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King Jury selection begins today

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Jury selection was scheduled to begin Tuesday in the capital murder trial of a man accused of killing a pregnant woman, her husband

and young son in the Texas Panhandle in 2005.

Prosecutors are seeking the death penalty against Levi King, 26. He's already serving a life sentence for killing two people in his home state of Missouri the day before the Texas slay-

Jury selection could take several weeks, a Lubbock County court official said.

Prosecutor Lynn Switzer declined to comment on the case Monday, citing a gag order. King's attorney, Joe Mar Wilson of Amarillo, did not immediately return a call.

The bodies of Brian Conrad, 31, Michell Conrad, 35, and Zach Doan, her 14-year-old son were found slain in their home south of Pampa on Sept. 30, 2005. Michell Conrad was six months pregnant with the couple's

Michell Conrad's daughter, 10 at the time, survived and called 911. Texas authorities have not released the 911 tape, any details about how the girl survived or what she might have seen. It was not clear

History in full view at the Hoedown

OLD MOBEETIE - Sitting along the wall of the new visitor's center, waiting to be hung, is a painting of legendary gunfight Bat Masterson shooting it out with a cavalry trooper over a saloon girl in Joe and Janie Van Zandt's living room.

Of course, it wasn't the Van Zandt's living room at the time. It was the Lady Gay Saloon in Mobeetie, a town filled with saloons in January, 1876.

Sgt. Melvin King was the cavalry trooper who died in the fight. His shot killed Mollie Brennan, the blue-eyed, black-haired beauty who threw herself in front of Masterson and saved his life. Brennan is buried in the neatly kept cemetery at Mobeetie, along with Cap. Arrington, Wheeler County's first sheriff and patriarch of a local ranching family, and Louise Houston, the threeyear-old daughter of Temple Houston, son of the first President of the Republic of Texas, Sam Houston, who practiced law in Mobeetie.

Such is the history that will meet guests at the new Old Mobeetie Visitor's Center.

Like most of Old Mobeetie. it's not new. It's the old school building. Actually, it was the second school built. The first one, a rock building, was torn down. The high school was built in New Mobeetie a mile or so to the north, or as local residents call it, "New


The school district was established in 1882.

Pampa man dies in rollover accident

crash at around 2 a.m. Tuesday morning, according to The Texas Department of Safety.

Stephen Leon Alexander 51, of Officer for the DPS, Alexander 51, Pampa, Texas died as a result of a vehicle rollover crash that occurred 2.5 miles east of Pampa on US 60 in Gray County.

According to Trooper Gabriel Medrano, Public Information

was the driver of a Ford Explorer traveling east on US 60 in Gray County. The vehicle veered off of the roadway to the south striking a light pole.

The vehicle continued along the

south ditch and began to overturn, ejecting the driver as it rolled. Alexander was pronounced dead at the scene. Alexander was not wearing a safety belt at the time of the crash, according to the DPS report.

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Tribune-Herald to cease printing in Waco

WACO, Texas (AP) The Waco Tribune-Herald will cease printing and packaging at its Waco shop, effective July 13.

Publisher Belinda Gaudet (gaw-DAY') says the Tribune-Herald will outsource those functions to its Cox Newspapers sibling Austin American-Statesman. She says that move and the elimination of 25 full-time and 18 parttime positions are aimed at cutting costs.

Gaudet says the affected workers will be offered severance of base pay

and benefits for eight to 26 weeks, depending on seniority.

The cuts will reduce the staff to 162, down 31 percent from August.

Gaudet notes the consolidation is part of an industrywide trend. The Tribune-Herald will still be written, edited and designed in Waco with finished page layouts sent electronically to Austin.

The newspaper's roots date back to 1892. Cox bought the Tribune-Herald

80 gang members arrested in Texas sweep

HOUSTON (AP) — U.S. immigration officials say 80 street gang members have been arrested in a five-day sweep through Houston, Beaumont and Corpus Christi.

Federal, state and local officers made the arrests as part of a national initiative targeting transnational gangs, officials said Tuesday. The sweep also nabbed 36 immigration status violators.

Sixty face criminal charges and 13 re-entered the country illegally after being deported. The remaining 43 were arrested on immigration violations and are in custody.



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
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

TV news and the Fairness Doctrine

Let's bring back the Fairness Doctrine that required television journalists to at least attempt to be fair. That's right, there was a magic time in American when the suits at the three main networks, ABC, NBC and CBS had to set aside a certain amount of air time devoted to controversial topics or current affairs and all sides of an issue had to be presented. The regulation worked so well that Congress made it a law in 1959 and it lasted almost forty years and helped shape the way the American public viewed news anchors, at least before 1984 when it was repealed.

The Fairness Doctrine was started in 1949 just as television was barely making headway into living rooms and created an expectation by viewers that TV news producers had their best interests in mind when assigning news stories. Radio had a similar policy dating to 1927 and was started by the FCC's forerunner, the Federal Radio Commission. It was also common practice to keep entert inment divisions, which gave shows the axe based on ratings, far apart from news divi-

sions.

News programs that didn't garner great ratings but were considered in the public good were left on the air as a means to fulfill the requirement. That at least gave average Americans a fighting chance at forming their own opinions rather than being spoon fed the bits that someone else, whether a liberal or conservative, had decided voters needed to know.

Policy makers saw the power of advertising and knew that dollars could drive a news show with the results being a skewed message. The public wouldn't have the resources to know whether or not they were receiving a fair and balanced broadcast or just what someone with enough money or political pull wanted them to know

pull wanted them to know. There is an old saw that things used to be better in America. That whole idea requires a lot of overlooking or denial in order to really pull off and is probably best attempted in locker rooms at country clubs. However, the economic debacles and looming health care crisis have left a whiff of reform in the air once again and TV journalism is something that could stand some tinkering. It used to be better in America

And this is one reform that wouldn't silence either side because it doesn't address what can't be on the air but instead talks about what ought to be always available on the television airwaves. In the past, the Fairness Doctrine has ensured that those who held an opposing viewpoint, such as the National Rifle Association one day or Planned Parenthood the next, would still be heard.

Everyone could turn off their sets but the opportunity to voice how they felt was considered an American right. It's also a fundamental aspect of free speech to allow even those we don't agree with to have their say.

But since 1984 all of the major networks have come to see their news divisions as a part of the entire entertainment package and the quality of news has suffered as a result. Segments have become shorter and it's not unusual to see celebrity news lead a major newscast. It's obvious that ratings and therefore advertising dollars have become more important than 'affording reasonable opportunity for discussion of conflicting views on matters of public importance'.

It's why late night entertainer Jay Leno can walk down any street in America and ask who is the vicepresident, drawing blank stares but get a rundown on who's left in the American Idol competition. It gets a lot of yucks when he finds a school teacher or a guy in college who can't name the three branches of government or even one branch but it has an eventual affect on the quality of our democracy

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It works like this: if no one ever presents all the topics of the day then a smaller and smaller group gets to decide for us because we aren't even aware there's a discussion. Average citizens have busy lives and don't have the resources to seek out the topics. Eventually, a pattern of bypassing the public emerges and a lot of our rights have quietly ebbed away. If that sounds at all familiar, start E-mailing your congressman and ask about bringing back the Fairness Doctrine and a more lively discussion that won't mention Paris unless the topic is France.

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Representative Scott Hochberg responds to Governor's veto

If Governor Perry was denied a voter registration certificate because a clerk spelled his name "Peiry" instead of "Perry", we'd never hear the end of it. But that's what happens to 70,000 Texas citizens each year, who have their voter registration certificates delayed or denied, because of typos or misread handwriting in county offices that cause their names or birthdates not to pass a state "matching" test against the Department of Public Safety (DPS) drivers license file.

These are not mistakes made by voters who some-how forgot how to spell their names. Nor are they fraudulent applications. Rather, they represent a relatively small number of data entry errors on the hundreds of thousands of applications typed into the system each year by clerks in voter registration offices.

There used to be even more rejections, until the Secretary of State agreed to not deny applications because of differences in hyphens and other punctuation in names. This bill would have taken the next logical step, directing the Secretary of State allow for

minor, obvious typos when matching to the DPS file, if the rest of the information

matches.

Despite the governor's claim to the contrary, the bill does not take counties out of the process. In fact, for every suspected typo, the bill requires the county to go back and check the actual voter registration application to confirm that it really is consistent with the information on the DPS file. (See HB 1457, page 2, lines 11-18.)

This bill was the product of meetings with the Secretary of State, her predecessor and staff over the past interim, along with detailed research by my office showing that many Texans whose applications were rejected never got to vote. Even worse, our research showed that whether or not you are ultimately put on the rolls depends on where you live, since some counties put a higher priority on fixing their errors than do others.

These errors have nothing to do with fraud. The governor's argument on this point is not supported by ANY facts. Anyone who examines a list of the rejections sees immediately that the great majority of them are minor, innocent typos that should not interfere with a Texas citizen's right to vote.

Indeed, if a person wanted to register fraudulently in someone else's name, as the governor alleges, that person could simply leave the drivers license space blank on the application, and the registration would be issued without ever attempting to match it against the DPS drivers license file.

In a session where voting issues were high profile, contentious, and partisan, this bill received unanimous bipartisan votes in committee in each chamber, and was passed on House and Senate consent calendars. A small allocation for the necessary computer changes was also included in the appropriations bill.

The right to vote is precious and fundamental. Our current registration process allows this right to be withheld in large numbers at no fault of the citizens trying to register. Why would any elected official, charged with upholding the Constitution, not want to do everything possible to keep this from happening?

Mosquito facts and protection from West Nile Disease

After a mild winter and recent early summer rains in West Texas, mosquitoes are coming. People will be suffering from the annoying itch of mosquito bites. Before you worry about West Nile infection, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center epidemi-ologist Ronald Warner, D.V.M., Ph.D., reminds us of some facts and methods to prevent this mosquitoborne disease.

Dr. Warner, in the Department of Family and Community Medicine, said between March and June, "West Nile" mosquitoes prefer to feed on birds such as crows, ravens, robins, sparrows and jays. July to October, these mosquitoes shift their feeding preference to mammals, including humans. The female mosquitoes need to feast on protein enriched foods (blood) to develop and form their eggs. Once winter arrives adult mosquitoes will seek shelter in attics and under shingles and the bark on trees. Some unhatched mosquito eggs will be resistant to winter weather and survive until the return of spring rains.

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"Domestic pets, such as dogs and cats, are rarely infected with West Nile but horses, mules and donkeys are much more susceptible," Warner said. "There are several vaccinations to help prevent your horses from being infected by the West Nile virus."

Depending on a person's age and health condition, some may have serious effects from West Nile virus, if infected. Underlying diseases such as hypertension and kidney disease appear to increase the severity of West Nile disease. Younger people, especially transplant patients and others with immune suppression (e.g., cancer treatment), can also suffer severe effects.

On average, most West Nile diseases are acquired near the home because that is where people spend most of their outdoor time. Outdoor candles, torches and/or coils may be burned to produce a smoke that repels mosquitoes, but make sure the active ingredient contains the oil of citronella. Be aware of general fire hazards and use only under calm or windless weather conditions. A few more household tips to keep in mind: keep your grass fairly short, remove weeds in your alley, and always remember to practice the "4 Ds:"

☐ DEET is the active ingredient in "Off," but avoid applying high-concentrations (no more than 50% DEET); no more than 10% on small children. Also, use skin

application should last 4 to 6 hours, but apply after profuse sweating or swim-

 Dress appropriately if outdoors; wear long sleeves, long pants and apply mosquito repellent to the remaining area of skin that is not covered by your clothing. Permethrincontaining repellents (permanone) may be put on clothing, shoes and camping gear. Permethrintreated clothing repels ticks, mosquitoes and other arthropods and retains this effect even after repeated washings. However, if a garment is dry-cleaned, the repellent will need to be re-applied.

· Dusk and Dawn are the times during the day when mosquitoes are the most active.

· Drain ALL standing water around your home. Wadding pools - drain

repellants sparingly; one every other day; also flower pot basins, dog bowls, and kids toys. Any standing water will attract mosquitoes and provide a place for their eggs to develop and hatch.

There are many myths about mosquitoes. Warner said one myth is mosquitoes become larger with more rain; that is false.

"In Texas alone there are approximately 80 different documented species of mosquitoes. The time of year and local weather conditions determine what type of species we will have," Warner said.

Warner added that eating bananas, washing your mouth with Listerine and wearing dark clothes will not protect you from mosquito bites. Just remember to practice the 4 Ds and look for the active ingredients that help protect you and your loved ones.

2 soldiers with Texas ties die in action

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon reports Tuesday that two soldiers with Texas ties have died in Iraq and Afghanistan.

A 28-year-old Fort Hood soldier from Michigan died from a roadside bombing in Iraq, while a 20-year-old soldier from suburban Fort Worth has died in a vehicle rollover while serving in Afghanistan.

Army Sgt. Timothy A. David of Gladwin, Mich., died Sunday in Baghdad of wounds suffered from the roadside

bombing in Sadr City, Iraq. He served with the 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood.

Army Pfc. Peter K. Cross of Saginaw died Friday at Combat Outpost Carwile, Afghanistan, of injuries from the rollover. He served with the 2nd Battalion, 87th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum, N.Y.

Oil up to near \$72 on dollar fall

Oil prices rose to near \$72 a barrel Tuesday after briefly jumping above \$73, an eight-month high, due to a weakening U.S. dollar and attacks on oil installations in Nigeria.

Analysts also said prices were boosted by speculative trades and portfolio positioning by investment funds, which typically intensify at the end of a fiscal quarter.

By mid-afternoon in Europe, benchmark crude for August delivery was up 13 cents to \$71.62 a barrel in electronic trading on the New York Mercantile Exchange after trading as high as \$73.38




