PISD celebrates \$18 million renovation, expansion project

This year sees a new chapter being added to the history of Pampa High School, Derrell DeLoach said.

The school board president said at Thursday night's dedication of the renovated and expanded Pampa High that the district can establish a new tradition of academic excellence and continue the tradition of the past.

DeLoach said there are many people who have brought the new facility to fruition.

"I want you to know that four years ago whenever our board realized the enormity of the problems before us," DeLoach said, "we appointed a group of citi-

zens in the community to help us come up with a solution to this problem."

Pampa attorney Don Lane was the chairman of the committee that brought the new construction to fruition.

Lane was extremely instrumental in bring the new Pampa High School to reality, DeLoach said.

He said that this building will stand as testimony to Lane's hard work and sacrifice.

DeLoach said there were many others involved in the committee that brought the renovated school to a reality.

"People like Bill Berry," DeLoach said. "People like Doug Carmichael, Doug Ware, Dora Cornutt, Rep. (Warren) Chisum.

I would like to thank them for their time, their input, their wisdom, for their knowledge."

DeLoach said their work and the work of others resulted in an \$18 million updated facility.

It will afford every student a major educational opportunity.

"That's what this is all about," DeLoach said.

There are eight new science labs and major technology upgrades, he said. There's a new library.

"I'm proud of what we've done to accomplish here in the community today," DeLoach said.

He said one of the people responsible for this project is Lee Porter.

"There's no one I respect more

than Lee Porter," DeLoach said. "This community owes him a great debt of gratitude."

The school board president said he is proud of the relationship that the board has been able to forge with the community.

"I hope that we can continue to forge a relationship that will guarantee continued academic excellence," he said.

Lane said that he has driven by during the renovation of the high school and watched it progress.

He said it would not have been possible without the taxpayers going to the polls and voted yes on the bond issue.

Texas second in nation on student loan defaults

DALLAS (AP) — The slumping economy led Texas to finish second in the nation for the rate of federal student loan defaults at 9.3 percent.

"There's no question in our minds that the recession has had an impact," said George Torres, an assistant vice president for Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corp.

The U.S. Department of Education put the national default rate at 6.7 percent, up from 5.2 percent the previous fiscal year. Arizona had a borrower default rate of 9.8 percent.

The figures are for students whose first loan repayments were due between Oct. 1, 2006, and

Sept. 30, 2007, and who defaulted prior to Sept. 30, 2008.

U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan, in response to figures released Monday, said the economic downturn "likely had a significant impact on the borrowers captured in these rates."

The department says schools with excessive default rates may lose eligibility from one or more federal student aid programs.

The Dallas Morning News reported Friday that the Texas default rate, over the latest three reporting periods, climbed from 5.8 percent, to 7.1 percent, then

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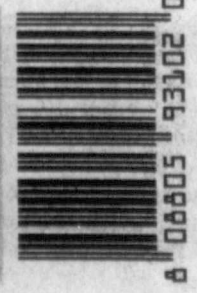

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Unemployment hits 22-year high at 8 percent

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas unemployment rate rose to 8 percent for the first time in 22 years. The Texas Workforce Commission said Friday the jobless rate for August was up from 7.9 percent in July. The state also lost 62,200 nonagricultural jobs last month. The state's unemployment rate last hit 8 percent in November 1987, the dying days of an oil bust that ravaged the Texas economy. Texas was still tracking well below the national unemployment rate of 9.7 percent. Leisure, construction and manufacturing were the hardest-hit industries last month, losing a combined 35,500 jobs.

Oprah Winfrey show will air from state fair

DALLAS (AP) — Oprah Winfrey is heading to the State Fair of Texas. Winfrey plans to tape her talk show on Monday, Oct. 12, from the expo in Dallas. Spokeswoman Angela De Paul had no information Friday on when the episode of "The Oprah Winfrey Show" would air or where it would be taped at the fairgrounds. De Paul said the show "will highlight the Texas state fair" and "we're excited to be coming." She told The Associated Press that further details would be released later. Winfrey on Friday was in New York City for her Chicago-based show's scheduled live broadcast from Central Park. The State Fair of Texas, with amusement rides, football games at the Cotton Bowl and off-beat foods such as deep fried butter, runs Sept. 25 through Oct. 18.

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UT Arlington may stamp out smoking campuswide

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The University of Texas at Arlington is considering banning smoking and tobacco campuswide and would become the first four-year college in north-

ern Texas to do so. A 15-member committee that includes leading school administrators recommended the ban in an announcement made Wednesday.

Committee chairwoman and UT-Arlington human resources Vice President Jean Hood says the overall goal is to have a healthy workplace.

The ban would not take effect until August 2011. But nothing's final until public input is received Oct. 19 and until university President James Spaniolo has made a final decision.

Until then the campus has planned an anti-tobacco education and support campaign, starting Oct. 1.

Tarrant County College and the UNT Health Science Center in Fort Worth have similar bans.

the 9.3 percent.

Those who attended for-profit schools are most likely default on loans. In Texas, the latest rates are 16.5 percent at for-profit colleges, 7.7 percent at public colleges and 4.9 percent at private, nonprofit schools.

One reason for the higher default rate for Texas was the state has a greater share of low-income students, who could have more trou-

ble repaying loans. Texans also have to rely more on federal loans because the state offers relatively less aid, according to Torres.

The Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corp. has several programs to help people repay loans and avoid default, said Torres, urging borrowers to seek more information.

"It's everyone's responsibility," Torres said.

We at the Pampa EDC would like to take this opportunity to explain our position on the Family Aquatic Center and why we have taken the stance that we have. That stance being a requirement for the facility to be located at Inez Carter Park versus the current city pool site which we felt did not meet economic development criteria.
The Inez Carter Park site is just one of numerous sites presented to and discussed with the Pampa EDC Board of Directors by Assistant City Manager Shane Stokes at our scheduled Board meetings. This site was chosen after it was determined that for one reason or another, the other locations were not feasible.

The other locations included property in the vicinity of the new junior high school site, West 23rd St, Horace Mann School site, the former Sam Houston Elementary location, and Recreation Park.
First, we have nothing but the highest respect for our Mayor, City Commissioners, and city staff. In our opinion, each and every one of them have only the greatest love and concern for this community and the desire for the continued improvement of Pampa. We greatly appreciate Mr. Stokes for all that he does for this community in his position and also for the diligent hard work that he has put in on the aquatic park project.

Please note that the Pampa EDC is a Title B (previously 4B) Economic Development Corporation. We have a responsibility and are mandated to view each project from economic development, and community development perspectives. With this in mind, we agree that the Family Aquatic Center is a good project for the citizens

of Pampa and that is why when the City came to us requesting financial assistance we agreed to grant a portion of the EDC's funds to them for this project. The Pampa EDC believes that the Family Aquatic Center has the potential to draw significant numbers of people not only locally but from surrounding communities as well.

When the project was first brought to us, there was no pre-determined location or design; therefore, we agreed to help fund the facility with two stipulations.

Those stipulations were that we approve the site and design as we felt that this would be our responsibility as an EDC that is pledging tax payer funds, which is true of any project that we undertake or participate in. Regarding the location, our goal and we believe our obligation, has been to try to help maximize the potential of this excellent marketing tool for Pampa by creating a synergistic effect through site selection near the Pampa Youth and Community Center and close proximity to restaurants and retail businesses in the Coronado Shopping Center and also on or near Hobart Street.

All in all we believe that by locating the Family Aquatic Center at Inez Carter Park, the community gets the benefit of a great recreational facility that is completely brand new with a potentially long life span of decades, still convenient for most of the citizens of Pampa, and creates more opportunities for our local businesses. Bear in mind that additional revenue to the city through added sales tax dollars provides funds to maintain the many wonderful assets that we have in Pampa. In addition, it makes us more competitive with

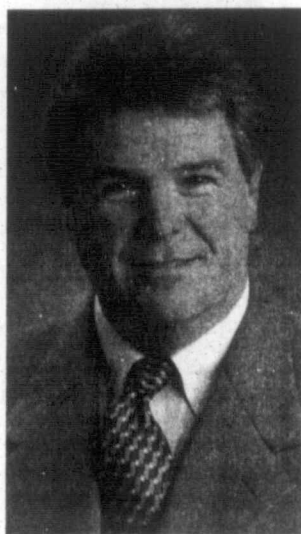

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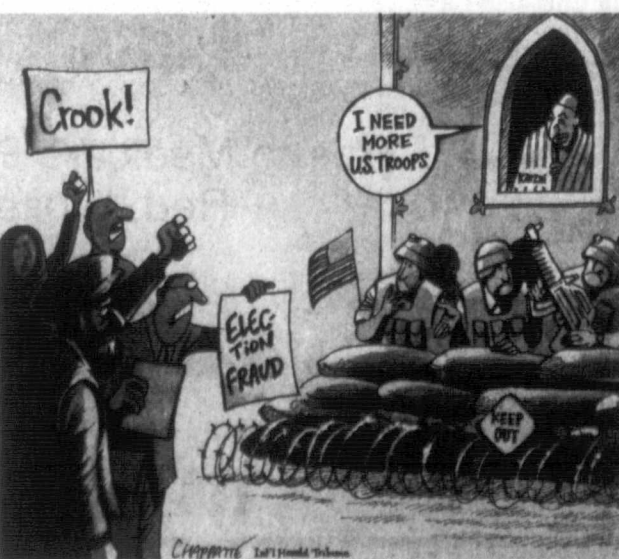
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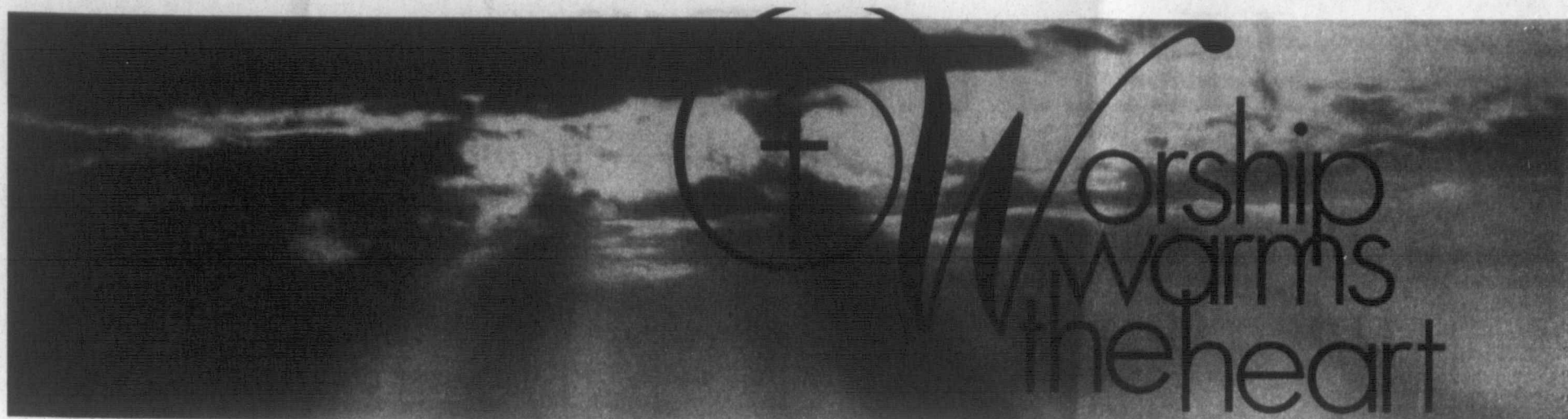

Baseball team selling bricks to upgrade field

Pampa Head Baseball Coach Kaleb Snelgrooves was watching a major league baseball game and noticed the home team had a brick backstop and thought that was something Pampa's field should have. "I thought of a deal we could get a brick backstop and get the public involved and put it on the spectator side and help pay for it," Snelgrooves said. "With all the alumni and great teams we've had come through here, it would be a pretty easy sell."

The Pampa baseball team is selling engraved bricks to help pay for a brick backstop that will be installed in June.

There are three options on bricks people can buy. They can purchase a 12 x 12 bricks for \$1,000, a 4 by 8 brick with 3 lines of text or a 4 by 8 brick with three lines of text and a logo, both costing \$50. The bricks can be made in honor of, in memory of someone, or whatever the buyer wants.

The team is only selling 16, 12 by 12 bricks and already sold 11. Snelgrooves said he is pleased with how the community is backing the project.

"We're not putting this in until June and the community is already behind it," Snelgrooves said. "They're in full arms ready to go."

The head baseball coach said they are targeting businesses to buy the 12 by 12 bricks.

"We're talking to these companies around town," Snelgrooves said. "We're telling them it's a thousand dollars for a big brick that will be there forever."

The team has a table set up at home varsity football games and have a lot of people have shown interest in the fundraiser.

"At football games Judy and Huey (Green) both have been setting a table up and passing out flyers," Snelgrooves said. "Every football game they have been running out of flyers and having people continuously stop by and talk to them."

Huey Green is the organizer of this project and has been helping the team. The head baseball coach said his players will be more involved in the project when the season starts.

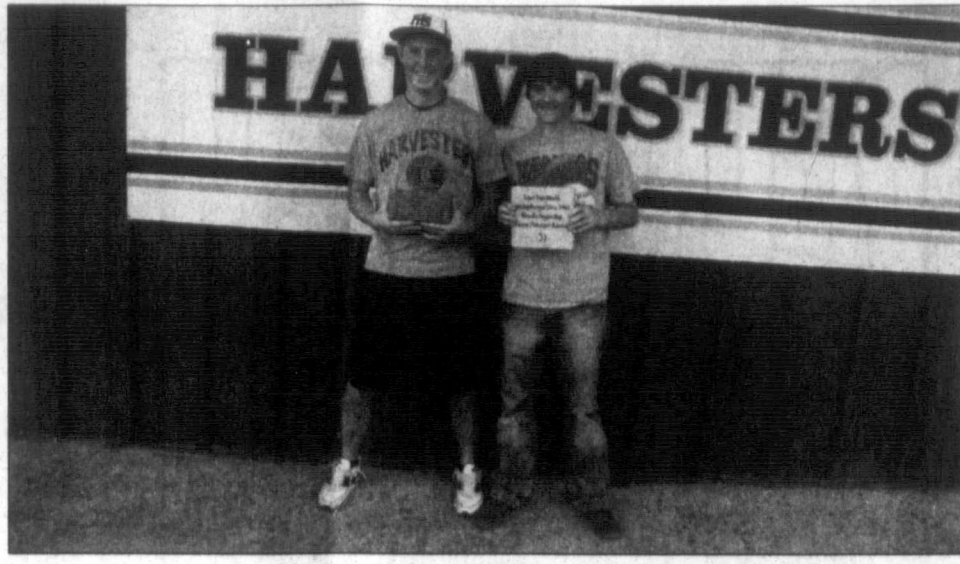
"Right now players aren't involved as they will be," Snelgrooves said. "When the season comes around we are going to have a deal where we're going to ask each kid sells x amount of

bricks. Whether it be 10 or five, it's going to be our fundraiser."

Snelgrooves said having a brick backstop will upgrade the baseball facilities and show the community support.

"We have a very nice field," Snelgrooves said. "So it will dress it up. The community will be behind it and will see their name in a brick."

Tech, Texas lock horns again

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — One second.

So much of Texas' 2008 season — of what it was and what it wouldn't be — can be wrapped up in one second.

One second was all that remained when Texas Tech's Michael Crabtree scooted into the end zone to beat the then-No. 1 Longhorns 39-33. That one second ultimately stood between Texas getting a chance to play for the Big 12 title and, perhaps, a national title.

Ten months later, with the now-No. 2 Longhorns (2-0) and Red Raiders (2-0) set to clash again Saturday night, all conversation goes back to one audacious throw and catch, fans rushing the field (twice) and the one second that was left on the clock as the Longhorns stood in stunned silence.

"One second better," Texas quarterback Colt McCoy said. "We've got to finish the game."

Crabtree's catch was the signature play of the 2008 season. The 2009 Longhorns insist revenge isn't their motivation this week. It's a new season and a new team.

"That's one of the greatest plays that's ever happened. It's on like every commercial," McCoy said. "Put it in the past ... I've never been a revenge-type guy."

Oh, but it may be the only thing that matters for about 101,000 Texas fans at Royal-Memorial Stadium. Up in Lubbock, Red Raiders fans were at a fever pitch from the opening kick to their victory party.

"I expect our fans," Texas coach Mack Brown said, "to be the best they've ever been."

Texas Tech coach Mike Leach seemed unconcerned about the reception that awaits.

Always the contrarian, Leach suggested Texas is more likely to be looking ahead to upcoming games against ranked opponents Oklahoma and Oklahoma State than worried about his unranked Red Raiders.

"I imagine we're probably another game to them," Leach said.

Texas and Texas Tech were originally scheduled

to meet Nov. 7, a more traditional time slot for an intense Big 12 South rivalry game. But after last year's nail-biter and with a television schedule needing a big game this weekend, ABC asked it be moved to a prime-time slot this week.

History suggests the change will not help Texas Tech.

The Red Raiders' spread offense requires extreme precision between the quarterback and receivers, and Leach usually has more time to get it in gear for games like this.

Things haven't turned out well when he didn't. Since 2000, the Red Raiders have lost all four games played against ranked teams in August and September.

And this time, they face Texas with a new quarterback, junior Taylor Potts.

Potts has looked good so far. His 861 yards passing leads the nation and he threw for seven touchdowns last week in a 55-10 win over Rice. Still, Saturday night will be his first start on the road.

Leach was either protecting his quarterback or just teasing the media when he didn't make Potts available to talk with reporters this week. Texas expects him to be latest great gunslinger in Leach's plug-'n-play offense.

"They had seven touchdown passes last week and that's nearly unheard of," Brown said. "Tech gets the credit for coaching on offense, I've never felt like their kids get credit for being really good players."

For McCoy, last season's loss stalled his Heisman Trophy campaign and he finished runner-up to Oklahoma's Sam Bradford.

With Bradford out with a shoulder injury, the Heisman could come down to a two-man race between McCoy and Florida's Tim Tebow, the 2007 winner. A big game in front of a revved-up home crowd with a national television audience could be a big boost.

McCoy has been solid his first two games, passing for 654 yards and five touchdowns with two interceptions.

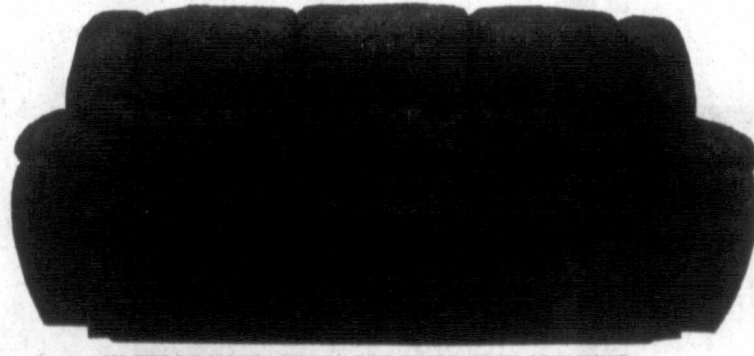
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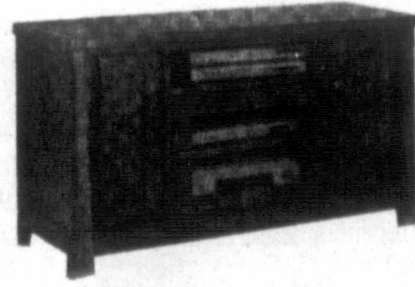
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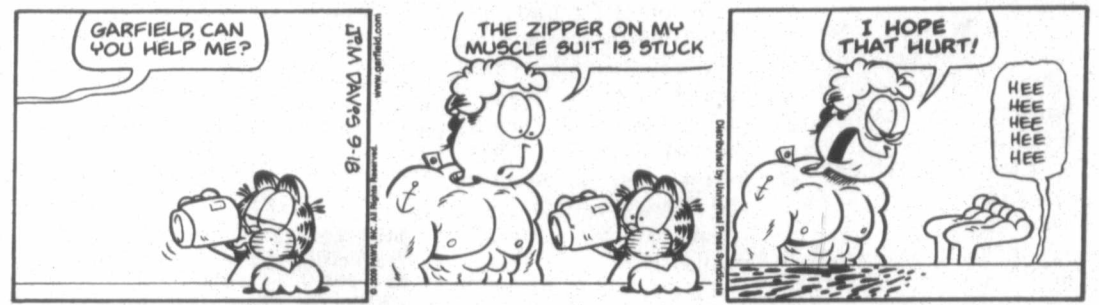
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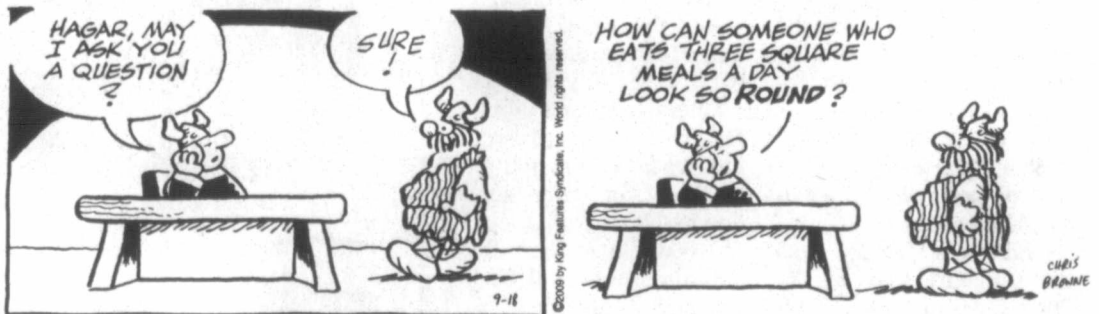
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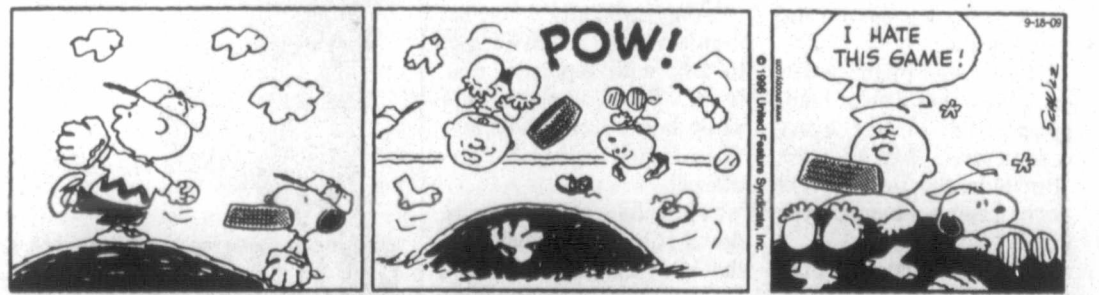
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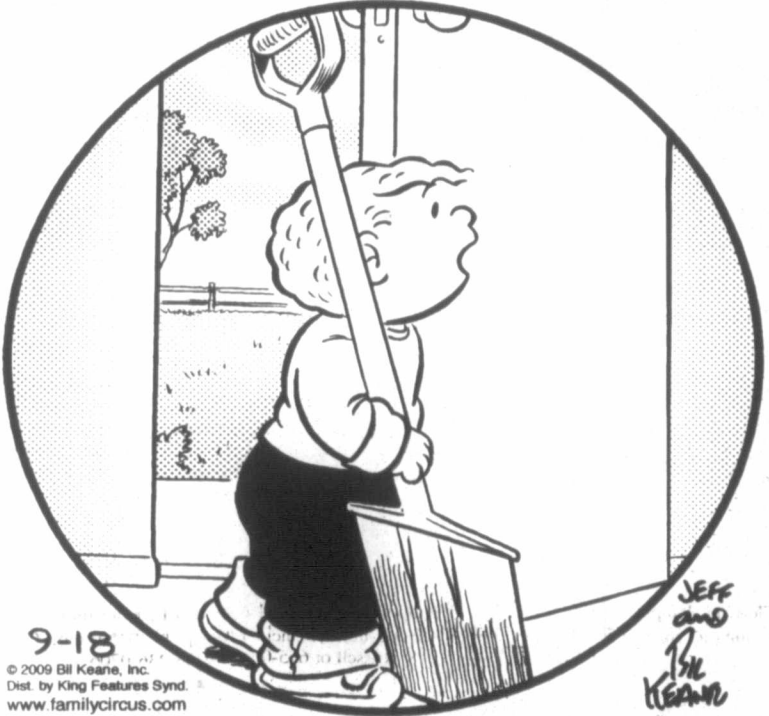

Free prostate screening at PRMC Oct. 2

A free prostate cancer screen is scheduled from 1 - 4 p.m. Friday October 2, in Pampa Regional Medical Center - second floor.

The Screen includes a PSA Blood Test - PSA is a test which measures a substance in the blood called the Prostate Specific Antigen.

PSA blood levels increase in cases of prostate cancer and other prostate diseases.

The also includes a Digital Exam performed by Dr. Grabato. This examination is done by a doctor who will use a gloved finger to examine inside the rectal area to detect any hard lumps or growths in the prostate.

Dr. Grabato recommends an annual digital rectal exam and prostate-specific antigen test for men 50 and over, and men with a family history of prostate cancer.

If either is abnormal, further evaluation should be considered.
