## City, County near new EMS contract agreement

 The Gray County Commissioner's Court has taken the next step in setting up a new ambulance service.

Following the city's lead, the county commissioners indicated they would support a new ambulance service in Gray County and the City of Pampa. The city's intention to enter into a contract with Emergency Service Foundation is conditional on mutually satisfactory returns and performance and payment and a similar contract is reached with Gray County.

In a statement released by the city, Morris said Pampa looks forward to entering into a mutually satisfying contract between the city, Gray County and Emergency Service Foundation.

Gray County Judge Richard

Peet said the county had a tentative contract with another ambulance service, but it is still negotiable. He said the commission had talked about some changes to their contract.

That agreement with the ambulance company, Guardian, the company that now holds the contract is not final.

"I think the city also has some thoughts in there they would like to have rearranged or reworded," Peet said.

Joseph Anstey, chief administrative officer of Emergency Services Foundation, said that Dr. James Hall, on the board of directors, is pursuing the foundation's financing.

"We feel that it is imperative that we have both letters from the city and county to indicate that a contract will follow," Anstey said.

Morris told the Gray County

Commissioners Court that the city and the foundation have pretty well reached an agreement.

"We had to go through the letter of intent and follow up with a contract with some minor changes that we're looking at that we have in the contract," Morris said.

He said that the foundation is allowed under the letter of intent to that the foundation could secure financing using the city and county as references.

"We're ready to go," Morris said. "It's just a matter of the contract document and having attorneys from all parties mesh that contract together in to something everyone can live with."

Anstey said he thinks it's a great opportunity for the

## County court tackles murder trail expenses

The Gray County Commissioners Court discussed subjects from paying for witnesses expenses in a capital murder trial in Lubbock to trying to hammer out a new budget for the next fiscal year.

Gray County also applied for a grant Friday with the City of Pampa for a law enforcement grant.

Sheriff Don Copeland said they were applying for a \$7,123 matching grant. The same amount would go to the city.

"It about \$14,000," Copeland said. "We'd get half of it."

The county already has two law enforcement grants of about \$29,000 each that they share with the city.

"These are our tax dollars," Judge Peet noted. "This is one way of securing part of it back to the local area though a grant which can be used to assist law enforcement."

"I'll have to call (his staff in Austin) tonight and tell them I have a college degree. They will be very impressed."

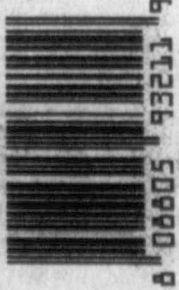





## 4 Marines die in Afghanistan, 2 are Texans

DALLAS (AP) — The Defense Department says two Texans are among four Marines killed in Afghanistan.

U.S. military officials in Afghanistan said they died Thursday when a roadside bomb struck their vehicle

## Agency spending hurricane money

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Texas agency that was questioned for not spending much of the money it received to help 2005 hurricane victims has improved but still has spent only 31 percent of the funds, a state auditor's report found.

The Department of Housing and Community Affairs and the Office of Rural Community Affairs are administering a total of \$517 million for recovery from hurricanes Rita and Katrina of 2005.

The State Auditor's Office in October 2007 found that the money, coming mostly from federal grants, was being paid out slowly by the housing and community affairs department. At that time only 2 percent of the federal money had been paid to communities and homeowners.

This week's follow-up report distributed Friday

says the agency has "fully or substantially" implemented 12 recommendations made by the state auditor but that only 31 percent of the \$440 million available to the agency has been spent.

Auditors stated that the agency should address the spending delays because it will be responsible for some of the \$1.3 billion in federal funds Texas has received for recovery from last year's Hurricane Ike.

Spending the hurricane recovery money — dollars that in many cases help the poorest of Texans — can get postponed because of federal environmental and historic preservation regulations and by requirements that clear home ownership titles be proven, said Michael Gerber, executive director of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

Texas has followed those federal requirements

and spent money properly, Gerber said, adding that some of the housing construction projects are complex. He said the agency is committed to accountability and said the audit found no major problems related to administering the recovery money.

"We have none of the abuse, fraud and waste that has gone on in other states" with disaster recovery efforts, Gerber said. "In Texas, we made a different choice. We're not just giving checks to people. We chose to rebuild the tax base."

He said the audit two years ago came shortly after the state received the federal money, so spending was barely getting under way.

Gerber said just this week his agency helped open more than 200 apartment rental units on three properties in Beaumont, Orange and Port Arthur,

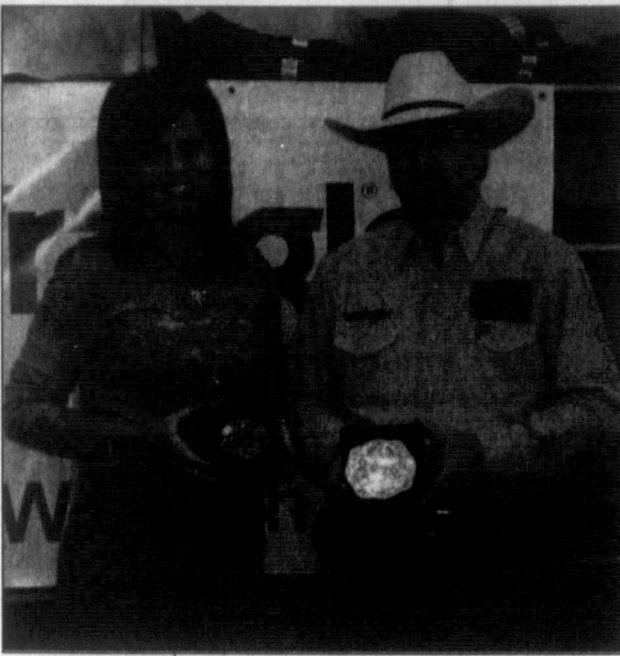
an area slammed by Hurricane Rita.

"We're pleased that we've been able to do as much as we've been able to do," he said. "We're really hitting, I think, a stride now."

As for the Office of Rural Community Affairs, the report said it has fully implemented four of five previous auditor recommendations. The department received a total of \$77 million in hurricane recovery money and has allocated 95 percent to local organizations and rest to administration.

Fifty-eight percent of that agency's hurricane recovery money had been spent as of June, the report states. The money is for projects such as debris removal and repairs to drainage systems, water facilities and other infrastructure.

City of Pampa and Gray County to work together for the benefit of all.

Peet said he expected the city, county and company to reach a contract based on the expectation that the company secures funding.

Peet said they were still discussing the term of the contract, whether it would be for three or five years.

Gray County Commissioner James Hefley said a clause allowing one of the parties to opt

out of the contract wall still being discussed.

"The contract that I submitted," said Anstey, "was merely a place to start."

He said there was room for negotiations.

The court also dealt with another law enforcement matter — the Levi King trial taking place in Lubbock on a change of venue.

Levi King is on trial for the murders of a Pampa family in September, 2005.

As of last Wednesday Judge Peet said the county's defense expenditures on the trial are \$529,000.

That includes that latest payment of over \$60,000 for witness travel and accommodations in Lubbock.

Peet said the half a million dollars does not include expert witnesses that may be called in dur-

ing the trial. Some of the money may be reimbursed by the state, Peet said.

"Over 100 witnesses are being called, both prosecution and defense, in this case," Peet said.

Most of the expenses are expected to be reimbursed by the state.

The court also approved a five-dollar fee dedicated to the District Clerk's Technology Fund to be used for preserving older county records.

The commissioners court

also discussed tax rates for next year in preparation for presentation of the county annual budget this fall.

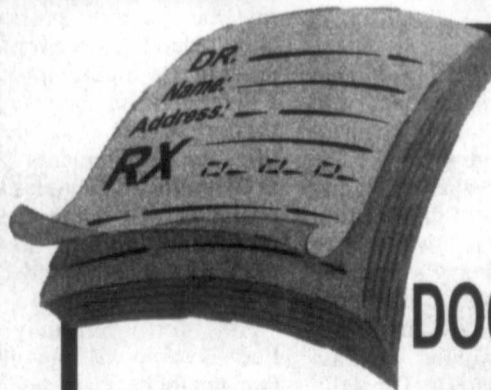

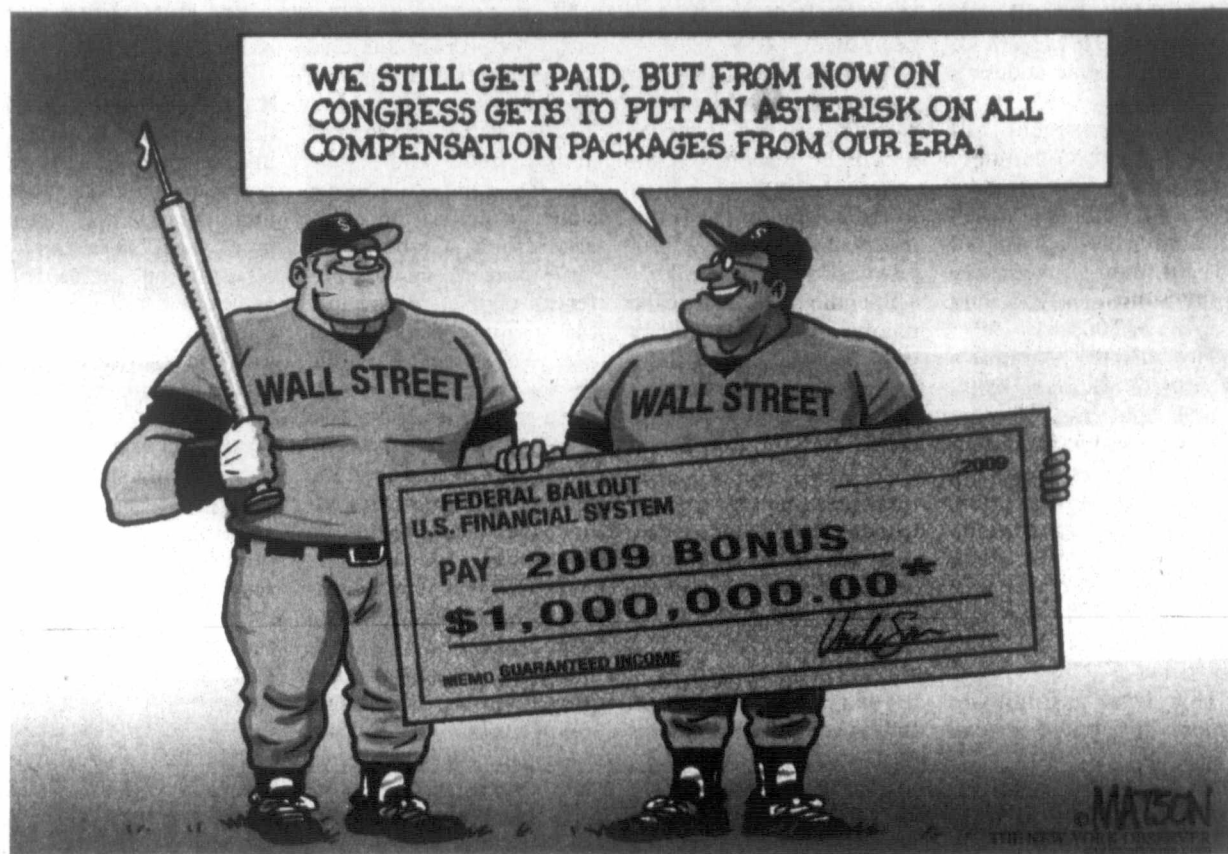

## Latinos could be factor in GOP slugfest

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Republicans U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and Gov. Rick Perry are walking a tightrope heading into their primary, where the winner will emerge the front-runner for the governor's race in this decidedly red state.

On one side are Hispanic voters - a growing and influential bloc willing to listen to the GOP titans and one the candidates may need in the general election. On the other is a group that Hutchison and Perry cannot afford to anger: the Republican base of religious, largely white and conservative voters.

So they've done a two-step around Texas, showing up in majority-Hispanic parts of the state to appeal to those Texans while talking tough on guns, border security and other top issues for traditional primary voters.

Witness Hutchison at the Texas Association of Mexican-American Chambers of Commerce convention in McAllen last week. Only days before she had announced she would vote against Hispanic Sonia Sotomayor's confirmation to the Supreme Court.

She explained to tepid applause that she could not vote to confirm a judge who was not a firm supporter of gun rights. Balancing Texas gun owners against Hispanic pride? The GOP candidate chose gun owners.

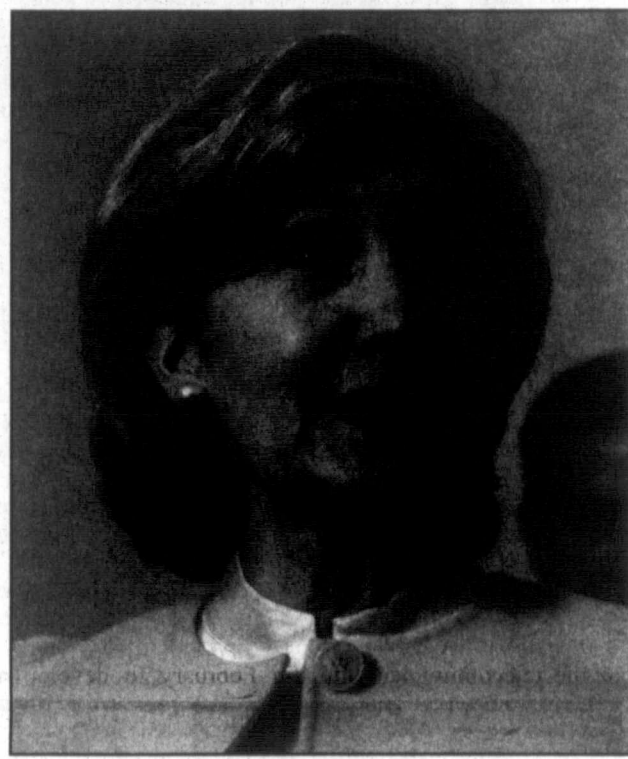
But beyond the March 2010 primary, Republicans are still seeking to reach out to Latinos for years to come; hence, Hutchison's warmer response when she noted to the McAllen crowd that 30 percent of

her proposed nominees for federal judgeships had been Hispanic. She emphasized her work as co-chairwoman of a coalition supporting colleges that serve Hispanic students and declared her respect for Democratic U.S. Rep. Ruben Hinojosa of South Texas and Republican U.S. Sen. Mel Martinez of Florida.

"It simply cannot be ignored," said Jerry Polinard, a political scientist at the University of Texas-Pan American. "Republicans have got to begin to peel some of these Latino voters away from the Democratic Party."

Perry also wants to score points with Latinos, who make up one-quarter of Texas' eligible voters and one-third of the population.

His aides cite his record of appointing 701 Hispanics to state boards and commissions - or 15 percent of his appointees - as the state's longest-serving governor. Spokesman Mark Miner said Perry's appeal to Latinos lies in his policies, such as assisting the private sector in job

and helping to open a Wal-Mart in Pecos in the Rio Grande Valley, where he praised the state's business climate.

As election season unfolds look for Hutchison and Perry to make more trips to South Texas,

of sealing 700 miles of the U.S.-Mexico border with barriers. Her aides say she has worked to make sure local officials are consulted by federal officials as the fence is built.

Perry has said he opposes a border fence, except in some urban areas.

He has talked tough about the need for border security and crackdowns on illegal immigration, though he has continued to support legislation he signed allowing illegal immigrant students to pay in-state college tuition and says he supports passage of a federal guest worker program for immigrants.

Perry and Hutchison both support stricter voter identification requirements. At a Republican legislative proposal that Democrats say would prevent some minorities and the elderly from casting ballots.

As for Sotomayor, Perry's camp will say only that her beliefs are not in line with those a Supreme Court justice should have on issues such as gun rights. Miner wouldn't say that Hutchison is right with her opposition to Sotomayor and wouldn't say how Perry would vote if he were in the Senate.

Javier Martinez, general manager of a radio station in Del Rio who spoke with Hutchison at the Mexican-American Chambers of Commerce convention, isn't holding the senator's position on Sotomayor against her.

"She's a friend of Hispanics even though she's not voting for Sotomayor," he said.

But based on historic voting trends, neither Hutchison nor Perry is likely to have the upper hand among Hispanics, at least at the moment. That role could belong to the Democratic nominee.

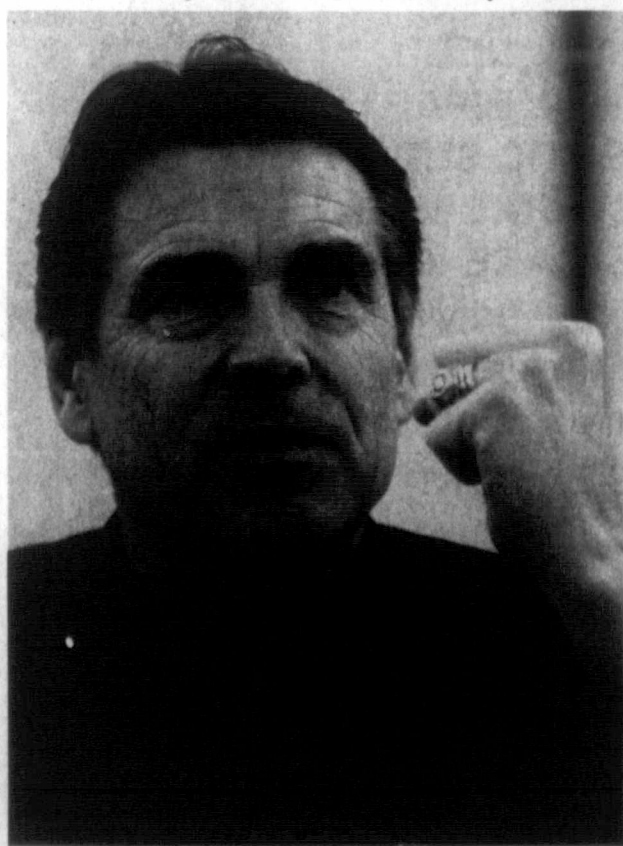
Hutchison wants to cut into Perry's reliable backing from social conservatives who traditionally dominate Texas' GOP primaries. Typically only about 650,000 of the state's 13 million registered voters cast ballots in the Republican gubernatorial primaries.

Attracting more Latino voters to the primary won't be easy.

Case in point: In the 2006 gubernatorial primary, in predominantly Hispanic areas of the state nearly three times as many El Paso County voters cast Democratic ballots for governor than cast GOP ballots. In Hidalgo County on the border, there were 15 times as many votes for Democrats for governor as there were for Republicans.

There's nothing to suggest a change in those trends yet for 2010, Polinard said, describing his Rio Grande Valley region as "the bluest part of the red state."

"This is not where they're going to win the primary election," he said. Hutchison voted in favor

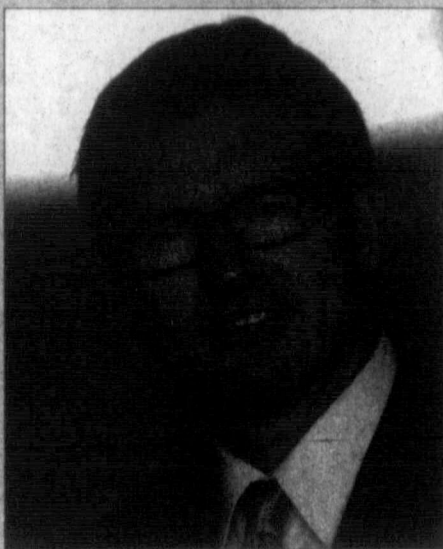

## Telco companies to provide data for broadband map

WASHINGTON (AP) — The country's biggest phone and cable companies have agreed to hand over information about their broadband networks to help the federal government produce a national map showing where high-speed Internet connections are available across the U.S.

AT&T Inc., Verizon Communications Inc. and Comcast Corp. have told the Commerce Department that they are committed to helping the government "complete the important and difficult task of mapping broadband availability."

Trade groups representing a broad cross-section of the telecommunications

sector, including wireless carriers, rural phone and cable companies and the industry giants, are also encouraging their members to cooperate with the Congressionally mandated effort.

"The information that the broadband carriers are now committed to providing is crucial to the creation of the national broadband map," said Lawrence Strickling, head of the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, the arm of the Commerce Department that is overseeing the mapping project.

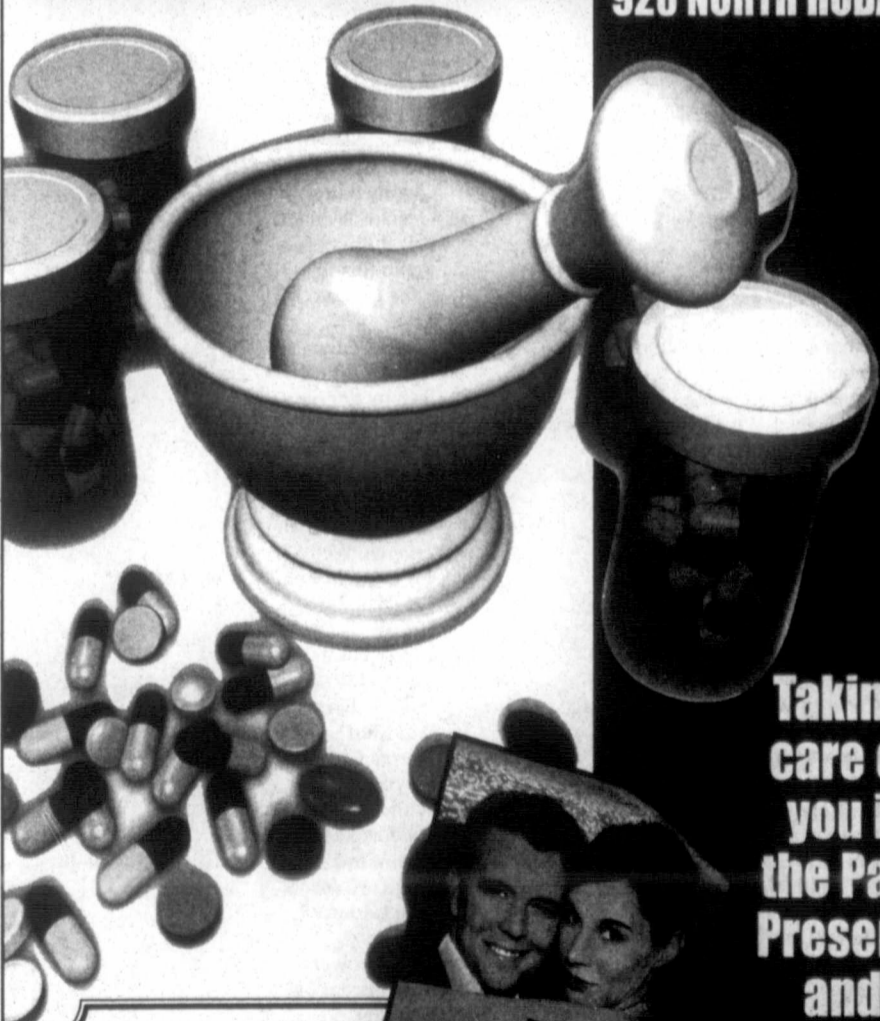
Congress included up to \$350 million in the economic stimulus bill passed in February to develop a

"comprehensive nationwide inventory map of existing broadband service capability and availability in the United States."

The NTIA will be awarding grants to entities in each state to gather data on everything from the availability of different broadband technologies to connection speeds at the local level. The data will be used to produce an interactive national broadband map that Americans everywhere can search to find local broadband services. Regulators and lawmakers also plan to use the data to target broadband investments and shape policy to bring affordable high-speed connections to all corners of the country.

## Why the NFL has no rival: 'It's the game, stupid.'

It's easier to find out-of-work supermodels than athletes good enough for the NFL, which is the short answer why the Lingerie Football League will survive for another day and the Arena Football League won't.

An AFL players' association official confirmed Tuesday what was rumored for some time: The league, which had already suspended the 2009 season in hopes of returning in 2010, has given up. It "seems to be inevitable at this point," regional director James Guidry told The Associated Press, that the AFL will formally announce it's ceased operations any day.

"I feel bad for the fans," Philadelphia Soul wide receiver Chris Jackson said, "because for 22 years it was one of the most unique, most loved, most fun sports I've ever been a part of."

For those keeping score at home, the demise marks the fourth time in the last 50 years an outfit tried to make a living basking in the reflection of America's 800-pound sporting gorilla.

The American Football League launched in 1960 and survived nine years before being arm-wrestled into a 1969 merger. As far as success stories, that's it.

The World Football League, which boasted stars such as Larry Csonka, Jim Kiick and Danny White, folded in 1975, 10 weeks into its second season. Things were so bad by the end, the Birmingham, Ala., sheriff's department ambushed the winners of the World Bowl in the locker room and confiscated their uniforms.

Some 10 years later, the United States Football League featured Doug Flutie, Steve Young and Jim Kelly. The legendary George Allen coached. The bombastic Donald Trump owned. But not for long.

The USFL folded its tent three seasons later, after winning an antitrust case against the NFL and being awarded \$3 for its trouble

— about \$1.5 billion less than it was seeking.

The XFL took its shot in 2001 and failed, disproving the notion nobody ever went broke selling sex and violence. That because the league, the brainchild of then-NBC Sports boss Dick Ebersol and World Wrestling Entertainment Chairman Vince McMahon, forgot it was trying to sell football.

They put cameras in the cheerleaders' locker room, carnival barkers in the announcers' booth and tweaked the rules — no fair catches or quarterback-in-the-grasp stoppages — to ensure the maximum number of collisions. But once the games actually began, it became apparent the XFL had plenty of actors, but too few athletes.

In that regard, nothing has changed: There's barely enough of those to fill out the roster of the 32 NFL teams.

More to the point, an enterprise called the United Football League

will launch in October, with four teams playing six games in seven cities and ending with a Thanksgiving weekend championship. According to the league's mission statement, its goal is "to fulfill the unmet needs of football fans in major markets currently underserved by professional football."

Toward that end, the four franchises will be headed by former NFL coaches: Jim Fassel in Las Vegas, Dennis Green in San Francisco, Ted Cottrell in New York and Jim Haslett in Orlando.

Yet another startup league is waiting in the wings, backed by a group of investors who plan to revive the USFL's original business plan and stage games in the spring. Whether it survives, or like most of its predecessors, lasts just long enough to provide the NFL with a few innovations worth stealing, remains to be seen.

But here's a few words to the wise, the same

ones that could have been engraved on the tombstone of every rival league that thinks America's desire for football is unlimited:

It's the game, stupid.

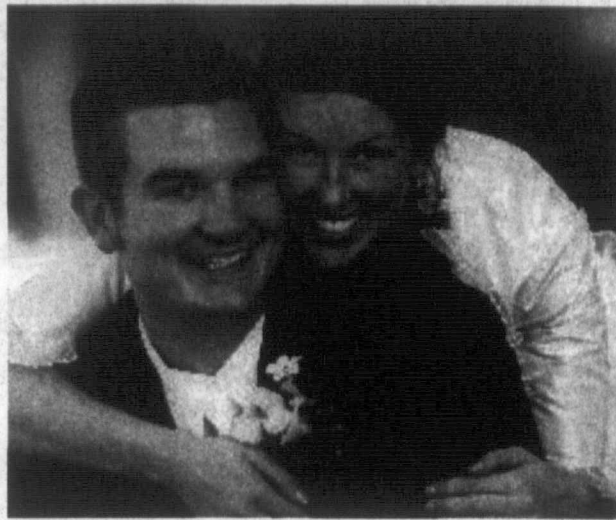

## Texas' July temps 13th hottest

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Rainfall in typically dry West Texas last month held down the state's temperature average while other parts of the Lone Star State baked.

National Weather Service meteorologist Victor Murphy in Fort

Worth said Friday that last month was the state's 13th hottest July. The average temperature was 84.1 degrees, 1.7 degrees above the 82.4-degree normal.

He says rainfall scattered across West Texas throughout the month kept it cool in those regions and evened out the scorching 100-degree days in San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.

The average Texas temperature through July was the eighth warmest at 66.6 degrees.

The hottest seven-month span was in another drought year, 2006, when the average was 67.8 degrees.

Despite persistent drought in Central and South Texas, last month was the state's 27th wettest July.

## Ouch! Early flu shot season comes with 3 jabs

ATLANTA (AP) — Get ready to roll up your sleeve three times for flu shots this fall.

That's right, three times. This year's flu season is shaping up to be a very different one. Most people will need one shot for the regular seasonal flu and probably two others to protect against the new swine flu.

Experts suggest you get that first shot as early as this month — if you can find it.

"We'd like to get to Job 1 and get most of it done," said Dr. William Schaffner, a Vanderbilt University flu expert, referring to seasonal flu vaccinations.

"Get it done before we start to tackle Job 2," the more complex task of swine flu vaccinations, he added.

The five vaccine manufacturers that supply the United States are finishing up production of seasonal flu vaccine earlier than usual. Health officials say they expect about half of the more than 120 million doses of seasonal vaccine to be available by the end of this month. Most of the rest are due out by the end of September. Some manufacturers report that distributors are quickly buying up supplies.

Those five companies — including one that makes a nasal spray version of flu vaccine — are the same

ones making the new swine flu vaccine. They are on track to start delivering the first batches of that in September, but the bulk of it isn't expected until late October or November, health officials say.

That's sparked questions about how all this is going to work.

Officials want to get as many people as possible vaccinated against both forms of flu, but a lot of that depends on consumers and how many trips they'll be willing to make to get shots.

Why can't you get one shot for all — or maybe just two?

The reasons have to do with logistics and caution.

Scientists believe the swine flu vaccine will be most effective if given in two doses, about three weeks apart, although testing is still under way to check that. Combining swine flu and seasonal flu in one shot is theoretically possible, but it was too late to try it this year. Decisions were made last winter about what flu strains to use in this year's seasonal vaccine, and production was too far along by the time swine flu hit in April to alter the formula.

So seasonal flu and swine flu will have to be given as separate doses, even if it's during the same appointment.

But it's not a matter of

just giving both to whoever comes in. Supplies are expected to be limited, so the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has two different lists for who should be first to get the seasonal flu shot and who should be first to get the swine flu shot.

For the regular flu vaccine, elderly people, health care workers and pregnant women are among the priority groups. For the swine flu vaccine, health care workers and pregnant women are on the list but not older people, who seem to have some immunity to swine flu.

If all the flu shots were given at about the same time, it could mean a mash of people, some of whom should be among the first to get one shot and not the

other. "I think it's safe to say we expect some confusion," said Kristine Sheedy, a CDC communications specialist.

Then, there are safety questions.

Health officials are haunted by the swine flu vaccine campaign in 1976, which was stopped after unexpectedly high numbers of patients suffered a paralyzing condition called Guillain-Barre Syndrome. While it's not clear the vaccine was to blame, health officials want to carefully monitor people who get the new swine flu vaccine for any problems.

Scientists are just beginning to test the safety and effectiveness of the new swine flu vaccine, work that is expected to take months. If the seasonal

flu and swine flu vaccines were given at the same sitting and some people developed health problems, it would be hard to single out which vaccine caused the problem, or whether it was the combination of them.

"How you're going to separate that out — that's a doozy," said Dr. Samuel Katz, a Duke University vaccines expert, who was a developer of the measles vaccine.

So the government is looking at three shots, preferably over three visits.

That's daunting. Over the years, the public hasn't been great about getting even one flu shot: Just one in three U.S. adults got flu shots last year, CDC data indicate.

"To come two or three times? That's expecting a

lot of public response," said Katz.

Health officials traditionally kick off an autumn vaccine campaign against seasonal flu in late September or October with a news conference in Washington D.C. But this year, the news conference — which features the CDC director — has been moved up to Sept. 10.

Unofficially, the push for seasonal vaccinations begins even sooner, some health officials said.

"As soon as it becomes available, we'll be encouraging people to get it," said Carol Schriber, a spokeswoman for the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services.

# Gov't— Don't rush to close schools for swine flu

WASHINGTON (AP) — Don't panic, schools.

The government is urging school officials to stay calm when swine flu strikes this fall, closing buildings only in drastic cases and allowing sick students to return as soon as 24 hours after their fever is gone.

States and schools should also be planning now for the possibility of school-wide vaccinations beginning in mid-October.

Federal officials know more now about swine flu than they did last spring, when alarm and confusion led hundreds of schools to temporarily shut down. New guidance issued Friday reflects what the officials have learned.

Closing schools is rarely warranted, even if students or teachers have swine flu, said Thomas Frieden, director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"There are measures we can take to protect the students, to protect the staff and allow learning to continue," Frieden said during a news conference at the Department of Health and Human Services.

Some steps for prevention remain the same as always, officials said: People should wash their hands, cough into their sleeves and stay home if they get sick.

But the officials added a new precaution, saying schools need to keep sick kids away from classmates, setting aside a room where students who show up sick can wait to be sent home.

And CDC also changed its advice on how long sick kids should stay home. Students and teachers can return to school or work 24 hours after their fever is gone; the old advice was to stay home for a week.

There are three situations generally that would justify school closure, officials said:

—When swine flu emerges in a school where most or all of the children have special needs, such as a school for pregnant teenagers or for medically frail children.

—When large numbers of kids or staff come down with swine flu.

—When parents send sick, feverish kids to school despite federal and local guidance to keep them home.

The last scenario — sick kids with fever coming to school — prompted dozens of New York City schools to close last spring, said Frieden, who was serving as the city's top health offi-

cial at the time.

"Perhaps we would have closed fewer, had we known then what we know now," he said.

As with most decisions about education in the U.S., whether to close schools is up to local officials. But those officials have been looking to the federal government for advice about the new flu strain that has caused a global epidemic.

The emergence of the never-before-seen flu prompted more than 700 schools to temporarily close last spring, giving students an unexpected vacation but forcing parents to scramble to find child care.

The CDC had at first said schools should shut down for about two weeks if there were suspected cases of swine flu. Then the CDC changed course, saying schools did not need to close because the virus was milder than feared. Instead, parents were told to keep sick kids home for at least a week.

Education Secretary Arne Duncan said officials learned last spring the benefits of pre-emptive closure may often be outweighed by negative consequences.

The benefits must be balanced against loss of learning, lost wages for parents, lack of access to school breakfast and lunch programs for poor children and the danger of kids being left unsupervised.

I am opposed to the idea. This will be a formal wedding and reception at an expensive hotel, and we are paying for it. I think Peter and Laurie should regard the day they take their vows as a once-in-a-lifetime event and forgo the game. Guests who feel compelled to check the score may do so in the bar or in their rooms. At the risk of being rude, I don't want to encourage the sports zeal by bringing in television sets.

Am I hopelessly out of touch and old-fashioned? Please help. This may escalate to a confrontation before the wedding.

DEAR V.O.R.: You aren't out of touch or old-fashioned. You are simply not a sports fan. Although you have generously agreed to pay for the reception, I hope you will relent and provide a set to be placed to one side. Remember, it is Laurie and Peter's wedding, and their guests may feel as they do. Imagine your embarrassment if the bride and groom were also in the bar or in their room instead of enjoying their own reception.

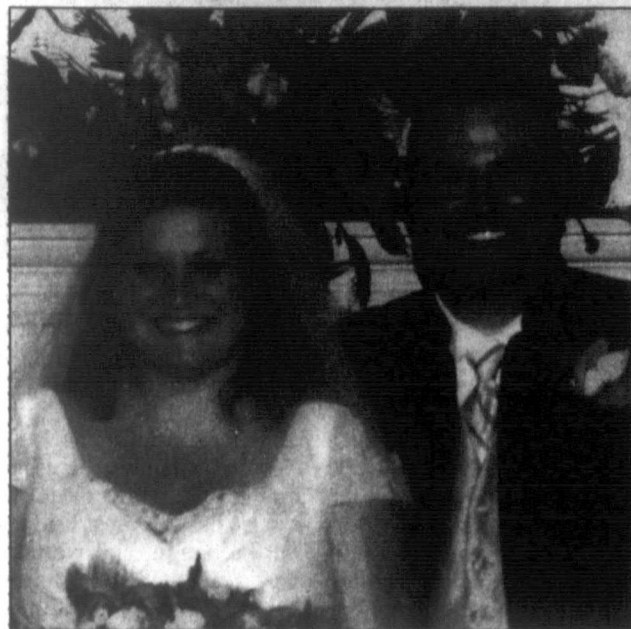

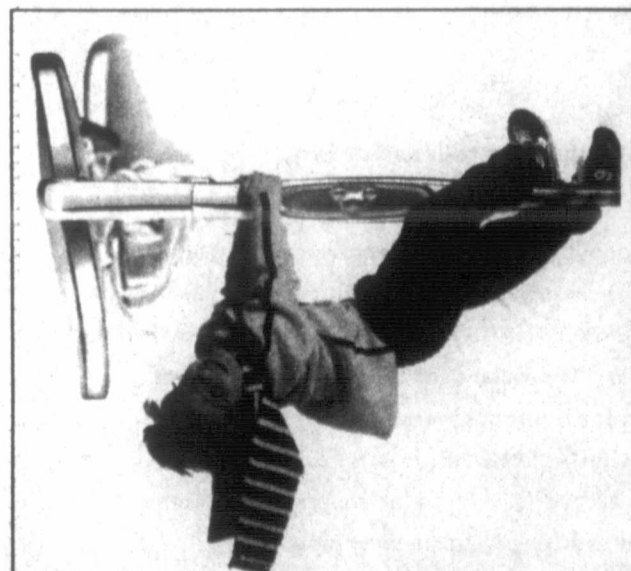

# Most stimulus-targeted bridges in Texas are OK

DALLAS (AP) — Most of the dozens of Texas bridges scheduled for repairs using federal stimulus money have passed inspections with good marks, according to government transportation records.

An analysis by The Associated Press showed 77 bridges in 12 counties will be repaired or improved using stimulus money. Just 30 of them are considered structurally deficient or functionally obsolete — terms that don't mean bridges are dangerous but refer instead to whether they are eligible for federal transportation money for repairs.

Texas has about 50,000 bridges, the most of any state. Inspectors consider about 9,800 of them deficient or obsolete.

State transportation officials said under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, preferences were given to projects that were ready to go and would maximize employment. Extensive bridge repairs require years

of planning, essentially making long-term bridge projects ineligible for stimulus money.

Officials said the act required them to quickly identify projects, sign contracts and spend the money — or risk losing it.

"A bridge is not something you can make shovel-ready in a matter of months," said Kelly Breazeale, a spokeswoman with the Texas Department of Transportation's bridge division.

Texas received about \$2.25 billion for roads and bridges, a cash injection that, though useful, doesn't come close to the amount needed for transportation work, said Chris Lippincott, a state transportation department spokesman. A panel of business leaders estimated Texas would have to spend about \$313 billion over the next 20 years just to keep traffic congestion from getting worse, he said.

Texas roads are strained by truck traffic between Mexico and the U.S. along with a population that grows by about 1,000 residents per day, Lippincott said. Meanwhile, gas tax revenues used to pay for

transportation projects have decreased as fuel efficiency has increased.

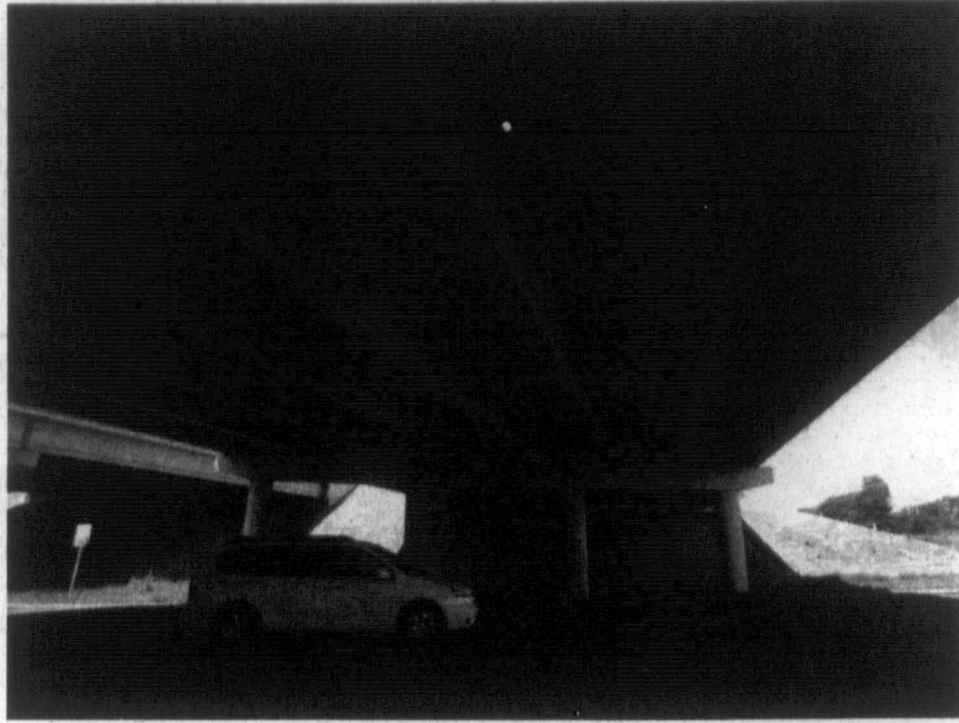
"The stimulus bill ... was passed to put shovels in the dirt and money in people's pockets," Lippincott said. "It was not meant to solve our nation's transportation problems. It was not meant to completely fix the failure of our nation to maintain and improve our critical infrastructure."

Lippincott defended the selection process, saying the bridges scheduled for repairs need improvements even if the spans are in relatively good shape.

"The feds sent us the money and we are going to spend it," he said. "We don't have the luxury of spending money on bad projects."

Fifty-three of the 77 Texas bridges identified by The AP as receiving stimulus funding are in Tarrant County, home to Fort Worth, or Newton County, about 120 miles northeast of Houston. Local transportation officials decided how to use the stimulus money, and officials in those locations chose to spend it on bridges, Lippincott said.

Most of the repairs are

not extensive. The Newton County bridges, for example, will receive new guardrails to replace outdated ones, he said.

Nationally, about half of the nearly 2,500 bridges scheduled for repairs with stimulus money have passed inspections with

high marks, according to federal data. About 1,100 bridges received such high inspection ratings that, normally, they would be ineligible for federal bridge money. Those restrictions were lifted for the stimulus bill.

"Bridge ratings are funny

things," Lippincott said. "If we find a dangerous bridge in Texas, we'll close it. Texas has the most bridges in the nation, and we take that responsibility as seriously as any of the duties in our state. We drive across those bridges, too."

## St. Louis researchers identify cells that say 'scratch me'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Got an itch to scratch? Scientists have pinpointed a key group of cells that sends itch-alerts to the brain.

When researchers at Washington University in St. Louis knocked out those cells in mice, it alleviated their itchiness without affecting their ability to sense pain — work that opens a possible new target for creating better itch relievers.

Don't underestimate that need. The kind of itch caused by bug bites or allergies typically goes away with a little scratching or some antihistamines. But some people can scratch themselves raw without relieving serious, daily itching triggered by a variety of conditions, such as certain cancers, chronic kidney failure, and even use of certain narcotic pain relievers.

Indeed, pain and itch have been difficult to separate. Previous research has

found various nerve pathways that seem involved in both.

But Thursday's report in the journal *Science* is the first to identify itch-specific cells in the spinal cord, that highway that delivers sensation to the brain.

"It's exciting," said well-known itch specialist Dr. Gil Yosipovitch of North Carolina's Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center, who wasn't involved in the new research. "This comprehensive study opens the field."

Lead researcher Zhou-Feng Chen, a Washington University associate professor of anesthesiology, in 2007 discovered the first gene related to itchiness, named GRPR. They found that mice with an inactive version of the gene scratched less when exposed to itchy things than mice with an active gene.

But that didn't prove that the spinal cord neurons, or

nerve cells, that harbored this gene were itch-specific. They could also be important to genes related to pain sensation.

So this time, Chen's team injected the spinal cords of mice with a neurotoxin that seeks out the GRPR receptor, sort of a docking site. Over about two weeks, the toxin killed about 80 percent of the cells that harbored that gene.

Before those injections, the mice scratched vigorously. But after the itch cells were killed off, their scratching plummeted — in some cases stopped completely — when Chen introduced one after another itchy substance.

They weren't simply numbed: Their motor function remained normal, and so did their response to pain from heat and pressure in a series of common experiments that show animals flick their tails or pull away their paws during various stresses.

This isn't the only itch

pathway to the brain, stressed Wake Forest's Yosipovitch. Nor does anyone know if this gene would behave similarly in people. But researchers have been hunting itch-specific receptors in hopes of eventually learning how to block their "scratch-me" signals to the brain and help relieve at least some types of itch.

## Fla. man blames cat paws for child porn downloads

JENSEN BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Florida investigators say a man accused of downloading child pornography is blaming his cat.

Keith Griffin of Jensen Beach is charged with 10 counts of possession of child pornography after detectives found more than

1,000 images on his home computer.

According to a sheriff's report Friday, Griffin told investigators that his cat jumped on the computer keyboard while he was downloading music. He said he had left the room and found "strange things"

on his computer when he returned.

Griffin is being held on \$250,000 bond in the Martin County jail. It is unclear if he has an attorney.

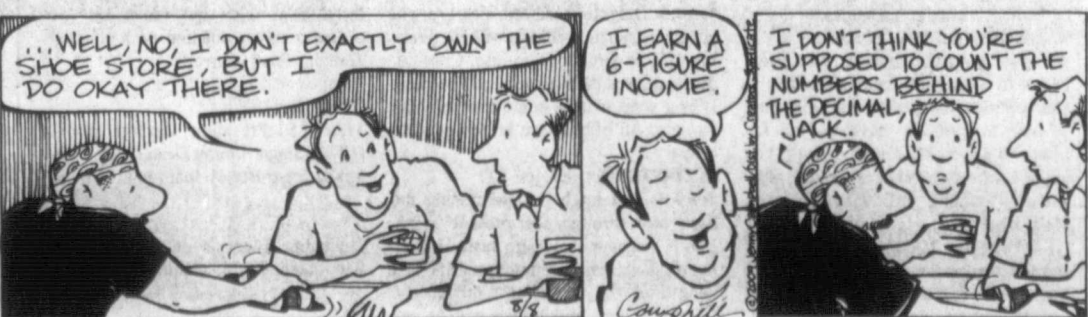

# Carmakers rush to replenish depleted dealer stocks

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. (AP) — Under normal circumstances, it would take Ford Motor Co. about a month to replace a Focus sold at one of Richard Bazy's two Pittsburgh-area dealerships.

Today, with customers across the country clamoring to trade in old gas guzzlers under the "cash for clunkers" program, Bazy says Ford can't tell him when it will send him the bulk of the 50 compact cars he needs to replenish what he sold in the two weeks since the program began.

"I do not have a definite, acceptable answer to that," said Bazy, who maintains he could sell 200 more Focuses if he could get them. "It's killing me."

Bazy, like many dealers for just about every automaker, is worried that he won't be able to get cars to take advantage of the second installment of clunker cash that could be approved by the Senate Thursday night.

He's got only two Focuses left and says Ford has told him it will ship only six more within the month. He's complained to his regional manager to no avail and said the clunkers program has cleaned out the Pittsburgh region's inventory.

Annette Sykora, who runs two Ford dealerships near Lubbock, Texas, is running into the same problem. She was conservative, keeping her inventory lean because of the depressed market. Like many dealers, she didn't expect the high showroom traffic and demand from the clunkers program.

She's happy for the increased business, even though she's sold all six Focuses she had. She's also out of midsize Fusions,

and after today, will have no more Ford Escapes or Mercury Mariner midsize sport utility vehicles.

If the renewed program expires on Labor Day weekend, she won't be able to take part unless she sells vehicles before they arrive or somehow gets them from nearby dealers.

"I won't be able to restock by then," she said. "It'll be a while before I am replenished."

Ford is trying to ramp up production of the Focus, which ranks No. 2 on the purchase list of those trading in clunkers. The Toyota Corolla is first.

The clunker program offers up to a \$4,500 rebate to those who trade in older, less-efficient vehicles for new ones that get better gas mileage.

Ford had only a 25-day supply of Focuses at the end of July, according to Ward's AutoInfoBank. Overall, its 48-day vehicle

supply was at the industry average for automakers. Nationwide, Ford had only 21,000 Focuses in stock, down from 38,000 at the start of July.

George Pipas, the company's top sales analyst, said Ford is working as hard as it can to crank up factories to meet demand, but said no automaker can turn on a dime and make more cars instantly. With thousands of parts made by hundreds of supply companies, it takes a month or longer to gear up factories, he said.

"Car production is not something that you can snap your fingers and all of the sudden all the components and materials show up on your loading dock from your suppliers," Pipas said.

August's production schedule was set last month and can't be changed in 30 days, but Ford is working to raise output in

September, Pipas said.

It will be six weeks or longer, though, before Bazy will get his Focuses, and even then he won't get the 50 he wants because all dealers are trying to get more and the lone Michigan factory that makes them can't satisfy the demand, Pipas said.

Toyota says it still has a decent supply of Corollas, at 37 days. But there are shortages of the Prius gas-electric hybrid, with a 13-day supply. Toyota and other automakers have raised production or are considering further increases. General Motors Co.'s product development chief said Thursday the company is working on ways to increase factory output of its more efficient models.

For Bazy, though, the opportunity to sell more cars under the clunkers program might pass without more vehicles arriving

from Ford. He says the company's new system to keep inventory lean isn't working.

"You've got to get these cars built," he said.

## Police; woman aimed to steal baby, kill mom

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Texas woman remained jailed Friday after falsely claiming she was pregnant and trying to kidnap a baby and kill the child's mother, police said.

Forty-year-old Margarita Nino's plan was foiled by a Zavala County sheriff's deputy who pulled her over for speeding as she fled toward Mexico with the baby and his mother in the car, authorities said.

The deputy detained the baby boy and his mother, 34-year-old Blanca Zacarias, because she did not have identification on her. Once separated from Nino, Zacarias said she had been kidnapped, police said.

Nino, who returned home, was arrested Thursday by Austin police.

Nino was booked into the Travis County Jail on Thursday on two felony kidnapping charges. Her bond was set at \$100,000 on each charge. The jail had no information on whether she has an attorney and no listing could be found for her home number.

The incident began Tuesday when Nino told friends she was in labor and heading to the hospital. Instead, she allegedly drugged and kidnapped Zacarias and her 2-week-old infant, said police, who believe she had just met the new mother a few days earlier through an acquaintance.

Nino called a friend Tuesday to tell her of the plot. She said she had drugged Zacarias and planned to kill her, throw

her body in a river near San Antonio and keep the baby, Austin police Cmdr. Julie O'Brien said. The friend called 911.

Police checked out the story, confirming with Nino's boyfriend and Zacarias' husband that neither woman had been seen for some time.

Austin police issued an Amber Alert early Wednesday morning. At some point, Nino was pulled over for speeding, and Zacarias and her son were detained while Border Patrol agents checked their immigration status. Zacarias told authorities she had been drugged and kidnapped, police said.

Nino later returned to Austin where she was arrested, police said.
