime was not strong and "could have belonged to a very, very large group of people. It's not the one-in-a-trillion odds that we might see on TV."

Puryear, 31, was arrested in 2006 and has been free on bail for two years.

#### Session

Voter ID bill in the Texas Legislature may have been in vain anyway.

"The Obama Justice Department is going to take a harder view on those types of issues than would have the Bush Justice Department," Duncan said.

The Senator said changes in voting laws in southern states have to be cleared by the U.S. Department of Justice because of the Voting Rights Act.

"At the end of the day," he said, "when you look at what happened, I think we had a pretty good session on some things. On other things, we'll probably have to wait another day."

He said that the session ended with the Texas Department of Transportation bill and the Texas Department of Insurance bill not passing, and there was no safety net bill passed for them.

"Unless we do something," Duncan said, "those agencies will start winding down in about a year."

For that reason, Duncan thinks Gov. Rick Perry will call a Special Session next year (The Texas Legislature meets in regular session for 140 days only in odd numbered years).

Duncan said the Senate took a hard position on the Texas Department of Transportation because there was \$2 billion dollars in Proposition 12 bonds that were not issued that would have supported highway construction.

Proposition 12 was a constitutional amendment that passed in 2007 that provided for \$5 billion in bonds for highway improvements.

"We felt like we needed to force the issue on those bonds," Duncan said.

Duncan said that if the state isn't funding construction in the cities, then TxDoT raids their maintenance funds from the rural counties.

The Senator said it was the most contentious session that he's seen.

"For rural Texas," he said, "I think we had some good results."

Part of that was a bill

that helps rural communi-

ties gain doctors.

Duncan said that Chisum passed one of the bill concerning rural physicians by changing the way the state taxes smokeless tobacco.

weight rather than price. "That raised about \$90 million," Duncan said.

Of that \$90 million expected to flow into the state coffers, \$30 to \$40 million will go into the Physician Loan Repayment Plan.

"That allows physicians to come work in rural areas and have their medical school loans repaid if they work in rural areas," Duncan said.

The rest of the money expected to come in was used to raise the exemption on the state's franchise tax to \$600,000 and maybe as much as \$1 million, depending upon the figures that the Texas State Comptroller comes up with.

"The small businessman is going to get a significant tax because of what Warren Chisum did," Duncan said.

He said the Legislature also improved oil field cleanup provisions. "It was the lack of oil

"It was the lack of oil field electrical safety that caused the fires that ravaged this area four years ago," Duncan said.

He said the Legislature appropriated a lot of money this past spring, but a lot of it was federal stimulus money.

"Without the stimulus money, we would have had an even tougher session," Duncan said.

Chisum said that when the Legislature saw the federal stimulus money coming down, they reduced the general revenue in the budget.

"Everyone of those programs that are funded with Obama dollars specifically says that once the money is spent, that program goes away," Chisum said, "so we're not stuck with anything that we're going to

have to fund in the future."
Chisum said Texas did
turn down \$550 million in
stimulus money because

it would have required a significant change on businesses and how they had to

pay unemployment taxes.

Duncan said that federal money generally has strings attached to it.

"We're in good shape,"
Duncan said. "We have about \$9 billion that we left in the bank because we think the next legislative session is going to be even tougher if this economy doesn't turn around."

Duncan said he doesn't think it will by the time the Legislature meets again in two years.

Depending upon the price of oil, the state could enter its next legislative session in 2011 with \$11 or \$12

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
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

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## Shooting changes guitarist's life

Texas (AP)— Lloyd Dalton would be the first to tell you he's not a deeply religious man. He's just a country musician who says God protected him one Friday night almost two years ago at O'Neill's Sports Tavern. The night a man aimed a gun at Dalton in the Marble Falls bar after shooting a bartender who got in his way.

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"I don't know if you're a Christian or not, and it's none of my business," Dalton said. "But God was with me that night, and it's changed my life.'

Police said the man accused of being the gunman, Paul Devoe III, shot five other people after leaving the bar. Devoe is now in the Travis County Correctional Complex awaiting trial on capital murder charges in the deaths of two of the vic-

Dalton said the shooting put him at a crossroads.

The 75-year-old has spent more than half a century gracing country music stages with his Willie Nelson-style guitar picking, playing mostly on weekends and doing occasional backup gigs for country stars. After that night in O'Neill's, his new stage is in the auditoriums of local churches and the cafeterias of nursing homes, where he honors God for the talents he's been given and looks for healing and understanding.

Dalton grew up west of Dallas in the country, where he learned to play guitar by strumming along to the country tunes of Eddy Arnold and Ernest Tubb he heard on his Philco radio.

By the time he graduated from high school, he was fixing telephone poles and installing wires for Mountain Bell Telephone & Telegraph in El Paso, and on the weekends he and the five other members of the Texas Trailblazers would travel as far as Arizona to play shows.

"I'd make more money in one night with the band than I could in a whole week working my job," Dalton said. "I spent all my free time smoking cigarettes, drinking beer, playing guitar and having a great time."

After Dalton's father advised him to find a good job because there wasn't money for college, Dalton put his focus on work; his band only made occasional television appearances on Channel 4. One of his coworkers told Dalton that her little sister Polly had seen him on TV and was crazy about him. The coworker later introduced them, and the two were married in 1959. The couple moved to Austin after the births of three children Lloyd Jr., Jenny and Kyle.


Lloyd Dalton kept at his passion, too. He performed at opries all over Central Texas. He played mariachi guitar in Juarez, Chihuahua, with Johnny Cash. He was backup lead guitarist for country stars like Webb Pierce, Hank Locklin and Patsy Cline. But only on the weekends.

In 1978, Dalton received a promotion to area manager, a job that transferred him to Waco.

Lloyd and Polly Dalton and their son Kyle were in a hotel room in Waco after closing on a new house on Dec. 22 when they received the phone call. Jenny, their 19-year-old daughter, had been in a head-on collision on U.S. 183 that killed her, her boyfriend and a passenger in the other car. The other driver, who had been drinking, suffered two broken knees and served three years' probation.

Dalton said his daughter's death left a hole in his heart that never fully healed.

Dalton's sons graduated from college and started lives of their own. Lloyd Jr. owns an electronic installation company and works

When Lloyd Dalton got home after that night in the bar, Polly Dalton was standing in their open garage. The two embraced and cried for a long time.

Afterward, Lloyd Dalton would wake up thinking about that night. Other nights, he couldn't fall asleep.

"I would close my eyes and see that man walking straight towards me with that gun," said Dalton, who said he will never forget the gunman's face. "It makes me sick when his picture shows up in the newspaper."

Dalton began seeing a Christian counselor, who told him he was dealing with post-traumatic stress disorder and tried to help him find his way through church and prayer.


It took several months for Dalton to sleep through the night.

In January 2008, he lay in Seton Medical Center recovering from knee replacement surgery in room 609 while his wife was in room 613 with a broken shoulder after she tripped over a curb outside the hospital. It took more than five months for them to recover, and during that time, Dalton said he finally understood God's path for

"What happened to me, I felt like the good Lord was speaking to me," Dalton said. "I told him I wouldn't do any more of this country stuff, no more opries, no more traveling, but I would praise him for giving me these skills instead."

Dalton, whose parents lived out their final days in a nursing home with Alzheimer's disease and dementia, decided to dedicate his energies to nursing homes and charities.

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# 4 travelers missed doomed Flight 447

PARIS (AP) — A reservation mixup, an overbooking and a Brazilian cabbie's passion for soccer are all that separated some would-be passengers on Air France flight 447 from the fate of 228 others who lost their lives in the mid-Atlantic.

The survivors say their relief is overshadowed by the immense sense of loss they feel for those who didn't make it.

"It feels miraculous and sad at the same time," said Amina Benouargha-Jaffiol, who tried to get on the flight Sunday night, even enlisting a diplomat friend to try to pressure Air France to let her and her husband on.

"Of course, at some level we feel lucky, but we also feel an enormous sadness for all those who perished," she

For some it was a simple matter of arriving at Rio's airport late; for Andrej Aplinc, it was because he got there

The 39-year-old Slovenian sailor and father of two was spared because his cab driver was in a hurry to see a soccer match.

With time to spare at the airport, Apline, who was supposed to take Flight 447, learned there was no seat on the plane with enough legroom for him to stretch out his bum knee. But since he'd arrived early, he was able to board an earlier 4 p.m. Air France flight, which did have a roomy seat.

"It was such huge luck that I flew with that earlier plane," Aplinc said from his home in Radelj Ob Dravi in northeastern

Gustavo Ciriaco was scheduled to be on that 4 p.m. flight. But he arrived late at the check-in and was told airline agents could not find his seat and the gate was about to close.

The 39-year-old Brazilian choreographer and dancer was on his way to Europe for two weeks of rehearsals for his next ballet, and had a connecting flight to catch in Paris.

Ciriaco pleaded to be let him on the plane, and finally the airline discovered the seating error and relented.

If the reservation mix-up hadn't been resolved, "I would have tried to take the following flight because I would have arrived in Paris with enough time to catch my connection," Ciriaco said.

The next flight? Air France 447.

"Survivors" like these often need psychological counseling, said Guillaume Denoix de Saint-Marc, whose father was among the 170 people killed in 1989 when Libyan terrorists downed UTA Flight 772 with a suitcase bomb. He now heads an association that helps victims of airline disasters.

"They can have big psychological problems. We meet a lot of people like that," said Denoix de Saint-Marc, who was asked by French authorities to counsel relatives of the victims of Flight 447 at a crisis center at Paris' airport.

In the case of UTA flight 772, some of the pilots and cabin crew who had flown the French DC-10 jetliner before handing it over to the doomed crew "couldn't resume their careers," Denoix de Saint-Marc said.

"They lost their flying licenses because of big psychological problems or alcoholism," he said.

Such traumas have a name: "Survivors' syndrome," seen often in combat and other crisis situations in which those who make it feel as though they fled, deserted their buddies or were cowardly, said psychiatrist Ronan Orio.

But being saved by the ticket counter, traffic or other caprices of life should not be considered traumatic, said Orio, who has worked with victims of hostage situations, terror attacks and airline crashes.

Instead, near-miss situations should be viewed in a positive light, he said.

"People who take a plane and have a second chance win the lotto. They have the right to continue where the others died," he said.

Benouargha-Jaffiol and her husband Claude Jaffiol got a second chance last

The couple, who live in Montpellier, France, had pulled strings to try to get on Flight 447, even drafting a family friend, a Dutch diplomat, to phone Air France and try to get them seats on the overcrowded plane.

She and her husband finally left the airport, returning Monday after the

'This type of tragedy should give us all a lesson in humility and humanism," she said. "No one lives forever. We often forget that."

#### Guitar

Health Care Center in Marble Falls and asked for a chance to sing and play his guitar. The center already had a duo that played regularly but agreed to grant Dalton an audition.

He played a few songs before putting the guitar down and shaking hands with the few residents who listened to him. Dalton said he was humbled by the circumstances they had to overcome. Afterward, he told his wife he had finally found his niche.

A year and a half later, Dalton said he has more gigs than ever. He gets paid to play regular shows at five venues, mostly for people with Alzheimer's or dementia. He wears an American flag shirt to show his patriotism, makes jokes about his age and laughs with the crowd as he plays old country and gospel songs from his youth. The audience members clap their hands and sway along.

"Some of them can't even talk, but they know my songs," Dalton said. "There's been a couple times where I come home and I shed tears of joy that I can serve folks like that."

L.C. Johnston, a minister at First United Methodist Church in Burnet, where Dalton plays for people with dementia, says he has noticed a change in his friend of 14 years.

"Lloyd has experienced quite the transformation over the past two years," Johnston said. "He went from secularity to frequently talking about his faith and the reasons for it. It's made him a better person."

On March 3, Dalton's phone rang, and the voice on the other end asked him, "Are you Lloyd Dalton, the musician? I'm Alberta Allred, Mike's mother."

Allred had seen Dalton play at a Victims of Violent Crimes event months before and later realized he had been at the bar the night her son was shot. She said she'd had his number for a long time, but she needed to wait until she was strong enough to talk to him.

"He tried to bring me comfort by telling me what he went through with his daughter's death," Allred said.

Dalton told her it would be tough. "I said, 'You're going to have so many people try to do things for you to make you feel better, but it won't. We've been there. We're in the same club now.'

"Jenny's death will always be there. Life goes on, and you have to go on with it, but you never forget," Dalton said.

Allred told Dalton about

her son.

"If there was ever anyone who needed to be helped, he'd be there," she said. "Mike was big and tall and easy to talk to.'

The two talked for an hour and a half about how her son used to carry a Bible with him and how his daughter tried out for the Dallas Cowboys cheerleaders.

He and Allred talked about life and prayer and how that night in the bar changed Dalton's direction in life.

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Devoe's jury selection is scheduled to begin Sept. 10. In the meantime, Dalton says he's as busy as ever, "pickin' and grinnin'." He says he's also happier than ever.

"The good Lord was talking to me that night, and I am so glad I've been able to answer.'

## Innocence group taking DNA case reviews statewide

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DALLAS (AP) — The Innocence Project of Texas said Thursday it's taking its groundbreaking Dallas campaign of reviewing DNA claims state-

Chief Counsel Jeff Blackburn said he is sending a letter to every Texas judge and district attorney, encouraging them to refer cases to the Innocence Project of Texas. Blackburn's group has been part of the effort that has led to more than 20 Dallas County cases in which a judge has set aside a conviction based on DNA

"We're going to go after wrongful convictions in every single court in every single county in this state and come back with another Tim Cole case or two or three," Blackburn said.

Cole was a wrongly convicted

man who died in prison in 1999 while serving time for a rape that DNA testing cleared him of last year. He is the state's first posthumous DNA exoneree.

Flanked by three wrongly convicted exonerees who spent more than 70 combined years in prison, Blackburn said it's dangerous to think that "every wrongful case comes out of Dallas." Dallas County leads the nation with 21 DNA exonerations; Texas' 38 DNA exonerations are also a national high.

"All the people claiming innocence in prison are not from Dallas," said Cory Session, Cole's brother and the policy director for the Innocence Project of Texas. "They are from all over the state.

A \$25,000 grant from the Texas Bar Foundation will help the group proceed with its statewide effort, Blackburn said. The

cash-strapped innocence group has been looking for funding sources after part of a \$400,000 grant fell through when the donor lost money in the Ponzi scheme run by financier Bernie Madoff.

Among Texas DAs, only Dallas County District Attorney Craig Watkins has actively cooperated with innocence groups, one factor that has led to the frequent pace of exonerations there.

"I know you receive letters from inmates all the time who claim they are innocent and that you should reinvestigate their case," Blackburn writes in his letter. "If you want to refer such claims and letters to us, we would be glad to investigate them."

Session and Blackburn also praised the Texas Legislature for passing a bill named for Cole that makes Texas the most generous state in the nation in compensating the wrongly convicted. Each exoneree will receive \$80,000 for each year they were imprisoned, plus a lifetime annuity that on average is worth another \$40,000 a year.

That means an exoneree who spent 20 years in prison will receive a \$1.6 million lump sum; plus the \$40,000 annuity. Exonerees will start collecting their money when the new law

takes effect in September.

"I think the compensation is great," said Billy Smith, who spent 20 years in prison for a wrongful conviction of aggravated sexual assault. "But witness identification is just as important to me as compensation.'

The exonerees and Innocence Project of Texas officials lamented the Legislature's failure to pass a witness identification bill that would have required police departments to have a written policy in place for the presentation of photo arrays and suspect lineups. In nearly all the Dallas County cases, eyewitness misidentification was a factor in convicting an innocent person.

But the eyewitness identification bill was one of many that got lost in the Legislature's political fight over voter ID legislation. Its failure to become law "will result in more innocent people being convicted in the trial courts of this state - right here, right now," Blackburn said.

Blackburn and Session said they would request the eyewitness ID bill be revived in the 2011 session, or if the governor calls for a special session.

"Voter ID is not going to cost anyone their life. Eyewitness ID will," Session said. "It's extremely disheartening. We were very disappointed in the fact that we got so close and the wrong ID got picked instead of the correct ID.'

## Buffalo crash opened window into pilots' life

CLARENCE, N.Y. (AP) - Long-suffering pilots for commuter airlines say it's about time that Washington and passengers alike pay attention to the cockpit, where pilots may be exhausted, undertrained — and paid less than the bus or cab drivers who'd ferried their passengers to the airport.

"We have been calling for years trying to get the public to understand what their lifestyle is really like,' said Capt. Paul Rice, first vice president of the Air Line Pilots Association, International, the nation's largest pilot's union, representing 54,000 flyers.

The plight of many commuter pilots was revealed at a recent federal hearing into the Feb. 12 crash of Continental Connection Flight 3407 near Buffalo that killed 50 people.

National The Transportation Safety Board's hearing set off a cry in Congress for a review of safety at regional carriers, including training, scheduling and pay issues. The Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee has scheduled hearings Wednesday and June 17 on pilot fatigue and safety. A House hearing is also planned for June, although no date has been set.

Like Flight 3407's copilot, Rebecca Shaw, Capt. Dave Ryter earned around \$17,000 in his first year with a regional carrier and flew coast-to-coast just to get to work because of his placement in Miami.

"My wife held down a job and we lived in an apartment about 45 minutes north of Los Angeles International (Airport) and scraped by," said Ryter, who has 10 years with his regional airline and is a union officer with ALPA.

Regional carriers like Ryter's, and Shaw's employer, Colgan Air, handle about half of all domestic departures and about a quarter of the passengers, about 160 million yearly, often flying under the names of their larger partner airlines, like Continental or USAir.

But with smaller planes, shorter routes and less experienced pilots, they pay considerably less than their larger counterparts, despite pilot schedules that can include multiple daily flights for six days in a

Rice described draining 14- to 16-hour duty days, much of that time unpaid and spent waiting in crew lounges. With no food on planes, pilots grab meals on the run from airport fast-food stands. Perks like holiday and overtime pay don't exist, he said.

To earn six to eight hours of pay, "you can come to work at seven in the morning for an eight o'clock departure and park your last flight at nine o'clock that night," said Rice, whose union favors tougher FAA regulations on how many consecutive hours pilots can fly or be on duty. The issue has lingered on the agendas of the FAA and the NTSB since the mid-1990s.

Pilots said fatigue and lower pay are eroding the quality of pilots entering the airline industry, both at regional and major car-

"It used to be that airline pilot jobs were a coveted position," said veteran pilot Jeff Skiles, the first officer of US Flight 1549, which collided with Canada geese after takeoff from New York's LaGuardia Airport in January and ditched into the Hudson River.

"But even at the major

airline level, with the bankruptcies and how they've decimated our contracts, it's just not an attractive job any more," Skiles said. "People aren't leaving the military to become pilots - there are plenty of other options. For instance, corporate flying has exploded quite a bit. What you're finding is the qualifications of the entry level pilots in the traditional airline business have gone from adequate to very inadequate."

During last month's annual meeting of the Regional Airlines Association, one executive said the threeday NTSB hearing into the Flight 3407 crash provided a skewed view of safety in an industry that, he said, treats entry-level professionals no differently than any other industry.

"We have a very robust safety management sys-tem in place," said Joseph Randell, president and chief executive of Air Canada Jazz. "In a lot of industries, entry-level conditions are onerous for junior people who come in at a lower pay. There's nothing unique about the airline business in that respect."

Russell "Chip" Childs, president and chief operating officer of Delta partner SkyWest Airlines Inc., said his company's research shows no correlation between pay and proficiency.

"People need to understand also that first-year pilot pay is a little bit lower because the companies put in \$30,000 in training costs into that individual that first year. That's very well accepted," Childs said.

"Regional airlines pay so little at that entry level because they can," said Louis Smith, a retired Northwest Airlines captain and president of FltOps.

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
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
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
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


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








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


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# New drug war strategy focuses on weapons and cash

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Obama administration officials said Friday they will devote more resources to fighting Mexican drug cartels and use new technology to thwart them while trying to quell the U.S. demand for drugs that fuels the violent gangs.

Attorney General Eric Holder and Homeland Security Janet Napolitano announced a 2009 counternarcotics strategy at a press conference with White House drug czar Gil Kerlikowske. Holder called it "an effective way forward that will crack down on cartels and make our country safer."

The strategy calls for a number of steps along the U.S.-Mexico border to combat and detect smugglers, including:

-- Building visual shields near border-crossing points so drug cartel spotters can't alert approaching motorists about inspections.

Improving non-lethal weapons technology to help officers incapacitate suspects and disable motor vehicles and boats used by traffickers.

Revive an interagency working group to coordinate intelligence.

- Use more intelligence analysts to ferret out drugdealing networks.

"This strategy is tough, it's strong and it's balanced," Holder said.

The plan is outlined in a document to be sent to Congress.

Holder and Napolitano praised efforts by Mexican President Felipe Calderon and said the United States must contribute to the fight.

"International cooperation is very, very key," Napolitano said. "We have an unprecedented opportunity to work on drug trafficking on both sides of the border. We should not let this opportunity go by."

Rep. Bennie Thompson, chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee, said the strategy is missing a key piece: "I am disappointed that it does not call on departments of Homeland Security and Justice to resolve their long-standing turf battles over drug investigations," the Mississippi Democrat said.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement wants more of its agents to have the authority to do drug investigations. But this can only happen if the Drug Enforcement Administration agrees. No such agreement has been reached.

Napolitano conceded the plan outlined Friday doesn't address that issue but said Homeland Security and Justice officials have been working on it and will announce a solution "very, very shortly."

Dozens of state and federal law enforcement officials, state elected leaders, emergency management officials and state and federal prosecutors crowded a University of New Mexico ballroom for the announcement.

oping new technology to process biometric information from documents used by Mexicans crossing the border. That would allow Customs and Border Patrol officers to run fingerprint checks on Mexicans who have border crossing cards

to enter the U.S.

The Obama administration has pledged to provide more help in the effort, sending additional federal agents, officers, and equipment to the border and to Mexico to fight the Mexican cartels.

Napolitano said the U.S. strategy would also focus on reducing demand from drug users. The plan includes improved ways for federal agencies to share information with

state and local law enforcement agencies.

"We can't just fight drugs at the border. We can't just fight drugs by fighting traffickers. We must fight drugs in the United States," Napolitano said.

The Marijuana Policy Project, which supports regulating the drug like alcohol, criticized the plan.

"This new effort will keep a lot of cops and bureaucrats employed but will accomplish very little otherwise, because it ignores the central problem, which is that marijuana prohibition has handed the Mexican cartels a massive market that keeps them fat and happy," said the group's spokesman, Bruce Mirken.
