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

Highland Baptist Church on the 1300 block of N. Banks, is working through Angel Food Ministries to provide Pampa residents with affordable meals.

Angel Food Ministries, according to their web site, is a non-profit, non-denominational organization providing food relief and financial support in communities across the United States. Pastor Paul Nachtigall said his Highland Baptist got involved with the ministry a couple of years ago.

"We found out it was available, and it was something we could do to assist people with limited income," Nachtigall said.

According to the Angel Food web site. Anyone can order food through Angel Food ministries regardless of their income. People can get the food by filling out an order with the church and paying for that order. A couple of weeks after they order, people can pick up their order on a distru-

Nachtigall says the number of people who order each month varies

'Some months we've had as low as 24, but we get between 24-32, and one month we had as high as 48," Nachtigall said.

Highland Baptist gets their food shipped to Amarillo and have volunteers pick it up. The volunteers put it together at the church. Nacthigall said volunteers





Popularity, Web snafus nearly broke 'clunkers'

NEW YORK (AP) This was one government stimulus plan that yielded quick results. Maybe too quick.

Far more drivers signed up for the "cash for clunkers" program than anyone thought, overwhelming showrooms, blowing through the initial \$1 billion set aside by Congress and leaving dealers panicked over when or if the government would make good on the hefty rebates.

Confusion reigned, even as dollars flowed into dealerships starved for business for months.

The government Web site set up to process rebates of up to \$4,500 per new car could not keep up with demand. Washington scrambled to come up with more cash and sent mixed signals about how the program would unfold.

"A borderline train wreck," said Charlie Swenson, general manBloomington, Minn. In Glen Burnie, Md., Bob Bell, who owns Ford, Kia and Hyundai dealerships, said his employees were overwhelmed filing for reimbursement from the government's clunky sys-

He compared the program to a military operation: "It is a disaster," Bell said. "We met our objective, but the losses were terrible.'

The House voted Friday to replenish the program

The Car Allowance Rebate System offers owners of old cars and trucks \$3,500 or \$4,500 toward a new, more fuel-efficient vehicle, in exchange for scrapping their old vehicle. Congress last month approved the plan to boost auto sales and remove some inefficient cars and trucks from the roads.

It was unclear how many cars had been sold under the program on Friday, but the number was far higher than anyone had expected. About 40,000 vehicle sales were done through the program but dealers estimated they were trying to complete transactions on an additional 200,000 vehicles, said Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich.

Texas college tuition fund going broke

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The program offered a deal to Texas parents with young children: prepay when Junior is small and you won't have to worry about the cost of tuition at a Texas university, even as rates climb. But with the rapidly rising cost of college, the Texas Guaranteed Tuition Plan is going broke.

Comptroller Susan Combs, whose office administers the fund, said the plans are guaranteed by the state, so parents who enrolled in the program will get their children's tuition bills paid. But the fund, covering tuition and fees for about 119,000 children, is going broke and will require as much as \$2.1 billion in taxpayer money to stay solvent.

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The tuition plan was offered between 1996 and 2003. In 1997, voters approved a plan to guarantee the fund with the state's credit.

The fund was suspended when the state Legislature their own tuition rates, making it hard to predict what it would cost to fund a future education. Since 2003, tuition costs have jumped dramatically and the fund will run out of money between 2015 and

A newer - much costlier - prepaid tuition plan created in 2007 is administered by an investment firm, not the state.

Combs said regardless of the costs, the state will have to cover the shortfall in the tuition fund, which was called the Texas Tomorrow Fund when it was created.

"The taxpayers of Texas voted this in, and the taxpayers of Texas have obligated themselves to pay this out over time," Combs said. "You can't pull a California and send (parents) an IOU. You have a hole, and you must get a shovel and start filling in."

The state will have to completely pay tuition and fees of children who have contracts with the fund for the next 15 to 20 years,

Mark Hurley, a Dallas accountant who advises Combs on the plan, said the fund could run out of money sooner than 2015 if inflation or another stock market plummet plunders the fund.

John Sharp, the comptroller in 1995 when the fund was created, said there was no problem with plan at the time. Actuaries set the price based on costs and investment earnings. Sharp, now a Democratic candidate for U.S. Senate, said the price could have been adjusted over time as tuition costs rose and the stock market fluctuated.

The cost of a four-year college plan for a newborn in 1996 was about \$10,500. It rose to about \$17,500 in 2003.

By comparison, the cost of the new program created in 2007 is much higher, about \$39,400 for an infant, and the investments are not guaranteed by the

Most-ever districts 'academically unacceptable"

The number of Texas school districts rate by the state as "academically unacceptable" has increased to its highest level ever.

WASHINGTON (AP) The House voted overwhelmingly Friday to rush \$2 billion into the popular but financially strapped "cash for clunkers" car purchase program, heeding calls from consumers eager to keep taking advantage of thousands of dollars in

trade-in incentives. '- House members approved the measure 316-109 within hours of learning from Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood that the program was running out of money.

President Barack Obama said he was encouraged by the House action to keep alive a program that had "succeeded well beyond our expectations." Senate action is likely next week, ensuring the program won't be affected by the sudden shortage of cash.



AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Hispanic enrollment in Texas colleges and universities would need to almost double in the next six years to meet the state's goals by 2015, according to a new state report.

The staff report approved by the Texas Higher

Education Coordinating Board on Thursday looked a progress toward goals adopted by the state in 2000. The board has long considered lagging Hispanic enrollment and graduation rates a major problem.

"Texas is not one of the

highest-achieving states in terms of overall education attainment," Higher Education Commissioner Raymund Paredes said. "And Hispanics are the lowest-achieving of the three major ethnic groups in Texas."

The Austin American-Statesman reported Friday that the review found Hispanic enrollment had grown faster than that of blacks or whites but not fast enough to meet the state's goals. Nearly 129,500 more Hispanic students have enrolled in higher education since

2000, but another 309,000 would need to do so by 2015 to meet the state's goal of 5.7 percent of Hispanics enrolled.

Texas had about 367,000 Latino college students last

One problem is that too few Hispanic students graduate from high school, the report said. Only 54.2 percent of Hispanic seventh-graders in 1995 graduated from a Texas public high school, compared with 61.3 percent of all students, it said.

"Latino youth begin kindergarten far behind their peers," said Patricia Gandara, a UCLA professor of education. "Latino students require more investment by the state."

Officials pledged to address Hispanic achievement, as well as shortfalls in technology-related degrees, research funding and other benchmarks.

Texas has a goal of having 5.7 percent of each major ethnic and racial group in the state enroll in college by 2015. Last year, 5.4 percent of Texans were enrolled in public and private colleges and universities, up from 5 percent in 2000.

The proportion of blacks was the highest, at 5.6 percent, the report said.

The Texas Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division set initial August 2009 natural gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 17,542,639 Mcf (thousand cubic feet). In setting the initial August allowables,



New GI Bill sending veterans to school this fall

WASHINGTON (AP)
— Spc. Marco Reininger started the year on the dusty streets of Afghanistan. He'll end it on the campus of Columbia University with the government picking up a large chunk of the \$100,000 tab for tuition.

The Post-9/11 GI Bill rolls out on Saturday, just in time for the fall semester for veterans of the recent wars. Reminiscent of the GI education benefits signed into law by President Franklin D. Roosevelt two weeks after D-Day in 1944, the measure is aimed at transforming the lives of a new generation of veterans.

President Barack Obama on Monday will attend a rally at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va., in celebration.

In the next decade, \$78 billion is expected to be paid out under the new GI Bill, which is the most comprehensive education benefit offered since World War II.

Many veterans who served after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks are eligible for full tuition and fees for four years at a state university, a monthly housing stipend and up to \$1,000 annually for books. Among those covered are members of the Guard and Reserve who spent three months or more activated for war service, giving them vastly improved benefits.

If they opt to attend a private institution or graduate program, they can receive aid up to the cost of a public college in the state. About 1,100 schools and colleges are offering additional scholarships for veterans that the VA is matching under a Yellow Ribbon program.

Many veterans say they can't help but be thankful.

"It definitely makes it more valuable," Reininger, 25, a member of the New York Army National Guard, said of his combat experience. "Without that deployment, I couldn't be eligible for anything."

By 1947, nearly half of all college students in America were veterans. The program cost \$14.5 billion, and more than half of the nation's 15 million World War II veterans participated in some sort of educational program.

One of them was Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., 85, the child of immigrants from hard-scrabble Paterson, N.J., who fought in Europe at age 18. The GI Bill paid for him to go to Columbia University.

"In a way, I'm not even sure I would've gone to

college," Lautenberg said.
"The horizon was so limited. I couldn't think in terms of the future."

Lautenberg signed on early to the new GI Bill legislation, which was authored by Sen. Jim Webb, D-Va., 63, a Vietnam veteran whose Marine son fought in Iraq.

Webb attended the U.S. Naval Academy before his war service and Georgetown University's law school afterward. He said paying for education sends a signal about the value of military service and helps veterans with readjustment issues.

"There's a tremendous downstream effect on the emotional well-being on the people who have served if you treat them right," he said.

Aubrey Arcangel, 27, an Iraq veteran who attends City College of New York, recalls chatting with some of his Army buddies in Iraq worried about finding a job in the recession, and telling them about the new benefit.

"They were worried about getting out and looking for a job, and I said, 'Listen, this new GI Bill will do good for you," Arcangel said.

The legislation didn't pass without a fight. Some lawmakers complained about the cost, and the Pentagon expressed concerns that many troops would leave the military to attend college. A popular benefit was added that allowed members of the military to transfer the ben-

efit to spouses or children if they agree to serve an additional four years.

It's anticipated that 485,000 veterans or their family members could participate in the first year. About 112,000 claims have been processed so far, and more than 1 million callers have flooded a VA call center this year with questions. About 25,000 service members have applied to use the transfer benefit.

There are concerns that universities and the VA could be overwhelmed, in part, because the benefit is complex. And, there are complaints that veterans attending private schools in states like California that kept their public tuition low face a major disparity in what they receive.

Veterans from the nonprofit Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America, which aggressively lobbied for the bill, are back on Capitol Hill pushing for what they call a GI Bill fix. Among other changes, it would seek to solve the disparity in tuition amounts covered and grant new benefits for vocational programs. It would also provide a living allowance for those who live too far from a university and take classes online.

"The benefit is fantastic, it's transformative, it's historic, but we also have serious concerns about where it stands right now," said Paul Rieckhoff, the group's executive director and founder.




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Galleries at Sunset Center to host August Lights Festival
